Summer winding up for scholars

The mood of fall will settle upon the Plymouth Community School District this Thursday, as tiny kindergartners don their first school outfits and high school students shout greetings throughout the halls of the Centennial Educational Park.

Thursday marks the beginning of another year of pencils and books for all district students except those enrolled at Miller Elementary School, where the controversial 45-15 program began July 14.

ALTHOUGH SOME students undoubtedly regard the opening of another school year with distaste, all those soaking up the summer rays at Plymouth's Kellogg Park last week were excited about the prospect.

"Vacation's getting kind of boring," confessed Chris Crowther, a 10th grader at Plymouth Salem High, as he tossed a brightly-colored Frisbee through the air. "I'm kind of looking forward to going back, 'cause I got some good classes this year."

Mike Richards, a 10th grader at Plymouth Canton High, caught the Frisbee at the other end of the park and nodded his head in agreement.

"I've had a good time this summer, but I'm ready to get back and see all the girls."

Mary Ann McCloskey and Patti Fulton, who will begin attending CEP classes as freshmen this year, wheeled their bicycles through Kellogg Park and stopped for a rest.

"I'm excited to go back, because I'm starting a new school," said Mary Ann, who admitted some squeamish feelings about starting the high school routine. Her friend, Patti, added, "I'm getting excited now that it's getting closer, but I was scared about it at first."

SCHOOL DISTRICT officials predict 13,100 students—about 400 more than last year—will pack the district's schools this year. About 600 teachers will head the learning process, scheduled to begin this week.

On Thursday, incoming ninth graders at the CEP will attend a freshman orientation program from 7:30 to

10:25 a.m. Classes for ninth through 12th graders will begin at 10:30 a.m. and run on a 10-minute-per-modular schedule until the end of the day.

Elementary students will report to their schools for a full day of classes at 8:45 a.m. on Thursday. Middle school students will report to their homerooms at 7:55 a.m. Regular bus schedules will begin.

At Miller Elementary School, classes will proceed as usual this week. Most of the 700 pupils enrolled in Miller's 45-15 program began classes July 14, Aug. 4 or Aug. 25. The remainder will begin classes Sept. 15, when students enrolled on the program's track A schedule take their first three-week break.

The school year for all but Miller students is scheduled from Thursday to June 11, when next year's summer vacation will begin. District officials have scheduled Nov. 17 as a parental conference day; Nov. 27 and 28 as Thanksgiving vacation; Dec. 20 to Jan. 5 as Christmas vacation; March 8 as a teacher inservice day; and April 16-25 as Easter vacation.

ON THE SPORTS scene, Plymouth Salem will open its varsity football season Sept. 12 at Bloomfield Hills and play its first home game Sept. 19, beginning at 8 p.m., against Redford Union. The junior varsity squad will open Sept. 18 at Redford Union and play at home against Trenton on Sept. 25.

The Plymouth Canton football team will open with a home game against Livonia Bentley at 8 p.m., Friday, Sept. 12. The next Chief's game will be against Annapolis in an away contest on Sept. 19. The junior varsity will open with two away games against Walled Lake Central Sept. 18 and Garden City East Sept. 25. A home contest against Farmington Harrison will be held Oct. 2.

The Plymouth Salem cross-country squad will start its season with an away contest Sept. 11 against Redford Union, run against Northville Sept. 16 and have its first home competition on Sept. 18 against Trenton.

The Plymouth Canton cross-country team also will open with three away matches—Thurston on Sept. 11, Waterford Mott Sept. 18 and the Schoolcraft Invitational Sept. 20. The team will appear before the home crowd on Sept. 23 against Clarenceville.

The Plymouth Salem golf squad will open Sept. 8 with an away contest at Brighton and be home Sept. 9 for a 3 p.m. pairing with Dearborn Edsel Ford.

Plymouth Canton golfers will open against Walled Lake Western Sept. 8 at Walled Lake and be home Sept. 11 against Farmington Harrison and Sept. 12 against Redford Union—both at 3 p.m.

THE PLYMOUTH Canton girls basketball team will open with a home game Sept. 16 against Ann Arbor Huron at 6:30 p.m. and play at Livonia Bentley Sept. 18 at 4 p.m.

Plymouth Salem girl cagers will open at home Sept. 18 at 6:30 p.m. against Garden City East and travel to Walled Lake Western Sept. 23 for a 6:15 p.m. game.

The Plymouth Canton girls swimming team will open its schedule with three away games—Sept. 18 at Redford Union, Sept. 25 at Northville and Sept. 30 at Walled Lake—before performing for the home audience Oct. 2 against Farmington Harrison at 7 p.m.

The Plymouth Salem girls swimming team will open with three home games—Walled Lake Western on Sept. 16, Northville on Sept. 18 and Edsel Ford on Sept. 25—and then travel to Ann Arbor Huron Sept. 30.

The Salem girls tennis team will begin away Sept. 10 against Northville and open its season home against Ann Arbor Huron Sept. 12 at 3:30 p.m.

Farmers soon to get tax relief

Tax-weary farmers in Canton Township may not have to wait much longer for what Supervisor Robert Greenstein calls "real" tax relief.

A tax relief ordinance, specifically aimed at the township's farmers, already has been drafted and OK'd by township attorneys, Greenstein said. Official introduction of the ordinance awaits action of the Wayne County Taxation Department.

"Everything's all set to go," said the supervisor, "but we don't want to move until we hear from the county. The county's holding the whole thing up. I'm getting madder by the minute."

ALTHOUGH Greenstein declined to disclose details of the ordinance, pending county action and official introduction at the board table, the supervisor said the ordinance will encourage farmers to remain on their land.

"We have an ex-farmer on our planning commission, who says he'd still be in farming if this ordinance went through a couple years back."

The ordinance specifies areas within the township that are eligible for tax relief and outlines eligibility guidelines, such as minimum farm acreage.

Greenstein said the Michigan Tax Commission has examined and OK'd the proposed ordinance. The state commission "in effect" ordered the county to reassess the township's farmland in a downward direction, he said.

"THE COUNTY is now in the midst of reassessing it downward. We just want to make sure they go far enough."

A county-administered reassessment of the township's farmland would lower Canton's entire assessed valuation and leave the assessed valuations of non-farming properties at current levels.

The township's taxation board of appeals could lower assessments on Can-

ton's farmland, Greenstein said. That action could hike assessments of other properties in the township, if the county left Canton's total assessed valuation unchanged.

"We could do it ourselves," the supervisor said, "but we might end up punishing the entire township. We don't want to do that."

THE PROPOSED ordinance would supplement the township's proposed master land use plan, which dedicates 28 per cent of Canton's total land area to agriculture, and a recently enacted state law, designed to hold back the loss of farm acreage in Michigan.

Under the law, farmers who sign a contract with the state, agreeing to continue agricultural use of farmland for 10 years, will receive tax breaks and exemption from special assessments.

Property taxes on farmland which exceed seven per cent of the landowner's income will count as Michigan income tax credit under the state act. Farmers who break the contract must pay back all the tax benefits they received and six per cent annual interest.

But Greenstein believes the state law does not go far enough. Substantial tax benefits are needed, he says, to keep farmers on their land and the costs of food down.

TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS say retention of farmland will not erode the township's tax base. Farmland, they say, does not produce as much tax revenue as subdivisions, but agricultural land does not demand as many services.

Farmers interested in obtaining tax credits under the state act may obtain applications by writing the Office of Land Use, Department of Natural Resources, Stevens T. Mason Building, Lansing, Mich. 48926.

Under provisions of that act, township officials must certify the eligibility of farmers on the basis of income and size of farms.

Sheldon gets new surface

Motorists traveling on Sheldon between Ann Arbor Trail and Ann Arbor Road will no longer have to cope with the chattering teeth and bumpy ride, caused by the cavernous chuckholes in the pavement.

Wayne County Road Commission crews have begun work on a \$50,000 resurfacing project that will lay a smooth layer of asphalt over the nearly one-mile stretch of Sheldon.

Louis Sugo, director of public information for the road commission, says the work should be completed in one or two weeks. In the meantime, motorists will have to put up with construction crews and slowed-down traffic.

The project will temporarily provide a smooth surface for Sheldon traffic. Another project, proposed to begin in 1977, will widen Sheldon to five lanes of concrete from Ann Arbor Trail to Joy.

"The road commission recognized the fact that Sheldon is in bad shape," said Sugo. "The work now under way is not the final answer, but at least it's something."

Support is sought on billboard rule

Canton Township officials are trying to ensure the absence of billboards on Canton's highways and streets.

The township's recently enacted sign ordinance prohibits the erection of the huge advertising signs, but Supervisor Robert Greenstein feels the township needs a double-protection ban.

"I'm not positive," the supervisor said, "but my feeling is that we have a right to control them but not to ban them. I don't want to condone billboards at all."

In a recent letter to State Sen. William Faust (D—Westland), Greenstein asked the Legislature to pass a law, allowing townships to ban the use of billboards within their municipal limits.

"Because the state has proceeded to ban billboards on their highways and

the federal government has taken many steps in this direction, I am wondering if it isn't a possibility to give townships this right," Greenstein asked.

"It would be, it seems to me, a great feather in your cap to be able to give us the power to clean up our highways and streets and to finally prevent that trash from appearing like mushrooms on every inch of right-of-way."

Some billboards, erected before the township board passed Canton's sign ordinance, dot Michigan Ave., Greenstein noted. Township officials want no more of the large advertising signs.

"No one's pushing us or asking for billboards," the supervisor said. "We just want to anticipate the problem before it arises."

68 acres added to township land

A township recreational park or civic center, complete with township hall and other municipal buildings, may one day arise on a 68-acre site near Proctor and Canton Center roads in Canton Township.

Members of the township board have agreed to purchase the land from Arnold Folker, owner of Folkers Nursery, for \$5,500 an acre. Terms of the agreement outline seven per cent interest with three years to pay.

According to the agreement, the township will not acquire use of the land for another two years. In the meantime, Folker will use the land for his nursery.

Authorization to purchase the land consummates months of negotiations. Township officials have mentioned the recreational park or the civic center concept as possible uses for the land.

Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein said the price and terms of the sale are "tremendous." Folker, he said, will leave the nursery trees growing on the site.

Township board members authorized the administration to seek an option on the land in May. At that time, township officials refused to disclose the location of the parcel to prevent speculators from stepping in on the sale.

Trial ordered for driver in car deaths

A Livonia driver charged with manslaughter in the Aug. 23 traffic deaths of two Canton Township girls was ordered Thursday to stand trial in Wayne County Circuit Court.

District Judge James McCann of Livonia ordered James Deamud, 20, of 8832 Linville, to stand trial. McCann

held a preliminary hearing and listened to three witnesses.

Killed in the crash at the Wayne Road-Ann Arbor Trail intersection were Cynthia Conrad, 16, of 6046 Harvard, and Victoria Hunter, 16, of 6956 Harvard Lane.

