

# Safety millage question up to residents

CANTON—Township board members have assumed a "hands-off" policy concerning the possibility of a special election for a safety millage. Any attempt for a special safety millage will have to come from the citizens of the township explained Treasurer Carl Parsell.

Parsell added, "Morally, I don't think we can place this on the ballot open and declined comment after the circuit court panel's decision placing the striking Crestwood teachers back on the jobs today (Monday). Supervisor Robert Greenstein con-

curred, "The people have spoken twice, and as much as we'd like to see the new fire station, we can't really try again on our own. We can't ram the thing down the peoples' throats."

The millage proposal allowed for a three mill tax on real and on personal

property for the next 10 years "to provide more effective fire and police protection to all areas of the township."

Had the millage passed, the money would have provided for the construction and staffing of a second fire station in the township.

But Canton residents shot it down twice at the ballot box, once in the August primary, by a 932-907 margin, and again in the general election by 276 votes, 2,449-2,173.

While township board members still feel there is "a great need" for a second fire station, they have indicated

that the initiative for a special millage election will have to come from the public.

Parsell said, "They'll have to start a petition drive or show us a strong desire some other way in order to vote on it again."

# Teacher walkouts averted by court

PLYMOUTH—Many school administrators, teachers and school board members breathed a mild sigh of relief last Thursday when a three-judge panel removed, at least temporarily, the possibility of a teacher walkout in the Plymouth schools.

School Supt. John M. Hoben said his only concern was to keep the schools open and declined comment after the circuit court panel's decision placing the striking Crestwood teachers back on the jobs today (Monday).

A RECORDED message by Plymouth Education Association President Dolly Carter McMaster Thursday said that grievances were pending against the actions of the superintendent for "unilaterally" revoking personal business days for teachers last Tuesday and Wednesday.

Hoben said the charges were unfounded, noting that it would have been the case if teachers staged a walkout supporting the Crestwood teachers.

Additional attempts to contact Mrs.

McMaster both Thursday and Friday were unsuccessful.

School board trustee Thomas Yack said his first reaction to the court decision was one of relief. "I knew that the crisis we were confronting would go away, at least for a while."

"The board can now get back to a review of the budget and our proposed in-service program," Yack said.

The trustee said he felt Public Act 379, removing the rights of teachers to strike, "hasn't worked for a long time. If anything good has come of this situation, it will be to stir the legislature into action."

BOARD SECRETARY Marcia Borowski said she felt personally relieved that classes would not be disrupted. She echoed Yack's sentiments, noting, "The Crestwood situation just points out the need for new legislation... legislation that leaves everyone just a little unhappy."

Mrs. Borowski noted that neither side (teachers or board members) is currently subject to penalties in the event of a teacher walkout, and she suggested legislation which would force both sides to do more battling at the bargaining table.

She stressed that the pressure has to be applied on legislators, but quickly added, "I'm not sure any of them feel the urgency of the situation the way I do. And that distresses me."

Trustee George Lawton said he thought the Crestwood decision had no particular effect on Plymouth, but he joined with other board members in suggesting that teachers should be granted the right to strike, "but also given the penalty of loss of pay in the event of a strike, just like other workers."

## Crestwood staff plans to return

DEARBORN HEIGHTS—Crestwood District schools are set to open today (Monday) either to 186 formerly striking teachers or to 150 teachers hired after the Crestwood Board of Education fired striking teachers.

Edward Homeier, the board's attorney, has been seeking a stay of execution from the Michigan Court of Appeals after the board was ordered by Wayne County Circuit Court to reinstate the striking teachers.

The office of Supt. Robert Rutila reported attendance of students and new teachers Friday remained the same as it had been during the week—about 90 per cent.

EVEN IF the district's regular teachers return to work today, it will undoubtedly take a long time for the wounds created by the strike to heal.

Teachers hired to replace the strikers, have reported tire slashings and threats on their lives.

One of the new female teachers claimed pickets followed her home and tried to run her off the road.

Many Crestwood parents are threatening to keep their children home from school today.

The atmosphere the returning teachers encounter will be markedly different from the one that greeted non-union teachers.

Parents volunteered to help the non-union teachers and morale in school buildings was generally high.

The board had paid the non-union teachers on a contractual basis. Though their salaries were not as high as those demanded by striking teachers, they far exceeded the substitute pay many were receiving before coming to Crestwood.

Most of the non-union teachers regarded their week in Crestwood as a chance to draw paychecks far higher than they were accustomed to, if only for a short time.

REGARDLESS OF who teaches Crestwood students today, the three-judge circuit court panel which ordered the re-hiring of Crestwood teachers found little praise for either side.

Edward Ellman, attorney for the Michigan Education Association, described the case as "very confusing," and the three judges, in trying to sort out the legal intricacies of the matter, would certainly agree.

As Judge George Bowles expressed it in his majority statement:

"The majority concurs in Judge Joseph Rashid's holding that both parties are in open and flagrant defiance and violation of his honor's orders. The majority deplores such defiance. It also deplores resorting to any unlawful strikes, termed 'sympathy

## Flood insurance on the way?

Plymouth-Canton residents may have to purchase federally-subsidized flood insurance to obtain federally-backed home improvement or real estate loans after July 1.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Development has identified the City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township as flood-hazard areas not enrolled in a national flood insurance program, as well as 105 other Michigan communities.

Unless governing bodies of those communities apply for entry into the program by July 1, the municipalities' federally-guaranteed loans and grants will be jeopardized, as well as residents' eligibility for FHA or bank loans on local real estate, mobile homes, or, in some cases, personal property.

Canton Township is already proceeding with its application, according to township clerk John Flodin, while the City of Plymouth is preparing its application and studying the matter, according to administrative assistant Ray Quada.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP clerk Helen Richardson said the township board of trustees will discuss the matter at Tuesday's board meeting.

Although the Lower Rouge River and other creeks flow through Canton Township and the Middle Rouge River flows through the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township, many local officials cannot understand why HUD

has designated the Plymouth-Canton area as flood-prone.

"We're willing to cooperate, and we're going to take steps not to hurt residents of the City of Plymouth or anyone who will be living here in the future," said Quada. "But we'd like someone to tell us why we're considered a flood-hazard area."

Flodin expressed similar views concerning Canton Township.

"I've lived in this community all my life," Flodin said, and I don't know of anyone in this community who has ever lost a great deal from flooding. Canton is generally high and dry and not in that great of risk. The program has more value in some parts of the country than in Canton."

Plymouth Township rejected enrollment in the program last year, Mrs. Richardson said, because the board of trustees could see no danger of flooding in the township. The board made that decision, however, before rejection endangered federally-guaranteed grants and loans.

RICHARD WATT, an engineer for the hydrological survey division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the agency administering the federal flood program for the state, said areas designated flood-prone are theoretically endangered by storms that occur once every 100 years.

"It's a large storm," Watt explained, "but a reasonable type of flood event. Just because people haven't experienced flooding doesn't mean that

it can't happen eventually, and it probably will."

The drainage pattern of rivers flowing through communities identified as flood prone could cause flooding in such a storm, he said.

The three municipalities in the Plymouth-Canton area must apply for eligibility in the federal program and adopt resolutions to minimize the possibility of flooding in new buildings by July 1. Watt said, in order to guarantee eligibility for federal grants and loans.

FLODIN SAID Canton Township's building code already minimizes the prospect of flooding. The township board of trustees will soon discuss such a resolution, however, possibly at its Jan. 28 meeting.

"Certain precautions are taken at this level already in the process of platting land," Flodin said. "There are some safeguards already taken without being in the flood insurance program, although there's nothing wrong in entering in that."

Little land is left for building within the Plymouth city limits, noted city engineer Alan Gove, while land along the Rouge River is leased by Wayne County and classified as a parkway along Edward Hines Drive.

After July 1, residents or businessmen in the Plymouth-Canton area must obtain adequate flood insurance coverage before applications for federally-backed home or business improve-

ment loans will be approved. Watt said. Prospective residents must obtain flood insurance before federally-backed mortgages are approved.

"The federal government is basically trying to cover the money they put out," Watt explained. "Sometimes (federally-mortgaged) structures in flood-prone areas are destroyed."

THE FEDERAL government will subsidize 90 per cent of the flood insurance rates, Watt said. Flood insurance costs to the homeowner will run 25 cents for each \$100 of coverage to a maximum \$35,000. Insurance on contents will run 35 cents for each \$100 of coverage to a maximum \$10,000.

Rates for multiple family dwellings will remain the same, Watt said, but

# College budget request is up 8 per cent; under board study

## SC offers help for unemployed

A special program for persons who are unemployed, underemployed or desiring mid-career employment changes gets underway at Schoolcraft College late in January.

Registration, which is free on a first-come basis, should be completed by contacting the college's community services office as early as possible and no later than Jan. 22. The college is located at 18600 Haggerty.

Known as the "productive employment search program," four Saturday sessions will be held on the Schoolcraft campus from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Jan. 25, Feb. 1, 8 and 22.

Topics to be covered in the sessions include the identification of career goals and interests, providing occupational information, assistance in preparing employment resumes, help in locating employers and successful job interviewing.

Sessions will be conducted by Schoolcraft counselors Jean Pike and William Heise. Ms. Pike has been on staff since 1964, while Heise is one author of Schoolcraft's "systematic career counseling process."

Macomb launched a similar program last fall with 56 persons enrolled. In cooperation with Macomb, a \$25,000 grant from Title I of the 1965 Higher Education Act will fund a number of programs in southeastern Michigan community colleges.

At Schoolcraft, the productive employment search program will be financed by a \$1,000 grant, the college's allotment from the Title I funds accorded Macomb.

general operating budget at a study session in the Garden City Instructional Center.

