## Supervisor calls for 2nd hearing

### To answer questions on master plan

A response by the township administration to questions and complaints raised at a public hearing on the master land use plan last Monday night can be expected before the end of the month.

That's the word from Supervisor Robert Greenstein, who said he felt sufficient information on the plan has not been presented to the public.

"I'd like to hold an informational hearing on the plan, because I think there are still a lot of questions that need answers," Greenstein said.

"There are a lot of things that haven't been said in public, and I think we can answer some of the serious questions people have about the plan."

Greenstein said he'd like to hold the hearing before the end of the month at a location large enough to house a crowd at

least the size that was on hand Monday night.

An estimated 400 people were at the hearing in Plymouth Salem High auditorium Monday night.

"I THINK THE key issue, and what hasn't been explained to the people, is that land west of Canton Center is not developable right now. It will be at least 10 years before it is.

"Most of the land is already zoned agricultural and if speculators offered money for it right now, they'd be offering peanuts.

"The sewer capacity just doesn't exist even if we were capable of extending sewers past Canton Center right now.

"We'll have a hard enough time meeting the obligations we already have to the Planned Unit Developments (PUDs) in the east that haven't been started yet.

"The lawyers know that, and I can't see

where they could win in court right now.

"There's been talk of a 'super-sewer,' but that's years away."

Greenstein said if Canton were taken to court over confiscation of property right now, because of the lack of sewer capacity and the prior obligation to the PUDs, the township would win.

"IT'S THIS SIMPLE," he said. "The farmers have a choice now of sitting on the property for 10 years or so and paying lower taxes or selling for almost nothing.

"Then 10 years down the road, when the land is ready for development, we have a choice to make. Either we sell bonds or raise the money some way to buy the development rights of the land—or if enough farmland is saved by then and the money is not there, we let it go for development.

"Either way, the farmers get their money out of it. In the meantime, they

aren't getting ripped off by high taxes.

"The choice has to be made then, because if the money is not there to buy development rights and we don't let them develop the land, it will be confiscation of property.

"But right now, it certainly isn't."

The supervisor added that until then, if the plan is passed, those farming plots zoned small-farm can get a tax break if they apply to the township.

"If someone with a farm less than 40 acres (the minimum size for agricultural-industrial zoning) comes in and says he's commercially farming the land, we'll be glad to give him the reduction. We'd love to have him along."

Under the proposed plan, only large farmers are guaranteed an automatic tax break under the agricultural-industrial classification.

DICK LEWISTON of Practical Homebuilders, probably the largest land developer in the township, agreed with much of what Greenstein had to say.

"It's hard to put a dollar value on the land out there currently, but there's little question that right now the land is neither developable nor marketable."

"Anyone who thinks the land is usable presently is kidding himself. Even five or six years is an overly ambitious expectation."

Lewiston said that including himself, he didn't know of any land developers presently considering purchasing land in the western half of the township.

"There may be some speculators willing to purchase the land from an investment position, but there are no real land developers out there now."

Lewiston said he didn't expect utilities to be extended to the west for at least seven or eight years, and he added, "Even then there will be many parcels that won't be marketable."

According to Lewiston, if and when utilities are extended, value of the property in the west will be consistent with the east, discounting inflation. He said land east of Canton Center had been sold for \$3,500-\$7,000 for residential development, while prices for commercial development had fluctuated greatly.

WHEN THE second public hearing is held on the plan, Greenstein said he will use a question and answer format.

"I hope as many people as possible show up, including the lawyers that were there last time. Maybe we'll be able to clear the air."

## PEA responds

### CASTLES not for all teachers

An official response has been made to this newspaper on the issue of inservice training by the Plymouth Education Association (PEA), sole bargaining agent for teachers in the Plymouth Community School District.

Candi Reece, PEA president, begins by stating: "In response to the editorial in the Observer & Eccentric on requiring a certain number of inservice hours for teachers, thus making them 'good' teachers, is like asking the question 'which comes first, the chicken or the egg?' It's unanswerable—just as is the question of what makes a 'good' teacher.

"The teaching field is constantly dealing with unknown factors, such as emotion and intellect of each student, differences in parents, community, working conditions, and the teacher themselves.

"It is illogical to assume that the same requirements and methods will work for every teacher. Each teacher must feel a method is relevant to them as a teacher. Herein lies the problem with CASTLES.

"What it offers now is relevant to a few teachers, so the rest were automatically labeled 'apathetic.' The point being we should not just focus on one method of bettering the teaching profession and label it the Gospel."

THE PEA then points to a few examples of methods used by teachers in Plymouth to improve their teaching skills.

One method is teachers working toward higher college degrees and/or earning college credits. In this district there are: 295 teachers with master's degrees; 33 with a master's plus 30 college credits. Teachers who have earned their BA and are working toward a master's have a cumulative total of 343 credit hours, and those with MAs working toward the MA plus 30 have a total of 1,190 credit hours.

Another method to measure teachers by is the number of hours spend after school in preparing new centers, lessons, groupings and so forth, says Ms. Reece. A figure once quoted indicated there are about 300 hours spent per year by some teachers in such preparation," she adds.

"Another means of improvement is the attendance at the many professional conferences and workshops that are held at night or on weekends. They host a variety of subjects. A good estimate for the number of Plymouth teachers who attend, and pay their own way, would be about 80."

THERE ALSO ARE a number of teachers who take time after school in offering a variety of activities and discussions for students without monetary payment, the PEA adds. "Just one example would be a high school activity group of teachers who:

- Spend countless evenings organizing and directing extra curricular activities with very little and sometimes no compensation. This teacher also tutors students in a variety of subjects on his planning time.

- Each year offers a self defense course for students after school.

- Meets with students for three hours after school, once a week and Saturdays at his home to discuss problems both academic and personal.

- Challenge teams of students, every Friday in the spring, to softball. The rap-

port and understanding resulting from the games is terrific."

It is the fact that each teacher is an individual and functions that way that makes teaching so special, adds Ms. Reece. "Each teacher is constantly updating himself in a method which fits his needs. Nar-

row the field down, pin that energy into an ultimate solution and the one thing which sets teaching aside from every other profession will be lost—the spontaneity.

"In conclusion, teaching is not a narrow field subject to any ultimate systems or methodology. It is a diverse discipline which allows for individual creativity and development. Therefore, teachers shouldn't be labeled apathetic simply because they didn't choose the CASTLES method. This is not to criticize CASTLES, but to indicate it is one of many methods."

It is common for individual teachers to spend from \$100 to \$200 each school year with some individuals spending considerably more, they report. "As professional people this was done without reservation. The materials were needed, and each teacher bought them. This happens districtwide, especially on the elementary level, as our programs demand more consumable goods.

"Perhaps the school board and the central administration have not been aware of the financial contribution already being made by the teachers of the Plymouth Community School District.

"As professional teachers, who are committed to the total growth of each child, we take exception to those public statements which picture the teachers as a group unwilling to demonstrate support for this district."

## Large turnout expected

### Boundary hearing tonight

A large crowd is expected at tonight's public hearing on school boundaries for the 1976-77 school year.

The hearing will begin at 7 p.m. and be conducted by the Plymouth Board of Education in the cafeteria of Plymouth Canton High. Assisting in the presentation will be the attendance and boundary committee of the Plymouth Community School District.

Descriptions of the proposed boundary changes, and maps showing those alterations, were printed in the March 4 edition of the Observer & Eccentric with the elementary school map on Page 3A and the middle school map on Page 2A.

