## For DPW, firemen

# Labor talks pick up

CANTON—Money. That is one issue that may hang up contract negotiations between newly unionized firefighters, DPW employees and township officials.

Clerk John Flodin is bargaining from the township's side of the table, replacing Treasurer Carl Parsell when talks bogged down on both fronts.

"I haven't had any problems yet, but if I had to guess what would be a problem area, I would have to guess money," said Flodin.

Talks with the DPW employees began in October 1974 and according to one union member, "it's been a circus." He added, "We've made some progress with Flodin."

DPW representatives have met with Flodin twice after negotiating at various times with members of the old board, Parsell, and Trustee Bob Myers.

"THEY'VE BEEN stalling us. The building department and office workers are going to vote on joining the union (American Federation of State, city and Municipal Employees, a division of the AFL-CIO. I think they're trying to show them it's not the way to go," said one DPW employee.

"We don't even know what the issues will be in this contract. It's a pretty standard agreement we're seeking, but before we started talking with Flodin, we couldn't even work out the language in the contract, much less the substantive issues. Right now, I'd say we are about half way through the language of the contract," he commented.

The seven member bargaining unit has yet to be assigned a local number. That will happen when a contract settlement is reached. DPW employees voted unanimously to join AFSCME in the summer of 1974.

The most recent contract with DPW employees, an 18-month agreement, expired in October 1974. "It was an employe contract, not a union contract," said one DPW worker. According to Flodin, the union contract will be far more specific and detailed.

Unlike the DPW workers, firemen had no formal contract. Much of their bargaining effort has been centered around formalizing current practices and procedures into a written agreement.

Both Flodin and union negotiators expect to see "a lot of carry over into the contract" from current practices.

FLODIN AND MYERS met with state and local representatives of the firefighters union all day April 15. "It was a good meeting, we got a lot accomplished," said union president Art Winkel. "We got a lot of minor points out of the way and we submitted our wage demands."

Flodin commented, "Things went well. I think. This is a first for me. I've never really been involved in contract negotiations before."

He added, "Since this is the first contract ever, it takes a lot of work. We have to work out everything; pay, benefits, working conditions, discipline, promotions, uniform allowances, vacation time—the whole shooting match."

The firemen had been negotiating with Parsell "heavily" since the first of the year. "We were willing to talk to him, but we weren't getting anywhere," said one union member.

However, union officials seem pleased with Flodin. "He's very cooperative and we are making headway," said Winkel.

According to Flodin, the firemen are not seeking significant changes. "There's nothing radical in their demands," he said. "The only area of trouble might be over wages. We will probably continue the benefit arrangements as they are now."

Currently, firemen receive life insurance, medical coverage, two days personal leave, 12 days sick leave and a clothing allowance.

UNION OFFICIALS indicated they were satisfied with current fringe benefits as well as working conditions.

Winkel and union vice president Frank Chakrabarty agreed with Flodin that the tough issue might be money.

Said Chakrabarty, "We are seeking an increase, but I don't think our wage demands are out of line."

Added Winkel, "The only possible problems might be the wages and time and a half for overtime. There's a case in the courts right now about time and a half and we'll know better after that is settled as to what our status is."

He continued, "We don't even know if we will have any problems over money. We gave them our wage presentation Tuesday (April 15) and they said they'd study it."

## At Plymouth Center for Human Development

# Store gives residents choice

"You feel as good as you look," the old cliché goes.

Staff members at the Plymouth Center for Human Development have taken the saying to heart.

A new clothing store, offering an entire gamut of men's, women's and children's garments, today opened on the grounds of the state home for the mentally retarded to pump new life into the appearance and outlook of residents.

The store, where supervised residents will select their own articles of clothing, will replace the center's old method of issuing garments, under which huge consignments of pants, dresses and shirts were sent to each ward.

"As a result, the people looked like typical institution residents," said Dr. Elizabeth Ring, Ph.D., a unit director at Plymouth Center. "They had that wrinkled, ill-fitted look.

"THIS STORE will permit individualized attention to the clothing needs of our residents," Dr. Ring explained. "It's our belief that every resident, no matter how retarded, has a right to appear as attractive as he or she can."

Until today, residents had little or no say in the clothing which they put on. Piles of garments, arranged by size and type, were sent to each ward for residents' use. The clothes were laundered after a period of wear and sent indiscriminately to another resident of the same body same.

But all that changed today, as residents scanned the racks of brightly-colored dresses and shirts and checkered pants, suits and ties.

A rack of sandals and shoes sits before chairs and mirrors in the store's new shoe department, while life-size mannequins model jackets and bathing suits. Purses hang on the freshly-painted yellow walls, and jewelry, cosmetics, and sun glasses entice residents from behind a glass showcase.

"EVERYTHING'S like a regular store," said Dr. Ring, pointing out the orange carpet, fitting rooms and soft music, which emanated from a stereo console.

She explained, "The aim was to make this look like a store in the community, so it would serve as a good training setting. This whole thing is based on the principal of normalization—that every resident has a right to be treated in a manner that's as normal as possible. It provides a training setting within the institution that will provide a normal community experience of picking out clothes.

"We have many residents, who will eventually go into the community," Dr. Ring continued. "They'll have to know how to pick out appropriate clothes for the occasion and the season and know how to coordinate colors."

The goal of the clothing store, she explained, is to provide every resident with seven complete outfits for each season plus underclothing and outer garments. Ward supervisors will keep personal clothing records for each resident.

STAFF MEMBERS will alter the state-issued and donated clothing to fit each resident properly and stamp residents' names on the inside of the garment.

The slogan "He'll do better if he looks better," borrowed from John Smith Men's and Boy's Wear in Plymouth, hangs above a full-length mirror and reflects the hopes of staff members.

"We feel it will develop a sense of personal worth in residents," explained Dr. Ring. "Before, clothes were just piled in sizes, and everything looked pretty much the same. Now,

## Canton cleanup begins in May

CANTON—March winds and April showers are followed by May cleanup—at least that's what Canton Township residents are being encouraged to do as the township board declared May "Canton cleanup month."

Commented Clerk John Flodin, "We are looking for help in cleaning up the township. Right now there is a real need for citizen participation."

As part of the cleanup effort, the township will be offering assistance to organizations interested in cleaning up their neighborhoods.

"The township should be able to supply dump trucks and pickups and possibly men from the Department of Public Works," explained assistant ordinance officer Bruce Phillips.

At least one civic association has scheduled a neighborhood and road-side cleanup campaign and township officials are hopeful more are on the way.

The Northwest Canton Homeowners Association will hold its neighborhood cleanup May 10.

Flodin said, "Right now, a lot of people don't realize that lots of their large items can be handled in normal rubbish pickup. Our trucks are capable of handling large household items such as refrigerators or stoves. If not, special runs can be arranged."

Those interested in using township trucks for cleanup drives are encouraged to contact the township offices as early as possible.

## Detroit water rates get suburban studies

Two meetings will be held next week on consecutive days to investigate the Detroit Water Department rate structure and suburban representation on the water board of commissioners.

The first will be a state House of Representatives special committee hearing set for 10 a.m. next Monday, April 28, in the Livonia Senior Citizens' Activities Center, 15218 Farmington Road, south of Five Mile.

State Rep. John Bennett, committee chairman, invited public officials whose communities are customers of the Detroit water department to voice their views.