Deamud is scheduled to be ar-

raigned in circuit court on Sept. 24, said Patrolman Jesse Bartlett.

Glen McLean, 21, of Livonia, driver of the car in which the two victims were passengers, testified the Deamud car ran a red light at a high rate of speed. Other witnesses were Mark Primak and Thomas Smith, who said the same thing.

With the recent heavy thunderstorms hitting the area, Plymouth Township Fire Chief James Gignac has issued some lightning safety rules as endorsed by the Wayne County Office of Civil Defense.

"Lightning kills an average of 150 Americans per year and injures about 250," the chief said.

"Persons struck by lightning receive a severe electrical shock and may be burned, but they carry no electrical charge and can be handled safely," Gignac added.

Safety rules for electrical storms include staying indoors as much as possible.

"STAY AWAY from open doors or windows, fireplaces, radiators, metal pipes, sinks and plug-in electrical appliances.

"Don't use plug-in electrical equipment such as hair driers, electric toothbrushes, or electric razors during an electrical storm. And don't use bathtubs or showers when lightning threatens," the chief warns.

Persons outdoors when a storm hits should seek shelter from the lightning in buildings when possible. If no buildings are available, the best protection is a cave, ravine, ditch or under head-high clumps of trees in open forest glades, the Civil Defense bulletin states.

"Persons using a tractor, especially if pulling metal equipment, should stop work when a storm approaches," Gignac said.

Additional safety factors listed include:

Don't work on fences, telephone or power lines, pipelines, or structural steel fabrication.

GET OUT OF the water and off small boats. Don't handle flammable materials in open containers during electrical storms. Don't take laundry off the clothesline. Don't use the telephone during a storm as lightning may strike telephone lines outside the house.

The chief said a person "killed" by lightning can often be revived by prompt mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, cardiac massage and prolonged artificial respiration.

"In a group struck by lightning, the apparently 'dead' should be treated first; those who show vital signs will probably recover spontaneously, although burns and other injuries may require treatment.

"Recovery from lightning strikes is usually complete except for possible impairment or loss of sight or hearing."

The chief noted that should you feel the electrical charge, if your hair stands on end or your skin tingles, lightning may be about to strike you.

"DROP TO the ground immediately," he said.

Gignac listed some facts about lightning as released by the Office of Civil Defense.

"Lightning occurs when positive and negative charges become great enough to cause current to flow between the two charges. Potential can be as much as 100 million volts.

"The thermal effect of lightning is caused by the high current peaks (which may reach 200,000 amperes or more) and is responsible for starting numerous fires."

GOVERNOR'S MANSION was built in 1839 in Greek revival-style by James Wright Gordon, an early Michigan lieutenant governor and governor, who speculated that Marshall would be the state capital. It is now the property of Mary Marshall Chapter, DAR.



HONOLULU HOUSE, built in 1860 by a former U.S. consul to the Sandwich (now Hawaiian) Islands, is certainly the most unusual building in Marshall. It's the headquarters of the Marshall Historical Society and also contains a museum of 19th

century furniture and artifacts. It was the first of nine Marshall structures to be listed in the National Register and is also on the Historic American Buildings Survey.

5 'firsts' star on Marshall tour



HAINES HOUSE, among the most admired small Greek revival homes in Marshall, was built between 1838-40. Later additions have only partially hidden its charac-

teristics. Present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Brad Haines, have done it justice with their decorating efforts.

An assortment of five "first-time" houses will highlight historic Marshall's 12th annual Historic Home Tour Sept. 6-7. The event is sponsored by the Marshall (Michigan) Historical Society, with the cooperation of 30 civic, social, fraternal and religious organizations.

Queen Anne, Greek revival, Italianate, Victorian gothic and board-and-batten are some of the architectural styles featured. The tour will include seven private homes and the city's three quasi-public buildings: the "almost" Governor's Mansion (1839), Honolulu House (1860) and Capitol Hill School (1860).

The three quasi-public buildings all are being refurbished as part of the city's bicentennial celebration. Efforts are most visible at Capitol Hill School where a wall has been rebuilt, brick surface ground and tuck-pointed, and trim painted. The \$6,000 effort was made possible by proceeds from earlier tours.

HOMES NEVER before opened to the public include: Haines house, an 1838-40 Greek revival; Benedict House, an 1840 Greek revival; Themins house, an 1870 Italianate; Sahli house, an 1877 board-and-batten; and Selee house, an 1897 Queen Anne.

The other two private homes, which have both been on tour before, are Barger house, an 1868 Victorian gothic, and Trupiano house, a mid-1830s modified Greek revival.

The 10 buildings represent a top-notch cross-section of mid-19th century architecture, when Marshall was at its high point. All are beautifully maintained and decorated.

Bogar Theater, which has just completed a renovation as part of the city's downtown restoration program should be eye-catching. Brackets and other accessories have been added to the exterior to complement the city's commercial Italianate architecture.

AMBIENCE AND atmosphere of the last century will be recreated with church luncheons, bake sales, 14-dealer antique sale, arts and crafts fair, band concert, ice cream social, Civil War-type encampment, barbershop quartets and numerous other events.

A feature of this year's tour will be a grand bicentennial parade at noon each day. Highlight of the Sunday parade will be the recreation of the 5th Michigan Regiment Band from Howell. This unusual project includes an 85-piece band, historic color guard, folk dancers, banjo band and fife-and-drum band.

VISITORS WILL be able to enjoy the unstructured tour along Marshall's tree-shaded streets at their leisure between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 6, and 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 7. Marshall is 65 miles west of Ann Arbor on I-94.

Large free parking areas have been set aside. Free shuttle buses will make continuous trips from the parking areas, passing near all 10 buildings.

Two books on Marshall, underwritten by earlier tour proceeds, will be on sale, as will a Honolulu House commemorative plate. The plate is the first of a bicentennial series.

Home tour profits have also been used to purchase 12 Michigan state historic markers.

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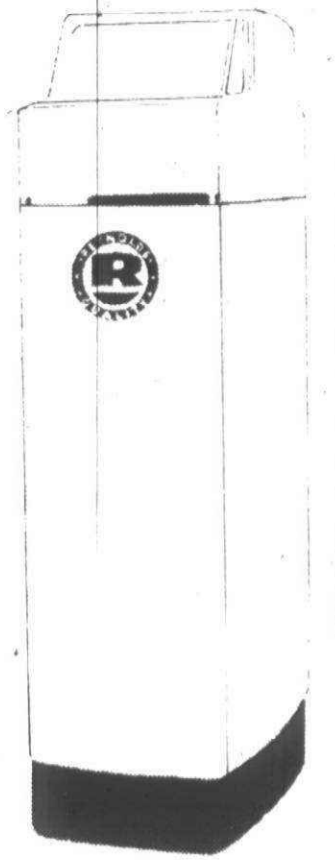

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free lunches and milk, or reduced-price lunches. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such lunches and milk for them, it should contact the school.


In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

RAYMOND HOEDEL, ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT FOR BUSINESS, Hearing Official, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an Outline of the hearing procedure. Each school and office of Mr. Hoedel in the Board of Education Offices has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by an interested party.

In this latest case, when the board adjourned to discuss "personnel" matters, it was really discussing "personal" matters. The matter could have been handled in public, in good taste, by mature persons without embarrassment to the individuals involved. It would have been more difficult, but being a public official is not an easy job.

