## PUDs under fire after investigation

All planned unit developments (PUDs) in Canton will be under close scrutiny in the coming months in the wake of an investigation by township ordinance officer Bruce Phillips which revealed one developer has failed to meet the obligations of his contract.

Phillips and Supervisor Robert Greenstein have charged Dominic Mocer, developer of the Stonegate subdivision at Lilley and Palmer, with breaking several stipulations in his contract with the township.

Greenstein said he feared that other contracts were being breached, and he has instructed Phillips to look into other PUDs. There are now 18 PUDs in the township comprising 2,878 acres, or about 12 percent of the land in Canton.

When completed, there will be 6,704 homes in the 18 PUDs.

Unlike normal subdivisions, PUDs are not subject to zoning rules and regulations. All guidelines and restrictions are part of a contract the township and the land developer sign.

To alter the PUD agreement, both the builder or developer and the township must agree and sign an amendment.

"THE PROBLEM is that no one has ever really been assigned the job of keeping an eye on the PUDs," Greenstein said.

"No one had the ultimate responsibility of seeing that what was supposed to be done was. Every department in the township had its own little bailiwick, but no one was doing an overview."

"We intend to see that changes."

The investigation of Stonegate began several months ago when homeowners complained of sloppy work and poor service, Phillips explained, and it was at that time he learned that none of the homeowners was aware of the park association.

Each PUD has provisions for a homeowners association that is charged with taking care of the park space. Homeowners are assessed annually for park improvements, and the association determines what improvements and maintenance will be undertaken.

According to Greenstein, one of the major advantages of the PUD—and there are few, he argues—is that the developer must build a park for the homeowners. The size and number of the parks are determined in the contract.

IN RETURN FOR the open space, there is usually a trade-off, and the builder is allowed higher zonings, such as multiple and commercial, in the PUD.

Phillips' investigation into Stonegate revealed that homeowners were unaware of the association, despite being assessed \$25 at closing time.

He also discovered several other violations of the contract.

\*Parks were not graded and seeded prior to construction of homes.

\*Sidewalks along the perimeter of the subdivision were not installed prior to the construction of homes.

\*Maps were not displayed in the sales offices showing that some homes would abut commercial and multiple property.

The major complaint, however, was that homeowners were not aware of the association and therefore were not present at its annual meetings.

At the most recent meeting, about a year ago, in the absence of any homeowners, the association elected officers. Mocer, his attorney, Gil Franklin, and one of the builders in the development, Manuel Dembs, were elected to the board of directors of the association.

After their election, they agreed to charge five cents a month retroactively for the parks to each lot owner.

Assessments went back to the time the first house was sold in November 1973, in accordance with the contract.

THE CONTRACT, however, stipulates every lot owner must pay his share for the park—and at the beginning of the subdivision, most of the lots were owned by

the land developer and the builders to whom he sold the lots.

Greenstein said homeowners purchasing lots and houses in the subdivision had been charged \$25 at the time each sale was closed. But now the developer and builders and all new homeowners will only be charged 60 cents a year, following the vote by the board of directors of the park association.

The upshot, said Greenstein, is that the homeowners have been "ripped off for more than \$20,000 by the developers and builders."

Greenstein charged further that retroactive assessments are illegal and that assessments should have been determined and levied one month after the first sale was made in the subdivision, according to the PUD contract.

Greenstein added that none of the homeowners in the subdivision have been notified of the annual meetings of the park association since 1973.

Franklin said that, since there were so few occupied homes, he didn't believe it necessary to contact the subdivision residents.

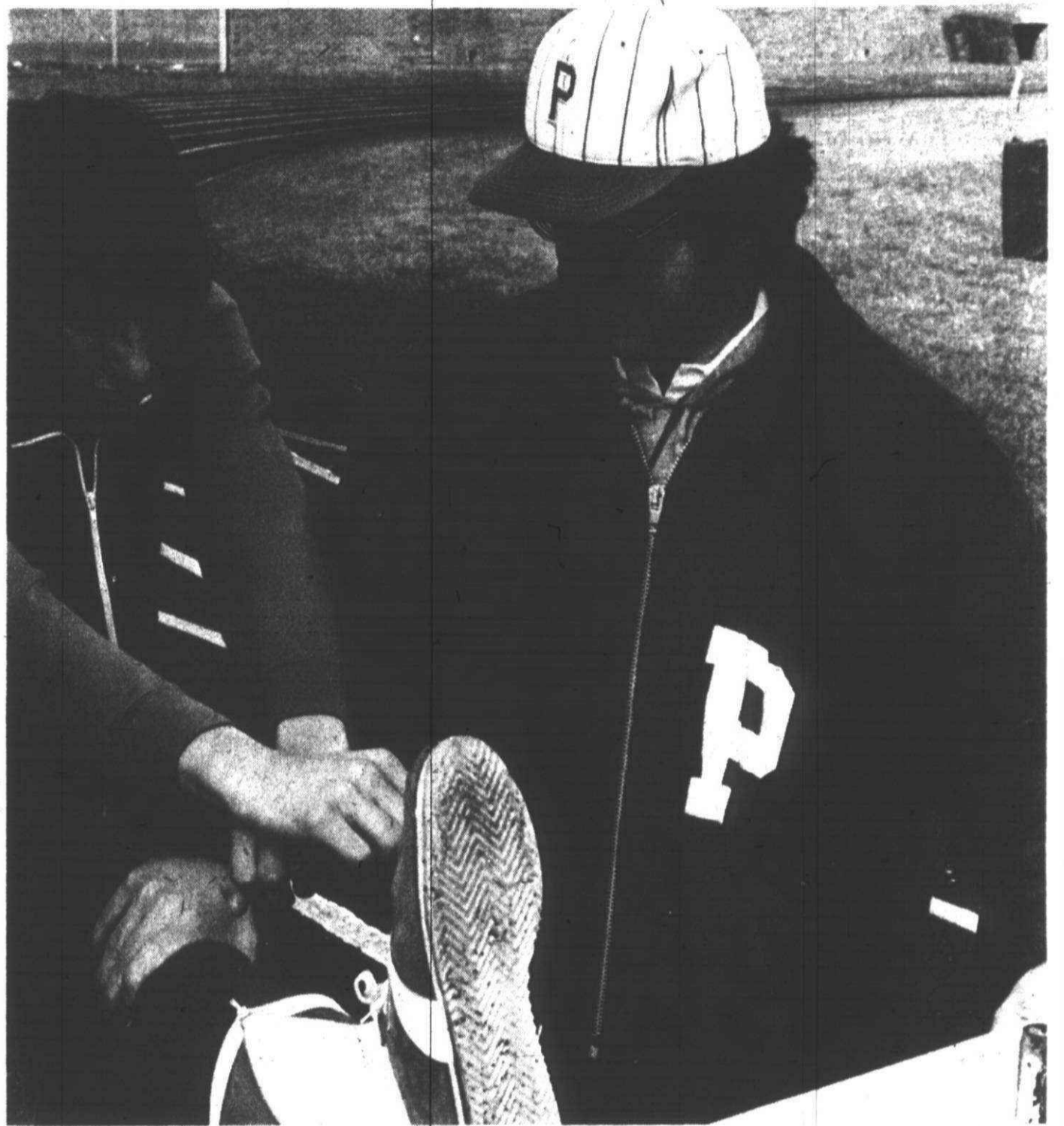
"IT DIDN'T SEEM to make sense. According to our records, there were only five homes sold when we held our last meeting. I suppose we should have contacted them, but, under the circumstances, it doesn't seem to make any difference."

Franklin added that he was unaware of the \$25 assessed buyers at the closing of the sales. "It's the first I heard of it," he responded when questioned by the Observer & Eccentric. The builder takes care of that, not us."

