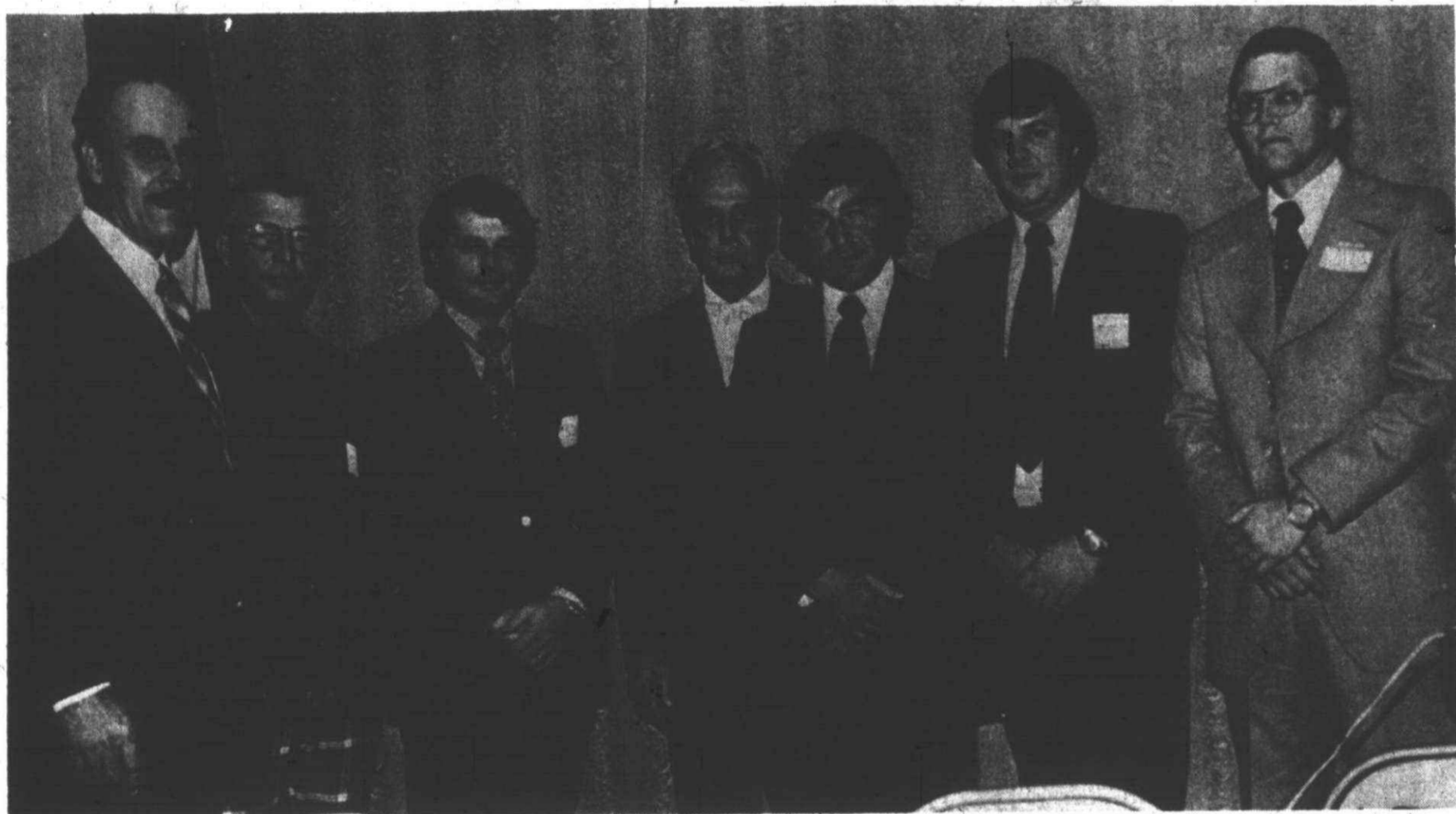

Greenstein highlights 'responsibility'

New board takes office

CANTON—A turnout of close to 100 residents highlighted the swearing-in ceremony of the new Canton Township board.

Judge Dunbar Davis delivered the oaths of office, and set the theme for the evening of "citizen participation."

Newly elected township supervisor Robert Greenstein set the tone of the evening by stating he hoped that "all anger generated in the recent campaign" was dissipated.

He repeated his pledge to make Canton a place where the residents "participate actively" in the affairs of their government.

Talking to wellwishers and onlookers, Greenstein declared: "You may have elected us, but it's up to you to stay involved and see we do our job properly and responsibly. Keep caring, that is the most important part."

Greenstein also presented a plaque to retiring supervisor Philip Dingley, citing "his many years of service and accomplishments."

Unfortunately, Dingley was out of town and was not able to accept the award.

INCOMING treasurer Carl Parsell also presented an award to his predecessor, Grant Campbell.

Parsell thanked Campbell for his assistance, adding: "Grant has been a great help to me, getting me settled in this job and helping me adjust to my new duties."

Judge Davis opened the ceremony with some words of praise for the new officers of the township, Greenstein in particular. "I'm glad to see this turnout because when the people show they are interested it makes officials extend that second effort. We can all agree that with increased citizen input, decisions won't be made by just a small inner circle." Of Greenstein he said: "I've seen Bob in court many times and every time he has always been thoroughly prepared. He is a sincere and able man."

JUDGE DAVIS swore in the four constables first, Timothy Murphy, Gene Reeves, and the husband and wife team of Ann and Jack Blevins.

They were followed by trustees Gerald Cheske, Brian Schwall, and Robert Myers, clerk John Flodin, treasurer Carl Parsell and supervisor Robert Greenstein.

Davis concluded his remarks asserting: "We are looking forward to a great future for Canton Township."

Water bills in Holiday Park are questioned

CANTON—What's happening with the water bills—that's the question a lot of Canton residents are asking. Especially those who live in the Holiday Park subdivision between Joy and Koppernick.

Water bills are running considerably higher for these residents, and there appears to be some discrepancy among bills—with persons who have pools and lawns paying less than those without them.

The water bill is broken down into five parts, one charge is for actual water use as determined by the meter in the home. This amount is then doubled to cover combined water and sewer use. A service charge of \$1.25 is added for meter reading, even though according to some residents, the meter readers are paid by taxes raised through the township millage.

These same residents have been told that this money goes to pay for new meters or repair of meters, yet there is an installation charge to the residents if they have a new meter installed.

AN \$8-FEE is also paid by residents using Canton water for debt-retirement of several bonds used to finance the water and sewer systems in the township.

If the bills are not paid within 10 days after receipt, a 10 per cent penalty charge is tacked onto the next bill. When bills are running as high as they are in Holiday Park, this can

often mean as much as \$9 or \$10 to the homeowner.

Paul Haremski, a resident of the subdivision has contacted the Wayne County Prosecutor's office, and an attorney has been assigned to investigate the matter.

Haremski was charged \$90 for his quarterly water bill which arrived in early October showing that he had used 138,000 gallons. During that period he claimed he was either on vacation or at work most of the time. He has lived in Canton for seven years and he claims this is the first time he has been billed anywhere near this amount. Since he watered his lawn lightly, and has only two children, he says he cannot understand where all the water went.

HIS NEIGHBOR, Betty Williams, has nine children and she paid less than he did for that same period of time, claims Haremski.

Some residents claimed they went to the water department and township hall and picketed in early October when the bills arrived. Many of the bills were then reduced by the water department claims Holiday Park resident Gloria Winner. Some of the residents received new water meters as well.

One resident, who preferred to remain unidentified, had a very large bill, and claimed that she couldn't afford to pay it. She said officials told her not to worry—just pay half and

New wage laws hurt students seeking jobs

WESTLAND — New minimum wage laws and increasing unemployment are frightening away businessmen from the Wayne-Westland School District Youth Employment Service, according to Alma Kelly, the programs coordinator.

The program, instituted more than three years ago as a part-time service, increased to a fulltime service a year and a half ago. Presently, more than 1,000 district residents between ages 14 and 22 have applications on file at the office, located in the central administration office, 3712 South Williams, Wayne.

"Most employers don't seem to realize the new minimum wage doesn't affect those between ages 14-17," says Mrs. Kelly.

AT THE beginning of the year, the federal minimum wage will increase from \$2 to \$2.10. State minimum wage is presently \$1.90.

The center, open from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday, offers temporary part-time, part-time and fulltime employment.

Besides offering a job referral service, the agency also counsels students in job hunting techniques.

"We handle that kind of service on a one-to-one basis. After we find a job for a person, we call them in and instruct them on references, resumes and appearance," says Mrs. Kelly. "If they have any questions we try to answer them so they do well on their job interviews."

Although doing little in follow-up work, the agency will recommend salary ranges to be asked for varying types of employment, she says. Many of the students are willing to take clean-up and maintenance jobs because of the need for money.

"We have just about every kind of job an employer might want to fill. All they have to do is get in contact with us."

THE AGENCY also deals with placing students for professional career jobs. Many of the students have received vocational training and are ready for the employment market," she says.

"The problem we really have is in placing students in the 14-16-year-old

range, who have little or no training. Some Some employers are reluctant to hire them."

The district is a step ahead of the state government, by instituting the program, she says. At the beginning of 1975, all school districts will be required to implement such programs.

"In the whole, this service has proved to be good for area businessmen. Although we do some advertising, the word has gotten around from business to business and they call."

RUNNING AS a 12 month service, the agency has attracted businessmen from many of the surrounding communities. Although those seeking employment must be from the district, any business may apply for employe possibilities.

Presently, businesses from Westland, Wayne, Ypsilanti and Dearborn are in contact with the service.

The program is also in contact with Michigan Employment Security Commission.

"We would like as many businesses as possible to register. We are looking for more jobs for our many applicants."

The service is at one of its peak times in the year, she says. Besides the Christmas employment rush, the service also has busy periods during summer when college students are looking for jobs.

SC counselors attend convention

Counselors from Schoolcraft College recently presented two programs at the Michigan Personnel and Guidance Association convention in Lansing.

It's another Hall of Fame for Eddie

PLYMOUTH—W.W. Edgar, better known as "Eddie", to his thousands of friends in Livonia, Plymouth and the southeastern section of the state discovered he wasn't all alone when he was inducted into the Michigan Amateur Sports Hall of Fame.

Better known to many as "The Stroller", because of the popularity of his column which appears biweekly in the Observer & Eccentric, Eddie was voted into the Hall of Fame last summer and the induction ceremonies were slated for Wednesday night at the Warren Chateau in the city of Warren.