BENNETT SAID the committee has scheduled four public hearings to look into the water department's operation with the possibility of a fifth hearing at Flint.

"I hope this investigation will shed some light on apparent problems which seem to exist in the Detroit water system operation and its rate structure," Bennett said.

The other meeting was called by Mayor Edward McNamara of Livonia for a committee of 16 cities. That meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 29, in McNamara's office in City Hall, 33001 Five Mile.

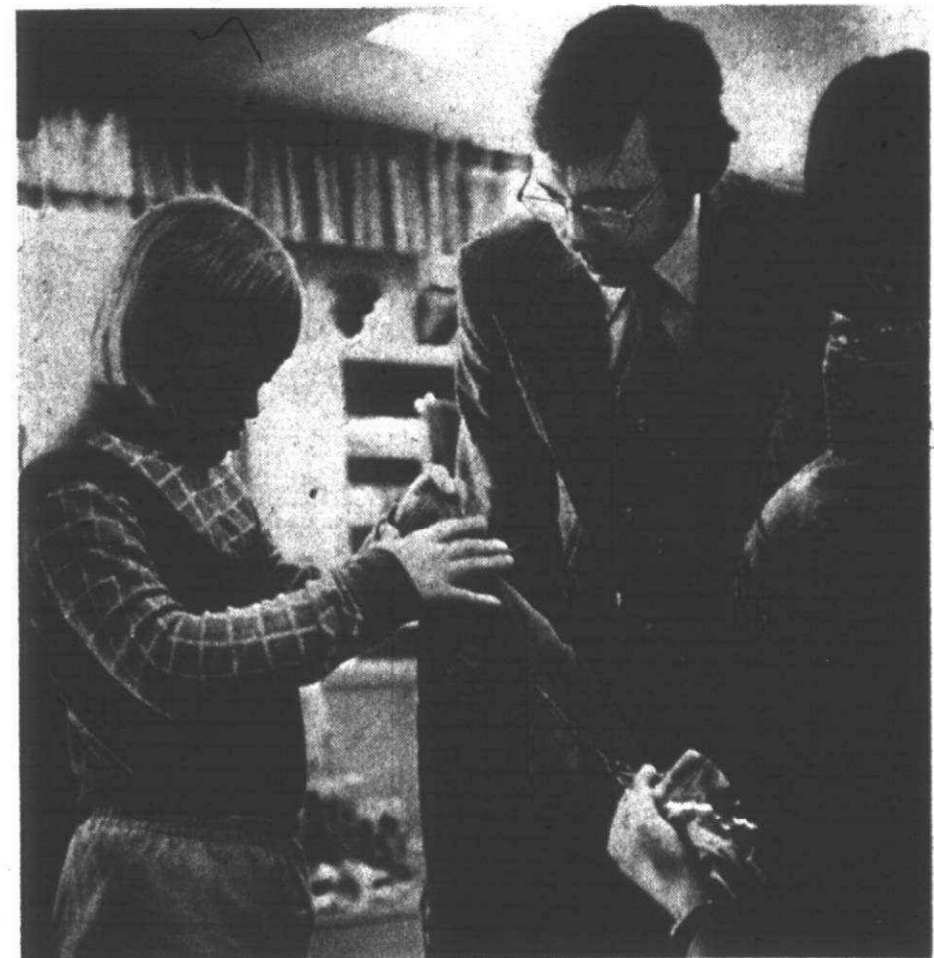
That committee will discuss ways to guarantee suburban representation on the water board.

The board has seven members with four from Detroit and the suburbs. McNamara serves on the board to represent Wayne County.

The board's membership could be changed in the future since the new Detroit city charter, which creates the water board, requires that at least four members be from Detroit.

BOTH COMMITTEES were created last month after McNamara, as board member, opposed a proposed 35 per cent water rate hike, recommended by Water Department Director Ernest Cedroni.

McNamara's opposition was based on numerous budget increases which he felt were unjustified or not fully explained.

# Metro-West Hospital employes go on strike

WESTLAND—Members of Local 42 of the Office and Professional Employees International Union (OPEI) were striking UAW-administered Metropolitan Hospital-West in Westland and Metropolitan Hospital in Detroit following a strike vote Thursday night.

The two hospitals are run by a board of directors including Ken Bannon, UAW vice president; Emil Mazey, UAW treasure and John Bate-man, UAW auditor.

Local 42 has about 450 members, 80 of whom are employed at Metro-West. Its membership includes office, accounting, dietary, housekeeping, medical records and medical attendant personnel.

UNION and management had met with the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service late Monday night and early Tuesday in a last-minute attempt to resolve differences.

The hospital made several new proposals Tuesday, and union officials called for a membership vote Thursday night.

The vote against the contract proposals was 284-84, and the strike began at 6 a.m. Friday.

Strike committee member Carol Hollman Friday claimed Mazey had attempted to persuade OPEI president Howard Coughlin to rescind his authorization of Local 42's strike.

A telegram the local received from Coughlin indicated he would not authorize the strike, but neither would he take any legal action to prevent it,

according to Mrs. Hollman and Geri Maciniak, another committee member.

WHILE about 35 strikers formed a picket line in front of Metro-West by noon Friday, executive hospital administrator William Rothman said hospital business was "normal."

"We have had 100 per cent of our people come to work today," he said. "Everything is running very well. Only a very few have not shown up for work."

Doctors, nurses and technicians crossed the picket line, as did most of the patients, Rothman added.

SEVERAL picketers claimed "police harassment."

"The Westland Police have prevented us from handing out literature" to patients and other employes entering the hospital, Mrs. Maciniak asserted.

One of the officers stationed at the hospital, Ptl. Dan Harvey, claimed the city has a handbill ordinance requiring a permit to distribute literature.

However, an employe in the Westland city clerk's office Friday said no permit is required other than for house-to-house handbill distribution.

"WHAT WE object to," Harvey

said, "is their knocking on car windows. If someone asks for the literature, it's OK."

Harvey said a group of strikers blocked the driveway to the hospital's emergency entrance, and when a driver refused to stop, the strikers pounded on the car.

By late Friday morning, strikers were orderly, permitting patients to enter, though greeting some with shouts of "Let the hypochondriacs through."

LOCAL 42 has been working without a contract since Feb. 1 this year. Union officials say the membership is seeking the same benefits it claims the UAW has sought for its own members in auto talks.

Objections to the hospital's proposed contract centers around four issues: cost-of-living allowance; sickness and accident benefits; an extension of the current contract term of two years to three; and a speedup caused by doubling the workload while increasing the number of employes only slightly.

The union also charges the hospital with preventing union activities on the premises.

Local 42 has a strike fund paying strikers \$20 per day, but the fund is expected to run dry in about two weeks.

## Agency to hold hearings

Six public hearings in Detroit and three suburbs, including Livonia, have been scheduled by the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging to hear residents' views on the needs of senior citizens.

At 10 a.m. Thursday, April 24, a hearing will be held in the Livonia Senior Citizens Center, 15218 Farmington Road. Another hearing will be held at 10 a.m. Friday, April 25, in the Romulus City Hall, 11111 Wayne Road.

The agency wants to hear public reaction as it is finalizing its funding goals for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The resulting area plan will be submitted to the Michigan Office on Aging to qualify Detroit and Wayne County programs for the aged for \$791,730 under the U.S. Older Americans Act.