As for the 60-cent annual assessments, Franklin said it was his experience that larger levies were unnecessary.

"The park is graded and seeded by the developer. Why should they need so much money for a set of swings or a baseball diamond?"

## Will voters buy fire assessment district?

For the third time in two years, the question of increased fire protection will be before the voters of Canton Township.

But rather than voting May 18 on a specified amount of millage for the construction and staffing of a second fire station, residents will be asked to approve a special assessment district for the purpose of additional fire protection.

That district will include the entire town-

ship, and following a pair of public hearings, the township board will decide on the amount of millage to levy.

Thereafter, each year, the board will determine how much to levy after holding two public hearings.

Under the Michigan law that provides for such a procedure, PA 33 of 1951, the board can levy up to 10 mills without voter approval.

BOARD MEMBERS in favor of going

the special assessment route argued last Monday that they lacked the necessary information to ask for a specific amount of millage.

They said it might be better to try for the special assessment district, and then, when all the reports are in, go before the public at the two hearings and ask for an exact amount.

Much of that determination will depend on two reports board members have not received.

The board received a report from the Michigan Fire Chief's Association that suggests a second station is needed in the township, but two studies, one from the Michigan Office of Insurance Services, and one from the Citizen's Advisory Council (CAC), are still outstanding.

The CAC report is expected within the next few weeks, but the insurance report may be some time coming.

An earlier preliminary report issued by the CAC estimated that one mill over 10 years would be sufficient to build and staff a second and eventually a third station.

But members of the administration who pushed for the special assessment said they preferred to wait until all the information is available before asking for a specific amount of millage.

IN THE WAKE of two defeats in 1974, they were understandably apprehensive about asking the voters for a certain amount of money without having the necessary evidence to support a request.

Nonetheless, there was a feeling of urgency about getting the issue before the voters as soon as possible so the fire station could be started this year.

Apparently, there is enough money in the township coffers to construct a second fire station this year if the money can be recouped at the end of the year with an additional mill or two.

In order to collect any additional levy this year, the tax must be on the rolls in August, and township treasurer Carl Parsell said he feared that a millage election in August would be "cutting it too close."

BUT JUST HOW marketable is a special assessment district?

Voters will not know how much money they are approving when they go to the polls; and even though there will be two public hearings, the final decision will lie with the board.

Unlike a specified millage, there is no time limit on the special assessment district. How long the extra millage is levied depends on the township board.

Conversely, Supervisor Robert Greenstein argues that if the board members attempt to levy too much, voters can remove them from office in November.

But what will voters do next year when there is no election to hold over the board members' heads? That might well be a concern.

Greenstein also claims that being able to

review the amount each year is a plus for the voters because they can look at the situation annually, and they can hold their officials accountable.

Once passed, however, the board cannot be held accountable for a specified millage. "With the assessment district, we have to justify our expenditures every year," the supervisor argued.

PERHAPS THE KEY to any vote depends on the faith the people have in their elected officials.

As Clerk John Flodin said, "A responsible board will assess only the monies needed."

The question then becomes, "Do the voters of Canton think their board will be reasonable?"

Flodin later added that the board had better give the people an indication of the limit they intend to ask for when reports are in. "We have to say something like 'We won't go over 1.5 or 2 mills,'" the clerk explained, "or I don't think this thing has much of a chance."

Already, because of lack of information, there has been some discrepancy over the estimates of what is needed. While the CAC has suggested one mill in its preliminary report, the township administration has estimated 1.5 mills is probably closer to the actual need.

Regardless of the amount the board eventually decides on, the fact that it is the board and not the people making the final decision in the amount has probably made the special assessment district less palatable to the voters than a specific millage.

Some trustees have refused to vote for payment of the bills in recent weeks, charging that bidding procedures are not

being followed and that money is being spent improperly.

HOW FAR that feeling trickles down to the voters should have considerable impact on the May 18 vote.

Perhaps it might have been wiser for the board to ask for a specific millage—maybe as high as 2 mills—with the understanding that if less is needed, less will be collected.

Just how marketable the special assessment district is remains to be seen—and on May 18 the answers should be available.

And if the people vote yes, with the knowledge that in most instances the Greenstein administration has four votes on a board of seven, that affirmation could mean more than the people desire for additional fire protection.

It could be interpreted as a vote of confidence for the present administration.

## Gridders back coach

Plymouth Canton football players have given their unanimous support to the high school's varsity football coach, Jim Muneio, and his three assistants, all of whom resigned last Monday.

Although the resignations had not been submitted in writing to the Plymouth Board of Education as of Friday, the coaching staff and the board are scheduled to meet in a closed session preceding the Monday, April 12, school board meeting.

The resignations were prompted by pressure during the last two years from school board trustee Joe Gray and parents of the players.

Junior John Young, next fall's team captain, organized a meeting of the players Friday morning to discuss the resignations. Included in the meeting were players in all grades who will be participating in the Canton football program in the upcoming season.

OF 48 STUDENTS attending the meeting, there were 12 returning lettermen from the 1975 season and 25 varsity candidates. All of this year's seniors were excluded from the meeting, according to Young.

"The fact that the varsity coaches resigned was the main reason for the meeting," said Young. He added that there was a lack of communication among the players concerning why the coaching staff resigned.

"Most of the team members I talked to said they didn't want the coaches out, so I called the meeting to see if all the kids possibly could get behind the coaches," explained Young.

"Some of the players weren't sure of what was going on. They were making up their minds on hearsay, but after we dis-

cussed the problem as a team, everything was cleared up," said Young.

DURING THE MEETING, players who had not supported Muneio as a coach listened while differing views of the problem were presented. Although some disagreed with the way Muneio ran the ballclub, team representatives said all members would play for him.

"After everyone had discussed the problem, there wasn't a person who wouldn't play for Mr. Muneio," Young said.

The team effort was gratifying to Muneio. "I appreciated their efforts in what they are doing at this time. My only concern is the effect it has on the reactions of people," said Muneio.

Canton assistant coach Jim Jarvey wanted some time to think about the player's mandate.

"IT'S TOO IMPORTANT a thing to make a quick decision on, there's some things we (coaching staff) are going to

have to sit down and talk about," he said.

Coach Muneio said he probably would be turning in his resignation sometime this week. One member of the varsity staff reportedly has submitted his reason for stepping down in writing.

If a written resignation is submitted by Muneio this week, follow-up resignations are expected from junior varsity coaches Tom Garrett and Russ Carlson, plus freshmen coaches Sam Daas and John Campbell in addition to varsity assistants.

Muneio has made it his policy not to approach other coaches to solicit their support, letting other coaches make their own decisions and thus winning the approval of the Canton coaching staff.

"This man is dedicated to working with kids and getting involved in the program," said Garrett. "JV and frosh ballplayers are coming into the varsity system. That really makes a difference in the program; however, I am not planning on coaching next season."

# What profiteth a man...

## To gain world and lose his sole?

Little Pete Mucci, the popular shoe repairman who has been holding forth in his shop at the central parking lot for the past 15 years, heaved a heavy sigh as he recounted the many changes that have been made in his profession in the past decade.

There was a day when Pete and his fellow cobblers, spent most of their time cutting soles from large pieces of leather and then either nailing them or sewing them on the shoe top. But no more.

"Leather is too expensive," Pete said, while shaking his head in disbelief that any commodity could rise that much. "I

used to charge only \$2.75 to put new soles and heels on shoes; not any more. The price now has jumped almost four times."

PETE ALSO noted that the high price of leather has had a major effect on the show business—even at the factory.

"Factory now uses crepe and rubber, and now we don't nail and sew any more. Now we vulcanize with special cement.

"It's lots different than it used to be, and people don't get shoes repaired much anymore. When the crepe goes, the shoe goes, too."