EDDIE, who celebrated his 77th birthday Tuesday, is the dean of the Observer & Eccentric newspapers' editorial staff. He had been honored previously for selection into the Bowling Hall of Fame and to the Media Hall of Fame at the University of Michigan.

This time his many friends in the Plymouth Rotary Club and in the city and township heard of the induction banquet and decided to attend in a body as a tribute to him.

Thus, when R.T. "Tommy" Thompson, executive editor of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers, stepped to the microphone for the presentation ceremonies, he had the support of 30 from Plymouth, 10 from the Detroit Women's Bowling Association and 10 from the Detroit Bowling Proprietors Association.

Eddie for years was the bowling moderator for the state of Michigan and also writes a bowling column "In The Pocket" for the sports pages of the Observer & Eccentric.

"His Friday afternoon radio broadcast has been familiar to bowlers of 20 years.

It was quite a tribute to the 77-year-old who received an outburst of more than 500 as he received the Hall of Fame plaque from his newspaper associate of more than 30 years.

The Plymouth delegation, headed by City Councilman Harold Guenther and State Sen. Carl Pursell, made the trip via two buses, leaving the Mayflower Hotel at 5:30 p.m. for the long trip across town.

"Imagine," said the almost crying Edgar. "All of those people came all the way over here to pay tribute to me. I can hardly believe it."

He was still shaking his head but with a wide smile when he sat down with the plaque after the presentation.

A wonderful, beautiful tribute to a 77-year-old newspaperman who seems to grow younger with age.

Voters elect McCartney to board

He served on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners from 1970-72.

Students waging a 'quiet attack' on drugs

PLYMOUTH—Students and teachers in the Centennial Educational Park are quietly attacking drug problems at Plymouth-Salem and Plymouth-Canton high schools. The attacks, launched by efforts of Drug Abuse Reduction Through Education (DARTE) teams at both schools, is channeled through free information about drugs, group counseling and "rap" sessions. Although some students at both high schools have drug problems, Byron Richardson, job coordinator and DARTE member at Salem, stressed that drug problems in both schools are fewer than at most other high schools. The two high schools enrolled DARTE last February, a program sponsored by the Wayne County Intermediate School District. Richardson and eight students were appointed to Plymouth-Salem's DARTE team, while students, teachers and counselors were appointed to represent Plymouth-Canton in the DARTE program. The teams attended a nine-day DARTE training session, where doctors and resource persons of-

ferred instruction in group communication, group therapy, alcohol education and pharmacology. The teams set up their own programs to combat drug abuse after graduating from the training session. Salem's program, although just begun, revolves around pamphlets, films, lectures, group counseling sessions and mini-courses about drugs that are offered to students on a "no strings-attached" basis. Free pamphlets about the physical dangers and effects of drugs have been available to students in a basement room of Salem High School since September. Richardson said two or three students come in each day to obtain a pamphlet. "I've never seen these kids before," Richardson said. "I don't know where they're coming from. We haven't advertised. We're not that far along yet. Students seem to find out about things, and, if they want information, they come here. This is a place they feel they can go where they won't be incriminated. "Students are interested in finding out if drugs will hurt them," Richardson said, "but they don't want to find

out in a way that everyone will find out about it. They're afraid to go to someone who will tell their parents." Robin Barraco, a pharmacologist from Wayne State University, recently lectured to Salem and Canton ninth graders about the effects of drugs at the Salem DARTE team's request. The lecture was a success, Richardson said, and others will probably be scheduled. On the drawing board are films and mini-courses about drugs, that students may attend during free periods. Much of the Salem team's program is based on the theory that students will more readily discuss their problems with other students than with adults, Richardson said. One group session, in which students discussed drug-related and other problems, has already been held, and more will be scheduled. A goal of the Salem program, Richardson said, is to establish a student service center, where students can drop in to discuss problems and pick up information about drugs. The Salem and Canton teams will run the center jointly, if it is established. The Canton DARTE team ap-

proaches the drug problem from a different angle. "I think our focus is different," said Carla Garbin, a Canton counselor and DARTE team member. "We're not working with substance abuse directly, because we feel that's been done, and it hasn't worked. We want to get kids involved. "Involved kids don't do 'bad' drugs. Bored kids do. Involved kids are basically happy in school and at home. Bored kids and adults can't get a psychological high, so they get a chemical high." To get students involved, the Canton

team has organized "rap" groups that discuss and find solutions to problems that plague teens, Mrs. Garbin said. Students attend the sessions during independent study periods, and many of the topics discussed are proposed by students. "Student reaction has been very high," Mrs. Garbin said. "What's good about it is that it's student-generated." The sessions widen communication between students and between students and teachers, she said. "If you make the school more humane, you'll probably decrease substance abuse."

Recycling project sends Pioneer Girls to camp

PLYMOUTH—Five years of glass collecting has built a strong sense of ecology and a means for financing activities for the Lutheran Pioneer girls. Every year Harland and Dorothy Smith load a borrowed five-ton truck full of pulverized glass and set out for the Owens Illinois Glass plant in Charlotte, south of Lansing. Making the trip three to four times a year, they add \$100 each time to the Pioneer treasury. "What we've been able to do since we started collecting glass is keep from asking the church to support our camping and craft activities," Mrs. Smith said. The Pioneers are a group similar to the Girl Scouts and are sponsored by St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Plymouth. Mrs. Smith leads a group of 50 girls ranging in age from six to 14. "So far we've been able to pay for camping trips and crafts," Mrs. Smith said. "And now we have our eye on a tent we'd like to get for the girls." The Smiths pour a great deal of time and effort into their project as the glass must be sorted according to color, crushed and loaded into a truck before making the two-hour trip to the glass factory. Glass is collected at the church as well as by the Smiths, their Pioneers and fellow parishioners who are willing to bring the glass to one of the drop-off points.

"The church really doesn't have a large storage area," Mrs. Smith said. "And the problem with having people save glass is that unless you collect it regularly, people stop collecting it. "The bars would undoubtedly be great source of glass but once we started to pick it up we'd have to continue to pick on schedule and we just can't make those kinds of promises." Since the project began the Smiths have honed the process down to a science. "My husband and I used to place the glass in a big barrel and break it with a fireplace poker," she said. "But we were getting cut too much because we just couldn't control where the glass would fly. "But it sure was a great way to work out your frustrations." In addition to being dangerous the method of breaking the glass by hand was also time consuming which moved Smith to build a "super smashing machine." "I kind of accidentally on purpose dropped a bottle into a compost shredder to see if it would do the job," Smith said. "It worked and now I can smash about 75 pounds of glass in three minutes." The project has really turned into a family affair as Smith spends his Thursday evening breaking glass, the same time Mrs. Smith conducts her Pioneer meetings. "You should see him when he's working on the glass," Mrs. Smith said. "He looks like a Martian with

the goggles he wears to protect his eyes and the ear muffs he wears to drown out the sound. "And I can really sneak up on him when he's working," she said with a grin. While just about everything that is collected is taken to Corning, the factory will not accept blue glass, plate glass or milk bottles. Mrs. Smith contended the change of seasons has not affect on their collections. "You'd think the pop bottles would be fewer in the winter but there's really no change. The only time there is an increase is just after the Christmas holidays when we get more wine and liquor bottles. "Often people will toss in returnables with the throwaways. The last time we cashed them in we got \$13," she said. While the Smiths have just about worked their smashing process to the point of a science, they do have trouble in borrowing a truck. "It wouldn't be profitable if we took less glass than we do now," Mrs. Smith said. "And what it would cost to rent a truck of that size would take away from our profits." Persons interested in collecting glass can drop it off at the church, or at the Smiths at 41895 Wilcox.

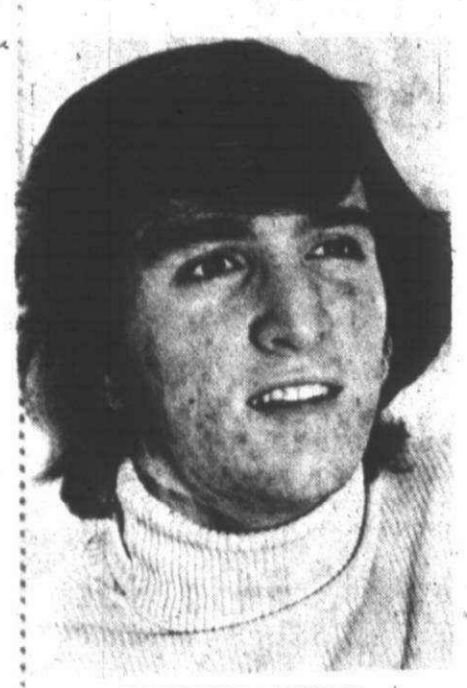

VELLA AND TAYLOR are science majors at UM-D and are taking the course on an elective basis with four other undergraduates.

The two part course (there is a lecture and a supplementary lab) is taught in Oakwood Hospital by Samuel Hancock, a medical physicist, and Dr. John Kim, an assistant professor of physics at UM-D.

The scientific theory of radiation is the basis of the course, and students learn how and why radiation works.

But they also learn the practical and medical applications of radiation, and this involves working with highly sophisticated machines.

Vella and Taylor have been learning how to set up and calibrate radiation machines that take X rays as well as "burn out" internal cancerous growths and tumors.

Both young men are excited by the

of the classroom although it's kind of weird having a class with a bunch of doctors. They sit on one side of the classroom and we sit on the other," said Vella.

NEITHER OF the students is intimidated by the doctors' presence and Taylor finds the knowledge he is gaining from the course is helping him in other areas. Taylor would like to be a doctor in the future.

"This is a good experience for me," said the UM-D junior, "because it gives me practical hospital experience as well as helping me with my current studies." Taylor is a bio-physics major and he hopes to go the U of M Medical School when he graduates in 1976.

He plans to be married in August to Sue Phoney of Farmington, who is studying to be a registered nurse.

They hope someday to "go up north to a small town where there is no doctor" and set up their own family practice.

Vella, 20, is uncertain about his future plans, although he is considering a career in radiation physics as a result of the Oakwood course. He may pursue a master's degree in physics.

Although Vella would rather be skiing and Taylor would rather be backpacking in the Rockies, for now they are content to stick with the books.

'Bet your life' when driving

Although Michigan motorists will drive about 50 per cent fewer miles this Thanksgiving weekend than on major summer holiday weekends, their chances of fatal accident involvement are as great as during a summer holiday period, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

"During the last five Thanksgiving weekends, a total of 141 traffic deaths were recorded," said James G. Mofat, Auto Club general manager. "This compares to 124 deaths on Memorial Day weekends, 151 over Fourth of July holidays and 138 during Labor Day periods for the same five years."