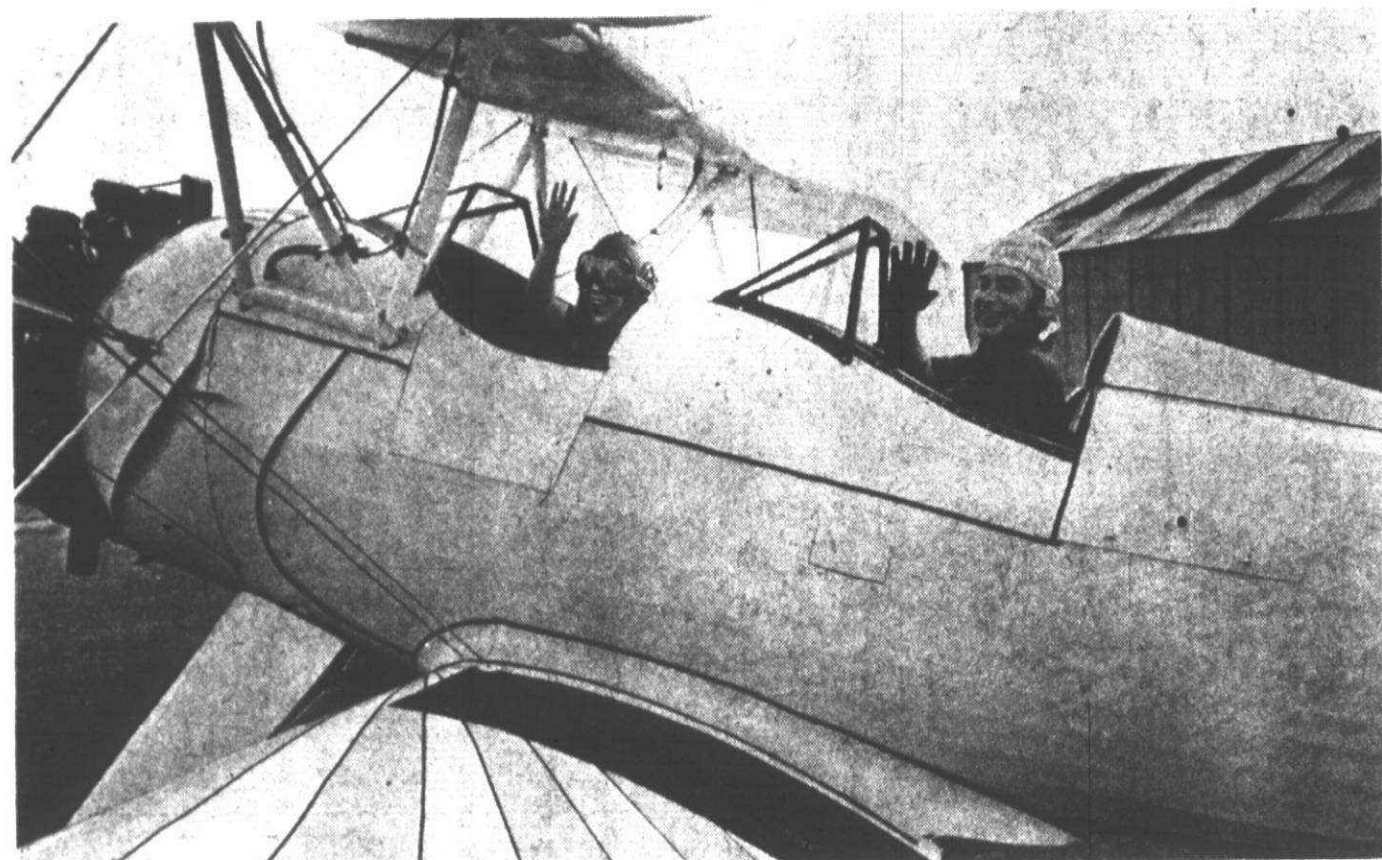

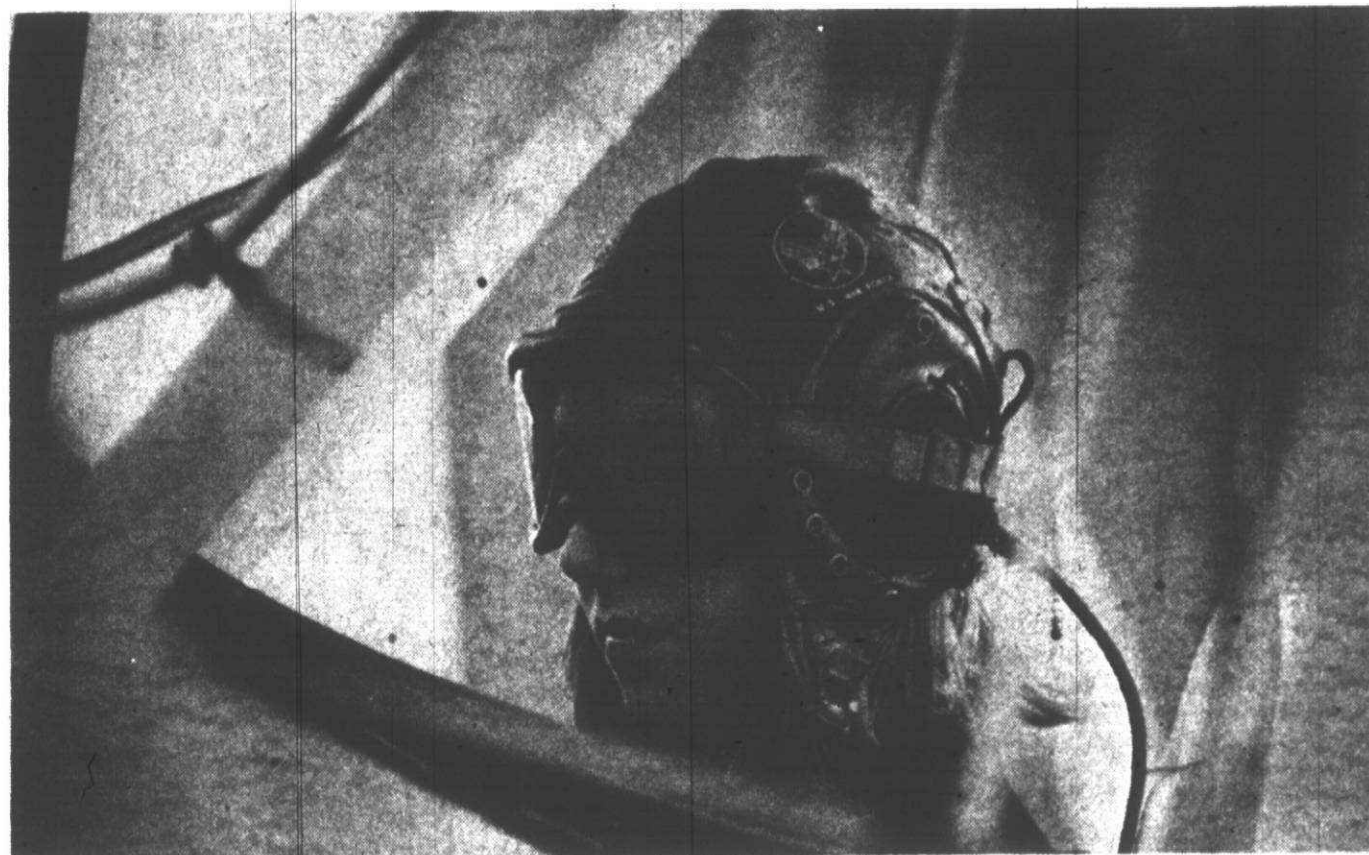

Hoffa's disappearance was kept secret from his mother in Livonia

The mother of former Teamster president James R. Hoffa died without knowing that her famous son was missing, but her daughter believes the 85-year-old woman sensed that something was wrong.

"We decided to keep it from her," said Mrs. Nancy Hawker, Hoffa's sister. "But I think she was suspicious last week."

"She said to me: 'I don't think I'll ever see your brother Jim again.'" Mrs. Viola Hoffa died Aug. 28 at Plymouth General Hospital in Detroit. She was taken there from Middle Belt Nursing Centre in Livonia where she had been a patient for two-and-half years.

MRS. HAWKER said the family managed to keep the news of her son's disappearance secret by taking away the elderly woman's hearing aid

and telling her that her television set was broken.

"The patient in the other bed was near death, so there was no conversation," Mrs. Hawker said. Her mother was bedfast and could not get to a telephone.

"We told her Jim was out of town on a business trip, and she was used to that and didn't think it was out of the way for him to fail to visit," the daughter, who lives in Utica, went on.

"I took her a real good picture of Jim that was in one of the newspapers and told her he had sent it," Mrs. Hawker said. "She kept it in the drawer of her bedside table and whenever any of the nurses or aides or anyone else came in, she would show it to them."

During one period, the elderly Mrs. Hoffa refused to eat, her daughter said. "I told her that Jim said he wanted her to eat to keep her strength up."

MRS. HAWKER disputed the reported statement of Murray Chodak, law partner of her nephew, James P. Hoffa, that her mother "died of a broken heart."

She died of the complications of old age," Mrs. Hawker said.

The hospital would say only that

Mrs. Hoffa died a natural death.

Mrs. Hawker said her mother was convinced she was near death and frequently said she would "never get out of the hospital."

Her death came just 30 days after her son's July 30 disappearance after leaving his Lake Orion home for a meeting at a Bloomfield Township restaurant.

Hoffa's wife, Josephine, was hospitalized earlier this month.

She had collapsed at the family home and her son said she was "exhausted physically and emotionally from the strain and stress." She was released six days later and is now back home.

Emig elected

Walter Emig of The Hearthside in Livonia has been elected to the board of directors of the National Home Furnishings Association.

Emig, president of The Hearthside, Livonia, will be directly involved with formulation of policies and programs geared to the needs of the 10,000 home furnishings retailers who are members of the association. He has served on numerous NHFA committees and is active in community affairs.

Extension service to get new building

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners, using previously allocated funds, has given the green light to continue design work on a new cooperative extension service headquarters that will save the county at least \$22,000 per year in leasing costs.

The board Aug. 21 agreed with Donald D. Juchartz, county extension director, that a new administration building was badly needed and authorized design work to continue.

"We presently have eight office locations in the county," Juchartz said following board approval. "We plan to consolidate four of these locations into this new building (behind the county library in Wayne) and save the lease costs we now are paying."

"As a further benefit, the building will serve as a meeting place for the more than 200,000 residents who attend meetings and programs sponsored by the service each year."

A \$250,000 commitment in state funds was allocated to two recreational projects, with the county contrib-

uting \$62,500 in carry-over funds.

"No new money will be involved in either project," Lesinski pointed out. He further noted that state funding for all the projects has been committed for several years as Wayne County's share of the state recreation bond program approved by the voters.

A total of \$200,000 (\$160,000 state, \$40,000 county) was appropriated to further develop plans for the Eliza Howell Nature Interpretive Center, near Telegraph and Fenkell in Detroit.

According to E.E. Mika, county parks and recreation superintendent, plans for the Nature Center have been sent to the State Department of Natural Resources for final approval.

"The nature center," Mika said, "will provide a highly urbanized area with the opportunity for nature education."

The remaining money, \$112,500 (90,000 state, \$22,500 county), will be used to develop the Middle Rouge Parkway Bikeway Project as biking continues to grow in popularity.

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Rocks face tough road to defend league title

When the Plymouth Salem Rocks return to the gridiron this fall they'll be defending a Suburban Eight football title and an undefeated season.

The major flaw the varsity crew will have to overcome is inexperience if they hope to attain the measure of success preceding Rock teams have enjoyed.

"We have two starters returning on defense and one on offense. The two players I'm talking about are Charlie Johnson and Rick Gladstone," commented head Coach Tom Moshimer.

Moshimer begins his eighth year as head football coach and speaks highly of Johnson and Gladstone. "I feel that Charlie Johnson is an excellent all around athlete and is definitely all-state material and a college prospect," he said. "Rick Gladstone is one of the best interior linemen around and a good candidate for post season honors."

The defensive strategy hasn't changed much at Salem, they'll still utilize the 5-2 defense. Moshimer pointed out the strengths and weaknesses of his defense.

"WE'LL BE TOUGH on the interior line, Gladstone and Dave Champion

are at tackles while Charlie Johnson plays noseguard. Players who might see action at the ends are Dave Kolb, John Horton, Charlie Poteau, or Russ Bruner," said Moshimer.

Plymouth defensive vulnerability is in the backfield. "Inexperience hurts us most at linebacker and in the secondary. However, these players are steadily improving."

Linebacker hopefuls are Joe Scott and Tim Lilley. John Daritoni and Kevin Grahm man the corners and at safety Dick Bradburn, Chris Ritchie, and Ken Blevens will play deep.

Moshimer assumes an unbiased attitude toward his players. "As I'm giving you these names now, I have no way of telling who will be starting at what position and when. My players work very hard, and only time will tell who earns starting positions."

Tradition still stands on offense as it does on defense. Moshimer makes no secret of his plans to use the option play as the best method of moving the ball. "Offensively, if we cannot run the option play, we're finished. We've got to make it work."

Running the option will be junior quarterback Steve Maisner. According to Moshimer, Maisner is learning how to handle the play well after seeing sparse action as a sophomore.