Pete hates to think of the future—insofar as shoe repairing is concerned.

"There used to a lot of us," he pointed out, "but many quit because prices got too high for profit. They can make more working in the factory."

Pete called attention not only to the high wages in the shops but to the many fringe benefits now available that a cobbler can't get on his own.

Pete, who was born in Italy, was 20 years old when he came to America with his parents who settled in Detroit. He had a shoe repair shop there for awhile and still smiles when he recalls the reason he came to Plymouth.

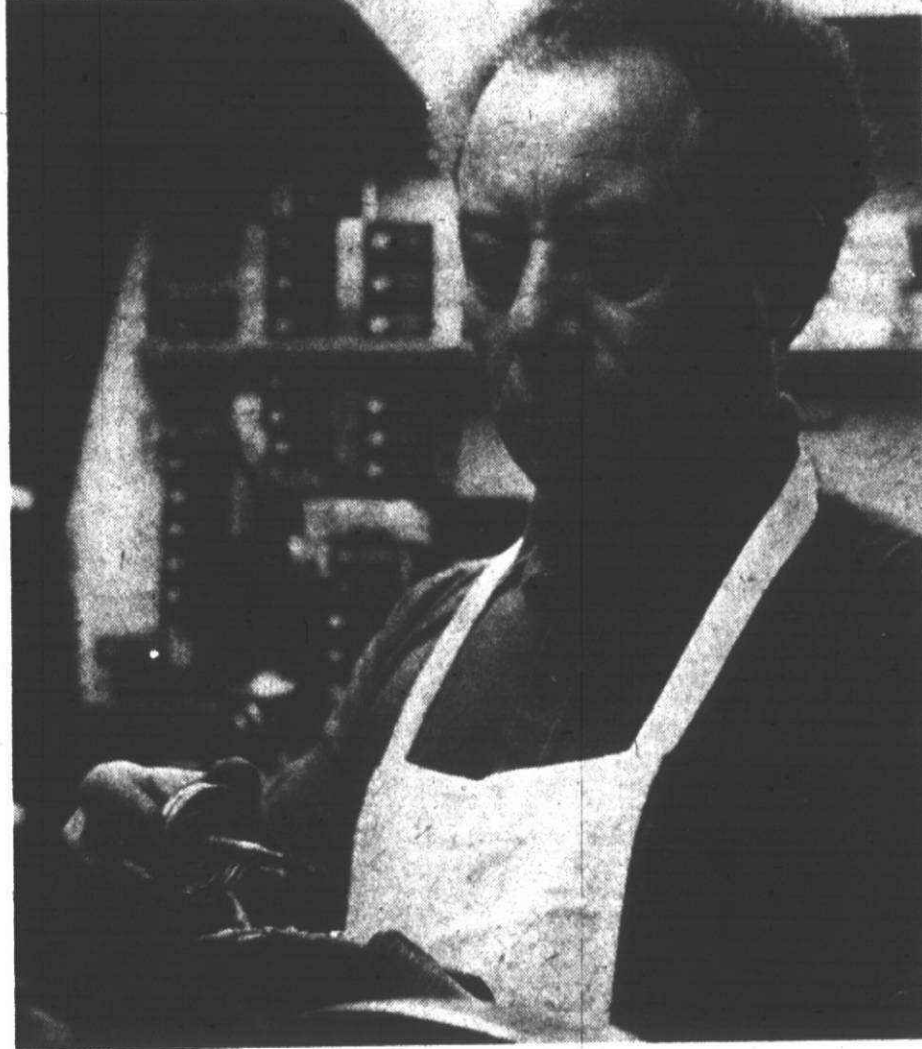
"One day a salesman came to our shop

and told me about Plymouth and that it looked like a good place to open up a shop. So I came and have been here 15 years."

With a smile, Pete asked, "Do you know what became of the salesman? He's retired and I'm still here."

Pete says Plymouth and its people have been good to him, but he doesn't know how much longer he can stick it out with the high price of leather and the changes in the shoe repair business.

While he doesn't admit it, he fears that cobblers are on the way to oblivion along with the blacksmiths of another day.

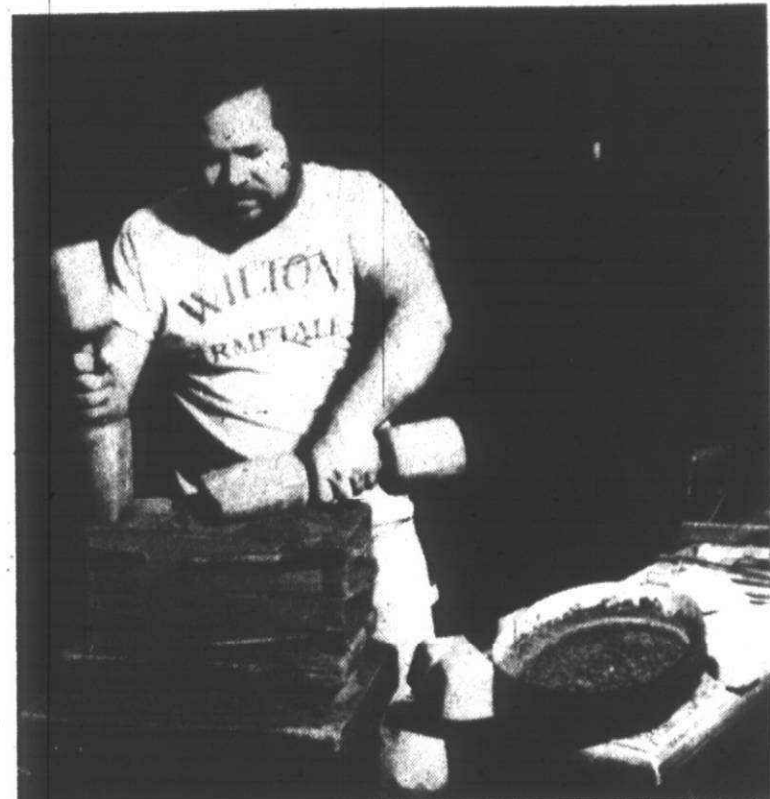


Pete Mucci works on a pair of soles while talking about the many changes in the profession of a cobbler. (Staff photo by Garry Caskey)