THANKSGIVING IS an especially hazardous holiday because most motorists stay close to home, making short trips to see family and friends with a maximum opportunity to over-indulge in alcohol.

"Statistics show that about 75 per cent of all fatal accidents on holiday weekends occur within 25 miles of the victim's home. Motorists apparently are lulled into a feeling of false security and become less alert in familiar surroundings."

Motorists are expected to log an estimated 350 million miles on Michigan highways during the 102-hour Thanksgiving holiday, which runs from 6 p.m. Wednesday (Nov. 28) to midnight Sunday (Dec. 1). In comparison, more than 690 million miles were traveled on state roads during the past Memorial Day weekend, 701 million miles over the Fourth of July and 627 million miles during the Labor Day weekend.

TO HELP "Bring 'Em Back Alive!" Thanksgiving weekend, Mofat suggests motorists take these precautions:

- Plan trips so they begin and end in daylight. Add extra travel time to compensate for poor weather.
- Don't drive more than 200 miles round-trip if only one day is available for travel. With the 55 miles per hour speed limit in effect, motorists should allow a minimum four hours driving time for travel by freeway and five to six hours for driving on other roads.
- If alcoholic beverages are consumed, remember the "one-for-one" rule: wait one hour for each ounce of alcohol consumed before driving.
- Drive with extra care when in familiar surroundings since most fatal holiday accidents happen near home.
- If driving between the hours of midnight and 7 a.m., make sure your gas tank is at least half full. At least 85 percent of the service stations in Michigan are closed during these hours.

MOTORISTS driving in downtown Detroit on Thanksgiving Day should time their trips to avoid traffic from two major events. The J. L. Hudson Co.'s annual Thanksgiving Day Parade will start at 9:20 a.m. at Woodward and Putnam. About 500,000 spectators are expected to line Woodward Avenue to watch the 45-minute parade. A crowd of 50,000 is anticipated at the Detroit Lions-Denver Broncos football game. Kick-off time is 12:35 p.m. at Tiger Stadium.

Travelers planning trips by air will find flights to Florida, California, Las Vegas and other popular warm weather destinations generally booked solid between Nov. 26 and Dec. 2. Only limited hotel and motel accommodations still are available in these areas for the holiday weekend.

WEATHER permitting, several Michigan ski resorts plan to open some slopes by Thanksgiving. Skiers should call ahead to make sure a report is open before making a trip.

Mini medical courses make study portable

Packaged mini medical courses are having an impact in updating the education of doctors after they leave medical school.

A University of Michigan program, designed to make it easy for practicing physicians to keep up on advances in medical knowledge is now in its third year and growing.

Pressures are growing from professional organizations and government agencies for doctors to complete a specified number of postgraduate education hours in their field each year.

Instead of requiring doctors to leave their patients and return to the campus for refresher courses, the project allows staff physicians to catch up on new knowledge in slack hours.

At the rate of 18 per year, slide-film lectures by experts are sent off to 85 subscriber institutions, mostly community hospitals in the U. S. and Canada. The courses can also be used to instruct medical students, interns, residents and other health professionals such as respiratory therapists.

Called Media Library, the courses require a maximum of 20 minutes viewing by physicians and include a self test at the end. Only facilities needed are a slide projector, tape recorder, a white wall, darkened room and 110-volt electrical outlet.

The U-M program is fully accredited by such organizations as the American Medical Association, the American Osteopathic Association, the American Academy of Family Physicians and the College of Family Physicians of Canada.

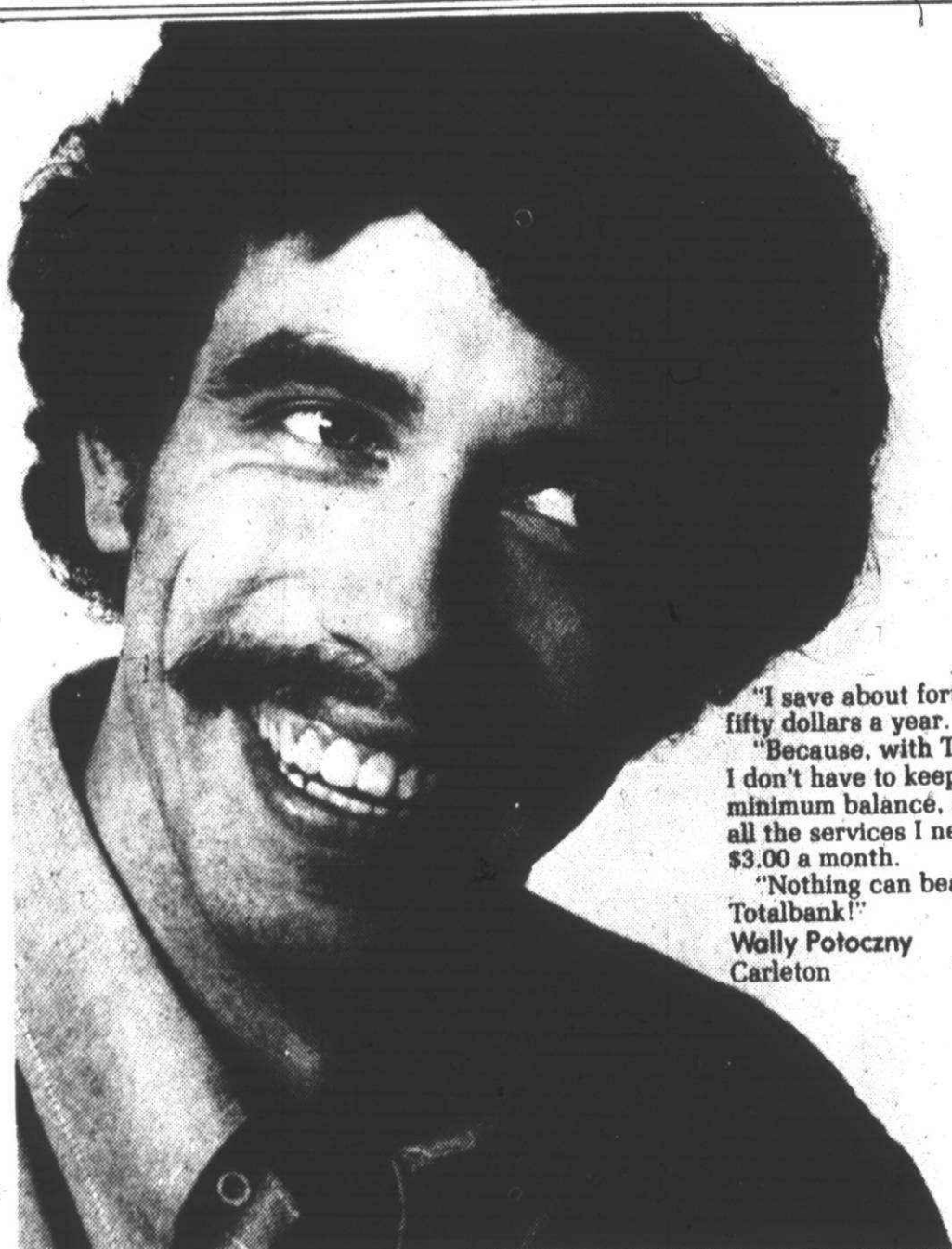

Plymouth once boasted cigar firms

(Part Two)

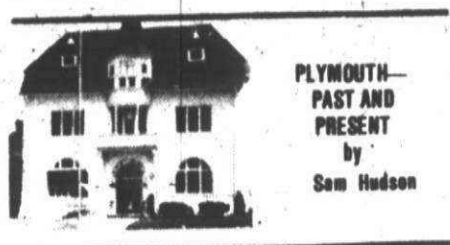
Plymouth was the home of two cigar manufacturers in the 1890s. One was the Plymouth Cigar Company, located on North Mill Street, across from the Hotel Victor. The firm, which employed several cigar makers, was still operating in 1905. In that year young Karl Starkweather attended an auction with his father at which the company put on the block a large quantity of "non-fresh" cigars.

The other operation was a one-man affair. George Springer began making cigars in 1896 in a 22x35 foot shop at the rear of his home. He lived on North Mill within a block of his chief competitor. Springer's brand names included "Our Senator," "The Plymouth Mail," "Springer's Best," "Chief Hunter," "Horsenan's Favorite," "Hotel Plymouth," "Hotel Victor," and "Plymouth Belle." His cigars are said to have sold well in Northville as well as in Plymouth.

Eventually Springer began to combine cigar rolling with a more eventful career—that of law enforcement officer. He became deputy sheriff of Plymouth Township in 1900 and village marshal in 1912. A one-man police force for several years, Springer evidently impressed the local citizenry with his efficiency. In 1916, the "Plymouth Mail" reported: "Springer's clever work has landed many desperate criminals behind the bars and the fraternity of crooks has learned that officer Springer is a good man to avoid."

Springer finally hired Charlie Thumme to assist him in police work. No uniform came with the job, so Thumme adapted his interurban trolley conductor's uniform for use when he was on police duty. Chief Springer eventually gave up making cigars, devoted full time to law enforcement, and remained in office until 1933 when he was succeeded by Vaughan R. Smith.

One of many livery stables which existed in Plymouth was opened by Czar Penny, in 1892, near the present Mayflower Hotel. Penny advertised that he had "a number of nice rigs and



good horses." He made a specialty of teaming and announced that he had "a first class team for that purpose."

The Plymouth Creamery Company, organized in 1901 by a local cooperative group, was off North Main Street, east of the railroad tracks. It was near the McLaren Lumber Company, one of the oldest business firms still existing in Plymouth. Farmers came from miles around to empty their milk cans and to exchange pleasantries with creamery superintendent Matthew Powell. Matt was called "Butter" Powell long after the company was sold. About 1912, the plant became a receiving station for the De-

troit Creamery Company, makers of "Velvet" ice cream.

In 1908, Williams Brothers Pickle Company was operating a tomato pulp branch along the Pere Marquette tracks in North Village, near the spot where the Jolliffe Cheese Company had been. The pulp was shipped to the firm's main plant in Detroit to be made into ketchup. The company contracted with local farmers to grow tomatoes on an acreage basis. Young Karl Starkweather was one who agreed to grow five acres of tomatoes in 1908. The company paid the grower \$6 a ton, or approximately 15 cents per bushel. "None of us grew rich growing tomatoes that year," Karl later recalled.

