

Another wait for an elusive sewer

CANTON—Residents in the McIntyre Manor subdivision will have to wait one more time, before they know if relief is on the way for over-saturated drain fields.

Appearing before the township board, residents were told they will have to wait another 60 days before a decision will be reached on the installation of sewers in the 50-home subdivision.

Platted in "the late '20s or '30s," according to township clerk John Flodin, the subdivision is served by septic tanks and drain fields which can no longer hold the water underground.

RESIDENTS had hoped the formation of Canton-Van Buren Sewer and Water Authority would remedy their water-filled, swampy back yards by providing the necessary funding to pay for the anticipated \$500,000 cost of city sewers in the Ford and Sheldon Road area subdivision. But action on the \$2.4 million bond issue was delayed last week when the board moved unanimously to reconsider both the total funding proposed by the authority and the existence of the authority itself.

As proposed, the total financial package would have provided either

sewers or water to eight areas in Canton Township. The McIntyre project is one of those which may benefit if the total package is approved.

WHEN TOLD the project would be delayed one more time, Robert Wilson, a McIntyre Manor resident, yelled, "We've been waiting too long already." He said the "old board" had promised the residents action earlier this year, "but the place still smells. We feel like we're the ghetto of Canton Township."

Another woman who lives in the subdivision said she was concerned about

the health hazard noting, "I'm afraid of a hepatitis outbreak."

Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein said he sympathized with the residents, but added, "When you're dealing with this sum of money, and it's not your own, you have an obligation as an elected official to make sure the money's going to be used in the best possible way."

"No one is going to stampede the board," Greenstein said later. "This project is interlocked with all other projects in the township."

GREENSTEIN said that by placing

a sanitary line into the the subdivision it would "perpetuate the 40-foot lots" that exist in the subdivision now. "We haven't had an opportunity to study alternatives, to find out which would be the best solution for the township as a whole."

Greenstein also noted that any action on this project is tied directly to the upcoming redrafting of the township's master land use plan.

Residents appeared before the board in mid-March of this year complaining of the same problems: soggy back yards and the stench of sewage

coming from both their yards and open culverts.

WHILE GOING along with the remainder of the board in voting to further study the matter, trustees James Poole and Brian Schwall voiced their concern for the welfare of residents of McIntyre subdivision.

"I don't care how, but let's recognize that these people need sewers right now," Schwall commented.

Poole added, "If we don't float bonds, then let's figure out alternative

Canton consumer group gets nod

CANTON—Residents of the township soon may have their own Consumer Protection Agency if citizen interest is as great as the new Canton Board of Trustees thinks.

The consumer council is one of four government and citizen bodies being considered by the new township board.

The agency, a brainchild of Trustee Robert Myers, would protect Canton residents from "rip-offs" by local merchants and businessmen.

Jack Chase, of the Detroit Consumer Affairs Office spoke to the board and the public at the request of Myers. He outlined the possible powers and functions of the proposed Canton agency.

MYERS ENVISIONS a body of five to seven members that will accept and investigate consumer complaints from Canton residents. The agency will be created by the township board but manned by interested citizens who would volunteer their time. Township facilities would be available to the volunteers, but all members of the proposed agency would not be paid from township funds.

In all likelihood, the proposed agency would work in conjunction with the Wayne County Consumer Protection Agency and would have access to its legal tools.

The township board passed a resolution stating interest in establishing a consumer agency, but the actual decision to form the council will have to come from residents of the township. If there is enough interest in the agency, it will be formed.

MANY QUESTIONS about the details of the agency remain. It is un-

known what legal weapons will be at its disposal, whether or not they can get funds for it, what size staff it will have, what the qualifications should be for members of the agency, and when and if the council will become operational.

Myers also said help would be available from two agencies, as Esther Shapiro, head of the Detroit Consumer Affairs Office and John Knapp, chairman of the Washtenaw Consumer Protection Agency have offered advice and help.

Greenstein added that while the township could not afford to pay volunteers, local merchants and civic associations might donate funds, and federal grant money might be available.

The board also discussed the possibility of creating a new citizens advisory council to participate in the formation of the new master land use plan. The advisory council would have input on "zoning and planning decisions, and other related aspects."

THE BOARD invited all interested citizens to join township planner Mike Manpre in a meeting to form the new advisory board Dec. 12 at the fire hall at 7:45 p.m.

A new inter-governmental committee was also established by the board and it will include members of both the Canton Township board and the Plymouth school board. The specifics of the committee were not established, but the rationale behind the group is that more communication is necessary between the school board and the Canton government.

Dr. Earl Hogan, deputy school superintendent, was present at the meeting and said, "We're very much in support of this move and we'll get back to you on it."

Progress was made on establishing a bicentennial committee for the township, and at the next board meeting steps will be taken to form the group. Currently, the board is waiting for interested volunteers.

MUCH TO THE relief of many Canton residents, two traffic lights will be installed by Dec. 16. Lights at Ford and Sheldon and Ford and Lilley should be operational in three weeks. Detroit Edison will have the wiring in by Dec. 13, according to Greenstein. The county road commission should have the lights erected and functioning three days after that.

A flashing light and school zone sign will be installed at Hanford and Sheldon as a safety measure for Miller School students. Trustee Gerald Cheske, while pleased with this progress, said more action was necessary. "We should have more traffic enforcement near the school."

Several procedural changes were instituted at the meeting, the most significant being that at the beginning of every township board meeting, 30 minutes will be allocated to the public, so that residents can air problems and make recommendations to the board.

This is part of Greenstein's program to insure "greater citizen input in the affairs of government."

Students are getting smaller

By the second week in December there may be a few remarks in the halls of Plymouth Canton High School about the students getting smaller or going to school in Lilliputian land.

There will be some truth in the jokes, for starting Monday, Dec. 9, Mrs. Mary Beth Koss' child care classes will be operating a nursery school for three- and four-year-olds.

A well-appointed room, complete with toys, bathroom facilities and an area for snack preparation is already available. All that is needed are the little folks. Mrs. Koss' 18 child care students have been preparing in class for the on-the-job training since the beginning of the school year.

Mrs. Koss is aiming for an enrollment of between 15 and 20 pre-schoolers to attend the sessions to be held four days a week, 8-10 a.m. until the first week in February. The second term opens Feb. 17 and continues

until school is out in June. The charge will be \$6 a week paid on a monthly or semester basis.

THERE WILL always be seven students working with the children plus Mrs. Koss, the program supervisor, and a teaching aide.

Mrs. Koss was supervisor for a private nursery school near Ann Arbor last summer after graduation from Eastern Michigan University.

She says a well-run, well-planned program can have a positive and very dramatic effect on a youngster, particularly one who will go to kindergarten the following year. Such a program helps in being able to get along with other children and becoming acclimated to a structured program.

It will also have a beneficial effect on the students who with the practical experience will qualify as nursery school aides upon graduation. Mrs. Koss urges her girls to continue in a two-year college course after which they would command higher pay and a more responsible position.

The program at the high school will be carefully planned, said Mrs. Koss, "but not so rigid that we aren't flexible."

The nursery program will begin with free play and continue into clean-up time, language arts or story-time, creative snack time ("It won't be just cookies, many times we'll be making our own"), music, and science activity with field trips mixed in. "There are many things right here within our school area for our kids to see," Mrs. Koss says and mentions the greenhouse, the auto shop, the cafeteria, the school farm and some of the other vocational areas.

WHILE SEVEN of the 18 students in the class are working in the nursery school, the rest will either be observing from a special room or working on projects for their days on the job.

Although she will be supervising the nursery school each day, Mrs. Koss will also be meeting and working with her students, holding staff meetings just as a regular nursery school does, to discuss problems, plan programs to

meet the needs of the youngsters and go over experiences.

"We've already worked out two weeks of a Christmas program—one week on winter and one on Christmas when we'll be making cookies and trimming a tree," Mrs. Koss says.

Those interested in enrolling children in the program may contact Mrs. Koss in the home economics office of the high school before 10:30 a.m. She has a packet of information prepared for mailing.

Flodin: Cityhood in future

PLYMOUTH—If present growth continues the time may be near when residents will file petitions asking for a vote to make Canton Township a city.

Speaking before the Plymouth Rotary Club last Friday, Township Clerk John Flodin peered into the future and made that prediction.

"Historically, this has been the trend. When a township grows and the people want more services such as expanded fire and police departments."

THE EXCEPTIONS to this trend in southeastern Michigan, he pointed out, were Redford Township with a population of more than 80,000 residents, and Plymouth Township that is approaching 20,000 residents.

"In 1960 we had a population of 4,000. This increased to 11,000 in 1970

and at the present time we are at about 28,000. And, from all appearances, we will continue to grow."

Citing the rapid growth, Flodin told of the sharp increase each year in building of single homes. According to his figures, the number jumped from 54 in 1956 to 115 in 1970, then to 528 in 1971, and in 1973 to 903.

"Up to Oct. 1 of this year we had 680. Aside from that we have 4,000 lots approved for building and it has been predicted we will grow at a rate of about 1,000 homes a year unless high mortgage rates curb development."

WHAT HAS caused the rapid growth?

Flodin was quick to answer that there are two reasons. Persons are lured to Canton because of the rural

atmosphere and because of the closeness to a city with the prestige of the City of Plymouth.

Flodin also predicted a government complex at the corner of Cherry Hill and Canton Center, and suitable recreational facilities.

With the phenomenal growth to date, the assessed valuation of Canton Township this year is \$141 million and Flodin expects this to increase by \$30 million within the next year.

With this vast growth, he said there is little low cost housing and the present land use plan now being studied will provide for very little more.

In view of this, he was prompted to project that, even though he may be opposed to cityhood, the time may not be too distant when cityhood status will be sought by residents and thus end the problem of seeking identity.

Year-round schools puzzle W-W officials

WESTLAND—A lack of concrete evidence concerning the benefits of the year round school concept has Wayne-Westland school officials puzzled about the feasibility of such a system.

"Right now we're conducting an informal study of the 45-15 program," says Michael Washburn, Stevenson

Junior High School principal and leader of the study.

"We're studying the pros and cons and we want to make sure the cons don't outweigh the pros. This district has been too supportive for us to sell them down the drain on such an issue."

THE CONCEPT has been implemented in the South and in two Michigan districts, Northville and Parma. It allows students to attend classes for nine weeks, followed by a three week vacation. On a quarterly system, it eliminates the traditional three-month summer vacation.

Washburn is quick to point out that the concept was introduced into districts which were experiencing population explosions.

"In most cases where the program is found, the districts were reluctant to build more schools in the event student populations declined," Washburn said.

"That's not our case. As a result we're more involved in looking into educational programs, learning and attitudes of the community about such a system."

In the study, which is also being conducted by Warren Spurling, assistant superintendent for curriculum and John Glenn High School Principal Frank Higgins, Washburn has found his share of pros and cons.

"In the first place people in the programs we've studied seem to be really fired-up about them. Both teachers and students are fresher when

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Fulfills job need

Livonia's MoTech trains auto mechanics

LIVONIA—Call it "Crankshaft College," "Transmission Tech," or what you will, Chrysler's Automotive Training Center has taken the nation's desperate need for auto mechanics seriously.

MoTech Center, located at 35155 Industrial, Livonia, is methodically turning out about 350 graduates yearly. Each of them can look forward to being pursued by 100 offers of employment and the average graduate will earn \$10,000 in his first year on the job.

According to W.E. Grimm, director of the Chrysler Institute, the most needed man in the auto labor force is not the engineer, market analyst, electronics specialist, or the salesman, but the auto mechanic.

THE NUMBER of cars in this country has increased 100 percent in the last 20 years, while the number of mechanics has grown by only 30 percent.

Says Grimm: "By 1978 there will be about 133 million vehicles on the road, and the ratio of one mechanic to every 80 cars is expected to drop to one mechanic for every 130 cars."

Although all too many mechanics learn their trade by trial and error at the corner gas station, there are several training schools in the Detroit area that take a more systematic approach.

Michigan Career Institute, Wolverine Trade School, and several colleges offer courses in automotive technology.

But Livonia's MoTech is the only school sponsored by an auto company, receiving its funds from Chrysler, and the latest technological information from the other auto companies.

Even with today's tremendous demand for its graduates, MoTech has not resorted to mass production methods to grind out grads.

"We're preparing line mechanics for the entire service industry," says MoTech Manager Dean Brown. "People used to drop their cars off for service in the evening and pick them up the following day. But not anymore."