The offensive interior will be tough to crack with Rick Gladstone, Chuck Poteau and Reid Albert at guards, and Tackles Dave Champion, Dave

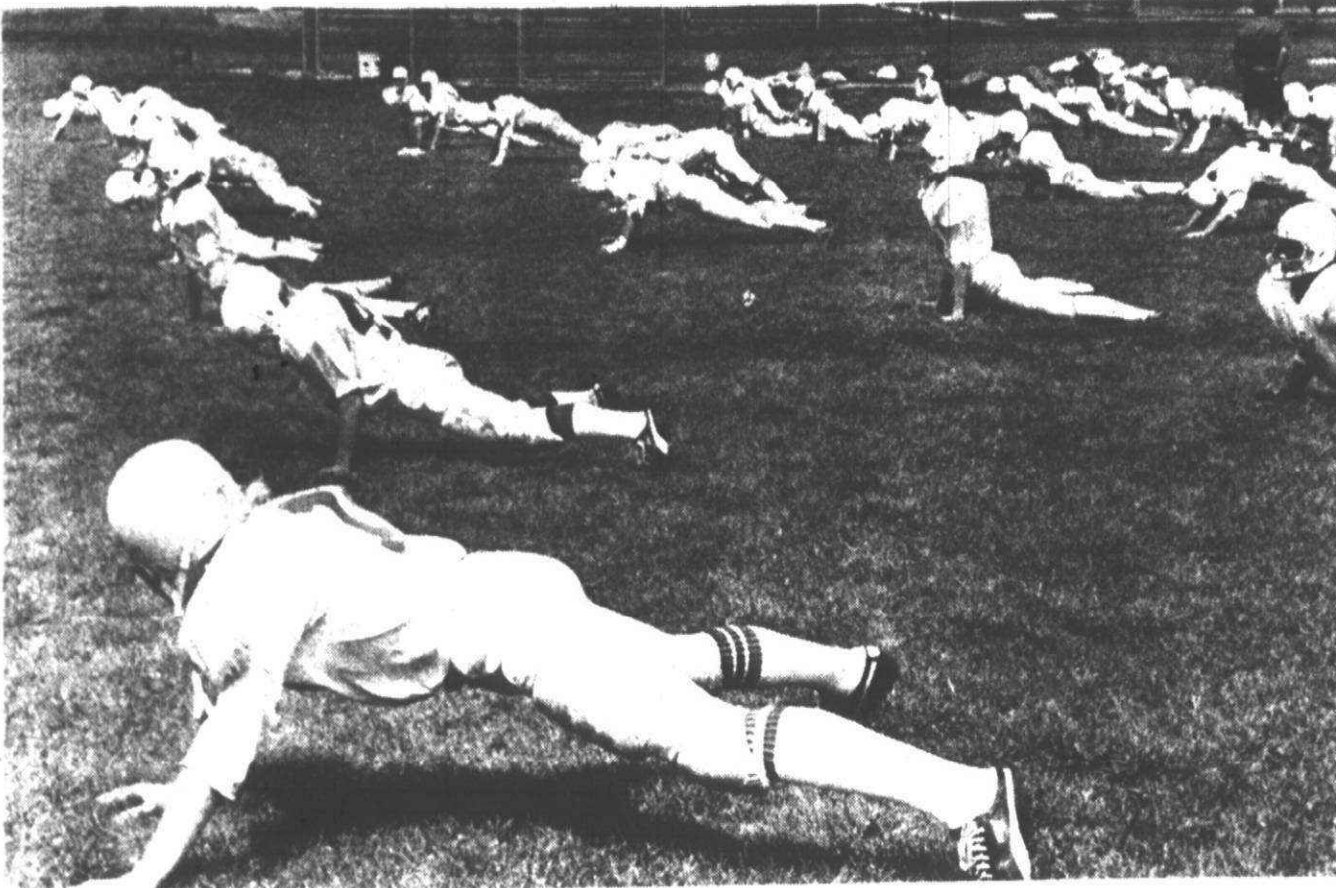
Kolb, and Dave Nitzgorski. Russ Bruner and John Horton are the ends, but they will be used mostly for blocking.

BESIDES MAISNER in the backfield there are halfbacks Charlie Johnson, Larry Rightler and Tim Lilley. Joe Scott and Howard Ich will run at Fullback.

As far as the Suburban Eight League goes Moshimer bluntly states "They are all tough, but the team that will provide the most formidable opposition will be Trenton."

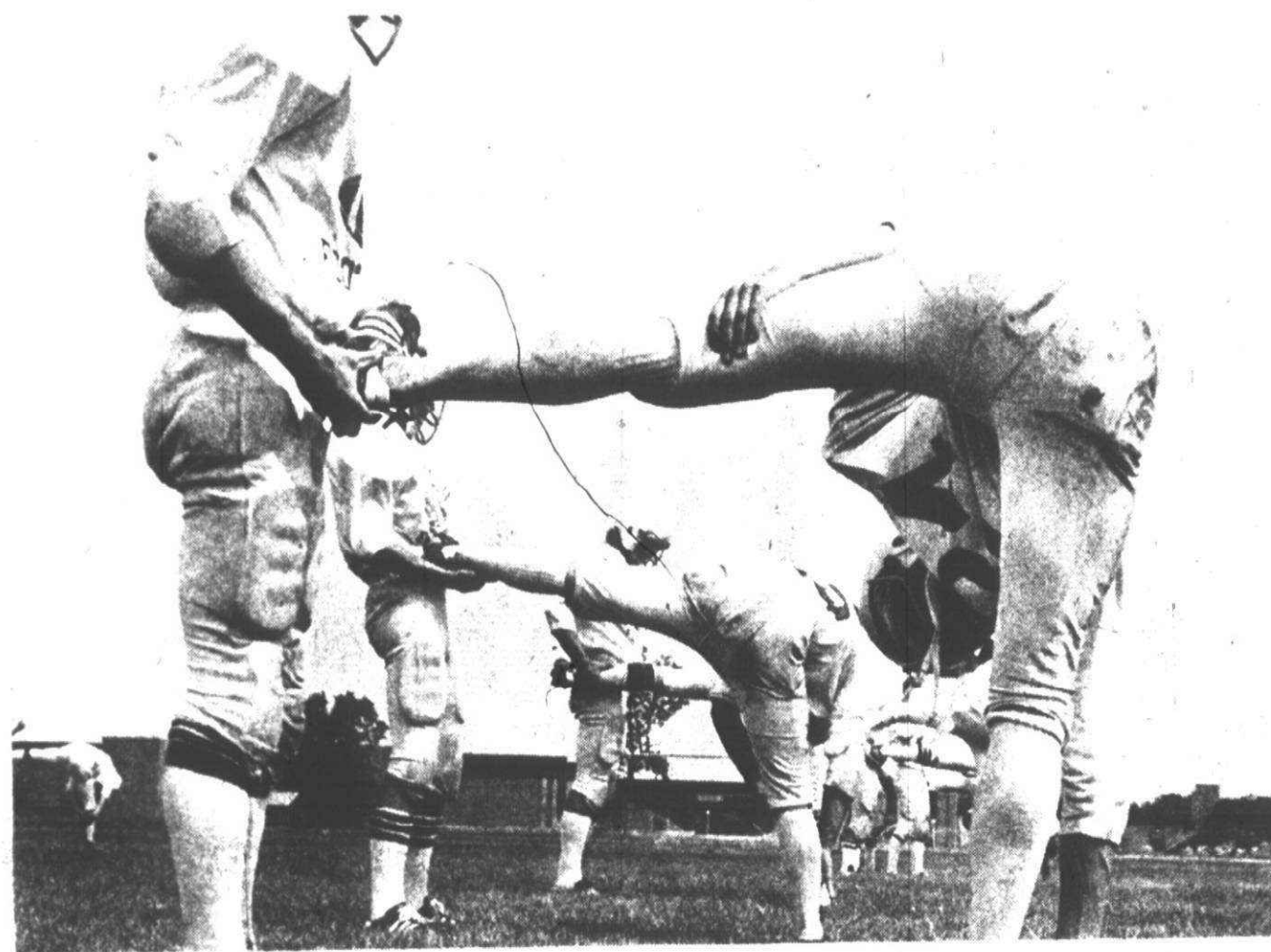

Aggies to vie for loop honors

There is sign hanging in the weight room where prospective candidates for the 1975 St. Agatha football team works out.

Mt. Carmel—25, St. Agatha—15 it reads.

It was that 10-point margin that gave the Aggies their only league loss last season and cost them a chance at the Catholic League Second Division title.

This year it figures to come down to the same two teams challenging for westside honors.

"We feel that the winner of that game will take the championship," said St. Agatha coach Harvey Heitman.

Heitman has good reason to be optimistic about going into that final game of the regular season with an unblemished league record.

He has 22 lettermen, including 14 starters, back from last year's team which finished 4-1 in league play and 5-3 overall.

Back will be quarterback Brian Higgins, a three-letter man who took over the reins during the second game last year. Only a junior, the 5-9, 170-pound Higgins will team with another veteran, fullback Dave Mully, to give the Aggies an experienced backfield.

Mully, a senior, goes 4.7 over 40 yards and, according to Heitman, "loves to hit people."

One back that will be missed at St. Agatha is all-state halfback Mark Duquette, who gained 1,470 yards in eight games last season.

But an experienced line, which includes three starters from last season, should open some holes.

INCLUDED IN that line are senior center Ken Christiansen and senior

guards Dan Kovarik and Charlie Memes.

Five players are expected to go two ways and that number could increase as the season progresses.

The Aggies start their season with a trio of topflight non-league opponents which may make the loop schedule seem easy in comparison.

Detroit Country Day School, Willow Run and Michigan Lutheran Seminary, the first two of which are traditional grid powers, will initiate the season for St. Agatha.

The game against Michigan Lutheran Seminary will be played at St. Joseph on Sept. 26 and the team will stay overnight in that city.

But what things really hold down to is the league season and the Saturday night Nov. 1 encounter with Mt. Carmel in particular.

"Don't worry. We won't overlook anybody," said Heitman.

But as long as the signs in the locker room stay up, St. Agatha will have something to look forward to.

State perch fishing now at peak period

The Automobile Club of Michigan has proclaimed the return of the "good old days" in Great Lakes perch fishing because of recent checks imposed on commercial harvesting of the fish and the increased planting of salmon—a predator that feeds on alewives.

The yellowbelly explosion may not be publicized as well as salmon and steelhead runs, but the average angler should outdo his salmon-hunting cousins in numbers of fish caught, and in angling hours and dollars spent landing the perch as the news spreads, according to Joseph Radke, Auto Club touring manager.

Radke attributes the perch resurgence to the banning of gill nets off Michigan shores and ever-increased planting of the alewife-hungry salmon in Lakes Huron and Michigan. For almost 10 years, the perch was in a losing battle for food with the small, inedible garbage fish.

The accompanying map pinpoints 46 of the best sites where even the novice angler, with a little luck, can catch dinner for a few dollars and a few hours time.

Lakes St. Clair and Erie also hold good perch populations again, although fish run smaller than the

slabriders frequently found elsewhere in the Great Lakes," Radke said.

As Lower Peninsula perch schools grow, public piers and boat liveries are expected to host thousands of persons using everything from hand lines to expensive fishing gear to land the eight-to 14-inch fish bounty.

In the last two years for example, experienced anglers on Lake Huron's Tawas Bay have been hauling in bucketsful of jumbo perch, a few approaching the state record of three pounds, 12 ounces.

Even the party boat industry, once cut to a few craft, is enjoying a rebirth. At least six boats from five docks are operating in Saginaw and Tawas Bay.

"These boats carry 24 to 33 persons each, offering inexpensive, family-style fun for persons preferring boat to dock fishing," Radke said.

Most knowledgeable veteran guides and livery operators see perch fishing getting much better through the end of September. Because of this conviction, they have been vigorously marketing their services throughout southeast Michigan and northern Ohio.