From about 1914 to 1917, International Milk Products Company had a plant in Plymouth near where the creamery had been located. The firm processed milk into powdered form.

Of the more than 3,000 cars and trucks that have been made in the United States since the advent of the auto, one was manufactured in Plymouth. Plymouth's auto producer, the Alter Company, was organized in 1914 by Guy Hamilton, F.M. Woodward and others. Operating in a 16,000

square foot, two-story building, the firm employed 100 men at peak periods. The Alter, "a medium-priced car," sold in 1916 for \$685. It had a wheel base of 108 inches, was equipped with a 27 horse power motor, and had its gas tank under the cowl. The Alter was on the market from 1915 to 1917.

The latest addition to manufacturing in Plymouth in 1916 was the Plymouth Motor Castings Company. Started in 1915 by J. B. Hickey and John F. Fitzgerald of Detroit, the firm specialized in the manufacture of gray iron and semi-steel motor castings sold primarily to automobile manufacturers. The plant employed 20 men and had a capacity of five tons of metal per day.

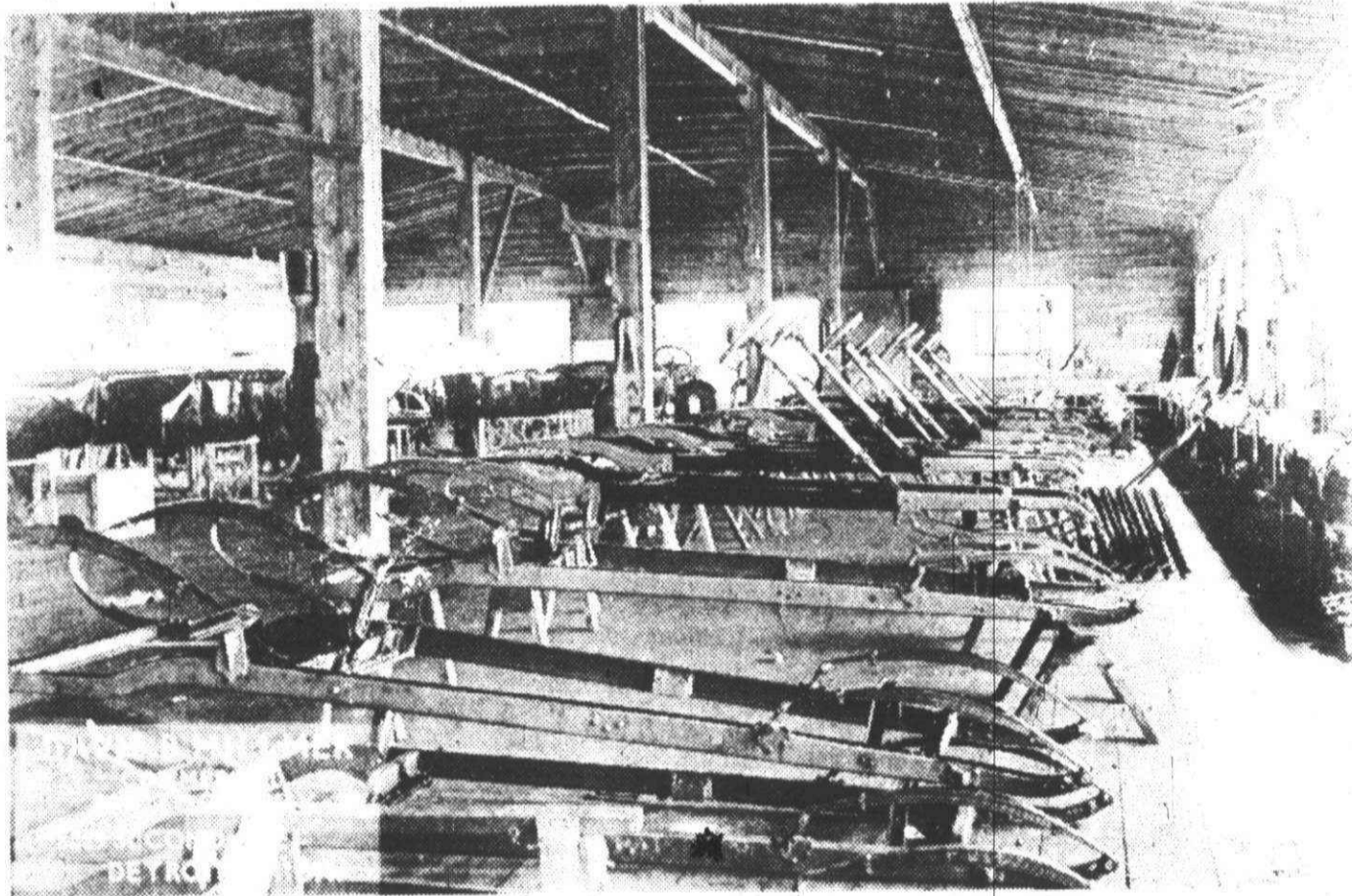
These, and many other business firms no longer in existence, were part of Plymouth's commercial past. The wind passed over them, and they are gone.

A Bahamian taxi driver will take you and your luggage on a wrong-side-of-the-road (at least to Americans) short trip to "the" hotel.

ONLY ONE on the island, the Treasure Cay Beach Hotel is just two stories high and hasn't got a superabundance of rooms.

But there are lots and lots of villas, mostly owned by landlords who let the hotel complex rent them to tourists.

The hotel and owner split the rents, the hotel taking a maintenance fee and the owner getting monthly purchase payments taken care of.

The development of Treasure Cay (pronounced "key" meaning "island") centers around these real-estate sales. You may want to invest in a hideaway that "pays for itself," allowing you to vacation in your own villa at times you don't wish to rent it out.

THE SPACIOUS two-bedroom, two-bath villas have their own house-keeping kitchens and breakfast bar. Outside the doorwall is a patio with lounge furniture, but you probably won't hang around the villa much.

Just a leisurely stroll away is the beach, which has been called one of the most beautiful in the Bahamas. The sugar sand is almost white and powder fine.

The water along the three and one-

half mile beach is clear aquamarine. You'll probably find yourself all alone on your stretch of beach. If you want company, there's a hotel outdoor pool, beach bar and patio dining.

Order up a Goombay Smash (rum and coconut are among the ingredients) and relax by the deep pool.

ACTUALLY, during the day you probably won't even see too many people at the pool. Clay tennis courts, golf course and marina beckon the sports-minded.

You can go out in the early morning with a guide and boat for a unique experience—bonefishing. Fishermen claim the sport with these fast-moving fish is exhilarating.

Or, by charter boat you can visit one of the nearby keys. At Great Guana Key, the deserted beach has its bounty of small white shells you can discover. There's also fishing from the moored boat and swimming.

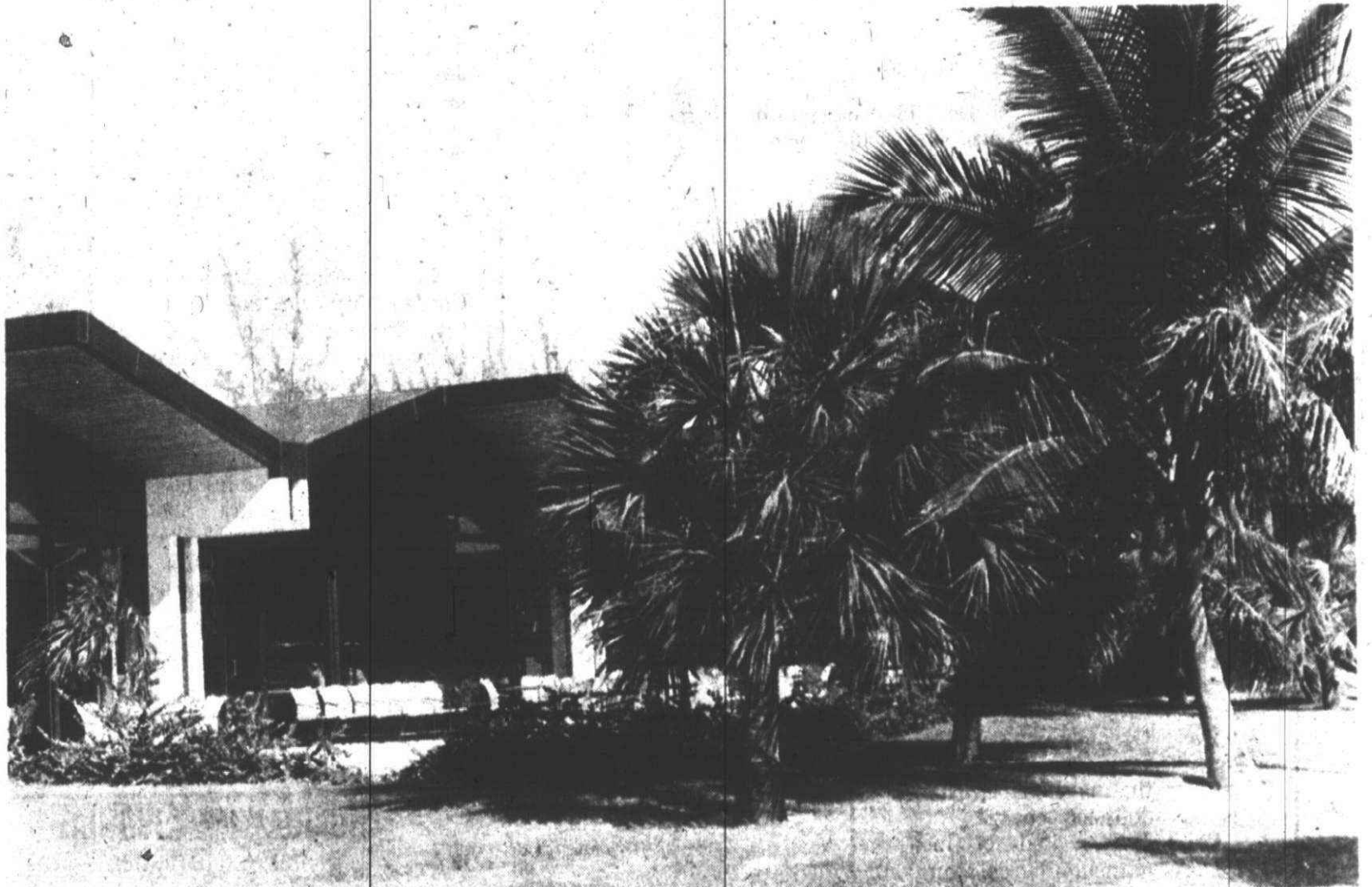
You may want to have lunch at the informal Guana Harbour Club, enjoying conch (pronounced "conk") chowder and a basket of mixed conch, grouper (a type of fish) and turtle fritters. The native food has a satisfying, fill-you-up flavor, "mon."

