Townships lose patrol appeal

Plymouth and Canton township supervisors J.D. McLaren and Robert Greenstein want their day in court—and if they get it, there will be an appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court to secure continued Wayne County funding of the sheriff's road patrol.

They were startled by—and want reversal of—a state court of appeals ruling late last week that allows Wayne County to discontinue full road patrol service to seven out-county townships.

By a 3-0 vote late last week, the appeals court upheld the one-year-old ruling of Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Thomas Foley, which had denied the township's request for a writ of mandamus that would have forced the county board of

commissioners to continue full funding of the road patrol.

Plymouth and Canton townships were joined together with Brownstown, Huron, Northville, Sumpter, and Van Buren townships in the legal action to force Sheriff William Lucas to continue out-county road patrol protection.

Wayne County, strapped for funds, has been seeking in the last five years to reduce or eliminate the road patrol, which provides 28 deputies in the unincorporated western 200 square miles of the county.

The townships argued that the county should pay the full annual cost of the road patrol, about \$400,000, because they are unable to afford their own police departments.

The ruling, signed by Judges Louis McGregor, George Bashara and Glenn S.

Allen, paves the way for the county to reduce funding of the road patrol.

The county had argued in the past that it should share the cost of patrol with the affected townships.

THE RULING, an almost verbatim copy of Foley's decision, said, "Our review of the authorities leads us to hold that neither the common law nor Michigan statutory authority impose a duty on the sheriff to supply a full-time road patrol on all county roads and highways. A stricter duty is imposed upon the sheriff to maintain law and order in those areas of the county not ade-

quately policed by local authorities. "This does not mean that the sheriff must regularly patrol those areas. All that is minimally required is that the sheriff exercise reasonable diligence to:

- "Keep abreast of those areas inadequately policed which may require limited vigilance.
- Monitor criminal activity or unusual conditions in the county.
- Respond professionally to calls for assistance from the citizenry."

Citing the separation of powers doctrine, the three judges added that a second rea-

son was behind the ruling. "The judiciary will not control the discretion of administrative bodies acting within the limits vested in them by law, unless the action is so capricious and arbitrary as to evidence a total failure to exercise discretion."

THE TOWNSHIPS appear to have two options: Start their own police departments, or contract with the county for the same services they now receive.

Judge Foley said he doubted the appeals court ruling would be appealed to the state supreme court, not only because the decision was unanimous, but because it affirmed his own ruling point by point.

Local reaction to the ruling was swift and strong. Supervisor J.D. McLaren of Plymouth Township, who had just learned of the decision, said it was possible Plymouth Township will consider joining

again with the other townships in a further appeal to the state high court.

"That's my personal reaction," he said, "but it will be up to the township board, since there is money involved."

Supervisor Robert Greenstein of Canton was more vehement in his response.

"It is an amazing thing when seven governments representing 200,000 citizens are refused their day in court when any criminal rapist, or murderer can get 10 or 15 shots at it.

"My position on behalf of Canton is that we should retain the same counsel and appeal it to the state supreme court."

Attorney Bert Burgoyne, recently retained by the suburbs to fight a 39 per cent water rate hike by Detroit, argued the case before the appeals court. He replaced

Board considers May 18 date

Fire millage to go on ballot?

Canton officials will decide the fate of an additional levy earmarked for fire protection at a special meeting of the township board tonight (Monday).

Board members will discuss the possibility of placing a fire millage on the May 18 presidential primary or at least reserving a spot on the ballot, should they decide later to ask for the additional levy.

"There are a lot of alternatives we have to look at," said Treasurer Carl Parsell. "We may have to take a partial and incomplete study and go ahead with it or forget about it."

"We have to decide whether to put it on the ballot or reserve a space for it."

PRESENTLY, the township is awaiting a report from the Michigan Office of Insurance Services—a report that may show the cost of an additional mill or two will be offset by lower fire insurance rates for township residents.

A Citizens' Advisory Council (CAC) has been commissioned to look into the fire millage issue, following rejection of a public safety millage twice in 1974.

That year, voters turned down a three mill levy twice at the polls, once in August and once in November.

The CAC has already published a preliminary report that shows that one mill over 10 years would be sufficient to build and staff a second station this year, and eventually build and staff a third station in several years.

"Apparently, the CAC sees the need for a millage," said Parsell, "but all the facts are not in."

TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS, however, are in receipt of a study conducted by the Michigan Fire Chiefs Association—and according to Canton Chief Mel Paulun, the study shows a need for a second station in the township.

Parsell said if should the board decide to go ahead with a millage in May, the amount will have to be determined.

"Even though the CAC has said one mill would be sufficient, the board may find that we want to staff the second station at more than a minimum and that we may want 1.5 mills."

However, any additional levy will be ear-

marked for fire protection solely, Parsell said.

The treasurer added that although the township was not in a race with the schools to go to the voters for more money, May would probably be the best time to ask for the additional millage.

"If we can pass the millage May 18, on the 19th we'll be on the phone talking to the construction people to get the station underway. We have money that we can

use immediately and we can replace it with the additional money generated by the millage in the fall.

"IF WE WANT to get it done this year, it has to be done by sometime in August because that's the time the county has to have the additional mill on the tax rolls," Parsell explained.

"If we wait to the August primary,

that's cutting it very close—maybe too close."

Parsell said much of the decision to go for the millage lies with the insurance report. "If they say everything is all right we have no business selling the millage."

"But if they say a second station will lower our rates, it will be a big selling point."

The insurance study is scheduled to begin today.

Water may cost less

Canton township board members are expected to take action tonight on the wording of an advisory ballot on the township master land use plan and the restructuring of the township water and sewer rate system.

The advisory question, slated to go on the May 18 presidential primary ballot, will feature a written summary of two plans, one currently before the township planning commission, and one that was dropped following a public hearing almost two years ago.

The older plan provides for full urbanization of the township, while the present plan calls for development to stop at Canton Center Road.

Land west of Canton Center will be retained for farming.

Both plans will probably be presented to the public on the ballot and voters will have a choice of approving one of the plans or neither.

FOLLOWING A LENGTHY study by the accounting firm of Seidman and Seidman, the township board will also consider overhauling the water and sewer rate system in the township, a system the auditors called "inequitable."

Recommendations made by the account-

ing firm are divided into two categories, one taking into account a proposed 39 per cent water rate increase by Detroit, and the other assuming there is no increase.

The accountants have proposed a two-tier system where residents and commercial users will be charged one rate under 100,000 gallons per quarter, and another above 100,000.

Cost of the first 100,000 gallons would 54 cents per 1,000 gallons, without the Detroit increase, and 65 cents with it.

Sewer usage would be billed at 27 cents per 1,000 gallons of water used, and with the Detroit increase, that figure would rise to 35 cents per 1,000 gallons.

For homes or businesses that use more than 100,000 gallons per billing period (large commercial accounts are billed monthly, everyone else is billed quarterly) cost of water would 35 cents with or without the Detroit increase per 1,000 gallons, and sewer usage would cost 16 cents per 1,000 gallons of water used with or without the increase.

TAP-IN CHARGES will increase significantly under the new system, with new customers paying anywhere from \$40-\$350 more than present tap-in costs.

Minimum billing amounts will be decreased from 10,000 gallons of water per

billing period to 5,000.

According to the accountants, the new rate structure will result in more revenue for the township water and sewer department while making the payments more equitable.

More than half of the customers in the township will receive a rate reduction, while only the very large users will receive an increase. Maximum increases will be eight per cent per billing period.

Under the present five-tier system, commercial and residential users pay a set water charge and 50 per cent of that charge for sewer usage.

According to Seidman and Seidman, that system resulted in the township's larger customers receiving water at less than the township paid for.

Copies of the rate report are available for public inspection at the township fire-hall and the general business offices.

Section 5 residents will fight for hunting ban

Approximately 20 residents from north-west Canton were at township hall Wednesday evening to tell "war" stories about damages and problems incurred by hunters in their neighborhood.

DNR conservation executive Bruce Andrews chaired the public hearing, intended to determine if hunting should be banned in section five of the township, a one-square mile area bounded by Joy, Warren, Beck and Ridge Roads.

"I've been here 27 years, and I used to hunt this area," said Bill Dickey, "but it's gotten to the point now where it isn't safe anymore. There's a lot more people living out here and there's a lot more children."

"The situation now is that people come up my driveway, park, and walk out on my property into the cornfield. I had to call the sheriff four times before I finally got them out of there."

"Some of these hunters just aren't safety conscious. I've got a hedge 40 feet from my house and sometimes they walk through it firing away. It doesn't matter if you post the property, they just ignore the signs and say they have permission to hunt out here."

