Canton farm, stables has special program for the 'special kids'

CANTON — "Education should be primarily a program of teaching children to become responsible adults, with reading and writing secondary." This is the opinion of Jack H. Marts, former teacher of special education in several school districts, including Plymouth, who for the past eight years has been director of the Children's Farm and Riding School out on Denton Road in Canton Township.

"We stress here that children are children regardless of any handicap they may have," Marts said.

AT PRESENT, Marts and wife Marvel are conducting a three-week riding and farm program for 22 deaf children from the George School for the Deaf in Ypsilanti.

"Four teachers from the school are assisting us in this three-week program which runs from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The children of various ages take care of the horses, clean the barn, milk the cows and goats and get all sorts of experiences of farm life." Marts taught special education for 12 years in the Plymouth, Taylor and Riverview districts.

"Eight years ago my wife and I purchased this farm with the idea of helping handicapped children learn about nature and farm life.

"Discipline, something not stressed enough in many schools today, is taught here," Marts said. "Should a

child not obey orders while riding a horse or on the tractor, he is made to get off and walk."

THE SCHOOL, located on Denton Road south of Cherry Hill, has seen some 100,000 children enjoy its surroundings over the past years.

Marts said numerous Scout troops have enrolled in his school program where the children have the opportunity to care for all the farm animals besides studying horsemanship, gardening, tractor driving, and arts and crafts.

His program has been accredited by the American Camping Association. In fact, some of the Scout troops spend several days camping in the large area just south of the farm house and barnyard.

Marts also has a riding school for young ladies, ages 11 to 16.

"They are supervised by my staff in the grooming and care of the horses and ride two hours or more each day. The young ladies study the breeds, anatomy, diseases and ailments of horses."

SPECIAL EDUCATION children, however, are the prime interest of the couple.

"There is no curriculum taught in schools today that lets children know what to do when they come up against a difficult problem.

"We have had groups of children with all sorts of handicaps and are constantly trying to sell our program

to various schools in the area."

He said through the eight years he has run into some interesting situations with children.

"At one time we had a group of underprivileged children. One of the youths, while riding a horse, came out with some really foul language.

"I asked him how old he was and he said he was 17. I told him, I'm 51 and have treated him as an adult all the time he was here and told him I didn't allow foul language on our farm."

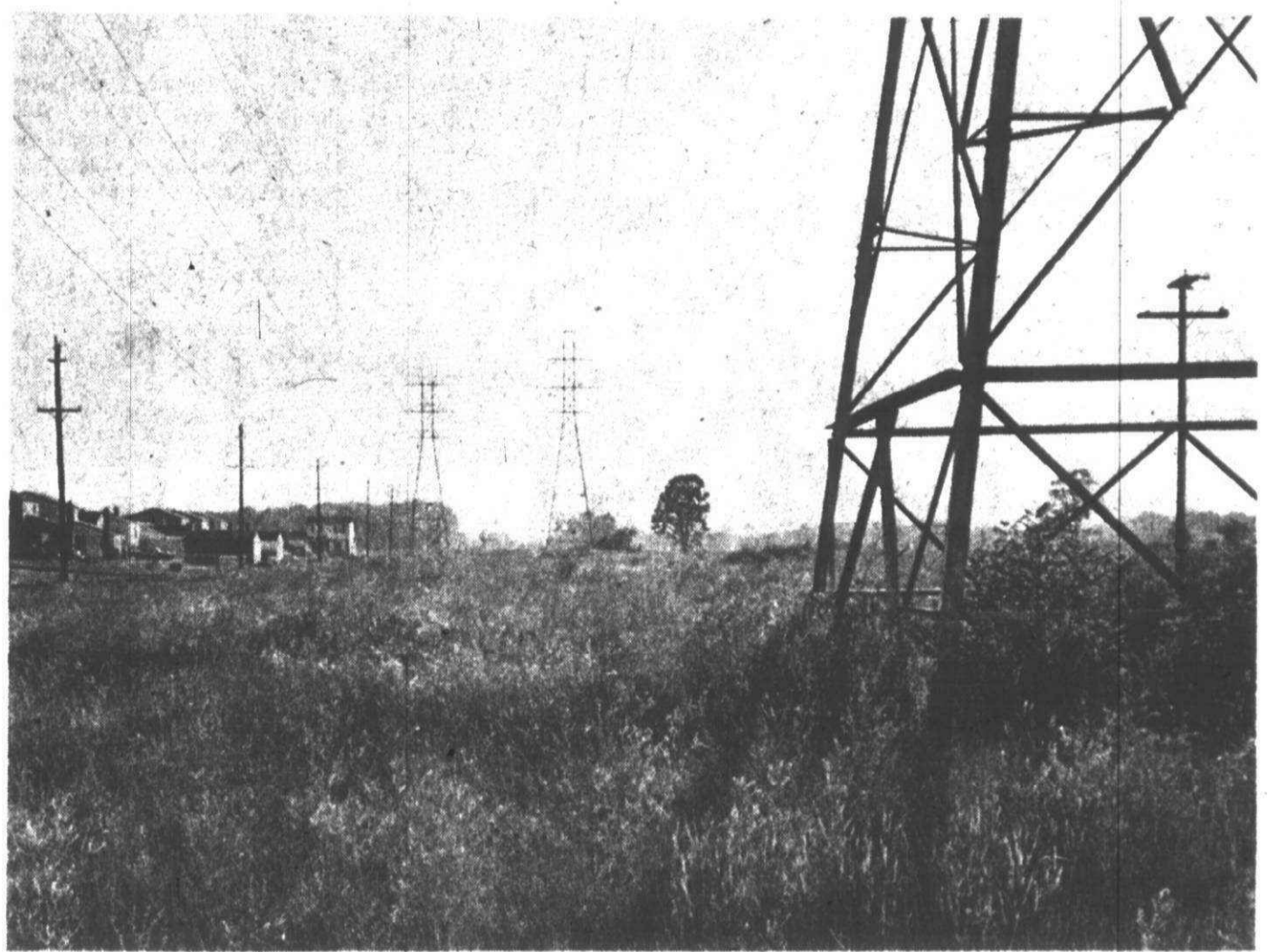
Marts said the youth look surprised and then said: "Mr. Marts, I'm sorry, it won't happen again."

MARTS SAID one of the teachers in the group told him that was the first time the youth had been known to apologize.

Marts said that while he wasn't knocking education today, there seems to be too much stress on reading and writing rather than developing the abilities of the child.

"There are children who have talents that don't require perfect reading and writing, talents that can make them an asset to society as well as a good living for themselves.

"This is what we strive for here. Our prime concern is helping all types of young persons, not stressing any handicaps, but teaching them discipline and the joys of doing things for themselves through proper training and understanding."

July Fourth parade another big success

Thousands of area residents celebrated America's 199th birthday Friday by crowding along the main street of Plymouth to view the annual Jaycee-sponsored parade.

The Independence Day parade went without a hitch, led by W.W. "Eddie" Edgar as grand marshal. Edgar, one-time editor for the Observer and Eccentric newspapers and now author of The Stroller and In the Pocket columns, has been active in Plymouth affairs and was instrumental in the exchanges of gifts and greetings from Plymouth's namesake city (Plymouth, England), a tradition which began in 1967.

The procession stopped briefly at city hall in recognition of that tradition and British Consul General J.J. Hyslop read greetings from the Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, W. Ivor Thompson. The greeting was in the form of verse:

"On this your Independence Day, You ask again that I will say, How fare the Imperial Locust trees, That bloom in Plymouth's sou-west breeze, Bringing across the ocean's span, Memories of Plymouth, Michigan.

The trees, I'm glad to say, stand still, Silent reminders of your goodwill, Next year with leaf and flower perennial, They'll welcome in your bi-centennial

With stars and stripes again displayed, At City Centre's royal parade.

And so we send felicitations, On these your annual celebrations, We hope that during '75, Your city's trades and industries thrive, Perhaps before this year does end, A civic visit you intend.

The English city gave Plymouth a portion of the famed Plymouth rock, taken from near where the Mayflower sailed and the city returned the gesture in the form of four trees now planted near the British town's civic center. And the American flag flies in that town every July 4 as a result of the exchanges with Plymouth, Michigan.

THE PARADE continued after the brief stop in front of city hall and included several marching units, floats, horses, antique cars and the areas top political leaders, including Sheriff William Lucas, U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch, State Senator Carl Pursell and State Representatives Tom Brown and Roy Smith.

As the floats passed the reviewing stand near Kellogg Park they were judged by Ron Cowden (Schoolcraft College Trustee), Thomas Turner, Elaine Kirchgatter and Ron Tzschkewicz, a regional director for the Jaycees.

Winners in the float competition were St. Peter Lutheran Church (first) and the New Majority and Calvary Baptist Church (tie for second). Marching honors went to the

Plymouth Canton Chiefettes (first) and the Taylor Troubadors (second). The Milford High School Marching Band won first place in the music category, and the Clan McRae Pipe Band from Detroit took second.

In the bicycle decoration contest top prize went to four youngsters for their Uncle Sam portrayal: Peter Wedtke, Jim Winegarden, Joe Tuley and Steve Tuley.

The parade began promptly at 12:30 and marched down Main Street, then proceeded to Middle School East for disbandment. More than 60 units took part in the parade.

