Wayne County to hear plan on Wednesday

Canton residents desiring another crack at the recently passed master land-use plan will have their shot Wednesday when the Wayne County Planning Commission reviews the plan.

The county planners will be taking public input on the plan starting at 9:30 a.m. in conference room A on the seventh floor of the City-County Building, 2 Woodward Avenue in Detroit.

Although the public is invited to attend and welcome to give its views to the commission, Chairman Don Juchartz warns that the county is interested in how the plan fits into the overall picture of Wayne County.

"This is not a public hearing like the one they would hold in Canton," he said. "We're going to look at it from a county-wide perspective. We're interested in the implications of the plan for the entire county, not just how it affects Canton. But we'll be happy to hear anyone."

JUCHARTZ SAID although the county does not have power of life and death over

the plan, its recommendations usually carry weight with the local municipality.

"If we don't like the plan, they can go ahead and ignore us if they so choose, but we have A-96 review powers and that means we can affect the township's applications for federal funds."

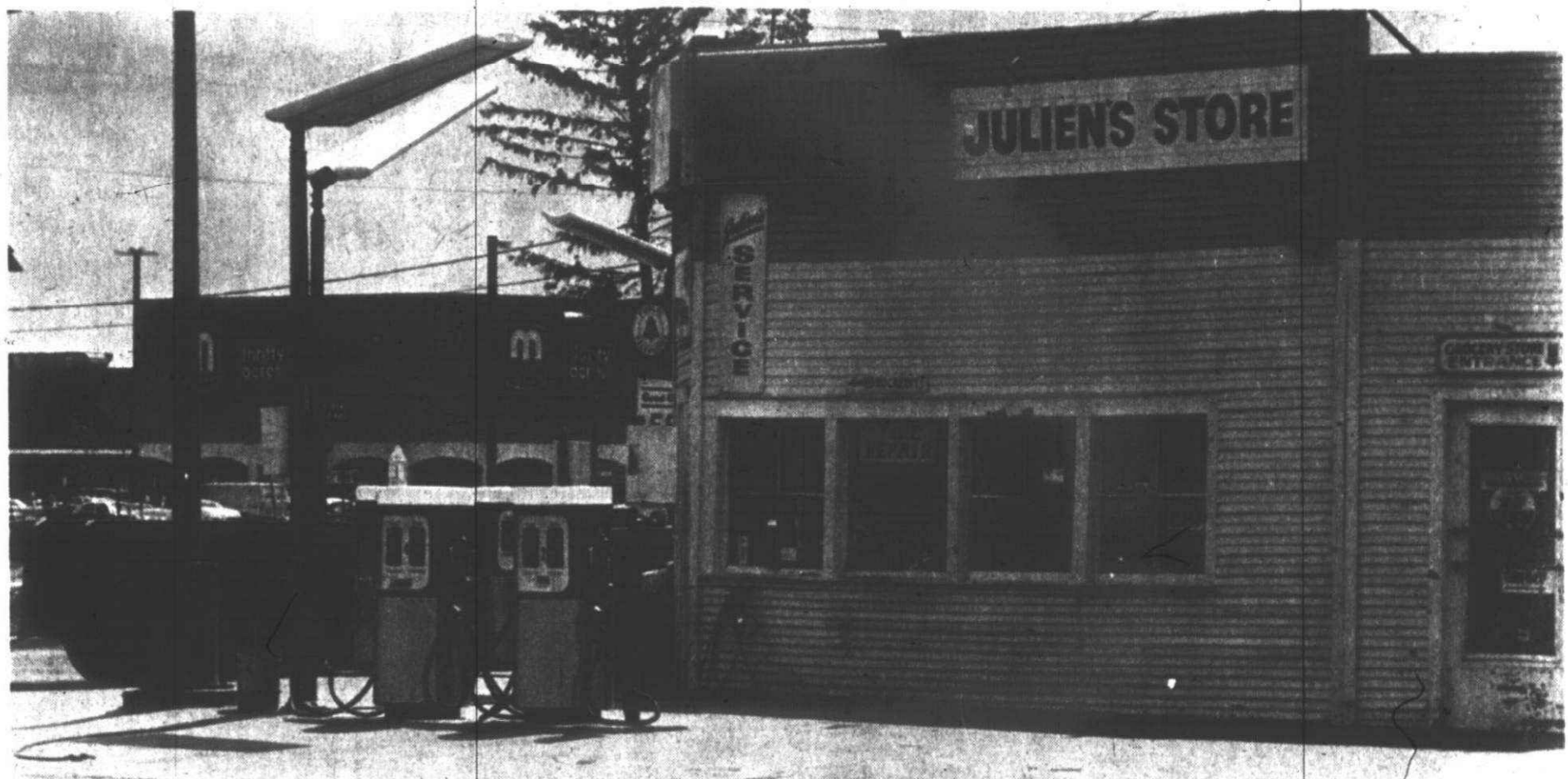
Juchartz added that usually the municipalities and the county cooperate well.

"We try to avoid that sort of situation if at all possible, but if they do ignore our suggestions, they have to have a pretty good reason."