Dickey added, "I used to raise dogs here. They were German Shepherds. But I got tired of picking pellets out of them. The hunters out there used to shoot at my dogs and it got to the point where I just quit raising them."

OTHER RESIDENTS talked of their lives and their children's lives being endangered by careless hunters.

"There's times when we can hear the bullets whizzing past us," Edward Zagor said. "We post the area, but in two days all the signs are pulled down. Are we supposed to keep on putting signs up every two days?"

One woman living on Gyde Road said her house suffered \$500 worth of damage

from shotgun pellets fired within 150 feet of the house.

"It's direct shooting damage," she said. "There's over 50 pellets in the siding and our daughter's window screen has holes in it, too."

"Our back yard is 100 feet deep and ends in a cornfield. We don't dare let our children go out there and play. In fact, we're scared to go out there ourselves."

Looking at Andrews, John Cojei, president of the Northwest Canton Homeowners Association commented, "Fortunately no one has been hurt yet, but the risk is certainly there. We're looking to you for relief."

According to one resident, petitions passed out in section five had been signed by 80 per cent of the residents, all of whom opposed hunting.

Of the approximate 600 acres in the section, owners of more than 400 say they want the land declared off-limits to hunting.

Jack Marx, another member of the Northwest Canton Homeowners Association, said all the people in section five and six are concerned about the hunting problem.

"I've visited almost all the homes out there, and the people I talk to always bring up the hunting problem."

ELAINE KIRCHGATTER, a seven-year resident of Canton on Gyde Road, commented, "We have three young children and we don't let them more than 25-50 feet from the house."

"We moved out here because we liked the open space and now we can't take advantage of it. Most of us have livestock too, and their lives are also endangered."

Trustee Jim Poole commented, "I think you should abolish hunting throughout section five. Eighty per cent of the people are against it, and bullets don't know the difference."

LWV asks Rouge water council

Within a month the Plymouth and Canton township governments will be asked to urge the state to process formation of a watershed council composed of communities in the Rouge River basin.

The idea is being promoted locally by the Plymouth, Northville, Canton, Novi League of Women Voters. Last week the League appeared before the Plymouth City Commission to ask the city's support for an area wide watershed council.

The city is studying the request and is due to make a decision at the April 5 commission meeting.

"The committee is interested in preserving the Rouge as a river, and not just purely as a drain," explained Mrs. Donaldson.

"The one thing we learned over the last four years is that governments along the Rouge basin seldom get together on problems relating to the river. About the only time they do is when the government begins a program which has an effect on another."

The League suggests formation of a watershed council as a forum for communication, a receptive for grants, and as an agency to educate the public about the value and function of the Rouge.

It has always been a problem for local governments to get information they need on the Rouge because of the diversity of agencies which collect data or are involved in regional decisions on drainage. Mrs. Donaldson added. These agencies include the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Michigan Water Resources Commission.

Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, and the Wayne, Oakland and Washtenaw drain and road commissions.

A WATERSHED COUNCIL can be organized, by state law, by petition of three or more local governments. The petition is filed with the water resources commission which then contacts local communities along the basin to determine how many are interested.

Redford Township has already agreed to sign the petition and interest has been expressed by Detroit, Allen Park, Beverly Hills, Franklin, Dearborn and Troy.

The communities forming the council decide what membership fees will be charged, approve bylaws, decide on the number of meetings, and establish the size of staff to operate the agency.

The Clinton Watershed Council operates with one full-time person and an annual budget of \$2,500, explained Mrs. Donaldson. "With more than one million persons living along the Rouge basin, a watershed council would be very inexpensive." Huron formed a watershed council in 1968, shortly after state enabling legislation was adopted, and Clinton was formed in about 1973.

The League hopes to contact a community of the Rouge basin by the end of April or mid-May.

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APPEARING BEFORE the commission was Mrs. John Donaldson, chairman of the Rouge River Basin Committee of the Detroit Metropolitan League of Women Voters which has been studying the Rouge for some four years.

Among local LWV members working with Mrs. Donaldson are Keri Miller and Nancy White of Plymouth, and Lynne Goldsmith of Canton.

Heritage is recorded on micro-film printer

Usually the persons who visit a historical museum go there to feast their eyes on old things—old furniture, old paintings, old books and even old autos and carriages.

One of the most popular attractions in the Plymouth Historical Museum, however, is a piece of modern equipment that helps give you a better view of the old things.

This popular piece of equipment is a reader-printer with a screen on which newspapers and records can be flashed. It gives you a chance to read the early history of Plymouth since it has all the issues of the Plymouth Mail back to the year 1930.

THE EQUIPMENT is the gift of the Plymouth Rotary Club. Inasmuch as the Rotarians had made its final payment on the operation of the school farm on Joy Road, the club turned over \$3,100 check to the museum for the cost of the printer.

While Rotary plans to preserve all of its records and copies of the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric, an invitation has been extended to all other service clubs and churches, along with the city government, to have their records preserved on microfilm.

In the short time the reader-printer has been in operation, it has served several useful purposes.

"Many of the school children come in," Mrs. Pat Whitesell said, "to check on things as they prepare for the writing of special papers."

"One of the students the other day checked on the old flour mills in the Plymouth community. She was doing a special paper and found the information she needed."

On another occasion a gentleman from Flint made the trip to check on his family tree. He, too, was successful.

One of the most unusual requests was by a man who purchased an old home in Plymouth and came in to check its background. He, too, left satisfied.

WHILE THE micro-film carries copies of the old Plymouth Mail from its inception, museum authorities hope that sufficient funds through gifts and admission charges will enable the films to be brought up to date.

Mark Hunt, museum director, is delighted with the popularity thus far, but is looking forward to the time when the reader-printer will be known around the entire area. It then can be put to real use and

serve the purpose the Rotarians intended, he said.

Because of the printer's popularity, Hunt always has some one available to operate it and provide other services people need in their research.

The Rotarians presented Hunt and Mrs. Evelyn Edgar, a member of the Plymouth Historical Society, with the check.

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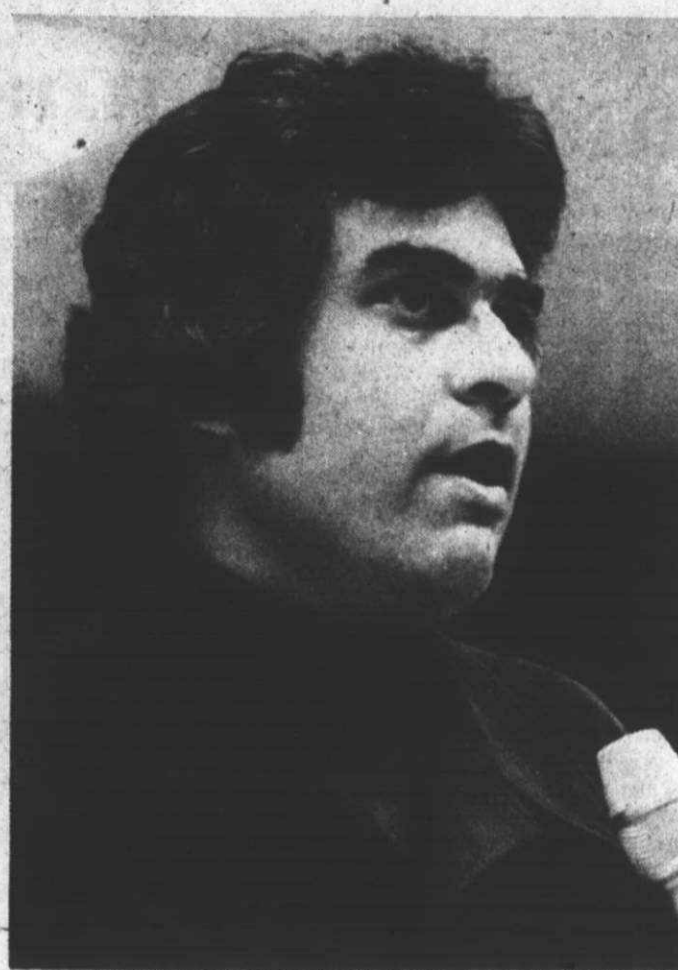
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Let the sun shine in Doug Ross talks about open meeting legislation

One of the most important generators of citizen participation in government is open-meeting legislation, according to Doug Ross, director of the Michigan Citizens Lobby.

Ross was the keynote speaker on a panel which gathered in Plymouth Canton High last week to discuss secrecy in government and the need for open-meeting laws. About 50 persons attended the public forum sponsored by Total Citizens Power of Canton.