Major objectives of the plan are development of health preventive and counseling services, programs to allow the elderly to live in their own homes, and information and referral services for seniors.

The proposed area plan is available for review at the agency's offices, 2516 David Stott Building, 1150 Griswold, Detroit, Monday-Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

# City police vote teamsters in

PLYMOUTH—City officials, sitting down at the bargaining table with police this summer, will be facing a new bargaining agent.

On Thursday, April 17, members of the Plymouth Police Officer's Association (PPOA) voted 10-1 to join the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. "Basically we joined because we are police officers first and shouldn't have to worry about the day to day responsibilities of union work or contract negotiations. By joining the Teamsters we are putting these responsibilities in the hands of a professional," said PPOA president Michael Gardner.

He added, "We are not dissatisfied with anything in particular, we just thought this would aid us in our professional duties."

**THE CURRENT** two year agreement expires June 30. It had been negotiated by officers of the PPOA.

Police Chief Tim Ford had no comment.

Ray Quada, administrative assistant to the city manager indicated the change was not significant.

He said "They have a perfect right to representation, whomever they choose. It just means we'll be dealing with Teamster representatives rather than PPOA representatives."

The bargaining unit is composed of 12 patrolmen and sergeants. The police chief, assistant chief, lieutenants,

community service officer and ordinance officer are not eligible to join the union.

Explained Gardner, "All non-supervisory sworn police officers are eligible to join."

Gardner said the move to join the teamsters would not mean the end of the PPOA. "That will continue to exist," he said, "but the teamsters will be handling our contract talks."

Thursday's vote was held before officials from the Michigan Employment Relations Commission who certified

the change in bargaining units. According to Gardner, state law dictates any change in bargaining agents must be recognized by the state commission.

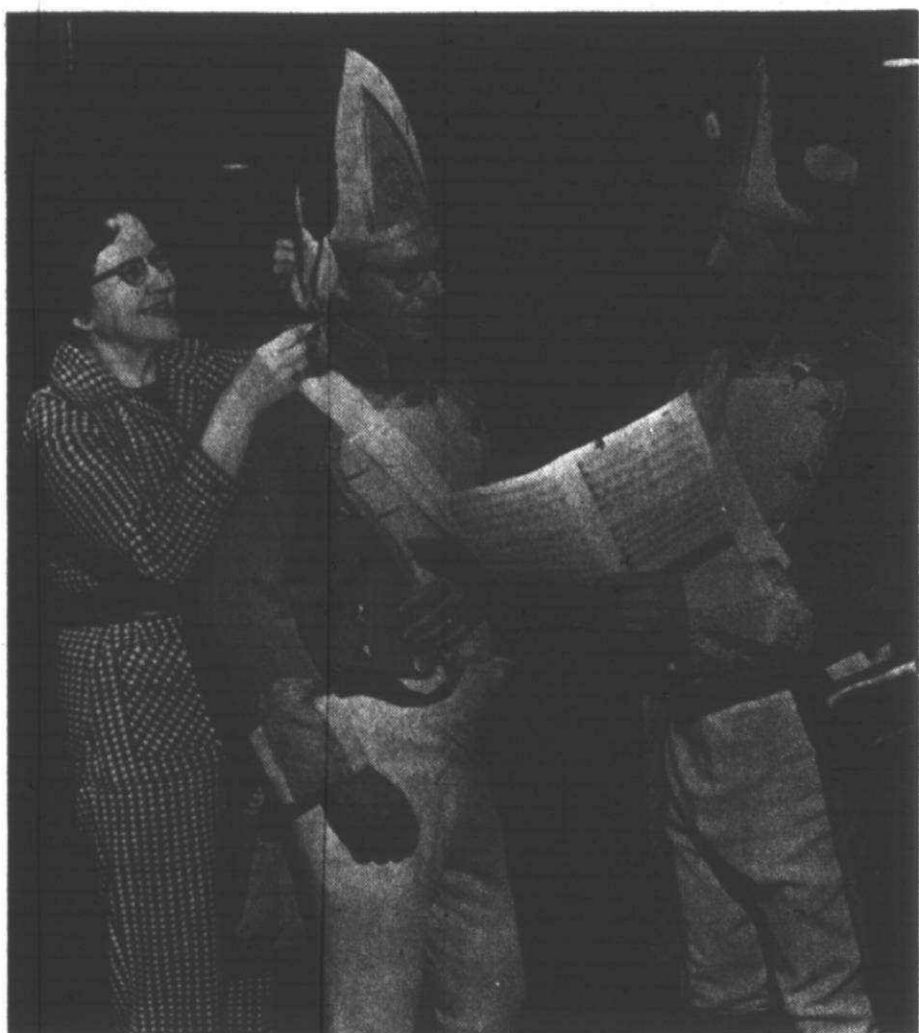
**DESPITE** the increased dues and initiation cost, Gardner said the PPOA approached the Teamsters. "We started thinking about this about two months ago," said the patrolman, "and we were nearly unanimous in our decision to join."

Gardner, PPOA secretary patrolman Roger Roy and treasure, patrol-

man Larry Ray will assume the local Teamster positions of chief steward, bargaining officer, and steward.

Police officers will meet with Teamsters officials on May 5 to formulate a bargaining schedule for this summer. "We'll set up a program and present it to the city right away," said Gardner. "If they agree, then we can begin negotiations soon thereafter."

The current police contract became effective July 1, 1973 after it was approved by the city commission.

## School bridges to lessen safety hazards of roads

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Students attending Bird Elementary and West Middle schools will not have to cross through Ann Arbor Trail and Sheldon Road traffic, when autumn winds blow next fall.

The Plymouth Community School Board Tuesday voted 4-1 in favor of constructing pedestrian overpasses over Ann Arbor Trail and Sheldon and awarded the contract to the low bidder, Spartan Sign Co., for \$80,384.

Trustee Gary Mirto cast the lone dissenting vote, while trustees George Lawton and Carl Berry were absent from the voting procedure.

The contractor will construct the

overpasses so they can be dismantled and moved to another site, according to Secretary Marcia Borowski's motion.

That motion directed school board members to study boundary attendance areas and eliminate major street crossings by 1976.

The district's safety committee and attendance boundary committee recently met to discuss the proposed overpasses, according to Mrs. Borowski. Some persons objected to the busy roads which students must currently cross, she said.

Construction of the overpasses should begin almost immediately, said board President E.J. McClendon,

and the bridges should be ready when school starts next fall.

A 0.4 mill safety levy, which voters approved last year, will fund the overpass project, McClendon said.

Mirto voted against the overpass, because he believes Plymouth Township should share the costs. The school district and Plymouth and Canton townships shared the costs of a similar overpass at Fiegel School, he said.

"This overpass is needed," Mirto said, "but we haven't been able to effect the same kind of cost-saving program as at Fiegel. Our resources should be used for educational purposes."

Advance tickets, priced at \$2 for adults and \$1 for children, must be purchased in the Cultural Center by 5 p.m. May 3. Tickets at the door are \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children.

Barbara Thacker, head instructor of ice classes in the Cultural Center and ice show director, expects more than 5,000 persons will view the three performances.

**THE FIRST HALF** of the show, which centers on a circus theme, begins with a precision group of skaters who glide over the ice in routine formation, throw popcorn to the audience and set the circus mood.