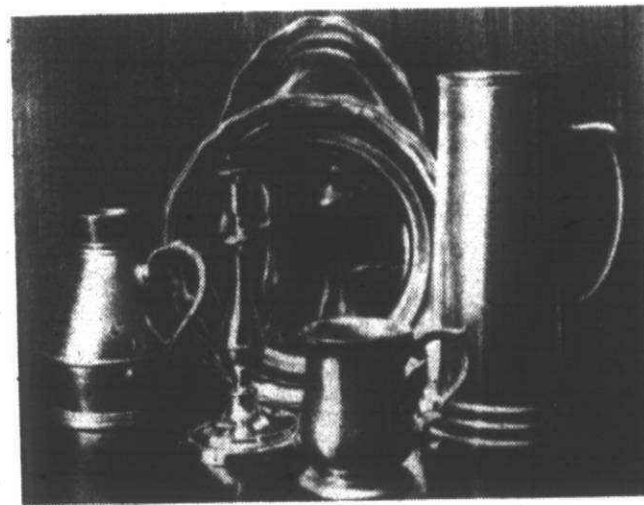

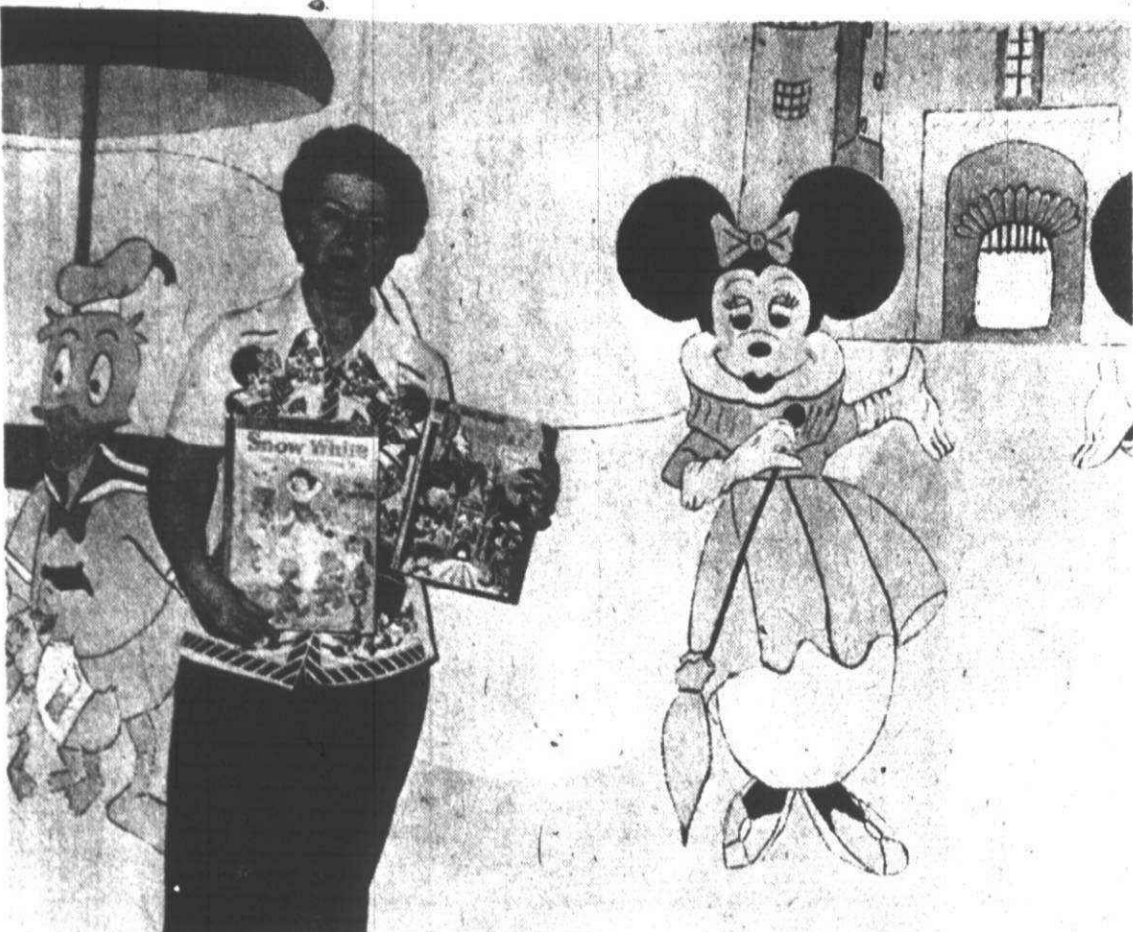

## Board approves new water rate structure

Following action by the township board Monday night, the majority of water users in Canton will be paying less on their quarterly bills.

Using the recommendations of the their auditing firm, Seidman and Seidman, members of the township board approved a rate restructuring that will benefit 56 per cent of the users in the township.

Large users, primarily commercial, however, can expect an increase in their bills, although the increase will not exceed eight per cent.

The new system features a two-tier structure, with water customers charged one amount per 1,000 gallons for the first 100,000, and a smaller rate per 1,000 for anything above the first 100,000.

Large users will be billed monthly as in the past, while smaller users, both residential and commercial, will be billed quarterly.

Under the old rate structure, commercial accounts, regardless of size, were billed monthly under a five-tier rate structure that resulted in very large users re-

ceiving water from the township for less than Canton paid.

WHILE BOARD members approved Seidman and Seidman's recommendations, they tacked on a six per cent increase to defray the eventual costs of depreciation on the system.

The maximum increase in rates under Seidman's recommendations is eight per cent without the additional six per cent passed by the board, but tap in rates for new customers will rise dramatically.

Capital charges will increase anywhere from \$45 per customer to \$350 depending on the size of pipe used.

Without the additional six per cent charge, the new rates as approved are:

- 54 cents per 1,000 gallons with a proposed 39 per cent increase from Detroit.
- 65 cents per 1,000 gallons without a 39 per cent increase from Detroit.
- For large users, water will cost 27 cents per 1,000 for usage above 100,000 gallons without the proposed increase and 37 cents per 1,000 with it.
- Sewer use will cost 35 cents per 1,000

gallons of water used with or without the Detroit increase for the first 100,000 gallons.

•Above 100,000 gallons of water used, sewer will cost 16 cents per 1,000 gallons with or without the Detroit increase.

UNDER THE OLD rate structure, sewer rates were computed on the basis of water usage with customers billed 150 per cent of their water usage to determine a sewer charge.

The new rate structure will also feature a lower minimum amount of 5,000 gallons per billing period.

Under the old system, the minimum charge per billing period was 10,000 gallons regardless of usage.

According to Seidman and Seidman, the new rate structure is more equitable, with all users paying their fair share of the operational and amortization cost of the sewer and water system.

Although there was some discussion about tacking on the additional six per cent charge, the board passed the measure 6-1 with trustee board Schwall dissenting.

after Bob Wiar, Seidman and Seidman representative, explained that some money was needed to cover depreciation of the system in later years.

Parsell, who asked for the six per cent,

argued that a new rate increase would be necessary within a few years without the additional six per cent and that he said "would be intolerable."

"We have to have a secure system," the

treasurer added, "and unless we charge an extra six per cent, we'll be at a break-even point. In later years, when parts of the system need to be replaced, we won't have the money available."

"Our experience in Pickwick was that they had so much money they didn't know what to do with it. When the residents get control of the homeowner's association and they want to assess themselves a lot of money, that's their business."

Greenstein said he will mail a letter to Franklin and Mocerri and give them 30 days to respond to the township's demands.

"WE HAVE THREE options open to us," he said. "We can stop occupancy permits, but that may hurt the people as well; we can stop all building permits; or we can void the PUD contract by declaratory judgement in court."

"I've talked to our attorney, Bert Burgoyne, and he says the contract is like any other, and if they violate it, we can void it."

"But we really don't want to put them out of business. Shutting them down is like hitting a giant with a howitzer. We'd rather see that they correct the situation."

"But if they don't respond, we will be forced to take some action."

The broader concern is the other 17 PUDs, with the exception of Carriage Hills and Windsor Park which are for the most part completed.

"All the other PUDs may be in the same position, and we intend to check them out."

"We've been dealing with Canton for a number of years," Franklin said, "and I

don't know why they don't come to us first to see if we can work out the problem rather than making accusations in the papers."

"We're willing to work things out, but instead they seem to want to make this an adversary proceeding."

Franklin added that while Mocerri's name was on the PUD contract, the responsibility to meet the terms of the contract had, in many instances, been passed on to the builders to whom Mocerri had sold the lots. "We have no control over what they do," he said.

Stonagate homeowners will be meeting in the future with Franklin, Mocerri, the builders and township officials to determine a course of action.

## Sketchbook available at museum

The first edition of "The Heritage of the Plymouth Area," a collection of sketches created by members of the Three Cities Art Club, will be available for the first time Sunday, April 4, in the Plymouth Historical Museum.

To commemorate the occasion, the artists whose works appear in the book will be honored by a short reception and an exhibit of original sketches appearing in the book.

Those purchasing the books on Sunday will have an opportunity to meet the artists and have their copies autographed. All proceeds from the sale of the sketchbook will go to the museum.

By the time the project was completed, it had become a total community effort, according to Lorene Vives, project coordinator.