Using perch rigs, a pair of number 6 or 8 hooks placed 12 to 18 inches apart with the lower hook above a sinker at line's end, has resulted in the very common catch of "doubleheaders" fishing vernacular for two fish caught at the same time on the same line. Minnows hooked through the head are the most popular bait.

Radke said that most of the good catches reported to the livery stations used by the Auto Club to monitor Great Lakes fishing come from less than 50 feet of water. Schools are moving to the shallows in the early morning, toward deep spots at midday, then back to the shallows in early evening.

Radke suggested that persons interested in a Lake Huron party boat trip should contact: Joe's Fishing Trips, Point Au Gres; Brown's Landing, Alabaster; Holiday Fishing Trips, East Tawas; Chuck's Party Boat, Caseville; or Don's Resort, Caseville.

There is no size or creel limit on the number of fish you may bring ashore (except in the case of the Les Cheneaux Islands area where a 50-fish daily limit is imposed) but all Great Lakes fishermen must have a valid state fishing license in their possession.

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
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

Fall Festival should be delicious

German krumkake, Greek cheese and spinach pies, Japanese yaki-tori, Italian pizelle, French rosettes, baklava, and Eldress Clymena Miner's Shaker cookies are not exactly everyday fare in the average household.

All will be available Sept. 4 to 7 at the Plymouth Fall Festival when 50 nonprofit organizations participate in an annual get-together as American as Helen Eckles' apple pie.

The Business and Professional Women's German dinner, the Lions Club fish fry, the Kiwanians' all-day pancake and sausage feast, the Jaycees' beef rib dinner and the Rota-

rians' chicken barbecue are the major eating events.

But a stroll down Main Street from Ann Arbor Trail to Fralick, past the festival booths, will reveal a tempting variety of ethnic and county-fair foods.

AND THE STATISTICS involved in planning for the booth sales are staggering.

Consider: 2,000 pounds of pork tenderloin for shishkebobs, 80 pounds of feta cheese for spinach and cheese pies, 500 pounds of prime beef for yaki-tori and 160 pounds of sugar for

fudge. Apples on sale were sprayed at a vital time so they would ripen for the festival which is earlier this year because Labor Day falls on Sept. 1.

A few steps away, on the other side of Kellogg Park, is the Grange Hall on Union Street. There Plymouth's most experienced cooks prepare meals reminiscent of an old-time visit to grandma on the farm.

FOR MANY, the festival is not complete until they have consumed their annual quota of Grange cookies.

Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Tritten will mix the batter for the sugar, oatmeal, chocolate chip and molasses cookies. The recipes are known only to members of the 101-year-old organization.

"We're not making as many this year," said Mrs. Tritten, "because we don't have the help. We'll probably just bake 200 dozen." She recalled one year when they baked 1,900 dozen for the fall festival and an air show at Mettetal Airport.

Mrs. Tritten weighs and measures the ingredients. Her husband does the mixing and prepares the dough for storage. The actual baking is done by Mr. and Mrs. Eric Nilson.

The apple and pumpkin pies are made by Mrs. Claude Eckles. She and her husband used to bake between 275 and 300 pies for the festival. This year her niece, Florence Bordine, is helping.

Helen Eckles told us how she makes her apple pies but she says the recipe varies according to the apples. She prefers Northern Spies, but because they are winter apples she will use MacIntosh.

THE FUDGE BOOTH has been a favorite for 12 years. Xi Epsilon Delta sorority members sell about 800 pounds of home-made fudge during the four-day fest.

"We have run out on a Saturday and gone home to make more for Sunday," said Beverly Weher.

She is rejoicing over the lower sugar prices this year.

"Last year we paid over \$2 for a five-pound bag. This year I've paid \$1.35. But, chocolate has gone away up," she said.

They use 160 pounds of sugar to make the chocolate fudge, some with nuts and some plain. Each of the 10 members makes eight batches.

Proceeds from fudge sales are used for donations to the cancer fund and Channel 56, and baskets for the needy at Thanksgiving and Christmas. They have adopted a patient at the Arnold

(Eldress Clymena Miner)

1 c. butter	¼ t. nutmeg
2 c. sugar	¼ t. cream of tartar
½ lemon peel (grated)	1 t. salt
3 eggs	4-4½ c. sifted flour

Bream butter & sugar. Save ½ an egg white. Slightly beat remaining egg; add to butter mixture. Add lemon peel and nutmeg. Sift dry ingredients; work into butter mixture. Form into ball, cover and chill for ½ hour!

THE PLYMOUTH CIVITAN Club specializes in yaki-tori. Dave Henry will not divulge the secret of his recipe for the marinade.

The club has ordered 300 pounds of prime beef with 200 pounds in reserve.

"We put three pieces of meat and two pieces of sweet onion on Japanese bamboo sticks," said Henry. "They are dipped in the sauce three or four times during the cooking to get the proper glaze and flavor."

Wives and children of Civitan members help man the booth for the four days. Proceeds from the sale of yaki-tori and photograph buttons aid the club's pet project, the special olympics for the handicapped.

GERMAN KRUMKAKE, Italian pizelle, French rosettes and fried pies are featured by the Michigan Christian Youth Camp Boosters.

Most of the boosters are members

of the Plymouth Church of Christ. Bill Econom is vice president of the club, which supports the Michigan Christian Camp in Lapeer. Mrs. Gil Camp, who with her husband shares the presidency of the group, gave us the recipe for krumkake which will be baked in the booth and filled with whipped cream and blueberries.

THE SHAKER COOKIES are not for sale. They will be given as a bonus with items sold by the Plymouth Symphony Society.

Plans for a special bicentennial program at the orchestra's March concert inspired the Shaker theme for the symphony booth. Bonnets, herbs, teas, tin plates, and note paper with original Shaker artwork will be available.

Dr. Ralph Atchley, secretary of the society and instigator of the cookie caper, warned, "You have to watch them carefully, and not let them brown. Unless the temperature of your oven is very reliable, they may burn."

The society also will sell kazoos. Although the wholesale price has gone up, kazoo will retail at the old price of 25 cents—but no free Shaker cookies will be given with them.

THE NATIVITY of the Virgin Mary Greek Orthodox Church will have a booth for the first time.

Church members of all ages have pitched in to prepare 2,000 pounds of

pork tenderloin for shishkebobs. At \$2 a pound, this is quite an investment.

The meat is tenderized with lemon juice and seasoned with salt, pepper and a little garlic. They will have Coney islands, coffee and soft drinks.

The American Hellenic Education Progressive Association (AHEPA), a fraternal organization with chapters all over the world, will have more delicious Greek food in its booth.

Festival goers will be able to snack on cheese pie, spinach pie, Greek bread and coffee at the AHEPA stall.

Frances Kontos of the Little Angels shop in Old Village says their philanthropies include cancer research, orphanages, shelter homes and heart surgery for impoverished youngsters. Proceeds from the booth will go to aid these projects.

THE 30 FAMILIES in the Plymouth Drop-in Center, a community nursery in the Salvation Army building, have dubbed their booth the Main Street Country Store. Home-made cookies, cupcakes, preserves and breads will be on sale. They will have hand-made comforters and afghans to be sold at silent auction. Bushels of apples were sprayed to have them at their best during the Plymouth festival. The oatmeal almond cookies, delicious made with either the oatmeal or granola, are a special recipe recommended for arthritics. You don't have to be an arthritic to enjoy them.

You'll soon be told what's in that lipstick

What will it do to romance to know that lipstick is made mostly of castor oil?

Whatever the effect, beginning March 3, 1976, cosmetic manufacturers must list ingredients on labels, including castor oil. The only exceptions will be trade secrets such as fragrances and flavorings.

"This new cosmetic labeling act will enable consumers to see if the cosmetic contains ingredients they are allergic to," says Diane Place, consumer affairs officer for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, told a recent meeting of home economists at Michigan State University.

"With the new label information, consumers can make a value comparison between cosmetics," she

added "And, if a child should swallow a cosmetic, the doctors will know whether or not to pump the child's stomach."

THE U.S. FOOD and Drug Administration has also defined "hypo-allergenic" cosmetics, according to Ms. Place.

"A cosmetic may be called hypo-allergenic if it is marketed with ingredients known to be the least likely cause of an allergic reaction," she said.

"The manufacturers must prove that the product produces significantly fewer allergic reactions than 10 per cent of the other products on the market. However, the manufacturers have been given two years to prove this."

Another highlight on the Activities Field will be a race against the clock by the Canadian Model T Assembly Team which will convert a pile of component parts into an operating car in minutes.

Each day of the festival special guests will be honored by Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum. On Saturday, William E. Burnett, retired chief engineer, Ford Motor Co., who developed the 1955 Thunderbird, will be honored.

On Sunday, in observance of the 75th anniversary of the founding of the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co., Richard Riley, president and chief executive officer, will accept the recognition of the village and museum for the company's contributions to the automobile industry and its long-term campaign for good roads and highway safety.

Throughout the weekend, visitors may see displays of license plates and other automobile related collectibles as well as a demonstration of how wooden automobile wheels were once made.

There is no additional charge for the Old Car Festival on Saturday and Sunday beyond the regular Greenfield Village admission. Children under six are admitted free.

The annual Fall Festival that holds forth in Kellogg Park after Labor Day weekend each year has a unique place in the country's scheme of things.

It is the only affair of its kind that concentrates on food for four days and nights in a city park.

Plus, the Rotary chicken barbecue is unmatched with its serving of 16,000 dinners in seven hours in a concentrated area such as Kellogg Park.

In a recent survey and hours of research, the only event that compares with the barbecue is a Boston Bean Day on the Commons in the New England city. There, it is boasted that 21,000 persons are served during the day. It isn't close to matching the barbecue that serves 16,000 in half that time.

But the main event—and the real drawing card—is food. Many other communities boast chicken dinners and large fish fries. They also boast ox roasts and the like. But no where in the country is it done on four separate days by separate groups all working for the same goal.

This will be the 20th annual chicken barbecue that started in 1956 as a Sunday afternoon picnic to raise funds for the purchase of playground equipment.

Plymouth historical film to be shown in Dunning-Hough

It's not often community residents can view a film about themselves.

A videotape about the Plymouth-Canton community's old-timers, newcomers, heritage and present will be shown on a viewing screen at this year's Fall Festival, when members of the Plymouth branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) present their bicentennial videotape, "Heritage, Happenings, Hopes."

The 35-minute, black and white videotape is scheduled for continuous showings at the Dunning-Hough Library, 223 S. Main, from 2-4 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 4; 7-9 p.m., Friday, Sept. 5; 2-4 p.m. and 7-9 p.m., Saturday, Sept. 6; and 2-4 p.m., Sunday, Sept. 7.

"THE TAPE'S about everything," said Peggy Fisher, chairperson of the AAUW's media committee. "It's a visual portrait of a growing community. Heritage shapes the background of a community, but we're also growing and moving into new things."