Juchartz said the county would probably not act on the plan Wednesday, but rather wait until its June 16 meeting.

"We have 45 days to review the plan, and it's certainly something we don't want to be rushed on. We'll probably defer action until our June meeting."

Juchartz said he expected proponents of the plan to be well-represented. "I imagine Wade Trim people and Mike Manore will be there, if not (Supervisor Robert) Greenstein, too. Perhaps the Canton Planning Commission will be there as well."

Time has been good to Julien's

The years have been good to the old white building housing Julien's Store.

The old-fashioned general store at the intersection of Ford and Canton Center with gasoline pumps at its side stands as a reminder of what Canton Township used to be long before the days of vast shopping centers and supermarkets open 24 hours a day.

Peering across Canton Center at the sprawling Meijer Thrifty Acres and a modern gasoline station on the north side of Ford, owner James Julien reminisced about the old days when empty fields surrounded his store.

Those were the days when little stores, offering groceries and gasoline, dotted the township, Julien recalls. Back then, people traveled to Plymouth to shop at a supermarket.

But, according to Julien, modern times

and the supermarkets they've brought have not damaged his store's business a bit.

"THE COMPETITION has slowed us at times," Julien said, "but it hasn't hurt. The big share of our business comes from the old-timers, who've been here for years."

Julien pointed to a customer, buying a bag of chips.

"That gentleman," he said, "I've seen him in here a couple times a week. It's just like old times. And that young fellow, I knew his dad. Now he's working for my son. With most of our help, either their mom or dad worked for me."

Julien attributes the success of his store in modern times to that old-fashioned quality called friendliness.

"A lot of the big stores have no friend-

liness at all," he said. "You drive up in front of our place with a flat tire, and you have that tire fixed. If you have fan belt trouble, we're going to fix it, if I have to go get that fan belt myself."

JULIEN PURCHASED the old wooden building back in 1944 for what is now a nominal cost of \$8,500. Back then, the building housed a restaurant with gasoline pumps at its side. Not long after his purchase, Julien converted the building to a general store.

Now 63, Julien retired 10 years ago and left his son Robert with management of the store.

"But, I tell you, the years here have been very enjoyable," Julien said. "I love the people out here. They've been so good to us—not only as customers but as friends too."

Crossing guard opinion issued

The long-awaited legal opinion from Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley on the responsibility for providing school crossing guards within municipalities has been issued.

The opinion was asked for by the Plymouth Community School District, through the office of State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth). Kelley issued his opinion this month and submitted it to Pursell who forwarded a copy to the school district last Friday.

AT ISSUE is a disagreement between the school district and Plymouth Township over the responsibility for providing crossing guards.

The district's position is the cost of providing safety guards should be shared 50-50 between the schools and the local municipalities. Plymouth Township disagrees, stating crossing guards is a school responsibility.

The City of Plymouth and Canton Township have contributed their shares, with the city making payment only on the basis that Plymouth Township follows suit.

Following Plymouth Township's reluctance to share the cost, the Plymouth Board of Education adopted a resolution of intent that crossing guards won't be provided next fall unless the city and both townships share in the expense.

Following that action, Plymouth Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren sent an official letter to the school board stating the township's refusal to contribute and stating its position that crossing guards were a school district responsibility.

IN HIS LETTER to Pursell, Kelley cites a section of a legal interpretation in 1959 of the School Code of 1955:

"My conclusion, then, is that while a school district is authorized to provide personnel for the conducting of school chil-

dren across streets and highways . . . should it choose to do, a school district is not obliged to provide personnel to conduct children in the crossing of streets and highways enroute to and from school."

Kelley then cites a 1972 lawsuit, *Kotering vs. Muskegon*, which provides that with re-

Westland councilman asks for Ford widening

Westland City Councilman Glenn Shaw has proposed the creation of a tri-city committee, consisting of members from Garden City, Canton Township and Westland, to study the possibility of the widening of Ford Road.

Shaw noted that while Ford Road spans seven lanes through Dearborn, it narrows from five lanes to two through the three communities.

"Ford Road is overburdened with an excess of traffic and the inevitable rush hour," Shaw said. "The pace on Ford Road deteriorates swiftly from safe to cumbersome to hazardous."

"We have an overburdened road leading into new growth in the west. If we start today, in five years Ford Road might be improved to handle the traffic flow."

Shaw has proposed that Westland Mayor Tom Taylor contact officials from the three areas to sit on the committee, and has recommended that State Reps. Tom Brown (D-Westland), whose district includes a portion of Canton Township, and Bill Keith (D-Garden City) serve as co-chairmen of the committee.

SHAW POINTS TO the development of the western section of Westland and the development of Canton Township as prime reasons for the expansion.

"We're seeing a lot of growth in Westland and Canton," Shaw said, "and when I-275 is completely opened, it can't help but congest Ford Road more."

"I think we need to get the other communities involved to see if they are as desirous of Ford Road widening as we are."

"I would like to see Ford expanded to seven lanes all the way to Canton Center Road."

"If we're talking five years before we get the project completed, we'll need every one of the seven lanes to Canton Center."