Several of the floats displayed bi-centennial themes in anticipation of next year, when the 200th birthday celebration of this nation will be in full swing.

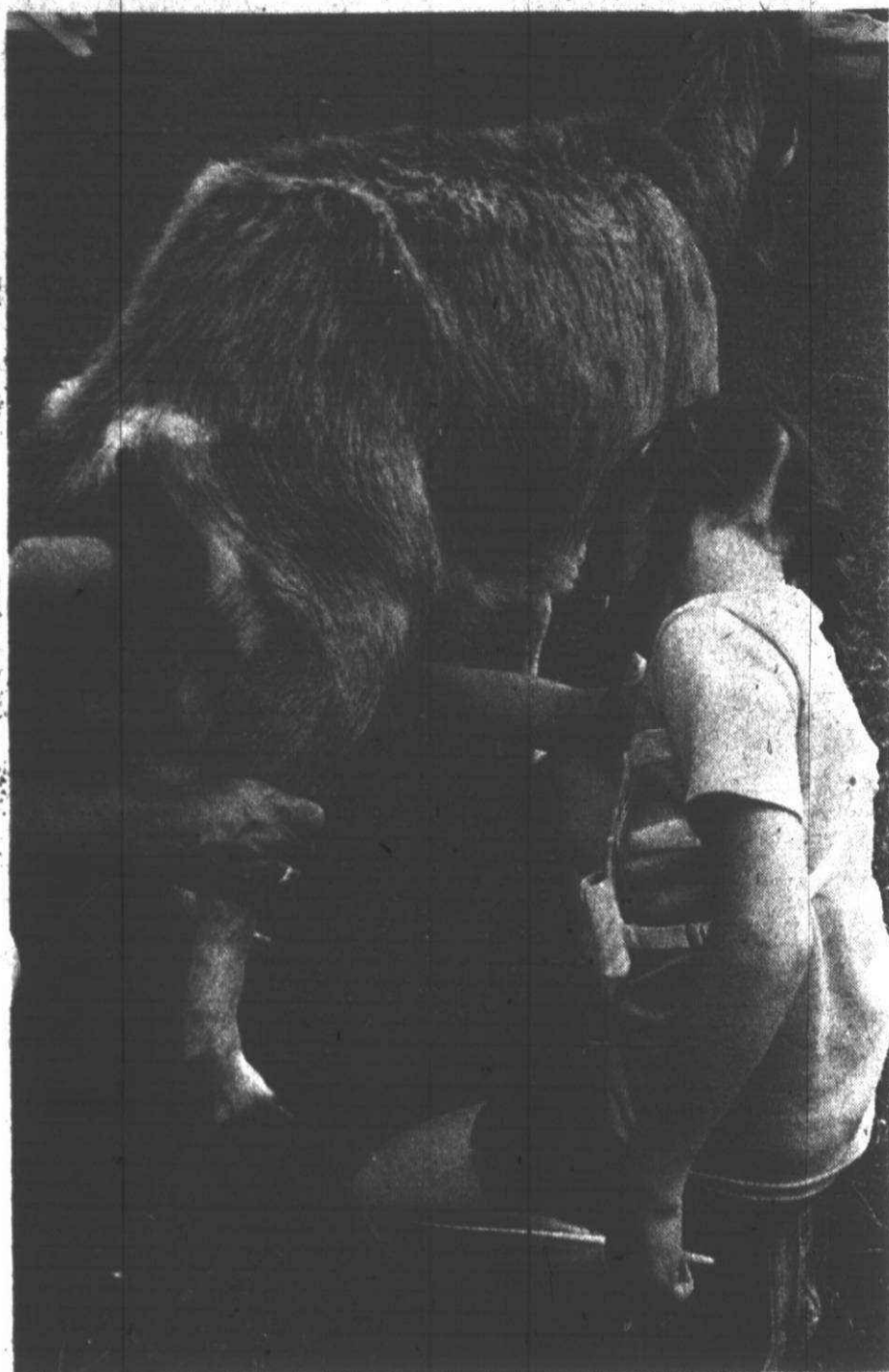

Sheriff's patrol may continue

The Wayne County Sheriff's road patrol service to Plymouth and Canton townships may be continued through November.

The public safety and judiciary committee of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners voted July 2 to recommend continuation of the road patrol funding for the townships through the end of the county's fiscal year—Nov. 30, 1975.

THE VOTE to recommend approval is contingent on any ruling made by

the State Court of Appeals on a Wayne County Circuit Court decision relieving the county of its obligation to provide road patrol in townships.

Realistically, however, county commissioners don't expect a decision from the court of appeals before Nov. 30, and those on the public safety and judiciary committee are prepared to extend the patrol service until the end of November.

The recommendation will be placed before the ways and means committee at its July 17 meeting and then

go before the full board for final action.

If the patrol extension is approved, it would cost the county an additional \$117,000 which is the anticipated cost for the service between now and Nov. 30.

Patrol funding was to have been cut off last April 30, but the county voted to extend the service until the end of July.

IN AUGUST 1974 the county first threatened to halt funding of the road patrol for Canton, Plymouth, Northville, Sumpter, Huron and Brownstown townships.

The townships joined and filed a suit which resulted in the road patrol being maintained at its present level of 28 men. Last March, Circuit Judge Thomas Foley dismissed the townships' lawsuit, ruling there was no legal basis requiring the county to provide protection for the townships.

The townships have appealed that ruling to the court of appeals and have retained the services of Bert Burgoyne, a Detroit attorney who also does legal work for Canton Township.

Farm gives area picnic site and zoo

A miniature children's zoo and cool, grassy picnic spot lie minutes from most doorsteps in the Plymouth-Canton area.

The Plymouth School Farm, located on Joy west of Plymouth Salem High, is open free to the public during hot summer months, but few persons roam among the squawking animals or lunch beneath the trees.

"We really don't get a lot of people during the summer," said Danny Sandmann, manager of the farm. "I don't know whether people don't know about it or what. I'm sure it can be utilized much more."

The 55-acre farm, located on the western edge of the Centennial Education Park, is used for educational purposes during the school year. Elementary school children tour the barnyard and farm buildings during fall and spring months, while a rolling "Farmyard Express" brings pens of animals to the schools during cold winter months.

Although guided tours are scheduled only on request during summer months, mom, dad and the kids can walk among the pens of animals, cook hamburgers on the grills and lunch on brightly colored picnic tables.

In the pens and grazing in the fields are cows and calves, a nanny and a billy goat, ewes, a horse, pigs, lambs, chickens, pheasants, rabbits, ducks and a dog named Blue.

Sandmann asks adults to accompany all children and requests all visitors to leave the picnic areas the way they were found. The farm is open during daylight hours.

The Canton and Plymouth Township boards of trustees recently approved the annual dues payment of \$100 to the new organization.

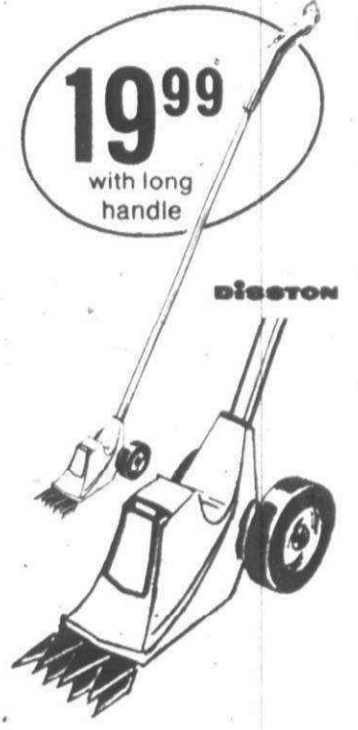
Canton Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein says informal meetings with other supervisors have proved beneficial to him.

West led the nine of diamonds. Some players, using today's standard American bidding system, would decide to pass. The hand has only 11 points in high cards and one for the doubleton diamond. One point short of a minimum opening bid and only three tricks.

Tournament players are aggressive and most of the players competing in the Michigan Bridge Association sectional last week opened the South hand.

Most players promise five cards in a major suit; therefore the opening bid was usually one club.

North knew South had at least three clubs, and placed the final contract at seven clubs. She felt the grand slam in clubs would be safer than in seven notrump.

If South had been dealt the nine of clubs, the story would have a happier ending. Or, if the diamond suit had divided three-three. Twelve tricks are available in either clubs or notrump.

Teachers will be painting, making music, solving mathematical and scientific problems, dancing, acting and enjoying their environment.

