

Murder suspects jailed in Wyoming

PLYMOUTH—The search for three persons charged in the Jan. 28 murder of 22-year-old Terry L. Buchman has ended in Cheyenne, Wyoming. Albany County (Wyoming) Highway Patrol is holding Barry L. Provow, 27, his wife, Leslie, and Robert Umney, 24, pending extradition proceedings. According to Albany County Under-sheriff Donald Fritzen, the Plymouth-area trio was picked up around 10:30 p.m. Friday (12:30 a.m. EST) while driving a 1967 Pontiac with stolen out-of-state license plates. Fritzen said the car was stopped because it contained "young people with out-of-state plates." A check through federal

LEIN (Law Enforcement Information Network) records turned up the first-degree murder charge on Mrs. Provow, and the three were jailed after charges came through on Umney and Provow.

THE TRIO will be held at the Albany County Jail until extradition proceedings have been completed. According to a Wayne County Sheriff's department spokesman, the extradition procedure was scheduled to begin this morning (Monday). If the three waive extradition, they could be returned to the state in about a week. If extradition is fought, but later ap-

proved by Wyoming courts, the trio could remain in Wyoming for several weeks, or longer. Police are still piecing together the series of events that led to Buchman's death.

Buchman's friend, Lloyd Cash, 20, who was beaten by a shotgun butt during events leading up to the murder, told police that the whole incident revolved around an unpaid loan.

But acquaintances and relatives of the trio charged in the murder believe that drugs may have involved.

According to Detective Robert Pond, one of the Wayne County Sheriff's deputies investigating the matter,

Umney had been a known drug user. He was arrested in 1971 and convicted for "violation, use, and addiction to narcotics." He was placed on two years probation.

PROVOW has also been arrested for drug use, and his wife Leslie was, according to a knowledgeable member of her family, "heavily into drugs a few years ago."

When contacted, Umney's father, Rex, said, "You missed one point altogether: drug involvement." When pressed for further information, he said his statement was based on his "feelings about the matter."

According to detectives' accounts of Cash's statements, the incident involved neither the use nor sale of drugs.

Cash, 20, contends that the issue revolves around a loan of \$50 made sometime before the murder, and a ring given as collateral for the debt.

The loan was never completed, although the lender reportedly held Provow's ring. Cash and Buchman allegedly entered the deal as liaisons between the man who held the ring and Provow.

A scheduled meeting Jan. 27 between Provow and the lender fell through and the lender failed to show.

This incident allegedly prompted the abduction of Cash and Buchman, followed by Buchman's murder the following day.

CASH TOLD police that the loan was for \$50, but sheriff's detectives estimate the value of the ring at between \$300 and \$1,000.

According to both family members and detectives handling the case, Provow had a "hair trigger temper" and "liked to fight." Family members said Provow was arrested and convicted of assault in Ann Arbor, soon after he was paroled from Jackson

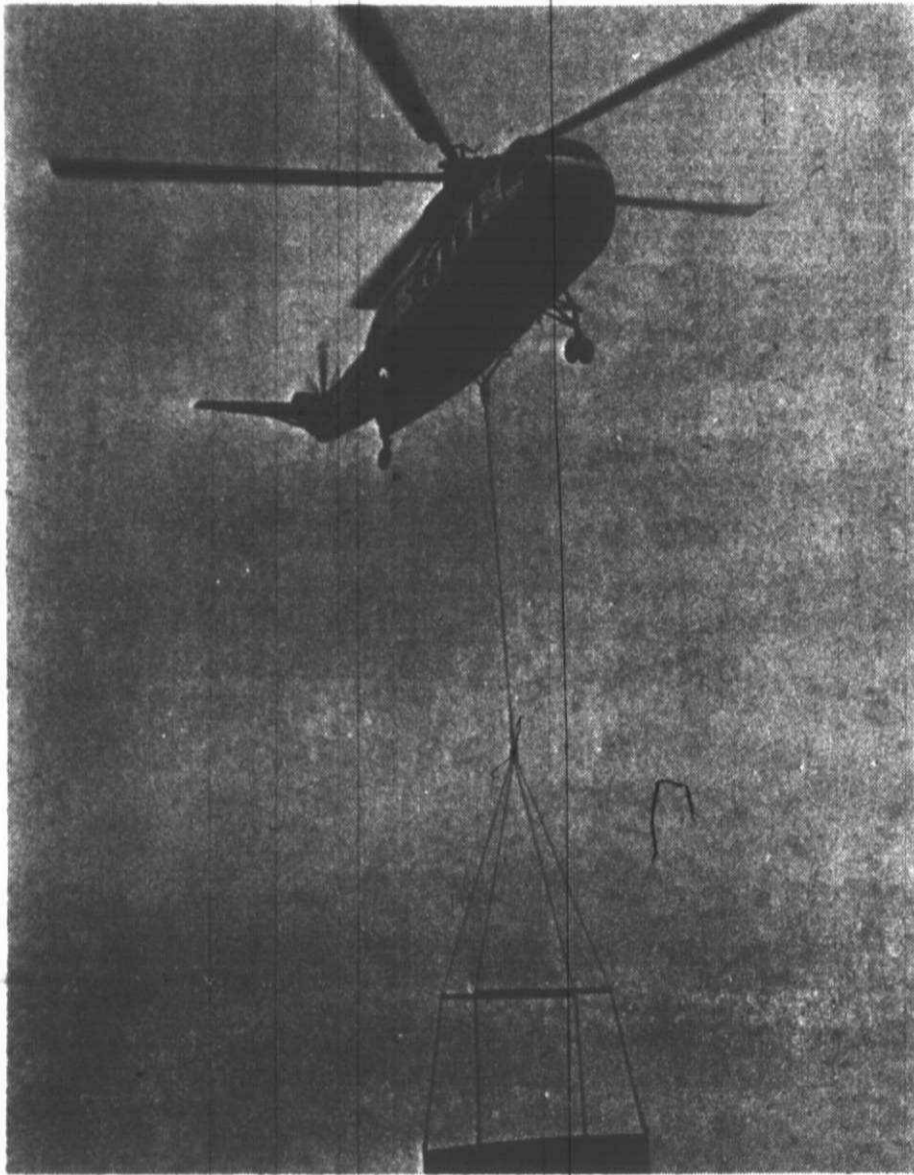

School board examines proposed teacher strike laws

PLYMOUTH—Four members of the Plymouth School Board will meet this morning (Monday) with other school district representatives at a conference of the Metropolitan Association to Improve School Legislation (MAISL) to present their ideas on new legislation governing teacher negotiations.

MAISL members, which include the Plymouth, Wayne-Westland, Livonia, Redford Union, Inkster, Taylor Center, Cherry Hill and Garden City school districts, will discuss points they would like incorporated into new teacher legislation to avert such strikes as occurred in the Chrestwood and Garden City school districts this year.

Gerald Dunn, who acts as a lobbyist for the MAISL group, will take the outcome of this morning's discussion to Lansing.

Plymouth School Supt. John Hoben, administrative assistant for personnel Norman Kee, school board secretary Marcia Borowski and school board treasurer Thomas Yack will present Plymouth's views on eight MAISL questions regarding teacher negotiations.

SCHOOL BOARD members met

Friday morning to discuss the eight points and reached general consensus on six:

- Binding arbitration on the last best offers of school boards and teacher unions should be the last step in teacher negotiations.

- Binding arbitration should be mandated when either a school board or teacher union requests it.

- New legislation amending Public Act 379, which prohibits strikes by certain public employees, should apply only to teachers, since teacher strikes create a different sort of impact than strikes of other employe groups.

- New legislation governing teacher negotiations should not include provisions of a statewide calendar year.

- New legislation should contain provisions for mediation and factfinding, if those bargaining processes are requested.

- Arbitration and factfinding hearings should be open to the public, but the mediation process should be open at the discretion of the mediator.

NO DECISION was reached on the legalized teacher strike, pending the outcome of MAISL's discussion, and no decision was reached on the penalties of a teacher strike, pending the outcome of MAISL's discussion on

binding arbitration and the legalized strike.

"We're looking for a piece of legislation that's evenly weighted," explained Yack. "It's got to have a balance, so that neither side is more powerful than the other."

The board's proposal to avert teacher strikes centers around the binding arbitration process.

Under binding arbitration, as proposed by the board, an arbitrator would select the last total offer of a teacher union or school board. No bargaining or exchange of economic issues would take place between the two offers.

"There are some games you can play by exchanging economic issues," Yack said. "We really can't see any other way to resolve the process (except through binding arbitration on the last best offers)."

Under the school board's proposal, a school board or teacher union could request binding arbitration as a last step in the bargaining process. Under current school legislation, both parties must agree to binding arbitration, before the process can begin, according to Yack.

New legislation, according to board members, should not outlaw media-

tion and factfinding in the teacher negotiation process.

UNDER MEDIATION, a state mediator attempts to create a compromise between the two parties involved. A factfinder researches the facts of both sides of the issue and makes his findings known.

"If you look at the state, you'll find the majority of school districts settle contracts before an impasse is reached," Yack said. "and they use mediation and factfinding as the vehicles. It would be a sad state of affairs if we outlawed the vehicle that works in the majority of cases."

Although the board ruled in favor of public hearings in the cases of arbitration and factfinding, it ruled against open mediation hearings, except when the mediator allows it.

A mediator discusses the issues in private in separate meetings with school boards and teacher unions, Yack explained, to try to effect a compromise.

"I think public hearings would destroy mediation," he said. "If meetings are open, no one's going to move."

Canton hopes actions will bring industries

CANTON—By a unanimous vote Tuesday night, the township board took action to encourage industry relocation into Canton.

The board passed a resolution stating that it would consider implementing Public Act 198 of 1974 which allows tax breaks for specific firms or geographic areas.