AT NIGHT, everybody congregates at the hotel dining room for a long, leisurely meal. You may want to try grouper (grouper fingers are served at the weekly manager's cocktail party at the pool) or huge Bahamian lobster for a main course.

The upstairs cocktail lounge provides after-dinner drinks and piano-bar entertainment. Restful close to an hectic way of life.

Be sure to get to the International Airport at least an hour prior to departure time. Bahamasair flights have a way of leaving as much as one half hour before schedule.

Apple for all seasons, happy going into a pie

West winds are blowing strongly now here at Old Arbes on the hill and all the trees around our scenic ravine are blushing their naturally brilliant tones that light the cobalt skies parallel to an inferno of apple red.

Sometimes I get a little jealous because my leaves are not necessarily the colors I want, or perhaps I'm just too picky and want nothing but the very best so I, too, can be admired the year through. In the spring, with all that enervating competition is the most difficult time of all.

The Montmorency blooms are right in front of the entrance and become so pushy around May that I dread the longer days to come at that time of year, and I'm so thankful when evening falls.

Now don't get me wrong, the Montmorencys are beautiful and I'm tickled pink they are doing so well, but does there have to be such harmony and success with her entire family on both sides of the entrance gate?

LOOK AT Forsythia with her long sensuous arms formally bound into a fortress of bright yummy yellow blooms (even though they are last year's color, she still can be intimidating.)

The French lilacs with their tiny purple flowers are so beautiful, and their foreign scent perfumes the air into a freshness so reminiscent of youth. It makes it impossible after people see the glorious coloration that the month of May brings, to bare face.

Life seems so insignificant to me. Oh, why can't I just pale into a kaleidoscope of unimportance!

June and July aren't much better but the intense heat of August makes tiny droplets form like organic orbs (notwithstanding the May trauma, however)—and soon rain with its natural goodness of iron will give the vital substance required to go on and form delightfully delicious apples.

I CAN SEE clearly now that the people are showing definite interest in

- 1/2 tablespoon cinnamon
- 1/4 lb. sweet unsalted butter
- 3 tablespoon apple butter

Toss all the ingredients into a large bowl like you would for a tossed salad. You would probably have better luck if your hands were used to replace the spoons.

(The moisture of your hands will soften the butter and sugar into a sauce.) Pour into a 10" pie dish of glass, that has been lined with dough. Sprinkle with crummy dough topping and bake on a rack, in a low heat oven 325 degrees F. on the bottom shelf for about an hour. The crust will become a golden hue.

APPLE OF MY EYE PIE DOUGH

- 1 lb. margarine
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- ICE water (not too much)

In an electric mixer add the first four ingredients and blend with a paddle, butter will become fluffy. Then add the flour and fold until well blended. Add a few drops of ice water and continue to mix momentarily.

This pie crust is not like the run-of-the-mill doughs. I discovered this recipe in France at the Ecole Hoteliere de Paris. They call it Pate Brisee.

Refrigerate it for an hour or freeze it.

When I make this pie, almost every day of apple season, I press the dough with my fingers around the glass pie dish as if it were pinch sculpture. It works.

CRUMMY DOUGH TOPPING

Take a handful of remaining dough and add about 4 tablespoons of flour, and about the same amount of sugar, brown sugar if you have some on hand. Mix by pressing flour and sugar together, then breaking them apart thus forming crumbs.

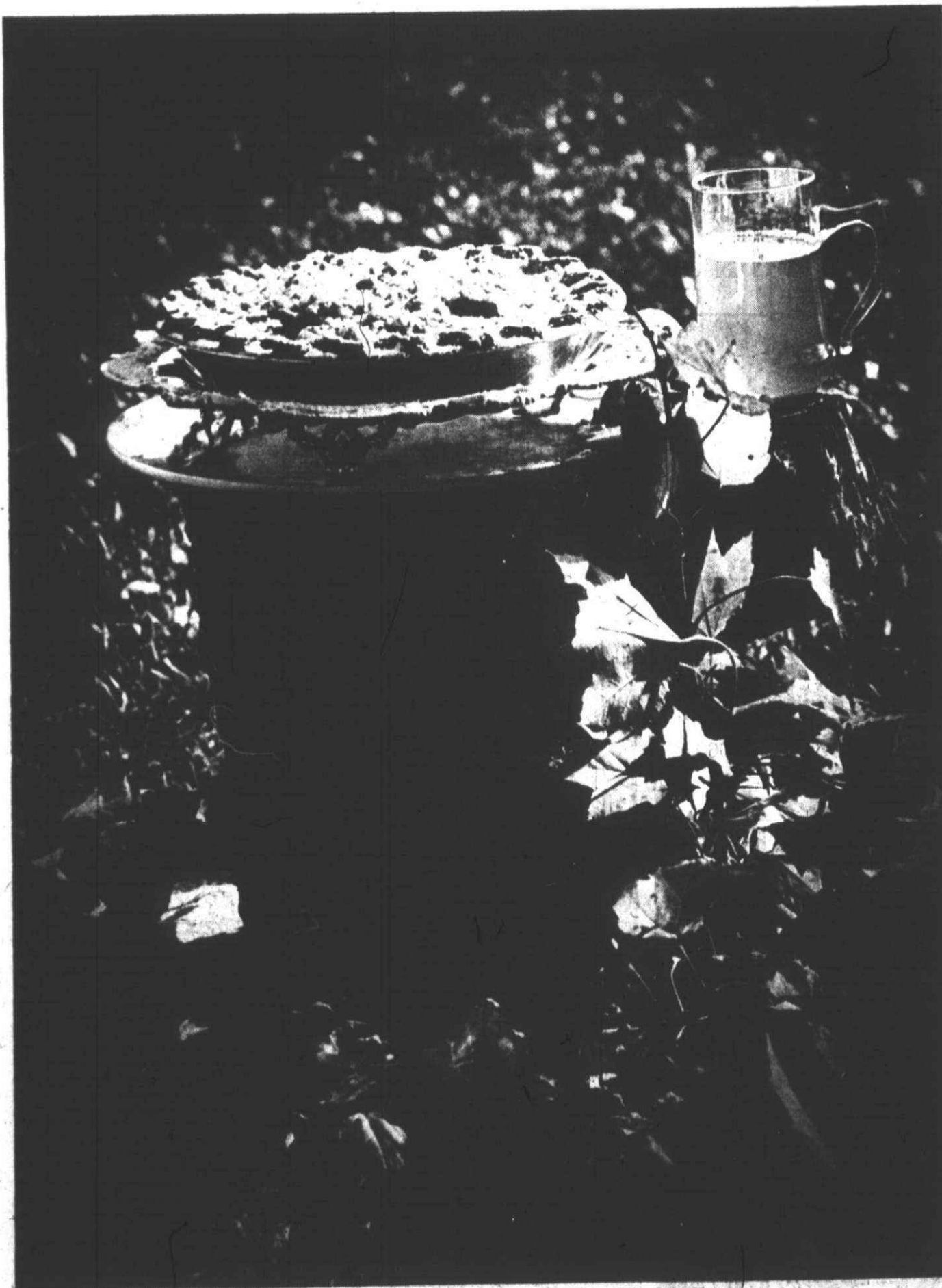





All must share in building the township

And now, on with the show... Everyone has been duly sworn in and the job of setting Canton on a brand new road has begun.

A tone of openness is presented as part of the new order for the day with "citizen input" as the key ingredient for making Canton into something better.

Judge Dunbar Davis rather eloquently pointed out to a crowd of nearly 100 residents last Wednesday that his experience has proved that there is a "combined wisdom" when more than just a few people are involved in making a decision.

CALL IT WISDOM, compromise or bargaining, but we feel that it's necessary for good government.

It has to begin among the board members themselves. We would have to be wise not to recognize that a four-man slate was elected on Nov. 5 and that those four could constitute a majority vote on any issue that came before the board. The power in that bloc of votes, could turn every decision made by the board into a dogmatic, hard line stand, placing decisions in the hands of political whim, rather than sound rational judgment.

A team of seven, with equal input to decision making, is quite obviously preferable to a united voice of four, acting almost as one.

Judge Davis also noted that if there were increased citizen input in government, decisions would not be made by just a small inner circle.

Those citizens who feel that their views will be represented on the new board, have the same responsibility to provide the input that was provided prior to the election. Without citizen voices in board sessions, positions that seemed at the forefront prior to the election, can become diluted or even forgotten.

A MEMBER OF a homeowners group in attendance last Wednesday evening at the swearing-in ceremonies rather cockily noted that he felt good knowing that he would no longer have to fight for decisions by the board that his group favored. While he may no longer have to fight for decisions, his presence and his voice are just as important now as they might have been in the past.

To borrow a few catchwords, Robert Greenstein's brief speech following his oath of office touched upon "responsibility" and "caring." A lot of people share the responsibilities of insuring that Canton grows in an orderly fashion. Responsible government is dependent upon a responsible citizenry.

And caring about your community doesn't end with an election, be it a victory or a defeat. We are hopeful that the new supervisor, all members of the board and all residents of Canton will continue to care and share in the building of a new Canton.



The Stroller When grampy carved the turkey

While Thanksgiving Day is steeped in tradition, many of the old time customs have changed through the years.

We no longer ride out into the country to visit our favorite farmer to purchase a turkey and then go through the barbaric method of preparing it for the festive board.

The Stroller shudders just to think of the manner in which the birds legs were tied together, before it was hung over the wash line in the yard with its head dangling toward the ground.

Then the strongest of heart would grab it by the neck, cut off its head and let it hang there for the bleeding process before the arduous task of removing the feathers—always a painstaking job.

In our modern times we wouldn't think of any such custom. Instead, the turkey is fully dressed when purchased and oftentimes is already stuffed.

IN THE PASSING years a glamorous character also has been removed from the scene. He is the "carver" who always made quite a show of standing at the head of the table, surrounded by his family, and gracefully carved the golden brown bird.

So deft were some of these carvers that not a sliver of meat—dark or white—was left on the carcass.

The mere mention of the "Carver" brings back memories of The Stroller's grandfather, who spent his later years in the role of a professional veteran of the Grand Army of the Republic. No matter where he was you could be sure that he was telling the exploits of the GAR. That is, no matter where he would be you could bet that he was telling about the many hardships suffered at the Battle of Gettysburg—except on Thanksgiving Day.

