Time to sign up for school advisory groups

Interested residents of the Plymouth-Canton community are being urged to let the school district know if they are willing to serve on one of 12 citizen advisory committees being organized.

The Plymouth Community School District is establishing a Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) to provide the board of education with a timely report on community attitudes in specific areas.

The committee's recommendations will aid in making decisions about the future of the school district.

THE 144 MEMBERS of the CAC will be selected based on location of residence, age, profession, parent or non-parent, and educational orientation in an effort to obtain equal balance in representation from all.

Each member picked will attend 12 weekly meetings through April 7, either with the entire committee or in one of 12 work groups.

The 12 topics to be studied include: preschool education; scheduling; classroom organization;

maintenance and operation of facilities; special programs for reading, humanities, etc.; extra-curricular activities; legislation and communications; vocational and career education; community education; media services; special education programs; and, inservice training programs.

Anyone interested in becoming a member of the CAC may obtain an application from the PCSD Administration Building, 454 S. Harvey, Plymouth, or from any school building office.

Applications must be returned to the Office of Community Relations, same address, by Jan. 12.

The first meeting of the CAC will be Wednesday, Jan. 21, at 7:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of West Middle School. All meetings are open to the public.

Resources for the work groups will include financial and organizational information on their assigned area, reports from the district's needs assessment survey, and staff resources of teachers and administrators.

Christmas report:

The year for ham and cheap liquor

Christmas 1975—the year of pet rocks, mood rings and Super Kisses.

If you were like the majority of area residents, you had ham for Christmas dinner, gave clothing, flowers or books for gifts, and drank as much as usual—but cheaper brands of liquor.

The big stores were swarming with shoppers. Meijer Thrifty Acres in Canton Township had a bigger year than its first in the area.

The Kmart stores did a booming business. Lou Doty of the Canton store said sales were better generally, with toy sales exceptional. He rated HO model trains as the top seller.

Brad Gratton of the Plymouth Kresge Store said sales were up over last year.

But what about the smaller businesses? How did the main street retailer fare—the old-time shopkeeper who does business on a much smaller scale?

MERCHANTS report from good to fantastic Christmas sales with relatively few returns on Christmas gifts. Most say exchanges were arranged and sales continued at a brisk pace after the big day as shoppers spent

their Christmas gifts of money.

Dave Whitmore of Pilgrim Party Shoppe and Jan Blomberg of the Mayflower Wine Shop said sales were pretty close to last year. Whitmore noted the volume of commercial, industrial and over-the-counter buying was about the same as last year. But he said all were settling for middle-range brands, not the high-priced quality names.

DAVE SCHEMENAUER of Krogers and Marvin Levich of Farmer Jacks agreed that ham was the big seller for Christmas dinners.

Levich estimated 65 per cent of his customers chose ham rather than turkey, although some bought both. Schemenauer said if they did buy turkey, it was one of the smaller pre-basted types.

Bill Kuehr of Heide's Greenhouse and Flower Shop said his Christmas business doubled last year—especially the sale of poinsettias.

"All our poinsettias were grown in our greenhouse," said Kuehr. "They were all pinch-backs and because of the good growing season in the fall, some of them had as many as 25

blooms." He added that hanging baskets and large potted plants were top choices for Christmas giving.

"It seemed if they were undecided on what to give, they'd settle on a plant, big ones. We sold a lot of Norfolk pines."

JIM GIBSON of Plymouth Book World said, "Overall, business was better than last year." He added that Christmas Eve was much quieter. "Probably because they had Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday to shop this year."

Hugh Jarvis, owner of Hugh Jarvis Gifts, admitted the pet rocks were an "outstanding item."

He said large, chocolate Super Kisses were very popular and, on the whole, business was better than a year ago.

Candy sales were up in Kermutz's Fine Candies and Gifts, according to Kim Hamlin. Boxed candies, especially a Christmas box, were favorites.

Clothing items for the men in the family found their way under many Christmas trees.

Fred Hill of John Smith of Plymouth said sales were "way ahead of last year."

"November and December were both exceptional months," he added.

Bill Hall of Lent's, who was busy getting ready for his "lost-lease sale," reported pre-Christmas business was "fantastic, the largest in years."

GEORGE MOTSON estimated sales at Famous Men's Wear were better than last year.

Jerry Loissle, owner of Jerry's Bicycles on Ann Arbor Road was pleased with his second Christmas in the area. "Business was up about 10 per cent," he estimated. "And it was well-rounded, there was no single big seller. It wasn't all 10-speeds or Sting-Rays."

Naomi Frederick of Harvi's Inc of Plymouth said, "It was great, even after Christmas." She compared sales to those of 1972, a top year.

Sales were "up a little" at Minerva's Dunning's according to Herb Chaiken. He said the big snow early in December 1974 had increased the last-minute rush last year. The pace was more leisurely this year, but business was better.

Virginia Dyerr of Little Angels Shoppe reported sales of children's clothing were much brisker than last year.

For Muriel's Doll House, it was the first Christmas in its new location on Penniman Avenue.

"It was a lot better than last year," said Muriel Calhoun, "and we haven't had one exchange."

Help needed

Hypertension program to begin

Hypertension, or high blood pressure as it is more commonly called, is an element in the deaths each year of as many as 750,000 Americans.

In an effort to reduce this toll each year, a Hypertension Committee has been formed, made up of the fire

chiefs of Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships, representatives of the YMCA, the Wayne County Department of Health and the Michigan Heart Association.

HEADED BY Chief George

Schoenneman of Plymouth, the committee includes Chief Mel Paulun of Canton, Chief James Gignac of Plymouth Township, Mrs. Joan Goff of the Wayne County Health Department and Miss Shelley Radar of the Heart Association.

Plans are now being formulated for a "Hypertension Week" beginning Feb. 9 and running through the 14th. During this week, nurses and other volunteers will be on hand from 1 to 8 p.m. weekdays and from noon to 5 p.m. Saturday in the Canton and Plymouth township fire stations where persons may have their blood pressure taken free.

It is hoped by the committee that the average person, who may be too busy to see a doctor for a blood pressure test, will take advantage of the program.

"We are mainly seeking the 30 to 50 age groups, those who may never had their blood pressure tested due to the rush of every-day living," Schoenneman said.

He said older persons usually have become more concerned about their blood pressure than those in the 30 to 50 age group. In Plymouth, the YMCA is supplying this service for senior citizens at the present time.

THE PROGRAM is a pilot one for Southeastern Michigan. The committee is hoping to make a success of it so that other communities and organizations may join in the campaign to reduce death or illness from hypertension, Schoenneman added.

"Our main problem at the present is getting enough volunteers and equipment to do the job right," the chief said.

"Blood pressure cuffs and the cooperation and assistance of local nurses are badly needed."

The three fire chiefs said that most firemen could give blood pressure tests but that in the event of an alarm, they would have to leave the station unmanned.

The committee said local doctors will be contacted to see if they are available to assist in the program.

"Volunteers are badly needed in this program is to be a success," Schoenneman said.

Persons interested in devoting their time to this project are asked to contact Schoenneman at the Plymouth fire station, or Gignac in Plymouth Township, and Paulun in Canton Township.