Canton Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein has likewise been pushing for widening of Ford Road. The Canton supervisor has asked that Ford become a boulevard with a green belt in the middle of it.

But his efforts so far have met with little success.

SHAW SPECULATED that Garden City

may not be as desirous of the expansion as the other two communities.

"With seven lanes in Dearborn Heights, five in Garden City and the possibility of seven in Westland, I would just as soon like to see each city go to seven lanes and get it done together."

But in Garden City, they may be worried about taking away some of their frontage for parking purposes.

Shaw added a similar problem exists in Westland.

"Most of the depth on Ford Road is 100-110 feet. We'll need some property in the rear of businesses zoned for parking."

A major issue concerning the com-

mittee, if it is set up, is the question of funding.

"I'm not sure how it would be divided," Shaw said. "We would have to look at the pros and cons of it."

"But someone's got to take an aggressive stand on this. It's not going to be too long before the situation becomes unbearable."

THE FORD ROAD situation was reviewed when Brown sought a status report from the Department of State Highways and Transportation.

A reply from Donald C. Rush, engineer of programming, pointed to several delays.

"The project for the improvement of the Wayne Road-Ford Road intersection is delayed due to the necessary right-of-way acquisition on the north side of Ford Road. Our Right of Way Division has estimated that it will probably be January 1977, before this right of way can be cleared and bids taken for the project," Rush wrote.

The requested improvement at the Haggerty Road-Ford Road intersection, which is immediately west of the I-275 interchange, is being developed in cooperation with the Wayne County Road Commission. It is intended that his project be funded

Dombecki to run for clerk

Citing the need for more industrial tax-base in Canton and for more rational government, Patricia Dombecki, a Republican, announced Thursday she will seek the office of township clerk.

Comparing her 10 years of secretarial work, the last eight for an executive of Ford Motor Company, to John Flodin's experience, she said, "I think it's time for a change."

Flodin has been clerk since 1956. "I think it's time to get a women's viewpoint on the board. I'm not a women's libber, but I do believe in equal opportunity for women."

A three-year resident of Canton in the Windsor Park subdivision, Ms. Dombecki, 32, is the mother of two children, Jeannie, 13, and Phyllis, 11.

"My children are at the age where they don't need constant attention, and I think now I have time to get into politics," Ms. Dombecki said she always has been

interested in politics and became interested in Canton government in the last year.

"Too many irrational decisions and ordinances have been made by this board, and I think it's time to investigate issues more thoroughly."

"We should use more advisory groups like TCP (Total Citizen's Power), the League of Women Voters and homeowners groups to make our decisions."

"We should listen to their opinions and use their organizations as vehicles to make our choices for the township."

MRS. DOMBECKI said the township needed more industry for both more non-residential taxbase and to attract business executives.

"Executives are brilliant people and they'll only come here if the industry is here—we need the business mind to help our township."

The Republican said she favored the concept of the master land use plan but was against the methods used to pass it.

"We need more studies, especially on agricultural land, flood plains and the finan-

cial aspects. We need more investigation to plan our township."

"Right now I think we need a moratorium on rezoning of commercial property to residential and on building permits. We need a good tax base—we're giving away all the land to residential builders."

"We're moving too fast," she added. "There are too many irrational decisions, and they're all made by 43 votes."

"We have to limit the number of people coming into the township. Mr. Bundarin (Republican candidate for supervisor) has a good idea to come up with a lottery-type thing to limit people coming in."

Ms. Dombecki said she thought the master land use plan would not be implemented because it was an "incomplete concept and poorly organized."

"Right now we have to catch up. We need better police protection, fire protection, more sidewalks and we have to slow down for the schools' sake."

"If we don't, it won't be too long before we can't afford to live here."

The candidate for clerk said she opposed

Approve fire district

On Tuesday, voters in Canton will have big decisions to make—decisions that will not only affect the future of the township, but the health and safety of its residents.

Voters will decide on a special assessment district for fire protection, and on an advisory question about land use.

Although the advisory question uses the word "concept" when it offers two choices to the voter, Supervisor Robert Greenstein, for one, has repeatedly said the vote will decide the future of the present land use plan.

IF YOU VOTE for the concepts that would retain agricultural land west of Canton Center, your vote will be interpreted as an endorsement of the plan recently approved by the township planning commission.

If you vote for the alternative concepts which will provide for the township to be fully urbanized, your vote will be interpreted as a vote against the current plan.

If enough persons choose the full-urbanization concept, even Greenstein, the architect of the plan to save agricultural land, has promised to scrap the present plan.

Do not be confused by the word "concept." Vote either for or against the current plan because that is the way your vote will be viewed.

Understand further that while this is an advisory ballot and not a referendum, your vote will be considered a mandate and will determine the fate of the land use plan.

Exercise your franchise. Do not avoid

the issue because the ballot is shoddily worded.

This is a serious matter and your vote does count. It may well determine the future size, shape and character of Canton Township.

ON PROPOSITION NO. 1, we urge you to vote yes, in favor of the fire special assessment district.

