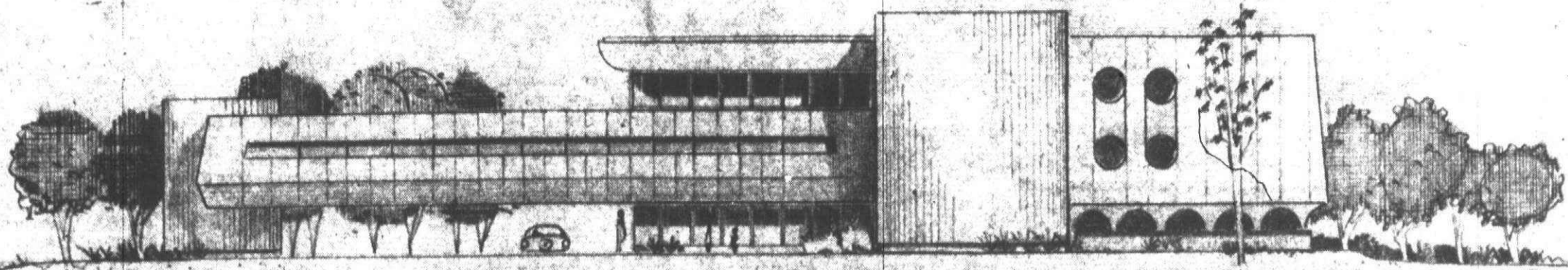

Detroit wasn't the only municipality to receive a lion's share of federal funds last week. Canton Township received word that its grant proposal for a three-story administration building will be funded by the Economic Development Administration (EDA). The

grant, for \$2,715,300, is still tentative, and final approval should come within a week. Canton applied for seven other EDA projects in September but no word has come on the status of those proposals. Supervisor Harold Stein said Thursday he's "ecstatic"

over the federal grant money but wishes the township would have received the money for sewers and water projects instead.

Feds fund \$1.7 million township hall

A \$2,715,300 Christmas present in the form of a tentative federal public works grant has been earmarked for a Canton Township central administration building.

The grant comes from the Economic Development Administration (EDA), a branch of the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Mike Gorman, Canton deputy treasurer, said final approval of the project should come Dec. 30 through the Local Public Works Development Act of 1976.

Once approved, Canton must begin construction within 90 days. This means, if the schedule is followed, groundbreaking will start by April 5.

The EDA public works grants are also designed to help stimulate construction jobs in communities.

Gorman said he learned of the tentative grant approval Wednesday from three

sources—U.S. Rep. William Ford, Grant Coordinator Ron Linton, and the township's planning consultant firm, Wade, Trim and Associates.

Mike Manore, a consulting firm employee, helped draw up seven board-approved EDA grant proposals. But, according to Gorman, there has been no word on whether any of the other grants will be funded.

In September, when Manore submitted the seven proposals to the township board for approval, he indicated that the administration building was first priority. He explained that the more applications Canton submitted the better its chances would be in securing a grant.

The Livonia architectural firm of Ralls, Hammill, Becker and Carne drew up schematics and renderings of the buildings for the township administration.

THE SITE picked for the administration building is located on Canton Center, north

of the existing meeting hall (Fire Station No. 1) between Cherry Hill and Ford Road on the east side of the street. It is north of the recreation field. The township presently owns 27 acres of land in that spot with another 37 acres east of the fire station in the process of condemnation. Canton is negotiating with builder Dick Lewiston for an adjacent 12-acre parcel north of the power lines.

Last Thursday, when the news of the tentative approval became known, Supervisor Harold Stein said that he would have rather seen the federal government fund "solve two immediate needs."

"One was a \$685,000 industrial area water pressure improvement project and the other was a \$411,000 commercial-industrial area sanitary sewer project," Stein said. "Either one or both would have started us off in the right direction."

But Stein said later he would not "look a gift horse in the mouth" and would work

to make the best out of the grant.

Stein said that from talks with some officials from surrounding communities it appears that the EDA leaned toward funding building projects, rather than sewer or water projects.

Part of the EDA stipulations state the project proposal should be "labor-intensive" to produce more jobs for the unemployed.

STEIN SAID that one advantage of the three-story municipal building would be that it will allow the township to consolidate "its different, spread-out operations" into one building.

"We'll put everything towards this instead of putting money into buildings we don't own," he said.

Stein was referring to the Recreation-Senior Citizen Building which the township rents, but received block grant monies last

year to remodel and equip.

Township administrators indicated that the Recreation Department and Senior Citizen activities would be relocated in the new administration building.

"The thought of a special youth activities center is being entertained as well," Stein said, "as is an area designated for a courtroom and possibly a library."

Stein tempered his remarks about the administration building in a written statement.

He said he was "ecstatic with the fact that Canton has just received \$2,715,300," but "upset that Canton's immediate needs" will not be met.

"The new administration building is something that we probably need 10 years or so down that road," Stein said. "But what we need today is additional sewer and water lines to allow this township to develop its commercial and industrial areas. We need to put the township on a

more representative tax base than letting the homeowners pay the price."

Clerk John Flodin called the news of the grant "a windfall, and it's wonderful."

"WHAT IT'LL DO is give the people of Canton something they profoundly need but normally couldn't afford at this stage of the game," Flodin said.

The other six projects submitted by Canton to the EDA were a proposal to boost water pressure from 35 pounds to at least 50 pounds in the southern corridor of the township; build an addition to Fire Hall No. 2; recreational site improvement funding; industrial and commercial sewer construction funds; a proposal to build two department of public works buildings; and finally a recreation building to be located next to the administration building.

Stein said he would push for sewer and water improvements in further grant applications.

Referral services designed for elderly

Senior citizens with questions about social security, housing, medical care or other problems can have the answers at their finger tips by dialing 455-4907 after Jan. 3.

Our House, a division of Growth Works will provide the information and referral service.

According to Bill Henry, director, the service will provide a central clearing house of information pertaining to the needs of the elderly.

"Many seniors have questions about important things in their lives and are not aware of all the avenues open to them to get the facts. And many times, they have to go through a lot of red tape to find out what they want to know," he said.

"We have done a lot of research and have compiled a large list of resources. We hope we can save people a lot of time and energy."

Because the service is new, Henry said there would be some flexibility to the hours of operation. As it stands now, the phone will be manned by volunteers from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"I really don't know how many calls we will be handling," commented Henry. "But I thought four hours a day would be a good start."

We will be changing a number of things as we go, and if necessary we can expand the hours of operation. We'll wait and see."

THE INFORMATION that will be available includes such areas as medical referrals, nursing home care, medical equipment rental, counseling referrals, community activities, church groups, trips, events, social security, and housing.

Henry said the volunteers also would be able to give people tips on how to deal with various bureaucracies.

"If somebody calls in with a question about getting financial assistance," Henry remarked, "we will be able to tell them who to call, what kind of treatment they can expect, and the type of information they will have to have ready."

Henry said that the information and referral service is being added in response to what he saw as a need within the community and also to broaden the scope of existing Our House programs.

"When people think of our organization, they think of drug problems and kids," he observed. "But that's not true. I would say that the average age of our clients is somewhere between 27 and 30."

Besides drug counseling, Our House services include parent information and counseling, sex information and counseling, legal referrals, and referrals to other helping organizations.

According to Henry, Our House is always looking for volunteers. Those wishing more information can contact him at 455-4902.

The pet rock craze appears to be the only missing link between this year's Christmas shopping season and last. At least that's the opinion of local merchants, who as a whole reported another healthy increase in sales.

While no one item stimulated the market like the pet rock of a year ago, the electronic television game would have to be rated the frontrunner in a Christmas gift popularity contest.

Despite recent reports of the games causing possible damage to TV sets, Corkey Mroczkowski, service manager for Meijer Thrifty Acres in Canton Township, says the gadget was one of the store's hottest selling items.