The act provides that certain areas in the township, either geographic, or where an individual plant might locate, could be designated industrial development districts. This would allow for a property tax break of up to 50 per cent for the first 12 years a plant was located in the township.

Any such redistricting, however, would have to be ratified by the state. According to Township Clerk John Flodin, the act, if implemented and ratified, would free new plants from half of all real property taxes. The building alone would be assessed at half the millage rate by the township, the county and the state. Personal property (inventory) and land, however, would be taxed the full amount. After 12 years, all real and personal property would be taxed fully.

Flodin added, "If we use this act it will make us competitive with other

areas seeking industry. I think there's a lot of merit in it.

Bart Berg, president of the Canton Chamber of Commerce, also spoke on the act during the meeting. "We fully endorse use of this act," he said. "I think it will help promote the township in the eyes of industry."

The act was passed into law in July

of 1974 and stipulates that a township may designate industrial development areas on its own or upon receiving application for redistricting from a firm considering

Flodin commented, however, "I can't imagine anyone not using it if a reputable firm applies for the redistricting."

Communities pool purchasing power

"Power buying" was the topic for the evening as representatives from Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton Township, Superior Township, and the Plymouth community schools met for the second time at the inter-governmental council.

Attending the meeting for the school board was Marda Benson, and she was named by consensus as the chairperson for future meetings. Other representatives were Supervisor Robert Greenstein of Canton Township, Plymouth city commissioners Norbert Battermann, and John Cummings, trustee Frank Millington of Plymouth Township, and trustees Diana Parks and Dick Innes of Superior Township. Absent from the meeting were representatives from Salem and Northville townships. Tom Abbott, purchasing agent for the schools made the presentation on "power buying" and stressed the savings that could be had for all through larger purchase orders.

ABBOTT SAID that if all orders for all the participating members of the council were added together, he could buy much larger quantities, and receive better prices for all.

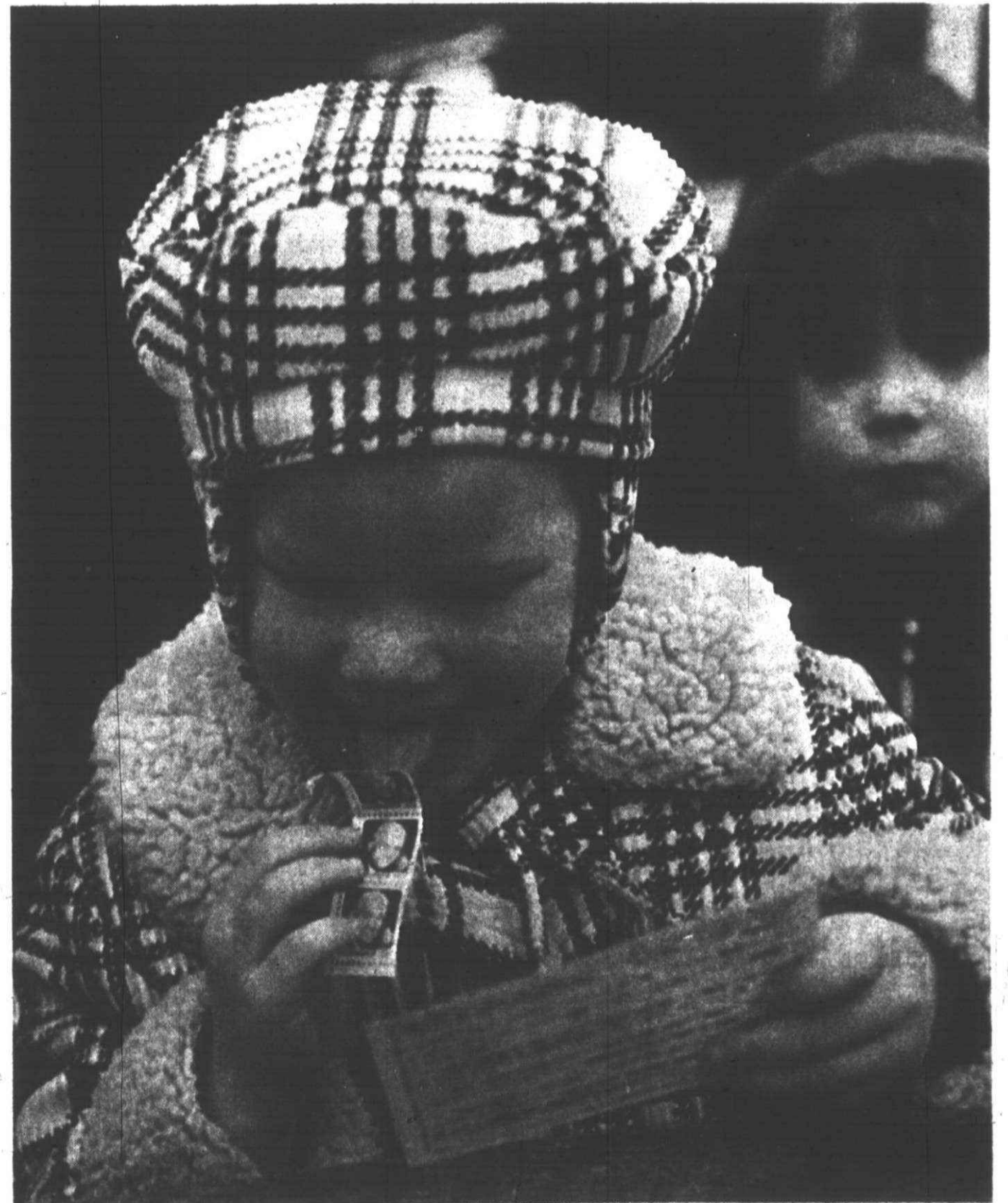
All the items purchased would be stored in the school's 6,700 square foot warehouse.

In return for the discount, members who joined in the buying program would be asked to pay a two per cent handling charge. The charge would go to the schools to cover their inventory and administrative costs.

Abbott explained, "Together, we would be bigger than Livonia as a buying unit." He listed many examples of the savings from cans of corn to salt and fertilizer.

Abbott's talk struck a cord in Millington, a purchasing agent for Cadillac Motors for 48 1/2 years. He responded, "I like this man, he's got his heart in it. Mr. Abbott, you've got real enthusiasm for your job."

MILLINGTON then added, "This is Continued on Page 3A

Phone workers aid deaf persons

"No one knows better than telephone company employees how important it is to hear."

"That is why Wolverine Chapter 10 of the Telephone Pioneers of America is trying to collect used hearing aids and batteries," said Chuck Micallef of Livonia, who works for Michigan Bell

Telephone Co. "We call it Project Huh? Members of this chapter will see that the hearing aids are repaired, if necessary, and given to an underprivileged person, who is hard of hearing or deaf. "The batteries will be sold for recycling, with the money to be used toward repair costs of the hearing aids."

"This makes them talking animals. You would be surprised how often a child will talk to a stuffed animal before he will talk with his parents."

LAST AUGUST the Wolverine chapter arranged a baseball game for blind players in Edward Hines Park.

"We put a beeper in a softball by using batteries," said Micallef. "Then we put batteries in a pylon which let out a big squeal when the kids hit the ball. They had to go to the pylon and turn off the beeper to score a run. "They went wild when they hit the ball!"

Spring planting topic for meeting

Gregory Patchan, Oakland County horticultural agent, will be the guest speaker at the Feb. 5 meeting of the Botsford Garden Club at 1 p.m. in the Carl Sandburg Library on Seven Mile Road, Livonia.

Patchan, also employed by Michigan State University's Cooperative Extension Service, will discuss spring planting and how to start a successful vegetable or flower garden. He will include tips on tree and shrub planting and care.

LIKE OTHER Pioneer members, Micallef believes those who most need hearing aids are elderly people who can't afford them.

"We will furnish them with a hearing aid if they need one," he said. "Or we will lend one out on a trial basis so that they can see if it will help them."

Micallef would like the used hearing equipment mailed or brought to him at the Michigan Bell offices, 11770 Merriman, Livonia. He will see they are taken to centers in the area which serve the deaf.

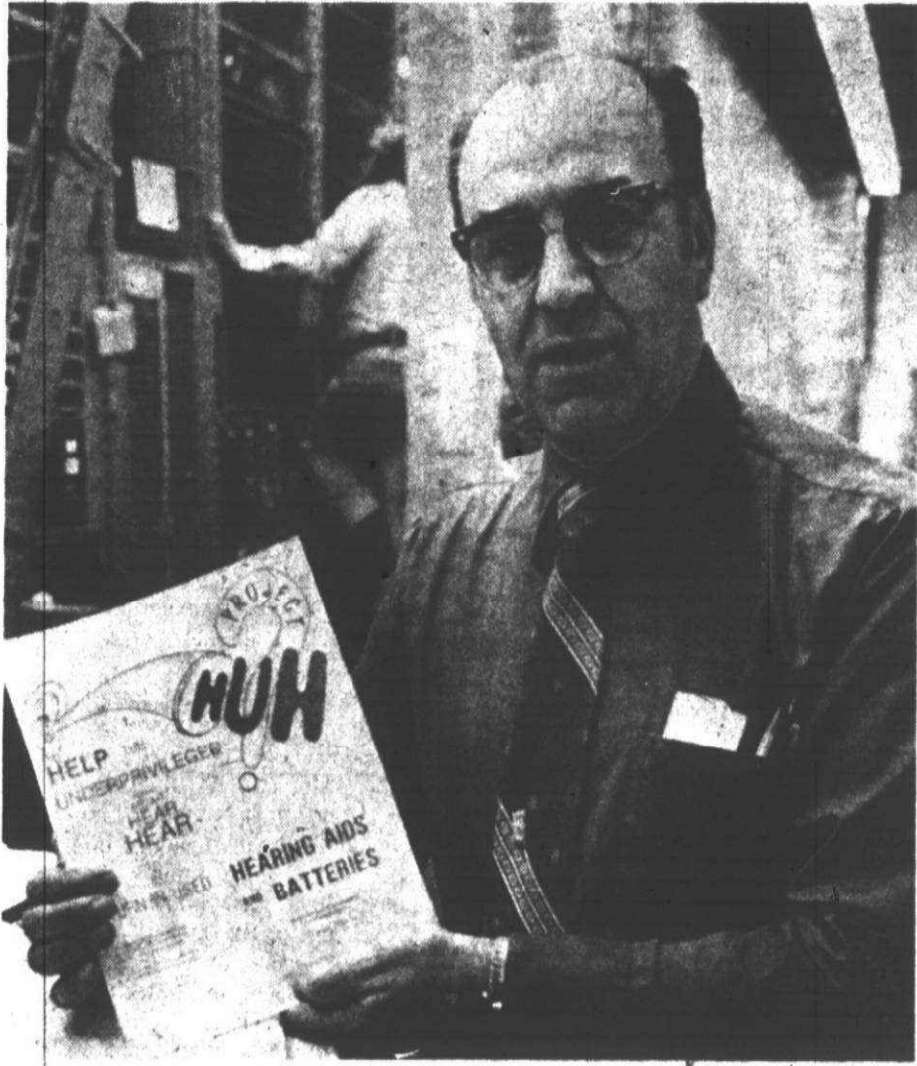
Micallef is publicity chairman for the fourth council of the Wolverine chapter of the Pioneers, whose members live in western Wayne County, Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and Monroe.