"You can't tune up a car today the way you did even five years ago. It takes a lot more expertise today.

"State legislation requiring licensing of auto mechanics will change the entire complexion of the industry. It should have the effect of dumping even more work on the guys who are now mechanics," says Brown.

Besides state licensing and an increase in the number and complexity of cars, there is another reason why

the demand for mechanics will increase.

Motorists probably will keep their cars longer, because of rising new car prices.

But even with the tremendous demand for its graduates, MoTech is not intended to be an educational assembly line.

The school is based on four approaches to learning—books, audiovisual materials, lab work, and a limited amount of classroom instruction.

The student in effect sets his own pace.

Starting with an auto fundamentals course, the student views and hears slide film and tape cassettes, studies written materials, and then goes into the shop to learn by doing.

Tuition is \$3,300 for the 50-week course, including \$600 worth of tools which the student takes with him when he leaves MoTech.

An entrance examination to determine mechanical aptitude is required of all candidates, who range in age from 18 to 50.

A student works at each segment until he gets it right, and the 50-week time period can be either lengthened or shortened, depending on the pace of each student.

Tests are administered, and if a student fails to get a perfect grade, he is re-tested until he can answer every question.

IT TOOK Chrysler technicians 50,000 man-hours to develop the school's 1,500-hour curriculum.

One of MoTech's more unique instructional devices is a simulator board.

A light on the board will indicate whether the student has solved a problem, such as starting the engine. The simulator permits the student to pinpoint problems and apply alternate solutions, without actually dismantling a part of the car's engine or chassis.

But there is also plenty of opportunity for a student to get dirt under his fingernails.

The school's 40,000 square feet includes 16,000 square feet of service area, and a parts inventory valued at \$14,000.

All four of the nation's auto companies have contributed cars, trucks, and motor homes to the center.

There are disembodied cars, cut-aways, chassis—in fact, vehicles in just about every stage of togetherness.

One of the center's engines has been broken apart and put together 38 times.

ALTHOUGH STUDENTS nearly always work alone or in small teams, instructors are always near at hand.

They include well-known drag racing competitors such as John Tedder, Ron Mancini, and Tony Rainero, and have an average of 13 years of mechanical experience.

Average age of the 21 instructors is 36 years, providing a student to teacher ratio of about 15-1.

Brown considers electrical systems the most difficult course to learn, but items such as the catalytic converter and starter interlock belt system are new even to experienced mechanics.

Some of MoTech's graduates already have passed the state licensing requirements, and the center could very well become one of the state's testing sites for automotive excellence. At any rate the state is keeping a close eye on MoTech, which may be a model for future training of licensed mechanics.

Brown expects to see more MoTech centers, "the economy permitting."

"Our graduates have as much 'smarts' as the graduates of any college in the country. They just want to be mechanics more than anything else."



THE MOMENT OF TRUTH for the MoTech student in the engine phase of the curriculum is when the engine is placed on the test stand. If it runs properly, the student passes this part

of the training and can begin on another phase. If not, the student with the aid of an instructor finds the mistake and corrects the problem.

County commissioners back solution for medical malpractice

A proposal to solve the malpractice insurance crisis faced by doctors and other professionals in Michigan has received support from the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The commissioners by resolution recently joined the United Auto Workers (UAW) union in its backing of the campaign by the 600-member Physicians Crisis Committee.

THE RESOLUTION was co-sponsored by commissioners Edward K. Michalski (D-Detroit) and George Z. Hart (D-Dearborn), chairman and vice-chairman respectively of a subcommittee studying the malpractice insurance problem.

The county medical examiner and his staff, the jail physician, doctors and anesthetists at Wayne County General Hospitals, plus county attorneys are among those having trouble getting malpractice insurance.

Malpractice insurance rates for doctors and other professionals have skyrocketed in recent years as malpractice lawsuits have mounted.

County school district drug grant continued

The Wayne Intermediate School District has received a \$141,760 grant from the State Board of Education to continue its drug education program for another year.

The grant is the same amount the district received for the 1973-74 fiscal year.

State monies are to be matched by local districts with funds totaling at least 25 per cent of their state grant.

THE MICHALSKI-HART resolution endorses a three-point program urged by the Physicians Crisis Committee and notes the UAW has also endorsed the program. The physicians group is urging that:

1. The Michigan Medical Practices Board do a better job of ridding the state of incompetent doctors.

2. The Michigan Supreme Court determine how much malpractice attorneys are charging for malpractice suits and then limit their fees.

3. State legislation be adopted to compensate more fairly medical patients injured due to negligence or incompetence.

"All concerned in this study concede that the premiums for malpractice coverage for physicians are prohibitive and insurance carriers are reluctant to provide coverage because of the many suits filed in the courts," states the county resolution.

Board adoption was recommended by its public safety and judiciary committee.

The intermediate school district's grant was one of 5 given to county school districts throughout the state totaling \$446,000.

The programs, which stress training of persons who can, in turn, train others in the knowledge and skills necessary to deal with the problems of substance abuse, have been in operation, with one project exception, since 1972.

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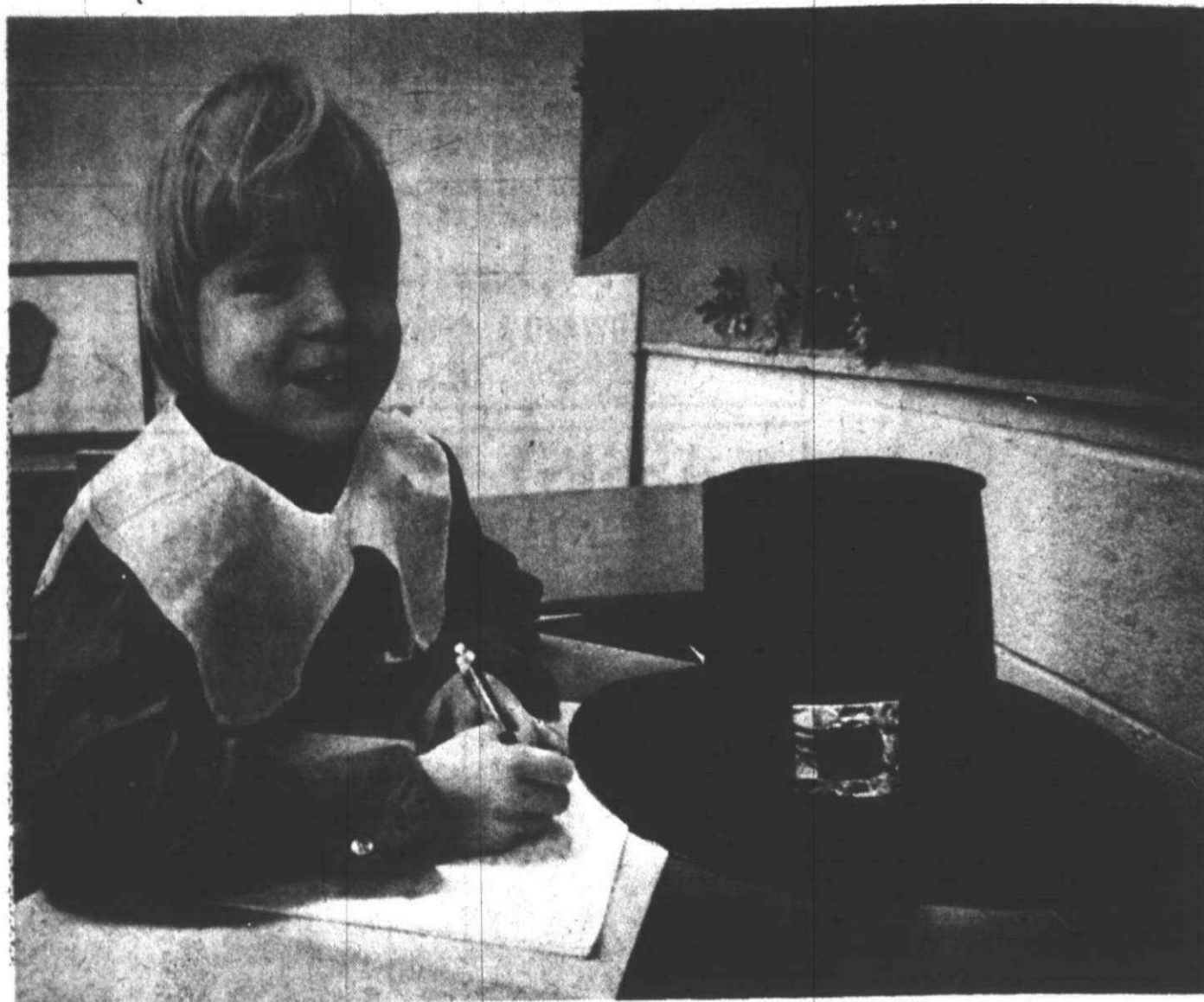

Agenda deadlines changed by board

CANTON—A new time limit has been established by the current administration on items to be placed on the township board meeting agenda.

All items must be submitted to the township clerk's office at Geddes and Sheldon roads 10 days in advance of the next board meeting to be considered during the meeting.

Township officers stated the new limit would allow them more time to

investigate and evaluate material presented. "We have to be informed, to vote properly," explained Supervisor Robert Greenstein.

Because the township board meetings are held the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month, all material must be into the clerk's office by the Friday 10 days prior to the next meeting.

Greenstein to serve on zoning board

Planning commission spots filled

CANTON—Appointments were the order of the evening as new township officials got into full swing at its first meeting last Tuesday evening.

Two appointments were made to the planning commission, and township Supervisor Robert Greenstein was named to the zoning board of appeals.

Named to the planning commission were new treasurer Carl Parsell and vice-president of the Northwest Canton Homeowner's Association Robert Miller.

Parsell will replace Grant Campbell as the township board's representative on the planning body, although there was some confusion as to the legality of his appointment.

Trustee Brian Schwall suggested Parsell could not be appointed because Campbell had not formally stepped down. Greenstein, however, interpreted the planning act to mean that when Campbell's term on the

board expired, so did his term on the planning commission.

This view prevailed and Parsell was appointed by a margin of 4-2. Parsell abstained, and trustees Schwall and James Poole voted against the appointment of Parsell on procedural grounds.

PARSELL will serve on the planning commission until Dec. 31, 1975, the date Campbell would have served had he been reelected treasurer.

Miller's appointment, to replace Robert Shefferly, will last for 30 days to the end of this year. Shefferly resigned from the planning commission because his term was due to expire at the end of this year and because he wanted his replacement to take part in the meetings on the new master land use plan which will begin this week.

Greenstein indicated Miller would be reappointed to a full-term on the commission, and stated that Miller

was a "concerned and active citizen—one who has always attended meetings and had participated on the advisory board for the master land use plan."

Miller was appointed by a vote of 6-0 with trustee Poole abstaining because, he said, "I don't know the man."

THE FINAL appointment of the evening was for Greenstein himself as township board representative to the zoning board of appeals.

The board of appeals is composed of three men: A township board representative, the chairman of the planning commission, and a third person appointed by the township board. Previously, the third member of the board had been selected by the other two. But under a new state law, the process was changed.

The jurisdiction of the board of appeals is "rather elastic," according to Greenstein, and "it can be a very powerful body."

The zoning board of appeals is governed by Article 20 of the township zoning ordinance, and is a "body of limited powers." But it can overrule the township board in rezoning matters when there are "practical difficulties or unnecessary hardships" involved in zoning problems.

According to Greenstein, the board can overrule zoning ordinances that effect every facet of building. The board can alter lot size, placement, size, shape, and type of buildings if it sees fit. It can order that either building or occupancy permits be issued contrary to resolutions of either the planning commission or the township board.

Consequently, Greenstein said he

felt it necessary to create coordination between the township board and the zoning board of appeals.

Greenstein will replace former trustee Donald Korte and can serve for two full years.

Trustee Poole was the only board member to vote against Greenstein's appointment. He said: "Greenstein has too much to do as supervisor. It's too much of a load for him to serve on both bodies."

Greenstein may not serve the entire two years on the board of appeals. He has indicated he may withdraw from the body once "communication lines" have been established between the township board and the zoning board of appeals.

Currently, the other two members on the zoning board of appeals are planning commission chairman, Joseph Kinnick, and Dr. Clifford McClumpha.

they go into a term and if they get bogged down by the fifth or sixth week, there are only a couple of weeks left until the break," he said.