Sporting goods, particularly backpacking gear, toys and food baskets were also popular at Meijers, which enjoyed a 10 to 20 per cent increase in sales from the previous year.

CUSTOMERS WERE less flamboyant this year, according to Mason Ludlow, manager of the Kmart store in Canton. He said shoppers were more conservative, concentrating on more useful, durable goods as opposed to less practical items.

Kmart, like most shopping center stores, experienced a sizeable jump in sales. While shopping centers attracted scores of shoppers, downtown merchants expressed some concerns about shopping patterns.

Most businesses in the downtown Plymouth area recorded a hike in sales figures, but some didn't. Nevertheless, retail clerks were kept busy the week before Christmas, and merchants said they had little to complain about.

Wine drinkers bought the grape with a bit more class as the Pilgrim Party Shoppe detected a reversal in trends from the previous year. Dave Whitmore noticed increased purchases of quality merchandise, a turnaround from last year's cheaper liquor buying habits.

Jerry Loissele, owner of Jerry's Bicycles on Ann Arbor Road, said he knew Santa Claus made a lot of youngster happy. Schwinn 10-speed bikes were popular. Customers showed much interest in bikes as a whole for holiday gifts.

The Plymouth Record & Tape Center was one downtown store that was overwhelmed by customers. Business was heavier the closer Christmas Day approached. Manager Debbie Burrow said Bob Seger, Stevie Wonder, Boston, Wings and the Eagles were top sellers.

PICTURE FRAMES were popular at Hugh Jarvis Gifts in Plymouth. The owner said sales were again up, and shoppers chose a variety of men's personal items for presents.

Two downtown merchants who didn't repeat high sales of 1975 were Kresge and Plymouth Sport Shop. Both couldn't quite account for the sales dip, but expressed concern with location in the downtown area.

The Sports Shop sold plenty of hockey equipment and T-shirts, and Kresge, which rarely has smashing back-to-back Christmas seasons, didn't find any specific item that caught the shopper's eye.

One firm that wasn't put out over sales receipts was Lou LaRiche Chevrolet. But then, who expected to find a new 1977 Caprice stationed underneath their Christmas tree?

Swearing-in is tomorrow

Pursell opening local headquarters

Livonia, Plymouth and Northville residents will have an expanded congressional office staff and services to help them with federal agencies starting next Monday.

State Sen. Carl Pursell, Plymouth Republican, is scheduled to be sworn in as the new 2d District congressman in Washington Tuesday—but he has already finalized plans for his district office in western Wayne County.

He will maintain the same office used in the past four years by his predecessor, Marvin Esch, who decided against a sixth term to run unsuccessfully for a U.S. Senate seat.

Pursell said the western Wayne County office will remain at 15273 Farmington Road, just south of Five Mile, Livonia, opposite Livonia Civic Center.

Although the address and telephone number will be the same (that number is 261-6080) there will be new faces and expanded office hours to help residents with government problems or inquiries.

THE TWO district representatives who will share the duties of working with people are Sylvia Skrel and Denise Radtke, both of whom have been active in Republican politics for many years.

Ms. Skrel, 44, is a Livonia resident and holds a Madonna College associate degree in para-legal work.

She graduated with highest honors and a 3.89 honor point average out of a possible high of 4.0.

She began her political activities 20 years ago as a precinct delegate and joined the Livonia Republican Women's Club and becoming over the years its president for two years, vice president and treasurer.

It was through that group that she first met Ms. Radtke.

Ms. Skrel soon moved into the Michigan Federation of Republican Women and served as vice president.

In the Wayne-2d District, she was Republican chairman in 1973 and was named to the party's state central committee.

She is chairman of the group's organizational committee.

On a campaign basis, she was manager of the Gov. Milliken-Rep. Esch telephone center in the Wayne-2d District.

naid, who later represented the former 19th district in Congress.

Ms. Radtke didn't step into a college building until she enrolled in Schoolcraft Community College when it first opened in the early 1960s.

She received her associate degree and then a BA in political science from University of Michigan.

She later joined the Livonia Republican Women's Club and two years ago served an internship in the office of Sen. Pursell.

When Pursell ran for a second four-year term later that year, Ms. Radtke was named his campaign manager.

In the recently-completed congressional

campaign, she was the district manager with Ms. Skrel coordinating the Wayne-2d portion of the campaign.

Like her co-office worker, she graduated with high distinction and a 3.8 honor point average.

THE CONGRESSIONAL office will be open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays instead of the shorter 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. schedule maintained under Esch.

Pursell, in announcing his district office managers, also disclosed his plans for his first steps as a congressman.

He will serve on the House education and labor committee, the science and technology committee, which he described as the "committee of the future" since it could be the committee which handles energy policies and legislation.

Pursell said both are strong committees and was particularly pleased with getting a position on the education panel since his district includes the University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University, Madonna College and Schoolcraft, Washtenaw and Monroe community colleges.

On the science and technology committee, Pursell expressed hope that southeast Michigan will be picked as the location for a new federal solar research institute.

The administration will announce its choice in March, Pursell said.

PURSELL WILL have a 400 Independence Ave. address in Washington and rent part of a townhouse owned by Russell Strange, former Michigan state legislator who is now a director of the National Science Foundation.

Although Pursell said he is reducing his Washington staff to expand the district offices in Livonia, Ann Arbor and Monroe, there will be two familiar faces in the capital when he takes office next week.

Those belong to Bill Kearns, who will continue as Pursell's press secretary, a post he held during the past campaign, and Northville's Nancy Nirider who will handle casework.

Pursell is expected to resign his state senate post when he is sworn in as a new congressman.

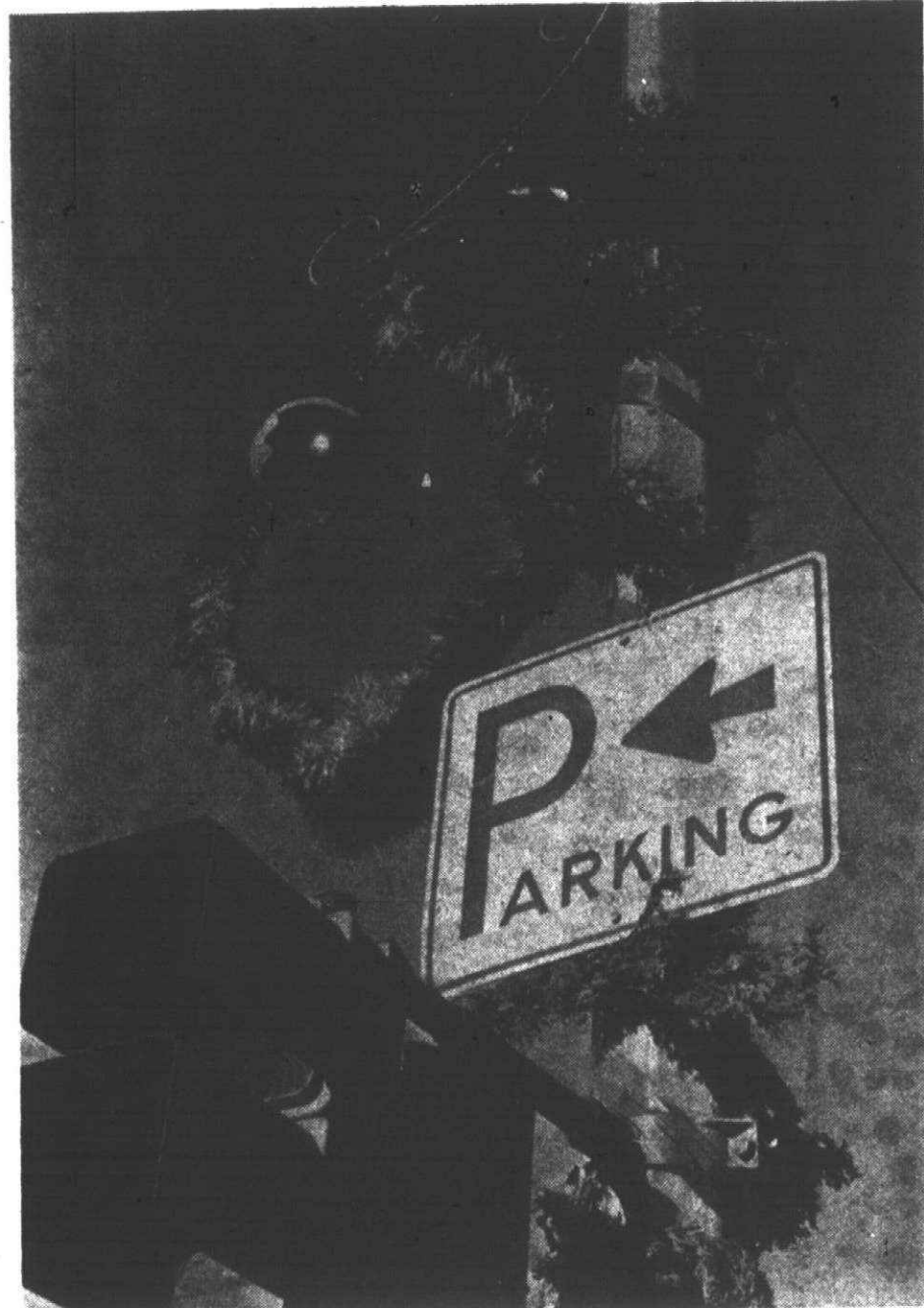
Pursell's Nov. 2 victory by 344 votes is still being challenged by his Democratic opponent, Dr. Ed Pierce of Ann Arbor.