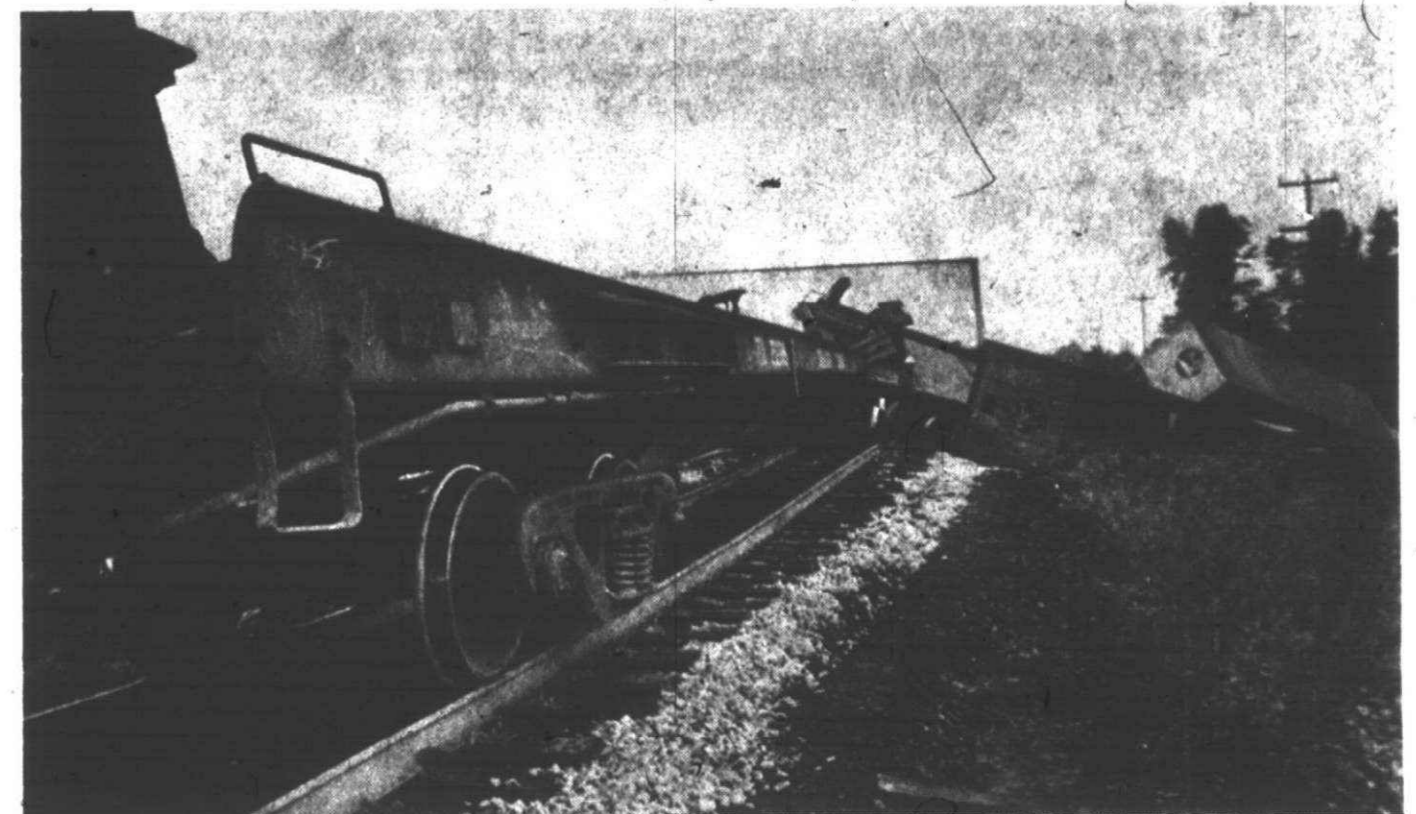

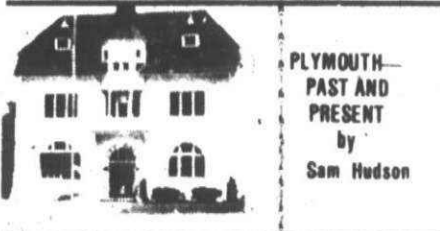

Plymouth produced its share of writers

There was little call for literary production during the early decades in Plymouth. After a hard day's work chopping logs, hoeing corn, mending fences and chasing strayed livestock, most settlers would emulate A.B. Markham, who took a bowl of Johnny Cake and milk for his supper and went right to bed.

With such a limited market for the written word, it isn't surprising that no mention of an author in Plymouth is found until the 1880s. Samuel Johnson, who observed that "the chief



glory of every people arises from its authors," is also the realist who said, "No man but a blockhead ever wrote except for money."

SINCE THE turn of the century, however, Plymouth has spawned a respectable number of authors, including an authority on the U.S. Constitution, an expert in electronics industry, and a nationally-known author of books and articles on conservative thought.

Plymouth's earliest author may have been Theodatus T. Lyon, the authority on fruit growing. His "History of Michigan Horticulture" appeared in the Seventeenth Annual Report of the State Historical Society in 1887. Lyon was then living in South Haven but the pomological work which earned him a national reputation was done in Plymouth between 1838 and 1874.

The second Plymouth writer of note



HELEN HULL

was Henry M. Utley. Born in Plymouth of pioneer parents in 1836, Utley co-authored "The History of Michigan as a Province, Territory and State" (1906). Earlier, he had written an essay, "Wildcat Banking in Michigan," an original source on the subject.

A YOUNG GIRL who spent her summers in the early 1900s visiting her

aunt in Plymouth, went on to become a nationally-known novelist and educator. Helen Rose Hull was born in Albion, but her mother, Louise McGill, was born here.

Helen's aunt, Anna McGill, lived here in the family home on Harvey Street. Warren C. Hull, Helen's father, came here to live after he retired as a professor at Michigan State University. It was Hull who encouraged local citizens to found the Plymouth Historical Society in 1948.

Miss Hull taught at Wellesley in Barnard, and at Columbia University, where she was professor of fiction writing for nearly 50 years. One of her students, author Paul Gallico, rated her in the company of John Erskine and Walter Pitkin as one of the great short-story teachers of her time.

She published 60 short stories and 20 novels. One of her novels "The Islanders" (1927), portrays Michigan at the time it was passing from the pioneer state into a more complex society. Another, "Heat Lightning," was a Book-of-the-Month Club selection in 1932. In 1960, Miss Hull wrote a mystery, "A tapping on the Wall," which won a \$3,000 award for the best mystery written by a college professor.

In 1940, a New York Times book reviewer placed Helen Hull as a writer alongside Edith Wharton and Willa Cather. Miss Hull died in 1971 at the age of 83. Her brother, Frederick Hull, who now lives in California, recently presented a set of his sister's novels to the Plymouth Historical Museum in memory of the days she enjoyed here with her Aunt Annie on Harvey Street.

IN THE LATE 1920s, Plymouth's leading exemplar of the newly-emerging emancipated woman, Mrs. Ruth Huston Whipple, found time in her busy schedule to write two books on debating.