"THE SYSTEM would also allow family vacations at other times of the year besides summer. Families could go hunting or skiing together and I think these types of activities are good for the family and are educational as well."

On the negative side of the ledger, Washburn has been looking at such side effects as abandoning the mini-course offerings at Stevenson.

"As it is now a student can take as many as 21 courses during the year. With a year round school program, one fourth of the teachers would be on vacation at any given time, which would reduce the numbers of courses we could offer," he says.

Washburn cites working parents who would face having their children home for four vacations instead of the traditional summer break.

Hand in hand with the summer problem would be the disruption of high school student work schedules and students who depend on summer jobs.

"We're still working on the problem of school activities," Washburn added. "What happens during track season if one of the team members is on vacation at the time of a meet? And we're wondering about the music programs. Would we have to place all the vocal music students on the same tract?"

"It wouldn't be fair to parents who want the traditional kind of education and without 100 per cent participation we just couldn't make the program work," he added.

While the district is making continual studies of Northville and the Parma school districts in Michigan, Washburn says their study was infor-

mal to the extent of not involving members of the Wayne-Westland Education Association.

"A couple of years ago, when we first studied the program, our teachers were gung ho about doing the research but not gung ho about implementing it."

"A new contract would have to be negotiated but the program still amounts to the same number of days worked. We're not ready to present it formally to the union."

HUGH RYAN, executive director of the WWEA admits that the 45-15 program conjures up different feelings from different persons.

"Some feel that it is exciting from the instructional point of view," Ryan says. "But others feel that it would destroy some aspects like the length of terms which traditional education schedules allow."

"Since the system represents substantial changes in the status quo, we naturally would be concerned."

"I think the union would be resistive to a forced situation, but that some teachers would be willing to partake."

Washburn admits that for the program to work it would entail the kindergarten through 12th grade system.

"What we need to know is if the system is educationally sound," he says. "But the problem is that the 45-15 system hasn't been in operation anywhere long enough to provide hard data studies."

"What it boils down to is if the children will learn more going to school the year round."

According to Flodin, once approved by the board and the state Municipal Finance Commission, the bonds could be placed on the market. When are sold it would take another 90 days to begin construction of the sewer lines. He said that it was difficult to predict how long the entire procedure would take, if the board were to give its blessing to the project two months from now.

Tax bills out

CANTON—For collection of this year's taxes, township residents will be asked to pay an additional one per cent on their bill to cover administrative costs.

The tax bill will be presented in an itemized fashion because of the new computer system used to total the tax bill and rather than rounding off the bill as in past years, this year's bill will have an additional one per cent charge.

Taxes will be collected from Monday Dec. 2 through Feb. 15 and residents are asked to pay the bill at the township offices at Sheldon and Geddes roads.

The change in billing procedure, and the complete itemization are a result of state law, and according to township treasurer, Carl Parsell, will be a "great improvement." The old billing procedure was not as equitable as the new one per cent method, because under the old system, bills were rounded off to the nearest dollar. Now, everyone in the township pays an equal percentage for administrative costs," explains the new treasurer.

The new tax bill will also show Canton residents exactly what percentage of their money goes to the Canton government, the county, the schools, etc.

Residents who are unable to pay their bill at the township office may pay at any local branch of National Bank of Detroit, Wayne Bank, or Detroit Bank and Trust.

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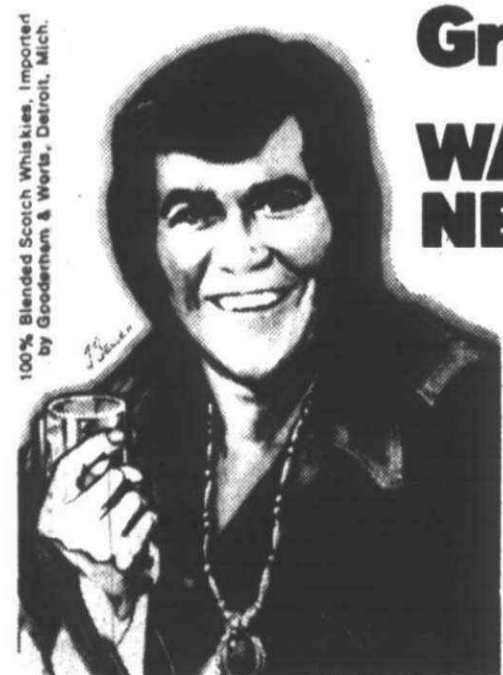
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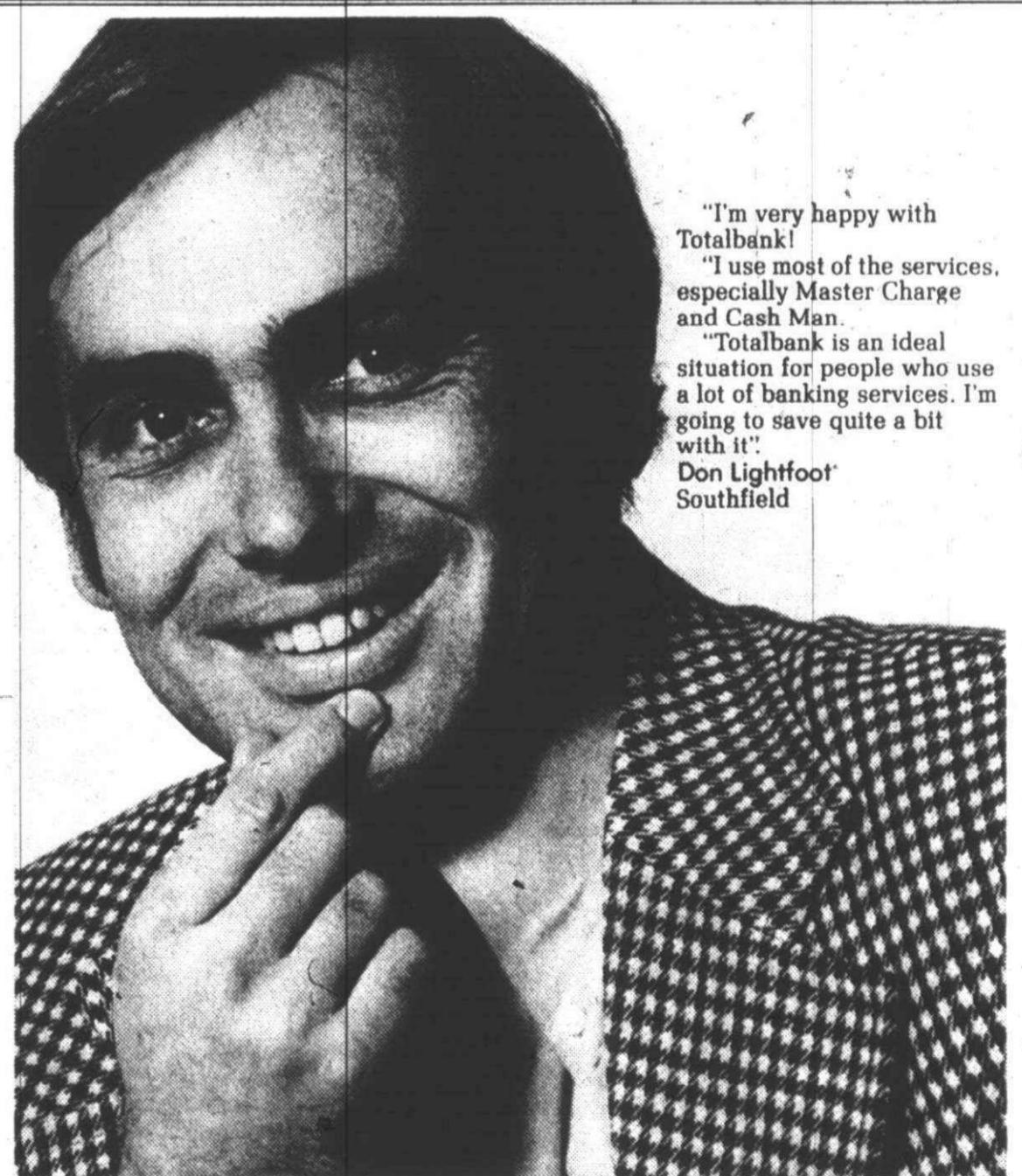
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Employers say

Liberal arts students need business-related courses

More liberal arts graduates would be hired by large American business and industrial companies if the students would take some business-related courses while in college, a University of Michigan study indicates.

Forty-two major companies responded to a U-M questionnaire, and 35 of them said liberal arts graduates would be more in demand with such preparation.

While the study's findings indicate more business courses are necessary for liberal arts grads in the job market, the study directors, William R. Audas and Daniel J. Weintraub, say their study is not intended as a recom-

mendation that liberal arts programs be turned into business-preparation programs.

"The university purports to equip people to live good and effective lives, and work is certainly an important part of life. We think the university and its academic departments should encourage the study of the liberal arts. We should help our students get a broadly-based education, but we should also encourage them to keep an eye on the future.

"Career planning and placement services are available to help the students, but in many cases we don't reach them soon enough to help them

make intelligent preparations for a career. An aware faculty is a big help in this area of career preparation and we hope the people in the departments will be sensitive to the problems," the researchers say.

AUDAS IS associate director in the U-M Office of Career Planning and Placement and Weintraub, a professor of psychology.

The most desirable courses for liberal arts majors who expect to enter business, company officials told the researchers, are accounting, introduction to business, management principles and economics.

Personal skills the companies most often look for include: ability in oral and written communication, supervisory and leadership ability and motivation.

Business-related experiences (such as summer jobs and internships), especially those involving the opportunity to manage people, are considered most valuable, as are extra-curricular activities demonstrating leadership ability.

Negative qualities sometimes found in job applicants with liberal arts degrees, the companies said, include: a lack of self-awareness; no specific job or job class in mind; a lack of aware-

ness of the American economic system or of what business is all about; no research on the company prior to interview and unaggressive, unenthusiastic and not self-confident attitudes.

One company official concluded: "Increasingly, I find liberal arts students to be among the least liberally educated."

Another said: "Most liberal arts graduates have not been provided with the tools to compete in most entry level business jobs."

BASED ON their findings and their own interpretation of the liberal arts

program, Audas and Weintraub recommend that liberal arts students interested in a business career, besides acquiring basic communications skills, should:

Take two courses in accounting and one each in business principles and management.

Spend at least one summer at work in a business setting.

Elect economics as part of the social science requirement.

Take full advantage of the benefits provided by a liberal arts program and avoid slanting the remainder of the undergraduate program toward preparing for a job.

When the days get shorter, wild animals are tipped off that cold weather is coming, and do something about it.

Most animals go on a crash feeding program. They build up thick layers of fat under the skin and around vital body organs. This helps preserve body heat and stores food energy.

Some animals store food away. Squirrels bury nuts, but often forget where they've stored their treasures, and so they unwittingly become tree planters.

The white-tailed deer replaces his reddish summer coat with a grey coat that is not only harder to see but has another advantage: The grey hairs are hollow. The air trapped inside

these hollow hairs makes a barrier of insulation that helps shed water and retain body heat.

THE SOURCE of these gems of winter wisdom is Glenn Dudderar, a wildlife management specialist at Michigan State University.

His very title — wildlife management specialist — reminds you that man's impact on the environment is so great that we have to manage even the wildlife portion nowadays.

If animals and birds are to survive, he says, they need three things: Food, shelter and water. Another consideration is the severity of the weather.

While the deer grows hollow fur, other animals grow a downy covering of underfur. This keeps them warm while the long "guard" hairs that grow all year shed water, says Dudderar.

Waterfowl also grow a downy underlayer and continue to swim around in near-freezing water.

A RECENT discovery, he tells us, is that animals reduce their activity

during the most severe winter weather. Few animals really hibernate.

"Most of the so-called hibernating animals will sleep through the worst storms and extremely cold weather, then begin foraging for food again when milder days arrive. It's not uncommon to see squirrels, skunks and

chipmunks rummaging around on sunny days in January and February," Dudderar says.

For some animal species, survival is assured by the fact that many die off during winter. Grouse and rabbit populations, for example, may be reduced as much as 66 per cent during

winter, resulting in less competition for food, shelter and water.

With that in mind, hunting doesn't seem so cruel. Hunters merely help do the job Mother Nature would anyway. The beflowered lady in white can be just as nasty as she appears in those margarine commercials.