E. Frederick Petersen, manager of business services, presented an \$8,766,529 budget to the board.

The budget, if approved, includes an income of \$3.2 million from taxes; \$1.9 million from student fees; \$3.4 million from state appropriations; \$148,830 from federal grants; \$78,800 in carry-over funds from the 1974-75 budget; and \$35,900 from other sources.

Because of the business recession, the college can expect only a slight increase in state equalized valuation (SEV), according to Petersen.

PETERSEN indicated he expects

an increase in SEV of only seven per cent for 1975-76, one of the smallest increases ever.

By contrast, the SEV jumped 17.08 per cent in 1970-71. The 1974-75 fiscal year showed an increase of 8.25 per cent.

The Schoolcraft College district had levied 1.995 mills in 1974-75: 1.662 for operating expenses, 0.225 for debt retirement, and 0.148 for a special maintenance fund.

The new budget calls for a rate of 2.13 mills: 1.69 for operating expenses, 0.36 for debt retirement, and 0.08 for a special maintenance fund.

The SEV is not expected to rise markedly in the next year, according to Petersen, because of a decline in

the number of new commercial and residential building starts within the college district.

Therefore, existing dwellings will be taxed at the somewhat higher rate. State allocations to the district might be curtailed by as much as one and one-half per cent.

THE BOARD may have to consider a tuition increase for residents of the district, who now pay \$11 a credit hour.

The increase would come if the state reduces appropriations to the college, and would probably raise the rate to \$12 a credit hour.

The board will decide whether to increase either the millage rate or tuition, or both, after it reviews a comprehensive study of the district's finances and future growth plans at a Jan. 22 regular meeting on campus in Livonia.

## Beekeeping class in SC offerings

"Beekeeping for beginners," a new community services course offered by Schoolcraft College, may provide some comfort to persons stung by soaring sugar prices.

It is just one of the 25 new courses contained in the class schedule booklet recently mailed to all homes in the college district, which includes Livonia; Clarenceville, Plymouth, Garden City and Northville school districts.

Some of the others announced by Director Ron Griffith are real estate investment, beginning ceramics, equine reproduction, shopping and cooking for one, and advanced Transactional Analysis.

In all, the booklet includes schedule information and course descriptions for more than 140 classes, plus information on special programs for

women and senior citizens and other community services offerings such as cultural and public affairs programs.

Mail-in registrations will be accepted until Jan. 24. On-campus registrations will be taken Feb. 19, 20 from noon to 7:30 p.m. in the registrar's office. The campus is at 18600 Haggerty between Six and Seven Mile Roads in Livonia.

Tuition and fees are payable by check, MasterCharge or BankAmericard.

Besides the 13 classes at Schoolcraft's Instructional Center at Florence and Middle Belt in Garden City, other off-campus classes are in Livonia Stevenson and Plymouth Canton high schools, St. Mary Hospital on Levan north of Schoolcraft, and the Plymouth Center for Human Development.

# Board decision nears for McIntyre sewers

CANTON—Several years have elapsed since the residents of McIntyre Manor subdivision began their fight for a sanitary sewer. Early next month a final decision should be reached by the township board.

The subdivision, located at Ford and Sheldon roads, is currently "served" by drain fields that are no longer able to absorb the waste of the community. Residents say that in the summer their back yards turn into swamps as the effluence rises. The stench, they relate, is "unbearable."

Township Clerk John Flodin explains the problem. "The soil there is mostly clay base, and as a result it does not absorb well. Any sand pockets in the ground that might have absorbed well at one time, are no longer able to do the job."

The subdivision was platted "back in the late 1920s or early 1930s," according to the clerk, and presently there are about 75 homes in the subdivision.

LAST MARCH, residents of the community beseeched the township board for action.

In the summer, a bonding unit, the Canton-Van Buren Sewer and Water Authority, was formed. The previous township administration considered using it to float \$2 million in bonds to construct water and sewer facilities in "eight or nine" areas of the township including McIntyre.

At that time the McIntyre residents thought their problems were solved.

But the new administration voted to defer action on the bonding at its first meeting on Nov. 26, 1974. Supervisor Robert Greenstein said, "When you're dealing with large sums of money, and it's not yours, you have an obligation as an elected official to make sure the money is being used the best way."

Instead, the board voted to discuss the problem and report back in 60 days. That time will be up in late January.

The response of McIntyre residents to the delay was vehement and several at the Nov. 26 meeting said they felt they were becoming "the ghetto of Canton Township." Others said they feared for their children, because of the possibility of a hepatitis outbreak.

SINCE THEN, the board has been

doing its homework. Indications are that they will report back on the matter at their first meeting in February.

Greenstein explains that there are two definite parts to the sewer problem. The first concerns what kind of sewer facility should be installed and the second is who will pay for it.

Township engineer, Glenn Roberts has presented the board with three possibilities. "We can install gravity sewers, pressurized sewers, or we can use holding tanks," explained the engineer.

The gravity sewer system said the engineer, would provide link-ups with the trunkline that runs parallel to Ford Road. As the name implies, it would work by gravity and the sewage would flow downhill from Ford to Haggerty to the county trunkline by Michigan Avenue.

The pressurized system would involve smaller pipes and would utilize a pump that would push the sewage through. This system would entail use of compactor unit. Every homeowner would have a unit in his back yard to condense the waste before it was pumped into the trunkline.

The third possibility is the installa-

tion of holding tanks. Homeowners would have tanks installed in their yards which would have to be pumped out periodically.

A final possibility would be using all three systems in combination.

According to Roberts, the gravity sewer system is less expensive in the long run, while the holding tank concept would be the most expensive.

THE PRICE of the sewer system is thought to be between \$300,000 and \$500,000, depending on what type of sewer is installed and how extensive it is.

Roberts says, "It depends on how far we go. We can 'purchase' the whole subdivision, or we can limit the sewer to what's there right now. We can fully or partially service them."

The issue of who pays for the sewers is also unresolved. Greenstein calls the problem, "a moral dilemma."

There are several possibilities for payment of the sewer, including bonding to raise the necessary money, special assessments to the affected residents, or a combination of both, with the township and the residents dividing the tab.

## Library paintings span a dozen years

CANTON—The rainbow colors of an art exhibit are brightening the stark white walls of the Plymouth Salem High School library these days.

"I walked in here one day, and all these blank walls were staring at me," said Jessie Hudson, who painted the abstract creations during the 12 years she has taught art in Plymouth.

"Most of these were stored in my basement, and I thought, 'I've got to get these up somewhere.' So I asked the librarian if she wanted an art exhibit."

MRS. HUDSON describes her paintings of bright and subdued colors, blocks, forms and shapes as "abstract landscapes."

The darkened, naked forms of trees

shoot through the orange background of one painting, while bright chunks of colors depict the buildings of a town in another.

Born and reared in Scotland, Mrs. Hudson has always reserved a spot in her life for art and painting. As a teacher with a masters degree in fine arts from Eastern Michigan University, she packs summers and weekends with competitive art shows, paint brushes and canvases, and weaving looms and yarn.

"I think it's easy to get in a rut when you settle down to any phase of life," Mrs. Hudson maintains. "I've noticed the most successful art teachers are active artists."

"I think the very fact you're produc-

ing keeps you on your toes. If you're not a producing, competing artist, you don't have your toes in today's water. This applies to all fields."

CASTING A critical eye at one of her paintings, Mrs. Hudson said: "It's not quite as abstract as I'd like it to be. I think I'm still involved in the landscape a little too much."

"If you're not tied to a specific pictorial idea, you're more free to consider the painting in its basic ingredients—color, form and placement."

"I think our viewpoint is changing. Sometimes the things you see from an airplane are beautiful abstract compositions."

Mrs. Hudson said she gathers inspiration for many of her paintings from landscapes, poems and photographs in newspapers and magazines. Many paintings are inspired from her memories of Scotland.

"I'm especially impressed with trees in the winter because you can really see the structure of the trees. The spaces between the forms are as important as the forms themselves."

Looking around the library, Mrs. Hudson said: "This is a good place for an exhibit, because you can get far enough away from the paintings to really see them."

The 25 paintings will remain on exhibit in the Salem High School library at least through February, she said. Although purpose of the exhibit is to brighten the walls and provide an art exposure to pupils, the paintings are for sale.

The library is open 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

to a maximum coverage of \$100,000 on the building and \$10,000 on contents.

Rates for commercial buildings will run 40 cents for each \$100 of coverage to a maximum \$100,000, while rates for contents will run 75 cents for each \$100 of coverage to a maximum \$100,000.

After communities apply for eligibility in the flood insurance program, HUD engineers will conduct a detailed study of the flood plain in each community and double the maximum flood insurance coverage available. Watt said.

NEIGHBORING communities that

must submit applications for the flood insurance program by the July 1 deadline include Northville and Sumpter Township.

Watt said such communities as Livonia, Redford Township, Ann Arbor and Farmington already have applied for the program and are eligible for the subsidized rates. Other neighboring communities, such as Westland, Van Buren Township and Garden City have not been identified as flood-prone communities.

"There wasn't any systematic way HUD identified these flood-prone communities," Watt admits. "In most places, it was a pretty rough determination. More communities will probably be identified in the future."

strikes,' that are in clear violation of collective bargaining contracts between parties not involved legally in this case.

"We find most regrettable any pressure teachers calculated to induce or encourage a favorable result one way or another, before this honorable court. Such tactics manifest a cynical lack of understanding of how a court functions and judges make decisions."

"We are reaping in this case the wild whirlwind of an inadequate labor law. Indeed, we hope the Governor and Legislature in considering new legislation which is so desperately needed would declare as pre-eminent

the best interests of the students and the school systems.

"The analogy to custody disputes is not inept—where we now recognize the "best interests" of the children, and not the desires and demands of the parents."

Bowles especially criticized the polarization of the community and advocated a "cooling off" presumably until legislation is passed to prevent future Crestwoods.