One of them, "Debating for High Schools," published by Ginn & Co. in 1929, was co-authored by Ray K. Immel. A high school debating coach in her early years, Mrs. Whipple was Plymouth's first woman mayor.

Another mayor of Plymouth, George M. Chute, has written three books on electronics. One of them, "Electronics in Industry," published by McGraw Hill in 1946, has gone through four editions and has been translated into eight languages. The latest edition (1971) was co-authored with Chute's son, Robert D. Chute, a professor at Lawrence Institute of Technology.

Until he retired in 1966, George Chute was a professor at the University of Detroit. He was acting mayor of Plymouth in 1949 when a temporary commission was appointed by Gov. G. Mennen Williams following the recall of four members of the elected commission.

PLYMOUTH WAS the birthplace of a distinguished educator and writer who was an authority on the U.S. Constitution and the presidency.

Edward Samuel Corwin, who was born here in 1878, earned his PhD at the University of Michigan in 1900. He was professor of jurisprudence at Princeton University from 1905 until he retired in 1946. He died in 1963.

Dr. Corwin wrote more than 20 books on the constitution and the government, including "A Constitution of

Powers in the Secular State" (1951), "The Constitution and What it Means Today" (1958), and "The President, Office and Powers" (1958).

Esch urges 'topless' law

Because the American public is forced to foot the bill of more than a quarter of a billion dollars for automobile damage, landscape destruction, serious injury and even death caused by uncovered trucks spewing debris onto our nation's highways, U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) has introduced legislation requiring the covering of all "topless" trucks using interstate or other federally-assisted highways.

"There is no excuse for allowing trucks to continue to spew junk all over our highways and passing motorists simply because it is inconvenient to cover loads," Esch said.

Under the Esch bill, states not having effective covered truck laws would not qualify for federal funds on highway projects. Esch said this is the only means Congress has of impacting upon the states to pass effective "topless truck" laws which would cut down the increasing costs and number of injuries to highway motorists. If the House Commerce Committee doesn't report the bill out to the floor for action, Esch indicated he would offer the bill as an amendment to the Federal Highway Act of 1976 when it comes before Congress next year.

NATURAL RESOURCES COMMISSION ACTION

(Under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended)

BOBCAT HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1976

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on June 13, 1975, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, in regards to bobcats declared no open season in Zone 3, abridged the open and required a permit to hunt in Zone 2 and on Bois Blanc Island of Zone 1. The seasons and regulations shall be as follows:

- Zone 1: No closed season, except on Bois Blanc Island where the season and regulations shall coincide with those of Zone 2.
- Zone 2: January 1 through February 29, in Emmet, Cheboygan, Presque Isle, Osego, Montmorency, and Alpena counties. Hunting by permit only.
- Zone 3: No open season.

Application Procedure

A free permit is required of all persons hunting bobcats in Zone 2. Applications must be made in person or by mail as follows:

1. Applicants may appear in person at the Gaylord District Headquarters or at the Atlanta, Indian River, or Millersburg field offices of the Department of Natural Resources. Such application must be made during regular working hours. No application is to be made prior to December 1, 1975.
2. Application by mail must be made individually on a government postal card. The applicant shall address the card to himself, typing or printing his name and address on the postage side of the card. The applicant shall then mail the card in an envelope addressed to: Bobcat Permit, P. O. Box 576, Department of Natural Resources, Gaylord, Michigan 49735. Applications must be postmarked no earlier than December 1, 1975.

Permits

There is no limit to the number of permits that will be issued. There will be no charge for the permit. The permit authorizes the bearer to hunt during the entire two-month season in the designated open areas.

Hunting

No person shall hunt under authority of his permit unless he has signed it in ink and carries it on his person along with his 1975 small game or sportsman's license, and unless he properly wears the back tag provided with his license.

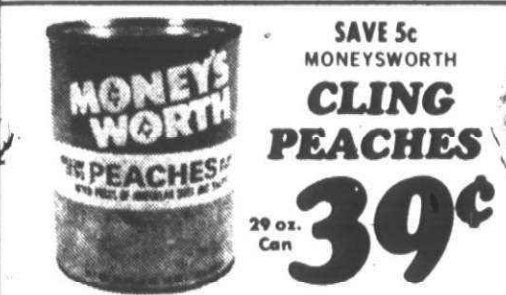

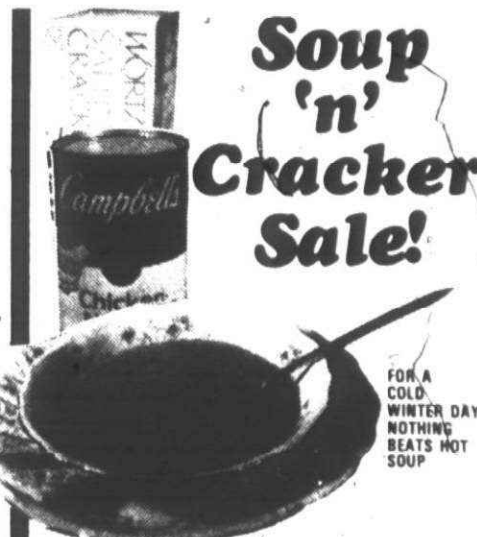

TLC for house plants is subject for 2 courses

Because more and more homes are looking like botanical gardens these days, two area Ys have decided to sponsor classes to answer the basic botanical question, "What do my plants want from me?"

Ready to respond to this query at the YWCA of Western Wayne County, 26279 Michigan, Inkster, is Angie Rutledge whose class in indoor gardening will begin Tuesday, Jan. 20.

Gayle Czubaj of Plymouth, former part owner of the Green Thumb Plant Shop, will be prepared to help plants and plant lovers learn to find happiness together in sessions at the Livonia Family Y, 14255 Stark.

Her four-week class will start Tuesday, Jan. 13 from 9:30-11 a.m.

"WATER IS THE MOST critical issue in growing plants," declared Mrs. Rutledge who lives in Dearborn, and who recently earned a degree in horticulture from Michigan State University.

"It causes more problems than anything else."

As a rule of thumb she suggested watering foliage plants until the water washes out at the bottom.

"A pot should have a hole in the bottom for drainage and should rest on a saucer," she said. "Those lovely pottery pots are not good for plants unless they have a saucer underneath. Without a drainage hole the plant is handicapped."

She believes it best to water so that the entire soil ball of the plant is moistened.

"Then don't water again until the surface dries out," she said.

If you have a dry house, try having a jade plant or a cactus, Mrs. Rutledge suggested. Both are succulents and have thick leaves or stems that hold moisture.

For the average house she finds that Swedish ivy does very well. To interest children in the plant scene, she thinks a mimosa sensitive plant might be just the thing. When its leaves are touched, they fold up.

PLANT EXPRESSIONS is the name Mrs. Czubaj has chosen for a new business she started in her home. No, the name doesn't mean she sells plants bearing happy or sad faces. It means she helps her customers express themselves in their home or office through a selection of decorative plants.

"Plants vitalize a room," she said. "When I walk into a room I always notice the plants. They make me feel good."