Pioneers are employees with 21 years of service with American Telegraph and Telephone Co. and its subsidiary companies such as Bell Telephone and Western Electric.

"I ENJOY being a Pioneer because we all help each other and we help other people," said Micallef, who works as a switchman.

Because of their knowledge of electronics, Pioneers often dream up good works involving their expertise.

"The Pioneers help organizations which work with the blind or the mentally retarded," said Micallef. "One way we do this is by placing transmitters in stuffed animals.

County adds stipulations on land deal

Although final steps have not been taken to approve the Schoolcraft College-Wayne State University consortium proposal for the former Plymouth State Home property, a Wayne County Board of Commissioners' committee has endorsed the plan in principal.

The consortium is a combined project of the two schools to use the property jointly for educational and community service purposes.

At a Jan. 28 meeting, the county Public Works Committee approved a motion by Commissioner Tom F. Taylor (D-Westland) to accept a task force recommendation of the consortium and to add five stipulations to any agreement between the county

and the consortium. They are:

- The consortium must be a registered legal corporation.
- The county retains power to appoint one-third of the corporation's board of directors.
- The county has annual audit rights.
- The cost of a county property coordinator stationed on the grounds must be paid by the corporation.
- The state must pay for relocating the driveway into the property should the county agree to sell the State Department of Mental Health 16½ acres for storage, parking and greenhouse facilities.
- There are automatically going to be some costs involved in implement-

ing the property arrangement, and I don't feel the cost should be borne by the county when the county is contributing such a valuable piece of property," said Taylor, whose district includes Garden City, explaining why the stipulations were made.

Details of any contract or lease have not been decided, although there have been suggestions of a \$1-per-year lease and a five-year automatically renewable lease.

The committee's endorsement of the consortium is now being studied by the County Board of Auditors and the Corporation Counsel.

a good idea because it's easier to save money than it is to make it."
Abbott replied, "Yes and it's easier to be honest than crooked. I can't tell you how many times vendors have offered me televisions and money to buy from them. I just tell them that if they want to donate to the schools that's fine—I've got a nice car—I don't need that stuff."
The way the intergovernmental council and Abbott view the buying

plan, Abbott would be the sole buying agent for all the municipalities. He would be responsible for the ordering and warehousing of all supplies.
All the representatives at the meeting seemed enthusiastic and after they report back to their respective governmental bodies, they will designate representatives to meet with Abbott and arrange the specifics of the "power buying" scheme.
The intergovernmental council will convene again Feb. 12 in the school board meeting room at 7:30 p.m.

Canton gets some costly news

CANTON—Three helpings of bad news were on hand for residents attending the township board meeting last week.
The board revealed that the lights on the Joy bridge over I-275 will be more costly. Sewer tap in fees are up, and a fifth lane on Sheldon north of Ford Road will have to be funded by the township.
Clerk John Flodin was informed of the cost increase when Edison officials told him that the electric company will not pay for the erection of the light fixtures—which cost about \$14,000 apiece.
The township was told previously the cost of the high power lights would be \$189 a month with Edison footing the bill for the construction of the light poles.

ever, and Supervisor Robert Greenstein doubts that they can be forced to pay for half of the bridge lighting.
Instead, Canton officials will check with the township's attorney and talk with state officials about a possible alternative solution for the bridge lights.
More bad news was in line for Canton residents when township engineer Glenn Roberts informed the board that the cost of sewer construction had risen radically and that tap-in fees should be increased to reflect that increased cost. Roberts asked

that the board increase the fee from \$3 to \$9 a foot.
He asked further that the change in fee schedules be made effective immediately to avoid a rush of tap-in applications under the old rate.
THE BOARD approved his suggestions by a 4-3 vote after some discussion on the morality of an immediate change in fee schedules, without informing the public.
The new tap-in fee became effective Wednesday Jan. 29.
The third helping of bad news came from Wayne County when they in-

formed the board that Canton Township must pay for a fifth lane on Sheldon Road between Ford and Warren if they want to add the additional lane.
The board had asked the county road commission to study the possibility of such a road widening and the county agency replied that since Sheldon was not going to be the major north-south artery in the township, they would not consider paying for the project.
Estimated cost of the fifth lane is \$76,000, a figure that Canton officials consider prohibitive.

CANTON OFFICIALS had hoped that Plymouth Township would share this bill, but were informed that the Plymouth Township Board had voted against the cost sharing plan at their Jan. 14 meeting.
Unfortunately, Canton Township is under court directive to pay for the lights. In December of 1973 when Canton took the Joy Bridge issue to court for the Holiday Park residents, one of Judge O'Hare's rulings was that Canton and Plymouth Township must share the tab for the bridge lighting.
Plymouth Township was never involved in the legal proceedings how-

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Charters, charter commissions and efforts to form a city compose a long dragged-out story in Plymouth Township's history.
Residents will cast their ballots on the acceptability of a new charter in August, 1976, but the election will not be the first of its kind in the township's history.
Residents east of McCumpha Road voted to cast off their township status to become the City of Plymouth Heights on Feb. 16, 1969.
But a city must have a charter, and subsequent efforts to adopt one have met repeated denials. Township residents have turned down five different charters in the last 14 years—in November 1960; July 1963; August 1966; March 1969; and March 1972.

into the City of Plymouth Heights.
"I kind of feel the people are getting ready to become a city," Richardson said. "I think this one is a real good charter."
The cityhood question will not be over, even if residents approve the recently drawn charter.
A sizeable chunk of the township, located west of McCumpha, is not included in the current cityhood question and upcoming charter election, since that portion of the township did not meet the cityhood requirement of 500 persons per square mile in 1959, Richardson said.
Although the population of the area probably meets the requirement by now, Richardson said annexation proceedings would be necessary to add the area to Plymouth Heights.

McEwen, who has run unopposed for Plymouth Heights mayor in all charter elections, has served as de facto mayor of Plymouth Heights since the first charter election in 1960.
All candidates for city offices on a charter election ballot lose their bids for office when the charter fails. The mayor, however, remains "in office" to prepare a petition for the next charter commission election.
"Fourteen years as mayor, and I haven't got a raise yet," joked McEwen, who retired from the township supervisor post four years ago.
Asked whether he will run for the mayor's post again, McEwen, 67, answered, "I don't know what I'm going to do. We'll have to wait to see what happens."

State Prison, where he was serving time for armed robbery.
Umney also served time on an armed robbery charge and is also out on parole.
In October of last year, Provow married Leslie Cassidy, who had a history of trouble herself.
Her mother described her as a "restless youth; always on the move to somewhere."
Leslie dropped out of high school as a sophomore in April, 1973, after running away from home on several occasions. One jaunt took her on a six-week trip to Florida and another to North Carolina.

The cityhood issue became a red hot item in 1958, when township officials feared the City of Plymouth would annex large chunks of their territory, according to Robert Richardson, chairman of the most recent charter commission, and John McEwen, former township supervisor and de facto mayor of Plymouth Heights.
At that time township was better able to ward off annexation attempts.
Despite the 1959 election, when voters agreed to the cityhood proposal, subsequent charter elections have lost by a landslide, according to McEwen.
"Voters turned down the charters," said McEwen, "because they don't want to become a city, apparently because of the increased costs. There's nothing cheaper than township government."
But voters could switch sides in the August 1976 election and transform more than half Plymouth Township

in Lansing have provided for a statewide calendar year, since many districts negotiate the calendar, Yack said. Teacher strikes leave the calendar question up in the air.
But Plymouth School Board members oppose the state-wide calendar, Yack said, since it would create difficulties for districts with year-round school.
THE BOARD held back decisions on the legalized teacher strike and penalties involved if a strike occurs, pend-

ing discussion of the issues at this morning's MAISL meeting.
"There are some who say 'Let's legalize teacher strikes,'" said Yack. "We're not sure we want to address ourselves to the problem until we (MAISL) discuss binding arbitration. If binding arbitration is the last step, there's really no step for a legal strike, (since the arbitrator's decision would be binding on both parties)."
If a school board or teacher union refused to accept the arbitrator's decision, a teacher strike would probably result, Yack said. Penalties could be levied against the side refusing to accept the arbitrator's decision.

Riding to socials for oranges—a highlight

Plymouthites of the 1890s had good appetites and plenty of locally-grown, undulterated food—a combination hard to duplicate in this age of tin cans and non-returnable bottles.

