Road patrol decision delayed again

Plymouth and Canton Township residents will have to wait again before they find out if the Wayne County Sheriff's Road Patrol will continue to fully protect them on a permanent basis.

The hearing scheduled for Jan. 17 before Circuit Court Judge Thomas Foley was postponed, as lawyers for the county and townships agreed to let the matter wait a little longer.

Another court hearing has been scheduled for Jan. 31, but it is conceivable that the issue could be settled through out-of-court bargaining by that time.

The court delay was prompted by resolutions passed Wednesday Jan. 15 when the county Public Safety and Judiciary Committee recommended full funding for the patrol through the end of April.

The committee also recommended

that talks between the county and the townships over funding of the road patrol be resumed.

THE HASSLE over the money and the level of service the road patrol should provide the townships has been going on for almost four years.

The combatants in the case are Wayne county and seven townships in the western region of the county, Canton, Plymouth, Van Buren, Sumpter, Brownstown, Huron and Northville. The county is legally committed, by the state constitution, to protect the areas, but the level of service to be provided the townships is not stipulated.

The county would like the townships to pay a portion of the costs of the road patrol and the townships want to make sure that at a very minimum, the county maintains the service standards of 1974.

Currently, the county employs 28

men to cover the 200-square mile area, or approximately three cars per shift. According to Under Sheriff Loren Pittman, however, at times the road patrol is reduced to two cars per shift due to the lack of manpower.

THE PROBLEM began in 1970 when the Wayne County board of Commissioners determined it no longer wanted to maintain funding for protection for the townships. Consequently, it funded police protection for nine months and forced the township supervisors into complaining all summer before financing services for the last three months of the year.

In 1974, the supervisors didn't complain. Instead they hired attorney Louis Wechsler who sought an injunction to prevent the county from withdrawing the sheriff's protection when funds expired at the end of August. Wechsler went before County Circuit Court Judge Thomas Foley and won his suit Aug. 28.

Five days later, the county allocated \$120,000 to the sheriff's department for the remaining three months of 1974.

When the 1975 budget was accepted by the county board of commissioners early November, the commissioners resolved "not to cut back on services to the townships." But when the Ways and Means Committee of the county met the following week it suggested that only \$350,000 be appropriated to the sh

riff for 1975, effectively reducing funds by 25 per cent. In 1974, they had allocated \$470,000 for the same purposes.

RECOGNIZING that the board had vowed not to reduce services, the Ways and Means Committee appointed a select subcommittee to study the problem and develop "recommendations on how to implement the activities of the road patrol" in view of the cutback.

When the subcommittee reported back in December, it suggested funding an additional \$10,000 for the month of January. But it also suggested that the townships add \$90,000.

The subcommittee also suggested that a cost sharing plan be negotiated by Jan. 15.

It was not, and the county voted to extend the extra financing of the patrol another 90 days.

The county board has recommended an additional \$30,000 be granted the patrol for the months of February, March and April.

Presently, the suit against the county by the townships asks that the county be forced to maintain the funding level of 1974.

But Wechsler plans to amend that motion to ask the court to designate a specific level of service from the county, rather than establishing a funding minimum. The amended complaint will allege that the service currently

received by the townships is "grossly inadequate."

THIS AMENDED complaint was supposed to have been filed before the postponed hearing of Jan. 17, but Wechsler explained that he intended to wait a little longer before altering his original complaint.

Some observers of the situation feel that the issue "is a political hot potato" and that the courts would rather avoid designating policing levels. If this is so, the amended complaint will give the townships extra bargaining power at the negotiating table, explains Canton Treasurer Carl Parsell.

"Right now the county has nothing to lose. The original complaint merely asks them to maintain the same funding level as 1974. If we ask for more service, and they lose the court case, they will have to put out more money. With the amended complaint, perhaps they will negotiate more seriously."

Strike moves into 15th week

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Striking workers at the Whitman and Barnes Division of the United Greenfield Corp., 40600 Plymouth Road, are pounding the picket lines today, as the strike continues in its 15th week.

Company officials last week rejected a contract proposal, outlining an improved pension plan and early retirement, proposed by the UAW Amalgamated Tool and Die Local 157.

Union plant chairman Lou Winters claims the company has refused to negotiate since proposing a contract offer in December.

Winters accuses the company, a manufacturer of drills and other tools, of sending production work to a non-union Greenfield Corp. plant in Chicago.

"They're sending eight or 10 supervisors to work in a plant doing production work usually done here," Winters said. "And that's strike-breaking."

Jim Bailey, industrial relations director for Whitman and Barnes, declined to comment on the union's accusations.

"We don't want to dignify their comments by any kind of a response," Bailey said. "We don't believe we want to be negotiating in a newspaper."

Bailey said a date has not been set for resumption of talks.

The key issue of the strike, according to Local president Joseph Danz, is early retirement.

"We're not asking for the 30-and-out plan per se," Danz said, "but we are

asking for an improvement in the pension plan. I can't see them (union members) dropping that issue. They're more adamant now than when they first went out on the street."

Under the old three-year contract, which expired Sept. 30, union members were entitled to retirement at age 62 with 30 years of service and pension benefits of \$6 per month for each year of service.

The company's contract offer in December proposed increasing those pension benefits over a three-year period from \$5 to \$8 a month for each year served.

Union members rejected that offer by a 242-15 vote, because it failed to provide for early retirement and the reinstatement of cost-of-living benefits, which the union and company agreed to abolish about 15 years ago, according to Winters.

Danz said the union modified its cost-of-living demands in its recent contract proposal.

Whitman and Barnes, a subsidiary of Thomas, Ramo and Woolridge (TRW), is refusing to offer union members early retirement, according to Danz, even though some TRW employees at other plants are eligible for early retirement.

Union member George Patak said the local is planning a rally with all striking employees Wednesday from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. in front of the Whitman and Barnes building.

Union members took to the picket line Oct. 3.

Communication key goal

Communities meet to air problems

PLYMOUTH—An area-wide inter-governmental committee is off the ground.

Meeting last Thursday in Plymouth Community Schools board offices, representatives of the school district, the city of Plymouth, and Canton, Salem, and Superior townships, sat down to discuss areas of mutual concern in their communities.

Also invited to participate were Plymouth and Northville townships who failed to send representatives to the first meeting.

Those representatives present, including school board members Tom Yack and Marda Benson, Plymouth City Commissioner Norbert Battermann, Canton Township Treasurer Carl Parsell, Salem Township Trustee Harvey Barkley, and Superior Township Trustee Richard Innes, reached accord on close to a dozen areas in which the units of government could possibly cooperate on.

"THIS GROUP is intended as a means of breaking down barriers," noted Yack as he opened the three-hour meeting.

"We're mainly concerned in opening up communication between the units of government within the school district and determine where our common concerns lie."

The forming of the committee was the outgrowth of discussions between Yack and Canton's supervisor Bob Greenstein. Following the November election, Yack put the works in motion to set up the group's first meeting.

The six representatives present at Thursday's meeting threw ideas out for discussion until a list of mutual concerns were listed.

Among those items were possible mutual police and fire protection, a reopening of discussions on an area recreational authority, and coordinated efforts in establishing long range waste disposal plans.

ALL MEMBERS present felt it important that the committee accomplish something to prove that the six governmental bodies could participate in combined efforts.

"It's very valuable for us to sit down and talk," noted Parsell, "but let's make sure we get started and do something before the committee falls apart."

Battermann commented, "We do have mutual problems and we think we can work on some of them. There

are certainly problems we can resolve."

The list of topics that the new committee will try to tackle include:

- Cooperative communication in planning.
- Minimizing overlapping services. (Purchasing, emergency services)
- Consider unified positions in relating to county agencies.
- Explore cooperative public safety. (Police and fire)
- Reevaluate the potential of a regional recreation planning authority.
- Consider joint Bicentennial celebrations.

• Coordination of senior citizens services.

• Cooperative purchasing and printing.

• Discussion of coordinated solid waste plans.

• Coordination in seeking state and federal funding for various projects.

• Study the expansion of the community school concept.

The committee has set its next meeting for Jan. 29, hoping to expand on the possible areas of cooperation and look toward some action on some ideas that have already been suggested.

Canton accepts sewers

CANTON—The Canton Township Board of Trustees Tuesday agreed to maintain two sewage systems and two water mains, recently installed in the township.

The board agreed to maintain a water main, connected to the K-mart shopping center at Sheldon and Ford last August, and a sewage system, connected to K-mart last September.