The artists contributed their art as a bi-centennial project to aid the museum.

They contacted area residents for old photos showing scenes which have disappeared from the Plymouth landscape. They also used the collections of the museum and archives as a source for their sketches.

Art suppliers, gallery owners, and other businesspeople contributed financial support. The Frame Works in Forest Place Mall donated the matting for the exhibit in the museum.

## Students fight smoke

Some 26 students from Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton high schools have signed up to spread the gospel of anti-smoking to elementary pupils throughout the Plymouth Community School District.

The students have already had two workshops and have contacted elementary school principals who have promised cooperation. The anti-smoking program is expected to get under way within three weeks when the students receive their instructional material.

THE STUDENTS AT the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park are getting involved in a program called the Bentley Project—an effort which began in Livonia Bentley High and is now being implemented statewide with assistance from Schoolcraft College and the American Cancer Society.

Jerry Barker, area coordinator and director of student affairs at the CEP, has helped coordinate the program here, with assistance from Bentley students. Acting as advisors have been Tom Crowley, director of respirator therapy at Sinai Hospital in Detroit, Linda McNeal, volunteer youth chairman for Plymouth Canton High, and Valerie Lafferty of the Wayne County Chapter of the Michigan Cancer Society.

From its Bentley beginnings, the program has spread to Stevens and Churchill high schools in Livonia, Redford Union High, Crestwood High in Dearborn Heights, Northville High, the Wayne-Westland School District, and now to Salem and Canton high schools.

Michigan to help pupils decide not to smoke.

Part of the funding to help spread the program across the state comes from \$2,645 contributed by the Schoolcraft campus Jaycee group.

AS THE BENTLEY project works, members of the teams are chosen at the beginning of each school year.

After training, they make scheduled visits to every elementary school in the district once during the year, sending two students into every classroom.

"We tell the kids all the good things about not smoking," explains Jill Ochalek, third member of her family on the Bentley team. "We show them we are people who are so involved in activities at school, and through other organizations, that we don't have to smoke. And we seem to get a lot of response. The children write us letters and send us pictures, and we hope we are getting across the message."

## Smith sponsors law on legals

State Rep. Roy Smith (R-Ann Arbor), whose district includes Plymouth, has sponsored a bill aimed at reducing the publication expense of Michigan's 83 counties.

The measure, HB 4378, eliminates the requirement that counties publish an itemized report of receipts and expenditures in local newspapers.

Counties are the only unit of government required to do this because of an antiquated statute, says Smith. "In fact, this law is so conflicting, it requires counties without auditors to publish and those with auditors aren't required to publish."

If it becomes law, Washtenaw County is expected to save some \$14,000 annually in

MEMBERSHIP ON the team is a prestige thing at Bentley.

During the third year of the program, there were some 70 applications for a dozen openings.

Principal Zack comments: "These are the kind of people with whom the younger children can identify, and they are the ones who can offer an example to resist the peer pressure to smoke."

"This is the only sustained, aggressive effort against smoking, and it's the only kind of effort that can work. It's obvious, from the number of people who do smoke despite medical warnings, that if you wait until kids are in junior high or high school, it's too late."

Shirley Romeyn, public education director of the American Cancer Society, adds: "Young people aren't worried about the medical aspects of smoking. That danger is a long way off. That's why we hardly ever send physicians into classrooms. An older student, obviously enjoying life without smoking, can say it much better."

publication expense. Another 36 counties which responded to a questionnaire sent by Smith, said they would save \$142,000 annually.

"Most county officials have felt for a long time, and I agree with them, that publishing that long list of itemized receipts and expenditures every month was an unnecessary expense because most of it was so complicated that it would take a trained accountant to figure out. # Aid on the way for W-W

Wayne-Westland Supt. Timothy Dyer is hoping ground-breaking ceremonies for a new vocational education center will be held at this time next year.  
 Dyer received word last week that Gov. William Milliken has signed into law a bill permitting districts with student populations of 18,000 to participate on a 50-50 basis with the state for both the constructing and equipping of a vocational education center. Wayne-Westland, which now qualifies, is anticipating funding of up to \$1.5 million from the state.  
 Similar legislation has permitted districts of 30,000 students to participate in a matching fund program for vocational education, but only four districts in the state qualified.

**IN ORDER TO RAISE** the matching funds for the center, Dyer said the district will probably seek bonding approval from the residents this fall or winter.  
 "We definitely will not be holding a bond election in June," Dyer said. "It would be most prudent if we waited."  
 "There are a number of steps we have to go through before we are officially designated as a vocational education area. And that takes time."  
 "If we're successful with a bond proposal, I'd expect a hole being dug this time next year."

Dyer said the center would be built independently of any existing school buildings, but possibly would be on a present school site.  
 "We don't have a lot of property but we do own some. There is property at both the John Glenn and the Wayne Memorial sites, and we have vacant land between the schools."  
**WITH THE VOCATIONAL** center, the district will expand its present programs and introduce programs it has not been able to offer before.  
 "With a student population in which the vast majority of our students do not go on to higher education, vocational education has to be a major thrust for this district," Dyer said.  
 "It's our responsibility to train our young men and women for the world of work, to give them skills and entry level ability that will permit them to secure jobs in today's tight economic market."  
 Dyer said the district would be able to upgrade present programs such as its auto and bump shop classes and child care and nursing classes.  
 "We just don't have the room to teach these programs the way we'd like to see them being taught."  
 Other classes which the district would be able to offer are welding, large and small appliance repair, commercial art, dental technology and graphic arts.  
 "These are very marketable areas that we haven't been able to get into," Dyer said.

**ASIDE FROM THE** vocational education aspects, Dyer sees some overlapping benefits for the district.  
 "The program offered after the center is built will be for high school students and adults."  
 "We hope to be operating a heavily expanded night school program."  
 Not only will more of the community be able to use the facilities, which would

make it a more attractive bond package when the district goes to the polls, but the district also has been able to maintain a steady enrollment thanks to its night school programs.  
 "We feel we'll be losing about 400 students in the elementary grades, but we hope to make that up in adult education," Dyer said.  
 Because of its "aggressive" adult programming, the district counts 1,000 adults as full-time students. At present, most school officials contend that present school aid formulas discriminate against districts with declining enrollments.

**SPECIAL EDUCATION** students would also be able to make use of the vocational center, according to the Dyer plan.

"If we have vocational education equipment that can be used for special ed students, we would be eligible for a direct grant from the federal government," Dyer said.  
 "It would be possible for us to have machinery installed which could be lowered for wheelchair students. The equipment would be expensive but there would be an overlapping of the vocational and special ed areas."  
 When the district seeks bonding approval, Dyer said many of the special education components of the two defeated bond issues would be included.  
 "We have never felt that the ingredients of our bond elections have been the real problem," Dyer said.

# Easter's date depends on the moon

Easter — that moveable religious holiday whose date varies according to the vicissitudes of the moon—this year will fall on April 18, notes University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh.

"Easter is designated as the Sunday following the first full moon that comes after the vernal equinox, which this year was March 20," Prof. Losh explains.

She points out that in 325 A.D., church fathers gathered in Nicaea and decreed this for establishing the date of Easter. She adds that one reason for the method might be to afford bright moonlight for safe pilgrimages attendant upon Easter's celebration.

"Because of the dependence on the phases of the moon, however, the date

fluctuates widely," she continues. "In 1943, for example, Easter came on the latest date possible, April 25; that won't happen again until 2038. But March 24 is the most unusual date, its occurrence in 1940 being only the second since the Gregorian calendar reform of 1582 — and there won't be another March 24 Easter until 2391."

THE U-M astronomer says one of the most ancient and famous starfigures, Hercules, can be spotted in April. Resembling a giant letter "H", it can be found in the northeast between Corona Borealis and the bright star, Vega.