On this day—one he always looked forward to—he was the main character at the dinner table, and he played the part to the hilt.

He would attire himself in the long white apron and the white cap of a chef. Then he'd have the roast bird placed in front of him while the diners o'd and ah'd at the sight of it.

THEN, LIKE A GREAT swordsman he'd lift high the emory spear on which he'd sharpen the knife. When this was finished he'd start carving—and no, one ever did a more artistic job.

We'd all pass our plates and announce our choice—white or dark meat—and he would manipulate that carcass until he had, just the part he wanted sliced. What an artist!

And when the carving finally was done the old "General" would take

his place at the head of the table, say a bit of thanks to have the family around and then extend the wish that we all enjoyed the meal.

Oftimes he didn't eat very much. He was just satisfied that he had done the job again to everyone's satisfaction.

He's long gone from the scene and with him went much of the old custom carving of the bird at the table. Today, the carving usually is done in the kitchen, where it makes not a bit of difference if the carver misses a joint, or rips a leg off the bird.

Oftentimes this amounts to something akin to mangling by the in-

experienced. But the diners seldom are aware of this as the platter is brought to the table.

THIS NEVER would have happened in grampy's day. And while he was a great turkey carver, he also was a temperamental artist, too.

There was one Thanksgiving Day when he visited one of his daughter's homes for dinner. And when he wasn't asked to carve he rose from the table, took his coat and hat and went home.

Is it any wonder that The Stroller will be thinking of him on this Thanksgiving Day?

Charles Osgood says media must present good and bad news

Charles Osgood used the example of a specially-made mirror costing \$650 to explain to his Livonia Town Hall audience the function of the news media.

"The mirror was so expensive because it had a special handle," said Osgood, a CBS radio newsmen. "By turning it, a person could change the way he looked. He could make himself thinner or more attractive."

"That is what people want. They don't want the mirror to show their flaws."

OSGOOD POINTED out that it is the same way with the news. "You don't like to hear that there is going to be difficulty dealing with inflation and other problems," he said. "You don't like to hear bad news. That is why the media became unpopular during Watergate."

The function of a news organization is not just to relay what the elected official has to say. The newsmen has to get more than a public relations view. He has to find his own story.

While Osgood often handles late-breaking big news on his shows, he has found that his listeners frequently respond more to the human aspect of the news.

"The story I did that got the most attention concerned a girl who showed up for her graduation in a purple dress," he said. "Her teacher sent her home because the girls had been asked to wear blue outfits. The fact that so many people expressed an interest in that story and mailed me letters to send on to the girl suggests things that happen to everyday people are also news."

Also news was a story Osgood told about a man in Iowa who lost his coin in a vending machine and then took out a gun and shot it.

THE BROADCASTER received both a good laugh and a round of applause when he coined a new word about the incident. He called the incident a case of vendicide.

One of his stories happened to Osgood himself. What seemed to be destined to become a frightening incident took place when he was covering

what could have become a race riot in Patterson, N.J.

Stepping out of his news vehicle, he was approached by a very menacing group who demanded to know if he was the from radio station.

Osgood said he was. "Do you know cousin Bruce?" asked one of the men, causing Osgood to breathe a long sigh of relief.

Osgood also related a number of stories and comments about celebrities in the news and political fields.

About Ron Nessen, the new presidential press secretary, he recalled this incident.

"DURING THE march from Selma, Ala., I rushed up to interview Martin Luther King after a speech," Osgood began.

"While we were talking I suddenly felt someone jab my side hard with his elbow. When I turned around I found it was the TV man from NBC trying to terminate my CBS radio interview with Dr. King."

"For a while we dueled with our elbows, forgetting that we were being simulcast — he on my radio and I on his TV. That was Ron Nessen."

About newsbroadcaster Edwin Newman, Osgood said, "There is no better interviewer in the business," adding "he's my idol."

About Harry Truman, he recalled placing a call to him at the Truman Library in Missouri only to have the ex-president himself answer.

Osgood was once part of a covey of newshawks who used to cover Truman's early morning strolls, often walking backwards in order to face the former president.

He sheepishly admitted that he had once asked Truman, "What do you think of your grandchildren?" The plainspeaking president then said, "What kind of a question is that?"

TO HIS AUDIENCE Osgood laughingly agreed it was not an outstanding one.

From the women in his audience Osgood received a wave of applause when it was announced that he is a new father. In an interview at lunch he said that he and his wife participated in the LaMaze childbirth method which stresses special education about childbirth for the couple and breathing lessons for the wife.

"I was present for the whole thing, including the actual birth of my daughter," said Osgood. "I wouldn't have missed it for anything."

Among questions asked him was one wondering why the press did not pursue the incident at Chappaquiddick as it did Watergate.

"I thought it was very well covered considering it involved the junior senator from Massachusetts," said Osgood. "In fact, it was covered so well

that Kennedy is no longer a viable presidential candidate.

"THE REASON Watergate was covered so much longer was that it involved the president and there were all kinds of hearings and developments that kept coming up."

When pressed further as to whether he believed the media had gone to the bottom of the matter, Osgood replied, "I don't think so."

Osgood admits that his job writing and broadcasting three news segments a day (heard locally over WJR), each of which is six minutes long is tension-filled, mostly because he writes for a deadline.

To relax he leaves his home in New York City for a sail on Long Island Sound. He also plays tennis.

Tender loving care comes to Livonia schools

In two of Livonia's elementary schools, small students are soon to be in for a shock. They're going to discover that the school secretary is no longer the school nurse.

Bruised bones and cut fingers will now be taken to the previously unmanned school clinic where they will be looked at by a volunteer health aid.

She will be there because of a program introduced by LOVE (Livonia Office of Volunteer Energies), which is operating under a federal grant to initiate volunteer programs where a need exists.

Twenty-one women recently took a LOVE-arranged eight-hour course in first aid, earning an official Red Cross apron to take to their jobs in two elementary schools and one junior high school in Livonia.

THE SCHOOLS participating in this pilot program are Wilson and Randolph elementary schools and Emerson Junior High School.

In their Red Cross classes, these volunteers learned how to minister to minor cuts and bruises and to identify symptoms. They reviewed the taking of a temperature and the reading of a pulse.

But they all know their real contribution will be in the field of TLC, tender loving care.

"Half of the healing process is calming the fears of the child," said Lois Wallner, on the day of her "graduation" ceremony. "If you can do that then half the battle is won."

Mrs. Wallner noted the school secretary used to have to leave her desk to take care of the sick children.

"While she was attending a hurt youngster in the health room, her phone would ring and she would have to leave to answer it."

Mrs. Wallner has had RN training but explained that the job of the volunteer aide would not involve medication.

"Just helping them gives you a feeling of self-satisfaction," she said. "That's enough for me."

MRS. SHEILA OGG, another volunteer, estimated that half of the mothers in her neighborhood work. She became interested in the program because her son was once hit in the stomach with a ball "and there was no one there to take his temperature."

"Now someone will always be there during the lunch period when most of the accidents occur," she said. "There is no way some mothers can get to school and we have to have someone who can stay at school with a sick child. Hand-holding helps a lot of problems."

Like the other volunteers, Joy Boase, mother of seven, has spent many hours of her spare time as a school helper. She was then recruited by the school for the medical program.

"Taking care of children always appealed to me," she said. "I thought I could be of some help and give something back to the community. There is too much taken today and not enough given."

JOYCE CANCELLA was pleased to learn in her preparatory course what services are available in the community to help people.

"My kids think it's great that I'll be working in the clinic," she said.

The principal of Emerson Junior High believes the plan is "a beautiful idea and so far it is going fine."

Feri Thomas said, "I feel more comfortable knowing that a student will receive quick attention if he is hurt or sick," adding that previously aiding the sick child "was often held up by the bureaucratic system."

"We had to wait for a counselor or secretary to handle the situation," he said. "Now a mother can receive the student, find out how sick he is, call home if necessary and then quickly check him out."

"The volunteers came in during a small flu epidemic so they were loaded with people. They have already been a big help."

JOAN DUGGAN, program director for LOVE pointed out that a group of registered nurses stands ready to backstop the volunteers in the schools should help be needed.

"They also will evaluate health records and give depth to the program," she said. "They taught the volunteers and once this pilot program runs a few months and the problems are ironed out, they will teach other volunteers as the program is expanded into other schools."

"Our women are trained in such things as temperature reading but they also have learned to identify drug users and to know what they can't do. Our course stressed confidentiality. What happens at their school is confidential and this is a great part of their responsibility."

Four registered nurses have volunteered to work with the program, including Pat Price, who is its coordinator, Judy Wright, Sharon Galindo and Betty Tatigian, wife of Harry Tatigian, city attorney.

Betty Fairham, Livonia Red Cross representative, also cooperated with the program.

Questioning a man's contributions

Long after he had become a millionaire several times over, comedian Bob Hope continued his entertaining of U.S. troops in Vietnam, a contribution that had won him the deep gratitude of millions of GIs overseas during World War II.

No one during World War II ever suggested that Hope either loved war or was an instrument of President Roosevelt's foreign or military policy.

But the long U.S. involvement in Vietnam was so controversial that numbers of militant clergy critics concluded that Hope's annually spending Christmas trying to bring some cheer to lonely soldiers was almost a war crime.

Hence, by the narrow margin of three votes, such clergy were able to oblige the Protestant Council of New York to reverse its previously-announced decision to award Bob Hope the annual "family of man" award.

HOPE GOOD-NATUREDLY responded to this monumental insult by remarking that he had already received a great many awards.

For some reason or another, there was no such reversal when this award was announced as being made to Presidents John Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon, as well as Dr. Henry Kissinger, none of whom were prominent as Vietnamese war protesters.

The 1974 recipient of this award, by vote of the city's 1,700 member churches and 2,000 affiliated business firms, is the Rev. William Tolbert Jr., president of the Republic of Liberia since 1971 and since 1961, vice president to the late Liberian strongman William Tubman.

IS THERE CAREFUL investigation of all recipients of this award for "broad massive contributions to hu-

manity...all mankind as one family under God?"

"We try to be careful," replied the council's top executive, Dr. Dan Potter.

Has the council gone on record in opposition to racial segregation?

"By all means," replied the Rev. Dr. Potter. "There have been repeated resolutions condemning racial segregation."