# Turf Tips, Quips

By DOC MINARD

It seems a bit early to talk about the thoroughbreds since the Detroit Racing Association meeting isn't scheduled to open until Feb. 21 but there's more than a little activity at the big mile track.

In the first place, more than 200 horses checked into the track in mid-December to start training for the 1975 season. Probably the real reason was that most didn't have any place else to go and it was cheaper for owners and trainers to stay at the

DRC than to ship to some southern track.

Be that as it may, there have been that many horses working out daily on the outer edge of the track and Director of Racing Tom Dorsey expects an additional 300 or more in the next two weeks.

**DORSEY BELIEVES** the 30-day early meeting will be one of the better ones presented in Michigan. He has received stall applications from Pete Maxwell, the Audley and Shirone stables and has Assistant Racing Secretary Bob Clark touring the south for additional stables.

"At this time, I believe this will be our best late winter meeting," Dorsey said. "We have received inquiries from trainers and owners in the east and south and expect to have most of the 1,700 stalls filled by the time we open."

DRA Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson is expected back from the sunny south next week at which time the track will open negotiations with the mutual clerks union.

Inasmuch as this opens the union talks, all of the track managements will be following it closely. In the past the pattern has been set by either Hazel Park or the Detroit Racing Association and the other associations fall in line.

This year's negotiations are expected to be complicated by the question of payment for Sunday work. Last spring Wilson rejected a double time demand from the union. But the DRA had a contract then for everything but Sunday racing and now everything starts from scratch.

IT WILL be interesting to see what develops once the two groups sit down and start talking money. It could be the negotiations will hit a stumbling block that may delay the Feb. 21 opening.

The thoroughbred tracks also are opening contract talks with the horse men over purse distribution and this may develop into one of the most bitter bargaining sessions in recent years.

The thoroughbred tracks have been seeking some relief from the State Legislature in the form of an additional one per cent of the mutual handle. To date no action has been taken but then the Legislature has just started and his such pressing matters as what to do about school strikes and teach-

ers unions and steps to take to balance the budget again.

So the next month or six weeks should be interesting. They could well spell the success of racing in Michigan during 1975.

**FROM THE STABLE** area at Northville Downs one hears tales that a group of concerned citizens are in the process of filing a petition with the attorney general asking for an investigation of the method of awarding horse racing dates.

'Tis a bit hard to learn the names of the leaders but from those who have been listening, it appears the movement will attempt to show that pressure may have been exerted in the awarding of the harness racing meetings.

Naturally Northville is much interested in this since Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley took away all summer dates from the 'Downs and gave back-to-back campaigns to Hazel Park and Wolverine.

There are many in the suburban city who contend the result will be a big dent in the money Northville receives from the state as its share of the mutual handle. State law provides that a city with a track within its limits shall receive 20 per cent of the state's share of the wagering up to a maximum of \$700,000.

## Martha Griffiths elected director of Consumers

Mrs. Martha W. Griffiths, former U.S. Rep. for Redford Township in the 17th District, has been elected to the board of directors of Consumers Power. She becomes the first woman elected a director of the utility.

Mrs. Griffiths was U.S. representative in the 17th, which also includes Southfield and Farmington, since 1955 until making a decision to retire this past year. She didn't seek re-election in November 1974.

**DURING HER** most recent term in Congress, she served on the Ways and Means Committee, Joint Economic Committee, and the new House Committee on the Budget.

A Democrat, her legislative interests were directed primarily toward social security, the medicare program, tax and welfare reform, and fiscal policy matters.

She sponsored the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) and diligently guided its passage through the House in the 91st Congress.

Mrs. Griffiths, an attorney, served in the Michigan Legislature from 1949-52 and in 1953 was judge and recorder of Detroit Recorder's Court.

**SHE EARNED** a BA from the University of Missouri and her law degree from the University of Michigan. She was admitted to the State Bar of Michigan in 1941.

The new director is affiliated with the Detroit and Michigan Bar Associations, National Association of Women Lawyers, and the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs.

Among her many honors are the annual award of the League of Industrial Democracy in 1971, the 1974 woman of the year by Ladies' Home Journal, and the award of the Coalition for a Democratic Majority in 1974.

# Layoffs hurt blood donations

The auto industry layoffs have had an unfortunate side effect on blood donations in the southeastern Michigan area.

Gary Jergens, who along with Dawn Rice is a Red Cross blood recruiter, working out of the Northwest Regional Office in Livonia says the layoffs have seriously affected the blood supply.

**THE RECRUITERS** are well aware that blood donations traditionally drop during holiday periods.

Consequently to meet their goal of 100,000 pints annually for the southeastern five-county area, they schedule blood drives from industries such as Ford Stamping during the Christmas and Easter holidays to pick up the slack.

"Most blood, particularly during holiday seasons," Jergens says, "come from the auto companies. The auto industries contribute about 50 per cent of our yearly supply."

With this heavy resource gone because of shutdowns, Jergens and his fellow recruiters have had to generate new sources of blood supply.

"Donors forget," Jergens adds, "the need is constant."

**TO MEET** the shortage, Jergens has been contacting local church and civic groups.

He and Miss Rice have also been recruiting through the high schools. The recruiters have been out to Bently, Franklin in Livonia and most of the other high schools in the area to contact the 18 year olds. Eighteen is the minimum age for donors.

"The 18-year-olds are some of our best donors. They keep appointments

and tend to be more regular than other age groups."

The "Save A Life" blood campaign initiated by the Red Cross and held Sunday, Dec. 29, helped focus on the need.

As a result of the publicity on the effort, the donations at the Northwest center jumped from 40 pints during the first week of December to 131 pints for the week beginning Dec. 23 and this was a four day week. On Dec. 29, the day's total was 243.

Jergens says things are dropping off now, but adds, "We are a little bit past the crunch of the holiday shortage."

# Esch's intern looks forward to winning his own election

If U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) is hearing footsteps these days, it may have something to do with the hiring of his newest legislative intern.

Robert Gary Ridner, who begins working for Esch this week, unabashedly admits that some day he'd like Esch's job.

"Believe it or not I'd like Esch's job," Ridner said. "He'll probably get mad at me for saying that but some day I hope to hold an elective office. I'm not shooting for the presidency but I would like to be a member of a legislature—state, local or hopefully national."

AS AN INTERN Ridner will be spending the spring semester answering constituent letters, looking into federal agencies for answers to consumer requests, helping to prepare Esch's annual questionnaire and doing legislative research on bills pending in the House.

Ridner of 17204 Carol, Livonia, is a 20-year-old junior majoring in political science at the University of Kentucky where he is attending school on a four year Army ROTC scholarship.

"At the university there is an office of experimental education which directs students toward intern programs, and that's where I learned about the job with Esch.

"I had been told that most of Esch's interns were from the University of Michigan and most served in the summer so I thought I might have a shot at a job in the spring.

"I'm a Republican county delegate so I've had some contact with Esch and would have campaigned for him this past summer if I hadn't been attending school."

Although Ridner is "ecstatic" about his appointment he has had to deal with slurs connected with politics.

"When people find out I'm interested in politics the first thing they ask me is if I'm a crook," he said.

"I don't think politics is a dirty busi-

ness. People I have met who hold offices have been straightforward and seem to be doing the best job they can under the circumstances."

RIDNER, who labels himself as "a conservative on most issues," calls the Watergate debacle "an unfortunate blow-up of normal happenings."

"Both parties engage in spying and whether it is intentional or not is another matter," he said.

"For instance, a person who becomes disillusioned with his own party can jump ranks and feed the opposing party a lot of information it never sought.

"The press became involved in Watergate and reported for the first time what has always been going on in political campaigns."

Ridner said even his parents who are not politically active would like to discourage him from entering politics.

"I guess I'm a bit of an egomaniac. The concept of power intrigues me and the way I see it, there are three avenues to power—politics, the military and business."

"Politics is the one I like best be-

cause it is a means of controlling the other two. And money flows to power so I think of politics as a means of making a pretty good living."

RIDNER SEES his internship as a learning experience for him.

"Hopefully just meeting the people I'll be in contact with will be an education in itself. I'll also be learning how laws are made, and how lobbyists and interests groups function. This experience may be what encourages me or discourages me from entering politics."

Besides the duties assigned to him by Esch, Ridner has set up his own goals. They include studying the roles of a legislative staff, looking into current legislative topics, and the functions of Congress in dealing with federal agencies.

While Ridner will not be paid a salary for the work he's doing for Esch, he will receive 12 hours of university credit and will be responsible for a reading list and writing a paper at the end of his internship.

Because he is involved in an ROTC program he will also be required to take a military science course at Georgetown University. An officer of Tau Kappa Epsilon at Kentucky, he will be staying with his fraternity brothers at George Washington University.

Ridner believes the biggest change he'll have to make is his style of dress.

"When you're used to wearing Levis every day to class, it's quite a change and a costly one to have to wear a suit every day."

# Bud Guest returns with 'sunny side'

LIVONIA—Edgar A. (Bud) Guest Jr., a household name among radio listeners for 36 years, brought his popular "Sunny Side of the Street" talents to Livonia last week.

Guest, whose failing vision forced him into "semi-retirement" two years ago, unveiled his favorite stories for 100 members and guests at the Livonia Chamber of Commerce monthly membership luncheon.

The listeners at times threw their heads back and laughed or chuckled at the tales spun by Guest.

GUEST, 62, touched on his definition of semi-retirement, problems with attorneys and title searches during a property sale, and how he gained four endings from listeners for the same tale.

Guest admitted that he was once puzzled by a question from a junior high school student who visited WJR and interviewed him for a class assignment.

Guest thought he had heard most questions, such as where he was born and how long he has been with the station, until one youngster wanted to know, "What is your ambition?" He said he was stumped, since his first impulse was to reply that he merely wanted to get to and from the station safely and keep his job.