The township board has stated its intention not to levy more than 1.5 mills. With that promise, it has paved the way for the people to make a reasonable decision without the fear of too much millage being levied.

There is little question that a second fire station is needed. Response time to the most heavily populated section of the township will be reduced, in some areas by as much as six minutes, with a second station.

While this station, to be located just west of Haggerty on Warren, will serve primarily the northeast of the township, it will allow the present station to concentrate its efforts on the rest of the township and serve as a backup.

As a result, the new station will benefit

all residents and businessmen of the township.

A yes vote on May 18 will allow construction of the second station to begin immediately.

Treasurer Carl Pursell has said there is enough money in township coffers to pay for the station if the money is reimbursed through the extra levy at the end of the year.

A NO VOTE will probably postpone the station another year at least because even if a fire millage is passed in August, it may be too late to get it on the tax rolls for this year.

At 1.5 mills, the cost of the second station will be about \$30 to the owner of a \$40,000 home, and that cost may be defrayed by a reduction in fire insurance rates.

The township presently has a very poor rating. At least one survey, conducted by the Fire Chiefs Association of Michigan, indicates a second station could lower the township's rating substantially.

There also is reason to think that once the station is built, the cost will be reduced. The township's tax base is growing rapidly. As it does, each mill raises more dollars.

In a few years, it is conceivable the levy will be one mill or less.

Vote yes—it's a too small a price to pay for much needed protection.

Michigan Week begins Thursday in the park

The nation's bicentennial spirit and state's heritage will be celebrated jointly in the opening Bicentennial-in-the-Park program scheduled during Michigan Week on Thursday, May 20, from 7-10 p.m. in Kellogg Park.

All area residents are invited to view the park program and share in the bicentennial festivities. Admission is free and seating is up to the individual (bring own chair or blanket). In case of bad weather, the program will move to the gymnasium of Central Middle School, Church at Main.

THE PROGRAM WILL begin with music by the Plymouth Fife and Drum Corps, which has been traveling statewide this year under a Michigan Bicentennial Grant. The 42-member corps will recreate historical sounds of America with traditional 18th and 19th century union melodies. Corps members will be making their first Plymouth appearance dressed in the new full dress colonial uniforms worn in the Cherry Blossom Parade in Washington DC.

The corps will play "Olympic Fanfare," "Revolutionary War Medley," "Farandole from L'Arlesienne Suite," "Iron Flut Medley," "Spirit of '76 Drum Solo" and "Stars and Stripes Forever."

PLYMOUTH MAYOR Joe Bida will welcome residents and elected officials who are the city's special guests for this opening evening of the Bicentennial-in-the-Park series.

Among the visiting officials to be introduced to the audience will be State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), Rep. Thomas H. Brown (D-Westland), Rep. Roy Smith (R-Ann Arbor), and Wayne County Commissioner Royce Smith (D-Belleville).

The program will then be turned over to Plymouth Community Schools with the first school performing being the Tanger Elementary Concert Choir. Selections include "Yankee Doodle," "Blowin' in the Wind," and a state tune—"Tulips Are Blooming in Holland, Michigan."

Next, cosumed Smith Elementary School students will present dances performed by their forefathers. Dance numbers will include the minuet, the varsovienne (also known as "Put Your Little Foot"), and the polka.

Students from Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton high schools then will meet in the Fourth Annual Log Rolling and Two-Man Saw Finals. Two sets of boys and of girls will compete in both the log rolling and sawing contests. These contests have been held at the Centennial Educational Park for the past three years as a part of Michigan history study. The park program marks the first time the contests have been held before the public.

FOLLOWING THE matches, students from Miller Elementary will offer a vocal and string instrument performance of popular American folk tunes, such as:

"Yankee Doodle," "Go Tell Aunt Rhody," "Skip to My Lou," "Shoo Fly,"

"Coming 'Round the Mountain," and "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Also, as part of the Bicentennial-in-the-Park series, the Northville, Plymouth, Canton, Novi League of Women Voters will have a voter registration booth in the park from 7-9 p.m. Any resident of the City of Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships will be able to register.

MASTER OF CEREMONIES May 20 will be Jim Courney.

The school portion of the program is being coordinated by James DeKiere with teachers Eleanor Burton and Claudia Tull directing individual groups. Wayne Weimer is organizing the log-rolling and sawing contests.

with Federal Aid-High Hazard Location Safety funds.

"We expect we could take bids for this project in August, providing no right-of-way acquisition difficulties are encountered."

IN ANSWER TO BROWN'S question on

an overall improvement program for Ford Road through Westland, Rush said that it would take at least three years to acquire the right-of-way.

"Since it appears that there will be a 1976 Federal-Aid Highway Act passed and signed, a review is to be undertaken to see if some improvements for traffic operations and safety can be developed in coop-

eration with the city and placed under contract yet this fall.

"There will be other preconstruction requirements to be completed, such as a public hearing and an Environmental Impact Statement."

"So this project, even if funds were available, will be approximately five years or more away from having bids taken."

Firemen, chamber back levy

The fire special assessment district on the May 18 ballot picked up two more organizations as supporters last week when both the Canton Chamber of Commerce and the township firefighters came out with endorsements for the district.