A little girl and her parents glide out to view the performance, while a ringmaster, clowns and unicyclists follow close behind. Skaters dressed as

lions, tigers and bears further the circus mood and perform their antics to music taped beforehand.

The second half of the show is dedicated to a Roaring Twenties nightclub, and tables, chandeliers, waitresses and dancers set the night-spot mood. Song hits from the '20s are featured.

"It's not a recital, but a real show," said Mrs. Thacker. "It's really a fantastic experience for skaters. It's kind of a reward for all their work."

**ABOUT 300** of the 900 persons enrolled in the Recreation Department's skating classes have volunteered to participate in the program, Mrs. Thacker said. Performers range in age from three-year-olds to grandparents. All are amateur skaters.

Instructors began gathering ideas for the show last year, not long after skaters presented Plymouth's first ice show, Mrs. Thacker said. Skaters began practicing their whirls and glides last month.

About 20 skaters who are participating in the program sewed brightly-colored costumes for the whole group, she said.

Skating instructors directing the program include Mrs. Thacker, Doris Bal-

sley, Carol Holcomb, Carol Scruggs, Madeleine Snyder, Tom Carlearde, Jeanne Young and Marjorie Marque.

people will have individualized clothing that they can call their own."

Celesta Taylor, head of domestic services, added, "We're moving residents from the institutional look into bold colors. We find if our residents are dressed up and we tell them they look pretty, they do better."

Elizabeth Ring came to Plymouth Center in 1972 from a state institution for the mentally retarded in Connecticut, where the clothing store concept had proved successful. A group of Plymouth Center staff members visited the Connecticut institution and liked what they saw.

A CLOTHING store planning committee, composed of staff members, was formed this fall, Dr. Ring said, to implement the clothing store concept. A \$1,000 federal grant was obtained to outfit the new store. Mirrors, furniture and mannequins were donated by organizations and other state agencies.

Now that the store has opened, the planning committee has evolved into an advisory committee, composed of staff members, a parent, a resident of Plymouth Center, Fred Hill, owner of John Smith Men's and Boy's Wear, and Julie Thoman, owner of Wayside Gift Shop, to deal with problems that may arise.

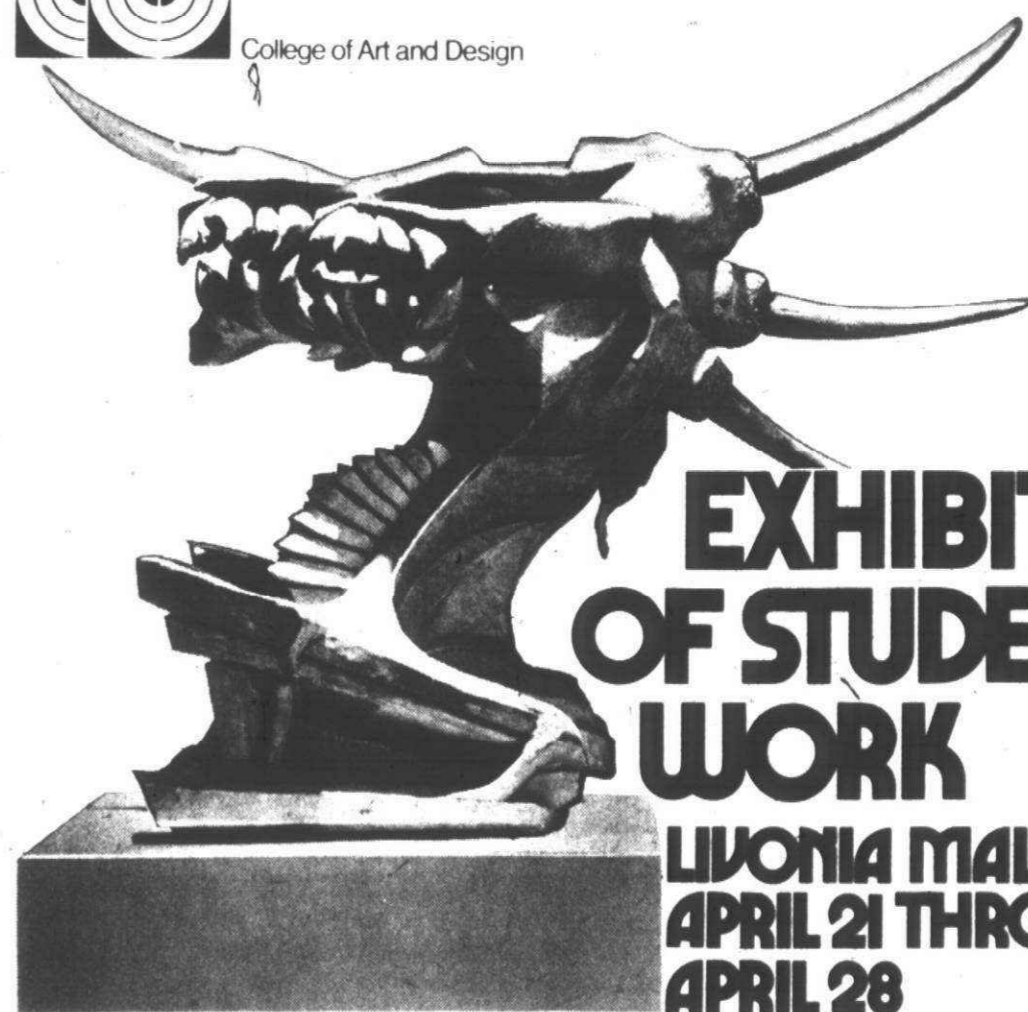
Ms. Taylor said, "We're hoping the store will cost the center less money in the future than our old method of issuing clothing and keep the students better dressed."

Dr. Ring added, "This kind of thing is going to become more and more prevalent, as we get away from the institutional concept of pushing retarded people away from society."

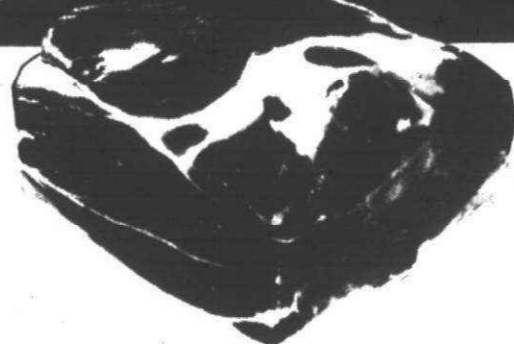

# SC board nixes advisory ballot question

LIVONIA—An attempt by a Schoolcraft College trustee to place an advisory question concerning the board of trustees' composition on the June 6 ballot failed to gain the board's approval at its April 16 meeting by a 3-3 vote.

In a lengthy statement, Rosina Raymond asked that voters be given an opportunity to decide how many persons ought to serve on the board and the manner in which they should be elected.

Mrs. Raymond said the results would be used as a basis for the board's recommendation to the State Legislature on how its members should be elected.

The board of trustees now consists of eight persons elected at-large by the voters in each school district served by the college—Livonia, Plymouth, Garden City, Northville and Clarenceville.

AT PRESENT, SC's board composition is determined by a 1971 court order requiring all eight members be elected at-large. Previously, one from each school district was elected and three were elected at-large.

A legislative act would be required to change to a seven-member board or to change the method of election from at-large to by-district.

The basis for the court order was that by-district membership violated the one-man, one-vote concept.