SCHOOL SUPT. John M. Hoben praised the attendance and boundary committee for its diligent efforts over the past two years.

The committee presented its recommendations to the school board March 1. After tonight's public hearing, the board will study public input and is scheduled to make final decisions at its March 22 meeting.

At the March 1 meeting, trustee E.J. McClendon questioned the wisdom of recommending that Geer Elementary remain open and then transferring 50 students in to create the need for an additional classroom to justify its continued operation.

The committee's position is that Geer should remain open unless the district's financial condition is such that one or more schools might need to be closed, in which case Geer is one of those recommended to be closed.

Trustee Joe Gray expressed concern with recommendations that 45-15 (year-round school) be considered for another building during the 1977-78 school year. Gray said the educational soundness and cost effectiveness of 45-15 hasn't been pro-

ven yet and it is premature to consider expanding the concept until a more complete evaluation is done.

WHEN THE recommendations were presented to the school board, a "minority report" was issued by Mrs. E.A. Hamann of Canton, who had served on the committee and asked that her name be deleted from those on the group because she had some strong disagreements with the report.

She takes exception with the suggestions on 45-15, for the same reasons expressed by Gray. Ms. Hamann also suggests that the district should further explore the use of portable classroom buildings.

Ms. Hamann said insufficient time was

given for public input before the final recommendation was made, or between its first public presentation March 1 and the public hearing on March 8. This shorter time element adds a sense of urgency to the report, she added, which "can easily lead people to react emotionally rather than intellectually."

She compliments the committee for its work, stating: "I realize the group attempted to do what, in its opinion, was best for the entire district. I respect their opinion, though I disagree with it."

At the same meeting tonight, the board will present a certificate of appreciation to Gary Mirto for his past service as a school trustee.

## Hoben reveals guard survey

John M. Hoben, superintendent of Plymouth Community School District, has conducted a phone survey of school districts in Wayne County and discovered that 17 governmental units pay the full cost of providing crossing guards at school sites.

The survey was in response to a claim made by Plymouth Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren that of 14 adjacent school districts all but one pay the full cost of providing crossing guards.

Hoben stressed he didn't want to get into an argument in the media with McLaren on the issue of crossing guards, but said he found it necessary to challenge the claim that only one governmental unit nearby pays the expense of crossing guards.

The superintendent phoned every school superintendent in Wayne County and also placed calls to school districts in Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Lansing and Midland. Of the Wayne County school districts polled, the crossing guard expense was paid 100 per cent by the governmental unit in 17 areas, 100 per cent by the school districts in nine, shared 50-50 in three areas, with six school districts not having any crossing guards at all.

Cities which pay 100 per cent of the expense of crossing guards include Northville, Livonia and Dearborn. Other municipalities which pay 100 per cent of the cost for crossing guards include: Allen Park, Detroit, Grosse Pointe, Hamtramck, Highland Park, Lincoln Park, Melvindale, Grosse Pointe Woods, Harper Woods, River Rouge, Riverview, Trenton, Woodhaven and Wyandotte.

Those areas where the school district pays 100 per cent of the cost include: Cherry Hill, Dearborn Heights, Inkster, North Dearborn Heights, Redford Union, Romulus, South Redford, Wayne-Westland, and Westwood.

Those which share the expense 50-50 include: Plymouth, with participation of Canton and the City of Plymouth but not Plymouth Township; Taylor, and Van Buren.

Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti also share 50-50 with Ypsilanti using federal CETA funds on crossing guards. The cities of Lansing and Midland bear 100 per cent of the expense for crossing guards.

In correspondence to the school board, Hoben notes: "Certainly there appears to be a philosophical difference as to whose responsibility crossing guards are and who has the funds basically to support this issue. It appears from the tone of the letter (from McLaren) that we certainly are at an impasse with the Township of Plymouth."

"It would be my suggestion," Hoben advised the board, "that we try to arrange a joint meeting with the board of education and Township of Plymouth leadership to debate this issue on that level rather than continue to debate this issue in the media."

"It would be interesting to know what their opinion is relative to revenue sharing funds of which one of the seven earmarked expenditures is safety. What is their opinion about the use of CETA funds to provide crossing guards administered by the township? The City of Plymouth and Canton Township may also be interested in going this route or in other ways that they could be involved in this particular issue.

"I agree with Mr. McLaren that this issue should be brought to a hasty conclusion and a policy established that is fair and equitable to all, without losing sight of the fact that it is the safety of children

# Water board reforms to be aired

Public hearings will be held in the suburbs within the next month on proposed legislation which would control the Detroit Metropolitan Water Board's actions in raising rates and give suburbs more representation on that board.

Three bills have been introduced in the state House of Representatives with Rep. John Bennett (D-Redford) being the chief sponsor.

Other area legislators signing the bills as co-sponsors are Rep. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville), Rep. Ruth McNamee (R-Birmingham), Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland) and Rep. Sal Rocca (D-Sterling Heights), whose district includes part of Troy.

**THE PUBLIC** hearings will be held by the House Cities Government Committee, which includes Mrs. McNamee, Rep. John Markes (D-Livonia) and Sandy Brotherton (R-Farmington).

Hearings are scheduled 10 a.m. Monday, March 29, in the Detroit City Council auditorium; 10 a.m. Monday, April 5, in the Livonia Senior Citizens Center, 15218 Farmington south of Five Mile, and tentatively for Monday, April 12, in Troy.

One proposal, House Bill 5464, would limit the wholesale price of water to suburban cities, villages and townships to be not more than the actual cost incurred by the

Detroit water department in delivering water to its customers.

"In establishing the rate to be charged, the (water board of commissioners) shall make its determination in accordance with the results of a study of rates and costs which it shall obtain from a nationally recognized rate study organization," the bill proposes.

**SUBURBAN CRITICS** of the water board have complained in the past that rate hikes were based on inaccurate budget projections and erroneous information.

House Bill 5465 would revise the makeup of the water board, now limited to seven members, appointed by the mayor of Detroit, with at least four Detroit residents. Besides the four Detroiters, the board is composed of one member each from western Wayne County, Oakland County and Macomb County.

The legislation proposes the board should have nine members with four appointed by the mayor of Detroit.

**THE OTHER** five would be picked by an assembly of local governments served by the water department. Each governmental unit should have at least one vote. The voting power would be based on one vote per 10,000 population.

The ninth member would be named by the other eight board members.

House Bill 5463 requires that the water department's operations be audited annually by an independent auditor picked by the state auditor general.

At present, the department is reviewed annually by the Detroit finance department and once every five years by an outside auditor.

The bill also proposes that the water board hold public hearings on rate hikes at least 120 days before increases are to be implemented and that the board not vote on an increase until after hearings are held.

**THE DETROIT** water board recently ran into suburban criticism for approving a 39 per cent rate boost and then holding a public hearing after its action. The increase isn't final until approved by Detroit City Council, which hasn't acted on the hike yet.

The bill also allows suburban customers to go to circuit court to prevent the rate boost from going into effect.

If at least one-third of the communities served by the water department petition the circuit court to protest a rate increase, the court would have the power to issue an injunction blocking the increase.

**AN AD HOC** committee made up of suburban officials to fight the latest rate hike met recently and agreed to have attorney

William Saxton represent them in a legal battle to stop the increase.

Saxton has yet to accept or deny the offer, as of Friday afternoon.