Both organizations were careful to say they supported the district as long as no more than 1.5 mills were levied.

Under the terms of the special assessment district, if the voters approve the district, the township board will conduct two public hearings.

After the hearings, the board will vote to levy a specific amount of millage. The process is repeated annually.

If the district is passed May 18, mem-

bers of the township board have promised not to levy more than 1.5 mills this year.

That money will go towards construction of a second fire station, to be located just west of Haggerty on Warren Road.

"We voted to support the mill and a half limit only," explained firefighter Bill Grady.

"We're going to stay on top of the situation and if they attempt to levy more than 1.5 mills we're going to be jumping all over them."

"There's a really bad need for a second station in this township. It will definitely help in response time."

"There's a lot of advantage to it," Grady said firefighters were be at the

polls on Tuesday distributing literature and encouraging people to vote yes on the proposition.

By a vote of 10-0 with one member abstaining and four absent, the chamber board of directors voted to endorse the district.

After considerable debate over the wording of the endorsement, a resolution passed.

It read: "The Canton Chamber of Commerce board will support establishment of a township-wide fire assessment district and endorse 1.5 mills for operation of the fire station for one year."

the sign ordinance among others because it was keeping industry out of the township. She said she would deal with those issues more completely later in the campaign.

gard to municipalities the authority to provide crossing guards is discretionary.

"Therefore, both school districts and municipalities have the authority to provide school crossing guards, if they choose to do so," concludes Kelley. "In neither case, however, is this a mandatory obligation, rather, it is discretionary."

SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN has forwarded a copy of Kelley's opinion to McLaren, Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein, and Plymouth City Mgr. Fred Yockey.

"As I read his interpretation," writes Hoben, "it is apparent that nobody is legally obligated to provide crossing guards, but in his words, it is a discretionary decision upon all units of government—schools, municipalities and townships."

"From the tenor of his letter, I would assume then that the practice of joint responsibility is one that is justifiable and incumbent upon all units. I realize there may be disagreement among you in this interpretation; however, that is how I view the information that we sought from Mr. Kelley."

During these days when the presidential primary fills the air, a fellow has a most difficult time looking at his favorite programs on the tube without being interrupted by one or the other of the candidates lashing out at opponents.

Seldom do they mention their own program or platform. They just take keen delight in criticizing the way things are being run from the big White House on 1600 Pennsylvania Ave.

It was that way recently when a group of us was looking at the Tiger baseball game. With little regard for the play at the

time, the program was interrupted to bring us the projected count in another segment of the campaign.

"With all the criticism a president has to take," one of the group remarked, "I wouldn't take the job for all the tea in China. No matter who holds the office, he's in hot water all the time."

"Really, I don't see what any one wants in politics. It's either to establish an identity they would not get otherwise or because they yearn for a touch of glamour."

HE LOOKED right at The Stroller as he spoke, possibly remembering that his host

once was in a hotbed of small town politics when the City of Livonia was incorporated.

Figuring the remark was directed at him, The Stroller recalled that he didn't get embroiled in the vote-getting game for any other reason than to be of public service.

Of course, most candidates say that but in The Stroller's case he was eager to help the community in its drive for incorporation. There was little thought of politics.

At least that was his feeling when he offered his services. It wasn't long until he realized that, good as his intentions were, it was a political game from the start. And when he was "honored" with a seat on the city council, The Stroller quickly learned that he wasn't only one of the city fathers but a servant to many of his friends who besieged him with all sorts of requests for favors.

There was one night in the spring when after a heavy rain, many of the gravel roads erupted and were in no shape to handle auto traffic. The phone rang and the woman's voice on the other end demanded that a load of gravel be sent over to her section of the street so she could drive it. Mind you, this was close to midnight and he was criticized no end for months for his failure to send the gravel.

ON ANOTHER occasion the city fathers decided to repave the streets in one of the largest subdivisions.

It was to be done at no charge to the

residents. It was a great gesture. But when the work started a delegation visited city hall to complain that the contractor left the chuckholes open and their tires were being ruined.

After the chuckholes were filled with small gravel, the delegation appeared again—this time claiming the gravel was being thrown on their lawns and ruining their mowers.

That was it. The council had enough. The entire project was called off and the paving wasn't done until years later.

And don't forget the heaviest barbs of criticism were aimed at the fellows who sought office just to get the city started. There was no reward. Just criticism.

Every community is much the same. Plymouth has it with the parking problem and the loop road. Garden City had a great fight over an urban renewal plan. In fact the people overthrew the government because of it.

Many who seek office don't realize the price that must be paid in trying to appease friends and shake criticism.

But as the late Harry Truman once said, "If you can't stand the heat get out of the kitchen."

Like his guest remarked the other night when he said he wouldn't take the president's job for all the tea in China, The Stroller backed away from the political pot. He has served his time and wouldn't take a million for his experience—but he's had it.

Stempien is critical of child center veto

Marvin Stempien, 2nd Congressional District Democratic candidate, criticized President Gerald Ford's recent veto of a federally-assisted child day care center program.