Wildlife copes with Michigan winters

Area schools keep pace on enrollment

Area colleges and universities in recording increasing student enrollments have kept pace with the overall enrollment picture in the state.

Michigan colleges and universities had their biggest enrollment increase in five years this fall, according to the State Board of Education.

In figures comparing 1973 and 1974 enrollments, Schoolcraft Community College showed a 622 student increase; Wayne County Community College, 772 and Henry Ford Community College, 570.

Madonna College recorded a 354 student gain for the same period; Eastern Michigan University, 186; and University of Michigan-Dearborn, 1,360.

THE STATE BOARD said 458,488 students are attending Michigan's 89 public and independent colleges and universities, a 7.7 per cent increase over last year. It was the largest year-to-year per cent increase since 1969.

Michigan's 13 public colleges and

universities experienced a 3.7 per cent increase in enrollment.

A total of 173,643 students enrolled in 29 public community and junior colleges, a 13.6 per cent gain.

Forty-seven independent colleges and universities reported a gain of 7.1 per cent.

The State Board of Education compiles data on enrollments and other information in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education's National Center for Educational Statistics.

There is still a look of a rural community along Canton Center Road going south from Ann Arbor Road toward Ford. There are old farmhouses, a couple of picturesque barns and a good deal of open land, some of it already staked for development.

At the corner of Canton Center and Maben, there's a sign Arnoldt Williams Music, Inc. The house where Mrs. Williams was born is on the corner and to the west the building which houses the family business. The couple bought the home from Mrs. Williams' father and the 10 acres around it. They raised their children there. These people have respect for tradition which is a part of their lives.

Yet, the growth of the community which promises to continue at its present unprecedented rate, doesn't trouble them. In fact, it is in part responsible for the growth and success of the family business.

Mrs. Williams says, "The changes are good for business. Yes, I enjoy the rural atmosphere and we were lucky to have the beauty of it for all these years. I still love it now and I wouldn't want to be anywhere else."

She listens as her husband talks about his work with great enthusiasm and comments, "You can't avoid change, so why not adapt to it." Mrs. Williams father, Paul Simons, was a piano tuner who did business from his home in Canton from 1922. In 1945, when he found his young son-in-law (with skill in mechanics and training in aeronautics) was interested in pianos and piano tuning, he began to teach him the business.

Williams admits it was a strange turn of events for a boy born in Virginia whose family had been horticulturists for many generations, and a former United States Air Force instructor, to get interested in piano tuning, but he did—much to the amazement of his family.

It felt right then and it still does, only now there is much more.

The retail store sells and services pianos, organs, and has moved into the electronic instruments since John, 19, joined the business.

Space has become a problem—the visitor walks carefully—from the display rooms to the repair area where there are half a dozen grand pianos in various stages of repair and from there into the room reserved for electronic instruments. Moog and Arp synthesizers.

Plans for a new building are very close to completion and another family member, Yvonne, in merchandising with Gimbels in New York City, is joining the family business shortly, as her father says to "organize us."

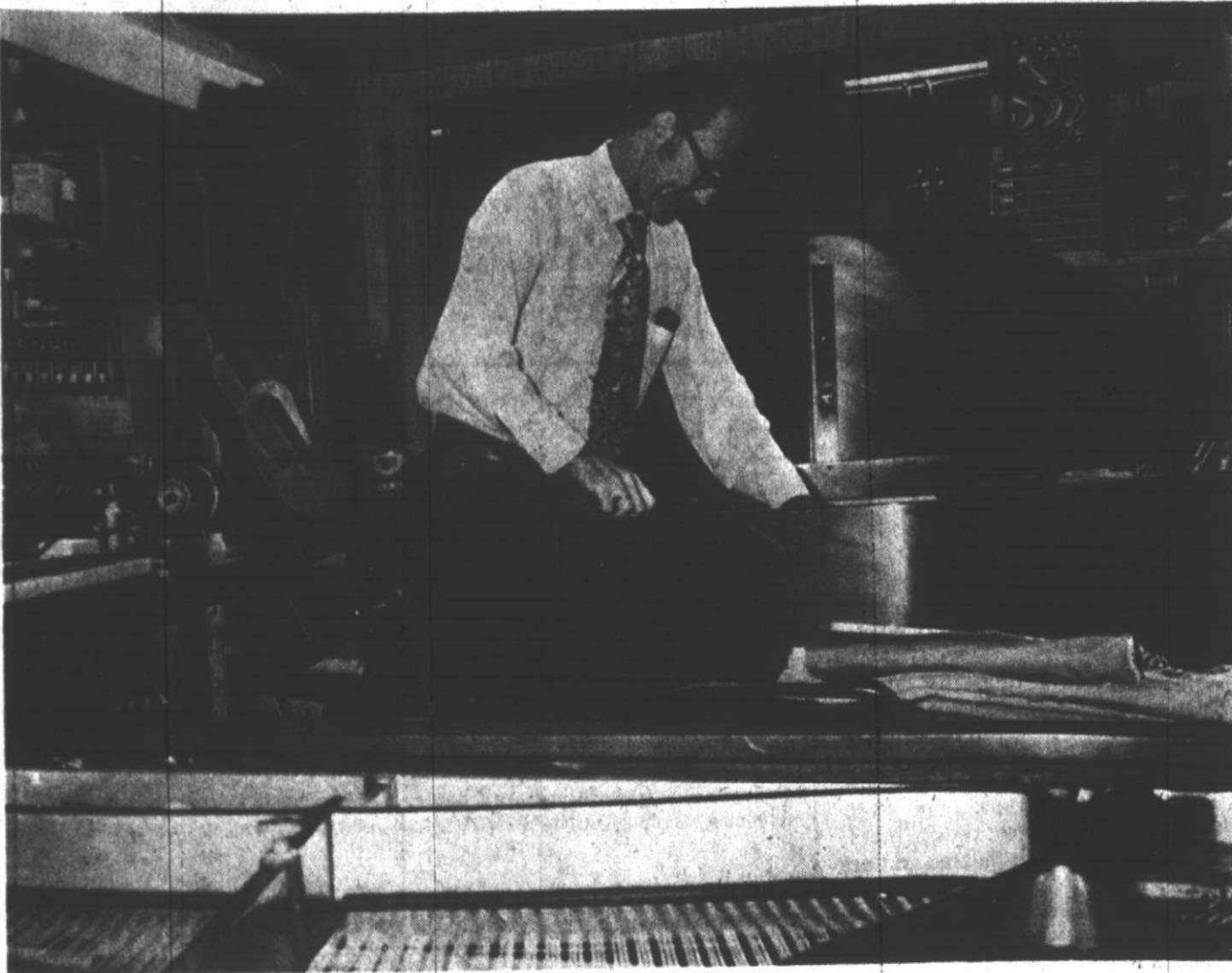
Williams plans to have music lessons available when the new store is constructed as well as a larger inventory and increased work space.

"The growth of the community is good for everybody. I find there aren't enough hours in the day—it's very exciting...some people have been fighting the changes, but we have the area and we have the potential for growth, you can't stand in the way."

For Arnoldt Williams and his family, life in Canton Township has been good, so good, in fact, that his son and daughter plan to stay here and another daughter, Karen, lives a few minutes away in Northville.

The family business is growing and a new building is contemplated. Plans and philosophy indicate it will continue to meet the demands of the community.

There are no regrets about what once was—only optimism for what can and will be.

Dancers will remember the old hall

CANTON — Many of the older buildings in Canton Township are steeped in history and reminders of the days that used to be. But none has a more interesting background than the building at the corner of Cherry Hill and Ridge Road that started as a grocery store, expanded into the most popular dance hall in western Wayne County,

and now is an apartment complex. "Would you believe it," said Joe West, Plymouth Township treasurer whose father bought the store in 1900, "they once housed 100 horses in the basement during dance night!"

During one of the few lulls in his position as the new treasurer, West got

to reminiscing about the old building, once known as West Hall— and the square dance capital of the area.

"My father bought the place in 1900," he said, "and it was just a country store. Then they decided to hold dances on the second floor, and it soon became one of the most popular

halls on Friday and Saturday night." West smiled as he recalled that the floor was made of what was called hard wood spring lumber.

"The floor actually sprang up and down during the dances," he said, "and at one time we had as many as 20 squares (that's 180 people) on the floor."

"People came from all over," he went on, "and the Farmers Union that sponsored the dances had visions of attracting dancers from as far away as Chicago."

As he spoke, West reeled off the names of the old time families who enjoyed the dancing, and it sounded almost like a directory of the Plymouth area.

The the Loseys, the McFarlanes and the Burrells, the Roy Schultzes and the Nairns were a few of the regulars. Others who could be seen on dance nights were John Flodin, now Canton Township clerk, the Fred Heids and the Stanges, the Palmers, the Backuses, Salous, Shears and Corwins.

There was a twinkle in West's eye as the memory of those days came back and he recalled that they sold ice cream and pop for five cents and hot dogs for a dime.

"The old hall was a great place," he went on. "The blacksmith shop was only two doors away and Lou Bealer, the constable, was a steady caller."

The old dance hall operated until the '50s, long after the horses and carriages gave way to automobiles. At that time, World War II was ended and the defense work at Willow Run slowed down.

With the war workers idle, the dancing groups changed and it was decided to move into other fields.

The dance hall was renovated and turned into apartments, such as they are today.

But while the music of the square dance orchestras has given way to silence, the memory of those square dance parties lingers on and West Hall has taken its place in the interesting lore of Canton Township.

Plymouth Community School District today announces its revised lunch policy by adding "OR REDUCED PRICE LUNCH" to its recently adopted policy statement on "Free Lunch and Free Milk" for the 1974-75 school year. The introduction of the reduced price lunch becomes effective December 2, 1974.

Free Lunches, Free Milk or Reduced Price Lunches are for those school children who attend the public schools of the Plymouth Community School District who are unable to pay the full price of lunches and milk served under the National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast, Special Milk Program and U.S.D.A. Donated Foods Programs.

Local school officials adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility in the 1974-75 school year:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free lunches and free milk or reduced price lunches. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of thirty percent of income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply. In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such lunches and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Application forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, the SCHOOL NURSE and PRINCIPAL OF THE SCHOOL THE STUDENT ATTENDS will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the NURSE and PRINCIPAL, he may make a request either orally or in writing to MR. RAYMOND HOEDEL, ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT FOR BUSINESS (designated as the Hearing Official), 454 South Harvey Street, Plymouth, Michigan, PHONE 453-0200, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure. Each school and the Office of the Assistant Superintendent for Business has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by an interested party.

Hamilton rifles were Plymouth products

Daisy's BB gun was not the only rifle to make the youth of America aware of Plymouth during the early 1900s. From 1899 to 1942, the Hamilton .22 caliber rifle, invented and manufactured in Plymouth by a man who contributed to the early success of Daisy, was also a favorite in the boy market.

Clarence J. Hamilton, who invented the all-metal farm windmill prior to 1882, and Daisy's all-metal air rifle in 1888, was superintendent of the Daisy plant until 1898. In that year he resigned and sold his interest in the business. He and his son, Coello, had invented an expensive .22 caliber rifle. They began to manufacture it in 1899, although their patent was not official until Nov. 20, 1900.

The firm was first called Hamilton Arms Company, then Hamilton Rifle Company, and finally, in 1901, C.J. Hamilton and Son, a co-partnership. The plant was (and still is) on what is now Hamilton Avenue, only a few blocks from Daisy. The "Plymouth Mail" on April 12, 1901, reported that the new firm was employing "from 30 to 40 hands the year round and has built up an extensive trade."

The father, Clarence, was born in 1849 and came to Michigan from Meadville, Pa. Coello was born in 1872, but was never sure whether his place of birth was Holly or Milford.

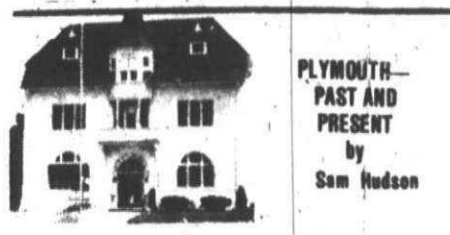
The family moved to Plymouth when Coello was two years old.

As described in their patent, Nov. 7, 1898, the first Hamilton rifle had a bronze sleeve barrel covered with two or more layers of steel tubing. A pivot-action, single shot gun, with a skeleton frame and stock, it was rifled by inserting into the barrel a steel mandrel with a negative profile of the rifling. This method was patented by the Hamiltons, as was the forming of the gun barrel in layers. The outer covering of the barrel was blued.