Mamie Conner tells us that she had baked duck for dinner on Oct. 14, 1890. The other references to food and drink in her journal are chiefly about party snacks. She ate plenty of popcorn, oranges, angel food cake and candy. She enjoyed the "candy-pull" at Eva Leach's on Oct. 20, 1892. "Had lovely candy," Mamie noted in her journal.

Mamie and her friends were also fond of watermelon, muskmelon, bananas and grapes. "Fried cakes," the earlier term for doughnuts, are mentioned frequently. When Mamie went to the Penniman's, in 1890, to see Kate's, Christmas tree, she was offered oranges and fried cakes.

ON ONE OCCASION in her journal, Mamie mentions paying 10 cents for some chestnuts, a tidbit relatively unknown in the United States since the chestnut blight swept across the eastern part of the country from 1900 to 1935. (The fungus disease which killed the huge trees with their flavorsome crop was inadvertently introduced into this country from the orient at the beginning of the century.)

Like the celebrated diarist, Samuel Pepys, Mamie usually recorded the time she went to bed. Just before

going to bed she usually wrote "ate onions." There was a belief at the time that onions induced sleep. Anyway, Mamie liked them. She often had onions and sardines, or onions and salmon for lunch.

On April 7, 1892, Mamie took some "vegetable oysters" to her friend, Eva Leach. A purple-flowered plant, usually known as salsify, vegetable oyster has a root with an oyster-like flavor. During 1892 there are also several references to bottled beer in the journal. On Aug. 18, when Mamie was on vacation at the Clifton House at Whitmore Lake, she noted "our case of beer came in the a.m. from Ann Arbor."

Socials were one of the diversions in Plymouth in the 1890s. On March 28, 1890, the Masons had a social featuring a male quartette and speakers from Detroit. On another occasion, Mrs. R. G. Hill invited Mamie to a "Mysterious Art Social" at her home. Miss Conner also went to the candy social held by the WCTU in February 1892.

OTHER EVENTS recorded in Mamie's journal include meetings of the FUN Club, a Negro camp meeting in Starkweather's Woods, a farmer's picnic at Whitmore Lake, and a magic lantern show.

As the resident of Plymouth today could not get along without the automobile, his counterpart in 1890 could not get along without the horse. Mamie Conner's journal contains frequent references to "riding with Eva in the surrey." On June 26, 1890, she drove to Northville and Novi in the "livery surrey." On July 30, Gusta Andrews "hired a livery" and took Mamie for a drive.

On another occasion Mamie walked to the "lower depot and rode back in the hack." On April 24, 1892, she went "riding with Czar's gray horses and light phaeton with Eva and Ed." Czar Penney's livery was located on Main, just south of where the Mayflower Hotel now stands.

There were problems in transportation even in those days. On Sept. 10, the wheel came off the carriage when Mamie drove to Northville. On an earlier occasion, her journal records, "Van Vleet's horse ran away."

On June 15, 1890, she notes that "Harry Robinson was kicked by a horse." Robinson ran a livery on Penniman Avenue, opposite today's post office. It was Robinson's "hack" that met all the trains.

DRIVING IN THE WINTER on snow-packed streets, behind a spirited horse festooned with musical bells, was a treat that went out with the advent of the automobile and its progeny, the salt truck. On Dec. 3, 1890, Mamie happily reported "first sleighing of the season." On Dec. 5 she enjoyed "a lovely cutter ride." On Feb. 16, and again on the 17th, Miss Conner went "cutting with friends."

On July 20, 1892, a new note was introduced into Mamie's journal. On that day she practiced riding her new bicycle at the Plymouth Fairgrounds. "I rode way around the track alone without falling off," she records with pardonable pride.

On Aug. 12, she received a gift of "a bicycle cap." Thereafter, she rode her bike to Novi and to Canton. On Sept. 20, she remarks that "Will Allen bought Kate a new bicycle—a Royal."

A trip to the lake was de rigueur in Plymouth in the 1890s as it is in Plymouth today. On July 4, 1890, Mamie skipped the Independence Day speeches in the Park in favor of a train ride to Island Lake, about four miles southeast of Brighton. She collected water lilies, fish and frogs, and had "an elegant time."

IN AUGUST, Mamie was back at Island Lake on her vacation. Bert Roe made a wooden chest for the "eatables." They fished, rowed, swam, walked into Brighton, and rode "the steamer with the Brighton folks."

Fishing in the 1890s was considerably more rewarding than it is today. On Saturday, June 25, 1892, Mamie dug bait and packed a lunch. On the following morning she was up at 5 a.m. and off in a double rig for Straits Lake. During the day, Mamie and her three companions caught no less than 70 fish.

The pleasures of Plymouth in the 1890s recorded in Mamie Conner's journal, may seem too simple a fare for many who live in the uninhibited, drug-tinged culture of today. As Oscar Wilde, a hippy of his own times, pointed out, however, "simple pleasures are the last refuge of the complex."

Citizen task force on negotiations bogs down trying to reach consensus

PLYMOUTH—A citizen task force, designed to recommend new legislation on teacher negotiations, met an impasse of its own Wednesday night, as discussion struggled toward consensus.

The task force, composed of parents, teachers and administrators in the Plymouth School District, was spearheaded by the Plymouth-Northville League of Women Voters to recommend school negotiation legislation to State Rep. William Keith (D—Garden City) and seven other members of his special house committee.

Keith asked the task force to place its recommendations on his desk by today (Monday), so his committee can recommend legislation to halt such teacher strikes as occurred this year in the Crestwood and Garden City school districts on Feb. 15.

BUT, AFTER a three-hour discussion at its second and final meeting Wednesday night, 24 members of the task force could only agree on three general points:

- If teacher strikes are to be legalized, there should be penalties involved.
 - Teacher unions or school boards can call for binding arbitration on the last best offer of unresolved issues, but binding arbitration is not to be mandated in new legislation.
 - The goal of teacher negotiations is to settle a new contract 90 days before the old contract expires.
- In addition, participants requested

an earlier state aid timetable, under which school districts would know how much state aid they would receive in the spring, when teacher negotiations would take place, rather than in the fall.

"I'm sure we all wish we could have something a bit more substantial," said discussion moderator Nancy White, a member of the League of Women Voters, "but there just isn't time. I think just our meeting and discussing this was a worthwhile exercise. I hope you all agree."

At its first meeting on Jan. 22, the task force defined its goal as "findings to which representatives of the various interest groups can generally agree."

PARTICIPANTS at that meeting agreed to the 90-day-contract-settlement date and expressed beliefs that a timetable for mediation or arbitration should be outlined, if a contract is not settled 90 days before the old one expires.

But participants at Wednesday's meeting, whose numbers and composition differed from that of the first meeting, could not agree on a timetable or reach total consensus on mandated binding arbitration.

Participants in favor of mandated binding arbitration threw in their hats as the clock drew close to 10:30 p.m., and a show of hands indicated a majority opinion opposed to the mandate.

Norman Kee, administrative assistant of personnel for the Plymouth Community School District, was among participants opposed to man-

dated binding arbitration in new legislation governing teacher negotiations.

MANDATED binding arbitration, Kee maintains, acts as a deterrent to progress in negotiations. Binding arbitration should be used as a last resort.

"Both parties are hesitant to get in a position that may be damaging in arbitration," Kee said.

School board trustee Carl Berry added, "If we require arbitration, why bargain at all?"

Don Tripp said, "Contracts should be settled 90 days before the old one expires. How they get there should be these big adult people's baby."

School board secretary Marcia Borowski disagreed and led the camp in favor of mandated binding arbitration.

"I would agree that it's not desirable to go to arbitration," Mrs. Borowski said, "but I think if you can't settle a contract, you should mandate arbitration."

THE STRONG INPUT of teacher unions and school boards into the make-up of the arbitration panel should guarantee that issues of both sides are considered, she said.

But, Mrs. Borowski said, binding arbitration should not be tied to a specific date, since different districts have different calendars.

"I don't know when we should move to arbitration," she said.

Another participant agreed. "I think, in reality, it's unrealistic to put all these districts on a timetable with a limited amount of mediators and arbitrators available," he said. "In reality, there's not that many men. I think to try to get into the details of the process is impractical. I think negotiations proceed at different paces."

Mrs. Borowski moved that penalties be attached to teacher strikes, now illegal under the Public Employment Relations Act 379, if they are legalized under new legislation.

Asked whether penalties would cover school boards as well as teachers, Mrs. Borowski said, "If the district cares about the education of its children, that's penalty enough."

"Short of fining board members—and I don't think people should have

to have adequate funds to cover fines to run—I don't know any way to penalize a board."

Tripp agreed. "I think the penalties on everyone are great now," he said. "Penalties on the board members are tremendous, even if they're not a father or mother of a child in school."

The meeting was adjourned without specifying what penalties would be levied against teachers or school boards in cases of strikes. Participants failed to outline a schedule of action, if a contract is not settled within 90 days of the old contract's expiration date.

"The whole thing is, we're trying to tackle a huge problem," said Tripp, while other participants called the 90-day requirement a hoped-for ideal.