The candidate in the Aug. 3 primary said Ford's veto was "insensitive and counterproductive" because states and cities will be forced to increase welfare spending. Mothers of children now enrolled in centers endangered by the federal funds cutoff are forced to quit their jobs and go on the welfare rolls.

Stempien made his remarks at a Huron Valley Labor Council meeting in Laborer's Hall, Ann Arbor, last week.

The candidate said the veto "was a slap in the face" of all working parents and vio-

lates the spirit of the Equal Rights Amendment, which he said is supported by most of the Republican leadership.

Stempien reminded the union members that he was a chief sponsor of ERA in the state Legislature when he was a state representative. He promised to sponsor and support efforts in congress to guarantee adequate funding for day care centers.

The candidate said that the way to correct overly strict standards for centers is not to take away all of their funding. If changes are needed, money should be provided while standards are being revised.

He added that there are about 850,000 children of low and middle income families now enrolled in federally-assisted day care centers.

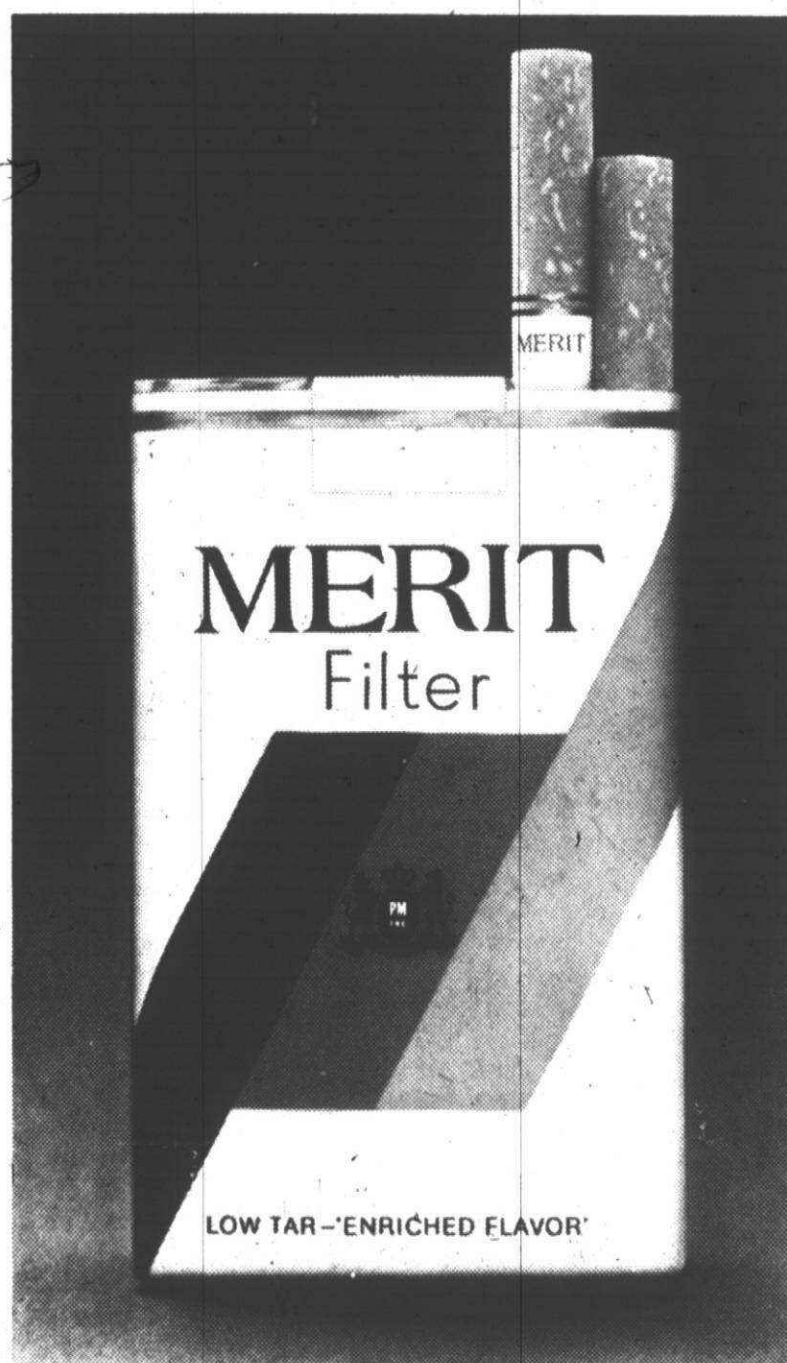

Mott mounted a threat in the fourth inning when Jim Stepanki doubled and Carl Fuller doubled to put runners on second and third base with one out. Parson eased

his way out of the jam by sending the next two batters down on strikes.

The line score had Canton with three runs, on four hits, and one error, while Mott had no runs, on two hits, and three errors.

Coach Crissey is optimistic at this point in the season about how his Chiefs will fare during this week which he termed "the most crucial week of the season."

"We have league games with Northville and Churchill plus a state, district qualifying game with Dearborn Heights Crestwood.