Saxton's firm represented nearly 50 suburban school districts in the controversial cross-district busing issue in Federal Court.

Dozens of communities already have pledged five cents per person to provide the costs for an attorney to represent the suburbs.

On the committee are Mayor Edward McNamara of Livonia, chairman; City Administrator Peter Cristiano of Southfield; Supervisor Robert Greenstein of Canton Township; and Richard Graham, Troy's public works director.

## League to study use of Rouge

The members of the League of Women Voters of Plymouth-Canton-Northville will be meeting this month to reach a consensus position on proper use of the Rouge River.

Two meetings to be held March 24 are: 9 a.m. in the home of Lesa Buckland of 449 Hill, Northville, and at 7:45 p.m. in the home of Lynne Goldsmith, 43951 Bannockburn, Canton Township.

Among the questions to be included in the discussion are how big is the Rouge River Basin, are you affected by the Rouge, what role do rivers play in our lives, what is the water cycle, why is water important, what are flood plains and what are their purpose, how can we use flood plains, what causes water pollution and what are the consequences?

**AMONG THE STUDIES** League members will use to arrive at their consensus is a 1974 position paper on channelization of the Rouge River prepared by the Detroit Metropolitan Area League.

That paper urged termination of plans for channelization of any portion of the Rouge. The LWV felt channelization was detrimental because:

- It causes soil erosion as a result of cutting back river banks and accompanying removal of plant growth.

- Sedimentation resulting from soil erosion destroys plant and animal water life;

- It causes more flooding in adjacent river and floodplain areas due to quicker runoff;

- It induces pollution because the natural pollutant removal through plant root systems and soil filtration has been eliminated;

- The straightening process destroys nesting and spawning areas of aquatic and small animal life;

- Ground water is depleted due to quick runoff induced by channelization;

- It doesn't in any way upgrade water quality of the river;

- It is a very expensive process for the dubious benefits derived;

- Encourages man-made development along filled-in floodplain, in turn encouraging erosion, sedimentation and more rapid runoff;

- Has the psychological effect of encouraging people to think of a river as a drain or sewer rather than as a natural resource.

**ALTERNATIVES** to channelization (cementing the bottom of the river in a V-shaped channel) suggested by the LWV include:

- Use of previous materials in new devel-


opments wherever possible, such as parking lots and walkways to diminish the amount of runoff into the drainage system;

- The planting of shrubbery and trees around buildings, walkways, and parking lots to help retain rainfall in the area;


- The placement of smaller, more localized sewage treatment plants to eliminate massive runoff into larger bodies of water;

The preservation and proper maintenance of floodplains by demanding strict floodplain ordinances and encouraging local enforcement of such measures.









At the time of its channelization position, the league urged long-range planning by state, county, and local authorities for the entire Rouge Basin in both flood control and pollution abatement.

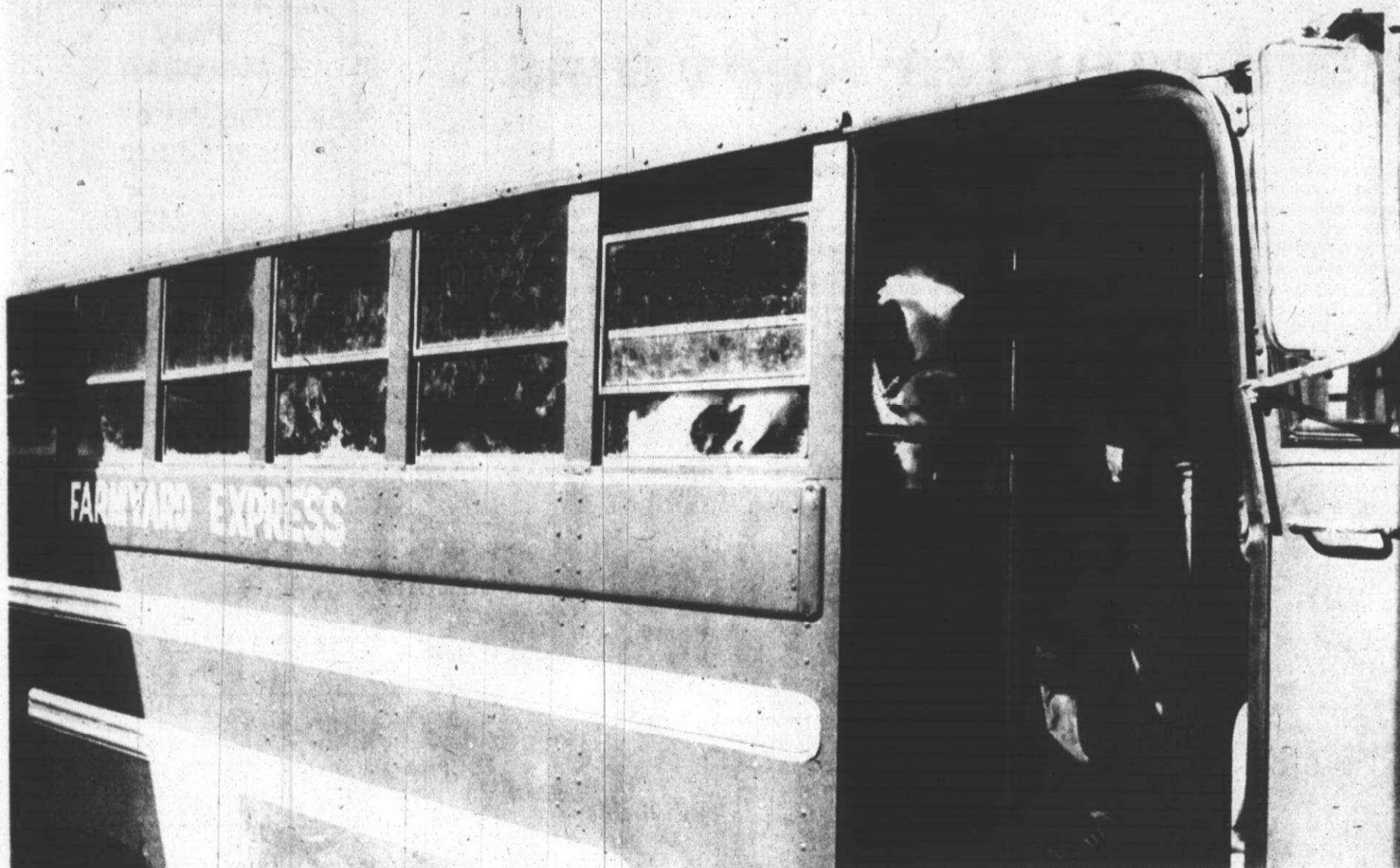

### Farmyard express

The Farmyard Express from the Plymouth School Farm made a visit last week to Smith Elementary School so youngsters could get a first-hand look at farm animals. # Angered teachers respond to apathy charges

Plymouth teachers have responded quickly to the suggestion that their apathy towards CASTLES inservice training may be because the profession is now in a demoralized condition.

That diagnosis was offered at the Feb. 24 meeting of the Plymouth Board of Education by Gordon Hill, who, along with Mac MacDonald, direct the CASTLES center on South Mill in Plymouth.

Hill had told the board that CASTLES was in danger of collapsing, not for lack of financial support but because of apathy among the faculty which has poor attendance at inservice sessions.

MANY TEACHERS calling the Observer & Eccentric pointed out they have never been consulted on what type of programs CASTLES should offer.