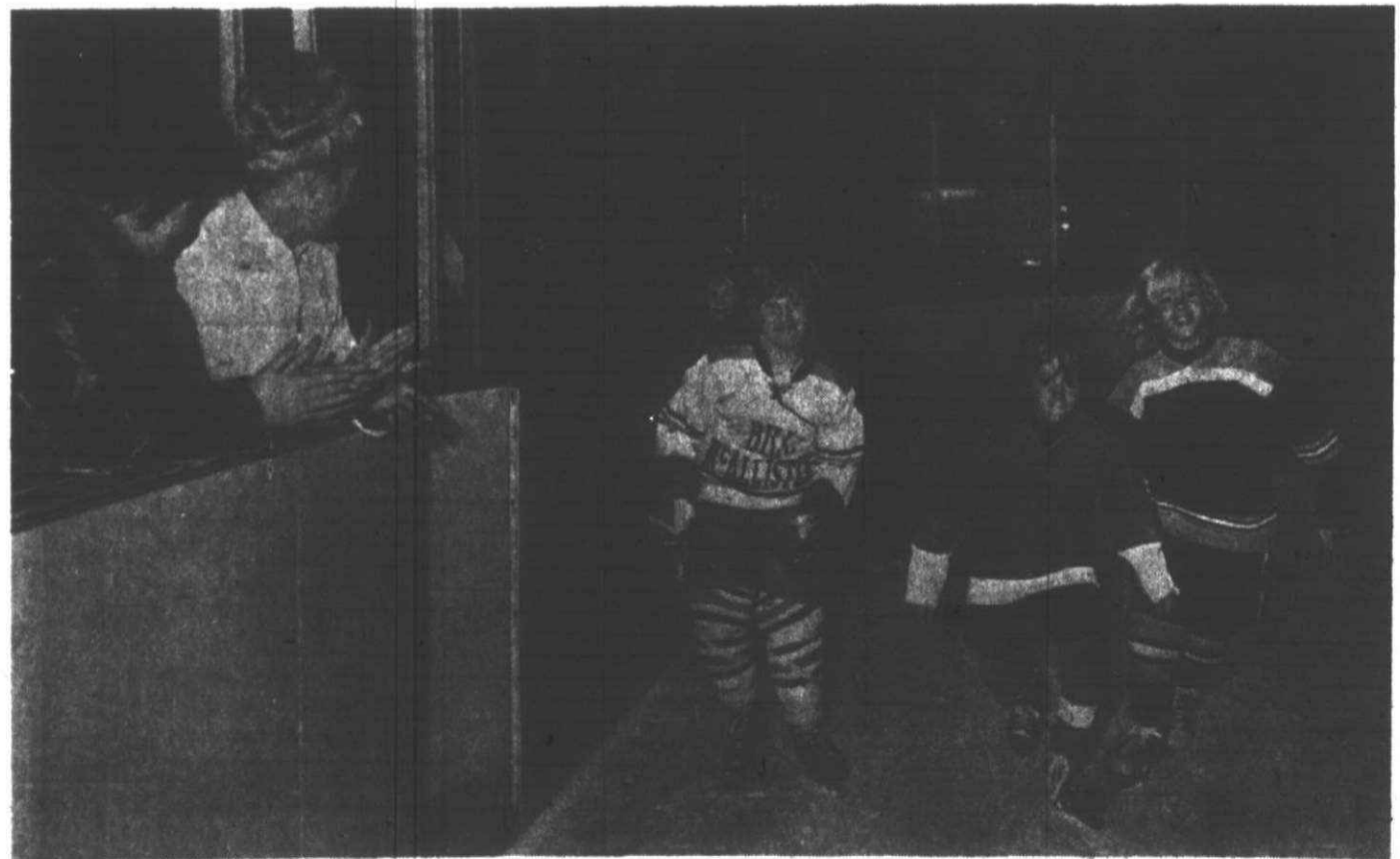
Students study in England

Adults play music to beat the band

At Radcliff Junior High in Garden City, Dale Werner is the band director. In the larger community, he's the music man who five years ago decided to form the Garden City Concert Band.

From the beginning Werner, a Livonia resident, saw the band as a non-profit outlet for adults who like to make music. After the idea jelled in his mind, his first problem was to recruit musicians—a concert band just doesn't materialize with the wave of a baton.

Werner chose a humble, but workable way to begin. He offered an adult education class in band. Some of the original 40 who joined the band class had music backgrounds, some were band parents who joined with a little coercion, many had never played a musical instrument before.

From this incongruous assortment, Werner built a band which made its debut under his direction at a Radcliff Junior High School band concert four months later.

Jim Falk of Garden City, trumpet player and business manager of the band, and one of the original members, says of that debut, "It took a lot of guts to get out there before those kids after four months."

Only about 10 of the original members are still playing with the present 65 piece band which Werner says has developed to the level of a good high school band.

Practice is held each Tuesday evening in the Radcliffe band room, unless there is a concert that night. Werner likes to schedule concerts on the regular rehearsal night.

He says, "I look at the band as an outlet for people who want to play. A great many people like to play pop and show tunes."

His programs frequently include traditional band marches, musical comedy selections, light classics, or maybe some Chicago or Simon and Garfunkel compositions. He stays away from hard rock, but says some of the popular music being written now is very good—as well as difficult to play.

Although \$1,000 of the annual \$6,000 operating budget comes from the Garden City Council, the band welcomes musicians from all the neighboring suburbs. Practically all—Livonia, Plymouth, Redford, Westland and Dearborn—are represented.

The age range of the musicians is as diverse as their home towns and musical experience. Werner says he fills in with some of his better junior high musicians. About half are young adults just out of high school and the rest run from 20 to 70 in age.

"We're open to new members," says Werner, "and right now we're short on flutes and we need a percussionist. Most people who want to play with us are not turned down."

Those interested are invited to attend the Tuesday evening rehearsals in the band room of the junior high on Radcliff south of Ford Rd., west of Venoy.

The band usually gives a series of three concerts per year in Garden City. The first winter concert was held earlier this month. Because one of the goals is to encourage participation in and appreciation of music, the band members agreed to give a special prize this year. All Garden City instrumental students who help sell tickets to the concerts may put their names into a hopper. The one chosen will receive up to \$500 toward the purchase of an instrument of his choice.

"We're doing this for a couple of reasons," says Dick Cywinski, band president. "We want to do whatever we can to supplement the fine music program in the Garden City schools. We also want students in Garden City and surrounding communities to be aware of our organization. We would like more of them in our band after high school."

Whenever it's convenient and they are invited, the band plays concerts in other communities and the ticket sale money goes to the sponsoring organization. The band played at Livonia's "Under the Stars" summer concert series last year, and played in Taylor last week.

To keep their treasury in the black, the band members sponsor dinner dances with live music furnished by the Metro West Big Band, a 17 piece dance band made up of concert band members.

All money from the dance band bookings goes into the concert band treasury.

Dale Werner, Garden City's music man, doesn't have quite 76 trombones, but he does believe in sharing the enjoyment of music.

While belonging to the Garden City Concert Band isn't guaranteed to keep the musicians away from the pool halls, it does make life a lot more fun for all involved.

The carnival atmosphere will include dancing to the Soraenbrecher, and the best costumes will win prizes.

The American equivalent of fasching is the Mardi Gras. Fasching, however, is celebrated throughout the entire German countryside.

The fasching season officially begins on the 11th day of the 11th month (November), 11 minutes and 11 seconds after the 11th hour and ends on Ash Wednesday.

Nightly costume balls start after the Christmas season, and their numbers rapidly increase as the last week-end before Lent draws near.

A parade is usually held on Rosemontag Monday, serving as a reminder that the season soon will end and calling to those still fit to participate.

Fasching Tuesday, the day before

Lent begins, is not too productive for German office workers. Office parties start after morning coffee, and by 2 p.m. offices are often deserted. Every one heads for the old village square for street dancing, long snake dances and frequent refreshment.

Esch meets with Milliken

U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) recently met with Governor William Milliken for a discussion to make sure the unemployed in Michigan are getting the chance to "get back to work."

The meeting brought together those who drafted and guided the special Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) through Congress last year, federal officials responsible for administering the program, the governor, and local officials directly involved in the day-to-day functioning of the program.

BOTH ESCH and Milliken regarded the meeting as a chance to review changes which may be necessary either through new administrative

rules, amendments to the Act, or improved intergovernmental cooperation.

Esch, whose 2nd District includes Livonia and Plymouth, was one of the principal architects of the CETA program designed to create 300,000 public service jobs.

"It is our responsibility not only to pass legislation," Esch stressed, "but to determine what problems there are in administering the program. We want to make certain the fundamental intent of the program is being carried out expeditiously."

"There is no excuse for an unemployed person in Michigan not receiving either unemployment benefits or having a job. The legislation passed

last December provides that every individual who is unemployed and who has worked for at least 14 weeks can receive unemployment benefits."

ESCH ALSO said the meeting represents his strong feelings that Washington officials should meet more on the "home front" to discuss legislative issues and to create better understanding and cooperating.

The new program should make available about \$100 million to Michigan and local governmental units (when combined with provisions of the Employment Act of 1973) to hire unemployed workers for public service jobs, he explains.

"There is a great deal of work to be done in our communities, in our parks, on our streets and roads. Funds have been put out to the local officials for the purpose of employing the unemployed. We want to know if those funds are being used for hiring, and if not, why not?"

"We who represent Michigan in Congress are trying to find ways to turn the auto industry around and get persons back on their regular jobs."

"For this reason, I have introduced legislation to provide for a \$250 tax rebate on new car purchases."

Dumas charges court with bypassing policy

Wayne County Commissioner Mary Dumas (R-Livonia) has charged the new presiding judge of Wayne County Circuit Court with circumventing the policy of the board on housing of the courts.

She charges that Presiding Circuit Judge James N. Canham has directed two former common pleas judges who became circuit judges to retain their common pleas court quarters in the City-County Building.

Last October the board directed that space be leased in the downtown Lafayette Building for the five additional circuit judges who took office Jan. 1.

In so doing, the board rejected a plan sponsored by the Michigan Supreme Court to consolidate the 33-judge circuit bench in the City-County Building.

tatives agreed the board's proposal was an acceptable solution — although not ideal in the opinion of the circuit court.

After that agreement, the board of commissioners authorized an appropriation not to exceed \$554,700 to design the new court facilities in the Lafayette Building to suit the specific needs of the circuit court.

Judge Canham's actions not only circumvents the board's policy, Mrs. Dumas says, but also "will have the effect of setting aside the long range plans of the board for permanent court facilities, including establishment of an out-county branch of the circuit court to serve those 50 per cent of the Wayne County residents who reside outside the City of Detroit."