Hamilton models sold at prices most boys could afford—from \$1.50 to \$12. They were distributed by large sporting goods houses, and advertised in "American Boy" and "American Boy-Youth's Companion."

Coello succeeded his father as head of the business (possibly in 1902, when a patent was issued solely in the son's name.) The plant stopped making rifles with the advent of World War II. It began making parts for the war effort, including tank bogie wheels. In 1945, when rifle prices allowed by the OPA were not sufficient to cover the firm's increased labor costs, Coello, who was then 70, decided to retire.

Hamilton sold his tools to John Hoban, his plant superintendent during the war years. Until his death, Hoban manufactured the "Hoban

Rifle" in the plant in Salem Township, which now houses Great Lakes Plastics.

Since 1945, the plant the Hamiltons built in 1899, and enlarged over the years, has been owned by local businessman Frank Arlen. It now houses a firm which produces parts for trucks.

I interviewed Coello Hamilton at his home in April 1967, 13 days before his

95th birthday, and seven months before his death. He was a small, spry man, with impaired hearing, but mentally alert and responsive. I asked him to what he attributed his longevity. He replied that he never worried about it. Asked about his unusual name, Coello, he said he understood that it was quite common in Brazil.

I showed Mr. Hamilton an article by rifle examiner Stanton O. Berg, to whom I am indebted for some of my information about the Hamilton rifles. It appeared in the July 1965 issue of the "American Rifleman." Coello read the article slowly and carefully. "The facts in it are not bad," he said.

Hamilton lived at 311 Hamilton Avenue, across from his former plant. The house was built in 1887 by his fa-

ther. In 1926, Coello had the structure remodelled by Tom Moss, a local architect at the time.

Mr. Hamilton, obviously proud of the fine woodwork in the living room, said it was made of beech, "as hard as hickory." I remarked on the deep red Wilton carpet. It was 41 years old but looked new. Hamilton said it was recommended by Moss.

Two large blue and white plates and many photos stood on the fireplace mantel. A picture of George Washington hung on the wall. Mr. Hamilton walked over to a cabinet and produced a book which he showed to me. It was McGuffey's "Fourth Eclectic Reader," published in 1879 by Van Antwerp Bragg & Co. of Cincinnati.

The book reminded Mr. Hamilton of

his schooldays in Plymouth in the 1880s. The schoolhouse he attended was an old frame building (probably the Seminary building which E.J. Peniman donated to the school district) located where Central Middle School now stands.

"The professor was C.A. Frisbee," Coello said. "He was a great disciplinarian and good for us kids. One day a kid who had raised hob ran out of the school. He had a good start, but Frisbee chased him all the way home. He caught him under the bed and took him clear back to school."

Coello Hamilton, co-founder of C.J. Hamilton and Son, died in Plymouth, Oct. 28, 1967, at the age of 95. He was buried in Riverside Cemetery.

As the state changed so has Eastern

Eastern has always been co-educational, and enrollment for many years has found men and women evenly balanced. This was not always so. In 1914, for instance, women outnumbered men seven to one; this led to the founding of a "Men's Union."

ENROLLMENT during this century has reflected the national condition.

World War I brought a sharp decline and the years of the Depression stunted what might have been normal growth. World War II, with its pervasive draft, caused enrollment to tumble from 1,746 in 1941 to 675 in 1944.

Eastern was designated a university in 1959, and the decade that followed was one of explosive growth. Enrollment doubled in the first five years (from 5,105 in 1960 to 10,226 in 1965) and almost doubled again in the next five (up to 19,965 in 1970).

More veterans, community college transfer students and out-of-state and foreign students have contributed to the influx of students.

STUDENTS' RIGHTS have been broadened beyond the wildest dreams of those who attended Eastern only 50 years ago or even later.

They now have a considerable say

in how the university is run. Hundreds, previously required to live in dormitories, now live in off-campus apartments.

In 1922, a women student, dismissed for smoking cigarettes in her Ypsilanti roominghouse, took her case to court and lost.

Today, alcoholic beverages are permitted in residence halls, and some even have arrangements for co-educational living in alternate rooms.

In the 125 years since its founding in 1849, what is now Eastern Michigan University has awarded 54,094 baccalaureate and graduate degrees and 52,225 teaching certificates. Who were these thousand of young men and women?

As late as 1892, Principal John M. B. Sill wrote in his annual report that "our (Michigan Normal School) pupils are largely the sons and daughters of farmers." Furthermore, they came to Ypsilanti for the sole purpose of studying to become teachers.

THE FACE of Michigan changed, however, and so did the background of Eastern's students. Most of them now come from the highly industrialized urban and suburban southeastern part of the state.

One day in November, I was unfortunate enough to witness a very serious accident just after it had taken place on Ford Road in Canton Township.

I remember being amazed by the speed with which the rescue squad arrived at the scene and pick up the seriously injured victim. At a time when adverse publicity and little sup-

port seem to be given to the Canton Fire Department, I feel they should receive some recognition for the work that we tend to take for granted.

I know that I feel better with the realization that quick efficient service will be available in the event of some serious problem or problems that might ever arise.

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Foods inexpensive to prepare for traditional Arabic feast

Experiencing food from other countries is interesting, exciting and, of course, a taste sensation. An ambitious and curious cook might consider an international fling with the exotic and tempting recipes of the Near East. In particular, an Arabic food feast.

Mrs. Suad Ghannam of Livonia prepares the traditional ethnic fare at least once a week. She assures even novice cooks of success in preparing the Near East delicacies, starting with a variety of canapes, sour soups, hearty entrees and luscious honey-drenched desserts.

Lamb and mutton are favorite meats for most Arabic main dishes. Eggplant, summer squash, tomato, okra and green pepper are popular vegetables.

Aromatic flavors of olive oil, saffron, garlic, mint, wild marjoram and rosemary are constantly used. Cinnamon and Syrian mix (allspice) are also used to season Arabic dishes.

DESSERTS consist of dates, figs, rose petals and honey-drenched pastries filled with ground nuts.

The traditional round, flat Arabic bread is eaten with every course except dessert.

Tea is served in large quantities. Steaming cups of thick, sweet Turkish coffee usually accompany dessert.

One of Mrs. Ghannam's typical weekend menus might include tangy Tabooli, a spicy salad of burghoul (cracked wheat) tomatoes, green onions, parsley, cucumbers, chopped mint, and a dressing made of olive oil and lemon juice.

THE MAIN course features grape leaves and summer squash, both stuffed with a mixture of rice and lamb, and freshly baked homemade bread.

To cap a delicious dinner—Knafeh, a dessert made of sweet ricotta cheese between two layers of shredded wheat dough and sprinkled with a clear syrup.

All the dishes are distinctive and, Mrs. Ghannam adds, most "can be inexpensively prepared."

Preparation time for many of the recipes is minimal. For foods that require stuffing, such as grapeleaves and squash, I usually make enough for several meals then freeze them," she says.

ACCORDING TO Mrs. Ghannam, the ingredients needed to prepare an Arabic feast, as described, are avail-

able at any American, Greek, Italian or Syrian grocery or bakery store.

Mrs. Ghannam's other suggestions, from melt-in-your-mouth appetizers to mouth-watering desserts, include:

Canapes are Baba Ghannouj, (eggplant dip) and Hummos Bi Tahini (garbanzo bean dip). Favorite entrees are Lamb Tongue and stuffed grapeleaves, and Kibbi Bil Laban (Kibbi with cooked yogurt). Pastry worth sampling is the well-known Baklava, paper-thin pastry filled with ground nuts and soaked in honey.

The tasty Arabic cuisine is food to please any sheik. To complete the dinner and create the Near Eastern atmosphere: Add several belly dancers.

TABOOLI

1 cup fine burghoul (cracked wheat)

6 large tomatoes, diced
2 bunches green onions, diced
2 cucumbers, diced
4 to 1 cup chopped mint leaves
Olive oil, lemon juice and salt to taste

If the recipe is made a few hours before serving, wash burghoul in large bowl and add all chopped vegetables starting with tomatoes. Add dressing and mix well. This allows the burghoul to absorb the natural juice of the vegetables and dressing. Otherwise, soak burghoul from 20 to 30 minutes before adding chopped vegetables and dressing.

SUGGESTION: Peel lemon, dice and add to tabooli in addition to lemon juice.

KUSA MAHSHI (Stuffed Squash)
15 squash (5" x 1 1/2")

Stuffing: 1 cup rice, uncooked and rinsed in cold water
1 tbs. rendered butter
1 1/2 lbs. lamb shoulder, coarsely ground, salt, pepper, cinnamon and allspice to taste. Combine all ingredients and mix together loosely. Brush lightly the outside of each squash and cut off tops. Core squash leaving a thin shell. Rinse briefly in salt water, and stuff them 3/4 of the way.

Put a layer of lamb neck or breast bones and arrange the layers in different directions to allow the juice to come between the squash so it will cook properly. Cook about one hour or until rice and squash are tender.

Cover squash with one large can of whole tomatoes, chopped.

STUFFED GRAPE LEAVES

1 qt. grapeleaves (if packed in salt water, rinse and drain. If using fresh grape leaves wash thoroughly and cover with hot water until they are limp. Drain and set aside).

1 pkg. lamb breast
Lemon juice to taste
Use recipe for Mahshi for stuffing. To stuff the leaves: Put 1 tsp. stuffing in the center of each leaf, on the side showing the vines (rough side). Fold the wide side up over stuffing, fold each side to the middle and roll tightly to make a cylinder 3 inches long and 1/4 inch thick.

To cook grape leaves: Put a layer of lamb breast cut up in the bottom of a heavy 4-5 qt. saucepan. Arrange rolls close together in layers. Be sure the open end of the roll is down. Sprinkle 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/4 lemon juice over the top and cover with water. Bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 45 minutes or more until stuffing is tender.

Serve with lamb chops, stuffed kibbi or leg of lamb.

NOTE: Tomatoes may be substituted on grapeleaves instead of water.

KNAFEH

2 lbs. of knafeh dough
2 lbs. of sweet cheese
1 lb. of sweet butter

Syrup (see Attar recipe)
Mix dough with butter over very low fire, making sure it doesn't stick together. Grease a tray evenly using sweet butter. Divide the dough in the tray and flatten it with hands. Spread the cheese on it and cover with the remaining half of the dough.

Bake in a 350 degrees preheated oven until the surface dough becomes light brown.

Pour cold syrup on knafeh and serve.

ATTAR (syrup)
2 cups sugar
1 cup water
1 tbs. lemon juice
Boil all ingredients until the solution becomes heavy and syrupy.

BASIC DOUGH BREAD
6 cups flour, sifted
1 tbs. salt
2 tbs. oil
2 envelopes dried yeast
2 1/2 cups lukewarm water

Soften and dissolve yeast in warm water. Gradually mix flour and oil, kneading as you add the yeast and water mixture. Knead only until a smooth dough results. In case the dough is too wet, add just a little flour. Let rise in a warm place for about 1 1/2 hours. Punch down gently. Form into balls about the size of an or-

ange and allow to rise about 30 minutes. Roll out with a little flour. Let settle for about 15 minutes and bake.

QAHWAY (Turkish coffee)
2 cups boiling water
5 tsp. sugar
5 tsp. turkish coffee
3 cardemom pads

Bring water to a boil. Add sugar, then add the coffee, stirring until mixture comes to a boil and is frothy; add cardemom.

Remove pot from fire. Repeat this procedure three times. Coffee will rise fast to the top of the pot. As the froth forms, spoon a little into each cup. This froth will settle at the top when coffee is poured. Serve six demistasse.

The rippling waters of our liquid world of wonder gave incredible feelings of wealth, when the aquatic inhabitants maneuver about in such a way that they create a glittering ceiling of diamonds.

The most enjoyable part of the day was when Kevin Karp, The King Fish, a senior citizen in very good standing with our community, would tell stories of his courageous youth and of his true love, Daisy Dover, queen of the English seas.

This usually took place after lunch, as we would form a family circle with our best friends so all could see him and listen in awe of the days when our water frontiers were like virgin crystals.

DAISY DOVER came from an auto-crate family that very much disapproved of their relationship. Even though the ol' kingfish was honest, intelligent and hardworking, he could never mate with his lady-in-waiting, no matter how secure their love was.

Family pressures on both sides insisted on maintaining a thoroughbred, however contrary to the changing times this may have been.