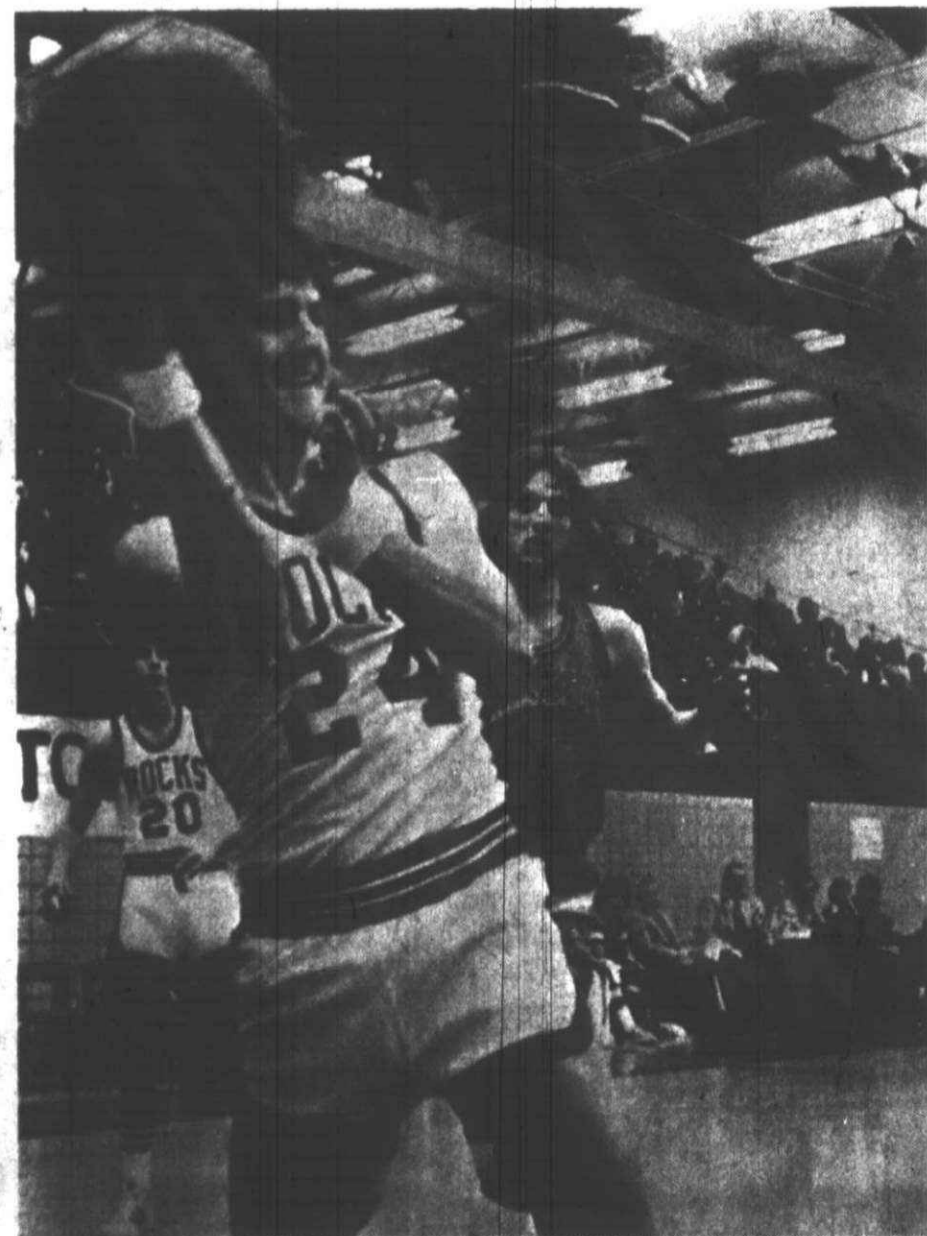
Contractor for the K-mart development, Peter A. Basile & Sons, submitted the bond guaranteeing the systems for one year, which was necessary for township maintenance approval.

The board agreed to maintain the water main system for the Cherry

Hill Orchards Subdivision, located on the southwest corner of Cherry Hill and Lilley, after the subdivision contractor, W. Stockton Excavating, Inc., submitted its one-year guarantee on the main connected in October.

The board approved the maintenance of the industrial sanitary sewage system located at Joy and Haggerty and connected last October, after its contractor, A & P Construction Co. submitted its one-year guarantee.

Township engineer Glen Roberts said the township usually agrees to maintain water and sewage systems, after they are connected and construction debris is cleared away.

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Chevy manager predicts upturn

Workers at the Chevrolet Livonia Spring and Bumper Plant wondered what "all the white shirts" were doing poking around their machines last Wednesday.

The "white shirts" formed an executive entourage to help familiarize Robert Lund, new general manager of Chevrolet, with the plant's production and employees.

Lund, of 711 Dennebec Court, Bloomfield Hills, was named to head the Chevrolet division of General Motors on Nov. 1, 1974. He is in the process of visiting each of the 26 Chevrolet plants.

LIVONIA SPRING and Bumper Plant is a feeder plant, rather than an assembly plant. But, when assembly plants cut back or shut down, feeder plants feel the jolt of the economic slump, or crisis, (depending on your degree of optimism).

The plant has laid off 680 workers already, and plant manager, Bernard "Bud" Kearney, predicts that 790 workers will be laid off by the end of the month.

On the executive tour, the group stopped to watch coil machine operator, Charles Drummond, feed a rod of cherry-red glowing steel into a drum which slurped the rod up like a strand of spaghetti and rolled it into a cooling solution as a spring.

THE COIL MACHINE operator said he has 19 years seniority but still worries about getting axed in a lay-off.

"There's supposed to be more people cut by the end of the month," said Drummond, "so I don't know if I'm safe even with my 19 years."

Later, in the plant's mahogany row, Lund took a more optimistic view than Drummond. He said he thought workers would be returning from the lay-off by spring of this year. Lund echoed the enthusiasm of his boss, GM President E.E. "Pete" Estes, over the economic proposals unveiled last week by President Ford.

"The individual tax refund is going to prime the pump for the economy," Lund said. "I was also encouraged to hear Ford suggest tax incentives for business."

"The whole thing is a cycle," he said. "If you get a sizeable tax rebate, you can afford to buy that new car, and workers will be called back to build that car. I think Ford's message offers excellent hope for an up-

ward swing. It's encouraging to see some incentive and leadership come out of Washington for a change.

"IT'S NO CRIME to offer legislation that helps business," said Lund. "For example, the proposed moratorium on anti-pollution equipment will allow us sufficient time to accomplish our environmental duty in an orderly way. The president's remarks were en-

couraging because I think he realizes that if business is hurting, the economy is hurting, and if business is doing well then people are not out of work and the country and economy are in good shape."

Lund was asked if he wasn't, in effect, saying what ex-GM President Charles Wilson said when he was secretary of defense: "What's good for

General Motors is good for the United States."

"That quote got a great deal of bad press," Lund answered. "But basically what he was saying was true. The reporters took it out of context. What the man was saying was that when you have a strong industry you have a strong economy. And when General Motors is profiting, so are its workers."

Will Esch seek Hart's seat?

The worst kept secret in Republican circles is that U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch is considering a run for the Senate in 1976.

One often-repeated version is that the 2nd District congressman will announce his intentions at the Feb. 15 GOP state convention in Grand Rapids, thus beginning a 21-month campaign.

Democrat Philip Hart, who is serving his third six-year term, has announced he intends to retire from the Senate after the 1976 election. Hart will turn 64 at the end of this term.

ESCH IS coy about his intentions. "I've heard that," he said about the story in party circles. And he admits "I've had encouragement... I have an obligation to look at it."

But the 47-year-old, five-term member of the lower house insists his twin interests at this point are to "be a congressman and rebuild and reshape the Republican Party of Michigan" to make it "more aggressive and effective."

Esch's district, one of the most meandering in Michigan, covers Monroe County, the eastern half of Washtenaw County (including two university campuses) and Livonia, Plymouth and Northville in western Wayne County.

It's considered a difficult one to campaign in because of the diversity of interests—rural, free-wheeling collegiate and middle class suburban. Esch, a former college instructor with good rapport with the farmers, looks like a suburban businessman and has carried the district when most politicians would have caved in.

While Esch won't deny he is both interested and considering the Senate run, he considers it premature to announce the beginning of a campaign as early as Feb. 15, 1975.

REPUBLICANS in recent years have disliked primary fights, figuring their limited funds are better spent on the November campaign. So they do a lot of maneuvering to get a consensus of party and financial chieftains behind a single candidate before too many persons get into a race.

That was what happened in 1970, when Lenore Romney got virtually unanimous support from the leadership in her Senate race. Conservative Republicans and cross-over Democrats backed then-State Sen. Robert Huber and gave Mrs. Romney a primary scare, but the essential GOP tactic has been retained.

Esch is solid friends with Gov. Milliken and Max M. Fisher, the party's chief money-raiser.

Esch was a member of the so-called "class of '66" that was elected on Gov. Romney's coattails in that overwhelmingly Republican year.

WHO WILL succeed Esch is already a topic of conjecture.

Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara is a Democratic possibility and was frequently mentioned in 1974 speculation.

John Reuther, the '74 candidate, hasn't ruled out another try, especially since he carried two of the three counties in the district.

Dr. Edward Pierce of Ann Arbor, who lost to Reuther in the Democratic primary by a handful of votes, is believed to be nursing his wounds and getting ready for another crack at it, a notion all the more believable with the emergence of a "Progressive Democratic Caucus" in the party.

On the Republican side, State Sen. Carl Pursell of Plymouth must be considered a contender, although Pursell is known to have ambitions in Lansing.

Not to be overlooked is Deane

Baker, Ann Arbor-area resident and contractor who recently acquired the Thunderbird Inn hotel-restaurant complex in Plymouth. Baker is a member of the University of Michigan Board of Regents. Party sources say he is looking for support for a U.S. Senate race, but Esch's entry would almost certainly force Baker to reconsider and instead look at the House.