Other panel members included Joe Gutowski of Common Cause and Tim Richard, editorial page director of the Observer & Eccentric.

ROSS STRESSED that open meetings by governments are a central requirement for citizens to have the ability to know what's going on in their communities.

"Throughout the state it is common practice for local governments to have a little meeting before the 'main meeting.' This isn't an evil plot on the part of officials, who rationalize that the little meeting is needed so that the main meeting will be more orderly.

"But if you can't be there for every part of that decision, then someone else is controlling that decision and you don't know what's really going on.

"Well, we citizens set the rules which determine what happens at the end of the game. If the rules are set to allow most of the decisions to be made without us or the press, which is the public's representative, then we are powerless.

"If, indeed, governmental decisions are made in our benefit, then we have the right to be present at everything."

ROSS THEN discussed specific areas which public officials and others often

argue should be discussed in private for the smooth functioning of government.

•Purchase of property—Many officials argue this should be excluded from open-meeting law because it's better to discuss real estate transactions in secret so nobody can take advantage of that knowledge. "But the only people who don't know are us—the people in real estate business find out. So the best protection is for everyone to know."

•Hiring of personnel—The argument is that personnel matters should be decided in secret because they involve personal information. "But we are the employers. Everybody on the public payroll works for us. If you were chairman of General Motors, would you hire someone without knowing his qualifications?"

•Disciplinary action against public employees—"Many in government feel dis-

ussion of possible discipline against public employees should be had in secret," said Ross. "But if we can't be trusted—if it's felt we lack proper judgement to listen to such discussions—then we are saying that self-government won't work."

The Michigan Citizens League does believe personal matters involving school children under 18 should be excluded from open-meeting legislation. "They are not employees, but students and minors. We would only favor open sessions involving students if the student or parents want it open.

"Our general approach is that if somebody wants to close people out, then the burden of proof should be on the government to prove it is to our best interest not to be there."

ROSS URGED local ordinances in the Plymouth-Canton area to require that governmental business be conducted in the open.

"Everytime a local government, on its own, sets open-meeting rules, then we get that much closer to getting action from the state legislature. When the opponents argue things would be in a mess if all government business were done in open, then we can point to your community as an example to the contrary.

"Florida passed a strong open-meeting law nine years ago which makes everything open, and that state's still there—nothing's broken down."

He urged residents to support Senate Bill 920 which passed the Senate with a number of exclusions but is now in House com-

mittee where public pressure can result in amendments to make it much stronger.

Rep. Tom Brown (D-Westland), whose district includes part of the Plymouth-Canton area, is chairman of the towns and counties committee now considering the open meeting bill. "If you agree with me, then you should write Tom Brown now in Lansing, and urge him to make it as strong as possible with few exceptions."

RICHARD TOLD the audience that present Michigan law merely provides that "you have the right to know how your public official voted, and that's about it.

"But you need to know how that official feels before the vote—not after. You need to know who else had input into that decision, what alternatives were considered, and you need an opportunity for your input."

He urged listeners not to be taken in by language tricks of legislators who refer to secret meetings as "executive sessions."

"They are meetings which you cannot attend, and you should call them secret meetings or sneak meetings, not executive sessions.

A law is needed to control the calling of special meetings, he added. "Having meetings at odd hours should be prohibited by law. There should be 48-hour notice given before special meetings are called, and no meeting should begin later than 8:30 p.m.

"It doesn't do much good to require 12 or 18 hours notice, because the mail is so slow you will get the notice the day after the meeting is held.

"And when attending public meetings,

don't forget that the magic word is 'adjourn.' The meeting isn't over until that word is spoken. Without that word, the officials can leave the room and return after you have left to take a vote.

"Although I'm against secret meetings, if they are going to be allowed, then we need a law to ban the interruption of public meetings with a secret meeting. This is an abuse.

"The trouble with granting exceptions, and excluding some discussions from the requirement to be held in the open, is that the list gets longer and longer.

"The next danger is that the board or commission, once they meet in secret to discuss an item which is excluded by law, doesn't know when to quit, and will begin to discuss matters not exempted."

GUTOWSKI said exclusions which Common Cause supports include:

Discussion of public employee's mental and physical health or character; discussions involving student discipline; real estate transactions, although it would be open discussion once an option is signed.

Common Cause is asking that political caucuses in the legislature be open to the public.

A letter from Marcia Borowski, vice-president of the Plymouth Board of Education, was read. She stated her support, as an individual, for open-meeting legislation. She was the only public official to write TCP to express views on open meetings. Those who attended the forum, but didn't express an opinion, were Canton trustees Brian Schwall and James Poole.

With few changes

School boundaries OK'd

School boundaries for elementary schools in Plymouth Community School District for 1976-77 were approved Monday night by the Plymouth Board of Education.

The board voted 6-1, with Joe Gray voting no, to accept the elementary boundaries with two changes and some minor clarifications.

A decision to delay adoption of the middle school boundaries was made by a 5-2 vote with Tom Yack and Marcia Borowski voting no. Approval of middle school boundaries is expected to be made by the board on April 12.

ONE CHANGE from that recommended by the attendance and boundary committee will allow students now attending Farrand, who were to have been transferred to Geer, to remain at Farrand.

The other major change stated that pupils will be allowed to attend Bird who live on the east side of the half-mile section line between Beck and Ridge roads. This primarily involves residents in the Plymouth Hills subdivision. Minor clarifications included: Students on both sides of Napier from the south side of Warren to Ford Road will attend Gallimore, and those living from Woodleigh Way west to Canton Center Road will attend Bird.

GRAY TOOK the occasion of the boundary vote to express concerns he had about 45-15 year-round school at Miller Elementary, and whether Geer should be kept open.

"I don't understand the insistence to keep Geer Elementary when we have 10 empty classrooms at Farrand Elementary. If the new elementary schools are finished, and we have those additional classrooms available, then why are we still running 45-15 at Miller with its added cost in face of a budget crunch?"

George Lawton stated that changes from what was recommended that the board was prepared to make will result in the Geer enrollment remaining exactly where it is this year.

"The attendance committee did drive for stability," answered Ms. Borowski, "and that's why it recommended that 45-15 remain open, so we don't have to scatter those kids all over the district. If we ended 45-15, we'd have 250 pupils that would have to be placed someplace else and there's no room in the three new elementaries. Where would we put them?"

E.J. McClendon commented that the question of whether Geer should be closed was a budget issue and not a boundary adjustment question. "It's a different problem than defining attendance boundaries. To cut the budget, I could support closing Geer."

Supt. John M. Hoben commented that the attendance committee and administration are concerned about whether the new schools will open on time. "A possible construction strike faces us, and we are now behind on the projects." One elementary is scheduled to open in mid-October and the other two in August.

Hoben added that the cost analysis in the preliminary status report is premature and the board should wait for the final cost analysis at the end of June to get an accurate accounting on the 45-15 program.

Ms. Borowski added that a survey showed students, teachers and parents have a positive reaction to 45-15. Gray answered that the survey's validity is questionable because it didn't include those who opted out and chose not to attend Miller or those who attend private schools.

Marda Benson, board president, said it was fine for Gray to disagree, but she hoped he would have positive recommendations to make instead of just criticizing action before the board.

After approval of the elementary boundaries, as amended, the board voted to delay action until April 15 on the middle schools. Ms. Borowski and Yack voted no because they said they were prepared to vote Monday night.

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Dyer calls for change in state aid

Wayne-Westland Supt. Timothy Dyer spent Friday in Lansing with a coalition of suburban, big city and outstate school representatives in an effort to help the legisla-

ture come up with a school aid formula equitable to all types of school districts. But Dyer cautioned the board in advance that with elections coming up, the legislature may not approve a state aid formula until November.

"The chances of a bill passing become slimmer and slimmer each day," Dyer told the board of education Monday. "The entire House of Representatives is up for election and we're anticipating a recess for campaigning from mid-July to November."

SCHOOL DISTRICTS traditionally have favored early passage of a state aid bill in order to anticipate the coming school year's budget which usually are drawn up by late summer.

Dyer said the coalition of school boards will be trying to "come up with an attractive package for all concerned." One of the proposals Dyer and the administrators will be studying is the Faxon bill, a weighted state aid formula, which would award payments based on the number of students in each grade sector with the greatest amounts of state aid allocated for students in the first three grades.

State Sen. Jack Faxon (D-Detroit), chairman of the senate education committee, contends that his proposal of increased funding in a child's "formative years" would decrease the need for remediation later in the child's scholastic career.