THE LUSCIOUS lillies lacing the palatial residence made it very inviting. The antique patina of moss and algae lightly coating the bedrock and sandstone structure made the old place look of royal character and genuine, English channel design.

Elegant housing is beauty of the past. No one has any incentive around here at all. The stately dwellings are

replaced with economical housing, notwithstanding our need for cultural reform.

Would it do any good to have a clean-up program, with the forever increasing pollution rate here in our neighborhood? Life spans are shortened to half. We are not allowed to mature gracefully into tantalizing, tasty trout.

I HAVE, however, become accustomed to a new edible that comes from France but originally from western Asia. It has a very mild onion-garlic scent. Tres agreeable!

When I'm not feeling up to par a hot toddy of this new edible, shallots, fresh lime juice, earthy mushrooms, and sweet unsalted butter, mixed in my 10th century Paul Lamiere sterling tureen, makes me feel wonderful again; and I want to go on maturing to the end of my purpose.

Gourmets will recognize, by the brilliant blue color of my skin, that I

took very good care of myself. If you want to be best you need:

The wisdom of a whale, strength of a salmon, disposition of a dolphin, loyalty of a langusta, sharpness of a shark, and, of course, tenderness of a trout.

TROUT DEFINITION: Any of the smaller fresh water species from the Salmonidae family comprising three genera: Salmo Christivomer, Salmo Trutta and Salmo Gairdneri.

The most widely found trout is the Savelinus Fontinalis (brook trout). It lives only in cold running fresh water streams.

HOT TODDY TROUT BROOKSIDE

4 brook or rainbow trout
1 pound of fresh mushrooms
2 limes
1 shallot chopped finely
1/4 pound sweet butter (soft if possible)

Some flour and fine breadcrumbs mixed

1/2 cup of white wine from the bottle (served with the trout)

1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley (fresh)

In a black skillet or saute pan, add about 1 tablespoon of vegetable oil per trout and heat. (More oil may be used depending on the size of pan used.)

Season trout with a mixture of salt and white pepper on both sides. If the fish is fresh, do not wash the sliminess off; it is part of the physical makeup and also very tasty.

When you are ready to cook the

fish, after it has been seasoned, dust it in the flour mixture and set it flesh down in the hot oil. It should turn golden brown within a few minutes; turn with a pancake spatula and cook the other side.

This recipe is for trout that has been boned. Any poissoniere or fish butcher will do this for you.

Remove from pan onto a serving platter, whip out pan and commence the preparation of la sauce.

ADD BUTTER and melt with shallots and mushrooms and saute until mushrooms are tender but firm (two minutes, at the most).

Add the wine and lime juice and simmer for another minute. Now add the parsley and remaining butter, shake pan or stir until smooth, pour trout flesh side up and serve.

Chablis, vouvrey, rhine or mossel would be delightful.

QUESTION FOR DUGLASS: Is that the right amount of margarine (1 pound) and butter (2 tablespoons) in last week's recipe for Apple of My Eye Pie dough? Seems like an awful lot.

ANSWER: It's a very rich dough. But amount of flour does vary geographically. Come to think of it, recipe should have specified 4 cups all purpose flour instead of 2. (Send your question for Duglass to: Duglass Duglass, The Good Life, The Observer & Eccentric, 1225 Bowers, Birmingham 48012.)

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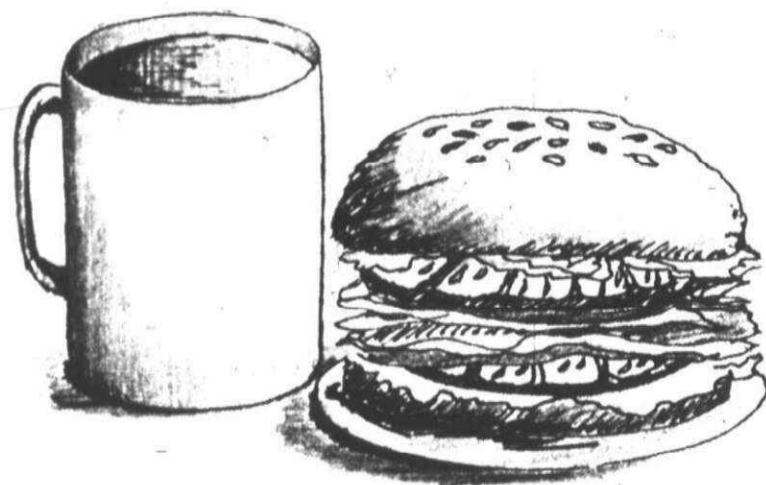

Public can do without secret meeting stunts by W-W school board

We find deplorable and insulting the action taken by the Wayne-Westland School Board in taking a recess to conduct a secret meeting during a public session.

It is repulsive enough for publicly elected officials to skirt their mandate by hiding away during the middle of the week to conduct secret meetings, but to flaunt this flagrant abuse of power in the faces of those who elected them is a clear breach of public trust.

If governmental units and politicians are to regain the respect of the electorate, they must bend over backwards to avoid breeding mistrust. This is especially important on the local level, where residents have a first hand view of politicians in action.

TRUSTEE William White's assumption that such a matter as teachers' extra duty pay is better discussed in private is bunk. What interests the board members surely is of interest to the residents. It is the taxpayers' money being bandied about.

Supt. Timothy Dyer's supposition that this issue had to do with personnel matters is questionable. Even if it were true, conducting a secret meeting demonstrates the board's lack of sensitivity towards the electorate.

It is true that elected legislative bodies are protected under state law to conduct secret meetings in some instances. But the law is voluntary. It is solely up to the discretion of the elected officials.

Accountability, more than ever, should be the concern of politicians, and school board members are politicians. If elected officials are ashamed to state their views in public, it is time for them to reconsider their rationale for being in the political arena.

The misunderstanding and mistrust of the residents during the recent teachers' strike is a cogent example of why community leaders must face up to this obligation.

Democratically based governments can survive only if having the support of the electorate. Conducting secret meetings erodes that support.

SOME MAY SAY the issue at hand was one of minimal interest or importance. Let the residents be the judge. Others may say public discussion adversely reflects on those administrators who are hired to implement the board's policies. Let the residents decide.

Persons choosing to work for the public must bear the brunt of public concern.

We oppose secret meetings conducted by any legislative body for any reason. It is hoped the Wayne-Westland school board will find the courage to step from under the umbrella of secrecy.



The Stroller

An old adage upheld

There's a quaint old saying that goes, "The more things change, the more they stay the same."

The Stroller couldn't help recalling the other evening while seated in his leisure chair at home listening to a statement made on TV by Ed Cole, immediate past president of General Motors Corp., in his informative discussion with Ralph Nader, the auto industry's most severe critic.

Asked if GM was planning anything to relieve the monotony and boredom along the mass production assembly lines, the former GM boss said, "We are experimenting with the concept of 'group assembly.'" He explained that the assembly workers would be set up in teams — and each team would build a car, instead of the long lines that have been in practice for years.

AN EXPERIMENT!

Mere mention of the word caused The Stroller to smile, for the concept of "group assembly" was used long before Ed Cole ever became the boss man at General Motors.

Years ago, long before The Stroller began travelling down the journalistic trail, he was a member of a group that assembled the now famous Mack "Bulldog" trucks back in his home town.

It was shortly after World War I when jobs were scarce, and even though he was a machinist by trade, the offer to work with one of these groups was welcome.

There were six on a team in those days. It was our job to assemble the truck from the ground up. In other words, an empty frame was given to us and when we finished with it, the truck was driven off the floor. Matter of fact, this is how The Stroller learned to drive.

The important thing about this system was the fact that the truck could not be driven away until it was passed by the discerning inspectors and woe be unto the team that had more than an occasional truck turned back.

Contrary to the effects of today's assembly line that breeds boredom, our groups inspired rivalry. It was like playing a game each day.

THERE WAS A constant race to see which group could assemble a truck that could pass inspection in the quickest time. And there was a scoreboard, similar to those in the ball parks today, to keep tabs on the races,

In expressing some doubt over the group system, Mr. Cole stated that absenteeism would wreck the plan. Well, we had absenteeism in those days, too, but there always was a "handy" man around to fill the gap and no truck frame ever stood idle.

The feature of the group plan was that each truck had to stand inspection before it ever left the floor. There was no such thing as letting a frame slip by. It couldn't be driven away if it wasn't complete.

So, Mr. Cole need have no doubt about the "group" assembly. If it worked years ago, it should work today, too.

One thing is certain. If the group system were adopted there would be no more recalling of cars by the thousands to correct some fault — and of times a fault that could lead to a fatality on the road.

It was the same in the machine shops when The Stroller spent his

days and nights in front of a motor lathe, turning out mechanical parts.

THERE WAS NO such thing as an assembly line there either. When you were given a job, it was yours to complete from the raw bar or casting to the finished product. And it had to stand inspection before it left the shop.

There was no such thing as one fellow drilling the holes, another planing the sides, and another cutting threads. One fellow did it all and it became a matter of pride.

There is no individual pride in the assembling of an automobile today. Too many hands play a part in it.

That's why GM is planning to "experiment" with the "group" system, in the hope that boredom on the assembly lines will be replaced with pride.

You see, the more things change, the more they are the same.

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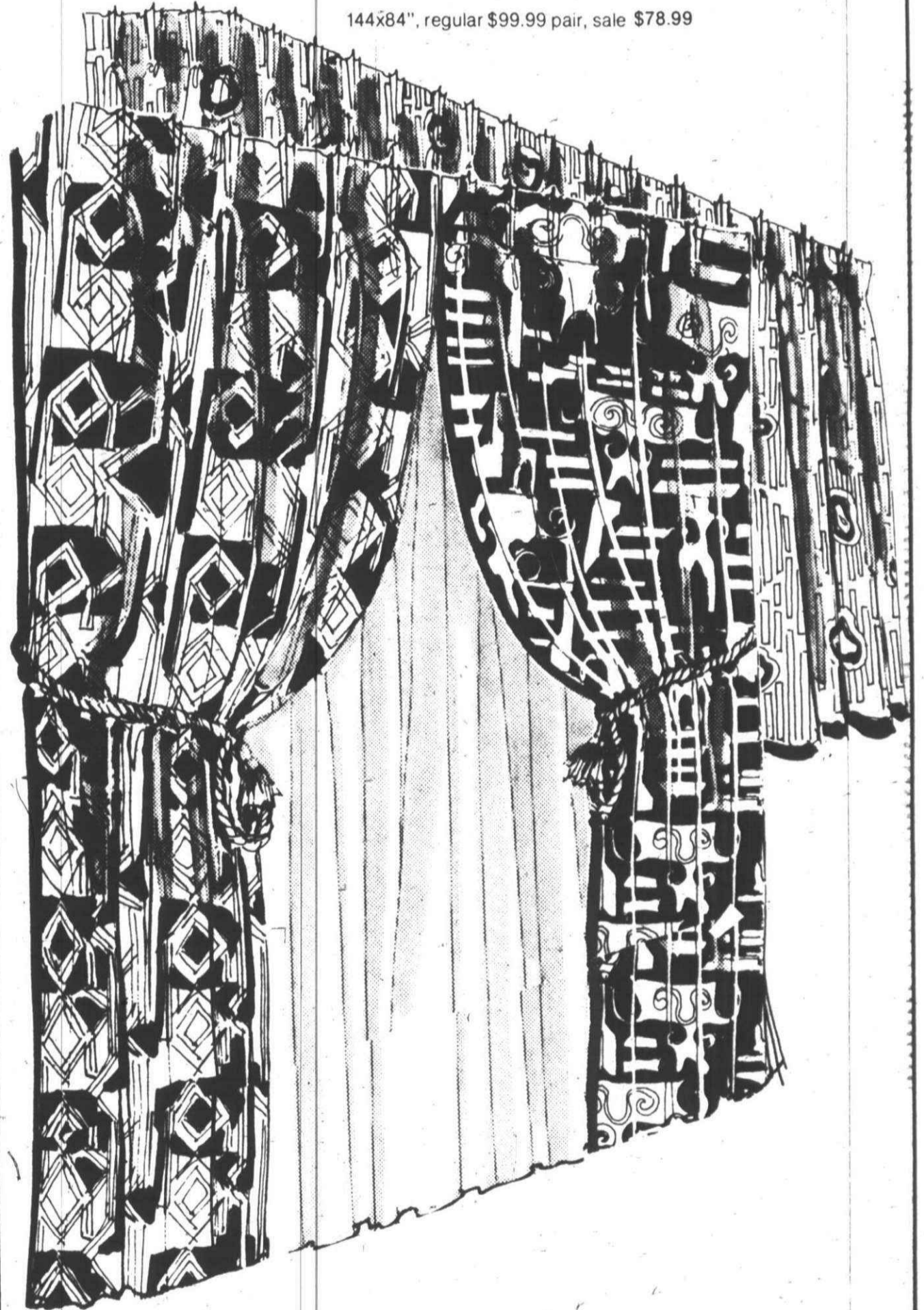
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Plymouth homes get early Christmas air

Rosina Raymond winner of Soroptimist award

"I was very honored," said Rosina Raymond, winner of the Women Helping Women award presented by the Soroptimist International of Livonia. "I just couldn't believe it. Basically I'm a very humble person."