Then what does the Protestant Council of New York make of Article 5, Sections 12 and 13 of the Constitution of the Republic of Liberia, to wit:

"No person shall be entitled to hold real estate in this Republic unless he be a citizen of same...None but Negroes, or persons of Negro descent shall

Potter answered: "I didn't know about those provisions. But should a mother say to her child 'I can't love you because you smoke'?"

Indeed not.

ONE CHILD of God who smokes, and is head of another racially-segregated African country, is Prime Minister Baltazar Johannes Vorster of the Republic of South Africa.

But since the segregation in South

Africa is imposed by whites rather than by blacks (as in Liberia), Dr. Vorster is not at all likely to be honored as in President Tolbert's citation:

"Leader of one of Africa's most progressive republics...continued commitment as a Baptist minister to the Christian religion in Africa. His faith and ideals have been translated into concrete actions."

Rockefeller will be confirmed: Griffin

LIVONIA—Things aren't as bad as they seem, U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin (R-Michigan) told the Livonia Chamber of Commerce at Madonna College.

The senator even thinks that vice president-nominee Nelson Rockefeller will be confirmed, and admitted that's a rosy outlook.

Griffin himself had questioned the former N.Y. governor during the Senate Rules Committee hearings before arriving in Livonia for the chamber speech.

HIS QUESTIONS had centered on Rockefeller's personal wealth, and "the book" written by Victor Lasky about Arthur Goldberg, Rockefeller's Democratic opponent in 1970.

"I think Rockefeller will be confirmed by most of the Senate Rules Committee," Griffin told the Observer & Eccentric following his speech.

Griffin would not commit himself to agreeing that the economy is in a state of recession.

"We have a psychological problem in this country, because people think the economy is going downhill. Things will improve when we start President (Gerald) Ford's 31-point program.

"We've got to sell cars and we will, as soon as interest rates come down and cars become easier to finance."

GRIFFIN'S SPEECH was very nearly an analysis of the American psyche.

"We suffer in this country from a horrible guilt complex," he said. "We have a sense of gloom and doom, a self-destruct syndrome."

He had some unkind words for the news media. "The network media," as the senator was careful to add later.

"What people know first hand in this country, they think well of. But what information is gathered by the media they think ill of. 'The network news philosophy is 'good news is not news,'" said Griffin, paraphrasing writer Ben Wattenberg.

Again referring to Wattenberg, the senator stated the press corps has "perfected techniques of reporting the bark on trees, but not the forest."

Griffin cited Wattenberg's thesis that there is "a great divergence between appearance and reality in this country."

"THERE IS a difference between mere rhetoric and real guilt," said the senator. "We're told that our society is sick; people are alienated, the gap between rich and poor is widening, that God is dead.

"But in reality despite our real economic problems, our real purchasing power is fantastic. The average income has nearly doubled in the last 20 years, the income of blacks has gone up considerably, the number of women in the labor force has increased steadily, college enrollments have doubled in 12 years, our work patterns have become more flexible, and there are only six per cent unskilled in our work force," said Griffin.

"The real facts are at sharp odds with the rhetoric of despair and failure," he concluded.

"The real America is an unprecedented America of real social progress. Americans are pleased with their personal lives and expect their futures to improve. Yet the outlook has been gloomy."

"I am interested in what people think of Congress. But Congress competes with the used car salesman and the garbage collector for level of prestige.

"And yet, most Americans believe their Congressmen are doing a good job; because most Americans really

know their own Congressmen," he said.

"I am of the conclusion that our domestic malaise lies in our media system, which undermines progress. Politicians thrive on coverage and our media thrives on conflict. By kicking or criticizing the President, by being controversial, a politician can get cov-

erage; a shoot-from-the-hip politician makes a better show than does the thoughtful, inarticulate politician.

"WE MUST demand higher standards from both our politicians and our media.

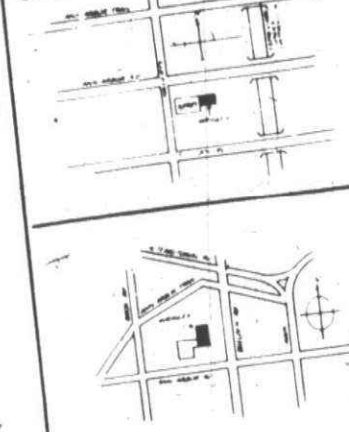
"We must do more about the network monopoly of news. I am not ad-

vocating a monopoly, but I have more faith in the local stations than I have in network executives," the senator said.

"Let's lift our heads above despair and turn off our self-destruct syndrome; we're not sick, we are the greatest story ever written," he concluded.

Inflation woes hit animal lovers

There has to be a recession. Why? Because Westland residents are trading in their big dogs for little dogs.

Marquette in Westland, says the price of dog food has gone up and this has affected pet-lovers' choice of dogs. Because the animal center has to feed the dogs in its custody, it is also feeling the economic pinch, and even recycles its trash bags, something no dog haven can do without.

THE CENTER is always busy, with a full waiting room almost any time of the day. But in recent months they've become even busier than usual. "One reason is more persons are moving into apartments and condominiums which forbid pets. So they

have to drop the animals off here," says Sowards. Don Don Dennis, Westland's dog warden, has his office in the center which also serves Garden City, Dearborn Heights, and Livonia. Dennis points out the center is getting an increasing number of calls

about wild animals besides dogs and cats running loose. He blames the influx of such animals as raccoons, skunks, snakes, and deer upon the increase in apartment construction. "Natural wooded areas used to provide shelter for the wild creatures,"

says Dennis. "But apartment construction has taken away most of the trees that offered natural refuge, and driven the animals into more densely populated areas."

THE ANIMALS ARE either picked up by Dennis and taken to the center, or hit by passing cars when they wander out on the roads.

"We try to pick up the animals and drop them off in a wooded area, but there are fewer wooded areas."

Biggest problem animals are raccoons and skunks. Raccoons climb into chimneys, but skunks offer another nuisance.

A pet dog may scare a skunk and, when the skunk responds in its usual manner, the dog brings the smell into the house.

Not only do wild animals bother domestic animals, but it works the other way around.

Friday, the Westland office responded to a call that a goat was being attacked by two German Shepherds.

The goat was the pet of a Westland resident and was tied in the yard.

The stray German Shepherds attacked the pet goat, which fought the dogs off but became exhausted by the battle.

Because the residents were not at home, Dennis had to bring the goat into the kindness center for protection. And there it sat, waiting for its owners.

It's legal to own a farm animal, such as a goat, in Westland, if the homestead is at least a half-acre in size.

But Dennis will try to persuade the goat's owners to build a fence to protect the animal.

Unusual animals are all in a day's work at the center, which has rounded up snakes, lizards, horses, rabbits, and you-name-it.

Another form of "wild" animal that poses a nuisance is the wild dog or cat.

ROAMING DOG PACKS are a threat to other animals and small children in Westland.

Unfortunately, it's easier to figure out where they come from than to get rid of them.

New construction is partly to blame.

When a dog-owner moves into an apartment or condominium, he must get rid of his dog or cat, because apartments don't allow them.

Where does he take the pet?

"Out in the country, of course," says Dennis. "He places the dog in the car and drives out to a secluded area, opens the car door, then drives away."

"What happens, though, is the dog joins with other dogs to form a pack and roams the area in search of food. They're extremely dangerous to small children."

The domestic cat gone wild can be almost as troublesome as the dog. Cats breed like crazy, according to Dennis.

"In just three years, a free-breeding female cat can produce 400-500 offspring."

The cat produces one litter, which produces another litter, ad infinitum. And the original cat herself continues to produce litters, in a kind of chain reaction.

Cats can cause rabies, just like dogs, and the victim has to undergo the same kind of repetitive shot treatments, unless the offending animal can be found and tested for the disease.

"Our biggest obstacle is getting people informed. I hate to issue a ticket and wish the law didn't require I have to because I'd like to improve my image."

"I'm the guy in the black hat to pet-owners as it is."

Often, the only image the dog warden presents is of the man with the net, snaring Fido or Fifi, and carrying the darling off to heaven knows where.

In fact, the dog warden is being placed in the position of having to protect the pet from the owner.

"I think 80 per cent of the people who own pets have no business owning pets. They lack the know how to feed and water a pet. They don't realize there are tests and shots that need to be given."

"And they don't realize that a pet needs love and attention."

DENNIS BELIEVES that pet-owners ought to be licensed, just as their pets are, after being trained how to raise a pet.

"I'd much rather show people the reasons for laws, instead of having to write tickets. But I guess if you can't listen, then you have to pay."

Dennis would just as soon do without the paperwork that writing tickets causes, too. He has file cabinet upon file cabinet of citations and complaints.

An owner can be fined if his dog is a "loose" animal, one that is licensed but on the lam. He can also be fined if his dog is causing a nuisance—barking, biting, or urinating where he shouldn't.

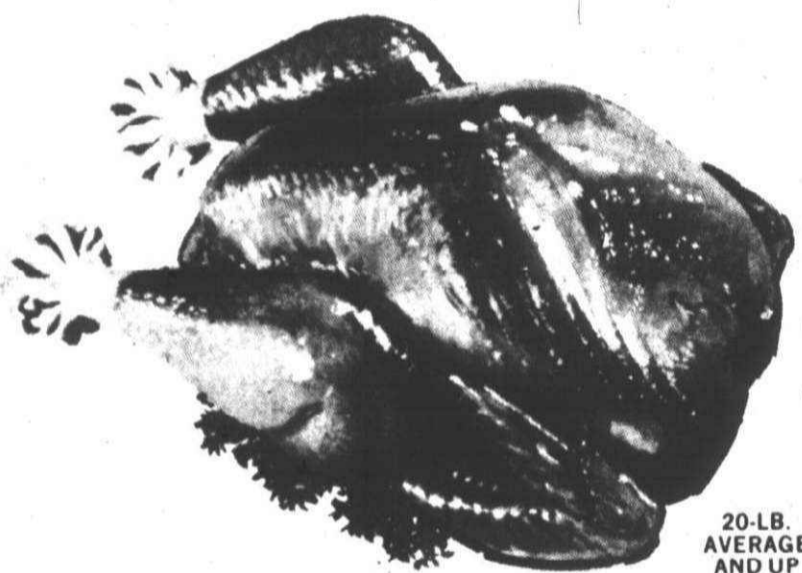
If an owner's dog is picked up and boarded at the center, the owner may end up paying for a ticket, shots, and impounding fees.

So, by not taking the time to license his dog, the owner may have to pay the center \$40 to remove the dog from the center.

Licensed dogs are returned to their owners quickly and generally there is no fine involved.