The videotape is a juxtaposition of past and present, old and new; work, play and local government. Scenes from today's Kellogg Park local governmental meetings and school district classrooms are blended with worn photographs of a community in years gone by.

Endorsed by the Plymouth Community Bicentennial Commission and funded by \$500 in grants from the AAUW's Plymouth branch, Michigan division and National Educational Foundation, the videotape was created by the media committee of the AAUW Plymouth branch and students and teachers from the Centennial Educational Park (CEP).

The media committee of the AAUW's Plymouth branch conceived the videotape idea about one year ago, after studying the potential of cable television in the Plymouth-Canton area.

Cable TV, Mrs. Fisher notes, could serve as an educational, communicative tool for a wide array of communities.

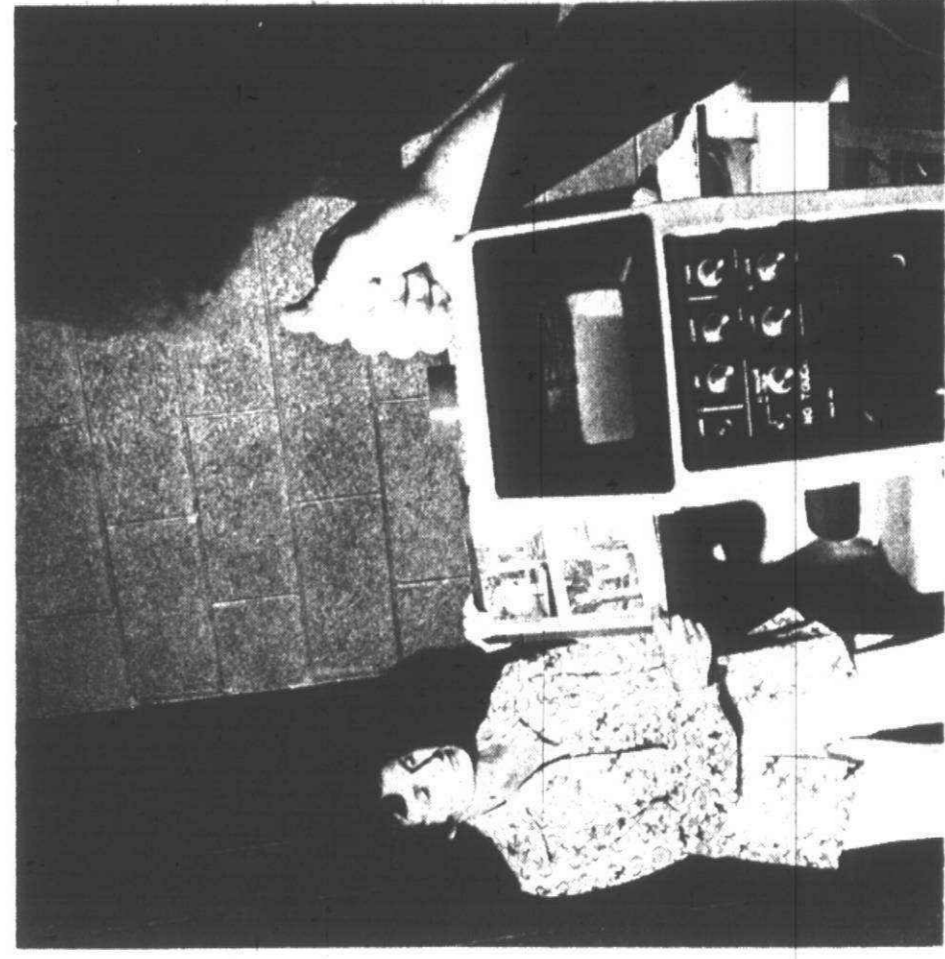


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
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How Festival got its start

One afternoon in 1956 a group of Rotarians was discussing what the club could do to help purchase much needed playground equipment and thus make a contribution to the general welfare of the city.

Finally, after discussing several ideas, Harold Hamill, whose fertile mind had conceived several worthwhile projects in the area, suggested conducting a chicken barbecue on a Sunday afternoon to which the general public would be invited.

THE IDEA seemed logical — even though it would mean a lot of hard work. So the group decided to try it. None of them had had experience in barbecuing chicken. That didn't stop them. They were courageous enough to make an attempt.

The first event was held on the site of the park on Hamilton Street. It attracted several hundred people — enough to build up confidence for the future.

Inspired by that success the Rotarians moved the event to the area in the rear of the Central High School the following year, with even greater success.

NOW, firmly established as a fund-

raiser, the Rotarians moved again. This time it was to Kellogg Park. Meanwhile, other groups in the city joined in the affair and organized what is now the Fall Festival.

In the group are the Kiwanis, Lions, Jaycees, the Plymouth Grange, the Business and Professional Women's Club — each with its own activity. The festival was established in 1956 and the event stretched over four days.

Traditionally, it is ushered in by the BPW with a knockwurst and sauerkraut dinner in the Park on Thursday following Labor Day. This is followed by the fish dinner sponsored by the Lions Club in the park on Friday. The Jaycees follow with a rib dinner on Saturday evening while the Kiwanians have an all-day pancake feast in the Masonic Temple.

All of this is prelude to the Rotary chicken barbecue on Sunday that has grown to such an extent that now is rated the biggest feast of its kind in the country.

And with each dinner, from the knockwurst to the chicken, a contribution is being made to charity. And it all started close to 20 years ago with a chicken dinner to raise funds for playground equipment.

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Hustling chefs prepare pancakes

How many pancake meals do the Kiwanis serve on the Saturday of the Fall Festival?

You'd be surprised to learn that the answer is "2,500 with seconds."

That means that with at least two pancakes to a meal, there are 5,000 pancakes. Counting the seconds—and at least half of the clients enjoy them—means that the hustling chefs with the high hats prepare at least 7,500 pancakes during the day.

NOW COUNT two sausages to a meal and you have 5,000 sausages with another 2,500 in "seconds" and you have quite a bundle of the delicacies.

"We could do a lot more," one of the veteran chefs said recently, "but

we only have three burners—and the traffic gets heavy.

"Our trouble is that we are suffering from growing pains—and no place to go."

FOR SOME time the Kiwanians have been considering the outdoors along side the Masonic Temple. Additional burners could be arranged and the present 2,500 limit surpassed. Each time the subject is mentioned it is countered with "What will we do if it rains?"

The Rotary Club has special boxes for the barbecued chicken, but it is rather difficult to prepare pancakes in the rain.

As a result they will remain indoors and be satisfied with serving the 2,500 pancake dishes.

How Fall Festival 'profits' are spent

Aside from helping to beautify the downtown area and Kellogg Park, the proceeds of the annual Fall Festival have done good for many other sectors.

Two years ago, when the area was crying for help for kidney patients, the Rotary Club donated two kidney dialysis machines to St. Mary Hospital in Livonia.

This was the start of an entire kidney unit in the hospital with the result that kidney patients from a wide area can be given relief.

When the Historical Commission was in need of something outstanding for the new museum, the Rotary Club again came through. This time it was a mural of the scene in 1924 depicting the intersection of Main Street and Penniman Avenue. It shows the old

car tracks and there is not an automobile in sight. This is certain to be an eye catcher when the museum opens to the public.

The museum also profited by the generosity of the Kiwanis Club. At the end of the old-time Main Street, that is the focal point of the upstairs in the museum, you'll find an old-time grocery store complete with coffee grinder, pickle barrel, etc.

This is the contribution of the Kiwanians and it is considered an outstanding replica of the grocery stores as we knew them at the turn of the century.

Help for the blind through the Lions and the scholarships awarded to local students by the BPW are all part of the festival fund distribution.

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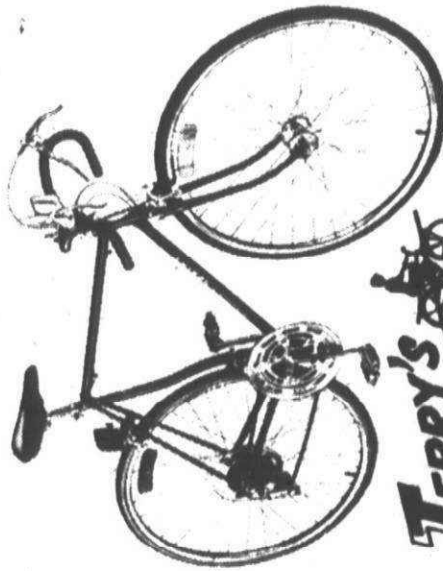
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Festival benefits entire community

There is much more to the annual Fall Festival than enjoying a good meal in the park.

No other event in the city spreads its wings of charity so far afield. It seems everybody gains and the city itself, is a place of serene beauty because the folks enjoyed their meal in the park and came back for more, year after year.

FOR EXAMPLE, Kellogg Park itself came into its present state of beauty because of the festival.

It was started by the Garden Club. Through the efforts of Mrs. Myrilla Shrader and Mrs. Arnold Johnson, the gas lights were placed in the park. Next came the controversial moving of a monument and the sodding of the entire area.

Following this the Rotary Club sponsored the fountain in the center and the Kiwanis members not only sponsored the brick walks, but personally laid them. The brick is unusual in that it became a community project and with each contribution of \$100 the contributor (individual or family) had a special brick laid.

Each special brick paid the cost of 1,000 regular bricks, and the walk added luster to the entire triangle.

The Business and Professional Women have used the proceeds of their German dinner to provide two scholarships each year, plus sending a girl to Girls State. The BPW also contributes to Youth, Inc.

FOLLOWING tradition, the Lions Club works with the blind and the Jaycees have a hand in several activities, including the sponsoring of the annual July Fourth parade and lending a hand wherever needed.

Only recently the Kiwanis Club took on another assignment to help beautify the city. It has beautified the triangular park in front of the old high school on Main Street.

A complete new sprinkling system was installed and the entire landscaping was revamped. It is now another beauty spot downtown that can be traced to the benefits from the Fall Festival.

So, when you're eating your chicken, ribs, pancakes or knackwurst, you are contributing to the welfare of the entire city and its residents.