"To help in identifying Hercules, look for four stars that form a keystone," she says. "This keystone contains the great

globular star cluster, a fine telescopic object." Visible to the naked eye as a dim, misty patch of diffused light, the cluster is about 35,000 light-years from our planet and is believed to contain as many as 500,000 stars as bright as our sun.

To the south are the constellation Hydra the Water Snake and Corvus the Crow.

"Hydra, the longest constellation in the sky, sprawls some 90 degrees across the south below Virgo and Leo," Prof. Losh says. "It is closely connected to Hercules in that, according to legend, he is trying to slay this terrible creature." The brightest star in Hydra is Alphard, the "Solitary One." Orange in color and alone in its portion of the heavens, Alphard can be easily located in the heart of the reptile, she says.

CLIMBING IN the southeast is the "striking little lopsided figure, Corvus," she notes. "Composed of five stars, three of which are very bright, Corvus is supposedly pecking away at Hydra."

April is also the time of year to see the zodiacal light, she comments.

"This faint triangle of light may be seen, if you're lucky, in the west after sunset on a clear, moonless night," she says. "It is called zodiacal light because it follows the path of the ecliptic and passes through zodiacal constellations." Broad at the base, the light tapers into darkness toward the zenith. It is believed to be sunlight reflected by interplanetary dust concentrated most heavily in the plane of the ecliptic.

Of all the planets, Prof. Losh says, Mars and Saturn are the easiest to observe in April. Both are found slightly west of the meridian at sunset and will shine in the western sky until around midnight. East of Mars, Saturn is somewhat brighter than the red planet.

## Tax tables are often misused

Many taxpayers are making errors in their 1975 income tax returns by failing to follow a tax table which continues to a subsequent page, according to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

R.L. Plate, IRS district director for Michigan, said the problem involves taxpayers who use the tax tables provided for persons with incomes under \$15,000 who do not itemize deductions. These people are overlooking the tax table that may continue to another page.

For example, in the tax tables included in the 1975 Form 1040-A instructions, most of tax table four appears on page 12, but the last part of table four appears on page 13 along with all of tax table five. Taxpayers using table four with an income between \$14,500 and \$15,000 would have to consult the top of page 13 to determine their tax.

"In skipping to the next page," said Plate, "some taxpayers are overlooking the continuation of the same tax table and are figuring their tax liability from the next tax table, resulting in an incorrect tax."

When an error is discovered, the IRS must contact the individual which, in turn, causes processing delays and unnecessary inconvenience to the taxpayer.

# Stempien will run for Congress seat

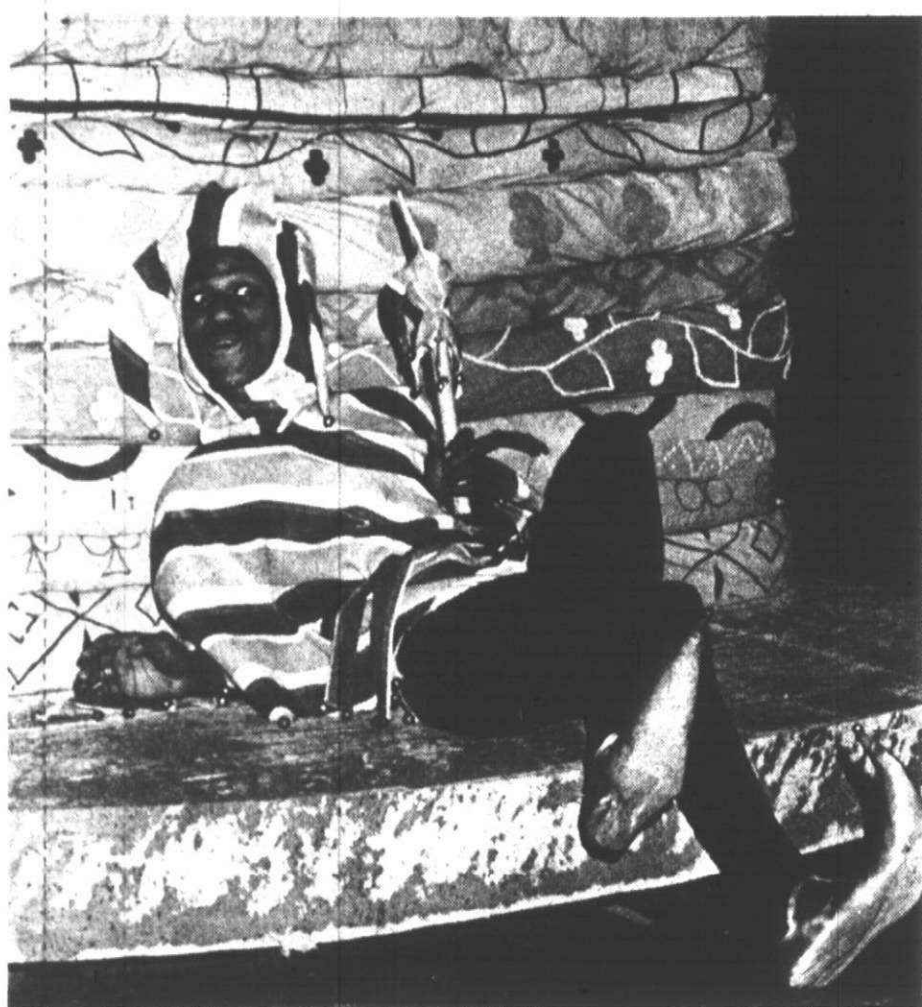

News comes that Sir Harry has found a contender and the royal entourage awaits her arrival in the courtyard. Princess Winnifred (Kathi VanAernum) makes an impressive entrance—dripping wet. "Actually," she informs the astonished group, "I swam the moat."

Through a series of strange and funny incidents, we are led to a happy ending. The queen is punished, the lovers are united, and Winnifred at last falls asleep as the company reminds us that: "You can recognize a lady by her elegant air, but a genuine princess is exceedingly rare."

Each time she did, there was a snicker among the students. But as the years wore on, The Stroller has witnessed the truth of the remark. And in many cases, it was a rather insignificant thing at the time that changed men's lives. In fact it was a rather small thing—the misspelling of a word—that played a part in his own career.

When he was about to set out on his own, not knowing exactly what he wanted to do, The Stroller took heart with an announcement that the postal system was planning to install home-delivery service and that an examination was to be held to select the mail carriers.

The announcement carried the interesting news that the successful carriers would have the opportunity to work their way up the promotional ladder and that, after so many years, they could retire for life on a pension.

What could be more enticing than that? THE STROLLER who was head of his class until he was forced to leave school

because of economic conditions, envisioned a bright future and his days of retirement in his little home town.

No competitor was more confident than he on the morning of the examination. He looked over the candidates and felt that he could beat any of them in any sort of competitive examination.

With Tom Fehnel, an old-time Pennsylvania Dutchman with a heavy dutch accent, in charge of the examination, it didn't seem difficult.

In less than an hour, The Stroller was the first one finished, and when he left it seemed all the others were struggling.

He was certain he would be the winner. But several weeks went by and there was no announcement of results. Finally, he could wait no longer and appealed to the postal officials for the verdict.

"You didn't win," the young lady in the office stated.

The Stroller couldn't believe it. He asked to see the papers to learn where he had failed.

"You missed in spelling," he was told.

That seemed odd because he had won many a spelling bee. But sure enough, he missed on the word "besiege." Because of the examiner's strong Dutch accent and the fact that the Dutch don't pronounce hard Gs, The Stroller thought the given

word was beseech. He spelled it that way. And on that little thing, his vision of a post-carrier and eventual retirement was blasted.