Mrs. Raymond was honored for her community service, particularly her work in advancing the status of women.

At the award dinner, Mrs. Jessie Sanderson, first vice-president, noted the reasons Mrs. Raymond had been selected for the distinction.

As a Schoolcraft College trustee she had urged the funding and continuation of the women's continuum, which offers special programs for area women.

SHE INSISTED that sexist terminology be removed from college contracts, brochures and catalogs.

She supported the increase of opportunities for women in faculty positions and for women students.

She worked actively to elect qualified women to public office.

Since 1970 Mrs. Raymond has supported the Equal Rights Amendment. As president of the Livonia Business and Professional Women's Club, she participated in a "fly in" to Washington to lobby for the passage of this amendment.

She has urged the appointment of women to civic and municipal posts.

"I FEEL women have made a great deal of progress," said Mrs. Raymond in an interview. "But there are many things to do. Some of us who are active still get flak from people who have difficulty recognizing that women are first and foremost persons and are equal to all other persons."

She added: "Women should have the option of going into any area of work that their intelligence, ability, training and aptitude takes them."

MRS. RAYMOND said she has no quarrel with women who prefer to stay home.

"That's great," she said. "But those who want to expand their horizons and go to work should be treated

equally. I would not trade my role of being a wife, homemaker, mother, grandmother solely to be a career person. I'm glad I've been able to combine them."

Mrs. Raymond took her first step toward public life in 1953 when she ran for a position on the Livonia Board of Education, but lost. She still remembers she lost by 187 votes.

"I have the philosophy that you never lose, you just don't always win. When I ran for the board, I did some learning along the way. I met people with whom I built relationships and friendships."

THEN SHE RAN for Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees and lost by about 200 votes. That was in 1964. Seven years later she ran for the six-year term and won two-to-one.

"That's what I mean when I say you don't really lose if you hang in there," she said.

Mrs. Raymond gives credit for her training in leadership to her early work in the 4-H Club when she lived in a rural Wisconsin community.

As a 16-year-old leader of the organi-

zation she was the youngest in the state. It gave her her first experience working with women, having been raised in a family with four brothers.

"In 4-H we had to work to win—we were in competition. But we also learned that if we lost we had to be a good loser."

"This kind of experience gives you determination when you set your sights on something you want. You just try to keep working toward it."

MRS. RAYMOND is by no means the only member of her family who is goal-oriented. Her husband, Jerry, has been a Livonia city councilman for nine years.

Her son, Eldon, ran for political office. "But he didn't win," said Mrs. Raymond with the unspoken implication that he didn't lose either. He is now on Livonia's Zoning Board of Appeals.

Her daughters, Rhea Heil and Sharon Rosen, are registered nurses, and another daughter, Joyce Dubrin, earned a teaching certificate and is a counselor in Pittsford, N.Y.

The open space will soon be filled

Progress ends the rural life

The gray and white farmhouse on McClumpha Road just north of Joy is a family home in the old tradition. Owners Mr. and Mrs. Leon Scharmen raised three sons in the comfortable, rural setting.

Clara Scharmen's memories go beyond this generation. Some member of her family, the Tylers, has lived in the house for the past 85 years. She was born in the music room, married in the living room and her parents died in the house. Her father farmed 88 acres, about average in size at the time.

The Scharmens have sold all but one acre and the house. They know that soon the open land which they love will be developed into building lots for three and four bedroom homes. Services for the occupants will spring up nearby. The schools are already there and the Scharmens can look out the bay window in the music room and watch the activity at the Centennial Educational Park just over the rolling land at the corner.

To crowd all of the enjoyment pos-

sible into the time before the development begins, Mr. and Mrs. Scharmen walk together every day along the paths in the fields and woods around their home, storing up precious memories before the bulldozers and builders arrive.

Yet, the very act of living and raising a family in a changing community fosters a sense of reality. The Scharmens are not fighting the changes which come with rapid growth, they are enjoying what they have for as long as possible. But, they know.

MRS. SCHARMEN has pity for those who move to Plymouth Township recently thinking they were moving to the country.

"You just can't hold country. If you want country, you have to buy acreage. You should find out ahead of time what's happening in the community."

Her husband nods in agreement. "There's got to be change. When this land was farmed and they started to develop this piece, the taxes went up 600 per cent in one year. There's no alternative, but to develop."

"I don't know what else you can do," Mrs. Scharmen says. "It's ridicu-

lous for people to come out here thinking they're moving to the country and then try to fight the development. They're unrealistic. We all hate to see it come, we love our open territory, but what can we do?"

In principle, Scharmen agrees with the thinking of Canton Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein who would like to preserve some of the open farming land.

"It would be nice to have some farms," Scharmen says, "if it could be worked out so the farmer didn't have to take a loss. It wouldn't be fair either if the farmland was on the tax rolls at \$500 an acre and the land around at \$5,000."

Scharmen would like to see a plan worked out at the state level where farmland would have low taxes as long as it is being worked, but taxes equitable to the developed land around it would be paid when the farmer sells the land.

Mrs. Scharmen comments, "Some of the land here is very good for farming and some of the finest farmers in the area are over in Canton Township."

THE COUPLE comment on the strange turn of events. Once the children, like their own, were bused into town to school. Now, the children from the town and the surrounding areas are bused out to the school.

So, until the urban development reaches them, Leon and Clara Scharmen are going to enjoy life. Most of the original outbuildings of the old farm are gone, including the carriage shed where Clara Tyler and her friends used to play.

"We got out of the house as fast as we could, you lived outside summer and winter."

Scharmen, who came to Detroit to find work as a young man from his home in northern Michigan, and his wife feel fortunate to have grown up and lived in rural America. They feel sorry for children who will never know the freedom and beauty of such a life.

They also know they can't stop progress. But to get the last drop of enjoyment from a life they love, they whistle for the old hound dog, put on warm coats and walk the farmland where the roots began.

Arts council receives grants

PLYMOUTH—Expanded arts programs are in the offing for Plymouth area residents with the news that the Plymouth Community Arts Council (PCAC) has received nearly \$3,000 in grants from the Michigan Council for the Arts (MCA).

According to PCAC executive director Marg Moon, the \$2,775 in grants will be used to both expand art programs in the schools and provide additional art programs to the community.

A major grant of \$1,150 will be used to develop an art rental program, in which Plymouth residents can rent art reproductions by the old masters and modern artists, and three-dimensional originals by Michigan artists.

"The project is still in the planning stages and won't begin until February," says Mrs. Moon.

THE DUNNING-HOUGH Library will handle the operation, and checking out art will be "as easy as checking out books," adds Mrs. Moon.

Wednesday is slated as art rental day with residents able to enjoy art in their homes for a low rental fee.

"The rental project should be self-sustaining. We hope to maintain and eventually increase it with money obtained from rental charges."

A second grant of \$825 will be used to replace supplies and add new materials to the visual arts program in the schools, explains Mrs. Moon.

"Funds will be utilized in three areas: a Picture Lady program in the elementary grades; art galleries in the middle schools, and library art displays at the high school level."

The Picture Lady project, in its sixth year and offers elementary age youngsters the opportunity to see the art they are learning about.

"The program is operated on a volunteer basis," explains Mrs. Moon.

"A PCAC representative visits five classrooms once a month and explains the art. Children get a chance to ask questions and examine the prints. The pictures are left in the classrooms and rotated throughout the school until every class has seen each reproduction."

THE GALLERY program for middle school students stresses three-dimensional art. It is in its sixth year of operation. Art galleries are set up in the libraries at each of Plymouth's four middle schools and art objects are rotated on a monthly basis.

"The high school art exhibits have been in operation on and off for about two years," explains Mrs. Moon. The arts council uses displays offered by MCA and makes them available in high school libraries."

An \$800 grant was awarded for the performing arts program which provides a variety of music, dance and theater productions in the schools.

"The PCAC acts primarily as a booking agency," says Mrs. Moon. "In the past performances have included groups from the Art Institute, community theater, and student productions from colleges and universities in the area."

"The project is in its fifth year and we've made a special effort to canvass the Plymouth area in search of local talent we can present to the students."

BESIDES THE actual performances, the project encourages working with students in a workshop atmosphere, which includes a question and answer period.

The grants will be matched with PCAC funds, says Mrs. Moon, with the exception of the performing arts program which helps pay for itself. Students are asked to make a donation for the productions they see.

Free Pap tests set in Romulus

A free Pap test clinic open to all women will be held on Thursday and Friday, Dec. 5 and 6 in Romulus Wesleyan Church, 37300 Goddard, Romulus.

Clinic hours will be 4 p.m. on Dec. 5 and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Dec. 6. The clinic is sponsored by the Michigan Cancer Foundation and the Helping Hand Thrift Shop in Romulus with the cooperation of other community organizations and churches.

Chairperson is Mrs. Florence Klein, also head of the Romulus branch of the Michigan Cancer Foundation.

The Pap test is a reliable test for cervical cancer, one of the most prevalent cancers afflicting women. It is curable if detected early enough.

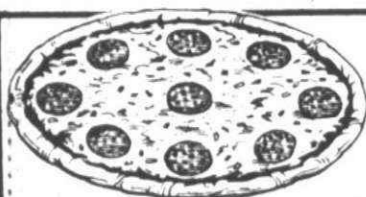
It is a painless test which takes about five minutes to administer. Cer-

vical cells are collected and microscopically examined for abnormalities in color, size and shape.

Results of the test will be sent to each woman's personal physician. Physicians recommend that every woman have a Pap test at least once a year. In some cases it should be administered two or three times a year.

Irregular bleeding or unusual vaginal discharge are among the first visible signs of cervical cancer. Such signs do not always indicate the presence of cervical cancer, but they should be reported immediately to a physician.

The Pap test indicates signs of cervical cancer long before these visible signs are apparent. Early detection can prevent needless deaths.

Sour debut for Eagle coach

Stevenson tops Thurston 55-42

In what has evolved into a season opening ritual, the Spartans of Stevenson High bounced the Thurston Eagles on the hardwood court, 55-42.

The last three years have seen these two clubs battle it out in first game jitters with Stevenson winning by scores of 71-43, 76-75 in overtime, and 67-66 last season.

This time it was Stevenson again. It was first year varsity coach Bill Croteau who took the brunt of defeat for his Thurston cagers.

"We didn't execute as well as I thought we would," commented Croteau. "I'll take the blame for this loss. I really thought we were ready but we weren't. I think it was there, but it just didn't happen."

"I HATE to lose and in seven years of coaching, this is the first time I have ever lost an opening game."

One of many scattered posters throughout the Stevenson gym read, "Gobble 'em up Spartans" and that's just about what George VanWagoner's crew did.

It was 13-10 Stevenson after one quarter, 30-20 at the half, 45-31 after

three quarters and easy sailing the remaining eight minutes.

The shooting game told the story as Stevenson hit on 23 of 60 for 38 per cent and Thurston 25 of 49 for 31 per cent. It was Stevenson's Jim Gilland who stole the show with nine field goals and seven of eight at the free throw line for a total of 25 points.

George Herman was No. 2 man in the Spartan attack with 10 points. He

hailed in 19 rebounds.

A FREE THROW by Gilland opened the scoring but Thurston jumped in front, 4-1 on buckets by Jim Fazzini and Cory Rodriguez. Stevenson's first bucket came 3:48 into the '74 season on a 15 footer by Dave Haberman. Gilland then sank two free throws. Rob Rose and Gilland con-

nected on two-pointers and it was Stevenson the rest of the way.