He then recalled a poem written by his famous father, whose work was syndicated through 400 newspapers, emphasizing that his goal was "service to fellow man."

GUEST TOLD the chamber of the problem he encountered after he bought an 80 acre farm in Michigan's Thumb area.

"I hope this complies with your request," the attorney's report closed.

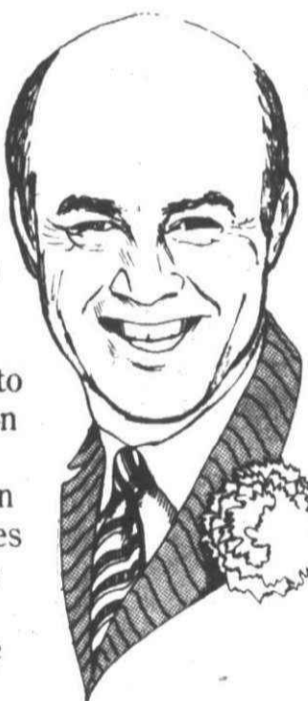

# Better bargaining needed

It's a shame that Wayne County Circuit Court had to settle a problem between the Crestwood Board of Education and the teachers union.

It's a shame every time a school contract negotiation problem lands in any court. Economic problems should be settled in an economic arena, and a court is just the wrong place to deal with economics.

The legal profession couldn't be more wrong when it insists "ours is a government of laws, not a government of men." We're in constant messes in our local school districts—indeed, we almost had half of Wayne County teachers on strike last week—for precisely the opposite reason: We lean too much on law and courts and too little on good-faith, competent economic bargaining.

**THE CURRENT** popular cry is that the Legislature must repair the school bargaining law which inconsistently allows teachers to bargain through a union but vaguely prohibits strikes.

Judge George Bowles, speaking for himself and Judge Thomas Roumell in last week's Crestwood case, wrote, "We are reaping in this case the wild whirlwind of an inadequate labor law. Indeed, we hope that the governor and the Legislature in considering new legislation which is so desperately needed would declare as pre-eminent the best interests of the students and the school systems."

Well, yes, the law can be improved, but law and lawyers alone will never improve our school labor relations.

As my richly experienced colleague, R.T. Thompson, pointed out editorially last Thursday, the bitterness caused by a strike can persist for at least 40 years, disrupting church congregations, social ties, families and civic programs.

No law can prevent that. Law is only as good as the characters of the men and women who live under it.

**CRESTWOOD STANDS** in excelsis as the example of bad board-union relations because it has had something like seven major disputes in nine years and nearly caused thousands of teachers in other districts to "hit the bricks."

But Crestwood is not the only bad example. Plymouth has had a couple of strikes. Garden City, noted for its harmonious school system for years until 1974, will be unable to offer a 180-classroom day school year because of its bitter strike. Livonia, Wayne-Westland, South Redford—all have had problems.

### Tim Richard writes

When problems occur, teachers go on strike, and so the public jumps to the false conclusion that the teachers union is to blame. Actually, it takes two sides to make a labor contract, and there are usually two sides at fault to some degree when a strike occurs.

As Judges Bowles and Roumell said, "The majority (of the three-judge panel) concurs in Judge Rashid's holding that both parties are in open and flagrant defiance and violation of his honor's orders."

**ON THE SURFACE**, it appears the union won the Crestwood case because the court ruled the school board improperly fired the 184 teachers. But teachers should refrain from celebrating too quickly.

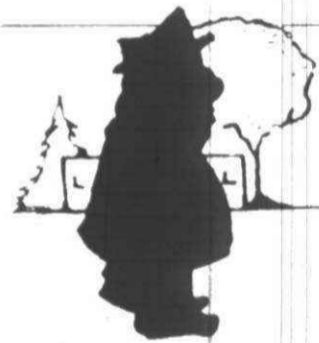
The court also "deplores resorting to any unlawful strikes, termed 'sympathy strikes,' that are in clear violation of collective bargaining contracts between parties not involved legally in this case. We find most regrettable any pressure teachers calculated to induce or encourage a favorable result one way or another, before this honorable court. Such tactics manifest a cynical lack of understanding of how a court functions and judges make decisions."

In other words, if teachers in Plymouth, the two Redfords, Garden City, Wayne-Westland and 11 other districts had also struck, they are served clear notice that they will be in big trouble.

The Crestwood union won on a legal technicality having to do with the tenure law. But the union would have been defeated and broken if any other industry had been involved. The economic fact of life is that hundreds of certified teachers are looking for work, and many will risk being branded "scab" in order to put bread on the table.

Teachers were in an enviable bargaining position while the education industry was growing and labor was in short supply. It's not true any longer, and union leaders will have to give their memberships that fact of life.

More than new laws, we need economic sophistication and mature wisdom on the parts of both school boards and teachers unions. Laws are less important than people.



## The Stroller Dressing sack feud

If the pros and cons of the Crestwood teachers' strike had had you in a dither, would you believe there once was a battle between a board of education and a teacher over her mode of dress that lasted for years—and the teacher won?

It happened in the Pennsylvania Dutch country where Sally McIntyre, a robust, gray-haired woman had been teaching in the intermediate grades for so many years that she became an institution.

**SHE TAUGHT** at least three generations in our little town and The Stroller well recalls the day he entered her classroom for the first time. She placed her hand on his shoulder and said, "If you do as well as your father did, you'll be all right."

She was a maiden lady who lived with a bachelor brother and her word was law. She never spoke of such things as women's lib or women's rights but in any given assignment she could more than hold her own. She proved it over the years to win the right to dress as she pleased. And she was quite a teacher.

**HER ONLY** fault—if it could be called a fault—was that she insisted on wearing a skirt and blouse instead of dresses other teachers wore.

There's nothing wrong with a blouse, or a "dressing sack" as they were called. She wasn't built to wear loose blouses. She was on the obese side and, despite the fact that she was well endowed by nature, she refused to wear foundation garments.

More than once, this was called to

the attention of the board of education, and while members frowned on her apparel, none had the courage to tell her.

It may seem strange that despite her lone fault, parents used to petition the board to have their children in her classes. More than once, disappointed mothers and dads stormed the board room to have their wishes granted.

It was the feeling about town that no one was properly educated unless you were in Sally McIntyre's classes. And woe be to anyone, parent or child, who referred to her as "Miss McIntyre."

**ON THE** first day of school each year, she would address the students. In reciting the rules of her room, she would ask that she be addressed "Teacher" and nothing else.

A stern taskmaster, she had a human side, too. She was the first teacher in our town that inaugurated an athletic program. She purchased tee shirts for the boys and blouses for the girls basketball team. What's more, she would sit on the players' bench and be the manager.

Come country fair time, she would take the class. She'd pay the streetcar fare, admission into the grounds, and entertain the pupils with refreshments along the midway. She was enjoying it even more than her students.

She literally was queen of all she surveyed and ruled with an iron hand. Yet along the way she left an imprint on the minds of her students and it was not uncommon to see groups of her "alumni" come from all sections

of the country to visit her during the summer.

**SHE WAS** the most highly respected teacher our town ever had. Then one year a member of the younger generation was elected to the school board. The first thing he did was to protest the wearing apparel "of one of our teachers." The older board members just smiled.

They retorted, "If you don't like the way she dresses, why don't you just tell her."

"I will," he said. But he never got the chance. Hearing what had happened at the board meeting, "Teacher" waited her chance. It came one evening as the young man was strolling along her street and she spotted him.

Without waiting for his first word of protest "Teacher" let fly a verbal barrage the like of which a person seldom would hear.

She politely informed him she was being paid to teach school—not serve as a model for a dress shop.

**SHE DUG** even deeper when she told him that his job was to guide the policy of an educational program and never mind about her apparel—that she was going to wear what she wanted when she wanted.

So great was the barrage that the neophyte school board member apologized and never another word was said about her "dressing sack."

The Stroller wasn't home when she died, but she fought her fight to the end. She was buried in a "dressing sack."