The bill also calls for basic state aid payments to be upped by \$80 million throughout the state with revenues raised from additional taxes on cigarettes and liquor.

DYER CALLED the Faxon bill "interesting but complicated." "I applaud the basic concept of the bill," Dyer said. "But the bill has lots of prob-

lems and the chief problem is the cost. "This bill would be \$60-\$70 million more expensive than the present aid formula. "And the governor has said that he would veto any type of bill which is that costly. There has not been an override of a governor's veto in this state since 1949. So, the chances appear slim that we could expect an override."

Dyer also contended that the Faxon bill does not address some of the major problems Dyer sees in the present state aid formula. "For one thing, it says nothing about those districts who levy more than 27 mills." Under the current formula, high-millage districts such as Wayne-Westland are not compensated by the state beyond the 27-mill levy cut-off.

Dyer has severely criticized this portion of the bill saying that districts willing to support education by levying high taxes should be entitled to additional state aid.

Dyer said the Faxon bill does not amend Sec. 143 of the state aid formula which was found to contain a tax loophole. Under 143, some districts which increase local millage will actually be penalized in state aid for the raise.

Dyer also hoped to find out whether a bill passed by both the senate and the house will be signed by Gov. William Milliken.

A Milliken signature would enable the district to construct a vocational education facility at half cost, with cost of equipment to be funded by the state.

attorney Louis Wechsler, who handled the suit at the circuit court level.

Greenstein said he was surprised by the decision because all the preliminary information he had received indicated the "townships would get their day in court."

"I'm amazed. Every pointer we received indicated a favorable outcome." The supervisor said if a second appeal was lost, and there were no other legal avenues such as the federal courts, he would favor Canton's starting its own police force.

"TWO THINGS ARE obvious," he said. "If the county drops the road patrol, the 7.07 mills we pay to the county are not going to be coming back in any way, shape, or form at all."

"There is no reason, then, for us not to very seriously consider becoming a city, because the only benefit we received by being a township was that we got the road patrol."

"We have already sacrificed control of our roads to the Wayne County Road Commission."

When informed of the ruling by the Observer & Eccentric, Senior Inspector Dick Novak, head of the road patrol, commented, "Who is to determine what is vigilance? We had 45,000-50,000 complaints last year. Who will determine which are answered?"

"Some people are really going to have put their heads together on this. What happens when we have an armed robbery at one end of the county, a woman in distress at the other end, and some guy spilled all over the road in an accident?"

"Who is going to decide which call gets answered?" Novak said the road patrol is now funded at a minimal level. "We've already asked for more money," the inspector commented.

"There are a lot of day-to-day things that have to be taken care of. Maybe somebody's kid is choking. That's not a murder, but to that lady it's the most important thing in the world."

"What happens when she calls and I have to tell her, 'Sorry, ma'am, I don't have a car?'"

"Those people are paying county taxes, and they want protection. Someone has to give it to them—and someone has to determine what the proper protection is. That's

where the politicians come in."

LT. WILLIAM Tomczyk, head of the Plymouth state police subpost, the only other police agency now patrolling Canton, Plymouth and Northville Townships, said he didn't think the decision would affect staffing in his command.

"We'll continue in the same manner as in the past with the same manpower. "We don't know the volume of work the sheriff did in the past, but we did call them in for backup on some occasions when we were short-handed."

"We'll just have to wait and see." The road patrol is funded through Dec. 1, at which time the county has the right to cut the funding if the ruling is not reversed.

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Pursell to run for congress seat

State Sen. Carl Pursell, who represents Livonia, Plymouth and Redford Township in the Legislature, is scheduled to announce his candidacy tonight for the 2nd Congressional District Republican nomination.

He has press conferences scheduled in Livonia, Ann Arbor and Monroe Monday to formally enter the GOP primary and the chance to succeed U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch, (R-Ann Arbor) who is campaigning for a U.S. Senate nomination this fall.

Pursell, of Plymouth, was elected to the state Senate in 1970 and re-elected to a second term in 1974.

In announcing his candidacy, Pursell said "Michigan's newest congressional delegate feels we are engaged in a struggle to achieve a new independence for America in a world increasingly hostile to democracy, free enterprise and personal liberty."

The candidate said he will run for a congressional seat "out of a desire to have an impact at a major crossroads in American history and out of a conviction that I can meet the high standards that are required."

Pursell said he believes in "cooperation and diplomatic mediation with other nations. But such relationships must be mutual and must not weaken our economic and political position in the world."

"At stake is our democracy, free enterprise system and personal liberties in a world growing increasingly hostile and intolerant of America's fundamental concepts."

The candidate said that he wants a chance to prove in Washington what he has proved in Lansing—"that real leadership can surmount partisanship."

Trowbridge runs for house seat

Ronald L. Trowbridge, city councilman in Ann Arbor, is a Republican candidate for the 2nd Congressional District nomination.

Trowbridge, 38, criticizes the Democratic Party for building a "parasitic, lumbering, ineffectual bureaucracy at the bottom."

"We remind ourselves that only 10 years ago the Democrats were laughing at the claim that New York City would go bankrupt. It is not comforting to know that these fiscally naive types now reside in Washington, generously spending your money and coercing you into sacrifices over which you have no control."

Trowbridge, an associate professor of English at Eastern Michigan University, quotes Robert Browning in his opening campaign speech:

"The English poet Robert Browning once said, 'A man's reach should exceed his grasp; or what's a heaven for.'"

"Democrats have altered Browning's poem to: 'Grab what you can reach. What's mine is mine; what's yours is mine.'"

Trowbridge chides the federal government for becoming "increasingly distant" from the people. He argues that the government either gorges itself or shares the bread with special interest groups that yell the loudest.

"The Republican Party has for years been chastizing big, expensive, unresponsive government, and it's only recently that Democrats, as political opportunists, have jumped on this bandwagon."

Trowbridge is editor-in-chief of the Michigan Academician, a publication of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters. He is a U of M graduate with a BA, MA and Ph.D. in English literature.

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Strict zoning is key to future—Frank Kelley

Land use was the topic Thursday night as Attorney General Frank Kelley spoke to a full house at the Canton Chamber of Commerce's Fourth Annual Dinner.

Interspersing his half hour talk with plenty of jokes, Kelley called on all municipalities to use their planning and zoning powers to save the environment and to make sure that land is "utilized the best and most efficient way."

"I was in real estate law for 30 years and taught it at the University of Michigan, and I welcome the opportunity to talk about the concept of land planning," the attorney general said.

"This is a vast open country and we all assume we have certain rights. But they are exaggerated. People think they can tote a gun down main street and they think that owning land gives them the absolute right to do with it as they wish."

"People don't want some lousy bureaucrat telling them what to do with their land."

"But in Europe, where our law originates from, it was never that way. There has always been some restriction on title to land. You could never always use it as you saw fit."

"GO TO PARIS," the attorney general

suggested, "and try to put out a Holiday Inn or a McDonald's sign, a big ugly neon one, and see how fast you end up in court."

"But here the first thing you do is put out the biggest ugliest neon sign you can find. We work all week to make ugliness and then on the weekend we get in the car to escape it and go out of the city only to make more."

Kelley said planning was the answer to stopping the onslaught on the environment and he added that land is a trust and one of our most important resources to be saved and used in the best interests of society.

The attorney general said that Michigan is fast losing its prime agricultural land, even though the state is the fifth largest food producer in the country, and in some areas number one.

"Did you know that Utica, Michigan is the number one producer of hot house rhubarb in the country. Tell that to someone at a cocktail party and impress them," he quipped.

Kelley said there is a line from Muskegon across the state that represents the northern boundary of Michigan's best crop lands. That land makes up 20 per cent of the state. The other 80 per cent, Kelley explained, other than the Saginaw fruit belt and land up in Grand Traverse County, is not as good for farming.

"YOU KNOW, we end up putting up houses and condominiums all over our best farmland and then we try to grow crops in clay."

"But once you ruin the crop land you can't recover it. The people aren't about to tear down a multi-million dollar project like the Renaissance Center just because it's where you should be growing sugar beets."

He added, "Last year we lost one million acres of land from its natural state. There's plenty of land—if we use it wisely."

The attorney general remarked that half of the state has no planning and uses no zoning so that "we end up with a pig sty next to a house next to a mobile home next to a big garbage dump."

"Land use planning advocates looking at the situation and then determining what the best use of the land is for everyone." He said realism was important.