She added that: "It has long been the concern of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners that the courts at all levels are invading and setting aside the legislative prerogatives of this and other law-making bodies and are, in fact, making law by dictate of the courts."

MRS. DUMAS made her allegations in a letter in which she told Board Chairman Roscoe L. Bobo (D-Ecorse) that she will recommend appropriate action at the next meeting of the board on Feb. 6.

The two former common pleas judges who retained their courtrooms after becoming circuit judges are Irwin H. Burdick and Andrew DiMaggio.

DiMaggio was elected circuit judge last November and Burdick was appointed by Gov. Milliken in January.

Mrs. Dumas points out that Judge Canham's decision for these two circuit judges to remain in the common pleas court building will require moving at least two of the common pleas judges to the Lafayette Building.

MRS. DUMAS ALSO states that, after months of discussion, the circuit court, common pleas court, State Supreme Court and court union represent-

Mexican Fiesta begins with tortillas

A Mexican fiesta wouldn't be complete without a delicious assortment of tortillas, enchiladas, refried beans and other spicy, ethnic favorites.

In conjunction with the Plymouth Community Arts Council's presentation of the National Dance Company of Mexico in "Fiesta Folklorico," on Saturday at Plymouth-Salem High School, Miriam Waterhouse of Plymouth decided to plan a dinner party a la Mexicana. It also was a good opportunity to enlist the help of her friend, Esperanza Barreiro, a native of Mexico City, who is presently living in Farmington Hills.

Mrs. Barreiro's husband is on assignment with Ford Motor Company, and the family expects to be in the United States for about two years.

The two women met while Mrs. Waterhouse's husband was working in Mexico for Ford Motor Company.

Before the dance company's performance, the Waterhouse and Barreiro clans, and a few neighbors and friends, will enjoy an assortment of Mexican cuisine including guacomole, tacos, enchiladas, Sangria and a variety of desserts.

For the Barreiro family the dinner is a special treat. Mrs. Barreiro says she seldom serves her family the traditional Mexican dishes.

"We generally eat a lot of meats, salads and vegetables, much like the typical American family."

She adds, while living in Mexico the family's diet was much the same as it is now, with the exception of the tortilla—a thin, flat, corn meal pancake.

"In Mexico tortillas are made and sold fresh every morning at the local corner shops," explains Mrs. Barreiro. "It is the basic staple from which a lot of Mexican dishes begin."

The tortilla recipe used by Mrs. Wa-

terhouse and Mrs. Barreiro includes Masa Harina (special corn flour, available at specialty stores), warm water, salt and some all-purpose flour. Mrs. Barreiro uses a tortilla press, which she purchased in Mexico City, to insure a perfect tortilla.

While living in Mexico City, Mrs. Waterhouse's family developed a taste for many Mexican dishes, in particular Enchilada Suiza, a tortilla pastry stuffed with chicken and baked in a cream and cheese sauce.

The family also enjoys a variety of tacos, tortilla pastry filled with any combination of meats, chopped tomatoes, shredded lettuce and cheese, and either chicken and cheese enchiladas.

Mrs. Waterhouse never runs out of recipe ideas because while living in Mexico she invested in a collection of cookbooks and stocked up on Mexican delicacies not available in this country.

Besides the ethnic fare Mrs. Waterhouse has planned several decorations to add to the international flavor. Menus in Spanish and English will be placed on bark prints next to each table setting. A pinata and the Mexican "Tree of Life," a candelabra type of ornament will grace the dinner table.

For dessert Mrs. Barreiro will prepare a special Mexican rice pudding, served with a sweetened Mexican coffee.

What will the fiesta be like? "Muy gusta," (very good) Mrs. Barreiro says with a smile.

ENCHILADAS SUIZA

Tortilla Dough

2 cups Masa Harina (special corn flour) available in specialty stores
1 and one-third cups warm water
Pinch of salt
1 teaspoon all-purpose flour

Combine the ingredients and round into a ball. Take a piece of dough, about walnut size, and place between two pieces of plastic in a tortilla press.

Or use frozen tortilla dough available in many local stores.

Heat frying pan and place tortilla in pan, turn and cook on both sides until pastry puffs up and is very soft and pliable.

To continue with enchilada recipe:

Place tortilla in a frying pan with heated oil. Turn tortilla once, then dip in either coffee cream or whipping cream to coat the pastry. Place cooked cubed chicken in tortilla and roll up.

Place tortilla with folded side down in baking dish and pour Mexican green sauce (also available in gourmet or specialty stores) over the top. Green sauce is very spicy and made from green tomatoes.

Shred mozzarella cheese and onion over top of tortillas. Pour remaining cream over the top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until bubbly. Serve with a green salad or refried beans.

MRS. BARRIEIRO'S MEXICAN RICE PUDDING

Boil 2 cups regular long grain rice. Cover and cook for about 20 minutes.

Add 2 quarts of milk and 1 stick of cinnamon and 1 tablespoon of vanilla, and bring ingredients to a boil.

Put enough sugar to taste while cooking so that sugar has a chance to dissolve.

Mix ingredients and place in a casserole dish. Sprinkle powdered cinnamon and top with about 1 cup of raisins. Prepare this dish in the morning so it has a chance to set.

Serve pudding cold.

The auto crisis

In the midst of discussing the crisis in the automobile industry at lunch the other day, the old rural philosopher who had been maintaining strict silence suddenly pushed aside his plate and remarked, "The trouble isn't too surprising—we have just been making too many cars."

"Too many cars!" several diners exclaimed. "What do you mean?"

The old philosopher smiled and countered, "That's just what I said. We've been building about nine million passenger cars a year. We've cluttered the highways with them—despite the high costs—and now we must pay the price."

"When you build that many cars each year there's bound to come a time when you reach a peak. I don't think this ever again will be a nine million car country."

THE LISTENERS sat, rather stunned for a moment, yet they knew the old philosopher usually had a good grip on conditions.

What did he think was going to happen?

"Well," he said, "when a fellow eats too much he gets a pain in the stomach. And the more pain he suffers the more he learns that overeating can be a lot of trouble."

"We've been overbuilding" he went on, "and now we must suffer the aches. And I don't think they can be cured until we realize we should cut back to about six million cars a year—and then build them better!"

"If we reduce the number, more time could be spent on them and we wouldn't hear of such things as calling them back by the thousands to correct some fault that should have been found in the factory. Our highways wouldn't be so cluttered up and we would have fewer accidents."

BY THE TIME the old philosopher stated his case he had just about convinced everyone at the table that, at least, he was on the right track. It was freely admitted that we couldn't go on at a nine-million-a-year clip—and that something had to give, just as it has in the past few months.

As he sat there, listening, The Stroller was taken back to his sports writing days and the memory of a dressing room scene in Tiger Stadium. It was the year when Joe DiMaggio, now the TV coffee man, won the centerfield job with the New York Yankees to follow in Babe Ruth's footsteps.

During the spring training and the first month of the season Joe was hitting at a great clip. He was away above the .400 mark and was the talk of the league. Then came a slump, and as, as they say in baseball, he couldn't buy a hit.

He was moaning about his slump this afternoon in the Yankee dressing room when the late Lou Gehrig, a great hitter himself, called Joe over to his locker and talked to him like a father.

"You're not a .400 hitter," he said

Some years ago when Chick Harbert's father was the pro at the Battle Creek Country Club he found a way to keep the playing members satisfied.

Instead of having a score card with a par of 72 for each member, he came up with a new idea.

He devised a scorecard for each bracket. When you reported and told him you were an 80 shooter, he'd give a score card with a par of 80. In this fashion you never ran the risk of over-trying. You left as a satisfied customer.

So maybe the old philosopher is right. Maybe we should realize that we are not a nine million a year car country—and shape our future at say, six million.

It may be the cure for that pain we've had of "over indulging" when it comes to automobiles.

Canton serious about sports

Editor:

On several occasions this year I have been urged by students, parents, and friends to write a letter to the editor to our local papers.

I have resisted this temptation because I felt the complaints of improper coverage and unequal coverage as compared with other area schools was a part of the growing pains of Plymouth Canton High School.

I felt it was the prerogative of the Observer & Eccentric to choose how they would cover our sports program and where the stories would appear in the paper. I still believe this.

I am writing at this time, however, because I feel your sports editor, Tom Donoghue, took an unnecessary and unjustified slap at the athletes and coaches of Plymouth Canton High School in the Jan. 9 edition of the Observer & Eccentric.

In his column, Mr. Donoghue "wishes" for Canton to become serious in athletics during 1975. I take serious exception to this statement.

I feel our athletes and our coaches are serious and dedicated in their pursuit of athletics. I feel this has been demonstrated in virtually all sports. Last spring, without a senior, the basketball team finished second in conference play and defeated the eventual state Class A champion, Livonia Churchill. This fall, though their season record was not too good (3-7), the varsity football team finished tied for second (three wins, two losses) in the Western Six suburban League. The freshman team went undefeated.

Our girls' basketball team finished second in conference play and was the only team to defeat the championship team. Our swimmers are above the .500 mark, the basketball team is at .500 at the time of this writing.

Incidentally, I notice that Mr. Donoghue ranks them seventh in Observerland. Last year (remember, no seniors) we had five athletes and a relay team qualify for state meets. So you see, Mr. Donoghue, Canton doesn't have to get serious—it already is serious about athletics.

In addition to being a new school and without tradition and without a gym or a pool, we are also the smallest school in our conference. We have less than 1,500 students in grades 9-12. Churchill's enrollment is more than double this number with about 2,600 plus students in grades 10-12. Salem's enrollment is nearly 2,200. It's tough living in their shadows and discouraging to be constantly compared with their successful teams.

I'm proud of our athletes and our coaching staff's accomplishment.