Years later, shortly after he began his stroll along the river of printers' ink, The Stroller's life was given a new turn when he had the privilege of meeting the late Edgar A. Guest, renowned Free Press poet. He was on a lecture tour and stopped off in our little town. And out of our short conversation came an invitation for The Stroller to join the Free Press sports staff. He accepted, and soon was on the way to a colorful career. It was just a short conversation, but it was the turning point in The Stroller's life.

Then there was the case of J. Fred Lawton, the perennial sophomore at the University of Michigan. He became one of the country's outstanding insurance men, all because of a speech he made at a Liberty Bond drive during World War I.

One of his listeners was J. L. Hudson, head of the famed department store. So impressed was he that he invited J. Fred to write all Hudson insurance. He did so until the day he died. It helped him write more than \$1 million of life insurance each year. All because he made a speech at the right time.

So, the "old maid school teacher" was right. It is the little things that count.

The society will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the Historical Museum. Guest speaker will be Sandy Hicks of the University of Michigan Botanical Gardens, whose subject will be the use of herbs down through the years.

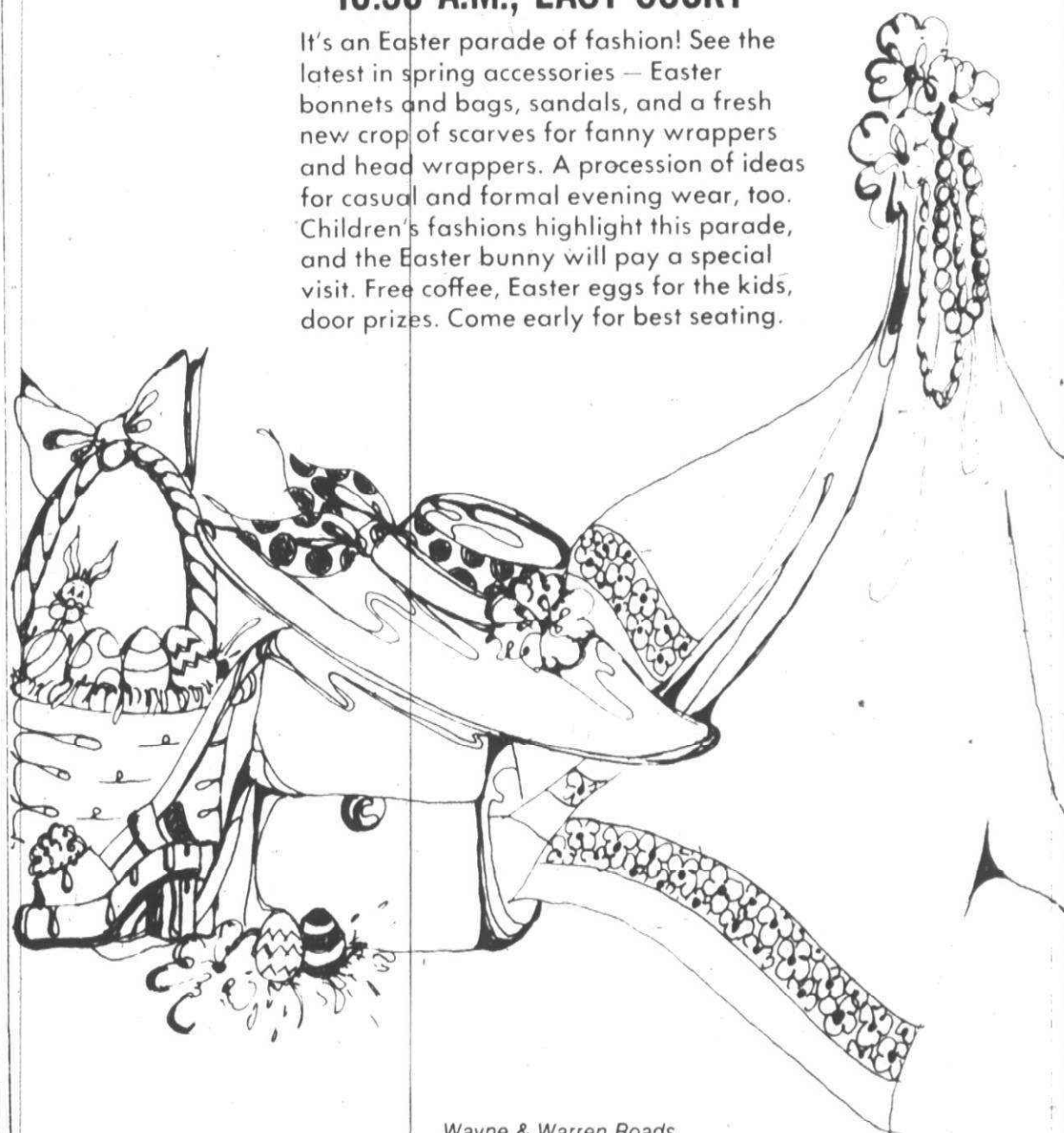

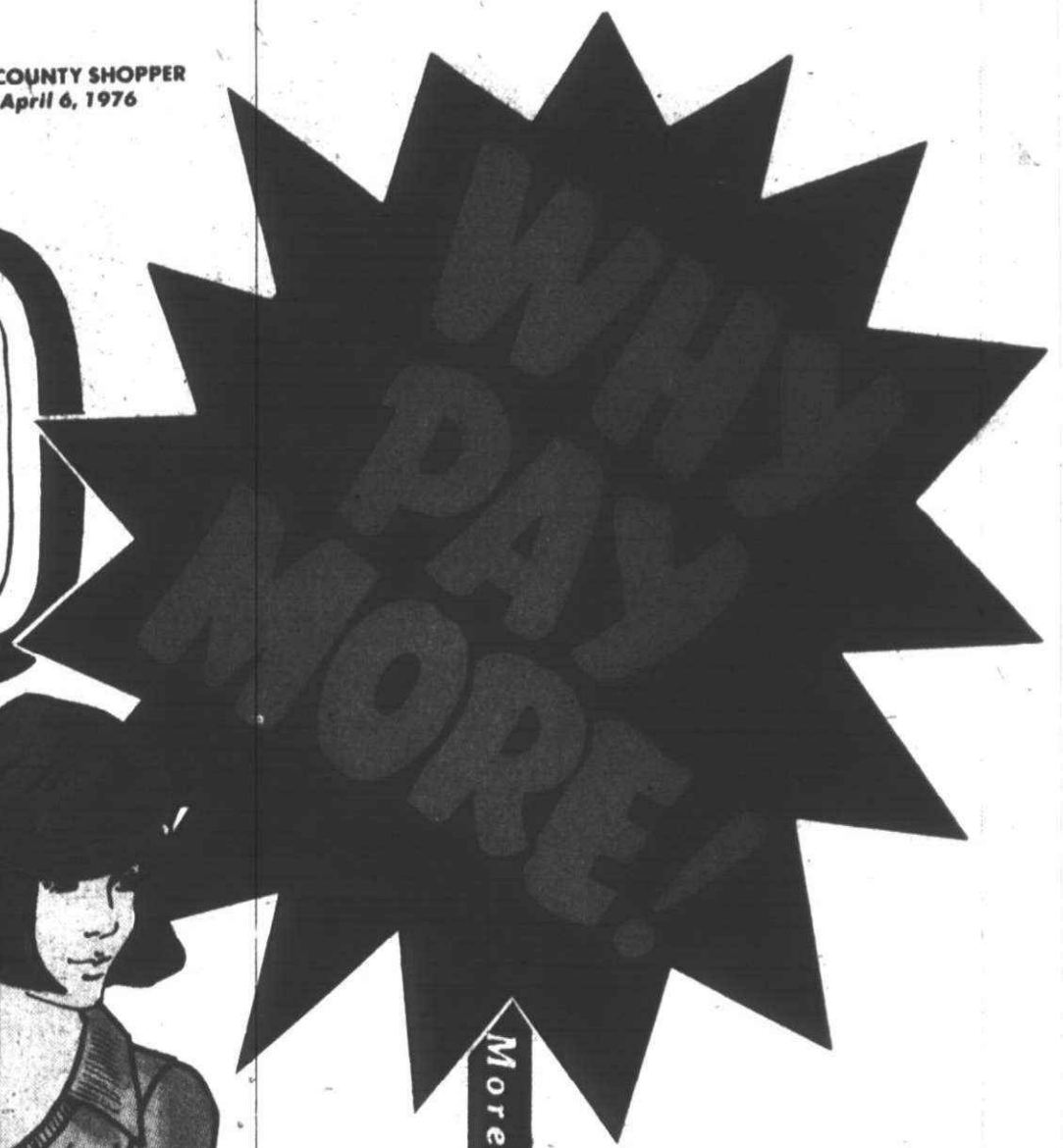

**NAEYC PROCLAIMS WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD**

THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE EDUCATION OF YOUNG CHILDREN has proclaimed April 4-10 as THE WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD. The purpose of the week is to emphasize the rights, needs and well-being of all young children, especially those of pre-school age.