"Look at Wayne County. Everyone wants industry to fund the schools so the homeowners can pay less. We have a survey that shows that there are 36 square miles of land in this county zoned for industry that won't be used in the next 30,000 years, if at all. But every township and city is after the fast buck."

"What we need is the orderly development of industry instead of every municipality in the state competing against each other for it."

The attorney general also came out against the present property tax system to fund the schools, a system that disturbs good planning, he said.

Kelley said he endorsed a plan along with governor William Milliken to come up with a state master land use plan over five years that would be based on local plans.

"YOU TELL US what you think about the unused land in your community—take your time and study it—and then give it to the governor and the state land use commission, and if it's acceptable, it will become part of the state master plan."

"There's place for everything, and land use planning is not a radical subject. It's up to us to preserve our natural beauty. We have thousands of lakes, let's not desecrate this state."

"If we do, history will judge us very

harshly as a bunch of ugly vulgarians."

Kelley referred to the late poet T.S. Eliot and a quote in which he said that architects digging up America will find bits of asphalt and used golfballs.

"I think we should add mobile homes and McDonald's signs to that," Kelley joked.

Kelley also spoke of the need to preserve the environment and the needs to produce food and energy. "We can produce energy without destroying the environment," he said.

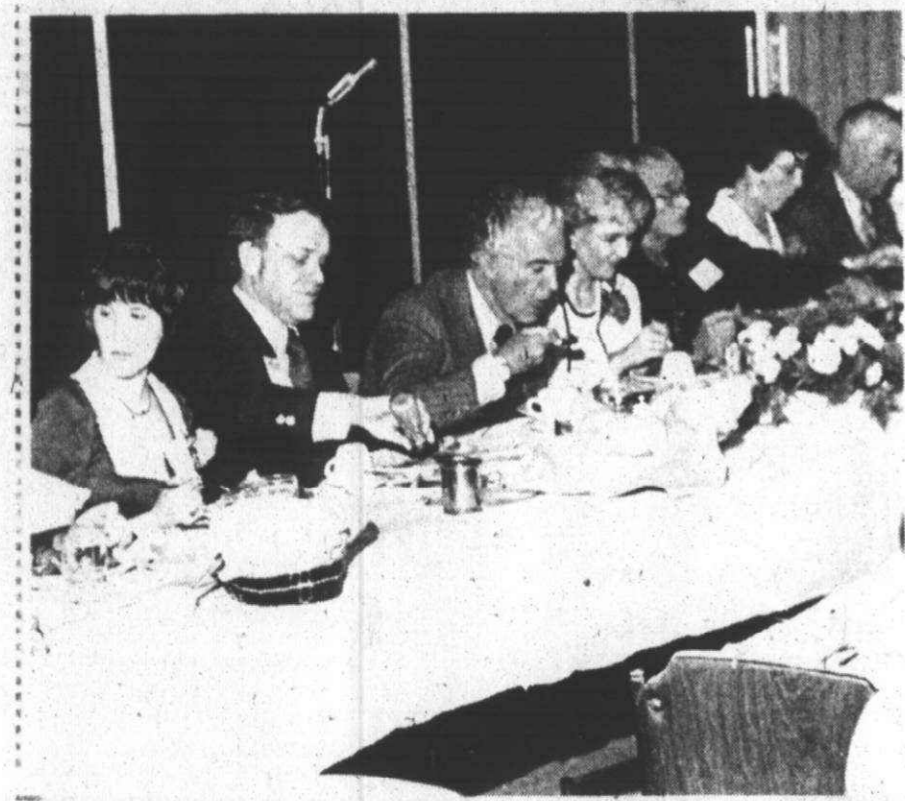
The attorney general concluded his speech saying, "Study zoning. Don't be

scared of it. You will find that the best use of the land and the best utilization of man's environment is where they have the strictest zoning requirements."

"It's been a pleasure being in Canton and I hope to be here next year giving you the award for the best gardens in the state."

Rec survey considered

Governmental units in the Plymouth-Canton area will be asked whether they want to contribute financial support for a survey of residents attitudes and desires for recreational facilities.

At the last meeting of the intra-governmental committee March 17, a presentation on the cost and methods of surveying was made by Jerome Johnston of the Institute for Social Research Center, University of Michigan.

Attending were representatives from Canton, Plymouth and Superior townships. Not represented were the City of Plymouth, Salem Township, and Plymouth Community School District. Hearing the presentation were Gerald Cheske of Canton, Frank Millington of Plymouth Township, Kay Williams and Richard Innes of Superior Township.

THE COMMITTEE has been discussing the advantages of each governmental unit's pooling its recreational facilities so

a wider range of choices will be available to residents.

At the last meeting, committee members discussed using a professional survey firm, utilizing summer class students from U-M, and using residents as volunteers with training from professionals.

The cost for a comprehensive survey would be about \$7,000. If U-M students were used this summer the cost would be less. But there may not be enough time for the governments to decide on this ap-

proach for the request to be made before U-M makes its decision on where students will do field work this summer.

JOHNSTON SAID the factors with the greatest influence on survey costs are:

The number of respondents; type of interviewing (mail or personal); the sampling plan and availability of lists of all units which might be included in the study.

Based on information given by those at the intra-governmental committee, Johnston anticipates that 400 properly selected respondents would be sufficient for meaningful results.

If residents were to be used as volunteers, he added, they would have to be trained by a professional for the results to be meaningful. Professionals also would have to be used to interpret the results.

Although it is cheaper to use a mail survey, he said, this method favors the more literate person and tends to leave out those persons most in need of recreation whose views are needed for a useful survey.

"At the moment, the intra-governmental members feel a survey is proper," says Innes, "but cost is the main factor. We now must learn how much the communities involved are willing to pay."

Members of the intra-governmental committee include City of Plymouth, Plymouth school district, and the townships of Canton, Plymouth, Superior, Salem and Northville.

ence between quail, ponies and people." Other residents said hunters get carried away during the hunt and don't look where they shoot.

The Hunting Area Control Committee (HACC), composed of one representative from the township, Clerk John Flodin and a representative from the sheriff and state police along with Andrews will probably hold another hearing, Flodin said.

Members of the committee have already visited section five, but Flodin said the committee would take another look before making any recommendation.

FLODIN said he thought the committee would not make a recommendation prior to holding a second hearing.

After that, the committee will make a recommendation and forward it to the township board for its approval.

Final jurisdiction on the matter lies with the state Joint Administrative Rules Committee, a legislative body composed of three state senators and five representatives.

The rules committee will act on the final recommendation of the HACC and if they agree to ban or limit hunting in section five, the township board will have to approve an identical ordinance to implement the ban.

Presently, 19% of the 36 one-mile square sections in the township are closed to hunting. All land east of Canton Center, the Centennial Education Park site, and land in the southern half of section six, just west of section five are off limits to hunters.

Despite unproven pitching

Salem hardball squad optimistic

Since Plymouth Salem won the state Class A championship one season ago, many things have changed to leave an uncertain amount of optimism as to Salem's prospects for renewed success.

Graduation witnessed the departure of the entire outfield, starting catcher and All-State southpaw Tom Willette whose powerful left arm accounted for 17 of the Rocks 23 victories.

The most significant development was the resignation of coach Wayne Sparkman after seven seasons of coaching.

Former JV coach Brian Gilles has inherited the reins as coach and maintains the same viewpoint after seven years of directing the freshmen and junior varsity teams in Plymouth.

"Fundamentally, my outlook is the same at any level. I feel it is pretty hard picking up a defending state champion and league

champion in my first year of varsity coaching," said Gilles.

As for the Rocks strengths and weaknesses, Gilles said, "Defensively we're going to be real tough, and offensively at the plate we're very strong, but our pitching hasn't been proven yet."

LEADING THE CAST of returning lettermen from last year's champs is the keystone combination of Brian Wolcott and Dave Pierce. Wolcott was an All-League shortstop last year and will see some duty on the mound during this season. He has excellent range at short and is also a capable batter who hits for average.

Pierce is a proven .300 hitter and has a knack for reaching base in the clutch. When the second basemen teams with Wolcott, they provide one of the best double play duos in the area.

The other tri-captain of this year's squad is Howard Inch, a 6-0 first basemen who

saw plenty of action as a junior last year. Although Inch does not provide alot of power, he will supply plenty of base hits from the right side of the plate.

Charlie Johnson has been moved to left field to compensate for the loss in the outfield. The ex-third basemen was the Rocks leader in slugging percentage and hitting last year and Salem will rely upon Johnson to hit the long ball.

John DenHouter will see double duty in centerfield and as the only lefthander on the pitching staff. "John is a good three-inning pitcher, but he has an excellent throwing arm from centerfield," said coach Gilles.