In conclusion, I feel that Mr. Donoghue's comment was in poor taste.

We need support, not unfounded criticism.

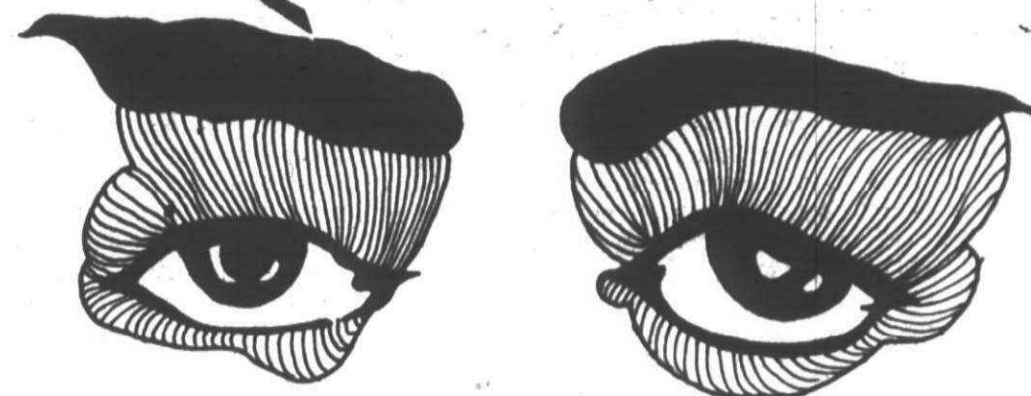

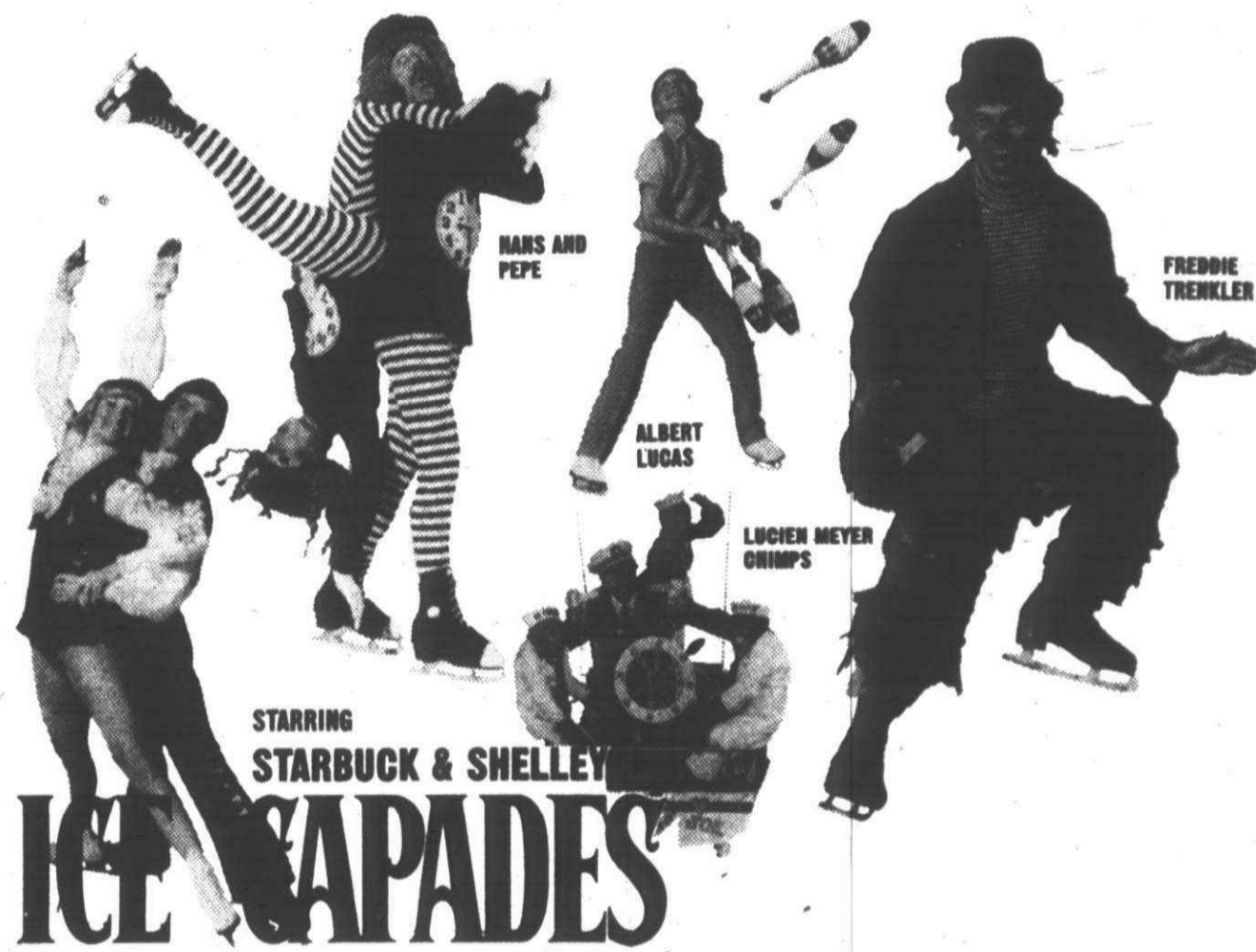

Laid off? Worrying about costs? You may be taking it out on the kids

Parents who feel abused by the current economic situation are likely to become abusive with their children, says a counselor at Methodist Children's Village in Redford Township. "Because they feel they can't control their economic lives, parents are feeling frustrated and angry," said Bruce Binstok, treatment coordinator for the residential center. "This spills over onto their children. "If the parents' own needs aren't being met, they just can't meet the needs of their children."

Binstok noted that parents seem more angry with their children, more physically and emotionally abusive.

"I think in the coming period we will see more child abuse, and more marital problems because of economic stress," he said. "We will also see more drinking and stealing on the part of adults. Acts of violence will increase because of the rising frustration and anger over the employment situation."

DAVID ANDERSON, outpatient social worker at Children's Village, added that parents are more apt to react to the normal things children do

with less patience, tolerance and understanding when there is an economic crunch.

"Reaction to children's actions will be extreme," he said. "There might be an 80 per cent reaction, where there was a 20 per cent one before. Parents are more likely to use a cannon when a pop gun would be sufficient."

"They carry it to an extreme because they feel they don't have control of their lives and they feel desperate."

Anderson noted that parents identify strongly with their work. "They tell

themselves they are a working person, so an unemployed father may ask himself, 'Without work, who am I? What is my value?'"

"That is more devastating than the money thing," Anderson added.

BINSTOK SECONDED the statement of his associate.

"Adolescents always have to test out what parents say," he observed. "Told to be in at 11 p.m., the child may not come in until early that morning. The general reaction would be to ground him for a couple of days."

"Now the parent will overreact because it is just one more area he can't control. There will be more physical reactions, in the form of pushing and shoving."

DURING THEIR PARTICIPATION in the counseling program at Children's Village, both men see many different families who are experiencing stress, strain and verbal battles.

"When you don't have the money to get what you value and think important, then how you feel about yourself and your abilities will be put in jeopardy," Binstok said.

"I don't know how much marital stress is caused by hard times. But I do know that if there is already marital stress, the financial situation will intensify it."

When families come in with a child, Binstok said, they often seem overly concerned about the behavior of the child.

"As the discussion goes on, it becomes clear that it is not so much what the child is doing that is troubling them, but that they are not equal to dealing with his actions," he added.

"Then I begin to see their feeling of loss of control and the evidence of things happening between the parents. It is clear that when the husband comes home he is not happy because of pressure from work."

BINSTOCK SAID the husband then may start talking about the three men who have been laid off at his office and the fact that he has been demoted and he's having a hard time meeting bills.

This may be news to the wife, he added, because "the husband tries to protect the family from such news and he hasn't dealt openly with her."

"The wife then says she thought something was wrong because her husband had been yelling that she was spending too much money," Binstock went on.

"We try to work out some kind of communication and balance between them. If they allow themselves to share a burden, they are better able to cope with it."

BINSTOK BELIEVES families are more apart today and for this reason: are less able to deal with bad times than families during the depression of the '30s.

"Families were together more then," he said. "There was more interaction and give and take. Grandparents and relatives were more together and people worked out relationships with each other. Now when they are more apart, they are not as helping."

Binstok observed that the lack of money is giving people second thoughts about having the counseling they need. "Now when they call, their

first question is not when can we have our first meeting, but how much will it cost," he said.

More people are asking that their fee be adjusted, he noted, adding that "currently the fee is set on a sliding scale based on ability to pay."

IN ADDITION to the counseling program in which both Binstok and Anderson participate, Children's Village (known formally as Methodist Children's Home Society) offers a number of other services.

"We have an adoption center and a unwed parent service," says Binstok. "We also have a day care center for children of working parents. It is for youngsters from two and a half to five years old and is open five days a week from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m."