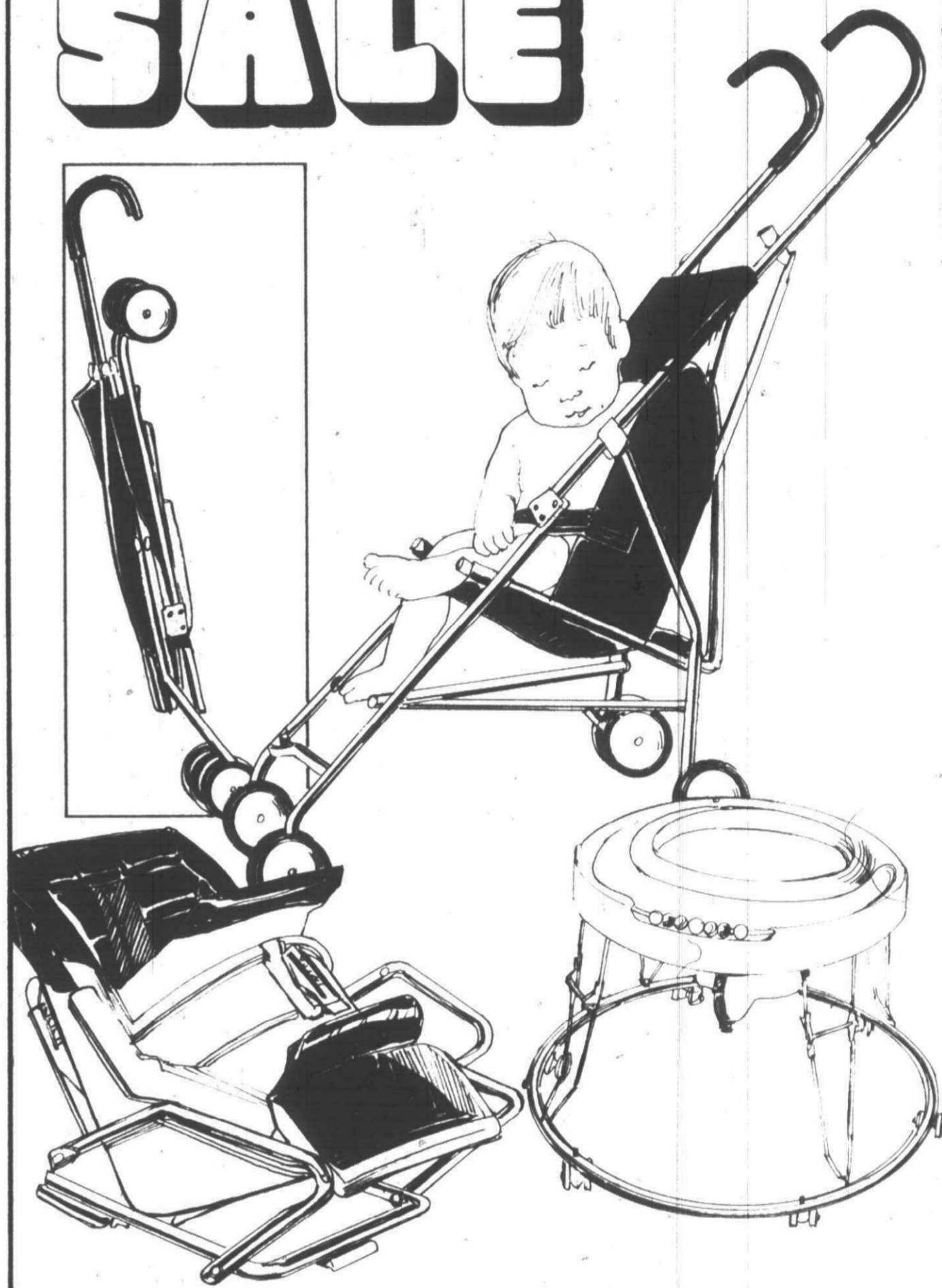

SOME MEMBER libraries of the Wayne County Federated Library System will be closed on Wednesday.

If staffed by employees of Wayne County civil service, and if approval to close was given by the city in which they are located, these libraries will observe the holiday on Jan. 15.

Redford Township Library and the

Garden City Library will close Wednesday.

No city halls in the area will be closed. While the Rev. Charles Adams, chairman of the Dr. King Holiday Steering Committee, and State Rep. Jackie Vaughn III are working to have the day declared a state holiday, no state offices will be closed.

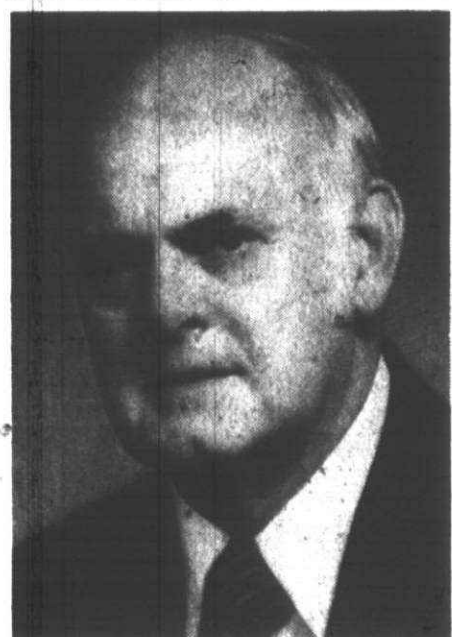

# Recall campaign had 'grass roots' support

On June 20, 1949, the Circuit Court denied Police Chief Lee Sackett a further stay of his ouster. On June 22, Captain Carl Greeney was named acting chief of police. Sackett appealed to the State Supreme Court which refused his petition.

Meantime, the Plymouth Citizens' League continued to hold meetings intended to support Sackett and to oust City Manager Harold Cheek. The league finally decided that the only way to remove Cheek from office was to remove the commissioners who stood behind him.

A mass meeting was called to plan the recall of the four commissioners who were charged with being "high handed and undemocratic in refusing Sackett a chance to defend himself at a hearing and in refusing to hear charges against Cheek." (City Attorney Claude Buzzard had advised the commission that the charges against Cheek were too generalized to give the petition legal standing).

THE HIGHLY emotional atmosphere of the time, which apparently resulted in name-calling, was reflected in a statement by Kenneth Gust to the Plymouth Mail on June 23.

Referring to the composition of the Citizen's League, he said, "Our membership comes from all parts of the community and includes all factions and political opinions. The heart of the group is composed of ordinary working citizens who resent being called 'riff-raff' and 'non-thinkers.'"

Gust said the executive board of the league included Charles Bennett, Edward C. Hough, Cass Hough (all of Daisy), Edna M. Allen, Margaret Dunning, Tom Brock, Gladys Tillotson, and others.

A week later, the commissioners retorted that some prominent people whose names were on Gust's list told them they were surprised to see their names there. They did not, however, say who the people were.

On June 24, the Detroit News reported that circulation of recall petitions had been started in Plymouth. Four of the five commissioners were charged with "deliberate nonfeasance of office, misrepresentation of facts, and holding secret meetings." (The nonfeasance charge referred to the commission's practice of permitting the city manager to open contract bids without the commissioners being present. Lewis Goddard, one of the com-

a part in the movement to oust her colleagues. The other commissioners pointed out, however, that Tom Brock, a young veteran, and one of the leaders of the Citizen's League, was a constant visitor at the Whipple home.

Brock directed the door-to-door campaign for the league, and apparently with great efficiency. He organized a "grass roots" movement with block captains, doorbell ringers, baby sitters, and advice on absentee ballots. The league used a sound truck on the streets on the day of the election.

BUSINESS MEN who supported the four commissioners paid for full-page ads in the Plymouth Mail urging the citizens to retain their elected officials. Phil Barney, who owned a local restaurant, wrote to the "Mail" supporting the commissioners as honest, capable and conscientious public officials.

Judge Nandino Perlongo also favored retention of the commissioners and of the city manager. The alternative, he told the paper, was that "in the future, no city manager will be in position to proceed with city affairs without feeling the intimidating influence of some misinformed citizen."

# New law can present taxing problems

How do you know which food items you buy will carry a sales tax under Michigan's new law?

It depends, says the state department of the treasury, on who's going to eat it. And when.

Exempt from the sales and use tax, says the statute that went into effect Jan. 1, are "prescription drugs for human use and food for human consumption except prepared food intended for immediate consumption as defined by law."

That means, said a spokesman in the treasury department office in Lansing, that the to-tax-or-not-to-tax consideration is not just the nature of the edible but also when it is to be consumed and by whom.

SEEMS SIMPLE enough as the supermarket cashiers click off the tax-exempt groceries—bread, eggs, canned goods—and hit the tax key on their sophisticated cash registers when they ring up items like paper napkins and detergent.

And it's also pretty self-evident that a restaurant meal involves "prepared food intended for immediate consumption" and thus gets the tax.

But there are some sticky areas, aside from those of the candied-apple variety.

FOR INSTANCE, there is the local dog owner who insisted he shouldn't be stung for a tax on dog food because he and his pet shared alike.

He made it past one cashier without paying the tax, but he probably won't win the argument next time. Guidelines on taxing, mailed out by the treasury department late in December, clearly lists pet food and supplies under taxable items.

"Dog food is taxed even if you're going to eat it yourself," the spokesman said.

THE "IMMEDIATE consumption" stipulation provided the key to whether the sales tax is added to such an item as a bag of potato chips.

Buy it in a supermarket, along with a bunch of other groceries, and you don't pay a tax. It's a grocery item produced for home consumption.

But go to a movie theater and buy the same chips to chomp while you enjoy the show and you do pay the tax. Then the chips come under the definition of "food or drink prepared and served for immediate consumption at or near the premises or ordinarily sold on a takeout basis for immediate consumption either on or off the premises."

Sanders ice cream stores in this area are among those that have had to make some fine distinctions.

"An ice cream cone," said a Sanders employee, "gets a sales tax if it is dipped at the fountain."

But if you buy one of the packaged cones from the store's freezer section, there's no tax. (Presumably, though, the consumption would have to be just as immediate, considering the drippy nature of ice cream.)

AT THE SUPERMARKET, the edible items still taxable are alcoholic beverages, cocktail mixes, non-prescription drugs, including cough drops and antacid mints, and hot prepared foods such as barbecued chicken and ribs.

The latter qualify under the section that provides taxing "food which is cooked and maintained at a temperature higher than the surrounding air temperature prior to sale."

In listing the taxable edibles, the treasury department spokesman suggested a tax also might be put on a prepared, wrapped sandwich picked

up at the meat counter of a supermarket, or even the snacks kids purchase at a drug store on the way home from school.

It's up to the store to make the decision, the spokesman added.

But a random survey in this area indicated the youngsters won't have to cough up the extra penny for snack tax.

No store checked is considering taxing such purchases.

ALTHOUGH THE GUIDELINES specify that prepared food (taxable) may be defined as "food of drink arranged on a plate or platter," this does not apply to frozen dinners. "Not for immediate consumption—most people like to heat them first," was the explanation.

And packages of seeds, though they may turn into edible vegetables, are considered non-edible at the checkout stand.

One item you DON'T eat carries no tax. That's the returnable bottle that holds your soda pop. But the returnable bottle that contains beer—if you can find one—is subject to tax.

WHEN GROCERY shopping in this area, some customers are finding that

purchases go through with tax added or not added automatically, while others are asked to separate non-taxable items from the taxable as they take them from the cart. The difference is not in store policy but in cash register age.