THE REST of the punch in the Salem batting lineup is expected to come from a pair of juniors up from the junior varsity team that was 9-8 last season.

Bob Smith is the prime candidate to fill the slot as the designated hitter with some chance of playing right field. Juniors Tim Lilley and Dick Bradburn also are vying for the vacant position in rightfield.

A heavy burden will be lowered on the shoulders of Mitch Symons, a power hitting catcher up from the JV. "Mitch has good power and a strong arm but his fundamentals will have to improve. We're going to look to him to be a leader on the field," said Gilles.

At the hot corner Pat McKendrie and Corky Norman are the probables to see action. Both players are juniors and McKendrie will likely fill in at short when Wolcott is pitching.

Salem's hitting and defense may be aspects of its game that will have to tide them over shortcomings ahead in the pitching department.

"We're going to have to score a lot of runs because many runs will be scored against us," said Gilles. "We won't be getting the 14 strikeouts a game that Willette gave us last year. That will put more pressure on our defense. We're going to have to concentrate on preventing the mental mistakes," he said.

IF THERE IS a shadow of doubt about this year's team, it is pitching.

Coach Gilles along with his assistant, Gary Temple, are planning on using six pitchers in the early portion of the schedule.

"We open up with three league games, after which we have six non-league games, which gives me an opportunity to get a good look at all our pitchers and find out who's going to do the job for us," said Gilles.

Mike Primeau, a senior who skipped his junior year after posting a 9-1 mark as a JV starter, will be one of the hurlers Gilles will be looking at along with Dave Nidzowski. Nidzowski is a junior transfer from Catholic Central, where he went 6-1 as a JV member.

Mark Chiatelas and Bruce Gerish are other JV moundmen who will receive a chance to show what they can do during the regular season.

John DenHouter and Brian Wolcott saw spot duty on the hill last season but will be used at other positions for the most part. Gilles commented that it's difficult for a player to pitch a lot of innings and play the field without developing a sore arm.

AS FOR THE Suburban Eight Conference race, Salem will be defending the crown for the first time since 1968 when they won the Suburban Six League.

The Rocks most formidable challenge comes from Livonia Bentley which sports a team comprised of many juniors who played varsity baseball last season as soph-

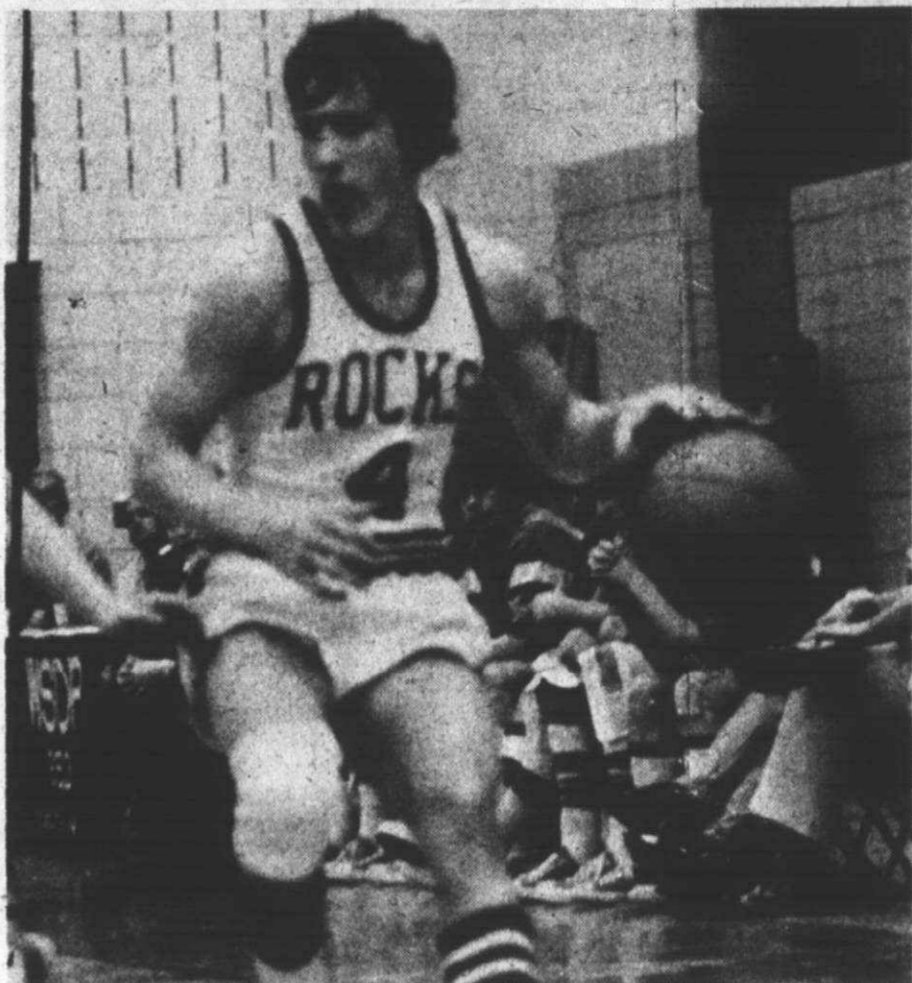
At press time, Shay hoped to sign up more parents. The mothers he signed, for sure, were Linda Richardson and Barb Hewlett.

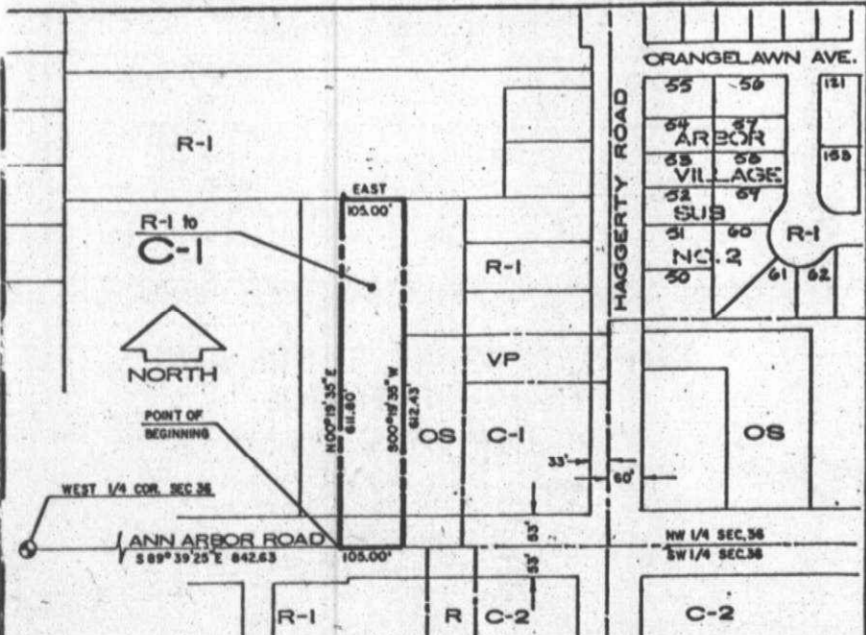

All watercraft users will be required to have a 1976 boat permit plus the vehicle entry permit during the months May through September. There is a 10-mile speed limit and no water skiing permitted at Kent Lake.