State Sen. Gilbert Bursley of Ann Arbor was once in the diplomatic service, but he will be 63 by the time of the election and is probably too old to consider running for Congress.

Appeals ruling averts walkout

DEARBORN HEIGHTS—Western Wayne County breathed a collective sigh of relief over the weekend as a possible 14-district teacher walkout was averted—at least temporarily.

The Michigan Court of Appeals ruled in support of a Wayne County Circuit Court decision to re-instate striking Crestwood teachers.


The Appeals Court ruling came late Friday night, and brought the likelihood of an appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court by the Crestwood Board of Education to keep the union teachers out of Crestwood schools.

The Supreme Court had refused earlier to intervene on behalf of the Michigan Education Association, but could act now that the Appeals Court has made its ruling.

A stay order by the Supreme Court would continue to keep striking Crestwood teachers out of their classrooms.

But a stay order, if granted, also would renew the MEA threat of a 14-district teacher walkout with 48 hours notice.

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Some balk at necessity of flood insurance

Spokesmen for the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township are balking with gripes and confusion over a federally-subsidized flood insurance program, while one Canton Township official describes his feelings about the insurance matter as "elated."

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has identified the three communities as flood-hazard areas not enrolled in a national flood insurance program.

The communities may jeopardize federally-guaranteed grants and loans if they do not apply for entry in the program by July 1. Residents living within areas specifically identified as flood-prone may no longer be eligible for FHA or bank loan on local real estate, mobile homes or, in some cases, personal property.

DESPIITE HUD's explanation that flood-prone areas are theoretically endangered by storms that occur once every 100 years, City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township officials are questioning flood-prone designations within their communities.

Appeal of the flood-prone designa-

tion after applying for entry into the program is one door left open to protesting governing bodies.

The City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township say their communities may take the appeal route, while Canton Township Treasurer Carl Parsell says appeal is not on his township's mind.

"Our main concern is that we really have nothing to indicate why we're a flood-hazard area," said administrative assistant Ray Quada of the City of Plymouth. "I think that (appeal) will be our progression, but we're being told to go through this whole long process first and then appeal."

THE CITY, Quada explained, must search through its ordinances and history to fill out the insurance application.

"We're putting in a lot of time studying a flood-hazard area that probably doesn't even exist," he said. "We've never had a flood problem, so we don't have any flood information in our files. To go through all these things takes a lot of time."

HUD has designated only two small sections of the city, surrounding the

Middle Rouge River, as flood-hazard areas.

Only one home, owned by city commissioner Harold Guenther, is located within the designated areas, Quada said. No buildings will be constructed on the remainder of the land, since it is leased by Wayne County and classified as a parkway along Edward Hines Drive.

"His (Guenther's) house is so far above the Rouge River that it would be inconceivable for water to rise that much," Quada said.

Quada complained that HUD has failed to provide the city with adequate flood insurance information.

MOST OF THE LAND designated as flood-prone in the Plymouth-Canton area lies within Plymouth Township. Although some of the scattered pieces designated as flood-prone lie along the Middle Rouge River, others are flat, low-lying land.

Township supervisor J.D. McLaren said the township may appeal the flood-prone designation of those areas. "I think we first have to get more answers and know what direction we're going to take," McLaren said.

The Plymouth Township Board of

Trustees last week tabled its application for entry into the flood insurance program for a maximum of 60 days, pending further investigation of the matter.

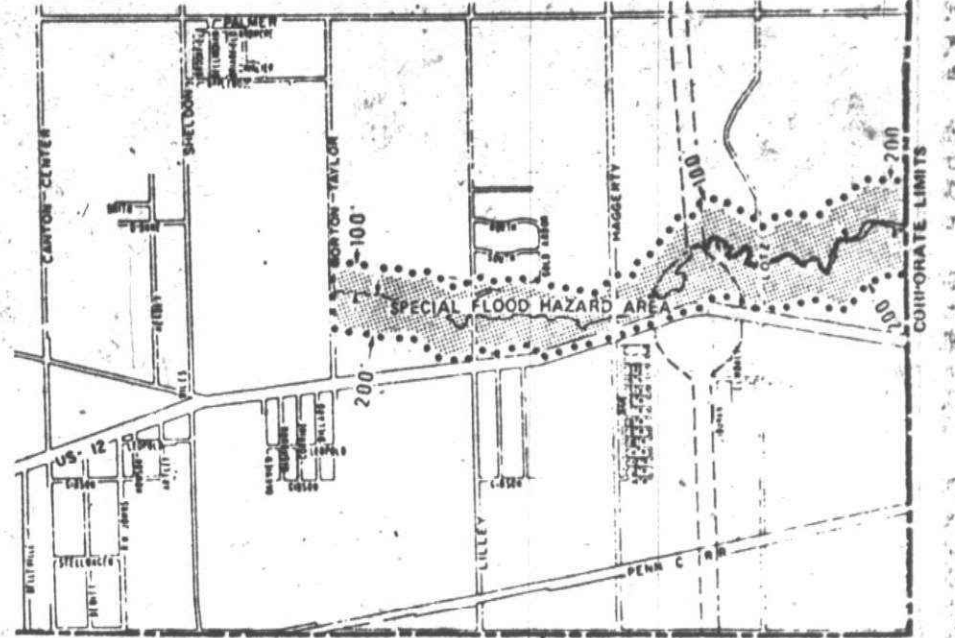
Canton Township, which is already proceeding with its flood insurance application, is eyeing the issue from a different angle, according to Parsell. "I maintain that 23,000 people will benefit from this," Parsell said. "The average person doesn't know his valuables aren't covered for damage by backed-up sewers or flooded basements because of the high rates of flood insurance."

"WE'RE DOING everything to apply, and we'll tell the people as soon as we're approved that they can contact their insurance companies to get coverage they think they already have."

"I'm very elated with this," Parsell added. "I think it will benefit all the people. I think these are precautions that should be taken, and I look on it as good advice."

The federally-subsidized flood insurance program will cover flood damage from backed-up sewers or flooded basements only in a general flood con-

dition, according to Richard Watt, an engineer for the hydrological survey division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the agency administering the federal flood program for the state.

Educators weigh value of calculators

WESTLAND—Will blackboard and chalk, pencil and paper be replaced in the math classroom by pocket-sized gadgets called electronic calculators?

Maybe, but at least not yet in Wayne-Westland schools, where the calculator is used sparingly and where teachers are still concerned that students know how to attack a problem before punching the buttons for an answer.

As calculators grow in popularity and decrease in price, educators are beginning to balance the pluses and

minuses of having them in the classroom.

THEIR BIGGEST ADVANTAGE, they say, is that they save time and relieve the student of the boredom of tedious calculations. On the negative side, some teachers worry that children will use calculators as a crutch and will not know how to perform even simple computations in their heads.

Gene Domanke, director of compensatory education and former math coordinator for Wayne-Westland schools, says the district has pur-

chased some calculators for high school use.

"I think that to weigh the benefits and disadvantages of using calculators you have to know what you're trying to teach a student," Domanke says. "If a child becomes too dependent on a combination of mechanical skills offered by the calculator he may not understand the operations."

"For a child to use a calculator successfully, he must at least know if the answer appearing is a reasonable one."

Domanke contends that two of the biggest benefits in using the calculators is that students arrive at an answer quickly and that the calculator serves as a motivation factor in solving math problems.

"Anything electronic is going to fascinate a child," he says. "But there is a danger that a student will become dependent upon them if they begin using them at too early an age."

Domanke also worries that, since most of the pocket models available do not employ a paper tape, a student may not be able to realize an error in computation.

"At times you need a record of a series of computations for the student to be able to go back and find out where he went wrong. Without a tape he won't even know if he hit the right keys."

While Domanke offers a few drawbacks to owning a calculator, he predicts the day when calculators will become so reasonable that people will be wearing them like wristwatches to do their figuring.

ONE OF THE district's biggest supporters of calculators is Larry Chamberlain, who instructs gifted children at Edison School.

"I can't agree that a calculator is going to become a crutch for students," Chamberlain says.

"People said the same things about cars. Calculators are going to be in the homes eventually. I can remember people opposing computers saying they would take away people's jobs. In actuality, they have created more, and that's what the calculator is going to do."

"The calculator offers unlimited possibilities for learning and allows students more time to be creative."

"I've struggled for years with children trying to get them to convert fractions to decimals. Now with calculators, they can pick it up in a day or two just by getting a feel of the relationships."

"A student can work out 100 calculations in just a few minutes on a calculator. With a paper and pencil he doesn't have the stamina to do them."

Chamberlain's sixth grade students are working on a project of measuring the area of Edison. After receiving their initial answer, they are using the figure to solve percentages regarding space per student.

"With a calculator they're getting a real feel for what they're doing, and they're doing far more with their results than they would if they were using paper and pencil."

Dick Thompson, math teacher at Stottlemeyer School, used a loaned calculator last year and was pleased with his results.

"I would like to have more of them," he says. "I used the calculator as a checking device. The students were on their own until it came to check their answer."