The newer ones have a special key that records tax item by item and the older ones do not.

As a handy guide, the treasury department has listed the following supermarket items that still carry a tax:

Alcoholic beverages, cocktail mixes, liquid and dry, household supplies, hot prepared foods, health and beauty aids, ice, paper products, pet foods and supplies.

Others are prepared foods, soap and soap products, toothpaste, water (mineral and distilled), tobacco and non-prescription medicines.

Those interested in a copy of the tax guidelines may obtain it from the Sales and Use Tax Division, Department of the Treasury, Lansing, Mich., 48922.

## Sand scenes fill these terrariums

A western sun sets in a blaze of orange and yellow beyond dark mountains. A sailboat glides peacefully on a blue lake. Graceful birds wing across the skies.

You find these pictures, not on framed canvas, but on the inside of glass bowls planted with cactus. The medium is not oil, acrylic or water color but colored sand.

This newest of art forms, not surprisingly called sand painting, is a do-it-yourself project Monday and Friday evenings in The Potting Shed, part of the Westland Garden Center at 32593 Cherry Hill.

There, people who want something unusual in a terrarium are invited to come in and make their own under the guidance of Dick and Joan Melow, proprietors, and Lanny Chamberlain, also well schooled in the new art.

Workshops begin at 7 p.m. and are limited to six or eight persons—"so we can give enough personal attention," said Melow.

CLASS MEMBERS buy the container, \$10 for a 10-inch round bowl or \$12 for a snifter. The colored sand, potting soil and charcoal are furnished, along with instruction in the techniques that these experts insist are really very simple.

After the sand scene is "painted" around a base of soil for planting, the customers can buy a selection of cactus plants to top their terrariums.

"Then we finish them up with the planting," Melow said.

SAND PAINTING, Chamberlain explained, is an adaptation of an art first used by the Navaho Indians in the southwest.

"It was an art practiced only by the priests and leaders of the tribes," he said. "Not an everyday thing with

those people. It would be done to drive away evil spirits or cure an illness or petition for good fortune."

The first dyes for the sands came from natural sources, berry juices and minerals and cacti.

In more recent Navajo history, the art form has been used by other members of the tribes for decorative purposes, and then in the last year it was introduced to floral arrangers through workshops using a new product, terrarium.

DICK MELOW did a run-through of the making of a sand-painting terrarium. It took him less than an hour, and his only tools were a bent iced tea spoon, small paint brush and knitting needles in sizes 1 to 5. The colored sands are held in paper cups.

"You start with a layer of sand," he said, "pouring in some in a neutral beige shade, and then begin the build-up of potting soil for the plants to live in."

Melow put potting soil atop the first layer of silicone sand, and then put in some charcoal "to keep the soil from going sour."

THE SAND PICTURES are made by pouring the sand in carefully in different colored layers: the beige and a dark brown in layers suggested a desert terrain. Then came mounds of terra cotta sand for foothills and black sand for distant mountains, and finally a mixture of yellow and orange sand—not too well mixed because streaking is desirable—for the sunset sky.

Birds were added to the scene by putting in a tiny amount of black sand and then poking a depression in the center of the line with a knitting needle. An orange sun started as a mound atop a hill, and was rounded off by pushing in the yellow sky color, again with the trusty needle.

Sailboats and grass also can be made with the needle manipulated carefully, Melow said.

THE COLORED SAND is built up at the edge of the container, with a core of potting soil filling most of the space.

"It's very important to keep the soil well tamped down," Melow said, "using his iced tea spoon for the purpose. 'That locks the sand in place.'"

Made properly, the finished terrarium can be moved without any problem, Melow said, but of course it shouldn't be tipped.

The final step is putting in the cacti and maybe a couple of pieces of drift-

wood or stones and then covering with a layer of the base color of sand.

"We recommend the cactus," Melow said, "because it's hardy and needs little care and comes in so many varieties. Two or three tablespoons of water a month is enough for these plants. The sand, incidentally, is colorfast so watering won't make the colors run."

Besides the picture scenes, the terrariums can be done with geometric designs.

These are harder, Melow said, and the secret is to stick to no more than three basic colors.

MELOW SAID HE BEGAN the

workshops about six weeks ago and has had people come from all over the metropolitan area.

"We made 35 or 40 to sell for the holidays, and we were cleaned out before Christmas Eve," he added. "I'd really rather have people come and make their own. It's not that difficult, and everyone seems to really enjoy it."

Melow admitted the sense of perspective he uses in his landscaping business and when he occasionally paints for pleasure probably stands him in good stead in sand painting. "But people seem to pick this up very quickly," he added. "One woman made about 20 to give for Christmas

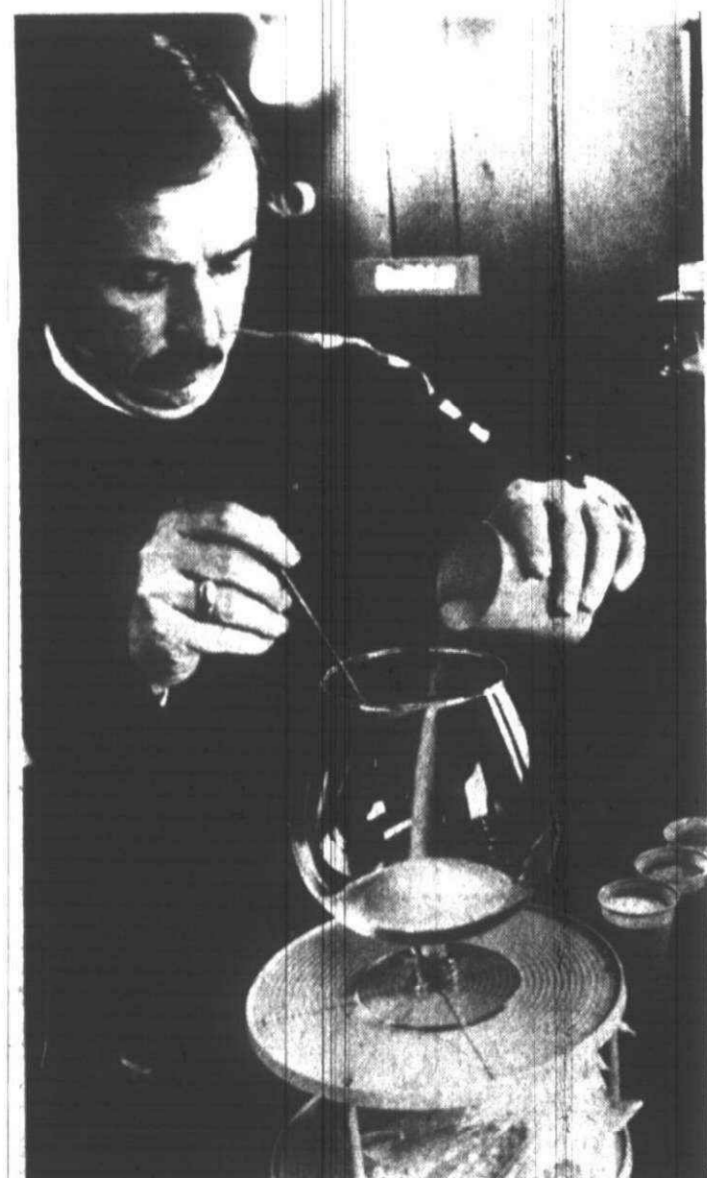
after attending a workshop."

THE MELOWS have had their landscape business in Westland for several years and added the plant department within the last year.

They plan other workshops, Melow said, with some on dish gardens to be scheduled soon. These would use small plants to make a scene effect.

"I look for the indoor plant business to boom as more people become interested in ecology and want to continue this interest year-round," he said.

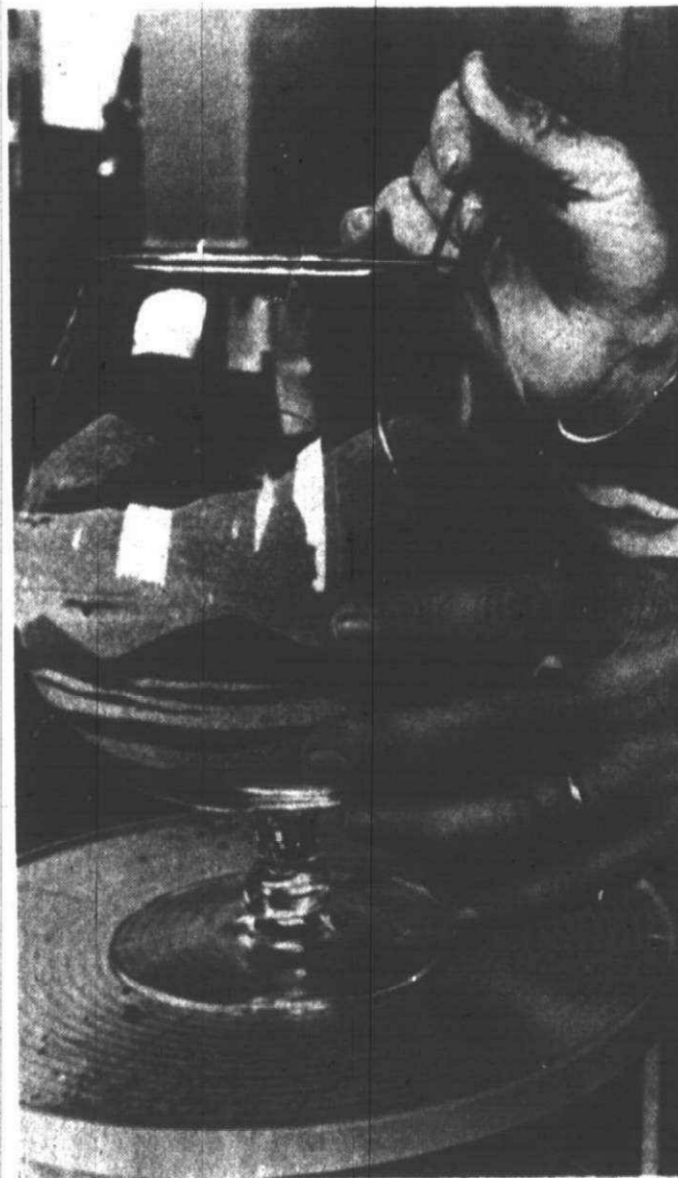
"Our new customers recently have been young householders, and there have been a lot of children putting Christmas money into unusual plants to enjoy."