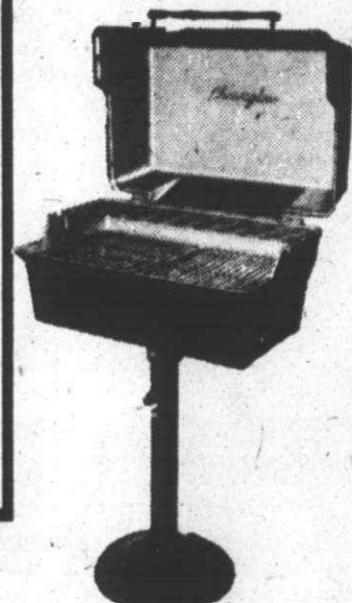

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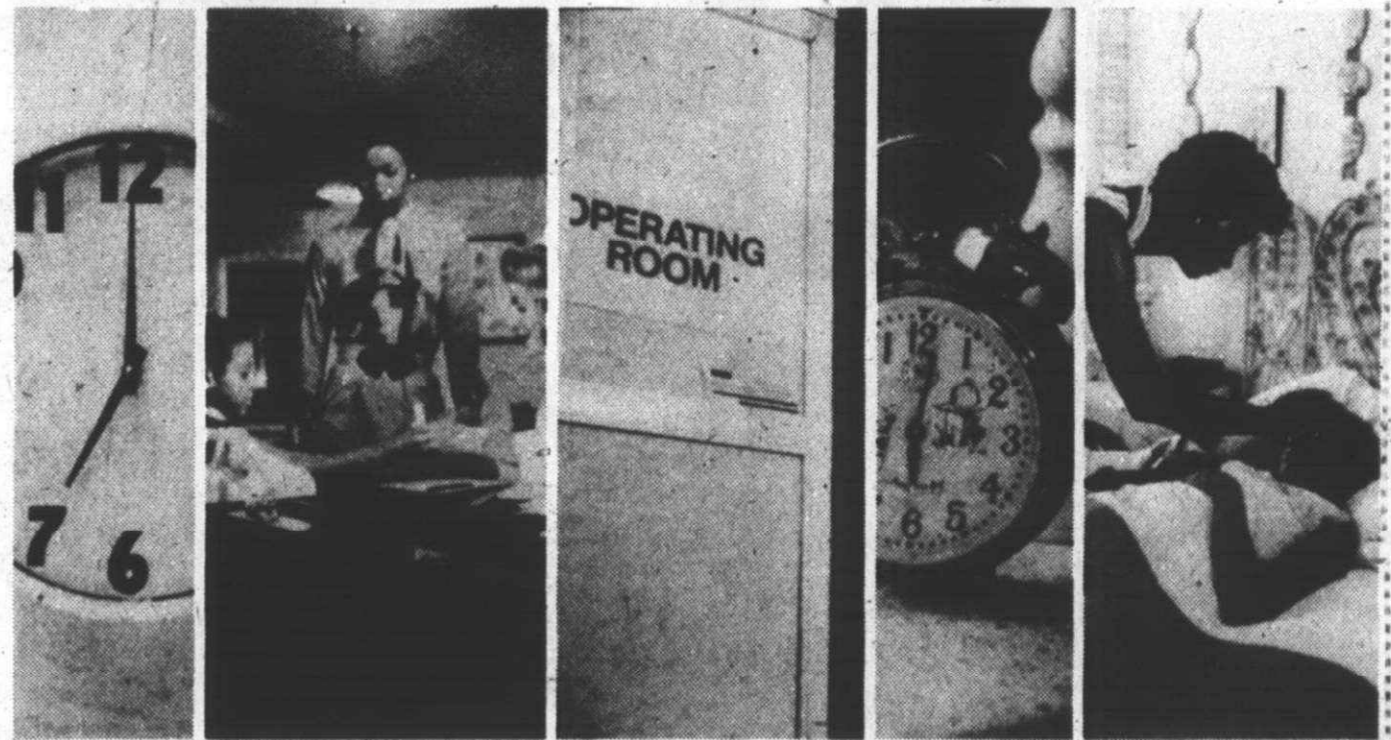
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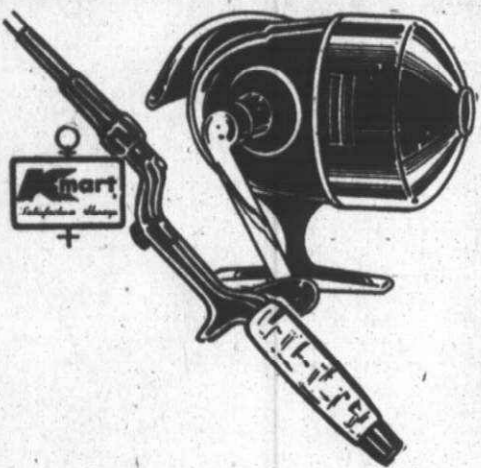

RED, WHITE AND BLUE SALAD

(Bicentennial)

First layer

1 c. hot water
1 pkg. raspberry jello
1 pkg. frozen raspberries
Dissolve raspberry gelatin in hot water.
Add frozen raspberries. Pour into 9 x 13

pan and set in refrigerator until firm.
Second layer

½ pt. coffee cream
½ c. sugar
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
½ pt. sour cream
1 t. vanilla

Heat the coffee cream and sugar until hot. Mix the unflavored gelatin with the cold water and add to the coffee cream; mix. While warm, add the sour cream and vanilla. Mix well. When cool, pour over the first layer. Refrigerate until firm.
Third layer

1 pkg. raspberry jello
1 c. hot water
1 can blueberries with juice

Dissolve raspberry gelatin in hot water and add can of blueberries. Let cool and add to second layer. Refrigerate until firm. (Serves 12.)

CHICKEN HAWAIIAN

(Barb Schendel)

1½ c. precooked rice
½ t. salt
1½ c. boiling water
½ c. mayonnaise
1½ c. french dressing
1 t. salt
½ t. pepper
½ c. chopped walnuts
1½ c. diced cooked chicken
1 c. diced celery
1 c. drained, sliced orange sections
Add rice and ½ teaspoon salt to boiling water in pan. Mix just to moisten all rice.

Cover and remove from heat. Let stand five minutes then uncover and let cool. About one hour before serving, combine mayonnaise, french dressing, salt and pepper; mix well. Combine chicken, celery, oranges and nuts in a bowl. Stir in mayonnaise mixture, then add rice and mix lightly with fork. Chill well. Makes six servings.

SEVEN LAYER SALAD

(Avis McLachlan)

1 head iceberg lettuce (cut like cabbage)
2 ribs celery (cut in small pieces)
2 green peppers, cut in strips
1 small sweet onion, cut fine
1 box frozen peas, cooked lightly in salt water and drained.
Place the above in layers as given, saving half the lettuce for top layer.

Mix together:
1 c. sour cream
1 c. mayonnaise
2 T. sugar

Spread over layers then sprinkle ¼ pound grated cheddar cheese or parmesan cheese over top. Cover with plastic covering and refrigerate for 24 hours or at least eight hours.

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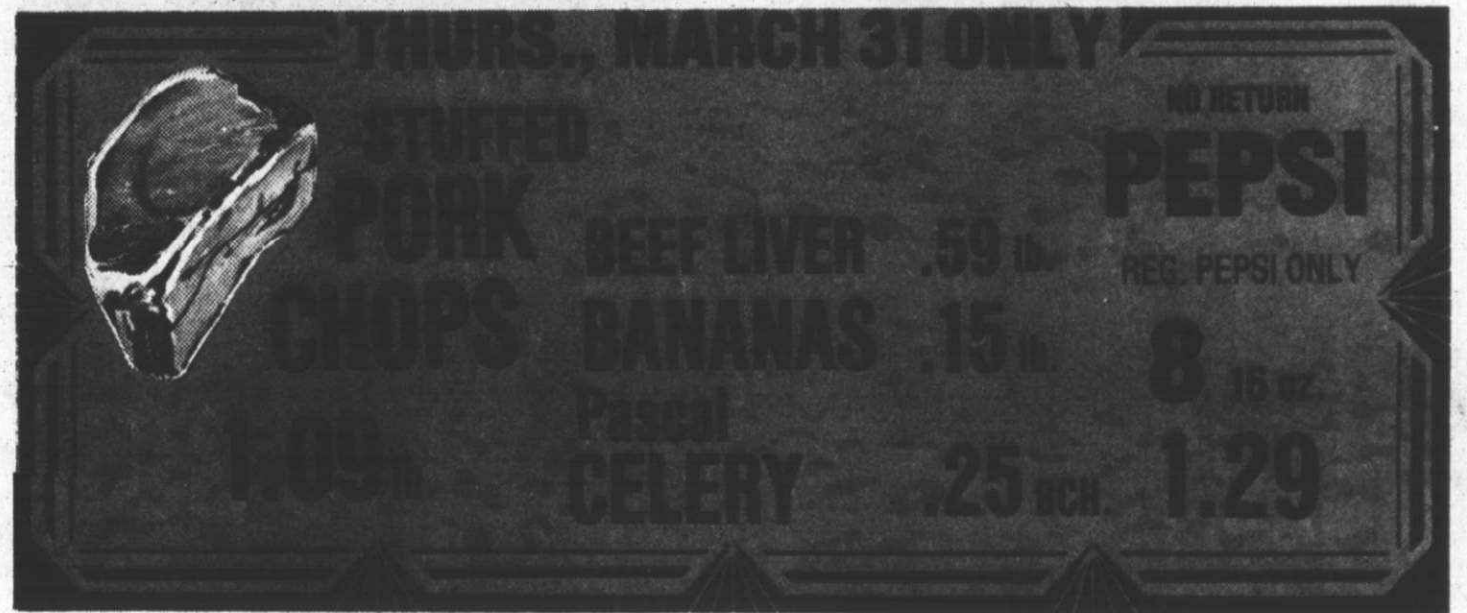
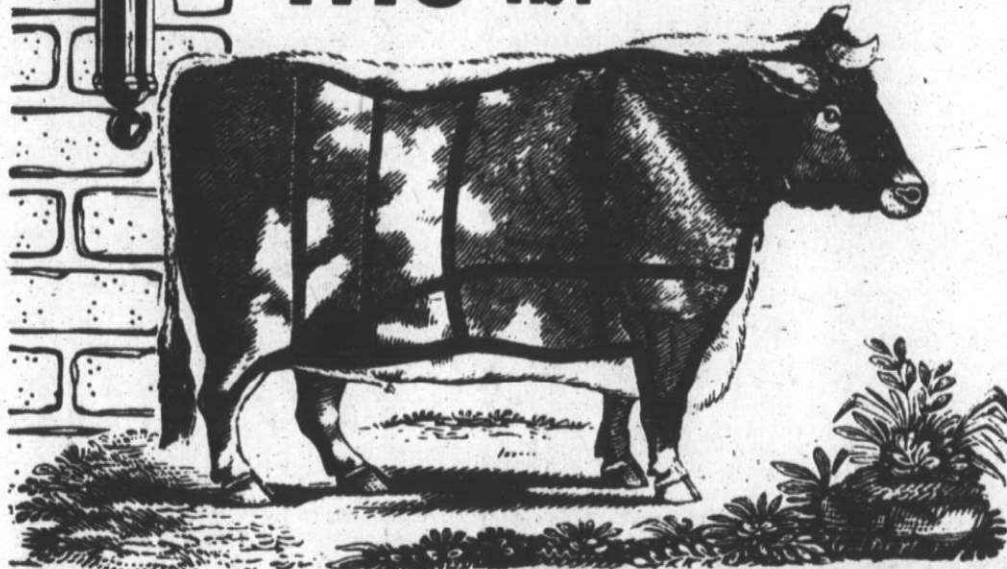