Although Pierce has lost several legal challenges in his quest to have a recount of the election, the Democrat said earlier that he may ultimately challenge Pursell's right to assume the congressional seat when the House convenes next week.

One option the House has is to hold a recount on its own. If that happens, it would pay the cost of the recount and attorneys' fees for Pierce and Pursell.

April-June review

Highlights are Munieo and 1-vote millage defeat

This is the second installment of a four-part series looking at 1976, covering the months of April, May, and June.

APRIL 1
Faced with mounting pressure from several groups in the Canton High athletic community, varsity football coach Jim Muneio and his staff resign, triggering a lengthy controversy.

Ray Quada submitted his resignation as assistant city manager of the City of Plymouth, effective May 17, to accept a position as City Manager of Lowell.
APRIL 5

Plymouth Canton football players meet and vote their unanimous support to Muneio and his assistants.

Twenty-six students at the Centennial Park combine efforts with students from Livonia Bentley High School to wage a propoganda campaign against smoking.
APRIL 8

The second member of the City of Plymouth's administrative team hands in his resignation. Bill Zirblis stepped down as director of the parks and recreation department.

George Wilson punches his time card for the last time at the Plymouth Post Office

after 35 years of service.

The Plymouth Fire and Drum Corps wraps up final preparation for its trip to the nation's capital.

APRIL 12

The City of Plymouth received a \$20,000 bonus in addition to the \$33,000 already allotted them to initiate low-cost housing rehabilitation program.

APRIL 15

The superintendent of schools is directed to delay a response to all resignations submitted by the Canton coaching staff until completion of a review of all aspects surrounding the situation. Meanwhile, the stalemate thickens as the Centennial Park coaches support Muneio and his staff, while Canton parents support school trustee Joe Gray, who allegedly led the charge to have Muneio ousted.

APRIL 19
After months of conjecture and speculation over the route, the new M-14 highway will cross Northville Road. It was learned that it will be depressed from Haggerty Road to Sheldon Road.

APRIL 26

A 76-page evaluation performed by a research team from Wayne State University endorsed the modular scheduling concept at the Centennial Educational Park. The report essentially stated, "...the educational program at Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem high schools has far more positive features than negative ones..."

APRIL 24

Plymouth Salem biology teacher Linda Wallace was shot in the arm by a gunman in Cordele, Ga. The gunman went on to wound 14 more people, murder three, before taking his own life.

Dr. E. J. McLendon, a member of the Plymouth Board of Education, receives two honors. The first honor comes from the health education department of Central Michigan University, while the other accolade is a federal appointment from President Gerald Ford to serve as a member of the National Advisory Council on Alcohol Abuse, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Administration.

MAY 10

Fifteen hundred mentally handicapped youngsters from the Wayne County area participate in the Special Olympics contest at the Centennial Park, sponsored by the Civitan Club of Plymouth, Wayne, and Livonia.
It's the end of an era as Harold Hammill

retires after 50 years of service as an engineer working in western Wayne County.

MAY 17

Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelley issues an opinion on the responsibility a community has to provide crossing guards. In a response to a statement sent by State Rep. Carl Pursell of Plymouth, Kelley stated, "My conclusion is that while a school district is authorized to provide personnel for the conducting of schoolchildren across streets and highways... a school district is not obliged to provide per-

sonnel to conduct children in the crossing of streets and highways enroute to and from school."

The nation's bicentennial spirit and state's heritage was celebrated jointly in the opening of the Bicentennial-in-the-Park program scheduled during Michigan Week. Students at the Centennial Park give the nod to Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter as the nominees for the 1976 presidential election in a mock election run at Canton High School, and directed by Canton's government instructor Audrey Etienne.

Regulatory agencies too cozy with business

Laxity for safety precautions and overzealousness for nuclear development seems to plague the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC).

In recent days, we the public have been bombarded from all spectrums of the media that the commission's management has been intentionally turning its back to shortcomings and is purposely thwarting any serious and warranted reappraisals for the public's safety.

A dissident Soviet scientist, now living in exile in England, said a nuclear accident in 1968 had killed hundreds of persons and made thousands ill from radiations. Why? The Soviets waived safety precautions for nuclear advancement. Is that to be a sample of our destiny? Moreover, why does the NRC give the appearance of being partial towards the private enterprises in the nuclear energy field?

Simply put, there is a "revolving door syndrome" between the regulatory commissioners and the industries they regulate.

Because of the federal Freedom of Information Act, Common Cause's research found that 58 per cent of top NRC consultants came from private enterprises holding licenses, permits or contracts from NRC.

Obviously, the potential for conflicts of interest is inevitable when the ties are congruous.