Some teachers claimed the program was approved by administration and school board without first seeking out the reaction from the faculty. After it was instituted, some teachers report, nobody came to the faculty asking for ideas on what programs could be offered.

Frederick J. Libbing, a counselor at Plymouth Canton High, comments: "I was not asked if I wanted the CASTLES program or if I would commit any time to it or if I thought it would fit into my plan of professional growth in the teaching profession."

"But the really incredible thing is that any jerk in town can feel that he not only

has the right to pass judgment on how an entire group of people should conduct their private lives, but evidently feels that these same people are incapable of making individual evaluations of how and when, and to what degree, they should add to their skills and knowledge.

"Is it heresy on my part to assume that it would be logical and humane for the school board and the teachers' union to get individual commitments from people to participate in various programs before they are assigned en masse to something that may not fit their needs, interests, or time allotments?"

"Because this wasn't done in the CASTLES program, I object to being blown away in the local rag for something I had no control over, no obligation to, and no interest in."

In response to an editorial in the same edition, Libbing suggested the writer should have checked "with various teachers to find out how they view professional growth and what they are currently doing to satisfy mandated legal requirements for updating and augmenting skills—not to mention many unrequired but on-going inservice programs, workshops, courses and so forth."

THE VIEWS of a group of middle school teachers was released in a statement to Hill and MacDonald from Brooke Disbrow, a teacher at Pioneer Middle School.

"We are appalled at your recent allegations concerning the apathy of Plymouth teachers. You have chosen to malign us in

the press and in your newsletters funded by taxpayers. It is evident that you are not aware of the dedication that abounds among American teachers. Because we don't rally around your program, does that prove that we are all lazy?"

"Out of ignorance, you have made malicious statements about us. Most of us are involved in graduate study and enrichment programs at the many universities in our area. Perhaps that is why we do not all flock to CASTLES at 3 p.m.—we are on our way to other professional activities."

The teachers asked the CASTLES directors to visit school buildings in the district where they would see "a multitude of exciting learning experiences in action. Stop by the work rooms and listen to the exchange of new ideas. Watch us with our students. Stop by after school and see us analyzing the day's activities and creating the next day's plans."

"Listen to the total involvement in the progress of our students as we agonize with team members, other staff, and special services personnel over the best way to reach every student. There are very few teachers whose day ends at 3 p.m."

"It is obvious that you didn't do these things before your vindictive attack, and yet you feel qualified to insult every one of us. Are you hurt that we do not all visit your program? We are sorry you feel that way. We try to teach our students to cope with their emotions when they are hurt—to resolve those problems in a positive manner instead of seeking retribution. The quality of your publicity suggests that you

prefer venom to constructive criticism. "Educational funds are all too scarce here and the taxes are depressingly high. Our area is well-stocked with colleges and other educational activities. (We do attend them). CASTLES would surely be more beneficial to an area such as upper Michigan where there aren't so many opportunities for teachers to further their skills. Do you think our 'morale' is low because we don't meet at CASTLES? Our morale is very high—enough to keep us and to our enthusiasm apparent to our students and to their parents."

"We hope that the parents of Plymouth aren't insulted by your rhetoric against American teachers. We also hope that they will remember that you don't teach here; we wouldn't want them to think for an instant that such unprofessional malice came from someone who is teaching their children."

"Your center is, at the moment, funded by the parents of Plymouth. You have only served to hurt our district by spreading unfounded and offensive statements. How is that good for the children?"

SUPT. HOBEN, remarked in a memo to the school board:

"I do feel that the article that appeared in the front page of the Observer & Eccentric newspaper, particularly in its headline, was an unfair analysis and condemnation of teachers that was unwarranted and unjustified."

"In my travels, particularly at the secondary level and supported by Dr. Earl Hogan in dealing with elementary evaluations, I find the teacher morale to be extremely high in the face of a very difficult year which is involved with a number of curtailments and uncertainties relative to their jobs."

That was the first official response by the administration to remarks of Hill. Neither Hoben nor Hogan made any public comments at the Feb. 24 board meeting.

Another teacher called this newspaper to object to the wording of the headline and added that he had called Hill who confirmed the accuracy of the story's content. The front page story was a news report of what Hill had said at the board meeting Feb. 24.

Mrs. E.A. Hamann, a Canton parent who attended the Feb. 24 meeting, comments: "As I listened to Gordon Hill's recent remarks concerning why CASTLES was failing, I could not help but feel our teachers were being scapegoated."

"Hill contended this negativism from the teaching force in Plymouth has worsened and we have fallen behind in our efforts to have teachers work effectively with CASTLES."

"While I don't question Hill's dedication, I must take issue with his brand of 'honesty' which placed blame for the problem solely on the teaching staff of Plymouth. As a parent I have had contact with various teachers around this district. Although they have varied, as do all individuals, I was impressed by a common denominator—the high quality of teachers found in Plymouth."

"After witnessing Hill's blanket condemnation of our teachers, as the majority of our board of education sat like mutes, does any one have to ask the real cause of low teacher morale in Plymouth?"

## Crossing guard survey released

(Continued from page 1A) which is a joint and major responsibility to all of us."

Hoben argues that state law provides that municipal governments have responsibility for pedestrian safety and that the school code states school districts will assist municipalities in safety—not bear the expense exclusively.

McLaren offers another interpretation of state law, however. "Our understanding of state law places the school district in 'in loco parentis.' This specifically gives the schools a parental role that includes responsibility for the child from the time he leaves home to the time of return."

"It is further expected that every reasonable and prudent action of the typical parent would be followed to insure the child's safety. This responsibility is not delegated to any other unit of government."

BY DIRECTION of the school board, Hoben had mailed a letter Jan. 27 to Plymouth Township stating unless the township agreed to pay 50 per cent of the

cost of crossing guards, there would be no crossing guards supplied—in Plymouth Township.

The school district makes the determination as to where schools are to be built, argues McLaren, where pupils shall attend, and anything else relating to the housing or transporting of students.

"We have no voice as to where the crossing guards are to be located or needed; nor the number required; no voice in the establishment of a wage scale for crossing guards."

"We would remind you that the Plymouth Township Fire Department is also funded with public money yet it does not occur to us to ask the school district for an additional subsidy. Historically, once subsidies are established there is little likelihood that they will ever be rescinded."

"From crossing guards we might well be expected next to contribute to any threatened curtailment of school programs such as band, recreation and school lunches."

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP operates on a one mill levy, McLaren pointed out, while the school district levies 35.6 mills. "For every dollar that a township resident pays in the way of township taxes, he pays \$35.60 to the school district."

McLaren said the township did a survey of 14 adjacent school districts. With but one exception, he reported, the school districts pay the cost of crossing guards. The survey also indicated, said McLaren, that crossing guards expense isn't a bone of contention in the districts polled. "Plymouth Township isn't the lone villain in the scenario."

McLaren suggested that the school district "look at your own housekeeping. Consider the possibility that you may be top heavy with high salaried and perhaps unnecessary administrative personnel."

"Consider the possibility of a millage proposal earmarked for no other purpose than the funding of crossing guards and the construction of overpasses if and when needed."

# Trustee says, contract for services

If Trustee Jim Poole has his way, Canton may never be faced with long drawn-out contract negotiations between the township and its employees.

Poole favors contracting for municipal services, rather than enlarging the township work force.