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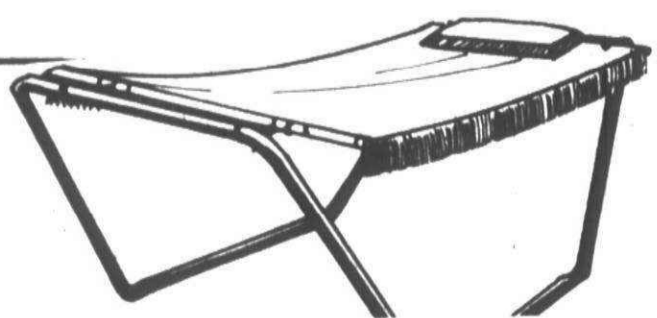
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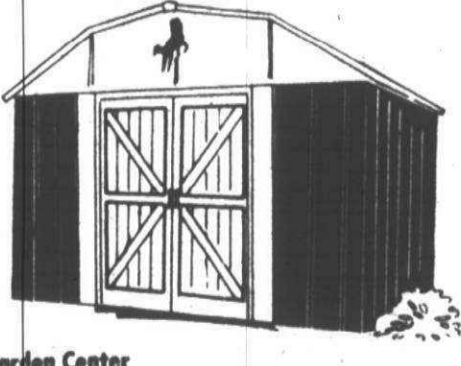
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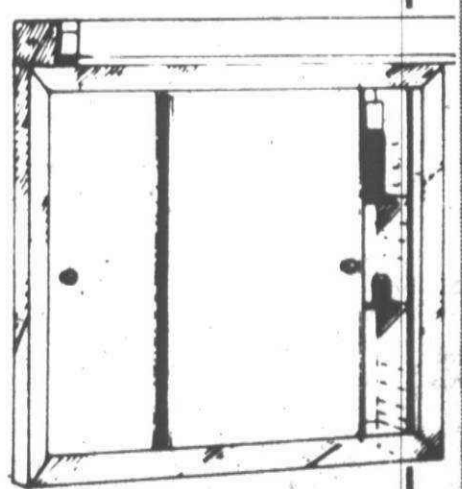

Almond-topped dish is rich, zesty

The kitchen, the equipment and the country are all relatively unfamiliar to Annick Carthew but the results of her cooking are predictably delicious.

Mrs. Carthew and her husband, who works for an international firm, are living in a rented townhouse in Birmingham while he is here on business for a few months.

Originally from Paris, Mrs. Carthew teaches French in an adult education program in England where she and her husband make their permanent home.

She first began to teach classes in French cuisine to provide something different for her advanced language students.

NOW HER schedule in England includes a pleasing variety of French language classes, French cooking classes in French and cooking classes in English.

"Both my parents were good cooks, and we entertained a lot," she said. "That's how I learned to cook."

Mrs. Carthew's classes in Birmingham got started when word of her culinary artistry spread and friends asked her to give them lessons.

On a recent afternoon, the second session of a series of four cooking classes began, with Mrs. Carthew surrounded by seven women students in the small kitchen.

The two doors leading into the narrow room were filled with standees

who rotated with other students seated or standing inside.

MRS. CARTHEW, dressed in a red and white sweater and black slacks, is petite, winsome with blue eyes and brown-banged hair.

Her French—and English—accented voice added charm as she divulged how to make a special dessert and sauce and a chicken entree.

Making a tarte reversee a l'abricot, or upside down apricot cake, is in a word, "easy."

"It's so easy because it's all in one bowl," she said as she mixed.

Previously, she had placed apricot halves, scooped side up, on a honeyed tin.

"IT'S SUCH an easy cake," she continued. "You won't have one of those failures when you open the oven door."

She beat the butter and sugar in a bowl, with a wooden spoon.

"It's very easy to control with a wooden spoon (rather than an electric beater)," she said.

She added the flour and then used a metal spoon.

"You may find it separates with a wooden spoon," she explained.

Mrs. Carthew has been here two months, on her second visit to the area. She said she is teaching the classes just "for fun."

But she has three classes a week, and when her husband is home on one of the nights they don't go out to dinner. She is too tired to cook so he

makes bacon and eggs.

"At my Tuesday class (first of the week) everything seems to go wrong," she sighed. "Yesterday we had a leaking tin."

MRS. CARTHEW belies the notion that you've got to have fancy equipment and use special ingredients. She held up a set of measuring cups she bought in the dime store.

"Don't go by my ingredients," she said when someone asked about the kind of flour she was using. She had selected whatever was handy in the market.

Learning to cook often isn't participatory for students where classes are held in the home, or at demonstrations.

But looking, listening, asking questions and exchanging information are all part of the session. The teacher constantly explains what she's doing and provides tips on how to do it best.

After the apricot cake went into the oven, Mrs. Carthew went on to mousse de fromage blanc aux abricots (cream cheese and apricots dessert).

THIS WAS to be served as a side dish for topping the upside down cake. The mousse also can be a topping for any fruit.

"It is good with anything. You can put in any flavor or fruit you want," she said.

After the mousse went into the refrigerator, she began the poulet jacqueline. It can be made with chicken

parts or breasts, and she used boned and quartered breasts.

The chicken pieces were added to a frying pan with warm butter and sautéed "au blanc."

She said, "Do not brown them. With cream it looks nasty. Just warm them up. 'Au blanc' is a French expression that means frying without frying—keep them white."

A STUDENT responded, "I'm laughing because I'm going to go home and make this in a couple of hours. I just happen to have some chicken breasts, and champagne, for our silver wedding anniversary."

Soon Mrs. Carthew paused in her work to summarize. "The chicken is cooking, the cream is setting, the cake is finished."

She removed the cake from the oven, inverted it to show the apricots. You can put cherries on top if you want, she told the class.

Because the chicken is served with fried apples, she said not to have potatoes with the meal but instead light, fluffy rice or green beans. Mrs. Carthew always uses golden delicious apples in cooking.

FINALLY, it was time to sample. The chicken, in its sauce and almond-topped, tasted rich and surprisingly zesty. The apples had an unexpected flavor and contrast.

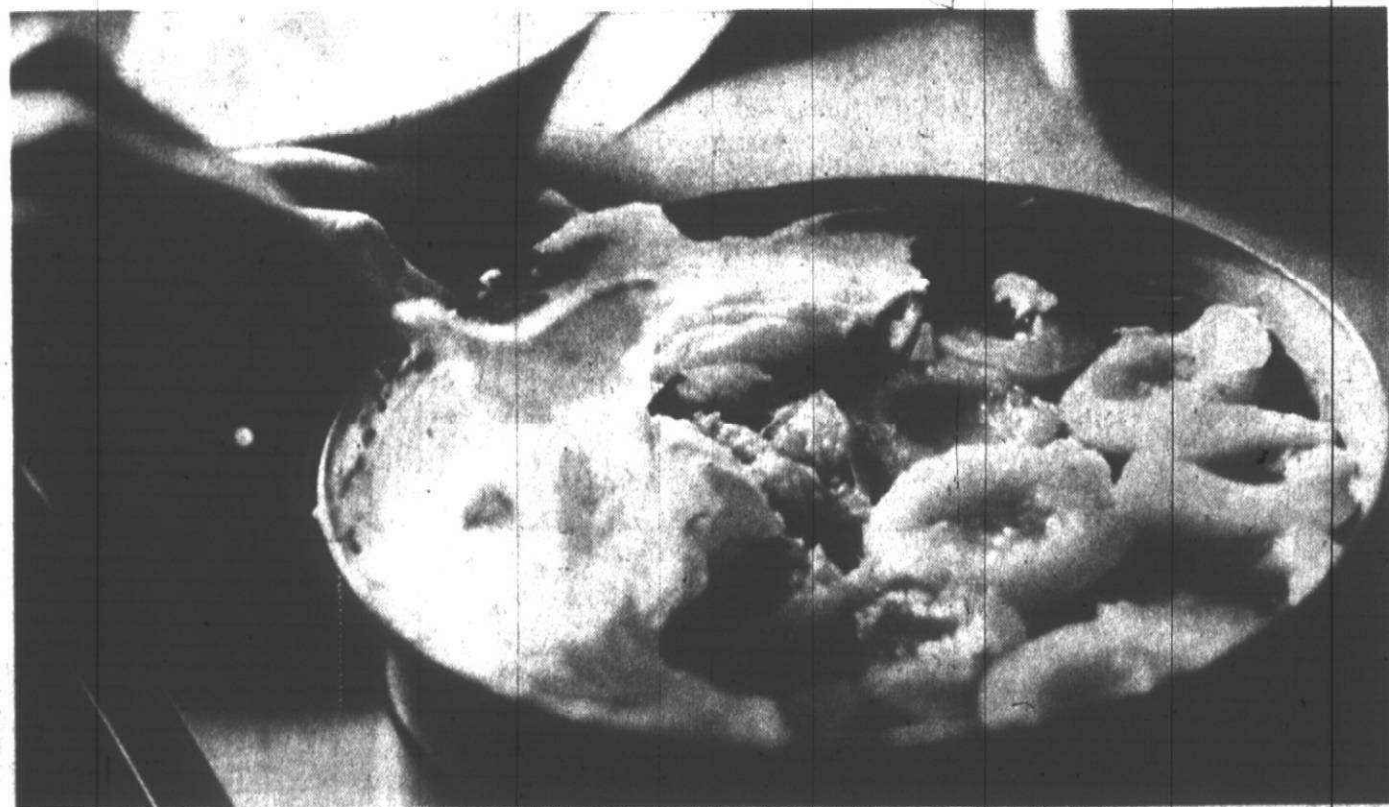
The apricot cake was good and the mousse spooned over it, a fresh delight.

Mrs. Carthew offers recipes

TARTE REVERSEE A L'ABRICOT

(Upside Down Apricot Cake)
(One 8-inch cake)
14-ounce can apricot halves (drained)
2 tablespoons clear honey
4 ounces (½ cup) sugar
2 eggs
5 ounces (¾ cup) plus 1 teaspoon butter
6 ounces (1 ½ cup) flour, sifted with 1½ teaspoon baking powder
3 tablespoons milk

Set oven at 350 degrees F. Using the teaspoon of butter, grease the bottom and sides of the cake tin. Cut 1 ounce (2 tablespoons) of the remaining butter into small pieces and dot them over the base of the tin. Spoon the honey into tin. Arrange the apricot halves, cut side uppermost, in the tin. Set aside.