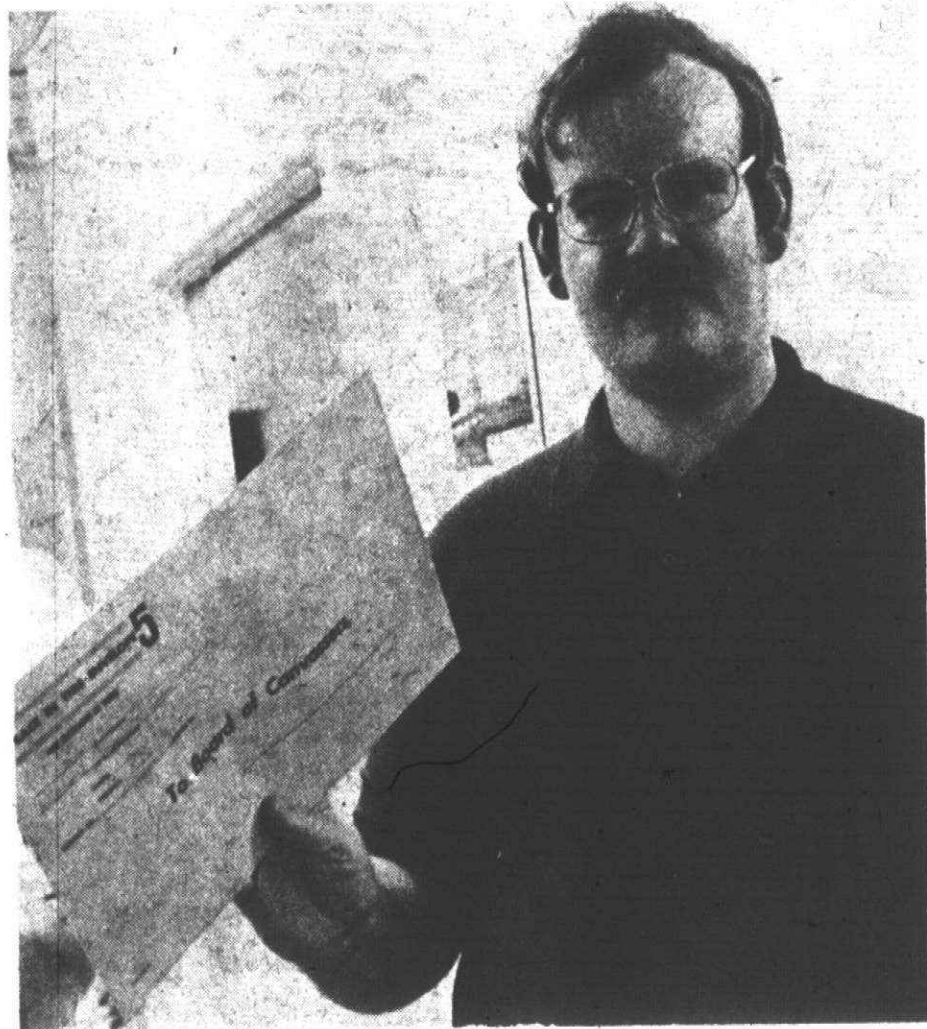
I am in serious doubt whether an objective relationship can be established, when NRC draws such a high percentage of its top policy-makers from private firms which have close dealings with the agency.

Thus, I strongly sense a need for executive conflict of interest legislations that calls for 1. full public disclosure of the personal finances of top officials and consultants to make sure that continuing financial relationships do not tie government employees to their former industrial employers; 2. Public disclosure on a regular and systematic basis of the previous employment of high government officials in the private sector; and 3. public disclosure of the post-government employment of top officials to expose the extent of the revolving door relationship between industry and government.

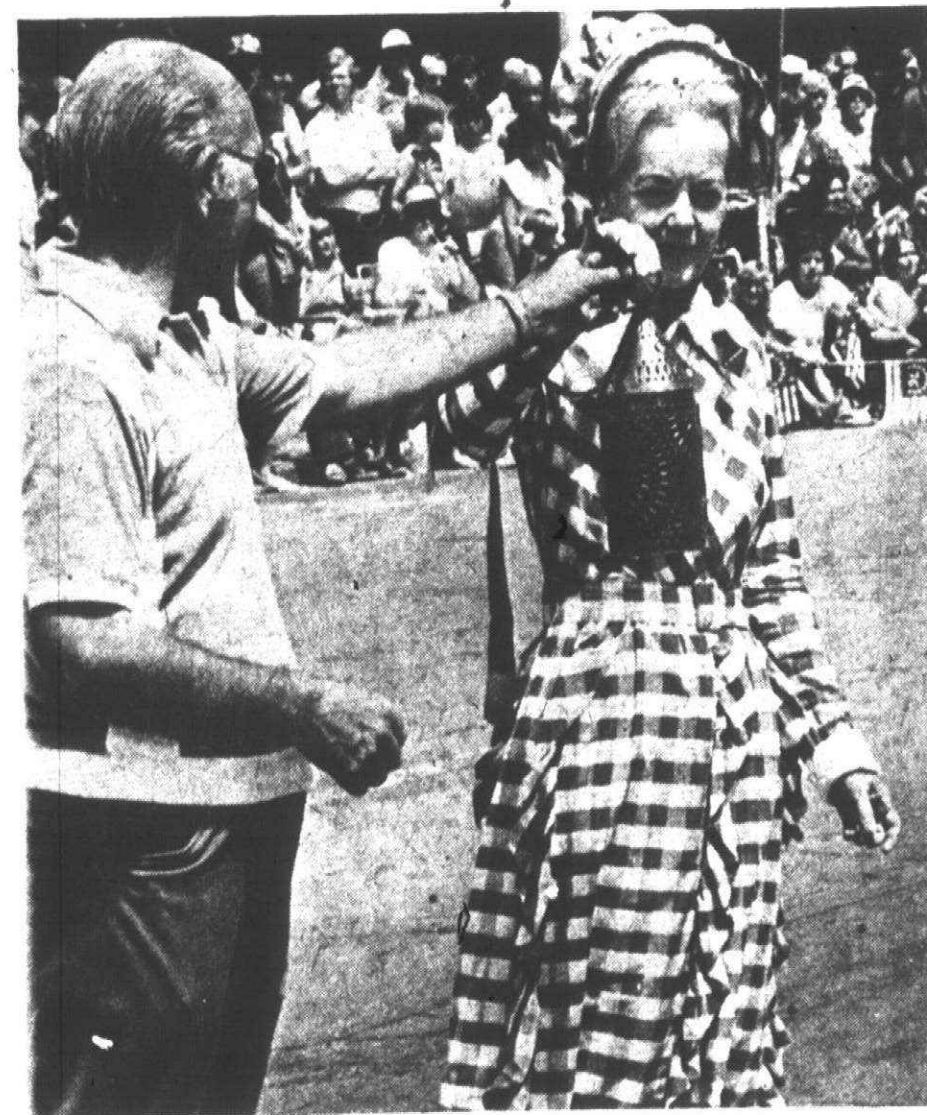
These measures (realizing that some dependence on industry expertise is a necessity) focus on making such influence visible to the public. With the ever-increasing citizen distrust of the NRC's (not to mention the Securities and Exchange Commission, Food and Drug Commission, Consumer Product Safety Commission, etc.) incestuous ties and biased policy-making, the above measures are surely within the realm of necessity.

Existing today is a definite state of apathy—a disease that has no age, sex or racial barriers. Snap out of that apathetic state and make conflict of interest legislation your "cause." President-elect Jimmy Carter is drafting tough new regulations to curb the traffic between industry and government. Write and ask your Congressman how he can insure its passage.