"The calculator is also great for times tables. It's a pain in the neck to try to get students to practice them on their own."

"I don't know if calculators could be described as a gimmick or a tool. What I do know is that I had great success working with one. The stu-

dents went to it and practiced their tables. They were quiet and handled it carefully. After using the machine, they began to assimilate the results."

"Someone would have to justify their costs, though, by determining if calculators or other learning devices are practical for a school system to offer to its students."

At the junior high school level, Nora Cole is teaching her Nankin ninth graders preparatory skills for computer science courses they may take while at John Glenn High School.

"We have a machine office calculator, which is the equivalent of three adding machines and which has three separate memory banks," she says. "It does square roots and positive and negative numbers."

"What we've been doing in class is flow charting, which teaches students to write out a step by step set of direction to feed into a computer."

She denies that her students look at the calculator as an expensive toy.

"WHEN WE STARTED two months ago they were gung ho about it and still are. They had a healthy respect for it from the beginning, because they had been exposed to them by the

media and by people in business.

"We generally use it when we're not flow charting with a problem that requires difficult computations. It's a big time saver."

John Glenn High School students, in math classes ranging from remedial to advanced, have access to four school-owned calculators, leading math teacher Larry Galbraith to believe that calculators make students more productive.

"They cut down on the time it takes to solve problems and they help to keep students interested in the program," he says.

"We don't allow them in tests so we still require the use of basic math functions. I can see calculators being a disadvantage in that they cut down on skills. You're not always going to have one at your fingers."

"I've seen people, even administrators, use a calculator to add a column of numbers when it would be faster to do it in their heads."

"But I find that our remedial students don't get as frustrated when they're using one, and if it will keep them coming to class then I think they're great."



CALCULATORS IN THE CLASSROOM are becoming more apparent as math students abandon pencil and paper for a more scientific means of problem solving. NOTICE OF HEARING

The Michigan Public Service Commission (Commission) in its Opinion and Order dated November 19, 1974 in Case No. U-4701 initiated proceedings on the design of the rate structures of gas utilities within the State of Michigan and other mechanisms to encourage the conservation of natural gas and to assist in increasing the possibility of adequate future supplies of natural gas. The initial hearing in these matters is scheduled to commence at 9:30 a.m. of February 7, 1975 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan. The hearing shall continue thereafter on such dates as a presiding officer may set until the matters have been fully heard.

Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate, subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. Any party seeking to intervene in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules shall file with the Commission, at least 5 days prior to the initial hearing of February 7, 1975, an original and 6 copies of the petition to intervene, together with proof of service upon their serving gas utility.

The proceedings initiated by the Commission will focus on two basic issues:

- (1) Any adjustments in the rate structure for gas service of gas utilities within the State of Michigan that would be appropriate for the promotion of the conservation of gas; and
- (2) Any other mechanisms appropriate for encouraging the conservation of gas.

The Commission emphasized that it had formed no firm findings or conclusions relative to the issues raised therein. However, in order to facilitate exploration of such issues, the Commission attached to the Opinion and Order several proposals upon which the Commission solicited evidence and other comments.

The proposals set forth in the Opinion and Order are divided into four parts:

Part I would direct, among other things, that gas utilities in the State of Michigan undertake a program of advertising and promotion to encourage the conservation of natural gas and establish a program to identify customers using disproportionate amounts of natural gas for space heating. Gas utilities would also be required to establish a residential inspection program to implement the "Discounted Residential Insulation Rate" provided for in Part II of the proposals.

Part II would establish a rate structure designed to reward residential customers who adequately insulate their homes. Four Alternatives are set forth which could implement such a rate structure. Under each alternative, residential gas customers having ceiling insulation adequate to meet the R-19 standard as set forth in the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) Minimum Property Standards for Single Dwelling Units, paragraph 607-3, effective August 1, 1974, and residential customers who rent their dwellings and those whose living units are such that they are physically unable to install ceiling insulation that meets the above R-19 standard would be entitled to a "Discounted Residential Insulation Rate" (Discounted Rate) for natural gas service.

Under Alternative 1, a portion of the revenues collected from residential customers failing to qualify for the Discounted Rate would be rebated annually by the utility collecting the same to those who qualified for the Discounted Rate.

Under Alternative 2, a portion of the revenues collected from residential customers failing to qualify for the Discounted Rate would be expended by the utility collecting the same for special conservation programs, or special actions to assure adequate future supplies of gas.

Under Alternative 3, a portion of the revenues collected from residential customers failing to qualify for the Discounted Rate would be rebated annually to all residential customers.

Under Alternative 4, the rates for gas service for residential customers qualifying for a Discounted Rate and those not qualifying for a Discounted Rate would be established at levels calculated as nearly as practicable to result in no change in net revenue for each gas utility.

Part III would prohibit the attachment of new residential gas service unless the living unit of the prospective customer meets one or more of the following requirements: (a) ceiling insulation meeting the FHA R-19 standard, (b) wall insulation meeting the FHA R-11 standard, (c) storm door or storm windows or their equivalent, or (d) in the case of a mobile home the living unit is in compliance with the heat loss standards promulgated by the Michigan Construction Code Commission in the Mobile Home Code, R 408.30611 of the Michigan Administrative Code.

Part IV would prohibit the use of gas for "ornamental purposes." As used in the proposal, "ornamental purposes" means for the primary purpose of decoration or for the primary purpose of enhancement of the aesthetic quality of an object, space, or environment, and include, but is not limited to, a use primarily for the purpose of providing light.

Each of the foregoing proposals would, if adopted as proposed, be made effective September 1, 1975.

The Commission requests all parties, staff and intervenors to address the impact of any proposal on residential customers of "limited financial means," renters and customers whose dwellings cannot physically be insulated and to suggest methods of treating such customers equitably. Under each alternative, residential customers who do not meet the insulation standards or other qualifications for eligibility to purchase gas under the "Discounted Residential Insulation Rate" would pay a higher rate for gas.

The Commission also ordered that each gas utility file evidence as to the future availability of and demand for gas.

The Commission also specifically solicited other proposals from the utilities, its Staff, and any other interested person which fit within the scope of the proceedings.

Jurisdiction is pursuant to 1909 PA 300, as amended, MCLA 462.2 et seq.; 1919 PA 419, as amended, MCLA 460.51 et seq.; 1939 PA 3, as amended, MCLA 460.1 et seq.; 1923 PA 94, as amended, MCLA 460.351; Section 87, 1969 PA 306, as amended, MCLA 24.287; and Rule 52 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.62.


Center Mike Susko, the 6-foot-6 junior pivotman, was the ship's "captain" as he gobbled up rebounds off

Jamaican gourmet cook Doreen Kirkcaldy scooped pepperpot soup from cans into a cooking pot. Her assistant, Herma Aris, meanwhile was mashing bananas in preparation for banana fritters.

Both would soon serve samples of these dishes to customers in the Creative Kitchen area of Hudson's Northland which welcomed the demonstrators as part of a recent store promotion.

Beautiful color postcards, compliments of the Jamaica Tourist Board, were spread out on a table to be plucked by hungry shoppers.

Recipes pictured Pepperpot Soup, Escoveitch Fish, Curry Goat, Cornmeal Pone, Rice and Peas, and Beef Patties, in tropical table settings.

MRS. KIRKCALDY explained, "Pepperpot soup is a simple one-pot meal that we love more than anything else. It's made from Jamaican callaloo."
"What's callaloo?"
"If you come to Jamaica it's available," she said. "It's similar to spinach. You add spinners, which are similar to dumplings (rolled). You must have fresh or salted meat. In Jamaica we use pickled pig's tail."
Other Jamaican one-pot soups in-

clude pumpkin, congo pea called gungo, red pea, rich vegetable with spinners, and escoveitch fish which is traditional.

AS A CHILD, Doreen Kirkcaldy brewed especially flavorful folk remedies. She majored in foods and nutrition in college and later worked for the Jamaican government.

She created the government-sponsored Culinary Arts Festival Competition, an annual Independence Festival event to develop Jamaican cuisine.

Today, Mrs. Kirkcaldy works with Grace Kennedy & Co. Ltd., manufacturers of precooked foods.

The canned pepperpot soup Mrs. Kirkcaldy served was delicious and zingy. But it's not available in the U.S. You can make your own pepperpot soup by following the postcard recipe:

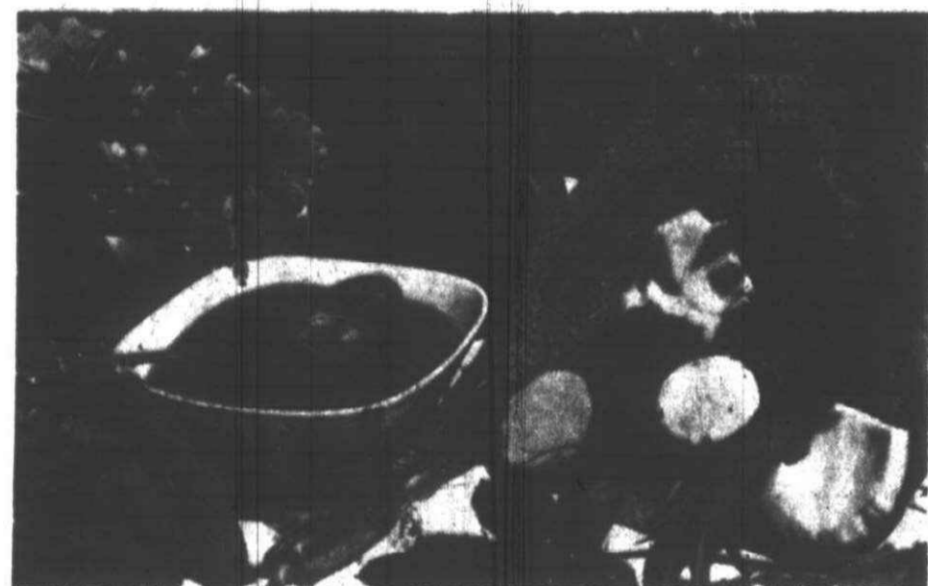

Wash and chop 1/2 lb. callaloo (spinach), 1/4 lb. Indian Kale, 1 doz. okras almost to a puree.