In a medium-sized mixing bowl, beat the remaining butter with a wooden spoon until it is soft and creamy. Add the sugar and cream it with the butter until the mixture is light and fluffy. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well until they are thoroughly blended. Using a large metal spoon, fold in the flour mixture. Stir in the milk.

Spoon the batter into the cake tin and smooth it over with the back of the spoon. Place in the oven and bake

for 50 minutes to one hour or until the cake is golden brown.

MOUSSE DE FROMAGE BLANC AUX ABRICOTS

(Cream Cheese and Apricots Dessert)
1 packet (8 ounces) of cream cheese
3 eggs
1 small tin of apricots (drained)
3 tablespoons of rum, brandy, ginger wine
Few sliced almonds
½ teaspoon of vanilla
3 ounces sugar (¾ of a cup)

Cut half of the apricots in small pieces and place them in a dish. Work the cream cheese with a fork until soft. Beat egg whites until stiff. Beat the egg yolks with the sugar until white and fluffy in a large bowl. Add the cream cheese, the brandy, the vanilla and egg whites. Spoon the mixture on top of the cut-up apricots and leave to set for two hours. Decorate with the sliced almonds and the remaining apricots.

POULET JACQUELINE

1 chicken, or chicken breast
2 ounces butter
2 onions
1 tablespoon flour
1 glass port (¼ cup)
8 ounces cream
1 pint chicken stock
Juice of half a lemon

Garnish

3 ounces sliced almonds
2 ounces butter
2 pounds sliced apples
Salt and pepper

Cut the chicken in small pieces and season. Melt the butter in a large pan. Add the chicken pieces to the warm butter and saute them "au blanc" (keep them white while cooking).

Add sliced onions and cook for few minutes (au blanc). When the chicken pieces and the onions have been sautéed but are still white, add flour. Add the port and the chicken stock. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes.

When the chicken pieces are cooked, take them out of the pan and set them on the serving dish (keep warm). Return the sauce to the heat and reduce it to half its volume. Remove the pan from the heat and add the cream and the lemon juice. Return to the heat and cook very gently for a few more minutes.

Meanwhile, toast the almond slices and fry the sliced apples in the remaining butter. Salt and pepper to taste. Pour the sauce on the chicken pieces; garnish with the apple slices and decorate with the toasted almonds.

Canton Chamber request deserves better answer

The request made by the Canton Chamber of Commerce to Canton Township officials seemed entirely reasonable. Unfortunately, the response from the township supervisor was less than reasonable.

The chamber would like more dialogue between the township board and merchants — particularly more communication on ordinances which affect business operations. The sore spot for Supervisor Robert Greenstein appears to be that the chamber would like to read ordinance proposals before they're presented to the board so they can have a chance to make intelligent comment.

Greenstein isn't against the chamber making intelligent comment but doesn't want merchants seeing any ordinance before it is introduced at a public board meeting.

Greenstein further expresses fear the chamber could become too powerful and become a political lobby which could then hand-pick Canton officials. He also explains that his administration will represent the "taxpayer," not any special interest groups such as the business community.

IT SHOULD NOT be overlooked that the chamber does, indeed, represent a large hunk of taxpayers. Sometimes it is forgotten that businesses pay real estate property taxes — plus personal property taxes — which contribute to a community's growth. Homeowners aren't the only entities on the tax rolls.

Greenstein uses the label "special interest group" when it serves his purpose and uses nicer

labels, such as "the citizens," when describing political allies.

There is no doubt that in the political arena of Canton Township, one of the strongest "special interest" groups is the homeowners associations. It is this special group which swept Greenstein and his slate into office. The difference between the political clout of a homeowners association and the potential endorsement power of a chamber is elusive at best.

THE POINT to be made is that merchants also have an investment — "special interest" if you will — in Canton and should be given at least equal treatment to others with investments in the township.

Obviously, the chamber could offer more intelligent input on ordinances affecting business if its members could examine proposed measures before introduced before the board for consideration.

This is not a mysterious request with dubious undertones. It's just common sense. And it would not break any traditions. Greenstein often confers with homeowner representatives before introducing measures before the board. In fact, on some items Greenstein has hinged passage on an action on homeowner acquiescence.

There is plenty of dialogue between residential taxpayers and residential special interest groups. Some of that dialogue could be spared to communicate with the business community. It would help residents as well as merchants and contribute to Canton's balanced growth.

Daniels Den

Having criticized Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein in the above editorial, the introduction of Daniels Den to Canton readers might be an appropriate time to mention some of the good things the Greenstein administration has done and is doing.

There is good and bad in each person, and Greenstein has his share of both. So let's look at the sunny side of Bob Greenstein.

GREENSTEIN AND his administration have set a fast pace in adopting innovative measures which will do a lot down the road for Canton.

I am most impressed with his proposal to build bike and bridle paths along the strip of land underneath those giant electric transformer towers which cut across Canton's landscape.

For the time being, the towers will continue to cut its ugly path and the night will have to be tolerated. But how great it is that Greenstein has

enough imagination to make useful something which is a nuisance. I wish him luck in negotiating with Detroit Edison for its agreement with the proposal.

ANOTHER INNOVATION of the Greenstein administration, this measure proposed by Treasurer Carl Parsell, is the recently adopted tree ordinance.

This ordinance requires builders to replace any trees which are removed to make way for structures. In a practical way, the ordinance recognizes that often trees must be removed to make room for homes and other buildings. But in a beautiful way, it recognizes that trees can be planted and trees can grow, and there can be a green future for the next generation of Cantonites.

A proposed measure which is quite innovative would ban residential builders from removing topsoil from a construction site. Again and again, in other communities, builders have come in and removed topsoil. Some-

times the topsoil is removed and hauled away and then sold back again to the person buying the house.

Ecologically, it is a rape of the soil and just as harmful to the environment as the rape of a person.

There is no reason in God's little green acres that topsoil cannot be left on the lot while the foundation is being laid, and then respread when grading is done. No reason except that many builders don't want to go to the trouble of doing so. Greenstein insists they should and he is right.

Greenstein was also on track when he guided passage of an ordinance requiring posting of rezoning information on property up for rezoning. This is another novel ordinance which other nearby communities are looking at to copy.

Bob, you have been a creative supervisor. But, sometimes, you are also a destructive supervisor. Your destructive side is the topic of the above editorial. Your creative leanings I now commend.

"What To Do If Your Husband Leaves (Or If You Must Leave Your Husband)" is the lengthy title of a pamphlet that owes its existence to anguishing problems brought to volunteers at the women's resource center of Schoolcraft College.

"Those who help at the center frequently get calls from women who don't know where to turn after their husbands leave them," says attorney Jean Wagner, who compiled the booklet.

"They are so upset, they are more or less paralyzed. Some are so shocked by what has taken place that they don't have the gumption to call the utility companies and ask for an extension on paying their bills."

An attorney for the Plymouth firm of Millar, Weinberg, Necker and Johnson, Mrs. Wagner put together the booklet on the basis of her own knowledge, from media material and from information provided by the Feminist Law Center at the University of Michigan.

In the main, the pamphlet deals with financial problems.

"MARSHAL YOUR ASSETS," is Mrs. Wagner's first piece of advice.

"Gather all the savings or checking accounts, savings bonds or other assets available to you that you can use to pay immediate bills. Place them in an account in your name."

Check full or part-time job opportunities in local want ads or with the Michigan Employment Security Com-

mission, she says. Check relatives who might provide a temporary loan. If luxury items around the home could be sold for quick cash, hold a garage sale.

Mrs. Wagner also suggests that a woman make an effort to obtain support from her husband. To do this a lawyer would probably be needed, and her pamphlet lists a number of sources for legal help.

She suggests contacting Feminist Legal Services at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, or the Neighborhood Legal Service Center, 1001 Fox Building, Detroit.

She also advises contacting legal aid clinics at the University of Detroit and Wayne State University.

A LAWYER also may be found through the Lawyer's Referral Serv-

ice of Livonia and the Detroit Bar Association.

"Many attorneys will provide an initial interview at a modest fee," explains Mrs. Wagner.

"If you have no money for attorney fees and no quick free help, there are two other options," she says. "See the Michigan Department of Social Services.

"If you are eligible for, or are receiving public assistance, and a father is not providing necessary support, a support action will be brought for you by the Friend of the Court upon referral from MDSS.

"This will be enforced the same as any Circuit Court divorce order."

The other option is to file a criminal non-support complaint with the police in your city.

"Remember, you must be prepared to testify against your husband," she says. "Charges will be dropped if he offers to pay. The county prosecutor's office will handle this on referral from your local police."

"THE NEXT STEP, Mrs. Wagner feels, is to take stock of your means for paying household expenses. She offers a priority list involving these costs, starting with food. House payment or rent is next followed by payments for utilities and maintaining the car.

For help with food, check food stamp eligibility at MDDSS.

Concerning house payment or rent she warns, "If you have a mortgage and are unable to meet payments, there is a danger of foreclosure."