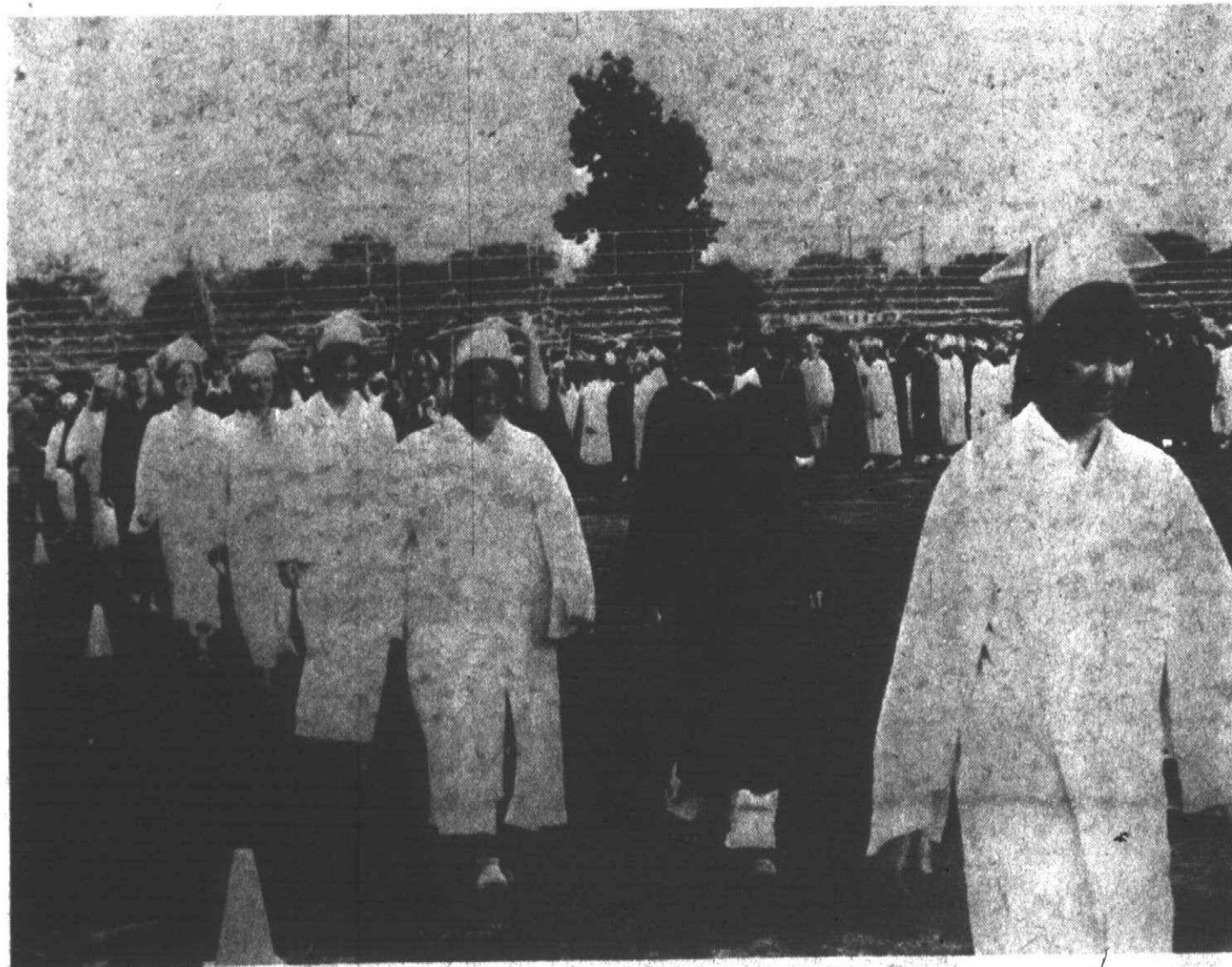

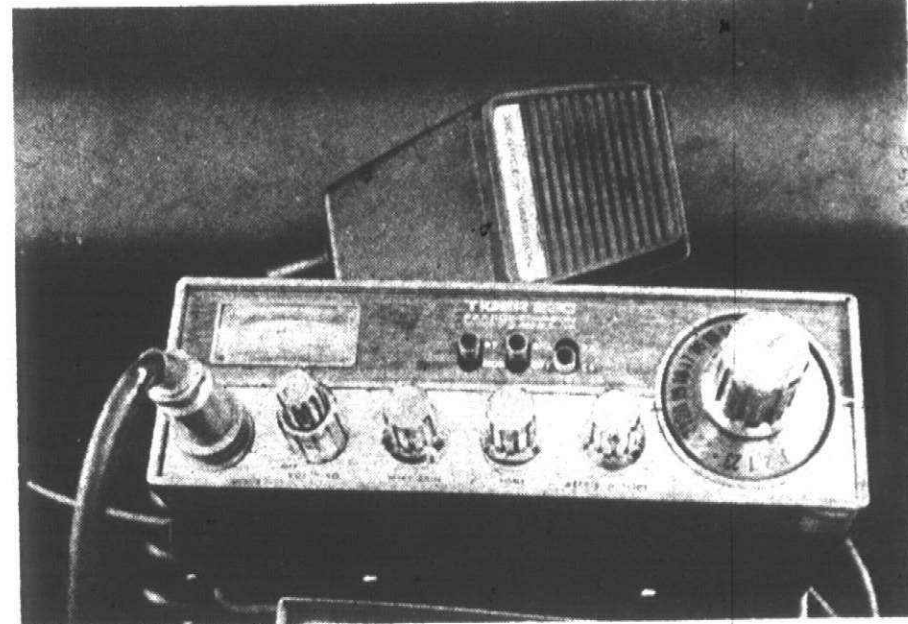

Homestead tax credits are offered

All senior citizens, widows of seniors, veterans, blind persons, paraplegics and other permanently disabled persons should file after Jan. 1 for their homestead property tax credits from the state of Michigan.

Deadlines for filing are June 30 for active servicemen, eligible veterans and disabled persons. Seniors, paraplegics, quadriplegics, widows and the blind must file their claim by Dec. 31, 1978, according to Canton Township Supervisor Harold Stein.

Stein said he is seeking volunteers to help people fill out their homestead tax credit forms. Residents will help and instruct applicants in filling out the forms.

All scheduling will be done through the supervisor's office.

Anyone interested in helping should call 397-1000 to be included in the assistance program. Seniors interested in receiving help should also call and ask for the supervisor's office.

Correction

Site plans for the Cherry Hill Apartments complex and an addition to the Countryside Motel were approved by 5-2 votes at the Dec. 14 meeting of the Canton Board of Trustees.

Contrary to information previously reported by the Canton Observer, site plans for the complex do show a berm between the apartment buildings and I-275.

Trustee Robert Myers, who cast one of the dissenting votes, had hoped developers would construct a berm between the apartment buildings and Cherry Hill, even though the township's berm ordinance does not require berms in that location.

Although the site plan for the Countryside addition did not show a landscape plan, as previously reported by the Observer, motel owner Louise Tabor had submitted a separate plan to board members showing the location of existing trees and shrubbery.

The 176-unit complex is proposed for a site on Cherry Hill at I-275. The Countryside Motel is located on Michigan between Lotz and Hamon.

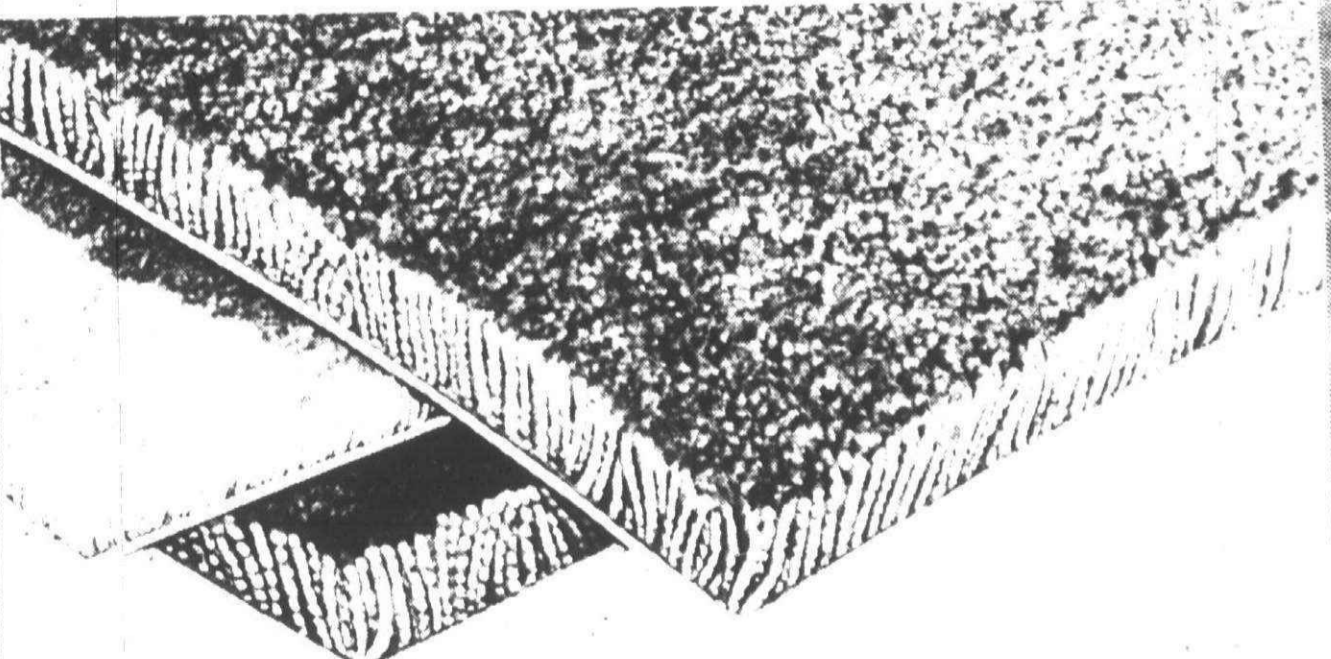

At last the bicentennial year is over—or did it end six months ago on July 5? Whenever, I'm glad 1976 is drawing to a close because, frankly, I'm bicentennial to death.