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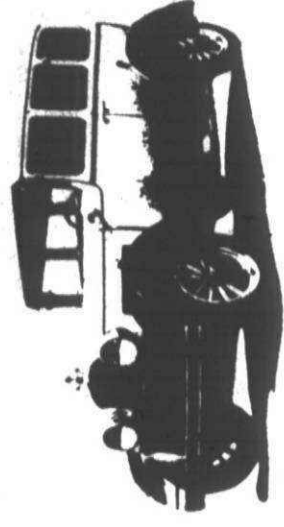
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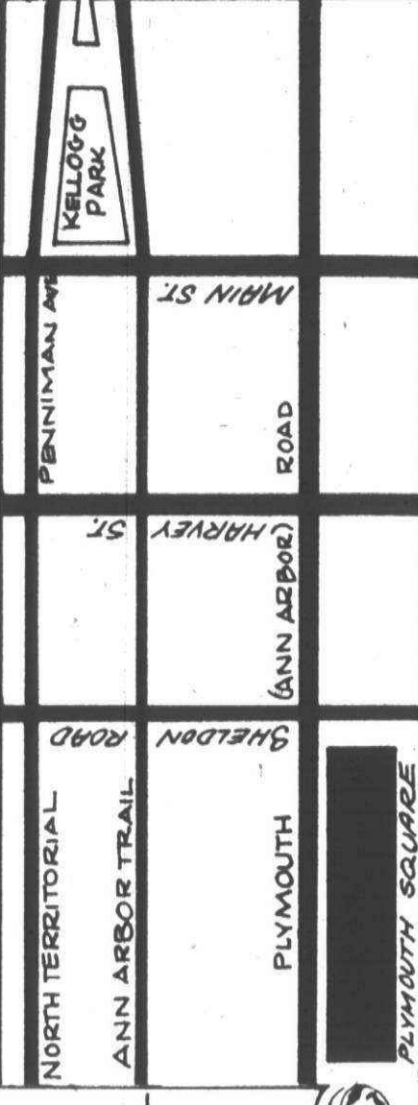
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

Mr. Clean has an army

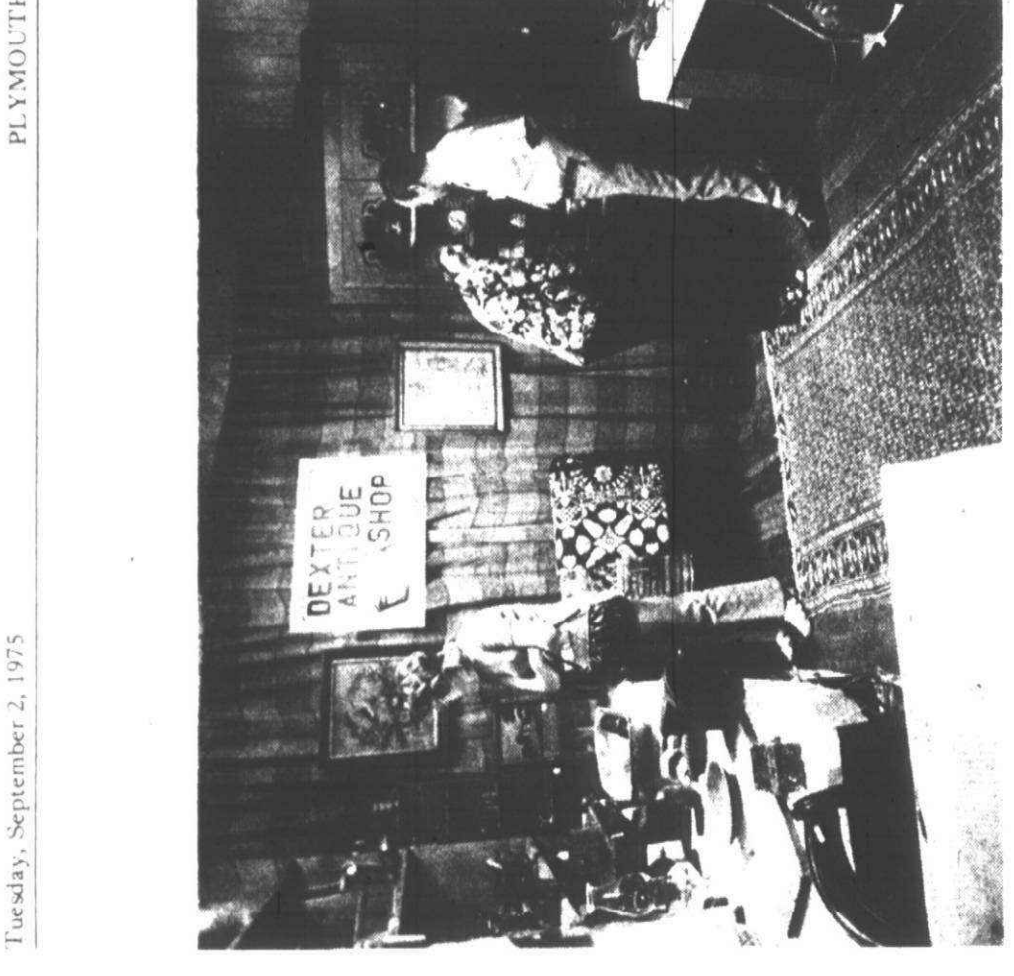

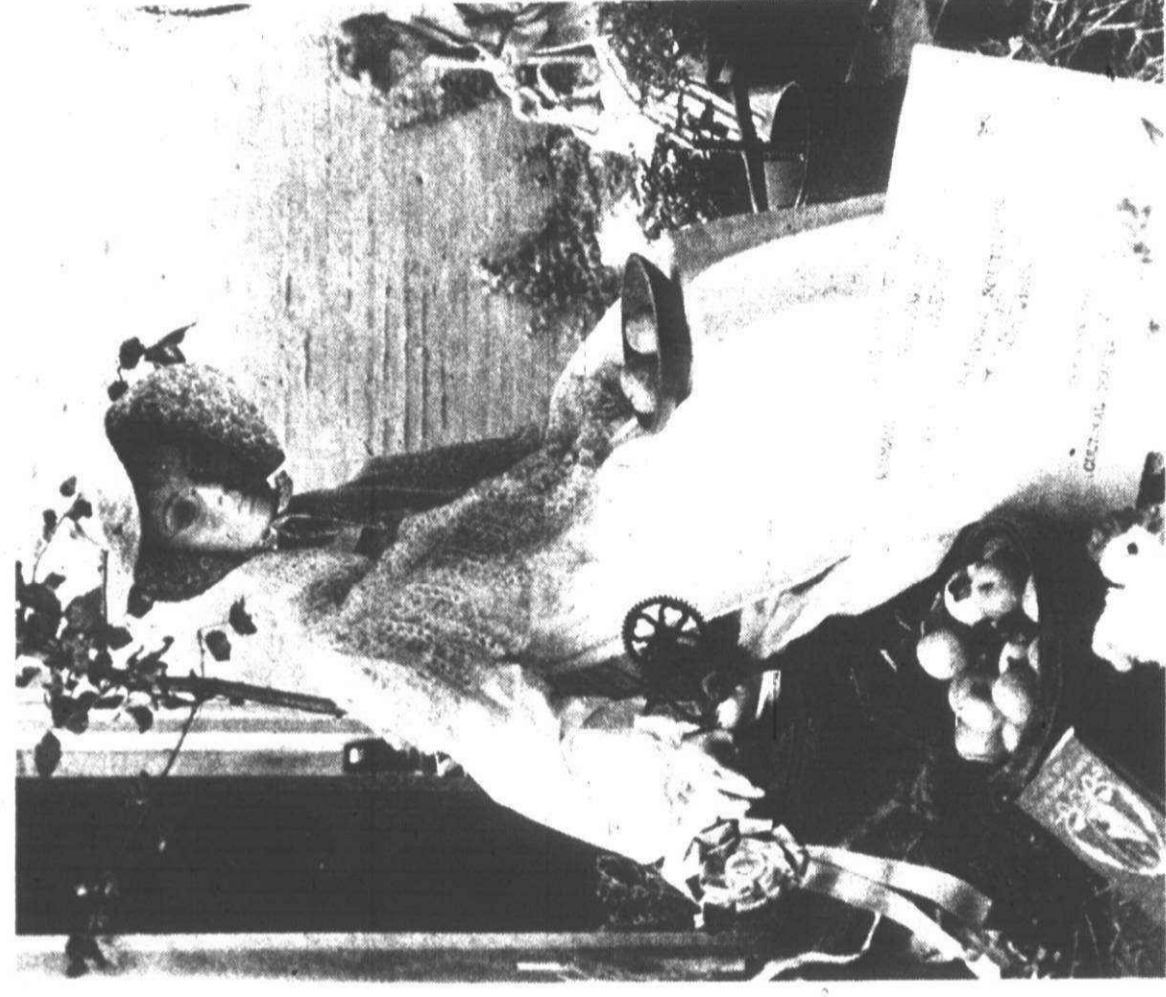

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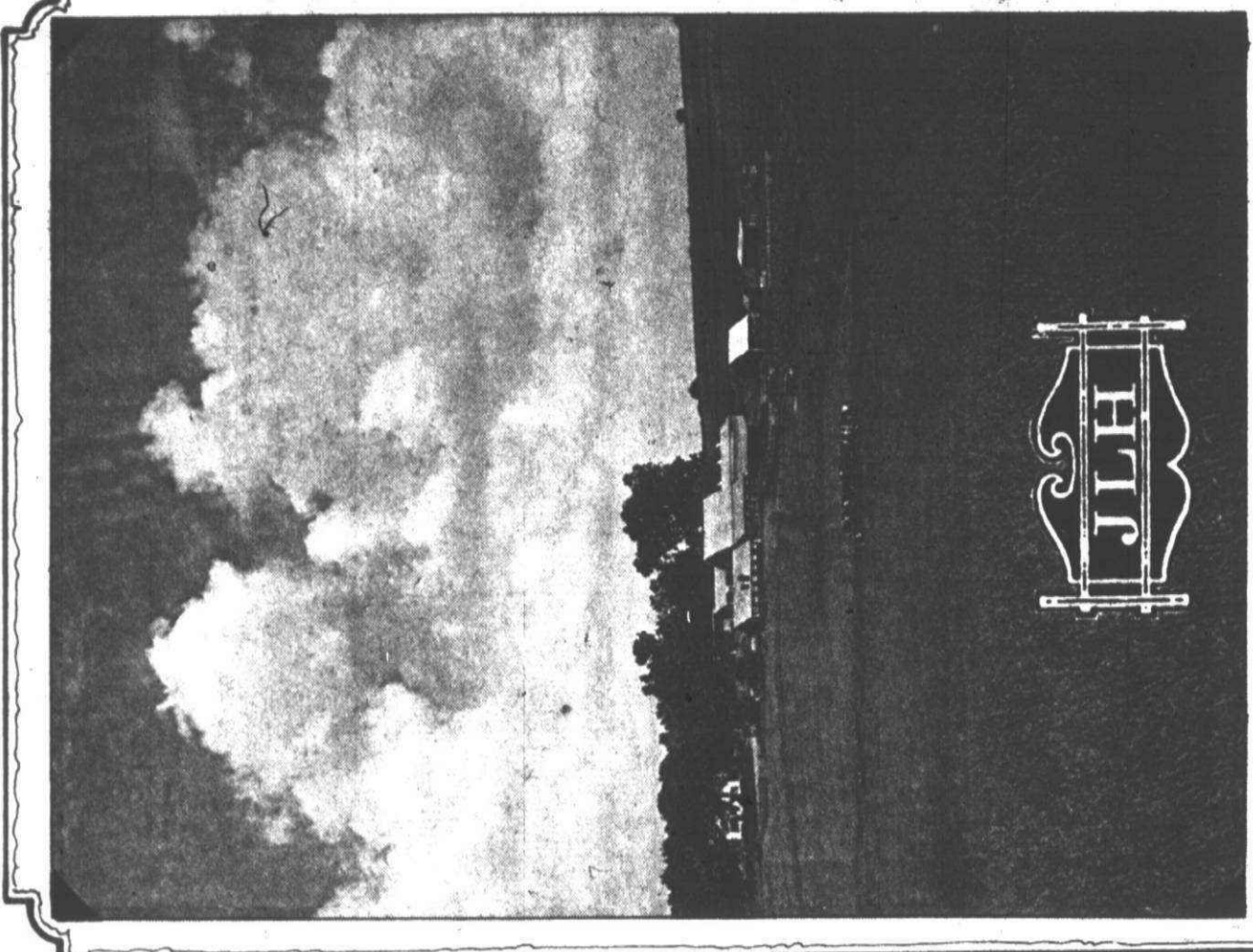