Put to boil with 1/2 lb. each, salt beef, pig's tail, fresh beef. Simmer until meats are tender.

Add 3 cups coconut milk (make by adding water to 1 grated coconut, then pass through sieve), 1/2 lb. each, peeled yam, coco, then 2 crushed escallions, 1 sliced hot pepper, salt and pepper to taste.

Simmer for further 1/4 hour.

"WE CANNOT really boast of what you would call a haute cuisine," Mrs. Kirkcaldy said. "But when Jamaica became independent in 1962 there was a place for culinary arts."

European-trained hotel chefs gave ideas to amateurs in the Culinary Arts Festival Competition.

"Each year seems to exceed other years," she said.

Influences from English, Spanish, African and ethnic groups such as Chinese, Indian and Syrian are evident in Jamaican cuisine.

"From the Spanish we have developed a taste for highly-seasoned

foods," Mrs. Kirkcaldy said. "For visitors we tone down on spices."

SHE CONTINUED, "Indians have given us this great urge to curries and chittneys."

The other tasty dish featured at the cooking demonstration, Banana Fritters ("like a pancake," Mrs. Kirkcaldy said), is made as follows:

BANANA FRITTERS

Fully ripe bananas
1 egg
3 to 4 T. flour
3 or more T. sugar
1 t. cinnamon or vanilla flavoring
1/2 t. baking powder

1/4 t. nutmeg
3 T. raisins (optional)
1/4 cup oil.

Mash banana to a pulp. Beat egg and sugar together. Add banana, flour and baking powder. Mix well. Heat oil in frying pan. Use one tablespoon to drop mixture into hot oil. Fry on one side until golden brown. Fry on other side.

Drain and dredge with sugar. "You can make an orange sauce, or any favorite fruit flavor," Mrs. Kirkcaldy pointed out. "The beauty is the banana fritter can be eaten hot or cold."

Is there more than just hard work and eating tossed salads? Alice would say as we were rocked to sleep in the warmth of the summer sun with the sounds of salads all about. There were salads served at least once a day, with colorful, jello and cream called confetti.

Salads served with pears and cheese.

Salads served with avocado and grapefruit with hot roquefort dressing.

Salads served with hot spiced-may-

onnaise, onions, crisp bacon and fresh spinach.

Salads served like in the time of Caesar.

And cottage cheese with a bouquet of fresh fragrant fruit from islands of afar, and dressing made of honey sweet, aging in a jar, but this is one she missed.

Fleur de Lys is my mother and it is for her, along with all others, that I present and honor this salad of salads.

LA FLEUR DE LYS SALADE

1 cup your favorite thousand island dressing
1/2 cup chef's dressing
2 lbs. sour cream
Salt and pepper to your taste
One heart of palm (about 90 cents a can)
1 head of iceberg (head) lettuce, loose, not tight
1 lb. King crab meat (frozen and defrosted)
10 T-16 oz. tiny shrimp (anyway available, usually at gourmet specialty shops)

METHOD

Remove the heart from the lettuce simply by holding the opposite end like a bowling ball and then banging it against a hard surface using a claw-like grip. With the other hand grab the heart, turn one-half degree and pull it out.

Run cold water gently down the cavity of the lettuce. The other leaves will fall off. Save the ones that form a perfect cup or bowl-like shape. This we will use for the actual service of the salad.

Cut the remainder of the lettuce in bite-size pieces. You may use a French knife without any worry about bruising the lettuce. No matter what, you are bruising the fibers whether a knife or your hands are the instruments.

Immediately submerge the lettuce in cold water. This method will prevent the damaged greens from continuing to bleed.

Strain the thousand island dressing. Then whip in the chef's dressing. Season to taste. In a large tossing bowl add the drained iceberg lettuce. Lettuce must be free from any excess water. Drain in a towel, then add half the dressing, the seafood. A little fresh chopped parsley would be great for color.

Toss with your hands, or if that hits you the wrong way, use whatever you

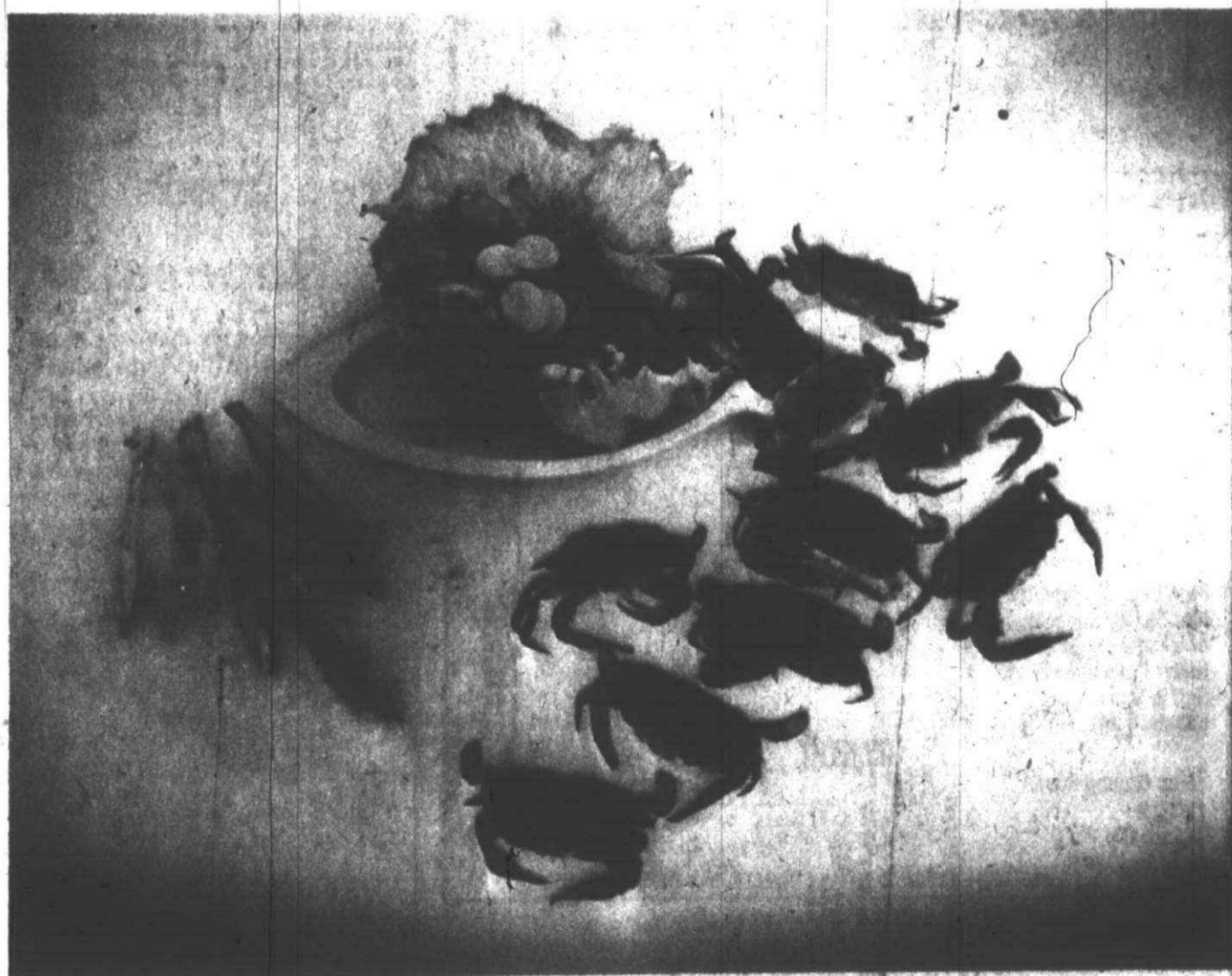
wish. This should be enough for a setting of four at luncheon and a great appetizer for a dinner of six.

Set lettuce cups on a glass cup or dish. Then divide salad into the proportions. Add sliced Brazilian hearts of palm on top.

There is very little vinegar in this dressing so a dry white wine or champagne may be served.

CHEF'S DRESSING

2 parts oil
1 part vinegar
Salt and pepper
Pressed fresh garlic (lightly)
Some Grey Poupon mustard
Pinch of sugar to cut the vinegar taste
1 egg
Add egg and vinegar in a blender. Whip for a minute. Then add all other ingredients and whip for a minute or two.