"I think right now is the time to begin looking into contracting for fire, police, and DPW service," Poole said.

"A lot of other communities nationwide are taking a long look at it, and in the long run, it could prove to be much more economical to the taxpayers."

Poole said the township might be able to save money because the taxpayers would not have to pay fringe benefits for contract labor.

"We wouldn't go to the county or another municipality," explained Poole, "but rather a private independent contractor just as we do for garbage collection."

"We probably have the cheapest garbage pickup in the Midwest. I think our residents are only paying \$2 a month."

"Of course in the area of fire and police, you have a significant issue about quality. The township would have to set standards, and the contractor would have to see they were enforced."

POOLE SAID the present fire-fighting force should be retained. But he added it would be worthwhile to investigate the possibility of augmenting "the present nucleus" with volunteers.

"I know in Troy that sort of system has met with great success. Everyone I've talked to says it has worked wonderfully."

Poole said the biggest benefits of contracting for services will be realized when township needs diminish as the building boom slows down.

"If you hire your own full-time employees, you're stuck with them from day one, and when the need for services decreases, you can't get rid of them."

"If you contract, you have better control over your variable costs. I think it's the wave of the future, especially when you look at what the fringes are for municipal employees."

While Poole has suggested the township board research the matter, the suggestion

has been met with little enthusiasm.

SUPERVISOR ROBERT Greenstein commented, "We discussed it at a study session, but it hasn't gone much further than that."

"At one point, the thought was to contract for services from the Wayne County Sheriff—that's what the county wants—but the cost is staggering."

"Romulus pays \$900,000, and all they get is three cars on the road."

"As far as fringes, I don't really think it makes any difference, because we end up paying for it anyway. We just pay the contractor, and he pays the benefits to his employees."

"The big thing in favor of not con-

tracting is that then we have more control.

"I think the answer may be for several municipalities to get together to form a mutual police department, because right now none of us are big enough to form our own."

"It would cost at least \$400,000 to start a department presently."

Greenstein said, however, that the township would continue to contract for garbage disposal and with the Westland Humane Society for control of stray animals.

## Smith School turns 25

Smith Elementary School's 25th anniversary celebration had all the elements of a family birthday party. Those in attendance ranged in age from babes in arms to senior members of the school family. There were presents, birthday cakes, and the shared enjoyment of reminiscing.

Principal William Lutz welcomed Clella Smith, widow of George A. Smith, after whom the school was named. Smith served as superintendent of Plymouth schools from 1918 to 1945. He was a member of the Wayne County Board of Education for 15 years and was appointed four times to the Michigan Institutional Commission. He was the first president of the Plymouth Rotary Club and a district governor of Rotary.

Clara Isbister, widow of School Supt. Russell Isbister, Esther Hulsing, former school board president, and Murlene Bruton, chairman of the committee which planned the anniversary party, were among the honored guests.

GERALD ELSTON and Earl Gibson, former Smith teachers who now are principals in the school district, recalled their days at the school. Ruth Eriksson, principal of the school for 20 years, was too ill to attend.

When the school opened, Miss Eriksson worked from a desk in the hallway until her office was completed. The first graders went to classes in the Baptist Church on Spring Street until their classrooms were ready in December. Their teachers were Bertha Anderson and Frances Holmes.

According to the records, the first students to walk across the wooden planks into the new school were John McLaren, Larry Smith, Jay Selle, Nancy Alford and Joe Clark.

Officers in the first Parent Teacher organization were Warren Smith, president; George Bowles, first vice-president; Willa Shirey, second vice-president; Opal Belobraydic, third vice-president; Marian Matthews, treasurer, and Juanita Sutherland, secretary. Dues were 50 cents and there were 170 charter members.

THE PTA was renamed Parent Organization in 1969. In the early 70s it was again renamed—Parent-Faculty Organization.

Miss Eriksson retired in June 1971 and Lutz was appointed principal in August of that year. Since that time 16 new pieces of playground equipment were purchased, a bridge was built across Tonquish Creek on the playground, \$1,000 worth of audio-visual material was purchased for the media center. Canton Township families were welcomed to the school, and Super Sammy Smith became the school mascot.

JAMES WATSON rededicated the school and birthday presents were displayed. The

PFO's silver anniversary gift to Smith will be a mural designed and crafted by Cathy DeLauro. Second graders in Alice Chrenko's and Isobelle Lutz's classes designed and made a wall hanging and framed Liberty Bell composite.

Lt. Dallas Raby of the Salvation Army gave the benediction. It was all part of tradition. One of his predecessors, Capt. William Roberts, had given the prayer at the 1950 ground-breaking.