"They respond to my care and as they grow they become more beautiful. I get gratification from this. They really beautify an area."

She thinks children can learn from plants.

"To observe life is to love life," she maintained. "Plants are for watching. If a child likes plants, give him responsibility for their care. Help him start one from a cutting."

"In my class the students will learn mother and child projects they can do together. There are lots of things that are fun and easy to do with kids."

HER CLASS ALSO WILL involve basic plant care.

"People often get frustrated because a book on plants will say one thing and another book will say something else," she said. "What I find that people need most is clearing up discrepancies in books. Often they can do this through experience. I hope to be able to give them experiences that will give them confidence in dealing with their own plants."

One of her tips for caring for plants

in the winter is to move them a little closer to the window for extra light.

She recommended plant misters for winter to increase the humidity in the air, adding that this should be done in the morning so that the plant can dry off by night and avoid getting a fungus growth.

"Don't mist plants with hairy or fuzzy leaves like the African violet," she warned. "Water gets caught in the hair and creates fungus."

Misting is not a substitute for watering, she said. "It's just giving the plant a special treat by creating a greenhouse atmosphere."

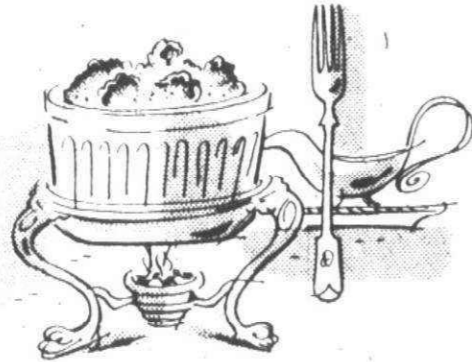
FOR THOSE who wonder what to do with all the greenery when away on a vacation, she has a useful suggestion.

"Wrap the plant in a plastic bag," she said. "Water the soil one or two days ahead of time so that it is not too wet. There can be a couple of vent holes."

"The bag will act as a terrarium or small greenhouse. You'll be surprised how well it does as long as you keep it out of the sun. Full sun would make it act like an oven."

Mrs. Czubaj thinks small plants could last two or three weeks this way.

New program to train teachers for pre-school

Kathy Wood, director of The Early Learning Center in Farmington, will launch a new course oriented toward a professional career in "Early Childhood Development" set to begin in January.

It is designed for those seeking certification for day care and pre-school agencies; those who wish to attain an associate of arts degree, or a bachelor of arts degree.

It has been hailed as "innovative" by Don Nichols, dean of Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus, who will be cooperating by offering the basic general studies required for the degree aspirants.

"THE JOB MARKET is way downhill for anyone with a degree to teach K-12 now, but it is a different matter altogether for those certified to teach pre-school," said Nancy Bates, administrative assistant at the center.

She said the idea for formulating the new course came after "a couple workshops Kathy gave. We became acutely aware there was a need for this."

Both Mrs. Bates and Ms. Wood stressed that the course was designed "not so much as a class, but more like a career oriented program."

They emphasized that whether the students choose to go for certificates or degrees, they will have enough spe-

cific skills to enter the job market immediately.

Ms. Wood added that those who finish a one-year course and decide to go on for a degree "would have a means of support for the next two or three years of schooling."

The practical experience with pre-schoolers, which is an intrinsic part of the course, will be done in conjunction with the youngsters who now attend the Early Learning Center sessions at 27000 Farmington Road. "And the students will undoubtedly be recipients of Ms. Wood's philosophy," Mrs. Bates said.

Ms. Wood bases her philosophy on assumptions about the growth and development of children.

"EVERY PERSON is very unique, and in planning the educational program, we respect the individuality of each child," she said. "Along with respect, we as teachers must take into consideration the developmental level at which each child is functioning and not particularly according to his chronological age in terms of months or years."

She also said she believes there are critical periods in which the child is most vulnerable to a lack of appropriate stimulation, and it is at these times that innovative programs for the early learners are necessary.

She considers all aspects of the child's development: social, religious, physical and psychological, "for they make up the whole person," she said.

"Through providing children with learning experiences, developing personal relationships, allowing self-expression and creativity, plus providing guidance appropriate to each stage of growth, we will find a child sensing his personal worth and satisfaction with life."

The Early Learning Center is part of John Wesley College's program for total human development.

Ms. Bates believes the course is tailor made for someone who is planning a second career.

"I'm talking about mothers who love children, yet their own children are gone. It's almost like being all dressed up with no place to go."

Rockets power past Spartans

Casting aside the effects of a cold first half in which they accumulated only 19 points, the Rockets from Westland John Glenn warmed up during the second 16 minutes Saturday night to defeat Inkster Cherry Hill, 55-41.

The victory, Glenn's second over nonleague rival Cherry Hill this season, came in the consolation pairing of the Western Wayne Invitational Basketball Tournament, won by Suburban Eight representative Belleville.

The Rockets had defeated the Spartans 66-63 in overtime in their first game of the season in Inkster, and in that battle, Glenn was very cold at the outset of the proceedings while the Spartans, as hot as a poised branding iron, jumped out to an 11-0 lead.

Last Saturday, during the initial quarter, both teams were as cold as the mountain of snow in the parking lot behing the triple-domed Glenn gym. The Rockets led 7-6 after the first eight minutes, but Cherry Hill fought back to tie the game at 19 by the end of the first half.

While the Spartans were just as inaccurate during the second half as they were in the first and the entire game the previous night against Wayne, the Rockets improved on finding the scoring range, besting the Spartans 16-10 in the third quarter and 20-12 in the finale to ease to their fourth win in nine games.

"We didn't play very well in the first half," assessed Glenn coach Gordon Davis. "The kids were a little flat, but I kind of expected that after they played so well the night before against Belleville and lost."

"However, we came back in the second half, shot better and moved better on defense after being sluggish throughout the first half," Davis said.

The Rockets used a man to man defense most of the game against the smaller Spartans and controlled the boards throughout the contest. George

Roberts collected 15 rebounds, most in the second half and Dan Diadiun hauled in 12 caroms.

Cherry Hill started out in a zone defense, which worked well when Glenn wasn't hitting, but the Spartans changed to a man to man defense in the fourth quarter when the Rockets started to pull away.

Three Rockets found themselves in the double-figure column of the scoring ledger after the game. Diadiun pumped in 16 points to lead all scorers, Roberts added 12 and DeLuca counted 11. Paul Bodner and Mark Lipinski tallied nine apiece for Cherry Hill.

Davis reiterated after the consolation contest that his Rockets have yet to develop the consistency needed to become a complete ball club.

In the tourney finals, Belleville, sparked by James Thompkins and Narvell Turner with 14 points apiece, bested Wayne 61-50 to claim the title. Belleville had edged the Rockets by six points in overtime to reach the championship bracket.

Selected for the all-tournament team were Pat Sheridan from Wayne, Thompkins and Dennis Easley from Belleville, and Diadiun and Roberts from John Glenn.

The Rockets next swing into league action next Friday (Jan. 9) at Livonia Franklin. JV play starts at 6:15 p.m.