Mrs. Raymond asked the board to approve the concept of placing the matter before SC district voters June 6, when they will also vote for two trustee seats—one, to replace John LaRue who is not seeking reelection, and the other held by Ron Cowden who is seeking reelection.

It had been suggested that one of the vacated seats be left unfilled, thereby automatically reducing the number to seven. It was pointed out, however, that this would be unconstitutional because it is a legislative prerogative.

"Now, it would seem timely that the Legislature act and that it have some advisory input before that action," Mrs. Raymond's statement read. "This advisory input could come from a majority of the trustees or from the voters in the respective districts. Any action would be merely advisory, the Legislature must make the final determination."

"Trustees come and go," she said, "but this is a people's college. I trust the people."

COWDEN, however, claimed there is insufficient time between now and the election for voters to familiarize themselves with all aspects of the issue.

"I would hope for some kind of educational process," said Cowden. Trustee Nancie Blatt agreed.

Mrs. Raymond's proposal would have asked voters to decide the following: • Shall the Schoolcraft Board of Trustees be composed of seven members? • Shall it be composed of nine members? • Shall members be elected at-large? • Shall they be elected from equally apportioned districts?

If the Legislature, under board urging, were to decide in favor of apportionment, districts would be established by the Legislature.

All community colleges in the state have seven-member boards, with the

exception of Delta College in the Bay City-Saginaw area.

MOST OF THE board members favor seven. However, Trustee Gerald Cox offered reasons for a nine-member board.

"We should not be fearful of being different," said Cox. "An advisory vote by our constituents would be helpful to us. I think another position on the board may help generate con-

trovery. Power corrupts and perhaps we have to be reminded that it's our constituents who make up the college."

Mrs. Blatt said she saw no problem with a nine-member board, either, although she said seven members would be less complicated.

Trustee Leroy Bennett agreed a nine-member board would have too many "ramifications," and that "the

closer we are to other community colleges, the better."

Mrs. Raymond accused the board of being "ivory towerish" in not seeking an advisory vote.

However, the trustees voted down her request for an advisory vote, with Mrs. Raymond, Cox and Trustee Paul Kadish voting in favor and Mrs. Blatt, Cowden and Bennett opposing. Trustee Arch Vallier was absent.

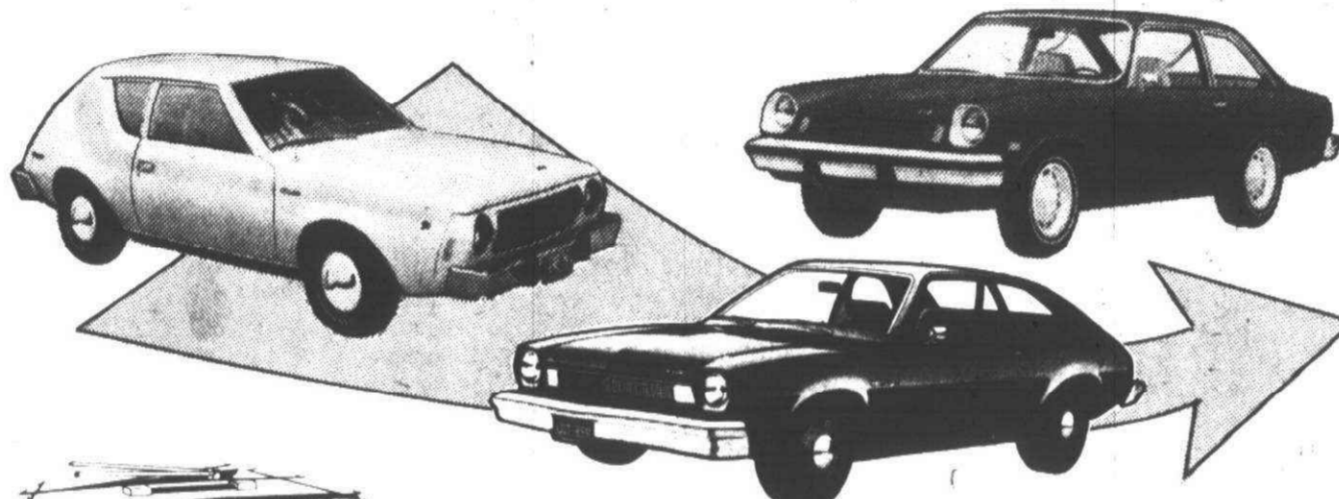

# Atrium chef's Beef Wellington a specialty

Beef Wellington for two at \$23 is the most expensive dinner on the menu at the Jarrus' elegant Atrium in Bingham Farms, but, ah, it's worth it.

Executive chef John Etchart is a Casque who describes himself as "a classic French cook."

Using the tines of a fork, he draws a map of France on a flour-covered porkboard in the Atrium kitchen. Etchart explains he does not specialize the cooking of any one area. He has worked in France, Spain,

Canada, Switzerland and Egypt and has served the Queen of England in Canada and the late King Farouk in Biarritz.

ETCHART WAS head chef at the five-star restaurant Le Dome in Fort Lauderdale when the Atrium's Jarrus spirited him away.

A working chef, Etchart is the kind of man who likes to do it himself instead of showing others. Nothing seems beneath him; he was seen dashing through the kitchen with a green

trash bag—taking out the garbage?—when we came to offer our compliments, after dining.

The Atrium is host Jarrus' third restaurant, and the only one he presently owns. He pays attention to every detail, including asking a bus boy whose hair had grown just a bit too long, to "get a haircut tomorrow."

The response was a respectful, "Yes, sir."

"I HAVE the same trouble with my boy," Jarrus said with a smile, afterward.

Jarrus came to the United States from Israel where all his family had been in the butcher business. He learned the art at age 12, and every once in a while Jarrus still likes to carve the rack of lamb.

"I like to cut meat," he explains. The Atrium is named for its tree-filled courtyard. The architect for the office building and restaurant wanted to leave open space, according to Jarrus, "but I offered to do the landscaping if we could have it rent-free."

LAST SUMMER the courtyard was used for cocktails and hors d'oeuvres, and this year an upcoming bar mitzvah party will use the atrium for dancing.

When will the courtyard be open? "Tomorrow! It depends on the weather," Jarrus says.

The Atrium's continental menu includes an insert of "Gourmet Dinners"—15 of these are rotated. For a low of \$6.75, you can have Chichen a la Princesse, breast of chicken in a champagne sauce, with white asparagus.