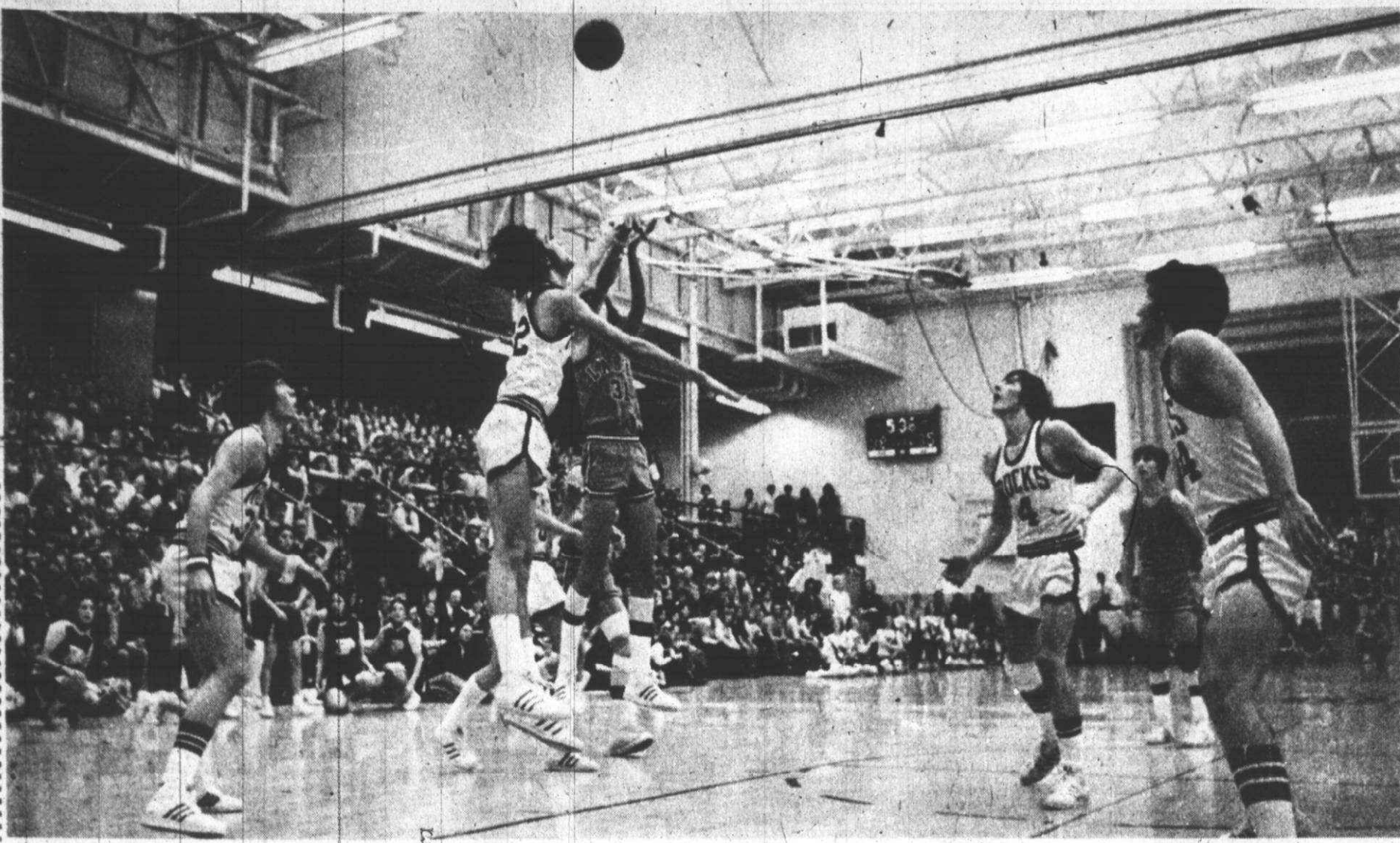

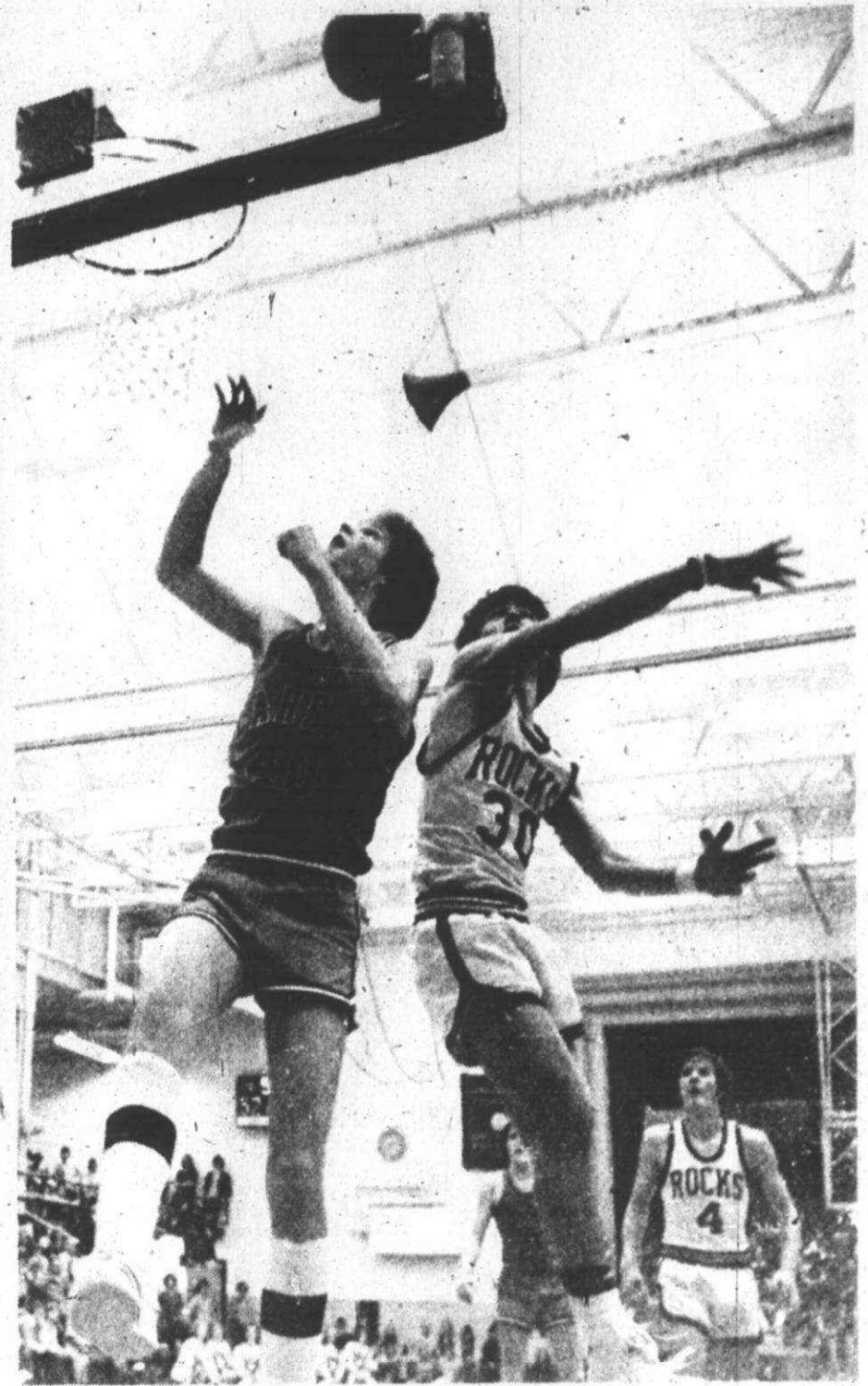

# Rocks bow out of districts

In a battle of state-ranked basketball powers, the Plymouth Salem Rocks ended their season prematurely by bowing to a crack Bloomfield Hills Lahser squad, 76-55, before an overflow crowd of 1,800 at Southfield High School Thursday evening in the district semi-finals.

Lahser's blend of consistent scoring and pressure defense was the prime factor supporting the Knights 20th victory in 21 outings and 15th in a row.

Bloomfield connected on 51 per cent of its field goal attempts, while Plymouth could hook up on only 41 per cent from the floor, 10 per cent below the team's seasonal average.

"We played a very fine ballclub. I feel their size was a definite factor—we just felt that we should've played them a little closer."

"I don't feel they are 20 points better than we are," said Salem Coach Fred Thomann.

Lahser cruised to a 19-9 first quarter lead, getting some fine shooting underneath the bucket and from the perimeter to control the momentum of the opening session.

The Rocks were bothered by a tenacious defensive effort on the part of Lahser, and were unable to get the shots they wanted.

IN THE EARLY moments of the second quarter, Lahser began committing turnovers which the Rocks converted into points that helped spur a second-quarter rally.

Trailing 25-13, Salem freshman guard Rich Hewlett entered the game and assumed the role of sparkplug, leading Plymouth's resurgence by hitting a pair of 20-footers and canning five free throws.

A driving layup by Bob Evans tied the

contest at 25-all, and the match was knotted at 29 when Hewlett sank two free throws.

The Knights moved to a three-point intermission margin of 34-31 when Dave Bennett came up with a three-point play.

The most outstanding physical feature of Lahser was its height. The trio of Mark Principe (6-6), Dave Bennett (6-6) and Mark Cheklich (6-8) combined for 50 points and controlled the glass defensively to deny the Rocks, a second chance on many of their shots.

Jim Ellinghausen, Salem's 6-8 all-state candidate, was hounded by Bennett throughout the game and hit on eight of 24 attempts from the floor, yet he was able to take game scoring honors with 23 points.

Ellinghausen drew his fourth foul early in the third quarter, and the Knights went back to controlling the play as they had done in the first period.

STEVE KNUDSON came off the bench for Lahser to score 11 points in the second half as Bloomfield displayed its speed by outscoring Salem, 19-10 in the third quarter and 23-14 in the final frame, to put them in the district finale against Southfield (9-12).

If Lahser wins Saturday, it will be rematched in the regional semi-finals

against Southfield Lathrup, the only team to defeat the Knights during the season.