It has been better these past six months, but January through June was an experience nobody should have to suffer. The bicentennial year might have been less painful if everyone didn't jump on the bandwagon—usually the same wagon. But everybody wanted to get in on the act and let everyone else know that what they did.

Thus, the bicentennial year wasn't any quiet, patriotic reflective inward-type experience. Instead of taking pride in our past, we were too souped up in the present trying to fire one firecracker after another 365 days a year.

FOR THE PAST nine months I've had a great desire to scream out in protest about all the shenanigans being staged to "observe" the bicentennial. But, until now, I have bitten my tongue and have been content just to take it all in. But, now that the year is coming to an end, I'll unload.

For awhile I was almost convinced that our democratic form of government never would have been conceived if the ladies of 1776 hadn't been adorned with "colonial" dresses. And it almost seemed like the Declaration of Independence never would've been penned if our forefathers hadn't kept warm at night with quilts, made clothing with a spinning wheel, or used candles for illumination.

You see, the whole bicentennial thing got carried away with the "symbols" and stereotypes of how modern Americans conceive life to have been in 1776. This symbolic colonial lifestyle was not the way of life for many Americans of that era. (Some actually wore plain workclothes.) But even if these symbols represented the reality of 1776 lifestyle, what bearing did what people wear and tuck under their chins at night have on why our nation gained its independence?

Actually very little, but it's easier to keep young people busy making candles, quilts, colonial caps and gowns, spinning yarn, and singing "Yankee Doodle Dandy" than to impart to them the desire for freedom, the protest tactics used by rebels to gain that freedom, and the price paid in bloodshed, death, disease and imprisonment.

It didn't bother me so much that I was flooded with requests to publicize people doing much the same thing. I realized each believed their effort to be unique and

they each would like a clipping for their scrapbook of what was done in the bicentennial year.

What got to me after awhile wasn't the redundancy but the irrelevancy of it all. This was such a golden opportunity, or so it seemed, to pass on some of our nation's history to youngsters. But instead of stressing history, we highlighted "heritage." In fact, sometimes I became convinced that many believe history and heritage are synonyms which they aren't. So I was saddened that many youngsters lived through the bicentennial year learning much about heritage and very little about history.

Sad because a lot had already been known about heritage. The schools do a good job teaching the nation's heritage because it's easy to place symbols on boards and walls. But how do you display an idea on corkboard? Because of the visual ease of using symbolism in learning, history usually takes a back seat to heritage. But it would have been nice if the whole heritage thing had been junked in 1976 and we all made a real effort to gain a great appreciation of the history of 1776.

But that conclusion comes from someone

who loves history. If you disagree, that's okay. I've got it off my chest and you've been kind enough to follow my thoughts up until this point.

WSU offers RN classes at Schoolcraft

Wayne State University will offer two courses for registered nurses at Schoolcraft College in Livonia beginning January 11.

The Stroller... Tale of the bells

In all seriousness one of the younger generation, talking about plans to celebrate the coming of the new year, asked: "What did folks do before Guy Lombardo and his Royal Canadians came along?"

He was referring, of course, to the traditional passing of the old year and the coming of the new when Lombardo and his band, now a tradition on New Year's Eve, break into the strains of "Auld Lang Syne."

Guy, who has been dominating the New Year's Eve scene on the tube for more years than most persons care to remember, takes time out only to let the TV viewers watch the red ball drop in Times Square in New York. Then, as the red ball falls, his band will stir the entire country side with the famous old farewell.

No other band during the year takes a hold on the general public like he has for more than a quarter of a century. And, in almost every neighborhood the "sweetest music this side of heaven" gets folks to singing the farewell to the old year.

But the young lad who originally asked the question had good reason. For things during his life always have been centered on the TV tube and the big New Year's Eve Balls as a means of celebrating.

It may seem strange to the younger generation that is now clamoring for reservations at the top flight ballrooms and restaurants that there was a time when New Year's Eve celebrations were held in our churches—especially in the smaller towns in the land.

Even though considerable time had been spent in church during the Christmas services the small town populace looked forward to what were termed "Watch Night Services."

The Stroller well remembers many of these celebrations in the little white church on top of the hill at home. And somehow, after all these years, he still feels the thrill of the manner in which the New Year was welcomed.

These were not the usual type of church services. In most cases they were hymn sings with choral numbers by the choir. But the minister, keeping watch on the clock, would signal the start of the official farewell.

He would rise in the pulpit and motion the congregation to rise, too. Then as the last few minutes ticked off the organist would start playing the ancient hymn "Blessed Be The Tie That Binds."

As he did the parishioners held out their

hands to the persons next to them and put all the fervor they had into singing. It always was an emotional moment.

Then by almost perfect timing the minister would raise his hand like a concert conductor and the congregation swung into the strains of Auld Lang Syne.

With that the bell in the church steeple would start ringing out the old year and ringing in the new. It was a moment that was bound to live with you always.

The ringing of the church bell also started the ringing of bells all around town. There were the school bells and the bells on the fire equipment in the town hall. Everyone who had a bell, large or small, would ring it.

So great did this tradition become that when The Stroller came to the midwest to settle down and build a home in the suburbs one of the first things he obtained was an old "cow" bell from back home.

Placing it in a convenient place at the rear of his home, The Stroller and all those in the house at the time, have raced out of the rear door at midnight to ring the bell.

This has been going on for years. The old bell has weathered many a winter night and the tugging of the rope as it sounded the coming of the new year. And he wouldn't miss taking part in this tradition for the world.

Not only house guests, but neighbors and friends, come each year to ring out the old year and ring in the new.

'Project Piano' seeks teachers and students

A Schoolcraft College program that offers an unusual opportunity to piano teachers in this area also can provide a bonanza for some fortunate beginning students.

These youngsters would start lessons—two a week—with teachers of piano teachers so the student teachers could observe their mentors' methods.

The cost is \$30 a month. The opportunity comes through expansion of a program that began in September under the title "Project Piano."

Schoolcraft has been conducting for four years a study course that involves 28 hours of credit work and results in a certificate for piano teaching.

Several of the graduates who have completed the certificate have gone on to earn state certification as piano teachers, according to Don Morelock, director of Schoolcraft's piano department.

"Project Piano" made its appearance in September as part of the certificate program.

As it works out, eight youngsters ready to begin piano lessons are signed up, two to each of the teachers in the department. Morelock, Jean Candlish, Linda Wotring and Donna Borgert.

THE TEACHERS give each child a lesson each week, in their homes or at Schoolcraft, and these lessons are video taped for the students in the piano certification program to view and discuss.

In addition, the teachers get together Saturday mornings with all eight children for a group lesson, and the student teachers in the program are on hand to watch that.

"After the group lesson," Morelock said, "the students stay for discussion. It gives us a good opportunity to work with the teachers on a week-to-week basis and observe the methods that lead to good progress for the students."

Opportunity for additional young students comes, Morelock said, because the Schoolcraft department is planning to add a second class of students in January and then another in the fall.

"That will give us three levels or proficiency to observe," said Morelock.

Ms. Wotring said the program also is a benefit to the children taking the lessons because they get teachers with a great deal of experience for a reasonable rate.

FOR THE PROGRAM, the Schoolcraft staff wants beginning students, preferably between the ages of seven and nine.