Cagers exhibit colors

Traditionally, the holiday season is a time for reflection, utilizing the present as a base for looking back into the past and ahead into the future.

While the occasion perhaps is best suited for consideration of one's own personal life situation, it also serves as a good time to check on the progress of area basketball teams, whose seasons are at least one-third over as we head into the new year.

Several interesting developments have materialized on the prep scene and whenever one is dealing with amateur athletics, surprises occasionally pop up in the realm of the anticipated.

Two area cage powerhouses—Plymouth Salem and Garden City West—are the only local teams which maintain perfect records at this point of the season, as the Rocks stand at 8-0 and the Tigers at 7-0.

Salem is the defending Suburban Eight League champion led by all-arounding Jim Ellinghausen and a supporting cast of quick, fundamentally-sound teammates.

The Rocks consistently move the ball ahead, fast break and stalk their opponents with a pressing man to man defense. However, the Rocks will be severely tested in their first game after the holiday break when they travel to Belleville to meet the Tigers.

Belleville currently sports a 7-1 record and might be able to match the Rocks' speed and board strength.

Garden City West has had a much rockier road to haul in its quest for a perfect season. Injuries to starters Mike Susko and Terry Bradley, who missed two games each with ankle sprains, forced the Tigers to go to their bench a little earlier and sooner than hoped.

However, the substitutes have responded admirably, according to veteran West coach Chris Babler.

West, co-champion of the Tri-River League, looks like a good bet to repeat this year with the talents of Susko, Mr. Inside, with his rebounding strength and deft touch from close in.

He is complimented by Dave Niles, Mr. Outside, who is averaging over 20 points per contest, mostly on long bombs.

The Tigers have been scared a couple times this year, downing Livonia Churchill by four points and besting Livonia Franklin by a single point when Franklin missed a one and one opportunity with one second to play.

However, both those games were on the road, and the Tigers went into the latter without the services of Susko and Bradley and still won, which is the mark of a poised team.

Livonia Stevenson, with an overall 4-3 record, is a squad whose season mark belies its true character. Among those losses were a three point overtime defeat to Garden City West and a six point loss to Salem.

The Spartans, who last year won the Inter-Lakes title, sport a 2-0 conference mark this season and have proved they have the talent to play with the best of teams.

The Stevenson cagers have also showed they have the discipline and courage to continue plugging away in the face of huge deficits.

A Jan. 9 home date with Pontiac Northern should clarify who really has the power this season in the Inter-Lakes League, but it is easy to appreciate a team like Stevenson, which refuses to quit.

Garden City East, so far, is a difficult squad to figure out this year. With a pair of solid returnees in Greg Emery and Jim Riley, most knowledgeable basketball fans thought the Panthers would have another tough ball club.

Even though Emery and Riley have both averaged in double figures, they have received little support from the rest of the crew, reflected by East's 4-2 mark.

In fact, the Panthers could just as easily be 2-4 now, as East defeated a relatively weak Inkster Cherry Hill by one point and Stevenson by three in overtime.

The Panthers' big problem is inconsistency in all aspects of the game, from rebounding and shooting to defensive work and running offensive patterns. East could face a rough 1976 unless it gets things together and resolves to show a little better team balance.

Redford Thurston is a likeable team because although the 'Eagles are small of size and experience, they are big in heart. Thurston, showing a seemingly dismal 1-7 record, lost its first two games by one point, then came back from 21 and 25 point deficits to make things sticky in two others before falling.

The Eagles' only win was against defending league champ Garden City East. Coach Bill Croteau says he has yet to field a lineup which has clicked, but he has nothing but praise for the effort his charges have shown so far this season.

Redford Union finally seems to be getting on the right track after a slow start, as coach Carl Andrews' Panthers have captured three wins in a row, including the Farmington Christmas Tourney crown.

RU prefers to use a fast, physical style of play and could be ready to challenge the likes of Salem, Trenton and Belleville in the rough and tumble Suburban Eight loop. Steve Schultz has been the Panthers' big shooting gun so far this season.

If Livonia Churchill can survive seven consecutive road games after the holiday break, coach Pat Montagan's Chargers should be given a ticker tape parade, the key to the city and the Western Six championship.

Churchill currently owns a 4-3 overall mark, 2-0 in league play, and nobody connected with the Chargers' camp is thinking basement this year, the place Churchill occupied last winter.

The key to the Chargers' success has been balance, as Matt Foster, Tom Bay and Dave Clare pace the team in scoring and rebounding.

Livonia Franklin's cage season appears to be suffering somewhat from the effects of a state championship in football. Several players who led the

Patriots to the gridiron title got a late start on the basketball court, and Franklin has yet to catch up.

Patriot coach Bob Visser is certain, though, that his team will come around after the holidays and win its share of games before the season is completed. Franklin's last three losses—to Bentley, North Farmington and Garden City West—were by a combined total of nine points.

Clarenceville sports a 1-4 mark on the current campaign in what coach Bob Wolf generally acknowledges is a rebuilding year. In spite of the defeats, the Trojan mentor said several starters have showed signs of experience and poise in the last couple outings which should prove valuable the rest of this year and next.

Plymouth Canton ended the 1975 portion of its schedule on a winning note, but unfortunately, that victory was preceded by four straight losses. Coach Casey Cavell hopes that his Chiefs will hit the warpath after their two week rest and come back with the scalps of a few Western Six foes.

Redford Bishop Borgess, 2-3 overall, seems to have an in and out team this year, where one night the Spartans are very good, and the next, flat.

Among Borgess' victims have been Garden City East and Detroit DeLaSalle, while the Spartans lost a heart-breaking 53-51 verdict to Dearborn Divine Child.

Other than that, Borgess has failed to impress in losses to Detroit Catholic Central and Southfield. How will the Spartans do the rest of the way? Don't bet on them matching the excellent season of the school's girl cagers.

Westland John Glenn has played nine of its 20-game schedule at this date and the Rockets hover around .500 with a 4-5 record.

Glenn is not a particularly big ball club, but then few are this year in the Northwest Suburban League. The Rockets had trouble earlier generating offense during the first and fourth quarters, but lately, they have been playing their best ball of the season at both ends of the court.

The Northwest Suburban circuit, if early-season play is indicative of the future, will show the biggest scramble for position than any other in the area.

Coach Gordon Davis' Rockets, with George Roberts in the pivot and Dan Diadiun and Todd DeLuca handling the ball, have just as good a chance as any to finish on top.

Livonia Bentley, although a third place finisher in the Sub Eight last year, unfortunately may be the conference whipping boy this season.

The biggest problem for coach Larry Jackson's team has been turnovers, and unless the trouble is soon rectified, the Bulldogs may find themselves in the doghouse at season's end.

Redford St. Agatha is another team which is winless and the Aggies could also face a long, long season in Second Division Catholic League play.

The Aggies have had to live with a 75-44 pounding administered by Orchard Lake St. Mary just before the holidays, and perhaps the thumping will inspire St. Agatha on to better things in the new year.

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Tigers lack depth

Graduation losses and lack of replacement personnel have crippled the 1975-76 Garden City West swimming team, as the Tigers have lost all four meets at the start of their 1975-76 winter pool campaign.