Stevenson hosts Redford Union tomorrow (Tuesday) and Waterford Friday in its Inter-Lakes loop opener while Thurston entertains Garden City West Tuesday and Garden City East on Friday.

Salem rattles WL Central; now comes Franklin revenge

A small measure of revenge for the defeat suffered in last season's battle for the regional basketball title will be Plymouth Salem's goal when the Rocks invade Livonia Franklin Tuesday night, having already notched a 59-41 win over Walled Lake Central in their opener.

Although it's only game No. 2 on a long, rugged road for both clubs, it's also the last tuneup for each before beginning defense of their respective league championships—Salem in the Suburban Eight and Franklin in the Northwest Suburban.

Last winter both also went on to win their state district tournament, but when they met head-on in the regional finale it was Franklin that came out on top by 10 points on its own court—only to bow to the eventual Class A champion, Birmingham Brother Rice, in the state quarter-finals.

Both will begin league play Friday. Salem at Trenton while Franklin

hosts Oak Park.

Hopes are high in Coach Fred Thomann's Salem camp not only of repeating as Sub 8 and district champs this winter, but also of adding the regional crown to qualify for a shot at the state crown after going 21-3 last year.

Against Walled Lake, although the Rocks' brand of basketball was hardly of state championship caliber, it was more than adequate to dispose of the Vikings in a ragged game, punctuated with frequent turnovers.

Salem simply had too much height for the Vikings and used it to advantage by grabbing 43 rebounds to Walled Lake's 27.

Eric Agardy, 6-10 senior center, dumped in five buckets in the first period as he went on to take game scoring honors with 21 points, plus leading in rebounds with 14. Major help on the boards came from 6-8 forward Jim Ellinghausen who grabbed 13 rebounds

to go with his 12 points on offense.

The two of them scored all of Plymouth's 15 points in the opening period as the Rocks went out to a 15-6 lead.

The Vikings came alive in the second stanza, cutting Salem's margin to two points at 17-15 behind the shooting of Blair Hysni, Micky Yeager and Brian Ducharme, but that was as close as they ever could get.

Dan Moore, Tim Dillon, Bill DenHouter, Agardy and Ellinghausen picked up the tempo to give the Rocks a 27-19 edge at the half, and a 10-point spurt early in the third quarter shot Salem in front by 18 at 41-23.

Two hooks by Agardy, a pair of tip-ins by Ellinghausen and a driving layup by John Maloney accounted for that rally.

8-2 first quarter lead and held a 9-6 margin at the end of one quarter and 24-16 lead at the half.

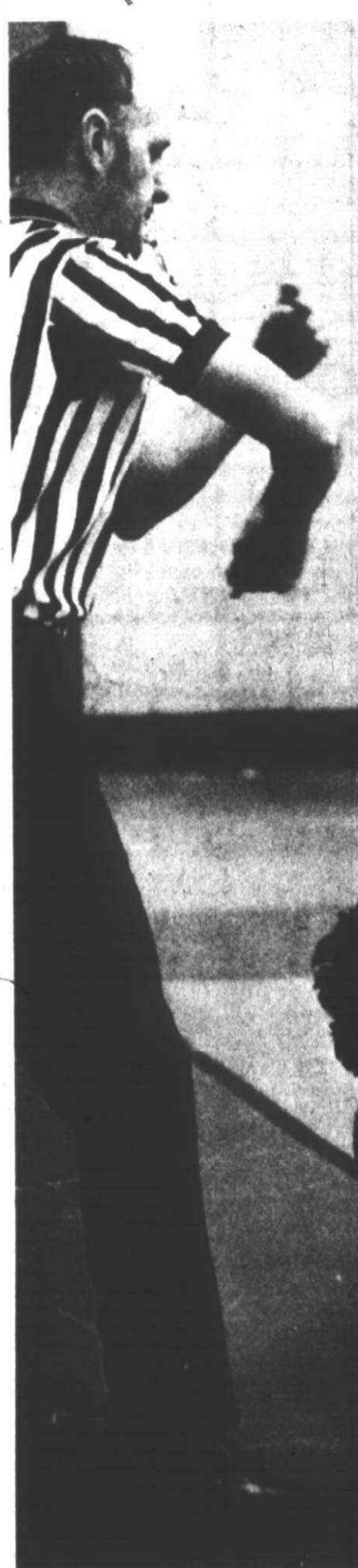
Borgess moved into a press in the third quarter and sliced the difference to two points, took the quarter, 13-10, and trailed 34-29 heading into the last eight minutes.

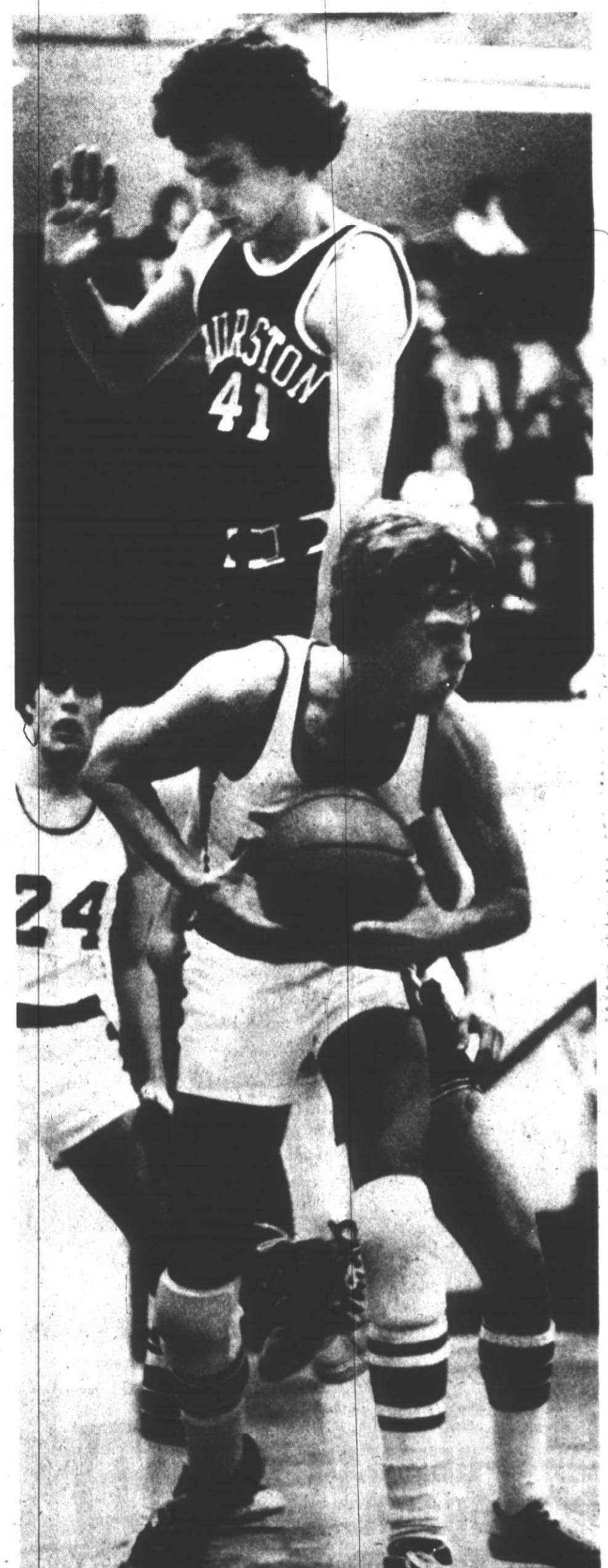

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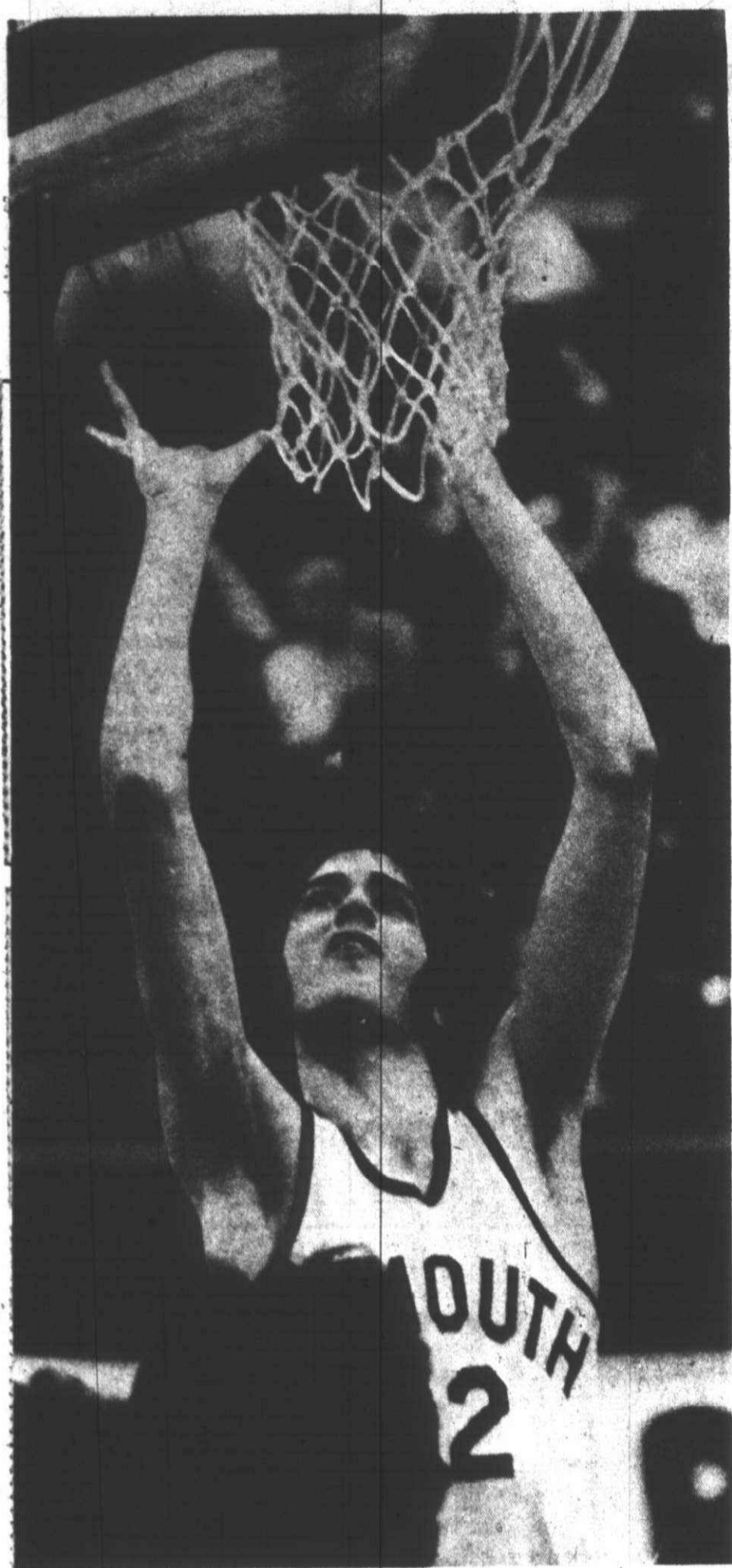
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In The Pocket

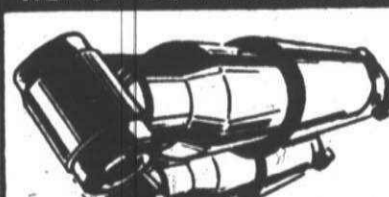



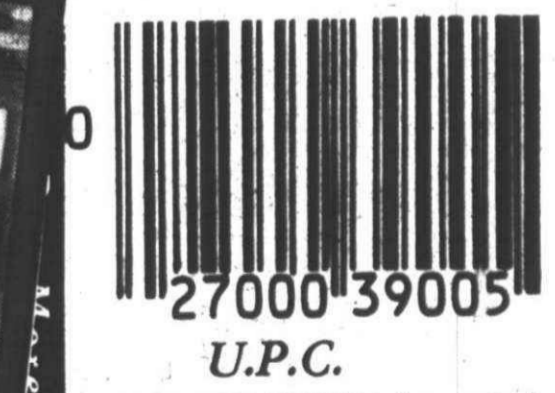

Customers who would prefer the conventional packages are asked to sign the back of the prescription, making a record of the request.

1. ALL MEDICATIONS should be stored out of reach. Some families use a locked tackle or record box for this purpose.