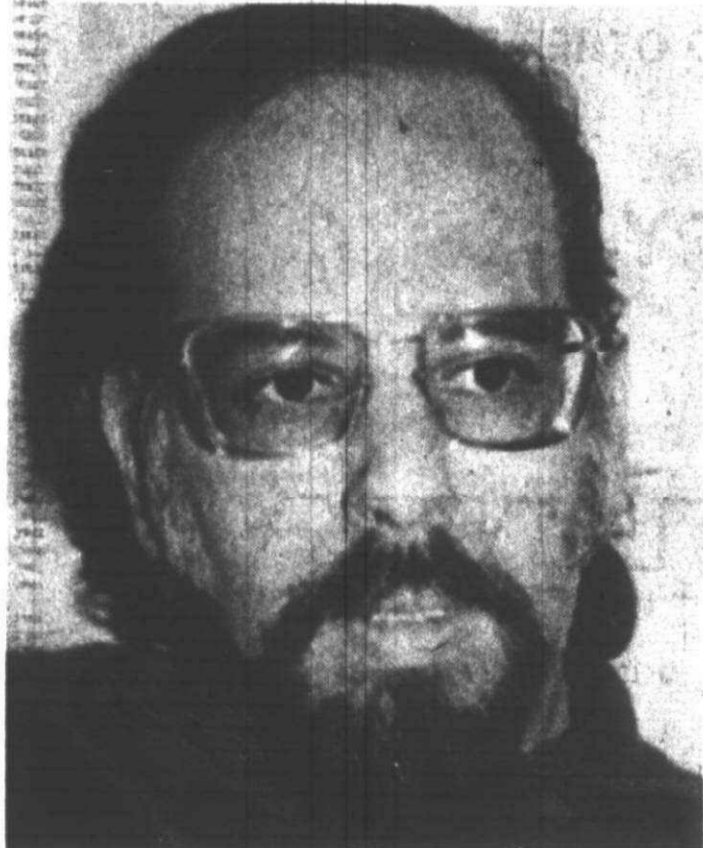
The Methodist organization also hosts two special programs for outside groups. One is the alternative education program for junior and senior high school students, called ACE of the Redford Union School District.

The other is a special school program for emotionally disturbed children sponsored by the Wayne County Intermediate School District in cooperation with the Redford Union district.

In addition, a special unit recently opened for children, who have severe mental retardation problems.

Children's Village is supported by an endowment fund.

Anderson will be offering counseling advice to divorced mothers in mid-February in a course to be given at the Dearborn YMCA, 19500 Ford Road.

There's magic in that Western YW program

You might think of magic as a common ingredient in two new sections of the Western Wayne County YWCA program.

Children are learning magic tricks in a weekly classes recently started in the busy headquarters at 26729 Michigan, Inkster.

And a lady well versed in the dos and don'ts of a wedding is ready to help brides in this area turn their big days into a truly magic one.

Both Magic for Children, taught Tuesday afternoons by Carlo the magician (who doubles as Schoolcraft College business teacher James Taylor), and Planning a Wedding, to be directed by fashion coordinator Anne Schellhase of Dearborn, are new this winter on the YW's program list.

"They seemed areas where there would be interest for expanding our program," said staff member Nora Nader of Livonia.

TAYLOR (OR CARLO) was recruited for his first class-teaching in the field of magic.

This Redford Township resident has been practicing sleight-of-hand since he was 10 years old, although in recent years he's limited himself to a few private parties.

With a full schedule of secretarial

classes at Schoolcraft and the spare-hours project of building a new home near Whitmore Lake, he has to agree that "you can't do everything."

But he does enjoy watching the junior-high aged youngsters begin to pick up the gist of some tricks to baffle their friends.

"I try to keep to the tricks that will not require a lot of equipment," he said. "Just a deck of cards and some paper and cloth. There's nothing wrong with the fancier tricks you can buy—they're being seen more in the big stage shows as magic shows get more popular again."

"But for kids just starting I wanted to keep the expenses as low as I could."

TAYLOR CONSIDERS magic work "one of the performing arts," but it's only one of his talents. A teacher at the Detroit High School of Commerce before it closed, he came to Schoolcraft when the college was organized 1964.

He also has acted, sung and played several musical instruments, and he is currently doing nearly all the construction work on the new home with a lot of help from his wife and two sons.

"I drew the plans and we're doing everything but the brick-laying," he said. "We hope to be in sometime this year."

ANNE SCHELLHASE wife a Lutheran pastor, currently is working as an fashion and interior decorating in Dearborn after eight years of commuting to coordinating work with the Patricia Stevens Career College in Toledo.

A course for brides was part of her work there, and that is what she hopes to bring to the Western YW program. Classes will be set up for brides and their mothers as soon as a group can be formed.

"We find many young women have no realistic ideas about how to prepare for a wedding," Mrs. Schellhase said. "They have a lot of romantic ideas, but not much solid information."

This consultant tries to get into timing and planning, making guest lists, working within a budget and knowing who pays for what.

"On that last there is more flexibility now," she commented. "Sometimes, with today's prices, compromises are made, like having the

bridegroom's family pay for liquor at the reception."

OTHER NEW wedding trends will be part of Mrs. Schellhase's course, too.

"I feel there is a place for change," she said. "I particularly like ceremonies in which both parents give the bride in marriage."

"And there are new ways to make the ceremony beautiful and memorable. I recently went to a wedding in our church in which the scripture was interpreted in dance."

"It was done very skillfully and in perfect taste. I was a little anxious, and I know my husband was concerned, but it turned out beautifully."

MRS. SCHELLHASE also intends to get into some of the "happily ever after" aspects of a wedding—the honeymoon and the apartment and the adjustments that must be made.

"Counseling is my husband's department," she said, "but I think in a situation like this we can talk about some of the things that become problems after the wedding if they are not discussed beforehand."

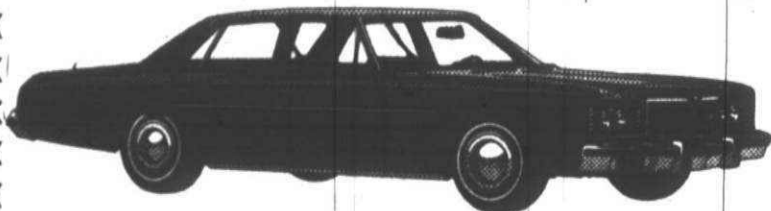

No contest...Salem Rocks maul Bentley, 75-46

Consistently superior shooting from the floor and a second quarter switch in defensive tactics paid off for Plymouth Salem with a convincing 29-point cage victory over Livonia Bentley in their long-awaited rematch, 75-46.

With 23 points from 6-10 Eric Agardy and 21 by 6-8 Jim Ellinghausen, the Rocks gained satisfying revenge for the one-point loss they suffered at Bentley in December. They now are 12-1 for the season and lead the Suburban Eight at 8-1.

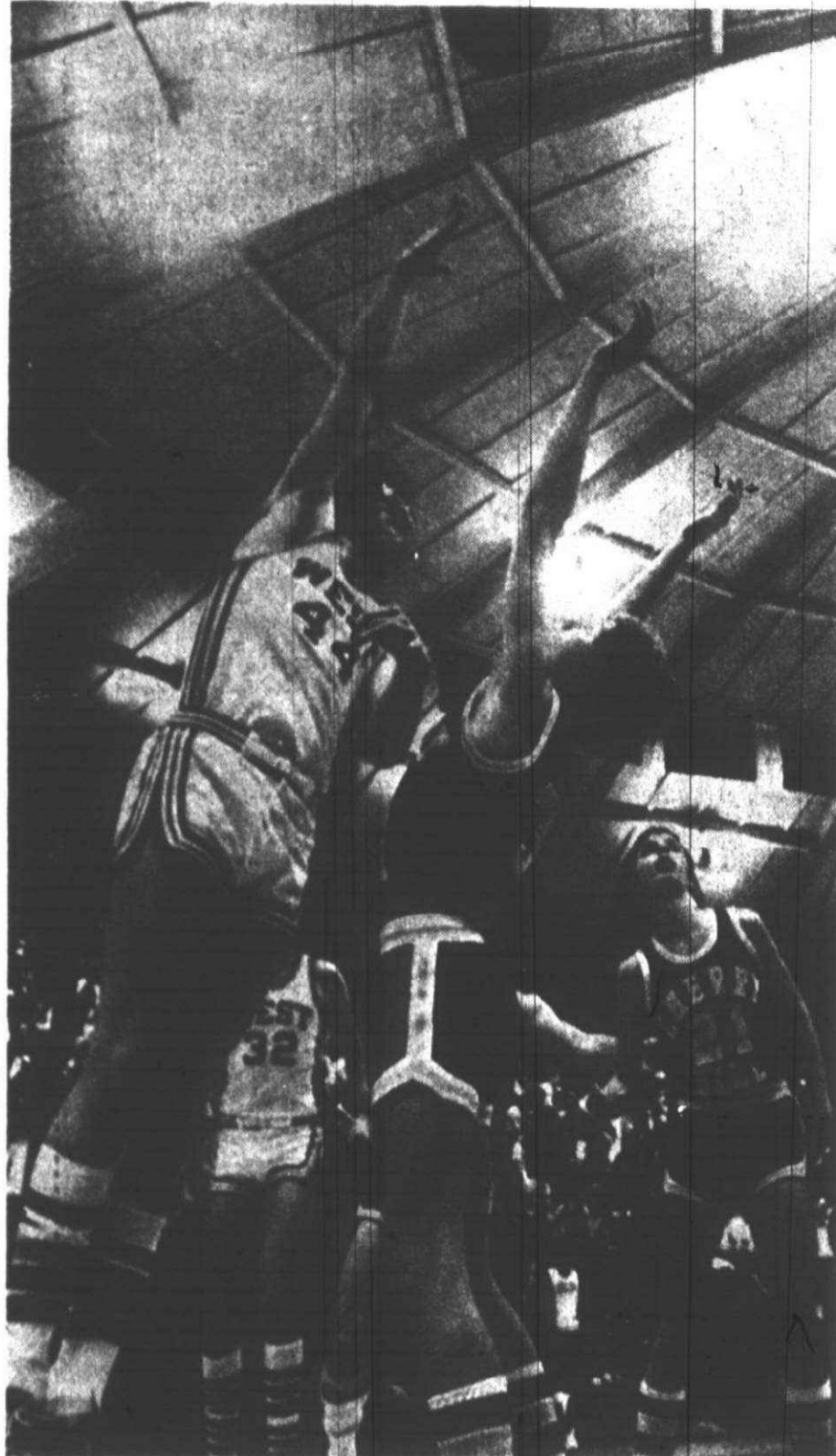