## Gourmets' resort rates 'Magnifique'

VAL-DAVID, QUEBEC—One word describes Hotel La Sapiniere.

Magnifique is this resort - gourmet center, 60 miles north of Montreal in Canada's Laurentian Mountains.

During a ski week in the Laurentians at Gray Rocks Inn in St. Jovite in the Mont-Tremblant area, an evening at La Sapiniere can't be overlooked.

"Unashamed luxury" is the keynote of La Sapiniere, one of 16 resorts in the Laurentians.

The Quebec Ministry of Tourism has given it five fleur-de-lys in the official Hotel Guide (only two other re-

sort hotels in the province have this rating).

La SAPINIERE also has received the highest possible rating of three forks to show the excellence of its food. And to complement the "three forks" it has a wine cellar unmatched in Canada with more than 200 selections, most of which are not available elsewhere.

But for this sports writer in the Laurentians on a ski junket, one fork and one bottle of wine proved to be enough to handle.

Jacques Brule, master of reservations and conventions for La Sapiniere, first greeted me.

Chef Marcel Kretz quickly appeared with a tray of herring, shrimp, and Tartare, Camembert and Gerardmer cheeses.

La Sapiniere is "home" for the Montreal Canadians during hockey playoff time, and Brule quickly added, "When the Canadians make the playoffs that is."

AFTER A tour of the hotel which accommodates 120 guests, it was into the dining hall and an introduction to Maitre Christian Simon.

From an appetizer card that also included burgundy snails, malpeque oysters, melon leek vinaigrette, herring fillet, smoked salmon and oxtongue

salad I chose chicken liver pate en croûte with truffles.

Next came a selection of French onion soup over consommé aux pates, oyster soup, chilled vichyssoise and vegetable juice.

The wine manager, attired in a colorful costume complete with tasting apparatus, entered the scene, and after glancing through a 24-page wine list, the selection was Mouton Cadet.

Next came the main dish. My choice was roast prime rib of Canadian beef au jus with fresh horseradish. The 12 other mouthwatering picks were broiled or boiled live lobster in drawn butter, cheese omelet, scampis provençale au gratin on rice, fillet of fresh dore amandine, fresh salmon trout meuniere, grilled beef fillet brochette with natural brown Arkansas rice, also grilled Canadian lamb chops, chicken in red burgundy wine, veal cutlet saute cordon bleu, calf's

sweetbreads saute grenobloise, cold half lobster mayonnaise garnished, and cold roast beef.

Then there was the pick of rissole or boiled potatoes, buttered fresh green beans, ratatouille a la nicoise and chickory vinaigrette.

THE DESERT LIST consisted of everything from a cheese tray to French pastries to stewed rhubarb.

And to cap off the meal there was a lime blossom-mint infusion to drink.

The cost of the meal - \$11.90. A different menu is prepared every day and you may select from the varied list depending on your taste.

The resort which has tabbed itself as somewhat of a "honeymoon hotel" charges \$26 to \$48 for single and \$20 to \$36 for double rooms a day.

The resort does not offer a ski week but does sport cross country skiing and plans for nearby ski centers.

PERHAPS THE most intriguing item at La Sapiniere is the wine cellar, which I was able to tour following the dinner. Below the dining hall there is a cave like setting of little round tables with small kegs as chairs.

This is where guests may sample wine and cheese.

Off the cave lounge is the wine cellar where more than 16,000 bottles of wine are kept at a temperature between 55 and 57 degrees.

The wine prices vary from \$4 a bottle for Canadian Jordan Valley wine to \$200 for Romanee Conti. There are more than 200 selections of wine, 50 per cent of those from France, 20 per cent from Spain and the remaining 30 per cent from Germany, Italy, Canada and Portugal.

The hotel is impressive, the wine cellar admirable, and the food sumptuous.

# Tradition perpetuates pleasant memories

What would our lives be without tradition? What terrible fatigue would overwhelm humanity if it only had to concern itself with the future?

Tradition represents a momentary pause in our course of toil - repose and the backward glance toward the past - the comparison of today and yesterday. Tradition brings back to life those whom we have loved, those to whom we owe the present and the future.

What, after all, is a museum? It is just an exhibition of monuments of the past. In every age civilized men collected mementos of the past so that living and future generations could draw from them inspiration founded on a solid basis.

Daily life is a struggle. Tradition is peace of mind. And that is why we continually create new traditions by instinct if not through feeling. All artistic manifestations are somehow based on tradition.

TRADITION PERPETUATES the moralistic religions. Tradition elevates everything it touches. Tradition even directs the art of eating. Each country has its own culinary tradition even if it only consists in the arrangement of meals.

An English breakfast is quite different from the French cafe au lait. Why? It's not due to climate because the English breakfast will follow an Englishman to Bangkok.

It is tradition which makes the French eat crepes on Shrove Tuesday. It was tradition which, for centuries, obliged Russians of all levels of society to exchange hard-boiled eggs at Easter as we do here in America.

By following traditions we commemorate those who have transmitted them. We bring back to life those who are no longer with us and we perform a good deed, since the dead are not altogether dead as long as there are those amongst the living who evoke their memory.

THESE ARE the famous words of author Dr. Edouard de Pomiane, renowned for the book "Cooking in 10 Minutes" and his scientific knowledge of food, however charmingly carefree his approach to cooking may be.

To prepare a dinner for a friend is to put into the cooking all one's affec-

tion and good will, all one's gaiety and zest so that after a lapse of cooking time, a waft of happiness escapes from beneath the lid.  
Dover sole saute bouquetiere is just what the doctor ordered.

**DOVER SOLE SAUTE BOUQUETIERE**  
Recipe for Four Covers (Persons)

4 frozen dover sole size 16/20  
Have on hand some seasoned salt, flour and oil, margarine or butter for cooking the sole

For the Sauce:  
2 tbs. butter  
2 tbs. flour  
2 cups cream, powdered may be used (scald)  
White pepper  
1/2 cup dry white wine  
A pinch of nutmeg  
And some salt (kosher)

Suggested Vegetables for the Bouquetiere:

Canned jumbo white asparagus  
Canned Belgium carrots  
Canned artichoke hearts  
Baked tomatoes stuffed  
Petits Pois (small green peas), frozen  
Three large silver dollar mushrooms (fresh)  
Fresh seedless green grapes warmed slightly in butter and a few drops water  
3 oz. imported Danish prawns or Eureka Bay shrimp from California.

Method  
To make a cream sauce the consistency of liquid velvet is simple if you scald your milk first (do not boil, it will curdle), melt the butter and add the flour. Stir and cook the now roux over a low heat momentarily.

Whip the roux with a wire whisk (fine) into the milk until it thickens. Add salt, white pepper (black will show up in the sauce), nutmeg, then slowly add the wine that has been heated with the small shrimp and mushrooms.

If the shrimp are frozen, defrost them first, then add them to the mushrooms that are sauting in a little butter. This will create an emulsion of flavor with the wine, shrimp and earthy mushrooms.

I would add about 2 tbs. of butter for a velvety texture. However, so many people have hangups with cholesterol that I just leave it to your better judgment. Even an egg yolk and some whipping would be super. Set this mixture aside or store, however, until ready.

Method for Buying, Preparing, Cooking and Serving Dover Sole

Sole comes in different sizes. The most popular sizes are 16/20 and 20/24. The numbers refer to ounces per sole with the head on. If possible, have the poissoniere (fish butcher) skin and remove the head and the fine bones alongside the fish.

Cooking  
In a thin black pan or copper fish pan heat vegetable oil enough to cover the pan with a dollop of butter on medium high heat.

Season the sole with seasoned salt on both sides. Then dust lightly in a mixture of flour and whole wheat bread crumbs if available. Gently set in the hot oil with the splash away from you.

Turn when golden brown and set in a 375-degree oven for about six to nine minutes.

Set on your favorite flat serving dish (it should be heatproof). With a flat instrument like a cake spatula, separate the pieces by starting in the center, gently pushing the fish away from you. Pick up the bone at the widest point. It should come off very simply. Your spatula will loosen any particles that stick.

Now you have four filets, two at the bottom together and the top two separated. Spoon the shrimp ragout, or

sauce if you like, into the center of the fish. Close it by just putting the two top pieces back together.