"If we win the league games, we can take a long step towards solidifying the conference championship. We'd very much like to do well in the state tourney and we must beat Crestwood to qualify for the districts," commented Crissey.

"THERE ARE MANY moments in a season, I hope the players can grasp those singular moments which are most important, and meet the occasion when it arises," philosophized Crissey.

"We could be in contention to win the

Western Six for the second year in a row and be considered a factor in the playoffs, or we could be all alone."

Canton faces Northville at Northville this afternoon at 4 p.m. They play Livonia Churchill at Haggerty Field at 4 p.m. on Wednesday.

The game with Crestwood will be played at Central Middle School at 4 p.m. on Thursday. If the Chiefs beat Crestwood, they will face Livonia Franklin in the opening round of district action May 29th.

In The Pocket

The grand old game of toping tennins, the second oldest sport known to man, would be undergoing some of the most radical changes in its long history if the suggestions now making the rounds were adopted by the American Bowling Congress.

These changes not only would alter the handicap rules but would include the rating of the various establishments with respect to lane conditions, and the banning of smoking in the bowling areas.

One of the latest demands is to alter the method of honoring high scorers. It has

been suggested that the record book should be divided into two parts—prepinsetter and plastic pin days and postpinsetter days.

It is claimed that in the old days the bowlers rolled against wooden pins that often did not meet specifications and lacked the life now shown by the plastic models. The same is true with the switch from the old rubber and wooden ball to the new models made of special material. This may be a good idea, but don't count on the ABC to approve it.

On hearing of the suggestion, one of the local ABC officials remarked, "Next they'll want separate listing for bowlers who used the two-finger ball and those take five steps. There would be no end to the demands."

THE NEXT suggestion was made with the idea of listing the houses on the manner in which the lanes are maintained. There would be one class where the lanes were "blocked" from one side to the other. This would be given a "C" rating. Next would come the lanes that are blocked in the middle. This would be given a "B" rating and the "A" rating would be reserved for those lanes that aren't blocked.

This may fall on deaf ears as the proprietors don't like their establishments rated and the pros would prefer the "B" lanes.

And as far as smoking goes, most of the newer establishments have air conditioning and the air changes every half hour or less. So smoking would be no problem.

The ABC is noted for caution in making any changes and it is a good bet that none of the suggestions for changes will be taken seriously for some years to come. If they are made, they will not be made to take effect at the same time. The ABC doesn't work that way.

Trojans find late-inning hitting punch

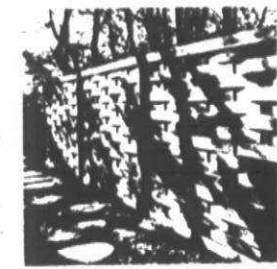

McCammon pitched the entire game for the Trojans and seemed to overcome much of the wildness she had displayed in previous outings, said Clarenceville coach Karen Oliva.

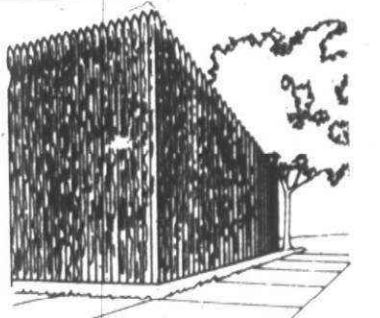
In earlier action, the Trojans were bounced in a non-league game by Detroit Lutheran West, 9-7.

SC's Globe takes 2nd

Bonner, Hopkins win media 1sts

The Schoolcraft College student newspaper, The Campus Globe, has won three awards in the recent Michigan Collegiate Media Association contest held at Eastern Michigan University.

The Globe earned a second place in the best weekly newspaper category, and two staff members were awarded first place honors in individual competition.

The Globe's second place finish was "especially rewarding for the staff," according to advisor Doug Johnson. "We competed with all the two-year and four-year colleges that publish a newspaper weekly." First place went to Ferris State College, a four-year school.

Tom Bonner of Garden City won a first place award for his story and pictures on the Alaskan timber wolf. Fred Hopkins of Livonia won a first place award in feature photography for his picture of seagulls which nest near the Schoolcraft Campus.

"CREDIT FOR the second place in the best newspaper category goes to the entire staff. However, our editor Greg Austin, and chief copy reader Chris Bueter, both of Northville, provided the leadership necessary to achieve this honor," Johnson explained.

Judge in this category was Will Snyder, an editor for the Ypsilanti Press. His comments:

"This is another paper that is easy on the eye. With a couple of exceptions... the layout is very good. I liked some of the features such as the '50s day picture package. It looks like the Globe really works hard here. It's sports coverage is well-balanced. It's good to see the girls get solid play on a page."

This was the first year the Globe had entered competition with other newspapers from colleges around the state.

THE GLOBE also recently received a second place rating in the annual critical rating service provided by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association (CSPA).

The ratings are based on standards set and administered by the CSPA, an organization of school newspapers and advisors based at Columbia University. Columbia is recognized as one of the top schools for journalism in the United States and is home base for the coveted Pulitzer Prizes.