They must be available for two lesson times, one Saturday morning.

Thurston's JV squad battled its counterpart from Plymouth Salem and won 73-66 in the finale held Thursday morning at the Plymouth gym.

Thurston earlier beat Stevenson while Salem knocked off Churchill to gain the finals and a chance for the tourney trophy.

The varsity championship saw Salem beat Thurston 39-37 Tuesday night at Churchill.

In that varsity game, Thurston was forced into a zone defense and a slowdown offense which almost upset the quicker Rocks.

But the junior varsity game, the Eagles

employed the man-to-man defense and hustling offense their known for. Thurston was smaller than Salem but its overall quickness paid off at the end.

"The kids did a super job," said Eagle coach Dennis Mikel. "They never stopped hustling. This is a good group of kids and the future is looking up (for Thurston)."

"We're 3-4 this season but we've been in every game. The biggest margin for a loss was four points. We lost one game in overtime against John Glenn and lost at the buzzer against Franklin."

Salem coach Craig Bell gave Thurston a lot of credit for its performance. The Eagles' victory marked the first time this season Salem JV has lost. The Rocks won the tournament last year.

"Everybody (on our team) played the best they could," Bell said. "We just got

beat by a better team. It was no fluke. They deserved to win.

"We had trouble with our transition game," the Rock mentor said. "We didn't convert from offense to defense well."

TO SAY THAT the Rocks lost the game at the free throw line would be an understatement. Thurston went to the charity line 35 different times and converted on 24, while Salem made four of 10. The Rocks committed 24 personal fouls while the Eagles were called for nine.

The main reason for the Rocks foul problems was Thurston's ability to move down the court quickly on the fast break and force Salem's defense to commit errors.

The Rocks opened the game with a man-to-man defense but were forced to play a zone because the Eagles were getting too many easy layups.

THURSTON STARTED the game with six straight fast break points which set the tone for the rest of the game. The Rocks came back to tie things at 6-6 but another Thurston spurt brought the score to 11-6.

Salem closed that margin at the end of the first quarter and both teams settled into a see-saw battle.

The Eagles made one too many turnovers just before halftime and the Rocks owned a 34-30 lead at intermission.

Thurston tied the score at 39-39 and went ahead midway in the third period. The Eagles led 50-48 going into the final period and took advantage of 17 fourth quarter free throws to put the game away.

Eagles' guard Carey Dondy led all scorers with 20. Tim Fazzini followed with 19 and Pete Bradley and Mike Fitzsimmons added 14 each.

The Rocks were led by Paul Dillon's 16. Kevin Kelliher popped in 14, Bill Thimm added 12 and freshman Rob Neu chipped in with 10.

Stevenson topped Churchill, 78-46, in the consolation game.