Heat the vegetables that you choose for your bouquetiere. Remember, however, to season them. The mixture for the sole (seasoned salt) will do nicely. Drain and toss with butter or margarine. For two interesting effects, use

vegetables of the following color:

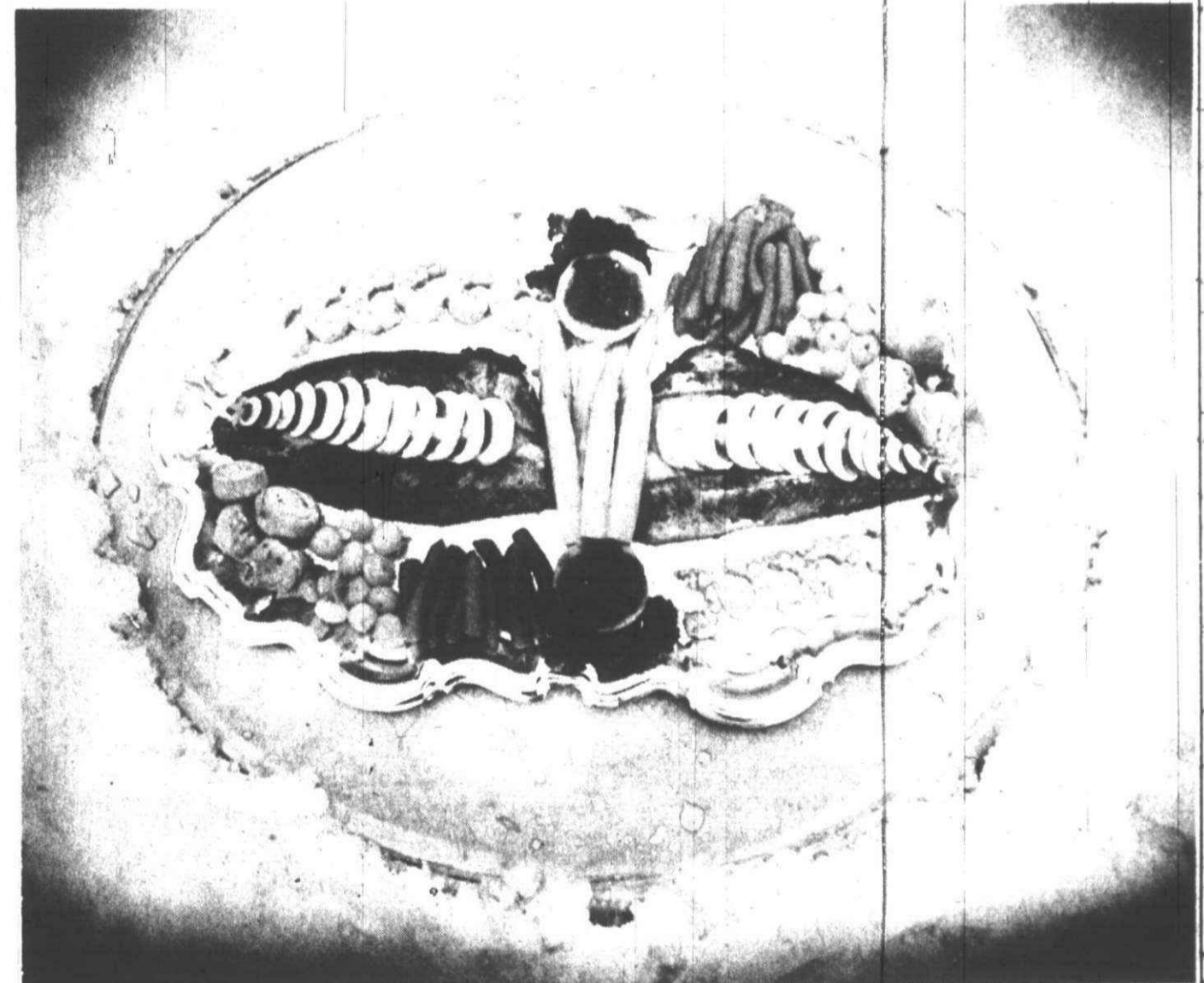
1. Vert Pret: All shades and tones of green and white

2. Orange, red, brown, yellow, white and green in that order, or similar.

NOTE, a tomato may be stuffed with left over shrimp pudding and a

slice of Swiss cheese. After the bouquetiere is assembled, set in the oven to reheat. Then serve and that's another story.

Any dry white wine would be honored to be served with this dish. Recommended: Riesling Napa Valley '73 California, Johannisberger Klaus Riesling Rhein '72.

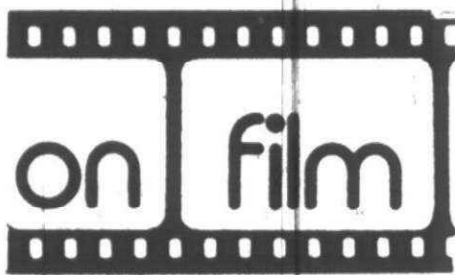

## Getting Around

Wine tasting with Les Amis du Vin (Friends of Wine) is serious business.

At a recent monthly wine-tasting at Glen Oak Golf and Country Club in Farmington Hills, members of the society were grouped at small tables, six wine glasses lined up vertically and portentously in front of each place.

After an aperitif, the program began with a surprisingly easy-going talk by guest speaker Bern C. Ramey, author of the "Pocket Dictionary of Wines."

For the tasting—French wines that evening—a card listed each wine, the region it was from, and a place for comments.

YOU'RE JUST supposed to sip, leave a lot or at least a little in each glass, so you can continue to compare tastes throughout the evening.

Bread and cheese provided counterbalance. An educational society, Les Amis du Vin stresses learning about wines and the mood was earnest, rather than one of joie de vivre.

My scribbled comments, which I wanted to keep hidden from everybody else—what if I said the wrong thing?—ranged from "not memorable" to "gutsy—good."

DON'T KNOW if these are the things you're supposed to say about wine. Connoisseurs seem to have a language of their own. But aren't we all a little intimidated if we don't really know our palates and how to talk about them?

Each gentleman at the table served in turn as sommelier, requiring a certain amount of talent in apportioning the bottle, since he was requested to serve himself last.

There was a "no smoking" rule so you wouldn't disturb your neighbor. We were asked to swirl the wine in the glass, to stir the molecules, heightening the fragrance which is a percentage of taste. Then, to put your nose in the glass and smell.

Wines sampled included a 1973 Cabernet D'Anjou and a Margaux, St. Esteph, Chateau Cantegrive and Chateau Latour Blanc, all 1970.

TASTERS AND drinkers don't necessarily go together. Most of the people at my table didn't try to down all the wine from each glass.

At the end of the session, tasters' glass still held lots of the red or white.

INTERVIEWING CHEFS and gourmet cooks for The Good Life, I've discovered one thing: These have got to be the friendliest people around.

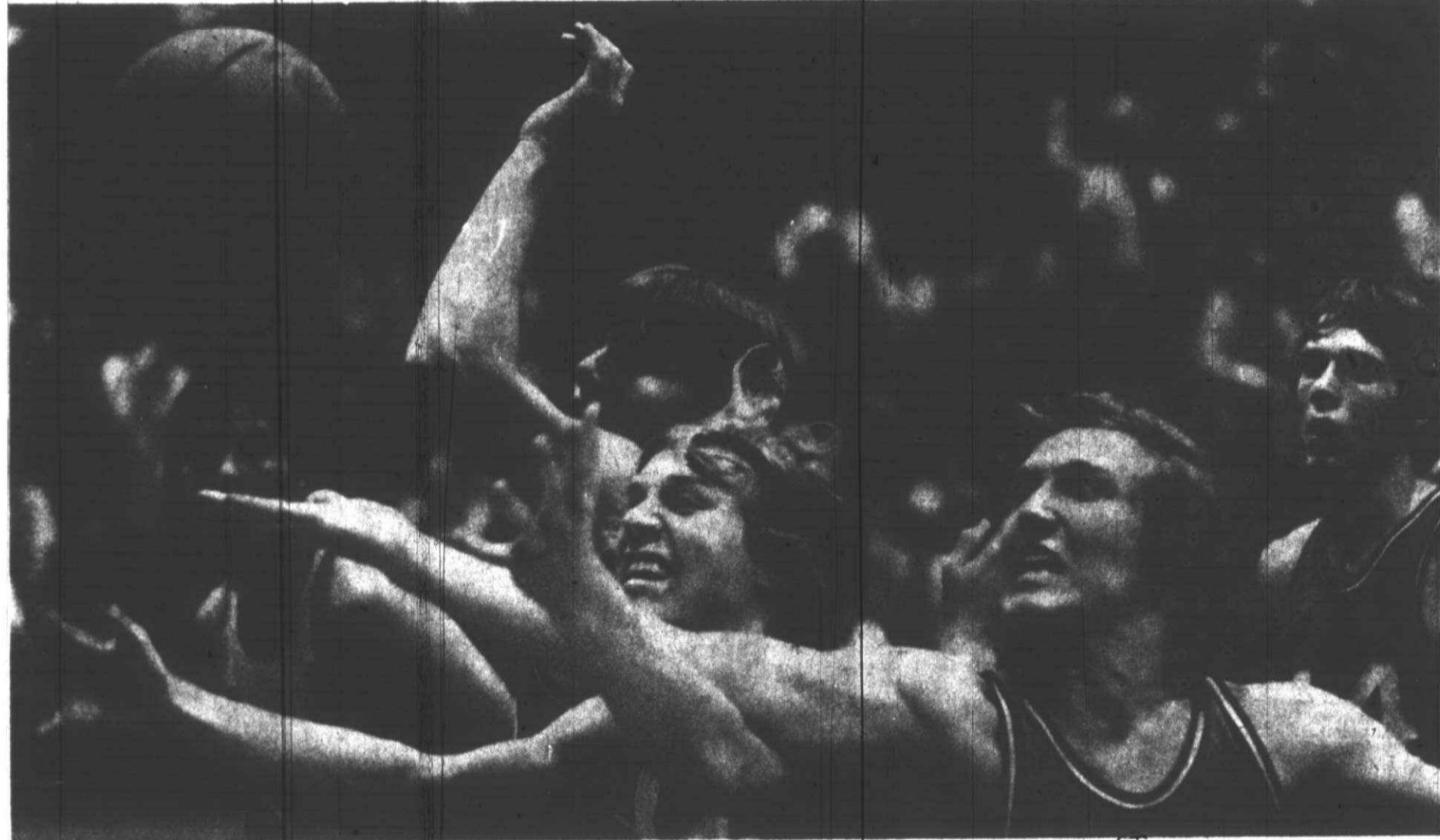