Contact your mortgage company immediately and tell it of the situation, she advises. Offer to pay interest only for a limited time, or try to renegotiate for smaller monthly payments.

If you can't reach an agreement with the mortgage company, it might be possible to have the payments met

by MDSS if you are eligible, she suggests.

"If you received notice of foreclosure, there will be between six months to one year from the time of foreclosure sale to redeem your home," Mrs. Wagner points out.

"The notice of foreclosure sale posted on your property will give date of sale and redemption time. Redemption after sale, however, can take place only if all costs of foreclosure are paid. It will be a more expensive proposition.

"Only after the redemption period is over will you have to vacate the premises."

IN THE CASE of problems meeting rent payments, contact your landlord and try to get an extension. MDSS may meet rent payments in eligible cases, Mrs. Wagner advises.

Utility bills also require immediate attention because the party in the house is responsible for them. Here again, she suggests using the phone.

"Contact each utility company immediately," she urges. "Part payments may be worked out. Generally companies are required to allow you 21 days to pay your bills.

"Under the new Michigan Bill of Rights for utility customers, you are entitled to a hearing before your utilities are cut off. But if payment has not been made, they will be cut off, so arrangements should be made immediately.

"Telephones are sometimes disconnected within 10 days."

THE FOURTH priority concerns the car. If it is necessary for getting to work or looking for work, car payments and insurance must be paid.

"If the bank holds a lien on the car it can be repossessed," says the attorney. "Contact creditors immedi-

ately and try to work out reduced payments."

She also suggests trading in a large car for a more economical one, but adds, "If the car is in your husband's name or held jointly, he must also sign the title transfer."

For items on which a bank or finance company holds a lien, Mrs. Wagner suggests trying to turn back the item if they will waive the deficiency, or trying to work out a better payment schedule.

"Notify all creditors that you will pay as soon as possible," she says. "Start a schedule of part payments, even if very small ones. Pay off bills with higher interest first if there is a choice."

FOR INFORMATION on credit counseling contact Credit Counseling Centers, Inc., which has several offices in the Detroit metropolitan area.

The Michigan Department of Social Services can provide a number of services for a family without funds.

To apply for financial assistance, all kinds of records and documents are needed.

"Bring your Social Security card and all other forms of identification," says Mrs. Wagner. "Bring your marriage certificate, proof of residence, proof of house and utility payments, divorce verifications, children's birth records and school records, unemployment benefit card, paycheck stubs, and if any, bank books, credit cards and tax receipts.

Inasmuch as Mrs. Wagner is offering practical solutions to real problems, she also includes advice on visiting social services department offices.

"The waits are exasperatingly long," she notes. "You would do well to arrive early, carry a sandwich and a couple of magazines."

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**CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON
Board Proceedings**

A regular meeting of the Township Board of the Charter Township of Canton was held at 128 Canton Center Road on June 24, 1975 at 8:00 P.M. The meeting was called to order by Supervisor Greenstein. Members present: Greenstein, Flodin, Parsell, Cheske, Myers, Poole, Schwall. Members absent: None.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that the following ordinance be introduced, tabled and published:

LAND FILL ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to regulate the dumping and depositing of sand, gravel, earth, rock, stone, concrete, minerals, garbage, rubbish, refuse, waste materials, sludge, noxious liquids, trees, limbs, wood chips, leaves, street sweepings, construction, demolition and other materials on lands located within the Charter Township of Canton, Wayne County, Michigan; to provide for the issuance of licenses for such activities; to provide for fees; to prescribe rules and regulations and conditions for the issuance of such licenses; to provide for bonds to insure satisfactory performance of the terms of said Ordinance, and to provide penalties for the violation thereof. The Charter Township of Canton ordains:

ARTICLE 1.00 TITLE, PURPOSE AND APPLICATION

Section 1.01 Title
This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Township of Canton Landfill Ordinance.

Section 1.02 Purpose
The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect the public health, safety and general welfare of the residents of the Township by the regulation of the location, design, materials deposited, operation and management of landfills so that no landfill shall be a nuisance, nor cause any damage to surrounding property, to the ground or surface water, become a breeding ground or harborage for insects and rodents, become a financial liability upon the community when abandoned, nor endanger the health or safety of the community.

Section 1.03 Scope
From and after the effective date of this Ordinance, no person, firm, partnership, corporation or public body shall dispose of any earth, refuse, garbage, rubbish, ashes or any waste material at any place in the Township except at an approved disposal area, nor shall any disposal area be established, operated, leased, managed, or conducted unless it conforms with this Ordinance and is approved by the Township Board as a sanitary landfill, as provided by this Ordinance and licensed in accordance with the Solid Waste Management Act, Public Act 87, of the Public Acts of 1965.

ARTICLE 2.00 DEFINITIONS

- Article 2.01 Definitions**
- a. Cell: The daily compacted refuse which is completely enveloped by earth cover material.
 - b. Disposal Area: A site, location, tract of land, area, building, structure or premise used or intended to be used for refuse disposal in a manner prescribed by this Ordinance.
 - c. Ground Water: Water in the ground that is in the zone of saturation.
 - d. Refuse: Solid wastes, except body wastes, and including garbage, rubbish, ashes, incinerator ash, incinerator residue, street cleanings and solid industrial wastes.
 - (1) Garbage - rejected food wastes including waste accumulation of animal, fruit or vegetable matter used or intended to be used for food or that attends the preparation, use, cooking, dealing in or storing or meat, fish, fowl, fruit or vegetable.
 - (2) Rubbish - Nonputrescible solid wastes, excluding ashes, consisting of both combustible and noncombustible wastes, such as paper, cardboard, metal containers, yard clippings, wood, glass, bedding, crockery, demolished building materials or litter of any kind that will be a detriment to the public health and safety.
 - (3) Ashes - residue from the burning of wood, coal, coke or other combustible materials.
 - e. Hazardous Material: Includes, but is not limited to, explosives, pathological wastes, radioactive materials and chemicals.
 - f. Open Dump: A site where refuse is dumped and which due to lack of operational procedures may create a breeding place for flies and rats, may catch fire or may produce air pollution.
 - g. Salvaging: The controlled removal of reusable materials.
 - h. Sanitary Landfill: A method of disposing of refuse on land without creating nuisances or hazards to public health or safety, by utilizing principles of engineering to confine the refuse to the smallest practical area, to reduce it to the smallest practical volume, to cover it with a layer of suitable earth cover at the conclusion of each day's operation or at more frequent intervals as necessary, and in conformity with all operational requirements of this Ordinance.
 - i. Scavenging: Uncontrolled picking of refuse, as previously defined.

ARTICLE 3.00 EXCEPTIONS

- Section 3.01 Exceptions**
It is the intent of this Ordinance to exempt from the provisions of this Ordinance the following:
- a. Disposal by an individual of refuse from his own household on his own land as long as such disposal does not create a nuisance or health hazard.
 - b. Disposal of rubbish accumulated as a part of the improvement for planting of privately owned farmland on the property generating the rubbish, provided such disposal does not create a nuisance or health hazard.

ARTICLE 4.00 DISPOSAL AREA SUITABILITY AND DETERMINATION

Section 4.01 Zoning District
The establishment of any disposal area shall be limited to the M-2 General Industrial Zoning District as shown on the Zoning Map of the Township Zoning Ordinance.

Section 4.02 Preliminary Investigation
The owner, or his agent, of land upon whose premises it is proposed to construct a disposal area shall submit a preliminary application to the Township Board for determination of the acceptability of the proposed location. The preliminary application shall include:

- a. Legal description of the proposed site.
- b. Statement of the type of ownership held by the applicant.
- c. Scale drawing of the proposed site showing site characteristics, existing and proposed land use on adjoining properties, zoning, road access and routes to be used by vehicles bringing refuse and cover material to the proposed site.
- d. Soil profiles to a minimum depth of twenty (20) feet below the lowest excavation proposed.
- e. Operational controls to be established and maintained for the disposal area.
- f. Description of the type of refuse and waste material to be disposed.
- g. Description of the intended use after completion of the disposal area.
- h. Time table giving estimates by length of time for establishing the disposal area and its completion.

The Township Board shall, upon receipt of the preliminary application, and if it finds that the applicant has furnished sufficient information as required by this Section, refer the application, for a report and recommendation, to the Planning Commission, Township Engineer and Township Planner.

The Planning Commission, Township Engineer and Township Planner shall within sixty (60) days submit in writing to the Township Board a report and recommendation on the preliminary application.

Upon receipt of the reports from the Township Planning Commission, Engineer and Planner, the Township Board shall within forty-five (45) days make a determination on the application. The Township Board shall consider if: the proposed method of landfill is according to good engineering practice; the operational controls will result in a nuisance free disposal area; anticipated vehicle traffic generated by the operation will not unduly contribute to congestion on the public roads nor cause unnecessary maintenance or premature deterioration of the road pavement; the proposed future land use of the completed disposal area will be harmonious with existing and future land use patterns and be beneficial to the community; and that the applicant has sufficient financial capability or can secure financial capability to insure the continuing orderly operation of the disposal area in full compliance with this Ordinance.