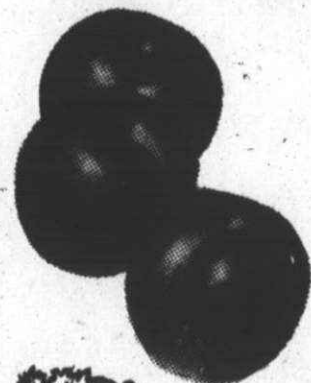

Recent legislation has made it possible for individuals and self-employed persons to establish their own retirement plan through a special savings account called an Individual Retirement Account. We asked DETROIT BANK-er Robert K. Smith to explain this new service.
Who is eligible for an I.R.A.?
"An Individual Retirement Account, or I.R.A., may be opened by any employed or self-employed person not currently covered by any other retirement plan. Even if you are already enrolled in a retirement plan, but have a working spouse who is not, he or she is eligible."
How does an I.R.A. differ from a regular savings account?
"There are important differences. First, all contributions to your I.R.A. are fully tax deductible. What's more, even the interest earned on this account is exempt from income tax until it is withdrawn. And when you finally begin making withdrawals, you pay taxes only on the amount you withdraw each year. Like savings accounts, however, I.R.A.'s offer a range of plans paying annual interest rates from 5-1/2 to 7-1/2 percent and are insured to \$40,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Incidentally, these are the highest interest rates that any bank can pay."
Are there special regulations for I.R.A.'s?
"Yes. Regulations only permit you to save a maximum of \$1,500 a year, or 15% of your annual wages, whichever is less. You can open an Individual Retirement Account with just \$25, then it's up to you when and how much you want to deposit, in amounts of \$25 or more, up to your maximum each year. You can add to your account each payday and when your savings reach \$1,000 or more, you can convert them to 6-year 7-1/2% Investment Certificates; or if you make your annual deposit in one lump sum, you can put it into 6-year 7-1/2% Investment Certificates at that time. The money must remain on deposit at least until you reach age 59-1/2, unless you become permanently disabled.
Should you withdraw prior to that, Federal regulations for Investment Certificates require that you pay substantial penalties on the amount withdrawn, and I.R.A. regulations impose further penalties for premature withdrawals."
Being tax-sheltered, savings in an I.R.A. should accumulate much faster, right?
"Amazingly so. In fact, here is a chart which shows what you could accumulate if you invested \$1,500, before taxes, at the beginning of each year. The first column shows how your interest accumulates with the help of a tax-sheltered I.R.A., the second shows how your interest accumulates without the help of a tax-sheltered I.R.A., and the third shows the difference."

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Quaker State sells tallow?

"Never fill the gasoline reservoir by lamplight."

Those words of caution, still good today, are to be found on page 20 of the owner's guide that came in the tool box of every 1903 Oldsmobile curv-dash runabout.

This is just one gem of advice in old-time car owner's guide books.

Several of the antique booklets were issued at a time when the horse was first being challenged as "King of the Road." It's a convincing measure of automotive progress to compare their contents with the uncomplicated break-in procedures and greatly extended periods between oil changes and other normal service shown in the modern car owner's guide.

Ranking among America's first "do-it-yourself" books, those early auto operating manuals told the buyer "how to run it" as well as "how to fix it."

For example, the proud possessor of a 1902 Cadillac chain-driver runabout was advised: "The best way to lubricate the drive chain after cleaning it is to take about four pounds of beef tallow, about one pound of flake graphite and about one pint of heavy lubricating oil, then heat and stir. When thoroughly melted and mixed, put the cleaned chain in the hot oil."

THE OPERATOR'S manual for the 1915 GMC "Model 49" truck called attention to this useful (standard equipment) feature: "Grooves are provided alongside the radiator so that pieces of cardboard may be slipped in... (to facilitate engine warm-up on cold winter mornings). This truck, incidentally, was the first GM model featuring a windshield as standard equipment and was also the first GM truck in which the driver sat on the left-hand side.

That the advent of tubless tires meant fewer worries for the motorist is borne out by this excerpt from the 1926 Pontiac owner's guide: "A tube, if carried loose in its cardboard container, will be chafed through by jostling about. If carried in the tool box it is likely to be cut by sharp objects and rotted by oil or grease. Spare tubes should be wrapped in cloth or carried in tube bags. Don't hang tubes over nails in the garage. Keep them away from heat or strong light."

This note in heavy type on the front cover of the 1903 Oldsmobile runabout's manual shows it definitely pre-dated the era of enlightened customer relations... Buyers were warned: "KEEP THIS BOOK IN THE TOOL BOX. A new copy will not be furnished unless a satisfactory explanation is given."

But let's assume the owner of the 1903 curv-dash Olds dared to ignore the admonition on

the cover and turned to the first section of the book. Here is where he really begins to get acquainted with his new-fangled machine, and from stern to stern.

THE MANUFACTURER opened his mechanical orientation on this rather disconcerting note: "We prefer that personal instructions be given when it is possible."

However, "Stepping up to the front of the machine we will remove the cushion and lift up the bottom of the seat, which practically exposes the whole of the inside of the machine. (See Fig. 1) etc."

Proceeding into the maintenance section, to "Oiling," we find that in 1903, transmission gears needed "to be filled with oil about once a week, depending on the amount of use."

The operating recommendations and precautions for this pioneer Oldsmobile make some of the most interesting reading in the 73-year-old booklet:

- "Never make a quick turn of the steering lever while the vehicle is running at a high speed; it is liable to cause a bad accident." (Tiller steering, standard equipment on this model, was very responsible.)
- "When nearing the bottom of a hill, apply the speeder to give the motor as great a speed as possible in order to make the next hill." (On the level, the 7 h.p. single-cylinder engine made out OK.)
- "Use emergency hand brake only in case the chain breaks, though it is well to try it occasionally to see that it is in good working order." (This is how the "Emergency Brake" got its name.)
- "Never leave vehicle with motor running; the inevitable small boy and a slight touch of the clutch-lever will cause the vehicle to leave you." (Boys will be boys, even in 1903.)

Some other "Don'ts":
 "Don't take anybody's word for it that your tanks have plenty of gasoline and water and your oil-cup plenty of oil. They may be guessing."
 "Don't imagine that our motor runs well on equal parts of water and gasoline. It's a mistake."
 "Don't make 'improvements' without writing the factory. We know all about many of those improvements and can advise you."

And, lastly, this very sensible bit of 1903 advice for the "break-in" period:

"Don't drive your Oldsmobile 100 miles the first day. You wouldn't drive a green horse 10 miles till you were acquainted with him. Do you know more about a gasoline motor than you do a horse?"