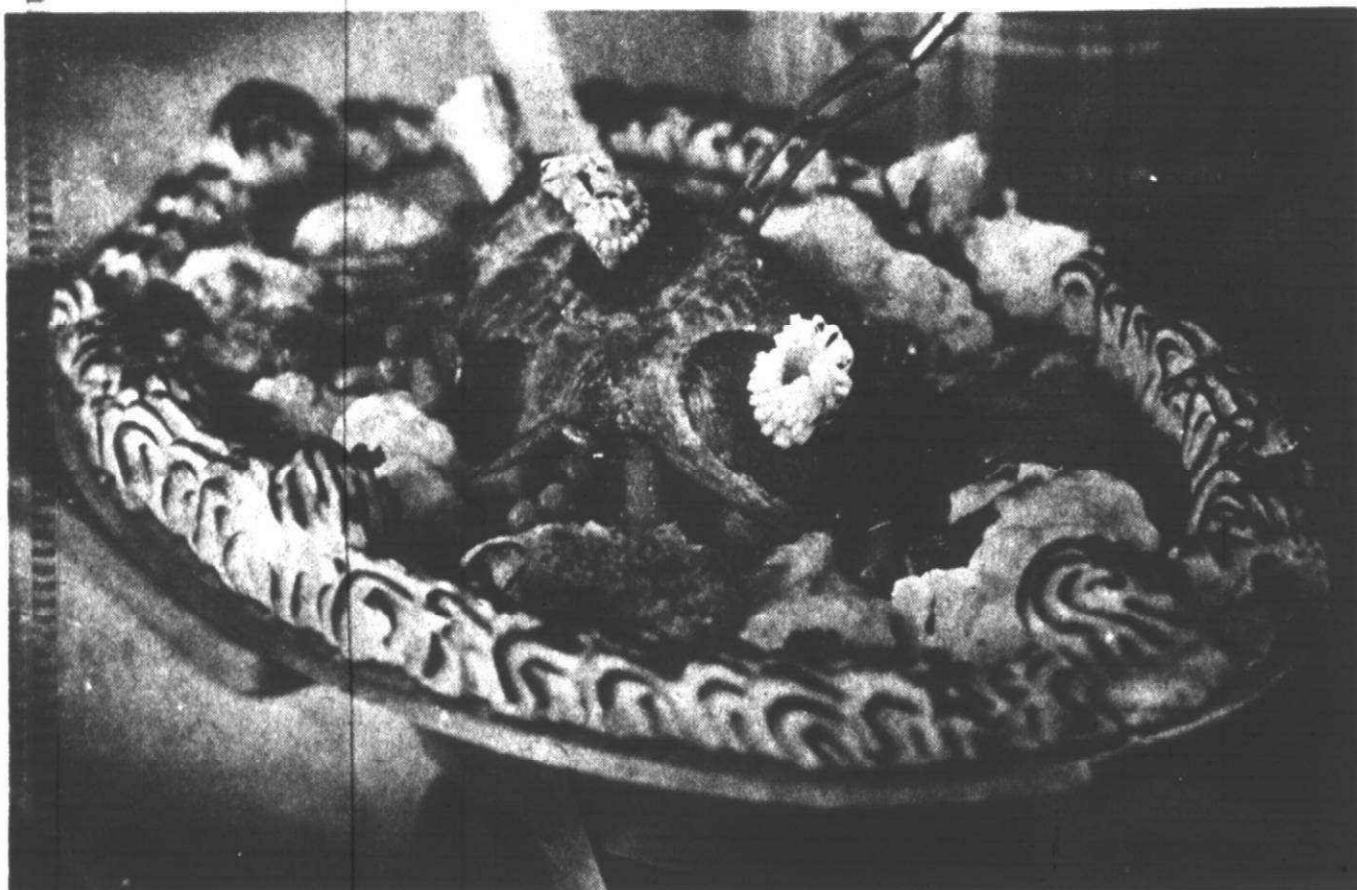
"A lot of people think we are high," Jarrus says, "but our price includes a complete dinner with fondue."

JARRUS ALSO points out, you can order for two or more persons any gourmet dish not on the menu. But call ahead, he warns.

The luncheon menu also has one of 15 inserts every day. Bobbies Pub next to the Atrium is part of the same

corporation and is a more casual spot for drinks and dining.

Chef Etchart's recipe for Beef Wellington is given below. He says it's easy to do, and if you want to save time, buy frozen puff pastry dough. Or you can make your own dough ahead of time and freeze, then thaw when needed. For the pate, you can find canned goose liver on supermarket gourmet shelves.

### BEEF WELLINGTON

Take out the center of a 20-ounce tenderloin.

Saute for 14 minutes till rare, then leave to cool for 15 minutes. During this time roll one pound puff pastry.

When dough is ready to use, take 8-

ounce goose liver and mix it with chopped mushrooms. Add one ounce of cognac and one ounce port. Mix them together and spread on top of the Wellington. Cover it with pastry dough.

Brush it with egg-wash. Put decoration on top, if desired.

Cook for a half hour at 350 degrees Fahrenheit.

Serve with truffle sauce accompanied by garnish.

### PUFF PASTRY DOUGH

2 pounds flour

1 quart water

2 ounces salt

Put flour in a bowl. Mix with water and two ounces salt. Mix them together. Let it rest for 20 minutes. After

that, roll into a sheet mixed with puff pastry margarine.

Roll puff crisscross six times; that is, fold it and roll it six times giving 15-minute intervals between rolling. Finally, roll it into one sheet, and it is now ready to use.

### TRUFFLE SAUCE

Chop two or three pieces of truffle and 16 ounces gravy and four ounces chopped goose liver and one ounce cognac. Mix them together and boil for 15 minutes.

### GARNISH

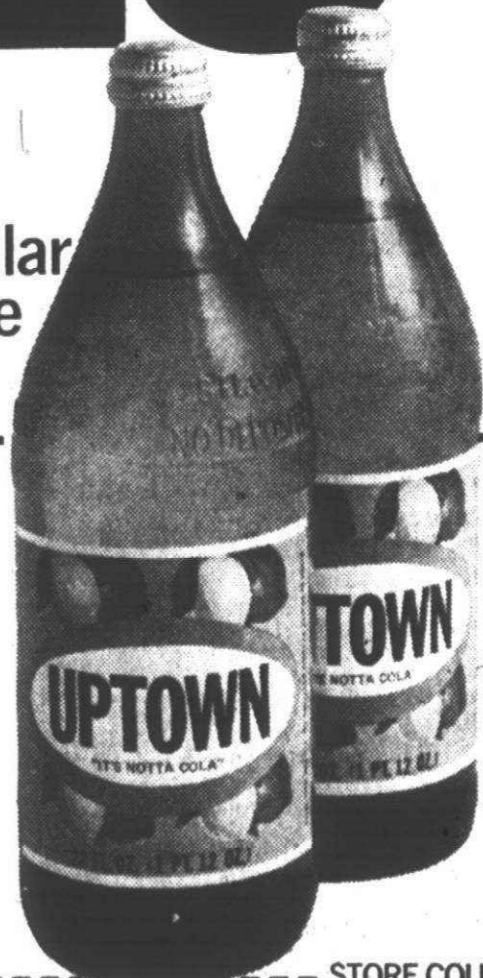

## Mirto needs manners

Plymouth Community School Board Trustee Gary Mirto ought to learn tact. He apparently does not know the difference between a school board meeting and a court of law and between a concerned resident and a witness in a criminal trial. Mirto's behavior at last week's school board meeting, at which the controversial 45-15 program was discussed, was rude and downright obnoxious. The questions he asked concerning the year-round school calendar were perhaps legitimate. But the manner in which they were asked was not. Mirto's behavior was akin to a prosecuting attorney cross-examining a star defense witness, rather than that of a school board trustee as he played to a small audience of residents in opposition to the 45-15 plans. After asking strings of leading questions to fellow school board members, suggesting that the district's administration had submitted a recom-

mendation against 45-15, Mirto reached the height of rude officialdom when he cross-examined one resident of the Miller attendance area who exercised his first amendment right to speak in favor of the year-round program. Calling the resident from his seat, Mirto asked, "Will your children still attend Miller after the new elementary schools are constructed?" He implied that the resident's support was not fully legitimate. We find that question and that attitude highly offensive. Any resident in any school district or municipality in this county has the constitutional right to voice his feelings before elected officials without fear of public embarrassment or intimidation. Perhaps if other residents had not backed Mirto's implications against 45-15 and grunted low complaints while one lone resident was speaking, Mirto would not have been so brave. Especially since he had voted in favor of the pilot 45-15 program in February.