Cooperative efforts look like a good thing

It wasn't the first instance of governmental cooperation, and it won't be the last, but last Thursday's Intergovernmental Study Committee showed remarkable promise of becoming a very successful force in the area.

Comprised of representatives of governments within the boundaries of Plymouth Community School District, the group seeks to open the lines of communication between the four townships, the city and the school district for some real attempts at mutual problem solving.

After three hours, close to a dozen ideas had been tossed about and a consensus reached on the direction the group is going to take. There were no egos on the line, no petty political axes to grind, just a lot of good discussion and an optimistic feeling that this group could accomplish something.

FOR THE SIX representatives, it was truly a learning experience, people met people for the first time and walked out of the school board offices with smiles on their faces.

Many of the items the committee will explore offer a potential savings to each unit of government. Cooperative purchasing of equipment and supplies led that list, with the obvious rationale that bigger quantities will bring lower prices.

Other no-cost ventures include coordinating efforts for acquiring state and federal grants for any number of projects.

Cooperative planning and unified positions with regard to county agencies also present limited financial liability and yet pose a potential for great benefits to all residents.

The crucial question of the group's real effectiveness will be seen later, when the issue of actually spending money is required. Exploring cooperative public safety, reevaluating possibilities for a recreational planning authority, and developing a coordinated approach to senior citizens services, will probably require some financial commitment from each governmental body.

IT'S HOPEFUL that when that day comes the same spirit of cooperation, the same lack of petty political differences, and the lack of personal or community ego can prevail and that each governmental unit can consider these issues as potential benefits to residents, rather than threats to their insular security.

No doubt differences will arise and perhaps none of the ideas presented will see the light of day, but it's hopeful that this committee, after taking a very good first step forward, will continue to keep the lines of communication open to the benefit of all residents in their communities.

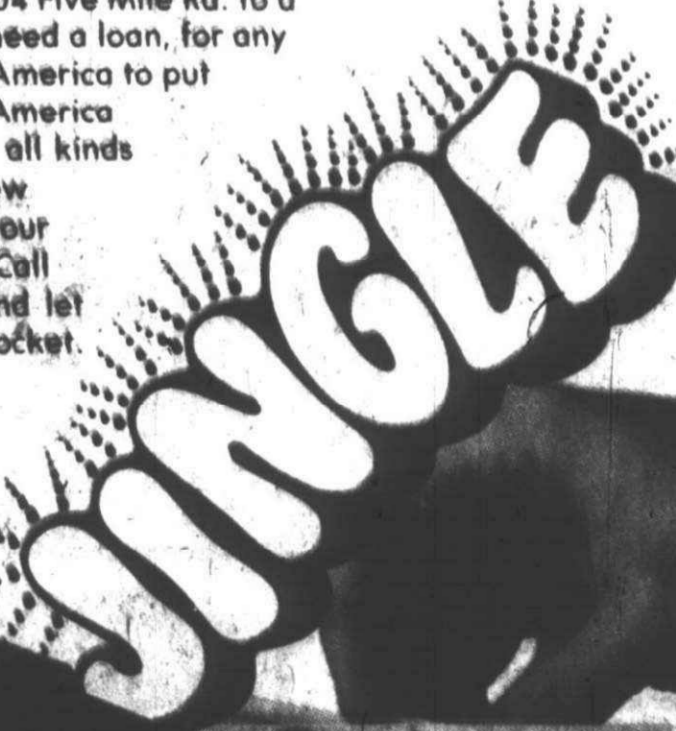
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LT. FRANK FELTS cautions his daughter, Stacy, about the dangers of fire. (Staff photo by Bob Woodring)

To most of us, a fire crackling pleasantly in the fireplace is a romantic sight. To area firemen, such a fire holds the potential of danger to life and property.

The U.S. Consumer Products Safety Commission says that more than 6,000 children and adults required hospital emergency room fireplace equipment.

In the concern about fireplaces, firemen worry mainly about dampers, ashes, construction and any flammable material nearby. They become particularly upset about the introduction of substances such as gasoline, coal and charcoal into the family fireplace.

However, Lt. Frank Felts of the Garden City Fire Department believes that there is no reason for a fireplace to lose its aura of romance, if firemakers will take some simple precautions.

"REMEMBERER TO OPEN your damper," he said. "We've had calls on that. Keep it open until the ashes are cool to avoid the build-up of poisonous gases."

He said it is wise always to use a screen in front of the fire, noting that

glass screens are safest because nothing can get through to ignite carpets or drapes.

He also suggested a screen for the chimney top to prevent flying debris that might spread fires around the neighborhood.

"Never overload," says Lt. Felts, who has worked for 13 years for the Garden City department. "Avoid placing so many wrappings and other papers in the fireplace that it makes a super hot fire."

"I don't recommend burning a Christmas tree either. It also generates too much heat. Having a fireplace heat up too rapidly is not good."

"Start the fire slowly so bricks can heat slowly. Too much heat can cause cracking in the mortar joints. Never start out with a roaring fire."

THE LIEUTENANT recommends using grates for logs because otherwise they don't burn very well. Grates will create a draft and allow smoke and heat to go up the chimney. It will also help to keep the logs from rolling on the floor.

"I like to see a fire extinguisher around," he said. "And I like to see the fireplace set up with proper tools so that falling logs can be returned quickly to the fireplace."

"I don't like to see paper stored near the fireplace."

Lt. Felts suggested taking a yearly look at the chimney. Shine a flashlight up from the bottom to see if chimney is plugged up, he advised, because too much soot on the sides of the chimney could be set on fire.

FIRE CHIEF George Schoenneman of the Plymouth Fire Department had several suggestions to make involving factory-made fireplaces.

"The outlet (stack) should be very well insulated as it goes through the walls into the chimney or outside," he says. "If you don't have a good clearance it might come in too close contact with wood or other combustible material."

The idea of using gasoline in a fireplace is enough to make a fireman's blood run cold.

"Gasoline is highly dangerous," emphasized Chief Schoenneman. "It is not only the fluid, but the vapors. With the right air mixture it is more powerful than dynamite. Vapors are heavier than air and don't go up the chimney."

"Gasoline should be used only in wide open spaces."

Charcoal makes too much smoke, the chief believes. With poor ventilation it might be dangerous to health. He recommends paper and kindling to start fires.

THE FIRE MARSHALL of Livonia has advice to offer about artificial logs. "The instructions on the logs should be very carefully obeyed," said Ted Kovarik, who has worked from the Livonia Fire Department for 21 years.

"Use one log at a time," he adds. "Don't break the wrapper or use with other wood. They are made mostly of wax and sawdust and should not be poked. If they disintegrate they might start a hotter fire."

Kovarik seconded the ideas of other firemen and the U.S. Product Safety Commission about the introduction of substances other than wood and paper into the fireplace.

"Do not use coal or charcoal in a fireplace because of the danger of carbon monoxide buildup," says the commission.

"It is not a good idea to burn trash or wrappings in fireplace fires because polystyrene foam and other coated materials can generate deadly fumes," he adds.

"Plastics when burning give off a heavy, thick, black smoke," notes Kovarik. "It creates a very sticky residue which will coat the inside of the chimney and might someday start burning."

The fire marshal reports that the burning of polyvinylchloride produces a deadly gas. "You can't tell what's in plastic, so don't throw it in the fireplace."

LIKE ALL FIREMAN, Kovarik urged householders to "enjoy your fireplace, but don't use it as an incinerator."

Kovarik had surprising information about cleaning ashes from fireplaces. "We've had more fires created by people cleaning out fireplaces than you can imagine."

"They dump the ashes in a paper bag or box and then set it in the garage or basement. Before long smoldering sparks start a fire."

"Wait at least two days after the fire before cleaning out the ashes. Then set the bag or box outdoors away from buildings. It would be even better to put the ashes in a metal container."

He also has advice for those men-

tioned by Lt. Felts, who fail to open the damper before starting a fire.

"After putting the fire out, open doors and windows, and use fans to blow the smoke out," he suggested. "Turn down the furnace because it will suck down the fumes into the furnace and recirculate the smoke."

KOVARIK NOTED that fires from fireplaces have decreased in recent years. He believes this is partly due to public education on the subject.

"We have better knowledge about the construction of fireplaces today," he says. "We also have better inspection of fireplace construction in new homes."

The Flammable Fabrics Act probably has also had a role in the improvement in the situation regarding fireplace fires. It recalls products that do not comply with standards of flammability. In most cases, companies voluntarily agree to recall products that do not pass flammability tests.

Recently an administrative law judge prohibited Congoleum Industries from manufacturing, selling or distributing carpeting in the future which does not comply with applicable flammability standards.

Actress brings new dimension to town hall

Actress Betty Jo Hawkins spends a great deal of time studying people, their speech, their gestures, their facial expressions.

That she is a good student was in evidence dramatically last week as this Livonia Town Hall guest brought a new acting dimension to the Mai Kai movie theater.

With monologues and the simplest of props, she moved through the roles of a young woman, a 30-year-old, a 50-year-old, a grandmother.