**TRADITIONALLY-PARENTS,** particularly mothers, have been able to provide care for their children. But, during the past few years, many women have joined the job force. They now find it necessary to depend on others to provide adequate day care for their children.

THE NAEYC points out that these children need more than a babysitting service. They need loving care and enriching experiences. With special emphasis during THE WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD, the NAEYC attempts to help parents obtain the proper care for their children.

A GOOD DAY CARE CENTER provides needed care, protection and continuous developmental, educational experiences while children are away from their parents.

THE NAEYC suggests several things to keep in mind when choosing a day care program for your child.

- (1) Do the children have plenty of space in which to play? Is outdoor play possible, especially during warm weather?
- (2) Is the building a safe, sanitary, healthy place?
- (3) Is the time organized and are routines established?
- (4) Are proper play materials and equipment available? Toys such as puzzles for problem solving should be provided. Large pieces of apparatus such as balancing boards, boxes, etc. should be available for active play.
- (5) Does the day care center establish a rapport with parents? Are comments welcomed and progress reports given?
- (6) Do the adults involved in the child care programs show warmth, friendliness, and understanding?

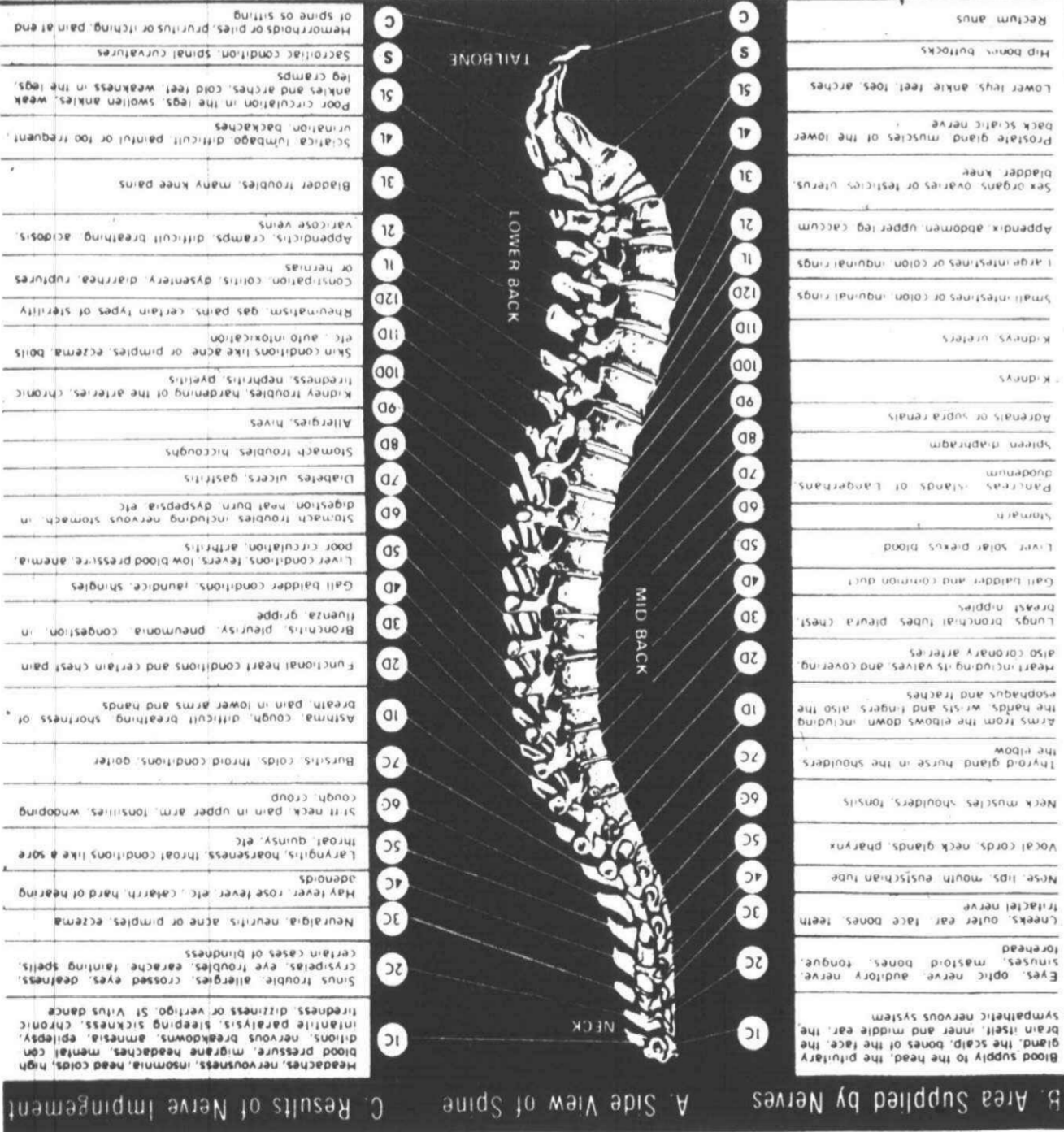

Every year, thousands of weekend golfers charge out to the golf course on the first nice day of the year and come home tired and aching. 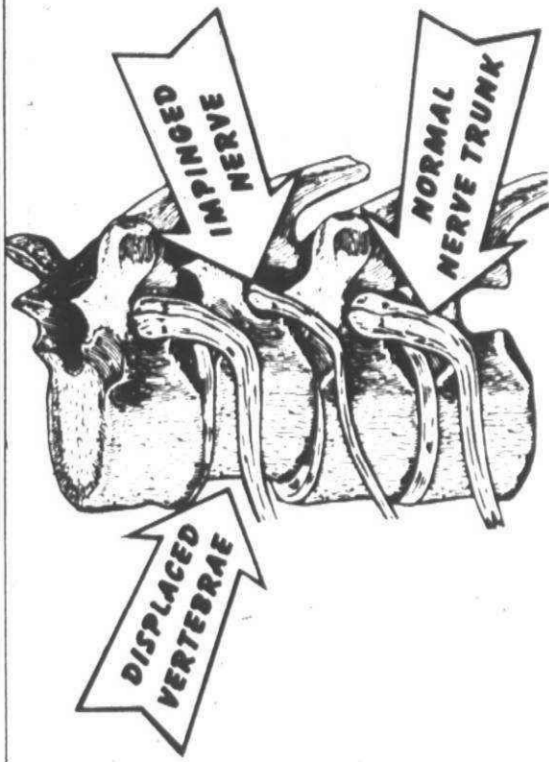