## The Stroller That reading problem

Sitting at the luncheon table the other day waiting for the second cup of coffee, we got to discussing the word carried in the public prints that the reading problem that has been plaguing the public schools has now reached the college level, causing considerable concern among the educators. "What ever happened to the 'Three R's'?" one of the diners asked, and said that "readin', 'ritin' and 'rithmitic" were the foundation on which his education was built. While waiting for an answer, he asked, "How can the schools graduate anyone who hasn't learned to read and what happens to a fellow out in the business world who can't read?" Well, The Stroller had a partial answer. He recalled asking that question of one of the area's school superintendents a few months ago and was given a startling reply. "EACH ONE OF US has a level of intelligence above which we can't rise," he said, "and the boy in our

school who is being graduated, has reached that level, insofar as reading goes. "He is fine in other grades and classes, and it would be a burden on the taxpayers and unfair to him, if we forced him to remain in school—when we know now that he never will improve." That, evidently, is the modern trend—if you can't read you will have to get along without it. During The Stroller's years along the journalistic trail, the most notable case of a fellow making a success of himself without being able to read was Joe Louis, the former heavy-weight champion who came out of Detroit's "Paradise Valley" to earn raving as one of the greatest heavy-weight champions of all time. The Stroller never will forget the afternoon he saw Joe for the first time and learned, in a peculiar way, that he could neither read nor write. At the time, The Stroller was toiling in the sports department of the Detroit Free Press and was accepting en-

tries for the Golden Gloves Tournament being sponsored by the paper. This afternoon, as he looked up from his desk, he noticed this strapping young fellow standing in the doorway. "IS THIS WHERE YOU enter the gloves?" he asked. He was told this was the place and The Stroller handed him an entry blank to fill out. "Will you fill it for me?" he asked. So the questions were asked and duly recorded on the blank. This done, Joe was asked to sign it. "Will you sign it for me?" he asked. Then it dawned on The Stroller that this young man could neither read nor write, for when he signed the entry, "Joe Lewis," Joe never mentioned that his name had been misspelled. It wasn't until a few months later that Joe's sister sought out The Stroller and asked, "When are you going to spell my brother's name right—it's Louis and not Lewis." And so his name went into the record books as Joe Louis and he carried it to fame.

## It's your theater

"The smell of the greasepaint, the roar of the crowd." Since before Shakespeare penned a word of prose or poetry, humanity has been lured to the stage, seeking the thrill that only the theater can offer. For the uninitiated, the spectator in the crowd, the life of a thespian seems glamorous, yet unreachably. But there is another side to the craft to which too few pay attention, even though it is very close to home. For those of us who have been captured by the age-old crafts' magic, yet have other fulltime vocations, community theater is dear to the heart. COMMUNITY THEATER EXISTS just about everywhere. In Michigan, alone, there are nearly 100 groups registered with the Community Theater Association of Michigan. While some have reached respectable heights, most are small, struggling enterprises, sustained by a dedicated few. In western Wayne County there are the Livonia-Redford, Plymouth and Wayne-Westland community theaters. Unfortunately for those who labor behind the scenes, there is often too much greasepaint and very few cheers. Many times the laughs come from the cast and crew, who watch one another blow a line, walk off the wrong side of the stage or trip over a misplaced prop. A friend once said, "It ain't Broadway, but it's all we've got." And therein lays the glory of community theater. The part-time activists become jacks-of-all-trades. The leading man may look the part of the suave and debonair entrepreneur on opening night, but a more discriminating person would notice the slight bags under the eyes. For weeks before, the leading Lothario undoubtedly was painting flats,

sanding and sawing. And so it is with every member of the cast. But don't be fooled into believing community theater is a half-baked attempt at theater. Some pretty fine productions are managed by most groups at one time or another. I FIRST BECAME hooked on the community theater circuit when I was 13 years old. An avid movie watcher from the year one, I knew I had to give it a try. Just once, I said. Nonsense. Nobody gets on a stage just once. If you fail the first time, you have to go back and redeem yourself. On the other hand, if your performance is greeted by those sweet sounding cheers and applause, you're addicted forever. But to be sure, the frustrating and embarrassing moments outnumber all others. I'll never forget my first attempt at a Shakespearean role. It was Petruchio, in "The Taming of the Shrew." Thrilled to win the part, I was nevertheless apprehensive over having to wear a pair of tights. Teenagers do have those hangups. My worst fears came to fruition. I can see it now. Playing opposite a delightful young lass of whom I was enamored, I strutted about the best I could in the unwieldy costume. The curtain opened. The words still ring in my ears. "I pray you do. I will attend her hear and woo her with some spirit when she comes." I pronounced with all the ardor of a Laurence Olivier. With a great dramatic gesture I turned towards the fair maiden who was entering stage left and...rip. Those cursed tights split from stem to stern. Horrors of all horrors had been cast upon me. The girl laughed and the crowd giggled. As for me,

scarlett wasn't deep enough to describe my countenance. THERE WERE other times as wretched. In "The Miracle Worker," a play about Helen Keller and her struggle in learning how to communicate, I was required to sing a few lines. Now singing isn't one of my more developed talents. As a matter of fact a frog sounds better. How well I recall the hoots and hollers from friends as I broke out in my unsorthy rendition of "Buffalo Girl." That play was doomed from the beginning. At the most dramatic juncture, when Annie Sullivan is teaching Helen to say "water," Annie grasps the pump handle to have Helen feel the water. You guessed it. The pump came off in Annie's hand. The incidents are countless. Having to apply makeup in gymnasium kitchens, unintentionally falling downstairs and a slap or two in the face by a temperamental actress are vivid memories. But believe me, folks, community theater really is fun. Many times you can see just as dramatic a performance by some local folks as you can see by stars. Local governments are becoming more cognizant of the groups and are setting aside money for them. Let's hope the trend continues. Who knows? Someday you may have your turn in the spotlight.

# Reach for Recovery has program to reach more mastectomees

It's to be titled "Mastectomee Update," and Livonians Gerry Dahler and Audrey Penskar want it known that the April 22 program is "strictly upbeat."

Upbeat because Mrs. Dahler and Mrs. Penskar and others in the American Cancer Society's Reach to Recovery program are anxious to share with all women who have undergone breast surgery the latest in helpful products and advice.

"Mastectomee Update" is an educational seminar, complete with displays and a fashion show, scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. Tuesday in the Roostertail club, at the foot of Marquette in east side Detroit.

It is the first such program to be sponsored by the Wayne County Unit of Reach to Recovery, a group within the cancer society that makes supportive visits to women who have undergone mastectomy or are facing the removal of a breast.

IN THE "UPDATE" program there will be greetings from Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas, a message from First Lady Betty Ford, herself a mastectomee, and a panel discussion on the latest in detection and treatment of breast carcinoma, as well as the display and fashion showing of apparel.

Participating in the panel will be Dr. Robert O'Bryan, oncologist at Henry Ford Hospital, Dr. John Wolfe, Hutzel Hospital radiologist and Dr. Angelos Kambouris, surgeon on the staffs of Sinai, Mt. Carmel and Harper Hospitals.