While she was acting the role of a young woman telling her mother her marriage plans, her voice was the voice of youth and her hands were the hands of youth. When older, she changed her physical reactions accordingly.

The catch in the voice, the slope of the shoulders, even the sudden intake of air seemed inevitably to match the age she was playing.

A hatrack stood to one side of the stage, lending additional theatrical interest to the performance. The audience could share with her the choice of the proper hat, apron or scarf for the next role.

MRS. HAWKENS' dramatic tour de force was an impersonation of a German woman who settled in this country in the 1700s.

After working hard to carve out a new life and have a family, the woman loses her husband and several of her children during an Indian attack. One child, however, is captured and carried off by the Indians.

"That the audience responded to this woman and the story of how she came to terms with her hatred of Indians and found her daughter was indicated by the remark of one listener. 'I see some other people are crying,' she said as the lights came up."

MRS. HAWKENS writes her own material, which gives her the advantage of personally trying out every line for its honesty and emotional impact as she goes along.

She knows good theatrical material when she sees it, having acted in such roles as "Angel Street," "Oklahoma" and "Lysistrata."

She has performed at the Houston Theater the Pasadena Playhouse and with the New York Theater Guild. While appearing for 18 months at the Drury Lane theater in London, she met and married her husband, who served in the U.S. Navy.

She also has acted in radio and television. She loves working in TV. "It's a real challenge to create something for such an intimate kind of media," she said.

BUT THE MAJOR part of her work is in roles she has created for herself. Recently she completed a monologue which has her playing the role of the legendary actress, Sarah Bernhardt, as she appeals to the French novelist, Emile Zola, to take an active role in France's famous Dreyfus case.

The bicentennial has stirred her imagination. Monologues about Abigail Adams, Martha Washington and the first wife of Patrick Henry soon will be performed.

At a luncheon in the Meeting House in Plymouth following the show, Mrs. Hawkins explained that she had no problems getting into the various roles she plays on the lecture circuit.

"By the time you see a character I have written about, I know her so well that it takes no time to remember exactly who she is," she said.

She added: "Most of me is with the woman while I am acting. But a small part of me is making sure I'm not being self-indulgent, that is, over doing it. I try to avoid going over that edge that will make the audience uncomfortable. I try not to take it beyond the point it wants to go."

LIKE MANY WOMEN, Mrs. Hawkins managed her career as best she could while raising a family.

"When away from the theater with my babies, I would write," she said. "I think everyone should have a book

and jot down things. Later when I did theater, I would feel guilty about the children. I had to learn they were becoming complete and independent people."

Mrs. Hawkins won approving applause from those in attendance when she mentioned that she has baked hun-

dreds of cookies in behalf of the American Field Service, the organization that benefits from the proceeds of the Town Hall lecture series.

She noted that her daughter went to the Barbados as an AFS student, and her young son can't wait to follow in his sister's footsteps.

AT LUNCH she shared the speakers table with three foreign students, who are studying at Livonia high schools this year through the efforts of AFS.

Esther Sablan is from Saipan, Juan Jaen is from Madrid and Roswitha Mueller is a resident of Switzerland.

Attending the lecture were three Livonia students who have lived in foreign countries under the AFS program. Kathy Schulz had been to West Germany, Dianne Tavarozzi traveled to Argentina, and Heidi Hepler returned just the day before from Australia.

Mrs. Whipple keeps her word

(Part IV)

At the regular meeting of the temporary City Commission on Sept. 19, 1949, Commissioner Ruth Huston-Whipple had an announcement to make. "In June, 1949, in good faith," she said, "I made a written statement that I would resign from the City Commission under certain circumstances. In my code, keeping one's word is necessary either in personal or public affairs. Integrity is mandatory in public officials. I hereby resign as City Commissioner."

The other shoe had dropped. Now there were none left of the five commissioners who had been embroiled in the Cheek-Sackett controversy.

The temporary commissioners accepted Mrs. Whipple's resignation with regret.

Commissioner Peck moved that Cass S. Hough, of the Daisy Manufacturing Company, be appointed to fill the place vacated by Mrs. Whipple. The motion was passed without dissent.

Barely a month later, Mrs. Whipple was a commissioner once more as a result of the special election late in October. Perry Richwine, who had advocated arbitration during the controversy, was named mayor of the new, permanent commission.

Eight years after the ouster, William Hartmann was also returned to the commission on which he served a four and then a two year term. I recently discussed the recall controversy with him. In retrospect, Hartmann says, the four commissioners should probably have let Sackett stay on the job, since he had only two years to go before retirement. Hartmann speaks good-humoredly about the affair and without any trace of rancor.

Frank Henderson, former mayor, past district governor of Rotary, owner of the Plymouth Plating Works, and a resident of Plymouth for 74 years, is still a prominent figure in the business community.

James Latture, former teacher, has operated his own real estate business in Plymouth for many years.

Lew Goddard moved to Arizona several years ago, after selling his Mini-Mall building located at the corner of Main and Ann Arbor Trail.

Mrs. Ruth Huston-Whipple died at age 59 on Jan. 4, 1955, after an illness of more than a year. She was survived by her husband, Austin Whipple, and two sons, Edson and Elmer. (Mrs. Whipple's story as a teacher, a member of the board of education, a city commissioner, a member of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors, and Plymouth's first woman mayor will be told in a future article).



Harold R. Cheek had no trouble finding a community where his efficiency was more appreciated—and better paid. For the past 14 years he has been city manager of High Point, N.C., a community whose population exceeds 60,000.

Lee Sackett, who had been restored to his position as chief of police, served in that capacity only 11 months after the recall. On Aug. 28, 1950, he asked to be relieved of his duties and given another assignment. Mayor Cass Hough named Sackett detective lieutenant of the department with emphasis on juvenile and truancy work. Acting on the recommendation of City Manager Al Glassford, Hough once more elevated Carl Greenlee to acting police chief.

In his letter to the commissioners, Sackett pointed out that the rapid growth of the city and his age and health made it important that a younger man be given the position as chief. Ironically, that was the conclusion Cheek and the four recalled commissioners had reached when they had asked Sackett to step down.

Sackett's supporters, however, undoubtedly saw a distinction between the 64-year old chief's voluntary admission, and what they envisioned as a cold dismissal of a veteran employee by the much younger city manager.

What conclusions are to be drawn from this interesting example of civic turmoil?

It is admittedly difficult for a person who was not a resident of the area when these events took place to grasp all of the nuances of the complex situation. Viewed with the perspective which comes with the passage of time, however, and with the emotional detachment possible when one was not a participant, it appears that:

•The commissioners badly misjudged the mood of a large segment of the population. They took no account of the adage which holds that "feeling is deeper than all thought."

•The voters, in their zeal to let Sackett have his remaining years in office, and to put the unpopular Cheek in his place, swept out of office some excellent men. The four commissioners were simply caught up in a tempest they never envisioned when they made what appeared to be a routine decision.

The Plymouth Recall of 1949 would make an excellent casebook for use by rising young politicians or potential city managers. One can see the questions posed for the students to ponder:

•Was there not some way in which the commissioners could have achieved the purpose of modern-

izing the police department short of firing its chief?

•Once the fat was in the fire, should the commission have bowed to the will of the populace and re-instored Sackett to office? Would this have cooled the ardor of those who wanted Cheek fired?

•Should both sides have agreed to

the arbitration proposed by Perry Richwine?

•Should the commissioners have left to the court's decision the validity of the charges against them instead of agreeing to the special recall election?

It is much easier to ask these questions than it is to answer them.

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Burroughs Corp. sets record year

Year-end and fourth quarter statistics for Burroughs Corporation, with a plant in Plymouth, show record revenues and earnings. Incoming orders and year-end backlogs were the highest in the company's history.

Revenue from worldwide operations in 1974 was more than \$1.5 billion, a 19 per cent increase over 1973. Rental and service revenue increased 18 per cent over 1973, while outright sale of systems and products increased 20 per cent. Good revenue growth came from both overseas and U.S. operations.

Net earnings in 1974 were nearly \$143 million, a 23 per cent increase. Net earnings per share for 1974 increased 22 per cent to \$3.66 on more than 39 million average number of

shares outstanding. In 1973 net earnings per share was \$3.01 on 38.5 million average number of shares outstanding.

Revenue for the 1974 fourth quarter was more than \$484 million, an increase of 24 per cent. Fourth quarter net earnings were nearly \$62 million, a 24 per cent increase. Per share earnings were \$1.58, compared with \$1.29 in the 1973 fourth quarter.

Incoming orders for the 1974 year increased 20 per cent. Worldwide backlogs at year-end set new record levels 27 per cent above 1973.

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Agardy hits for 28

Salem dumps Dearborn

The best tactic known to man in combating the slowdown, deliberate pattern game of a basketball foe such as Dearborn High is to go right to the front and stay there, which is exactly what Plymouth Salem did in running its season record to 9-1 with a 64-53 victory over the Pioneers.

"We showed 'em some razz-matazz tonight and played with authority," said Salem Coach Fred Thomann whose Rocks and Dearborn now share first place in the Suburban Eight at 5-1. Overall this was only the second loss of the campaign for Dearborn against eight wins.