Section 4.03 Final Investigation

If the Township Board finds that the applicant is in favorable compliance with the intent of Section 4.02 of this Ordinance, the applicant shall submit to the Township the following information regarding the proposed disposal area, prepared by a Registered Professional Engineer, licensed by the State of Michigan:

- a. Maps drawn to a scale of not over one hundred feet to the inch, showing:
 - (1) All property lines, dimensional and related to the nearest convenient section line and section corner.
 - (2) Date, scale and north arrow.
 - (3) Location and height of all existing and proposed buildings and land uses on and within 500 feet of the premises.
 - (4) Location, pavement and right-of-way width of all abutting roads and access routes for vehicles hauling refuse or cover material to the disposal area.
 - (5) Existing trees and ground cover.
 - (6) Existing bodies of water, drains, streams or creeks.
 - (7) Proposed fencing.
 - (8) Existing and proposed contour intervals, with two (2) foot interval minimum. Topography to be based upon Wayne County (U.S.C.G.S.) Bench Mark System.
 - (9) Vicinity map showing in a general manner, the property in relation to the surrounding area for at least one mile from the premises.
 - (10) Name and firm address of the professional individual responsible for the preparation of the information.
 - (11) Name, address and telephone number of the property owner.
 - (12) Size and location of all existing and proposed utilities including details of drainage facilities showing the method of drainage control during the phasing as well as how drainage will be accomplished after completion.
 - (13) On-site details including proposed areas to be filled, any borrow areas, on-site roads, and soil characteristics.
- b. Additional data and information:
 - (1) A statement describing the volume and type of refuse materials proposed to be placed in the disposal area.
 - (2) Plans showing typical sections of compacted fill, depths of layers, height of lifts, thickness of cover, number of lifts, surface slopes of lifts and final surface, direction of progress and type of venting proposed.
 - (3) Proposed future reuse of the premises after completion of the filling of the disposal area. The applicant shall provide maps or plans showing at the same scale as in Section 4.03, a, above, proposed land uses, buildings, streets and other public easements. The maps or plans shall not propose or show streets or underground utilities on areas to be filled with any refuse material.

- (4) When material other than earth is to be used as fill material, a competent professional investigation shall be submitted showing the highest expected ground water level, any connection with an aquifer constituting a source of water supply, and if a lowering of the groundwater is contemplated, whether this would adversely affect any water supply.
- (5) A plan which provides a detailed analysis of the direction the land fill operation will follow; origin and U.S.D.A. Soil Classification of cover material, location of stockpiled cover material, the order in which areas will be filled; and the provisions which will be made to control soil erosion and sedimentation from the partially completed site.

ARTICLE 5.00 DISPOSAL AREA DESIGN REQUIREMENTS

Section 5.01 On-Site Roads
All on-site roads shall be designed and constructed in accordance with current Wayne County Road Commission Standards for aggregate surface roads with open ditches. Roads shall be maintained in a manner to achieve free flowing daily operating traffic uninterrupted by ordinary inclement weather and also maintained in a rutfree, dust free condition. Road construction, location and design shall be subject to review and approval of the Township Engineer.

Section 5.02 Filling of Wet Areas
a. No filling of any type shall be permitted which will encroach upon the flood area of any body of water, drain or stream.
b. Draining or diking of earth fills shall be maintained so that no fill material shall be washed, eroded or in any way enter any body of water, drain, stream or adjoining property. Dikes shall be keyed to a level below any permeable surface soils such as sand or loam.
c. No filling or any material shall be permitted, except earth material, into any ponded water area, marsh, former gravel pit, swamps, nor less than twenty (20) feet above the highest expected water table as determined in Section 4.03, b, above.

Section 5.03 Permanent Facilities
a. Suitable permanent shelter and sanitary facilities shall be provided and maintained for persons working on the premises.
b. A telephone readily accessible to all persons on the premises shall be permanently maintained.
c. Suitable equipment shall be permanently maintained to extinguish fires and measures shall be taken to prevent their occurrence.
d. Adequate numbers, types and sizes of properly maintained equipment shall be used in operating the disposal area and standby equipment shall be available on the site or readily obtainable from other sources during equipment breakdowns or during peak loads.

Section 5.04 Perimeter Setbacks
No trenching, filling, borrowing or excavations shall take place within fifty (50) feet of any perimeter property line, within three hundred (300) feet of any public road right-of-way nor within thirty (30) feet of any drain which leaves the site without a sedimentation basin.

Section 5.05 Access
Access to or egress from any disposal area site shall be only from a Class "A" County Primary Road as designated by the Wayne County Road Commission.

Section 5.06 Minimum Site
An eighty (80) acre land parcel shall be the minimum size for the establishment of any disposal area.

Section 5.07 Surface Drainage
The entire site of any disposal area, including the fill surface, shall be graded and provided with drainage facilities to minimize runoff onto and into the fill, to prevent erosion or washing of the fill, and to prevent the collection of standing water.

Section 5.08 Fencing
The entire disposal area premises shall be fenced with an eight (8') foot high "chain link" type fence. Portable litter fences shall be used in the immediate vicinity of the working area and at other appropriate locations to control blowing litter. At the end of each operating day, or more often as required, litter shall be removed from the fences and the grounds and incorporated into the cell being used.

ARTICLE 6.00 DISPOSAL AREA FILLING REQUIREMENTS

Section 6.01 Sanitary Landfill Method
The use of refuse or other waste material as fill material in any disposal area shall be with the sanitary landfill method only and shall be so designed and operated that conditions of pollution will not be created and injury to ground or surface water will be prevented. The disposal of human wastes, animal wastes, hazardous materials, and dead animals, is specifically prohibited.

Section 6.02 Refuse Compaction and Cover
a. Refuse shall be spread so that it can be compacted in layers not exceeding a depth of two (2) feet of compacted material. Large and bulky items, exceeding two (2) feet in height, when placed as fill material, shall be broken into smaller sections equal in height to the compacted refuse.
b. A compacted layer of at least six (6) inches of an approved earth cover material shall be placed on all exposed refuse by the end of each working day. The volume of individual cells shall not exceed the daily quantity of waste material.
c. Daily cover material shall be of one of the following soil classifications as described by the "Guide for the Textural Classification of Soils" by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service:
(1) Sandy Clay Loam
(2) Loam
(3) Sandy Loam.

Final cover material shall be an earth material which is free of large rocks and putrescible materials, can be easily spread under all moisture conditions and can be compacted to a density so as to prohibit the intrusion of surface water.
d. A layer of approved earth cover material compacted to a minimum thickness of two (2) feet and seeded, shall be placed over the entire surface of each portion of the final lift not later than one (1) month following the placement of refuse within that portion. During the winter months seeding may be delayed until weather allows in the Spring.
Within one (1) year after the completion of the placement and grading of any final cover the entire area shall be dressed with four (4") inches of an approved topsoil and seeded with hardy perennial grass. The final cover depth shall be maintained for a period of at least two (2) years and all cracked eroded, and uneven areas in the final cover shall be repaired.

Section 6.03 Final Grade Elevations
The final elevations of the completed disposal area including the final cover, shall not exceed ten (10') feet above the average elevations existing prior to the establishment of the premises for a disposal area. In the case of a highway construction borrow pit or land significantly depressed from adjoining land parcels, the Township Board may permit the final elevations to be greater than the above, but in no case shall they exceed ten (10') feet above the grade of adjoining land parcels.

Slope of the sides of the final disposal area shall be not steeper than four to one (4:1), i.e., four units of horizontal distance to each one unit of vertical rise.

Section 6.04 Land Reuse Capability

- a. Placement of refuse and waste material shall be conducted in such a manner so as to permit the reuse of the disposal area for industrial development. The disposal area when completed shall be capable of platting and development as an industrial subdivision, thus refuse and waste material other than earth shall not be placed beneath the location of proposed street right-of-ways and shall conform with the approved plans submitted under Section 4.03, b.
- b. The disposal area shall be compartmentalized by means of earth fill dams extending vertically and horizontally through the disposal area. The earth fill dams shall coincide in location with the location of future streets proposed by the industrial subdivision capability and have a minimum width of six (6) feet throughout.
- c. The disposal area shall be provided with a venting system adequate to facilitate the ready expulsion of gases generated by the decomposition of materials in the disposal area.

ARTICLE 7.00 OPERATION

- a. The disposal area shall be under the direction of responsible personnel during any period of operation and access shall be limited to those periods when such persons are on duty.
- b. Access shall be limited to those persons and vehicles authorized to use the disposal area and Township, County and State personnel on official business.
- c. Measures shall be provided to control dust and blowing paper.
- d. No burning shall be permitted on any disposal area.
- e. Salvaging is permitted and shall be so organized so as to not interfere with prompt disposal of refuse or create unsightliness or health hazards. Scavenging is prohibited.
- f. Hours of operation shall be limited to the hours between 7:00 A.M. and 9:00 P.M. on Monday through Saturday except legal holidays.
- g. During winter operations, a supply of unfrozen earth cover material shall be made available and no frozen earth cover material shall be placed on the daily refuse fill.
- h. The hauling of refuse or earth cover material to the disposal area shall be confined to routes approved by the Township Board. Vehicles shall have clean wheels (tires and rims) before reentering a public road.
- i. Supplemental insect and rodent control measures shall be instituted whenever necessary.
- j. Points of access to a disposal area shall be controlled by a locked gate at all times refuse is not being delivered and/or an attendant is not on duty.
- k. Excavation shall precede placement of fill material by at least one hundred (100'), but shall not exceed two hundred (200') feet. Not more than two (2) working faces shall be active at any one time.