"I lost five or six boys who could be counted on for first, second or third place finishes and it hurts when you lose that many," said West coach George Hanosh.

"We're getting beat on depth," the coach added, noting that the Tigers finished first in eight of 11 events in their most recent meet against Dearborn Heights Annapolis and still lost 88-84.

West has also suffered setbacks to Ypsilanti, Redford Thurston and Wayne, all of which were contested away from the Tigers' home stomping grounds.

Hanosh, who has coached at West since 1964, said he has only 14 swimmers and four divers on the entire team, the smallest squad numbers-wise he has ever headed. The squad consists of a handful of seniors and

juniors and a majority of sophomores. "Over half the team is new kids without experience, so I guess you could call this a rebuilding year," Hanosh stated. Last winter, West finished third in the Tri-River League and the Tigers' coach anticipates finishing near the middle of the pack this season.

Co-captaining the Tigers this year are seniors Chris Soehnlein, whom Hanosh described as the most versatile swimmer on the team, and Bruce Becker, whose best stroke is the freestyle.

Several other West tankers were singled out by Hanosh for special praise, notably juniors Doug Burlingame, who swims the butterfly and freestyle, and freestylers Jim Bernhardt and Dave Sacker.

The Tigers have two girls among their 18-person varsity team, Pam Ross, a sophomore who swims the individual medley and butterfly, and Ann Pettit, a junior who specializes in the backstroke.

All four divers on the West roster—Adrian Giaccaglia, Benny Miller, Ken Smith and Dave Gerrard—are sophomores in their first year of competition. All are without experience but Hanosh said "they're learning every day."

Newcomers key to RU swim fortune

When an athletic team is laden with sophomores and first-year personnel, the coach and players usually concentrate on developing the fundamentals of the sport and forsake the temptation to make a helter-skelter, patchwork run at the championship.

Such is the case this year with the Redford Union swimming team, under the tutelage of Ron Mango, who holds the reigns as head coach after assisting the previous two seasons.

Last year, the Panthers had only 13 tankers representing the school, and eight graduated after the season in which RU finished near the bottom of the Suburban Eight pack.

Only five lettermen returned this year, but Mango is a little more fortunate in that he has 20 swimmers with which to work to develop a contending team.

However, with this being the first exposure to competitive swimming for three quarters of the team, Mango is realistic enough to know the best is yet to come.

"The team really has a lot of potential," the coach stated, "but not this year yet," alluding to his title chances.

As expected, the five returning lettermen are the Panthers' big strength, but the sophomores are showing great desire and improvement too, Mango stated.

John Lieth, whom Mango said is RU's most valuable swimmer, captains the Panthers and is the only senior letter-winner back from last year's crew. Lieth specializes in the distance 200 and 500-yard freestyles.

Four juniors who earned letters—John Nader, Robert Mullen, Greg Lesstad and Dan Hudson—are back this year and with Lieth, form the backbone of the team.

Nader swims the backstroke, Mullen the butterfly, Lesstad the breaststroke and individual medley, and Hudson the backstroke.

County's loss is Plymouth's gain

When Judge George E. Bowles of Plymouth retires a few days hence from the Wayne County Circuit Court bench, the court will lose one of its ablest, most esteemed jurists.

However, because of the nature of this man, neither the basic institution of the law nor the cause of justice will suffer—for here is a man who admits a lifetime commitment, a devotion if you will, to both.

After 19 years on the bench following his appointment by then Gov. G. Mennen Williams, Bowles states firmly, "I have no intention of quitting or of leaving the area. This is just a change of pace. I intend to be active in the practice of law, particularly the area of mediation and arbitration."

To that end he is planning to establish his new base of operations in downtown Plymouth, with his professional time scheduled so that he and wife Catherine can see their grown children more frequently—two of whom live in the San Francisco area and one in New Zealand. All three have distinguished themselves in their own professions.

WHEN THE Detroit Bar Association paid tribute to Bowles recently with a luncheon in his honor which was attended by nearly 400 persons, the roll call was ample evidence in itself of the respect he commands. Present to help sing his praises were more than 70 fellow jurists from

throughout Michigan, headed by State Supreme Court Chief Justice Thomas G. Kavanagh and the man who appointed Bowles in the first place, now Justice Williams.

Formal accolades were many as Bowles the jurist shared plaudits with Bowles the humanitarian, husband, father, neighbor, friend and responsible citizen.

As he retires from the bench, the Pennsylvania-born Bowles knows he has left his personal stamp upon Michigan law through a variety of hallmark decisions. What Charles R. Rutherford, Detroit Bar Association president, called Bowles' "exceptional service to the cause of justice" certainly will not be lost upon the generations of legal minds who follow him through the courts.

HUMAN UNDERSTANDING is an inherent characteristic this smiling, cordial, albeit scholarly, Plymouthite, and some of his remarks as he accepted the tributes of his peers revealed thoughts that defined that nobleness.

"Today's insight is not tomorrow's greater wisdom," reflected Bowles. "Today's applauded ruling may be tomorrow's folly. As Holmes put it, 'We have been cocksure of many things that are not so.'"

"To the trial judge, there are no convenient, libelous labels as 'those other people,' no abstract humans. You look the youthful offender in the eye, person to person, on sentence.

In a child-custody interview, it is eyeball-to-eyeball with another solitary soul, and those other faces look so very much like the face you see in the mirror.