Salem winds up its fourth season under the direction of Fred Thomann with 20 victories and two losses.

"Anytime you win 20 ballgames in a season, you've been successful," said Thomann.

"We did accomplish our primary goal—that was to win the Suburban Eight championship for the third year in a row," he added.

Thomann has coached at Plymouth Salem four years, and the record speaks for his success. He has compiled the winningest mark of any high school coach in the state since 1972 with 78 wins against 14 losses.

Jim Ellinghausen finished his three-year varsity career as Plymouth Salem's all-time scoring leader in career scoring and rebounds, with single season records for scoring and rebounding, plus single game records for scoring and rebounding.

As for next season's edition of the Plymouth Salem cagers, the Rock mentor commented, "We'll have four juniors, two sophomores and a freshmen coming back from this year's squad, plus a handful of JV players that will play for us next year. We're going to have a different kind of team next year."

## Salem swimmers 4th

For the fifth consecutive year, the Dearborn Pioneers have run away with the Suburban Eight League swimming meet, capturing its 11th league championship in a row since 1965.

The Pioneers, who qualified eight swimmers for the state meet, won both relay races and, between three swimmers, grabbed six individual first places.

Marty Szuba conquered the pack in the 200-yard freestyle and 100-yard butterfly, while Sean Dunworth notched his wins by

stroking to triumphs in the 200-yard individual medley and 100-yard backstroke. Bob Lazar won the 500-yard freestyle and 100-yard breaststroke to round out the bulk of Dearborn's team total of 310 points.

The standings went: Dearborn (310), 2nd-Belleville (235), 3rd-Edsel Ford (200), 4th-Plymouth Salem (176), 5th-Allen Park (83), 6th-Trenton (92), 7th-Livonia Bentley (39), and Redford Union 8th-with 24.

Although the Plymouth Salem Rocks did not win any individual events, they placed in the runnerup spot in four categories.

Junior Ron Finley missed the gold medal in the 100-yard backstroke by 0.34 seconds, placing second in the event. Finley was also a second place finisher in the 200-yard freestyle with a time of 1:51.03, five seconds off the pace.

The diving competition saw senior Mike Stocker come up with a solid 389.65 score to place second behind a Trenton opponent. Before Stocker had placed in the competition, the Salem 200-yard medley relay quartet finished second in a clocking of 1:44.92.

The 400-yard freestyle relay team of Craig Richter, Tom Robadue, Tom Smith, and Tom Griffin turned in a 3:27.12 performance for a fourth place finish.

Griffin, a sophomore, placed fifth as an individualist in the 100-yard freestyle with a time of 52.4.

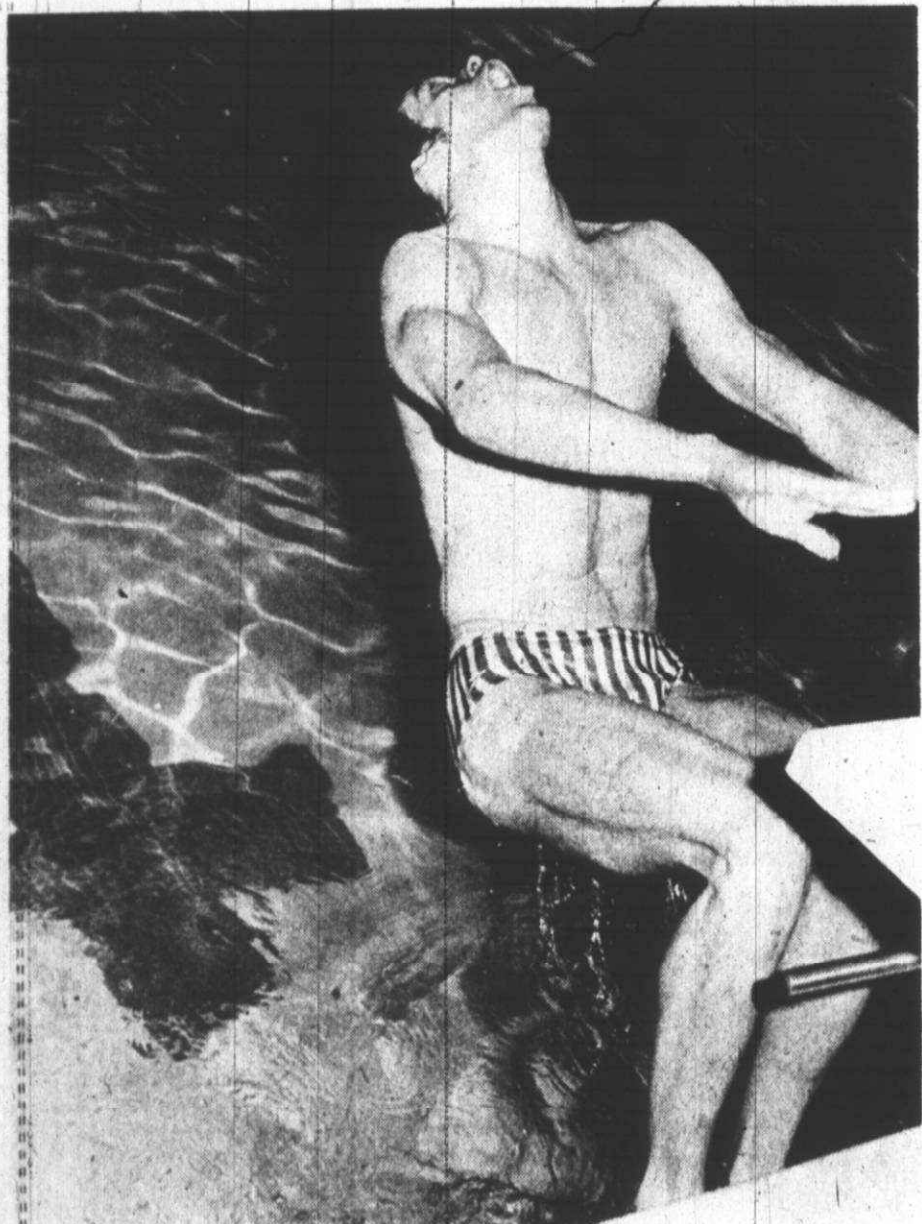
Other Salem achievements last Friday evening at the league meet held in the Rock's pool were turned in by Craig Richter and Brian Burton, who placed fourth and fifth, respectively, in the 50-yard freestyle.

Salem was not far behind Belleville after the conclusion of the diving competition, as the Rocks had totaled 93 points to the Tigers' 107, while Edsel Ford sat in fourth place with just 79 points to its credit at that time.

The T-Birds had it when it counted most toward the end, as they rolled up points in every one of the last six individual events to put a solid hold on third place.

Redford Union finished in the cellar in this year's standings and could do no better than a seventh place finish in the 200-yard medley relay with a time of 1:54.55.

Livonia Bentley, on the other hand, was just a short distance ahead of the Panthers, putting its best foot forward in the 400-yard freestyle relay with a 3:38.91 clocking.

# The Stroller

## Match mountains

Some years ago The Stroller had the privilege of listening to Arch Booth, executive secretary of the United States Chamber of Commerce, deliver a speech at the national Chamber meeting in Washington which he titled "Men to Match the Mountains."

It was a stirring speech in which he claimed that the country was in dire need of men to match the mountainous problems facing the nation—men with ambition, imagination and enthusiasm to carry on with the task.