ARTICLE 8.00 ISSUANCE OF PERMIT

Section 8.01 Conformance With Ordinance
If the Township Board is satisfied that the applicant has fulfilled the requirements of Section 4.03, and other provisions of this Ordinance and after a public hearing, the Township Board may issue a permit for the operation of a disposal area for a period of one year.

Section 8.02 Permit Renewal Or Cancellation
Permits issued in conformance with this Ordinance may be renewed by the Township Board for two-year period, if:

- a. Reasonable progress has been made in the construction of the disposal area and.
 - b. Operation of the disposal area has conformed, since the last permit renewal date or establishment of the disposal area, to the approved plans, conditions and this Ordinance and.
 - c. Permit fees have been paid.
- Permits issued by the Township Board may be refused for renewal or cancelled if:
- a. Operations are inactive or conducted on so small of a scale that, in the opinion of the Township, the duration of filling operation will itself constitute a nuisance, or.

- b. Operation of the disposal area has developed a previously unforeseen nuisance or health hazard or safety to the Township, and adequate measures have not been instituted to correct such conditions, or.
- c. Permit fees have not been paid.

ARTICLE 9.00 FINAL FILL PLAN

Upon completion of a disposal area, the permit holder shall supply to the Township and record with the Wayne County Register of Deeds, an "as built" plan which shall show by accurate references and be prepared by a Registered Civil Engineer, the actual location, depth, and types of fill and any leachate or gas control facilities which will have to be continued, and final surface elevations. This plan shall be drawn to the same scale and refer to the same elevation control as submitted under Section 4.03. A copy of the final plan shall be retained by the Township for future reference.

ARTICLE 10.00

MAINTENANCE AND PERFORMANCE GUARANTEES, INSPECTION AND REVIEW FEES; AND DEPOSIT OF BOND AND CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE.

Section 10.01 Review and Permit Fees
Fees payable to the Township for review of plans and information submitted to the Township Board in accordance with the preliminary application provisions of Section 4.02 shall be Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00).

Fees payable to the Township for review of plans and information submitted to the Township Board in accordance with the Section 4.03 shall be Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) per acre. The permit renewal fee shall be Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to be paid bi-annually.

Section 10.03 Deposits
Cash Deposits shall be made to the Township, to assure payment of permit fees and completion of the disposal area in accordance with this Ordinance, prior to the issuance of a permit by the Township Board. The cash deposit shall be Twenty-Five (\$25.00) per acre. The Township Board may at its discretion utilize the cash deposit to implement or seek enforcement of this Ordinance, conduct inspections during the operation of the disposal area or if it finds that the public health and welfare are being endangered by the condition of the disposal area, order emergency, corrective measures be taken and to be paid from the cash deposit remaining in the Township's possession.
Upon completion of the disposal area, the Township Board may return any unused portions of the cash deposit.

Section 10.04 Bond and Certificate of Insurance
The Township shall require, prior to the issuance of any permit, the applicant to deposit a surety bond, in an amount to be fixed by the Township Board, guaranteeing that the applicant will faithfully perform all of the conditions and requirements under this Ordinance.

The Township Board may, at its discretion, waive the requirement of depositing a surety bond if it is satisfied that the applicant has posted sufficient bonds with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, in accordance with Act 87, P. A. of 1965 as amended.

The Township shall also require, that the applicant deposit a certificate of a responsible indemnity company, in an amount to be fixed by the Township Board and related to the proposed work to be done insuring the Township and the public against any loss or damages arising in any way from the operation of the proposed disposal area.

ARTICLE 11.00 ENFORCEMENT

This Ordinance shall be enforceable by the Township Supervisor or his employees or agents, as he may designate; the Township Police; the Wayne County Sheriff and/or Sheriff's Deputies; and/or the Director of the Division of Environmental Health, Wayne County Health Department.

ARTICLE 12.00 SEVERABILITY, REPEAL, PENALTY

Section 12.01 Severability
If any portion of this Ordinance should be determined to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court, the remainder shall be considered severable and shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 12.02 Repeal of Prior Ordinance
Any portion of any Ordinance or resolution heretofore adopted relating to disposal areas or sanitary land fill method of operations, including Ordinance No. 27, are hereby superseded.

Section 12.03 Penalty
Any person, firm or corporation in violation of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and be punished by a fine of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days, or both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court, together with the costs of said prosecution.

ARTICLE 13.00 ADOPTION AND EFFECTIVE DATE

The foregoing Ordinance was adopted by the Canton Township Board at a meeting held at the Township Hall, in said Township on _____ and ordered published in the _____, a newspaper having general circulation in the Township.

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days from the date of publication.
A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Parsell and unanimously carried that the following ordinance be introduced, tabled and published:

ORDINANCE NO. _____

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON STREET NUMBER AND DISPLAY ORDINANCE

An Ordinance providing for the designation and assignment of street numbers for buildings located along public roadways; providing for the development of a uniform system for said purpose; providing for the public health, safety and welfare by requiring that street numbers be in arabic numerals and readily identifiable by members of police agencies and fire departments in cases of emergencies, and providing penalties for the violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 1: TERMS DEFINED

- 1. The term "building" refers to any structure, public or private, which is being used or is intended for use for residential, commercial, industrial or governmental purposes.
- 2. The term "public roadway" refers to all highways, avenues, thoroughfares, streets and all other manner of ways of passage over which the general public has a right of ingress and overland travel, whether said roadway be under the supervision of the Township, the County of Wayne, or State of Michigan.
- 3. The term "Edison numbering system" refers to the system of street number designation developed by the Detroit Edison Company prior to the adoption of the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 4. The term "Occupant" refers to the owner of a building or the person or persons in possession or control thereof.
- 5. The term "Department" refers to the Department of Building and Safety.

SECTION 2: DEVELOPMENT OF A UNIFORM STREET NUMBER SYSTEM

The Department is hereby assigned the responsibility of developing a uniform street number system within the Township based on the Edison numbering system. Street number determination shall be in conformity with the following formula: one full number shall be allowed for each five (5) feet of frontage on each side of any public road. In any case where a road follows a crescent, circular or otherwise meandering course and strict compliance with the foregoing even-odd numbering rule is therefore impracticable, the Department shall conform to said rule to the extent to which conformity is possible making such exceptions and modifications in application as appear warranted under the circumstances of the particular case. The Department shall take appropriate measures to insure that the Edison numbering system be brought into conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance to the extent practicable. For this purpose the Department may order existing street numbers be changed in accordance with the one number per five (5) feet formula.

SECTION 3: ARABIC NUMERAL DISPLAY REQUIREMENTS

The Occupant of a building shall cause the street number to be displayed on the front of said building by posting Arabic numerals of at least four (4) inches in height on or near the front entrance or, in the absence of such an entrance, on or near that area of the building which is located to the right of the building's front side, facing said building from the road, but in no case shall such posting be higher than nine (9) feet or less than six (6) feet above ground level. Said numerals shall be of a color which contrasts with and is distinguishable from the color of the background posting area. If said building is on a rural mail route, the Occupant shall also conform to the United States Postal Service regulations requiring display of street numbers on roadside mailboxes. For purposes of enforcing the display requirement, an Occupant who allows posted numerals to be covered or partially hidden by trees, awnings, overhanging appurtenances, or any other manner of obstacles to clear visibility from the road shall be regarded as having failed to comply with this Ordinance and shall be subject to the penalty hereinafter provided.

SECTION 4: ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES FOR NONCOMPLIANCE

The Department shall in all cases attempt to solicit the Occupant's voluntary compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance by notifying the Occupant of any non-compliance herewith in addition to the possible penalty for continued non-compliance. Failure to correct a non-compliance sixty (60) days after the first notice shall cause the Department to issue a second notice to the Occupant. Continued failure to correct a non-compliance thirty (30) days after issuance of the second notice shall be a misdemeanor and shall subject the offending Occupant to a fine of not more than ONE HUNDRED (\$100) DOLLARS.

SECTION 5: EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall become effective upon publication.
A motion was made by Parsell that a Recreation Commission be formed. The motion failed for lack of support.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that the proposed amendments to Ordinance No. 29 relative to Footing Drains be accepted for study.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Myers and unanimously carried that \$500.00 be advanced to the Canton Township Bicentennial Committee for supplies.