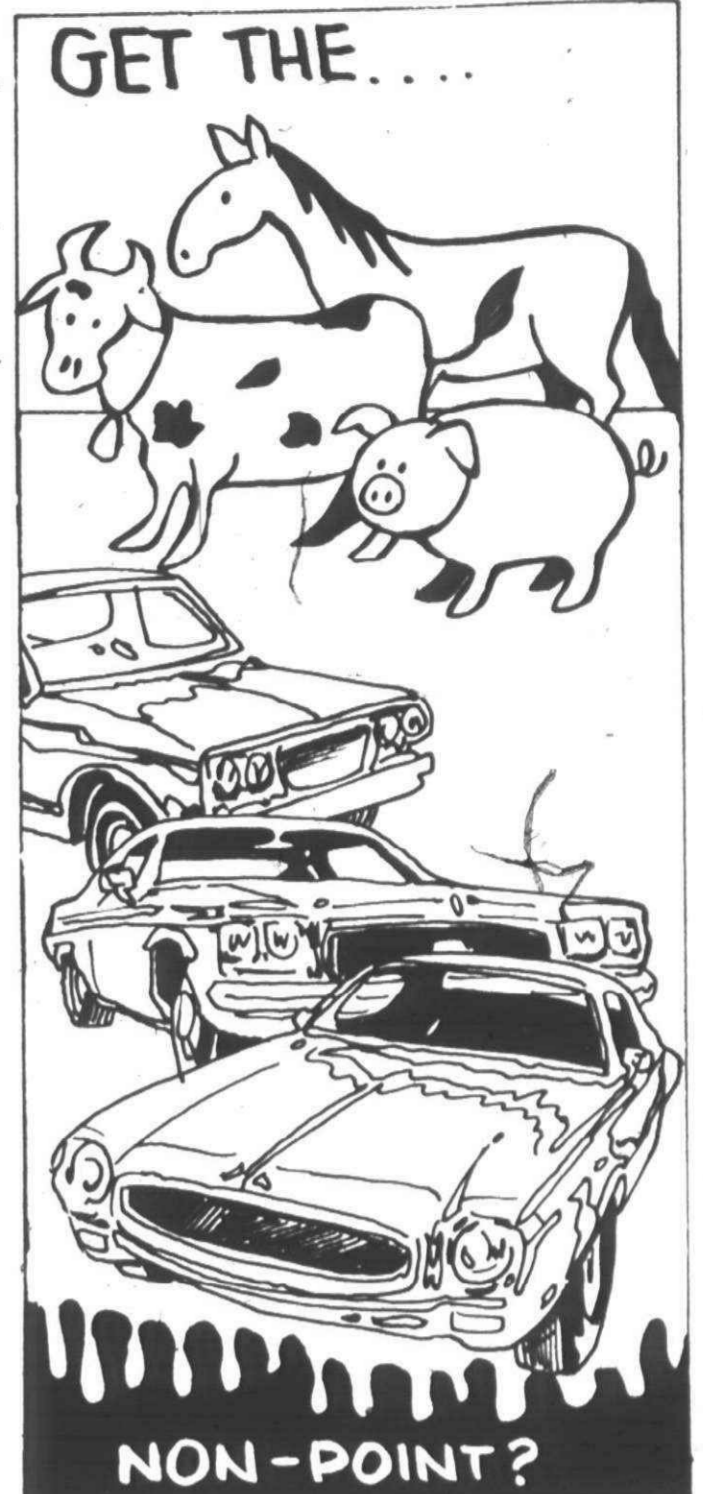
"The tradition of a public trial in open court is society's great safety valve; it goes to the very essence of freedom under law.

"A young man put it to me rather aptly, 'Is this on the level?' The judge, the institution, must be true and honest as well as efficient and it must have that appearance to the general public.

"Looking back, how much time was spent on trivial matters? But, no; they are not trivial if they are important to anybody else."

In eyeing the future, Bowles comments: "With the ever-increasing number and complexity of disputes in our private enterprise, industrialized society, I see a need for inventiveness and imagination in the development and use of speedy, inexpensive methods of dispute settlement outside the courtroom."

Few men can match the expertise and understanding of a George Bowles in seeking the objective settlement of differences. While his tenure on the bench may be coming to an end, not so his service to his fellow man.

Clean water's new dimensions

It was one of 16 presentations they had done all over the region on a hard-to-grasp subject—water quality management planning. But then an old-timer in the audience livened things up.

"I've been into this for 50 years," he said. "I've seen the quality of the Detroit River, the Rouge River and the Clinton River improved three times. What do you propose to do that hasn't already been done? Are we going to take what's been done, put it on the shelf, and let you children take over?"

The "children" were staff members of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, which has a \$5 million, two-year federal grant. SEMCOG is supposed to come up with a management plan to help the U.S. achieve clean water by 1985.

The "children" remark was annoying. Don Ivey, inter-governmental relations manager, is 38, the same age as "Federalist Papers" writer James Madison. Beverly Roth, environmental analyst, will be old enough to run for president this year. Roger Lennert, the public relations man with experience in industry, advertising and newspapering, is 32, the same age as Treasury Secretary Alexander Hamilton.

But they tried not to let any annoyance show, and they came up with some fascinating answers about water and its politics.

THE REGION is still growing; and obviously there needs to be additional planning for new areas—what kinds of water treatment facilities, which agency will build them and the like.

There's a whole new dimension to pollution that has had little attention, and the SEMCOG staff will make it a central point. Its title is "non-point pollution," and Ms. Roth explained it this way:

"Point pollution" is like a pipe carrying sewage or chemicals from a factory to a stream.

"Non-point" is different. In the 31 per cent of our region that is still farmed, there are fertilizer runoffs, pesticide runoffs, animal wastes. In the urban areas, there are salt and oil from roads, parking lots, driveways. And then there's the pollution produced by stormwater running off everything.

Her talk is a little technical, but you don't have to be an engineer to grasp the seriousness of the problems Ms. Roth is talking about.

THINK BACKWARDS a moment. There are all these "point" and "non-point" sources of pollution to worry about. But where did they come from?

Obviously, then, a water quality management plan is going to have something to say about land use. Now we're talking about big dollars, investments, ideas. We're talking about land use regulation and zoning.

Who's going to implement this plan? Not SEMCOG itself, the "children" said, because it's not in the governmental game. But there's no doubt it will take combinations of governments working cooperatively to implement plans and treat the many kinds of wastewater our society will generate.

We'll have to think, not in terms of our sacred little cities and townships, but in terms of watersheds. No river in these parts flows through fewer than two counties and a dozen municipal units.

THE OLD-TIMER was correct: Many of our rivers are actually cleaner than they were a generation ago, and even the Detroit River is a trout stream today.

No one wants to throw out the plans that have already been drawn up or discredit the efforts that have already been made.

What we all must do is improve on what we have, realize the new dimensions of our pollution problems, and think about the future. That's where we're going to spend the rest of our lives.

'76 may hold bright spots for suburbs

Although it won't be any bed of roses, the New Year will almost certainly be a better one than 1975 was for the suburbs.

Most basic, the economy of the metropolitan area—which means in practice the automobile industry—will be substantially better than it was last year. Industry leaders are predicting a 10 million car sales figure for this model year, up substantially from last year's disaster.

This means increased employment in the area, just as improved profit projections for the auto companies and their suppliers mean that year-end bonuses will contribute joy to the forthcoming Christmas season. All this means that local businesses and retailers should enjoy a good year in 1976, especially with the momentum of the very good 1975 year end.

The major gloomy spot on the economic horizon is that economists estimate that even with the assembly lines humming at a renewed clip, approximately 100,000 jobs in Michigan have been permanently lost as a result of the auto industry's drive to increase efficiency and eliminate unproductive overhead.

OVERALL, the State of Michigan will enter 1976 with a budget at least \$130 million out of whack, despite drastic cuts made late last year.

The wise men in Lansing are beginning to realize that there simply is not enough room to make cuts of this size without very substantially altering the kinds of services citizens have come to expect from the state. My guess is that after a period of agonizing reappraisal, the governor and the legislative leadership will agree that a tax increase is the only solution. Face-saving devices will be found so Democrats and Republicans can

equally duck voter disapproval, and income taxes will start going up some time during the first half of the year.

What this will not do is help out local schools, which were hit by two substantial cuts in state aid last year and which may well be clubbed for another slash this year. School officials are already highly anxious about their ability to operate for the remainder of this school year without running afoul of the law which forbids deficit operations, not to mention their enormous concern that educational quality may be irreparably eroded.

Complicating this problem for some local districts will be the effect of the new state single business tax which replaces a set of taxes which includes one on business inventories. For districts with a substantial business tax base, the loss of local revenue could be considerable; Birmingham schools, for example, will lose an estimated \$900,000 for the fiscal year 1976-77.

POLITICALLY, 1976 is an election year, so the air should be a bit hotter than usual.