They will talk about new techniques and answer questions the women attending may put to them.

"We have regular programs of this type for our Reach to Recovery volunteers," said Gerry Dahler, who coordinates the program in this area.

"But we feel sure there are a lot more women out there who have un-

dergone the surgery alone and need contacts with others and updated knowledge. This program is for them."

Reach to Recovery, Mrs. Dahler explained, involves visits, always with the permission of the physician involved, by mastectomee volunteers to women who have just undergone the surgery.

These volunteers, having been there themselves, can talk with the patients about the problems with losing a breast, both the physical and the psychological kind. They also can demonstrate helpful exercises, including reaching.

Audrey Penskar, along with Bev McDevitt of Livonia and Bev Landeau of Westland, are Reach for Recovery volunteers who are among the models for the fashion show Tuesday.

They will model various makes of bras and bathing suits that can be worn by mastectomees, and there will be discussion of the advantages of the different kinds of prosthesis, the form used to replace the missing breast, and the garments that cover it.

"WE WANT TO SHOW women you can look great as well as feeling fine and leading a really active life," said Mrs. Penskar, who will be modeling a special bathing suit with tunic and bikini pants.

Another bathing suit, Mrs. Dahler mentioned, will be modeled by a 67-year-old mastectomee, Mrs. McDevitt will show a dressy pantsuit with the necessary high neckline and sleeves.

Most of the styles shown will be assorted bras, the volunteer models said, because there are so many new kinds of bras and prostheses.

One to be brought to the show is made by Jodee and utilizes a new kind of medical gel.

The prostheses are expensive, ranging upwards from \$60, the women said, so it's important to know what is available.

MRS. DAHLER also mentioned that

"as soon as this program is finished our next project is going to be to start agitating to have the cost of the forms covered by Blue Cross."

"We feel they are as necessary as glasses and should be treated in the same way from a medical insurance standpoint," she said. "They definitely are a necessity—you get backaches from going without that extra weight."

The four local women all felt they had made it through the mastectomy adjustment with not too much trouble and Mrs. Landeau, who has had both breasts removed, 12 years apart, said she was back on her job with the Wayne County Stabilization Commission two weeks after the second surgery.

"That's sooner than most women," Mrs. Dahler said, "but most of our Reach to Recovery volunteers have made good adjustments that that is why we are so anxious to have them visit women newly facing the program."

## New Schoolcraft courses to deal with jobs, layoffs

Are you getting everything you are entitled to while you are unemployed?

And, when a chance to work again appears, do you know the best way to handle a job interview?

Spring classes, sponsored by Schoolcraft College community services and scheduled to begin the week of April 28 in Garden City School District, will attempt to find answers to questions like these.

"Surviving Layoffs" is the title of a course designed primarily for people who are laid off or unemployed. "Job Crisis Clinic," intended primarily for women, aims to give women confidence so they can successfully seek employment. Both will run four weeks and cost \$5.50.

Three additional classes will also be offered. "Lifestyle Planning for Women," "Protection Against Rape," and a course for couples only titled "Understanding Changing Lifestyles."

THE COURSE on surviving layoffs will be coordinated by Luther Bird, counselor at Livonia Churchill High School, and will be held in Garden City West High, 1851 Raddiffe, starting Thursday, May 1, from 7-9 p.m.

The first session, taught by a representative of the Wayne County Department of Social Services, will consider benefits and social services. Budget management and nutritional information will be presented by a representative of the Wayne County Extension Service in the second session.

Constructive use of time will be taken up by recreational and handicraft consultants and a representative of the Livonia Office of Volunteer Energies at the third session.

The final class will be visited by a representative of the Michigan Employment Security Commission, who will suggest additional income possibilities.

SELF-EVALUATION will be the basis of the first meeting of the job crisis clinic, which will begin Monday, April 28, from 7-9 p.m.

Job search skills will be offered at the second session with interview techniques offered at the third. On-the-job problems, discrimination, your role with the company will be discussed at the final session.

The course, conducted by Amy Wilson Durfee, a placement specialist with the Jewish vocational service, will be held in Garden City East High, 6500 Middle Belt.

"Protection Against Rape," a four-week course, will begin Thursday, May 1, from 7-9 p.m. in West High.

"Lifestyle Planning" will begin in East High Monday, April 28, from 7-9:40 p.m. It is a six-week course, as is "Understanding Changing Lifestyles," which will meet in West High starting Tuesday, April 29, from 7-9:40 p.m.

Tuition for classes that meet six times is \$11. For further information contact the Schoolcraft instructional center in Garden City.

# Tiger rookie Ruhle has Livonia buzzing

LIVONIA— When Vern Ruhle, the Tigers' rookie right-hander who beat the New York Yankees in his first start this season, steps to the mound the eyes and ears of hundreds of Livonians are focused on their radio or TV to listen to or watch every move.

This is especially true in the city offices where his mother-in-law, Mrs. Margaret Mekulen, is secretary to Bob Osborn in the Engineering Department, and in City Hall where his wife, Darlene, is a part-time secretary to Dan Gilmartin in the Industrial Relations division.

Outside of the government offices, the TV sets in many of the commercial establishments have the game on the tube and word flashes around the city that "The kid is pitching."

Ruhle, who lives with his wife at Five Mile and Hubbard, is not the first Livonia resident to hurl for the Tigers, but he is the first to command excitement by his performances.

Years ago young Harry E. Wolfe had a tryout with the Tigers, but never made it to the majors. In later years Billy Hoefft lived in the city and Bob Bruce, whom the Tigers traded

to Houston, still lives here. And Denny McClain once owned a paint company in the industrial park. But Ruhle is the first to capture the imagination of the fans as a rookie hurler.

When he started against the Yankees in Shea Stadium in New York for his maiden effort of the year, the word passed around the city and everywhere one went he heard the same question, "How's the kid doing?"

"If you think the people around the city were interested," his mother-in-law said, "you should have been in our home. We were so interested in television we didn't care much about anything else."

And his young wife added, "I watched every pitch and was so excited."

The young right-hander readily confesses that he was excited, too, when he took the mound in the big city.

"It was the best feeling I ever had in baseball," he said, "just to think that I was starting against the Yankees in New York."

He admitted he was quite confident, knowing that Manager Ralph Houk had faith in him and that Tom Veryzer, a teammate in the minors, was playing shortstop.

"Tom sure came through with sever-

al great plays that helped a lot," the young right hander said.

Now his only hope is that his showing wasn't just a flash and that he can keep his place in the starting rotation.

His showing wasn't too great a surprise to the Tigers, for Vern was a 20 game winner last season. He won five games at Montgomery, Ala., 13 at Evansville, and two in Tiger stadium before the season closed.

"Vern has dreamed of being a major leaguer ever since he was six years old," his mother-in-law said, "and his parents approved his playing provided he had good marks in school. He made the grade in high school and graduated from Olivet College where he met his wife, Darlene, a graduate of Livonia Stevenson high school."

Darlene, too, is excited by the twist of events that placed her with the major league wives. Her eyes sparkled when she recalled the grand times she had with Mrs. Bill Freehan and Mrs. Al Kaline, during the training camp days in Lakeland.

And now, along with that excitement, she is jubilant about another adventure. She expects her first child in September and hopes it will grow up to be a major leaguer, too.