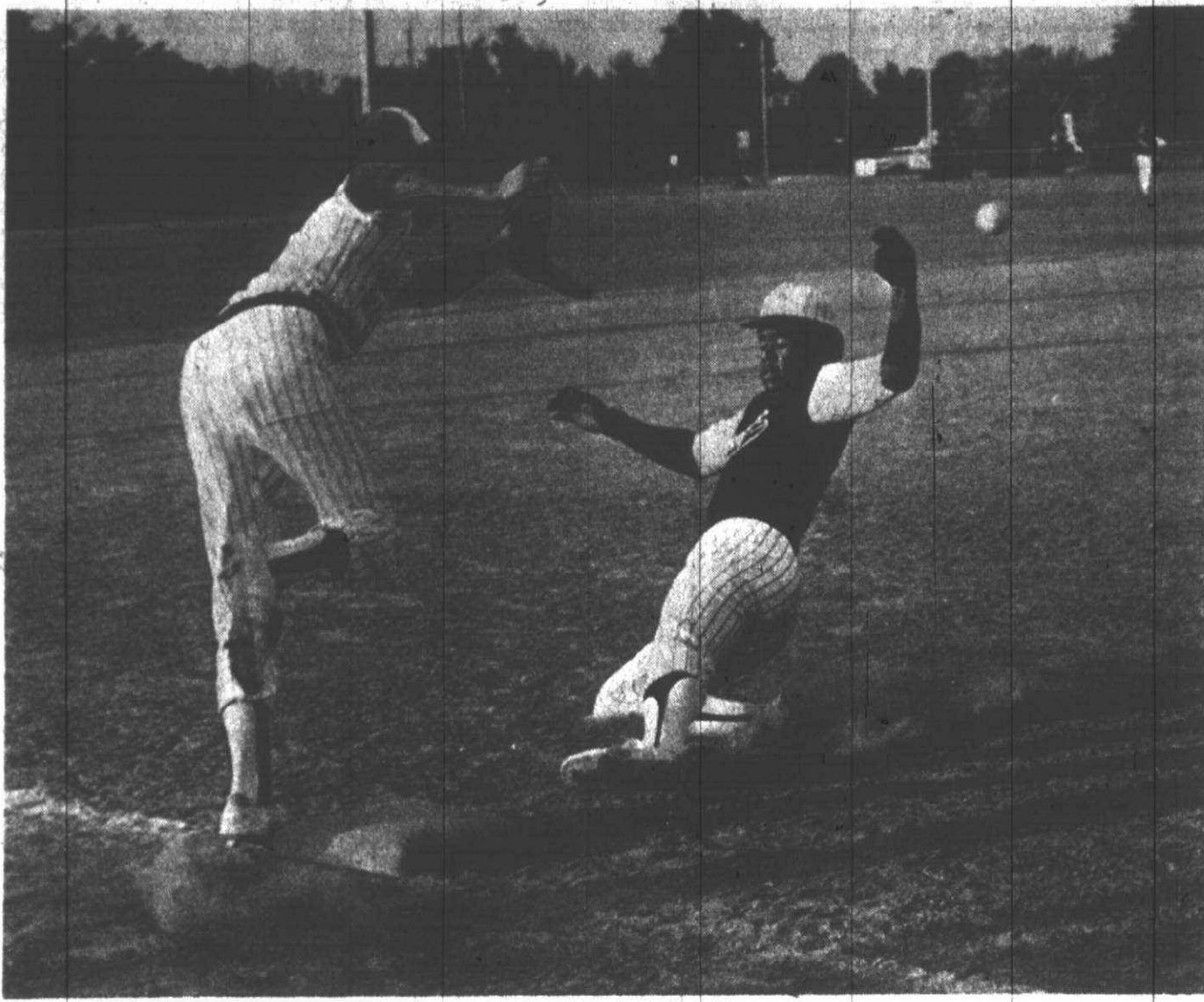

The Legion team managed to score two runs in that inning on one hit.

When Legionaire Rick Corner came on in the sixth to hit a Dan Bobowski pitch beyond the Ford Field left field fence with one on, it was all over but the shouting for the Berry team.

The Berry stars did not get on the board until the eighth inning. With Plymouth's Bill Parson on the mound for the Legion, Jim Hill started by being awarded first base because of catcher interference.

TOM DEPRIEST THEN hit a shot down the first baseline, and the Legion rightfielder allowed the ball to skip by him.

Kaseta top college hurler

The state of Michigan has a new all-time winningest pitcher in collegiate baseball circles. He's Tony Kaseta, a graduate of Livonia Franklin High School and the University of Detroit, who rode a 7-0 senior season to the new record.

Kaseta, who graduated from U-D's

Business school last month, won 25 games over his four year career for Coach Bob Miller, two better than the previous record of 23 held by Michigan State's Larry Ike.

He was a mainstay of Miller's staff all season as a senior, including a win over Mid-American Conference cham-

pion Eastern Michigan, who ultimately went on to the College World Series. Cleveland State and Wayne State were among the other teams he defeated as part of a Titan squad that set a record for the most wins ever in a single season, compiling a record of 36-18.

Kaseta had a 4-3 record back in 1972 as a freshman, but really moved into a regular role in 1973, setting a U-D record with a 9-3 record. His ERA was 2.29 and his accomplishments included pitching and winning both games of a doubleheader against Northwood Institute. Last year, he was bothered by arm trouble throughout the season, but still managed to compile a 5-3 record and pitch 62 innings. Then, as a senior, his physical problems were over and he compiled the unblemished record.

In addition to his record for wins, Kaseta ranks fourth in games pitched in a season (14, 1973), seventh in innings pitched (74.1, 1973) and eighth in strikeouts (62, 1973). In career records, he's No. 1 in innings (243.1), No. 2 in strikeouts (218), tied for second in games (43) and first in walks (119).

Tony's accomplishments don't stop on the baseball field, either, for like Coach Miller says, "he's one of the best student-athletes we've ever had here at the University and the kind of person who'll be a success in his chosen career."

Kaseta graduated from U-D with a 3.40 honor point average, and has been nominated for the 1975 Academic All-American Baseball Team, selected by the nation's Sports Information Directors (the team will be announced later this month). Last week was a strange one for Snyder's Softball Club in the Major Metro Travel League.

MIKE GOVIN, voted the league's most valuable player in 1974, paced Little Caesars, going 6-for-7 in the doubleheader. Four of those hits were home runs and Govin accounted for nine RBI's.

The next night, though, Caesars home-run magic was gone and so was its West Division lead. Its 22-6 mark puts Caesars percentage points behind Snyder's, which is 21-5.

This week, both clubs face tough assignments against East Division rivals, with Snyder's meeting Bert's and Uniroyal while Caesars takes on Uniroyal and Q & Q Printing.

It looks like a repeat of the exciting 1974 season, when Snyder's won the West Division championship only to be eliminated in the playoffs by Caesars.

Compromise settles DRC

That old adage that there is something good about everything may ring true in the aftermath of an incident that threatened for 48 hours to shut down thoroughbred racing at the Detroit Race Course last week.

The embroilment, triggered by two separate racing bills being studied in the state legislature, started Sunday when a group of dissident horsemen announced a boycott of the DRC entry box. The boycott was to have started Tuesday when DRC officials would take entries for Thursday's racing card.

Returning Tuesday from a few days away from the city, track vice president Dick Wilson immediately announced that if there were not enough horses entered for the Thursday card DRC would close down for the remainder of its scheduled thoroughbred meeting. The regular closing date is Sunday, July 13.

This would have meant a loss of 10 racing dates, including the long Fourth of July weekend, and the confrontation brought a hastily called meeting between track and horsemen officials and new state racing commis-

sioner Fedeje Fauri Tuesday night.

After a four hour session at the track Fauri announced there would be racing at DRC on Thursday and for the remainder of the scheduled season at the Livonia track.

ADMITTING THAT it was "a rather memorable way" to begin his tour of duty—Tuesday was his first day on the job—Fauri said:

"Everyone participating in tonight's meeting agreed to get together on overall legislation which would result in benefits for all elements of thoroughbred racing and breeding."

Both the Detroit tracks and the horsemen have been sponsoring legislative bills which would increase purse money for Michigan thoroughbred racing. But the bills differ in idea and some critics think this is why the progress of much needed help to the thoroughbred sport has been slow in the legislature.

The track proposal, covered in Senate Bill 819, has passed the Senate but is stalled in the House Agriculture

Committee. The horsemen's bill has not come out of committee.

The bill backed by the thoroughbred tracks would raise the take on gimmick betting, exclusive of the daily double, from 16 to 20 per cent, but only for thoroughbred racing. The tracks took this tack because state officials said they would not consider a change in the pari-mutuel takeout unless they were assured the state would not lose racing revenue.

The horsemen, on the other hand, would finance the increased purse money by levying a 23 percent tax on gimmick pools at both thoroughbred and harness tracks.

IN HIS EARLY statement to the DRC thoroughbred horsemen Wilson warned that the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association would not agree to any changes involving wagering on harness racing in Michigan. He added:

"If we (the DRC) close early, Hazel Park Harness is considering adding afternoon racing matinees to take up the slack."

Safety check gets 2nd chance

Motor vehicle inspection once or twice a year is a must in 40 of these United States. Michigan is one of the exceptions.

Because of that, the state has been threatened with withholding of federal highway safety money. But Michigan now has a reprieve from the Department of Transportation. The state has until November 1976 to prove the effectiveness of its own automobile safety inspection method.

The proof, if it's to be found, will come from data from an experimental program being conducted with new techniques and equipment. The aim is to check some 10,000 cars before the end of October. Some of those checked this summer will be reinspected next year.

And officials say the checkups will be more thorough than those now being conducted throughout the state.

Gov. William Milliken says he ex-

pects the program will show that Michigan's system can meet federal safety standards at less cost than some other compulsory inspection systems.

Michigan's check-lane system involved 300,000 vehicles last year. Of those, some 65 per cent showed defects of one sort or another.

Officials say there'll be an emphasis on brake inspections, since defects in brakes account for more accidents than any other defect.