Announcing All-Area girls cage lineup

First Team

At an average of 5-foot-7 and 126 pounds, here comes the area's first all area prep girl's basketball squad.

From the 14 area high schools, 12 of which sport girls basketball squads, comes a first and second team and honorable mention roster.

Unbeaten in 15 outings this fall, Stevenson High tops the list with three players on the first two teams in all-area Lori Hyman, Jeri Isanhart and Sharon Solack.

Redford Union and Plymouth Salem are next on the roster with a solo listing on each squad.

The first team is comprised of Stevenson's Miss Hyman, Mary Kay Itnyre of Bishop Borgess, Sue Myrtle of Plymouth Canton, Plymouth Salem's

Barb Croci and Amy Gierak of Redford Union.

The second team is made up of Stevenson's Isanhart and Solack, RU's Linda Kosovac, Salem's Molly Meade and Denise Kossick of Garden City East.

Heading up the No. 1 team is Itnyre of Borgess checking in at 5-foot-11 and 140 pounds. The junior Spartan has totaled 125 points in 22 quarters of basketball for an average of 24 points per game.

Itnyre is hitting 55 per cent from the field and 78 per cent from the charity line and is averaging six assists and four steals per game.

The smallest member of the squad is Canton's Sue Myrtle. At 5-foot-2 and 113 pounds, Sue has scored 120 points in eight games for an average of 15 points a contest.

Myrtle is hitting at a 51 per cent clip from the floor and at 50 per cent from the free throw line. The Canton senior has also 56 assists and an amazing figure of 142 steals in the eight games.

Stevenson High's sparkling lass in its unbeaten season has been Lori Hyman who checks in at 5-foot-9 and 120 pounds. She has hit on 89 of 196 shots from the floor for a 45 per cent mark and converted 33 of 54 at the line.

The Spartan senior has collected 30 assists, 55 interceptions, and 157 rebounds along with 41 blocked shots and is sporting a 15 plus scoring average heading into the districts.

Next comes the two Suburban Eight stars to round out team No. 1.

Plymouth Salem's "Miss Everything" in the athletic world Barb

Croci, who was all-area in track last year as a junior, checks in at 5-foot-6 and 120 pounds.

The Rock captain "thrives on competition of the highest caliber," comments Salem Coach Debbie Hatcher.

In 10 games, she made good 51 of 166 field goal attempts and hit on 27 of 51 at the line for 129 points and a 12.9 points per game average.

Barb hauled in 95 rebounds, stole the ball 36 times and came up with 25 blocked shots.

RU's Amy Gierak at 5-foot-6 and 140 pounds played in 17 games, hit 44 per cent from the floor and 60 per cent at the free throw line.

Amy totaled 272 points for an average of 16 points per game and hauled in 72 offensive rebounds and 98 off the defensive boards.

Now into the second team which jumps in at an average height of 5-foot-8 and weight of 138 pounds.

Garden City East's Denise Kossick checks in at 5-foot-9 and 165 pounds and has averaged 15 points per game. Denise is hitting at 57 per cent from the floor and is averaging 10 rebounds per 32 minute contest.

From Stevenson comes Isanhart and Solack on the second team.

At 6-foot and 135 pounds, Isanhart is the tall one of the squad. She has hit on 86 of 205 shots from the floor and 12 of 20 at the line for 192 points and an average of 13 plus per contest.

Isanhart also has 69 rebounds on the offensive boards and 78 on defense for 147 along with 50 blocked shots.

Solack is 5-foot-5 and 127 pounds and the all-state hurdler hopeful in the spring hit at 44 per cent from the floor and 55 per cent at the line and totaled 180 points for a 12 point per game mark.

RU's Kosovac is a junior at 5-foot-11 and 138 pounds and was No. 2 in Panther scoring to Amy Gierak. Kosovac totaled 225 points for 17 games, hit 37 per cent from the floor and 59 per cent at the charity line and collected 203 rebounds.

Salem's Molly Meade at 5-foot-5 and 125 pounds rounds out the all-area top 10. The Rock senior scored only 43 points but her team leadership and rebound ability made her No. 2 in Salem's attack.

"Molly was our spirited machine," added Salem coach Hatcher.

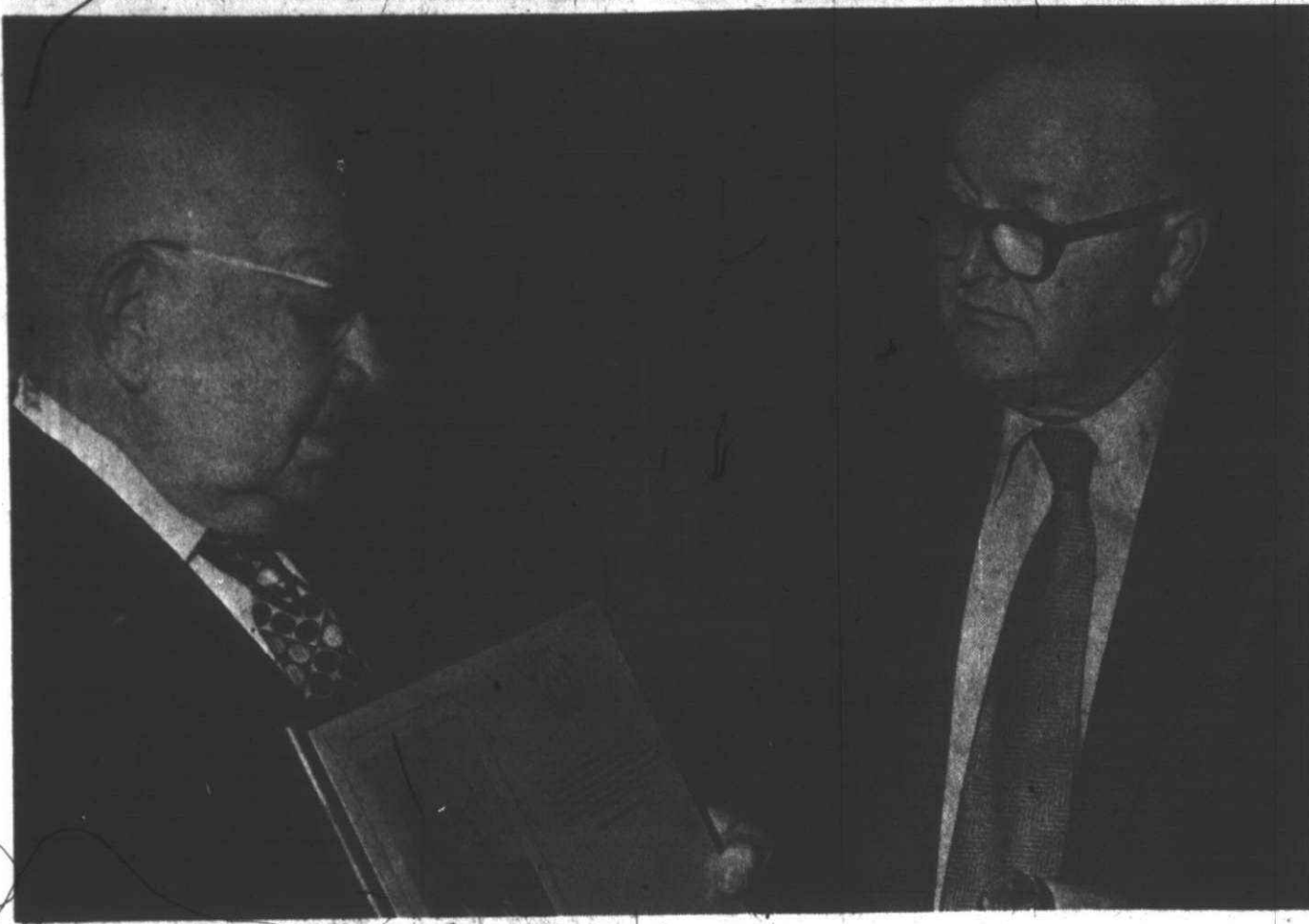

Turf Tips, Quips

Just a week ago it didn't seem possible that Hazel Park would drop Sunday racing for the remainder of the season, but that's exactly what happened.

After watching attendance and wagering drop each of the past four Sundays, the Hazel Park management took a good look at the situation and decided it would be better to go dark on Sundays rather than pay overtime at the rate of 1 3/4 to all mutual employees.

The track could afford to pay the union workers double time at the start of the Sunday operations when the handle was up around \$1.3 million, but then the weather changed and so

did the size of the crowds and the handle.

Wagering dropped from a high of \$1.4 million to slightly more than \$800,000 while the cost of operations didn't drop much at all. The mutual clerks union has a contract that calls for double time on Sundays when the handle is more than \$1.2 million and 1 3/4 time when it falls below that figure.

ONE HEARS rumors there may be some labor troubles before the DRC opens. It will be recalled that Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson, who was one of the big reasons for the approval of Sunday racing, did not pick up the option last

spring due to the union demands for double time or no work.

Now Wilson has had a chance to see Hazel Park hold Sabbath programs in good weather and bad and knows that they can be a big boost to wagering when the conditions are good and can be a disaster when the weatherman frowns.

After two rather poor seasons, Wilson isn't apt to be receptive to demands for double time in February, March and April when Michigan weather is unpredictable. On the other side, the union made it quite clear last spring that it wouldn't accept anything less than double time.

Somewhere between the DRC track in Livonia and the Hazel Park plant in Hazel Park, the union negotiators changed their minds and did accept less than double time.

Unless the legislature acts to give the thoroughbred tracks a bigger share of the mutual handle, then it appears there is slight chance the DRA will be in any better position than it was last spring.

As much as he would like to have Sunday racing, which he fought so hard to get, Wilson has to use common sense and decide whether it will all be worthwhile. It will be interesting to see what develops when he returns from Florida in mid-January to start making plans for the 1975 meeting and for the meetings with union negotiators.

FROM NORTHVILLE DOWNS, where Jackson is operating a harness racing meeting until the end of the year, comes word that Ms. Nanette Slavin Rakieten, who succeeded her late father, Leon A. Slavin, as president and general manager of Jackson Raceway, will have the usual Turkey Day goodies next Thursday.

It has long been a tradition for Jackson Raceway to have a dinner for the barn area help, drivers, trainers, grooms and their wives and children in the late afternoon and then modestly priced dinners for patrons in the early evening.

That practice will be continued this year, according to Ms. Rakieten. Dinner will be served for the barn area folks at 5:30 p.m. in the grandstand area followed by a buffet dinner for the general public starting at 6 and continuing until 8 p.m.