Although it's unlikely that anything concrete

will be done about it during the year, the bill to create a form of regional government introduced by Rep. William A. Ryan (D-Detroit) will generate intense debate. The specific purpose of the bill would be to create a new regional governmental body which would coordinate planning and allocate federal funds coming into this area. The real objective is to begin to grip the enormous and growing problems of relations between the center city of Detroit and the suburban ring.

The other major item on the agenda will be the area's efforts to try to get it together on mass transit in time to get in line for the fast-dwindling pile of federal funds stashed in Washington. In need of resolution are arguments about who should control SEMTA's board, what design characteristics a transit system should have, and how to tax people to pay for it; I expect some progress in each of these areas, but not enough to make it certain that a transit system can be started within the next year or so.

PERHAPS THE most important development on the horizon for 1976 is a subtle but important shift in the public's attitude toward government as a whole, and politicians in particular.

Skepticism of political claims is at an all-time high; doubts about the efficiency and proper function of government services are rampant. Increasingly, I see signs that the public will no longer put up with a government that costs more than it is worth and politicians who claim more than they can deliver.

If the net effect of this shift in public opinion is only to encourage more politicians to say they don't know, when in fact they don't, it will be a good year.

A belated Christmas story ends happily

My daughter got a citizens band radio for her birthday. Since she doesn't have a car, it was installed in my car.

A CB radio, for those of you who are neither truckers nor have teenagers at home, allows you to talk to your friends and neighbors who also have CBs while you are driving around town.

They are both fun and not expensive, and have really been a "hot" item in retail sales. Because they are small and valuable, they are also being stolen out of cars at a record rate.

Cars with CBs are easy to spot because they have an antenna sticking out of their trunk.

WHEN YOU GO downtown to Detroit, you have to park where you can lock your car because everyone knows that's where the criminals are.

Even if you lock your car, you are not absolutely safe, because a wire coathanger will get you into most locked new cars.

My tale of woe did not occur in Detroit. While I was at The Community House in Birmingham a couple of weeks ago, I parked in the municipal lot. When I returned to my car, the doors were open and the radio was gone.

I SAID TO myself, "How can this happen in a community like Birmingham?"

I was tremendously disappointed because I felt that the person who took the radio probably could have bought one for himself if he had really wanted one badly enough.

I had a funny feeling in the pit of my stomach. The community was no longer the safe place it used to be. Would I have to spend the rest of my days worrying about who was going to break into

my car in broad daylight, in public view, in a public parking lot?

I knew I couldn't rationalize that someone from the inner-city had snuck out and done the dirty work. It had to be one of our own.

THERE IS A happy ending to the story.

The day before Christmas, the Birmingham police found a brown box next to one of their patrol cars.

At first they thought it might contain a bomb, but when the package was opened carefully, there was our CB radio with a note.

The note was both an apology and an explanation. It was written by a teenager who identified the car from which it was taken.

It told of the agony he had gone through because he had taken something that didn't belong to him.

HE PROVED that he was man enough that after making a mistake, his basic values made him do what was right.

It's a nice Christmas story because it means that there are still consciences telling people what is right and what is wrong. It means that the

world is not completely callous and insensitive to the rights of others.

It was particularly gratifying to me because it restored my faith in the community.

Watch those words

Words change their meanings with the times, but some words are deliberately manipulated to fool us.

Realtors have equated the word *home* with a single-family, detached dwelling financed by a mortgage. But an apartment can be a home, too. So can a condominium, a townhouse, a trailer (whoops! mobile home) or a cave.

You can buy things after Christmas at a savings, they tell you. In truth, you are saving only when you sock away some money in a bank or similar investment. You don't save when you go to the store, you only spend less (maybe).

For some reason, a price *adjustment* always seems to go in one direction: up. Why can't they be called price increases?

Our city councils and school boards still say they're holding an *executive* session when in reality they're holding a secret meeting.

There are unions that still call themselves education *associations*, although the more candid members will admit they're a union. And there should be a better name for the trade groups and lobbies than "bar association" and "medical association."

Anyone care to tell us what *family size* means? Just another one of those lovely words that is exploited for marketing purposes.

The *post-Christmas* sales began Dec. 26. Actually, the Christmas season runs from Dec. 25 to Jan. 6. Only the moneyhungry call the days after Dec. 25 "post-Christmas."

The ranks of *environmentalists* contain many knowledgeable persons who care about the world we live in. They also contain many professional "aginnners" who oppose everything. It's time to dump the word *environmentalist*.

Professional is a word which has been corrupted as badly as *family*. Charles Schultz, in "Peanuts," dealt that word a severe blow when he spoofed the "professional yo-yo consultant." It would be a delight to see a genuinely useful word like "craftsman" revived. It would be an even greater delight to see the entire concept of craftsmanship revived.

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'First footer' brings good luck

There is an old New Year's Day superstition about the "first footer" that was taken quite seriously in many parts of the world, even in parts of this country as recently as 30 years ago.

Great importance was placed on the type of person who first entered your home on that day. For instance, it was considered very bad luck if your first visitor of the new year happened to be a woman.

Blond men or men with red hair were also considered extremely unlucky, as were grave-diggers, undertakers, people who walked with their toes turned in, or people whose eyebrows met.

To avoid a catastrophe, people often chose a dark-haired man, one who met all the other requirements as well, to act as the "first-footer." It was his job to go from house to house, where he would be the first to enter, bringing good luck to those who lived there.

IT WAS ALSO considered good luck for anyone visiting a house on New Year's Day to bring food and a bit of salt. Salt has been traditionally associated with luck and protection.

To this day many people still bless their homes, if not on New Year's Day, at least early in January. Salt is used in most of these blessings in one way or another.

One traditional blessing is done in the following manner:

Salt is scattered in all corners of the house, including alcoves, closets, stairwells and so on. The person doing this chants:

"Salt of the earth, where thou art cast,
No evil spirit nor spell may pass."

THE HOUSE is then circled three times—once with water, once with glowing coals and incense (signifying both fire and air) and once with salt

to represent the earth. Thus, the house is blessed with the four elements of earth, air, fire and water.

Last of all, a fertile egg is buried near the door of the house to assure those who dwell there of fertility, productivity and prosperity in all things during the new year.

There are hundreds of legends, myths and superstitions about salt. Next week's column will deal with more of these.

THAT ISN'T WHAT The Stroller's doctor told him some years ago. At the time he was becoming short of breath, the result of an ever-expanding waistline.

Following a medical examination, the doctor looked The Stroller in the eye and said, "You've got to take off some weight, not just some, but a lot."

Telling a fellow he has to lose weight is one thing. Telling him how it can be done is quite another. So The Stroller asked, "How can I do it?"

The doctor smiled a bit and countered with, "I'll tell you, but I will have every baker in town mad at me."

Then he provided a formula that called for the elimination of all potatoes. This was followed with, "Don't eat anything, and I mean anything, made with flour."

It is just as simple as that, the doctor said.

What would he suggest? "Be sensible about it, but eliminating one slice of bread each day would do it."

IT'S A FUNNY THING, but that formula worked, too.