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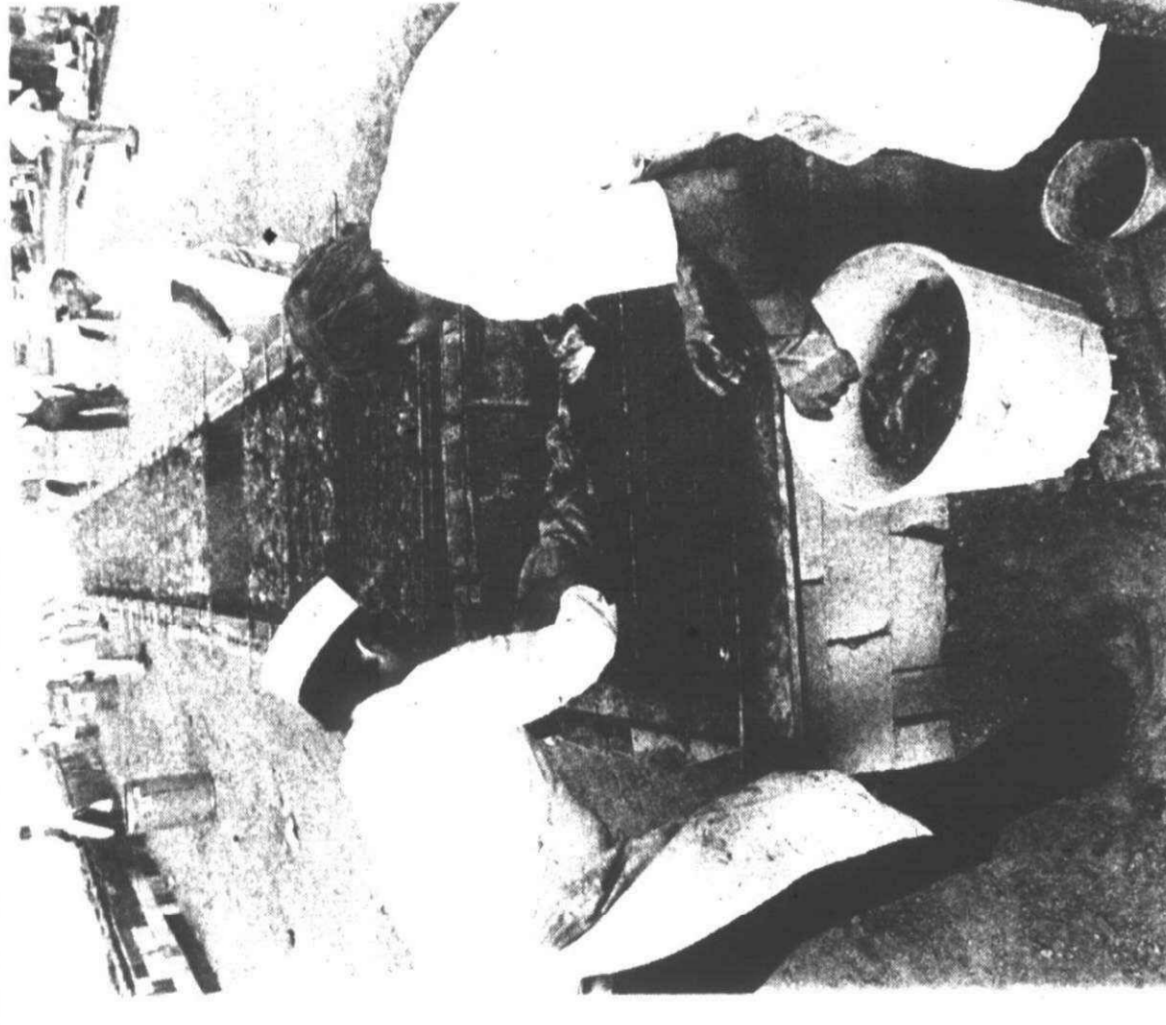


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The sides of chickens are quite important

If you are seated at the family dinner table and pick up the drumstick of the chicken being served on Sunday, chances are you wouldn't know if it came from the right or the left side of the chicken.

You'd just eat it and enjoy it. But if you were working one of the large grills at the Rotary Club's chicken barbecue that furnishes the climax to the Fall Festival, you would know the difference—and be very careful about it.

You see, over the years, the men who handle the barbecue and are responsible for preparing the chickens, found that getting the two sides mixed can be troublesome.

They learned that the sides must be folded properly into each other on the grills. If by chance you get a left side mixed with the right it will create a hump. When the grill is turned, the chicken halves will fall out into the fire.

To protect against such losses, the chickens are ordered in a special manner.

THIS IS NOT the only unusual feature of the chicken preparation. By experience, the Rotarians have learned that if the stoves or pits are kept at a length of 75 feet, it will take 28 turns over the coals from the truck to the serving line to properly prepare them. This has been determined on the basis of having the charcoal fire at a height of 18 inches.

As usual there will be two fires (pits) and they'll be kept going from morning until about 6:30 p.m. to care for the demand that again is expected to reach last year's record of 16,000 diners.

Yes sir, the chicken barbecue is not a haphazard system. In fact those who man the pits engage in a dry run the week before the festival in the hope that there'll be no embarrassing moments on the big day.



Speed is vital for Lions' fry

The PLYMOUTH LIONS will serve fresh perch from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Friday, Sept. 5, on Penniman at Kellogg Park.

The Lions Club of Plymouth is hoping to set a speed record during this year's fish fry to reach a goal of 3,600 diners served.

Planners figure if the club averages 400 dinners from 11:30 a.m. Friday, Sept. 5, 100 dinners from 4:55 p.m., 2,300 dinners from 5 to 7:30 p.m., and 200 dinners from 7:30 p.m., workers will have to dish out one serving every 3.6 seconds.

That is enough to reach last year's sales but the Lions are trying for a record of 3,600 meals — a task which will require one serving each 3.1 seconds. So each meal will have to be served five-tenths of a second faster and that's what the Lions hope to do, especially during the prime time of 4-7 p.m.

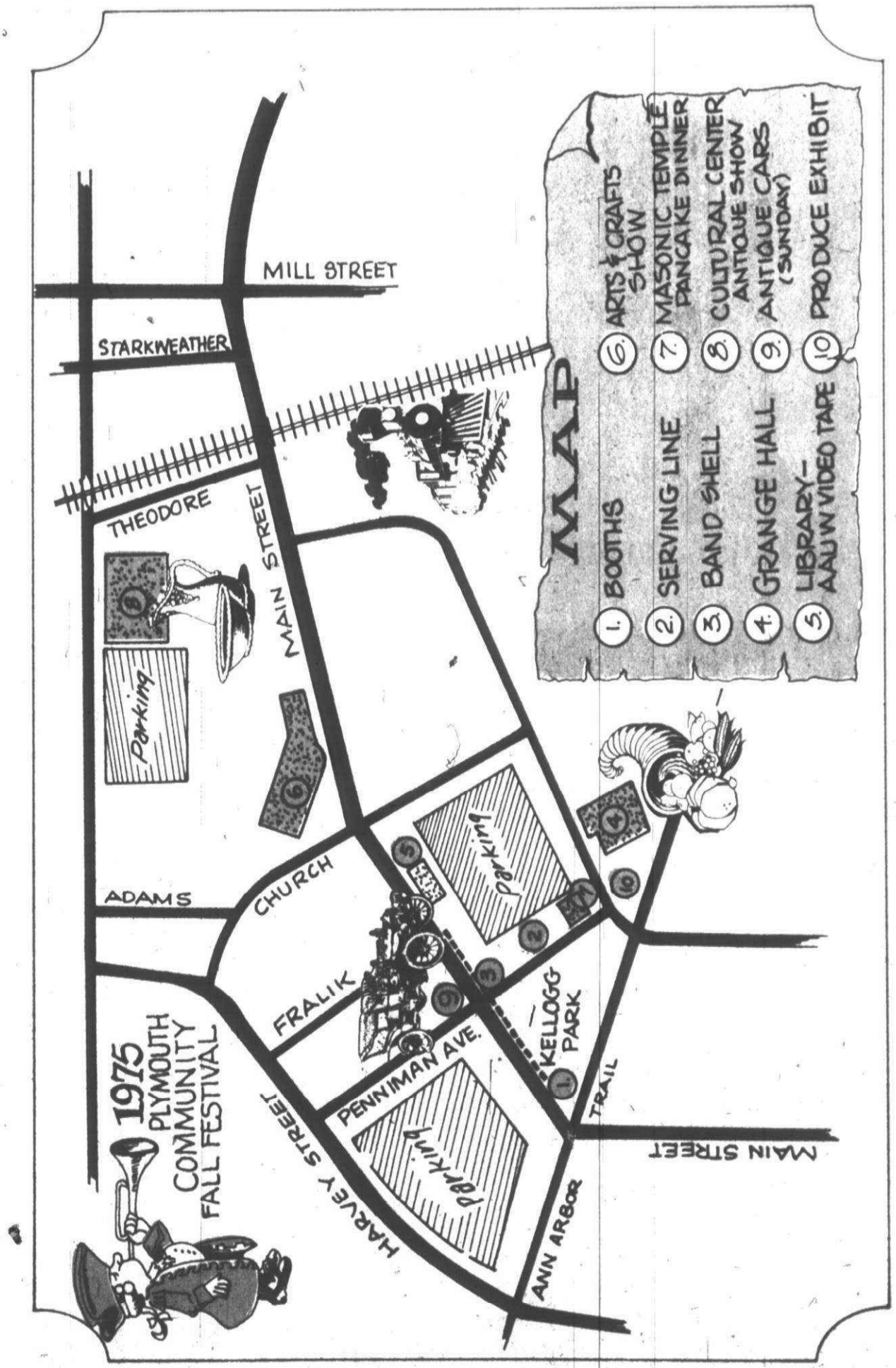