The Globe rating was based on a detailed evaluation of issues dating from January through December of 1975.

GOOD MARKS were given to editorials and advertising, headed this year by Keith Kobe of Livonia.

Other areas receiving generally good ratings were sports writing, done almost exclusively by Scott Fisher of Livonia. The Globe's page design, typography, feature stories and coverage of the campus were also praised.

Receiving low marks were some of the Globe's photographs, as well as the paper's lack of in-depth and routine news stories.

"The ratings are based on a check list of very tight principles set down in a rating booklet, with points assigned to various items. We needed 60 or so more points to qualify as a first-class paper under their rating system," Mr. Johnson said. "The second-place rating means we are neither very good nor very bad, perhaps a notch above average."

The Globe publishes weekly during the fall and winter terms and periodically during spring and summer.

FCC eyes storm alert

U.S. Rep. William M. Brodhead (D-Detroit) has announced that, at his request, the Federal Communications Commission will make a thorough investigation of the emergency weather warning system in the Detroit area. The request followed the March tornado which caused several deaths, many injuries and widespread property damage in northwest Detroit suburbs.

In an April 1 letter to the FCC, Brodhead said serious doubts had been raised about the system because many residents had been unaware of the approaching tornado.

"It has been my experience that local radio and TV stations have always cooperated in broadcasting storm warnings," said Brodhead. "However, if there is any way the system can be improved so that lives

can be saved or injuries prevented, then we must take the necessary steps."

FCC Chairman Richard E. Wiley, in a letter to Brodhead, said that the commission's emergency communications division would thoroughly investigate the warning procedures in the Detroit area and that a full report would be made public.

Brodhead said the investigation would cover such things as how long it takes for the weather service to transmit storm warnings to stations; how long it takes for the stations to get the warning aired; and how often it is repeated. Investigators will also check to see if all Detroit stations are participating in the system.

Chiefs back county jail tax



Quiz uncovers your fuel economy habits

By PATRICK KELLY

Government mileage ratings for new automobiles allow you to compare relative miles-per-gallon of various models in both highway and city driving.

The ratings, however, cannot compare fuel-economy driving ability or preventive maintenance practices between you and other drivers of the same model car.

The following multiple-choice quiz developed by the Automotive Information Council will help determine your fuel-economy driving knowledge. Seven correct answers rate you as a first-class economy driver; five or less indicate you can improve your new-or-used car's mileage.

1. To obtain the best mileage going uphill in a standard six-passenger car: a) hold throttle steady, letting car gradually lose speed; b) keep uphill speed constant by gradually increasing throttle; c) speed up just before reaching hill.

2. How much can tuning up a badly out-of-tune engine effect gas mileage? a) does not affect mileage; b) can increase mileage about 5 per cent; c) can increase mileage as much as 25 per cent.

3. When parking briefly, you save gasoline by shutting off and restarting your car's engine in a stop as short as: a) five minutes; b) three minutes; c) one minute.

4. Low tire pressure: a) increases gas mileage; b) decreases gas mileage; c) has no effect on gas mileage.

5. When starting a car on cold mornings, the best gas-saving technique is to: a) start driving slowly after a 30-second warm-up; b) thoroughly warm up the engine before driving; c) increase throttle speed to warm up car faster.

6. Highway driving under 60 miles per hour compared with 70 to 75 m.p.h. will increase gas mileage about: a) 5 per cent; b) 10 per cent; c) 15 per cent.

7. For maximum mileage with automatic transmission: a) accelerate rapidly to get the car into high gear; b) accelerate slowly to get the car into high gear; c) nothing will affect mileage with automatic transmission.

ANSWERS

1. Test drivers advise gradually accelerating uphill with large cars to maintain

speed; holding throttle steady uphill with small cars allowing speed to bleed-off.

2. C—Fouled spark plugs or bad connections can cut mileage by 25 per cent or more.

3. C—The engine burns more gasoline for one minute than is required to restart it.

4. B—Causes excessive drag, requiring more power.

5. A—Once oil pressure builds up, driving slowly toward your destination heats up the car faster and also saves fuel and time.

6. C—Highway driving under 60 miles per hour compared with 70 to 75 m.p.h. will increase gas mileage about 15 per cent.

7. B—Slower start shifts most automatic transmission cars into fuel-saving high gear sooner than tromping on the accelerator, which wastes additional gasoline.

MEASURING UP AT MEIJER

INSPECTORS FROM The Weights and Measures Division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture visit Michigan retailers frequently. Their job is to help protect the consumer by insuring that customers actually get what they pay for at the checkout counter.

For example, several packages of meat might be brought to the back room, unwrapped, and weighed. Canned goods may be sent to a laboratory in Lansing to make sure the cans have been filled properly. Any type of weighing or measuring that a retailer has done to prepare merchandise for the sales floor is SUBJECT TO GOVERNMENT INSPECTION.

AT MEIJER, we have employees who work full time testing, adjusting and replacing our weights and price marking machines. Other employees check the weights of our meat products daily, by stripping them to the bare product and reweighing them. The product alone, not the package, must match or exceed the weight listed on the package.