ERIC AGARDY, Plymouth's 6-10 senior center, had his best night of the winter as he drove to 13 baskets plus a pair of free throws for 28 points in addition to hauling in 16 rebounds and blocking two shots.

"They tried to stop him with an individual man-to-man defense, and when that didn't work they went to a sag and then our other guys got hot from the outside," said Thomann.

The hottest of those outside shooters was guard Brian Wolcott who popped in five of his nine buckets in the fourth quarter to run his point total to

18 in a clutch performance that kept the Rocks squarely in the running for their second straight Sub 8 title.

Playing before a noisy full house in their home gym, the Rocks raced to a 13-2 lead in the first five minutes, getting four points from Agardy, three from Jim Ellinghausen and two each from Tim Dillon and Wolcott after the latter had scored on the opening tip-off.

WITH PLYMOUTH in command 17-10 after the first period, Dearborn was forced to play catch-up ball the rest of the night. Although the Pioneers cut the Rocks' lead to three points on four occasions, they never forged ahead. As a result, Dearborn's vaunted stall-and-shoot style of attack was left on the shelf.

Jim VanderHull, son of the Pioneer coach, kept his club in the battle as best he could with 21 points, but he was the only Pioneer in double figures, and in no way was Dearborn a match for Plymouth on the boards.

With Agardy's 16 rebounds and 11 more from Ellinghausen, the Rocks led in that department 37-25. They also benefitted from fine floor play by Dillon, Wolcott and Dan Moore as Thomann put these three guards in his starting lineup with good results. Dillon, who quarterbacked Salem to an unbeaten football season, made five steals and 10 assists as the triple guard offense gave the Rocks their best blend of height and quickness of the season.

With Agardy hitting on 13 of 23 shots from the floor and Wolcott going nine for 12, the Rocks shot 46 per cent for the night as they led at the half 32-26 and after three periods by 48-42.

VanderHull's three-pointer at the start of the fourth quarter cut it to 48-45 but it was never that close again as the Rocks turned it on for a quick 10 points on four baskets by Wolcott and a fifth by Moore. The lead finally grew to 15 points before Dearborn's Dale Wimmer canned two shots in the closing seconds.

In the Sub 8 it's now Plymouth and Dearborn 5-1, Belleville 4-2, Bentley 3-3, Trenton, Redford Union and Edsel Ford 2-4, and Allen Park 1-5 with a full league round on tap Tuesday.

The three-minute overtime saw both clubs remain scoreless for 2:19. RU's Kirk Young hit a field goal with 41 seconds left and Sweeney one with 18 seconds remaining.

Bentley's fate was sealed with a 23 for 58 showing from the floor and 12

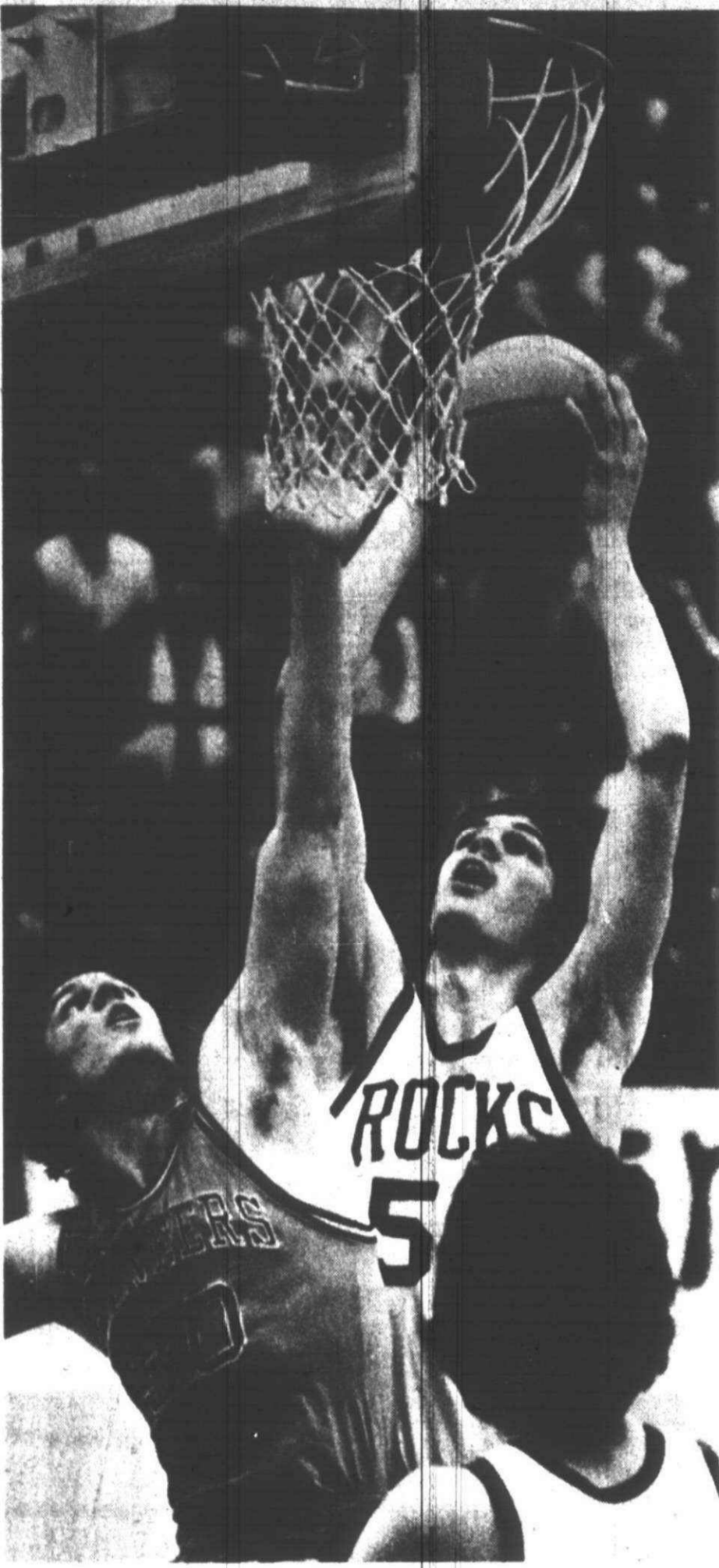
for 27 performance at the free throw line telling the story.

Westland John Glenn fought off a battling Thurston team, 63-55, to remain in sole possession of the Northwest Suburban League lead with a perfect 5-0 record and its 11th win in 12 games.

But it heard the footsteps of Garden City East's Panthers who got by a rugged Oak Park quintet, 40-38, on Greg Emery's last-second basket. East now stands 4-1, a game behind the Rocks.

Livonia Franklin was ripped, 51-32, by North Farmington and the Patriots and Oak Park Redskins dropped to 2-3 in Northwest Suburban League play.

Gordon Davis' Rockets were given a furious battle by the host Eagles. In fact, Thurston rode the scoring of

Dave Polodori, Cory Rodriguez and Tim Prokop to a 14-12 first quarter lead, despite four points each by George Roberts and Kirk Nagle of Glenn.

But then the big men for the Rockets, forward John Jesson and center Terry Johnson, went to work. With Johnson and Jesson sweeping the boards (they totaled 12 and eight for the game), Glenn came battling back.

Jesson fired in eight points, Johnson four and guard Mark Thweatt four in the second stanza while Thurston got six from Rodriguez and four from Dennis Graf.

Before Glenn finally took the lead in the first half at 24-22, the score was tied at 16-16, 18-18, 20-20, and 22-22. Glenn struggled to a 30-28 halftime advantage.

Still the Eagles were not done as Jeff Kryzwada notched the first bucket of the second half to again knot the count.

The Rockets' defense tightened then, holding Thurston to 11 third period points while John Jesson netted nine of Glenn's 18 quarter markers and 6-foot-5 George Roberts got five.

Jesson, carrying an 18-point average, hit on three key three-point-plays within a minute in the third quarter to give Glenn a 48-39 lead after three stanzas.

Jesson wound up with 19 points and Johnson bagged 18—10 of them in the final quarter as the Rockets pulled to a 12-point lead before settling for the final eight-point margin.

"It was the best defensive unit we've run up against all year," said

Davis after his team's 10th straight win, a school record.

Over at Oak Park, Center Greg Emery was again the hero for Billy Young's Panthers.

Galloping Greg hit a one-handed push shot from just inside the free throw line with three seconds left to break a 38-38 knot and give the Panthers their fourth win in five Northwest games.

The game, which gives East a 5-5 season mark, was close all the way. The visiting Panthers jumped to an 11-4 opening period lead and held a 23-15 halftime margin.

Then, with both Panther high scorers, Greg Emery and Jim Riley in foul trouble, Young slowed the game to a deliberate pace and each team managed only six points in the

third frame, for a 29-21 score.

The Redskins overcame deficits of 33-23 and 35-29 to knot the count at 38-38 on a driving jumper by Pat Sayles, who led his team with nine points.

Emery, who was playing with the flu and a badly bruised left elbow, pulled down 16 rebounds and blocked six shots in addition to sinking the winning bucket.

Riley scored 11 points to go with Emery's eight and Ken Tomaszewski's nine.

"Our kids played their hearts out," coach Young said.