Browsing through some old files the other evening, The Stroller came across a copy of the speech and took time to read it again to devour the thoughts the Chamber executive passed along more than two decades ago.

As The Stroller read he couldn't help feeling that the words of Arch Booth were just as true today as they were back in the 50s when he passed them on.

Through the years since he came here as a small-town boy eager to make good in the big city, The Stroller has had the pleasure of watching some of the men who stepped forth to match the mountains. "One of his favorites was little "Al" Cobo, who was taken on loan from the Burroughs Corporation to help Detroit solve its financial problems.

THIS WAS DURING the depression when men were being paid in scrip and a bit of cash. The scrip was a promissory

note and through Al's guidance every penny was made good.

This earned him election as mayor of the City of Detroit and it didn't take long for him to start leaving his mark.

At the time there was thought of building an expressway into Detroit, but it never got beyond the planning stage until Little Al saw them.

"If this plan is so good," he said, "let's build it."

He marched out front in the crusade while the Lodge Freeway was being built and when it was finished it was hailed as "Cobo's Ditch." But it was the daddy of the present system that now spreads through the suburbs.

He also spearheaded a drive for a convention hall in the downtown area—a hall that now bears his name.

But it never would have been built if it had not been for another man who had the daring to "match the mountain."

This fellow was Willis Hall, then an officer of the Detroit Board of Commerce. The Stroller had the honor of serving on the "Committee on Design" with him and he vividly recalls the morning that Hall's stirring words made the present hall possible.

At this particular meeting, the delegation from the city's leaders who had travelled through Europe displayed plans of the large buildings they had visited.

ONE MEMBER OF THE committee spoke up "now that we have all these plans let's hire an architect to look at them and then take the best part of each. We'll have a hall that is the average of all the best in the world."

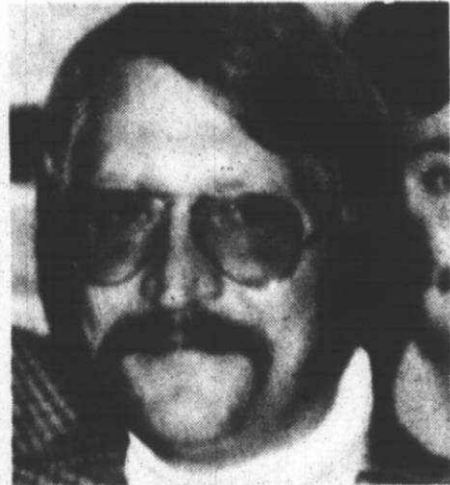
At this point Hall rose to his feet and, addressing the chair, said "I don't think the mayor appointed this group to build an "average" hall. If it's for Detroit it has got to be the best. If it is the plan to build an "average" hall then please accept my resignation."

He was matching the mountain. When he finished, the committee decided to build the best ever. Mayor Cobo never lived to see the Hall function. But the hall bears his name today, all because Willis Hall was a man who matched the mountain. His dynamic leadership helped change the entire face of downtown Detroit.

This type of leadership is badly needed today.

Had there been men to match the mountains some years ago our suburbs may look quite different today. Had their "men to show some of this mountain climbing years ago the City of Plymouth would have a loop road in the downtown section instead of having the plan placed in moth balls again for two years. And Garden City would have a real down town area had there been men to steadfastly stick to an urban renewal plan. It would have been a great face lifting.

SOME YEARS AGO when the pioneers of America surged westward a man by the name of Samuel Foss penned these stirring lines:

**CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON  
BOARD PROCEEDINGS**

A regular meeting of the Township Board of the Charter Township of Canton was held at 128 Canton Center Road at 8:00 P.M., on February 24, 1976. The meeting was called to order by Supervisor Greenstein. Members present: Greenstein, Flodin, Cheske, Poole, Schwall, absent: Parsell, Myers.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that the following ordinance be adopted:

**ORDINANCE NO. 68**

**AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE TRAFFIC CONTROL AND PARKING REGULATIONS FOR PRIVATELY OWNED PROPERTY AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.**

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON ORDAINS:

**SECTION 1: DEFINITIONS.** The following words and phrases when used in this Ordinance shall, for the purpose of this Ordinance, have the meanings respectively subscribed to them in this section.

"Parking area" means an area near or contiguous to a shopping center, multi-family dwelling, or business and used by the public, tenants, or employees as the means of access to and egress from the stores, apartments, or business establishments and for free parking of motor vehicles of patrons, invitees, tenants, employees and/or licensees of the shopping center, apartment or business.

**SECTION 2: APPLICATION.** Upon the request of either the owner or the person in charge of the general operation and control of the parking area, the Township Board may provide traffic regulation for said parking area, in accordance with scope of regulations enumerated in Section 3.

**SECTION 3: SCOPE OF REGULATES.** The Township Board may pursuant to the power granted in this Ordinance may be local ordinance:

- A. Order stop signs, yield signs or other traffic control devices erected at specified entrance or exit locations or at any intersection in the parking area.
- B. Regulate traffic in the parking area, including regulation by means of traffic control signals.
- C. Prohibit or regulate the turning of vehicles or specified types of vehicles at intersections or other designated locations in the parking area.
- D. Regulate the crossing of any roadway in the parking area by pedestrians.
- E. Designate any separate roadway, drive or lane in the parking area for one-way traffic.
- F. Prohibit, regulate, restrict or limit the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles in specified areas of the parking area.
- G. Designate safety zones, loading zones and other restricted areas.
- H. Provide for the removal and storage of vehicles parked or abandoned in the parking area during snowstorms, floods, fires or other public emergencies, or found unattended in the parking area, where they constitute an obstruction to traffic or where stopping, standing or parking is prohibited, and for the payment or reasonable charges for such removal and storage by the owner or operator of any such vehicle.
- I. Adopt such additional reasonable rules with respect to traffic and parking in a parking area as local conditions may require for the safety and convenience of the public.

**SECTION 4: ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTY.** Regulations enacted pursuant to the provision of this ordinance shall be enforced and violators penalized in accordance with the parallel provisions of the Uniform Traffic Code Ordinance by the Charter Township of Canton.

A motion was made by Flodin and supported by Poole and carried that March 7, 1976 be recognized and proclaimed as the 142nd Birthday of the Township, and that all citizens of the Township be urged to honor March 7, 1976 with a Bicentennial salute.

A motion was made by Schwall and supported by Schwall and carried that bills in the amount of \$40,940.31 be paid.

## Bothersome Buckeye bridge

Michigan motorists headed for the sunny South via I-75 should add an hour's driving time if planning to cross the Ohio River at Cincinnati between 2:30 and 7 p.m. on Fridays or the first day of holiday periods.

The delay between Cincinnati, Ohio, and Covington, Ky., is caused by the Brent Spence Double Deck Bridge which is inadequate to handle peak traffic.

Southbound I-75 motorists are advised by Michigan Auto Club to use a trail-blazed alternate route through Cincinnati to avoid being stranded in a slow-moving traffic jam often extending north for three miles.

An electric sign two miles north of the first of three alternate route exits is located at the Hopple Street interchange and is activated when traffic conditions warrant.

The backup occurs when afternoon factory traffic and early evening entertainment and sporting events goers converge with southbound tourist traffic at the bridge.

The tie-up can be avoided by following an alternate route indicated two miles in advance by an electric freeway sign. The alternate route is trail-blazed through Cincinnati and marked on the accompanying map by arrows from three starting points