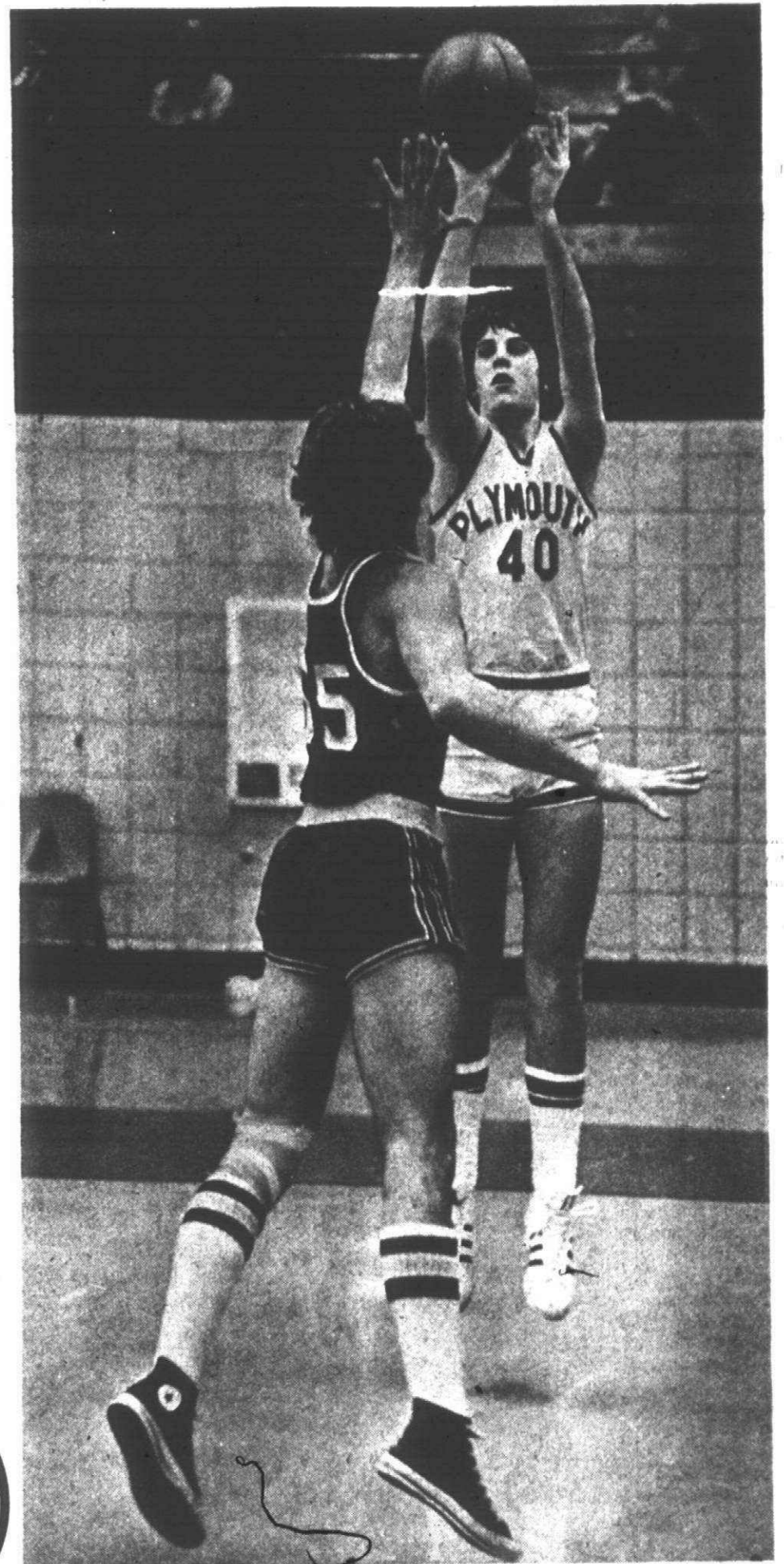

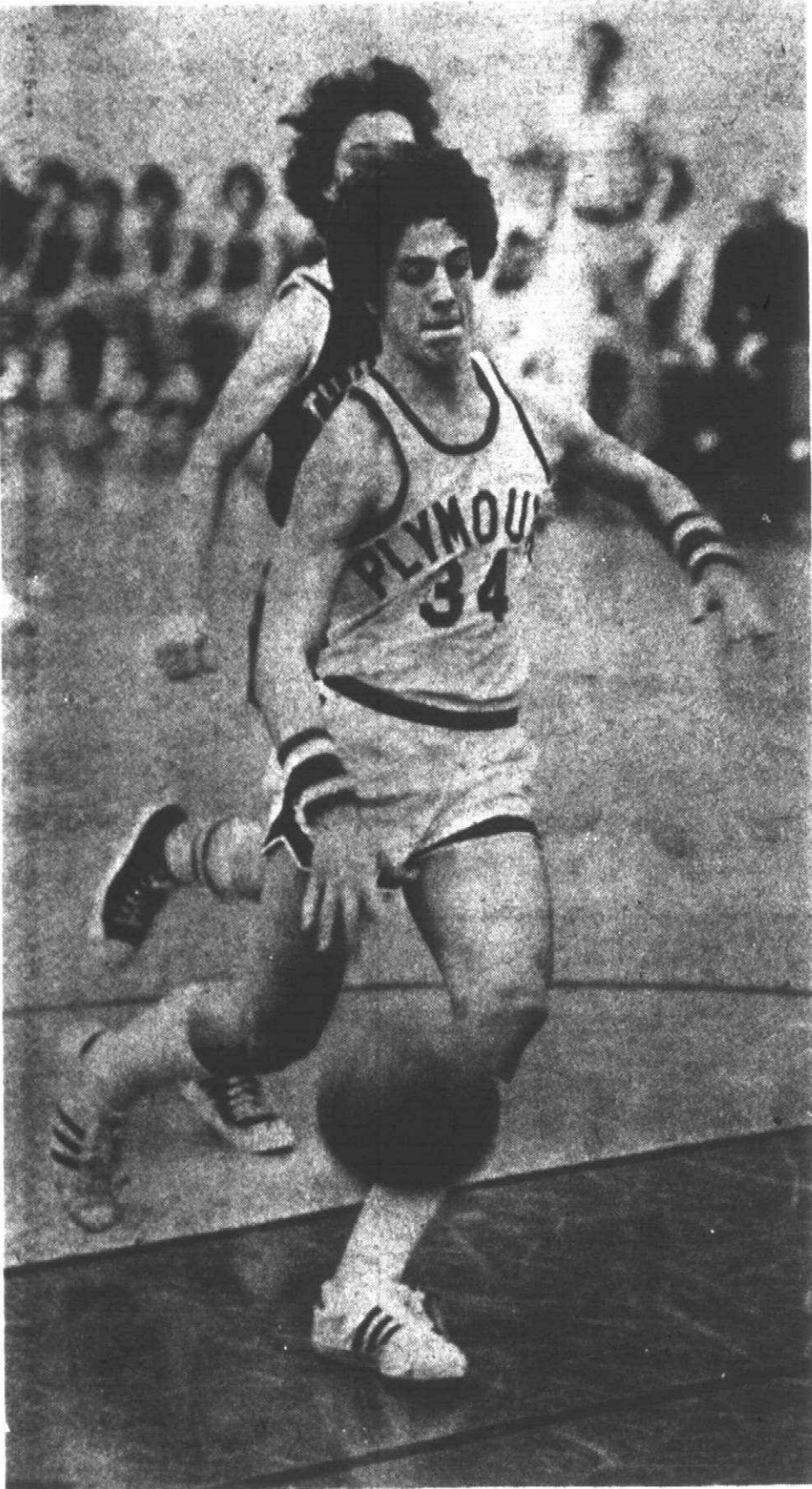
Tankers honored Thursday

The Observer sports section will run its all-Observerland girls swim team in Thursday's edition. The special squad was selected by area coaches two weeks ago.

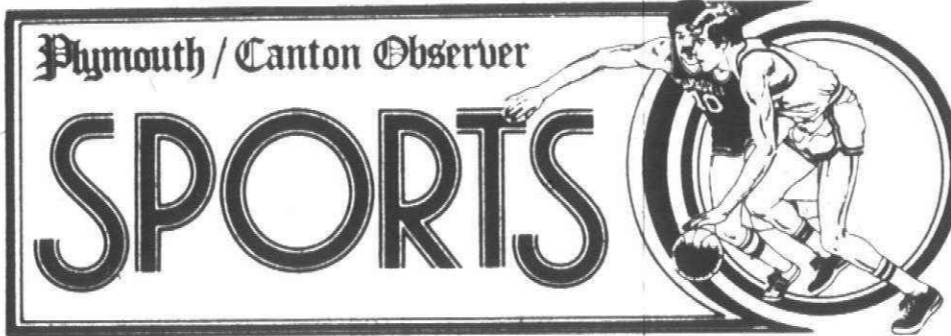

The Plymouth-Canton Junior Athletic Association (PCJAA) enters its 10th year of service next week and with each season this organization seems to grow stronger and stronger.

The purpose of the PCJAA is to sponsor and promote organized sports activities for the youth of the community and to develop their citizenship, sportsmanship, fellowship and physical development.

This organization is solely non-profit and voluntary which serves the Plymouth Community School District. The facilities used by PCJAA are from the schools and a large part of its funds come from merchants in the area.

The PCJAA holds regular board meetings with league officials to discuss current and future plans. Past presidents of the association were John Ennis, George Hunter, John Van Wagoner, Ron Hees, Dick Randazzo and Howard Oldford. Jack Gray is the current president who was elected in September.

Estimated hours donated by people for

the whole year is an amazing 40,380. Hockey parents donate 12,000 hours per year; baseball 10,880; basketball 10,880; and football 7,000. All this time is given for the good of the youngsters in the area—without pay.

Despite this volunteer system, cost still

prevails and financial help from other interested people is always welcome. The 1975 budget was \$128,384 and the estimated budget for 1976 is \$143,580. The past hockey season saw costs run to \$64,594. Baseball figured to \$34,076, football \$10,833, and basketball \$10,475.

Dillon elected to board

John H. Dillon, manager of research and development for the Adistra Corp. of Plymouth, has been elected to the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority board by the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners.

Dillon will fill the unexpired term of Jesse A. Rutherford, who died Nov. 23.

Dillon joins the seven-member board which governs 10 metroparks in Washtenaw, Livingston, Macomb, Oakland and Wayne counties.

Born in Orleans, Ind., Dillon earned degrees from Indiana State University and the University of Indiana. His HCMA term expires in 1980.

Gov. William G. Milliken signed Public Act 145, sponsored by State Sen. Gary Byker (R-Hudsonville), who hails from the fine pheasant-hunting farmland on the west side of the state. The bill was supported by the state Department of Natural Resources, Michigan United Conservation Clubs and Michigan Farm Bureau.

Said the governor: "While the new law creates some additional restrictions, it also adds some valuable protections to the recreational user against unfair and arbitrary trespass charges."

What it means is that the slob hunters have again given everybody a bad name, and we now must put up with another bothersome—if necessary—restriction.

Maybury begins ski rentals

Is cross country skiing—an increasingly popular sport—the winter activity for me? Those who have contemplated the question but hesitate to purchase the necessary equipment without first experiencing the sport now have an opportunity to experiment through a pilot program at Maybury State Park in Northville.

In an agreement with state recreation officials and Round River Adventures, an Ann Arbor-based outdoor recreation packager, a cross-country ski rental concession has been instituted at Maybury for a one-year trial period.

The purpose of the program, which primarily concerns rentals but also group instruction and moonlight tours, is to enable novices to develop a taste for cross country skiing.

Both Doug Maddex, a freelance writer who launched the project, and Robert Remer, Maybury park manager, agree that potential for success is good for the first ski concession of any kind in a lower peninsula state park.

Maddex, who was researching an article on the booming sport of cross country skiing, discovered that "it looked like an open market."

"I talked about it with Dick Taylor, president of Round River. He took the idea to his board of directors and they allocated \$20,000 to try and make it work."

Remer said that state recreation authorities had thought of starting its own rental concession, but decided against it due to a lack of money and manpower. "Again, we didn't have the expertise to start out with," Remer said.

Round River negotiated with the state on the particulars of the concession and came up with a one-year contract. According to Maddex, the state will receive two per cent of the gross revenues. Round River secured an option for a second year.

"As far as the park is concerned," Remer said, "anything that brings people in, especially family units, is greatly appreciated."

"Our program is for the kind of person who has been thinking about cross country skiing but doesn't want to go out and buy a lot of equipment before he knows whether he'll like it or not," Maddex stated.

Maddex, who will manage the concession for Round River, said that the biggest problem getting started to date was obtaining a stock of skis.

He said that many manufacturers of the longer, narrower cross country skis have been deluged with orders and unable to fill orders until next year.

After checking around the country, Maddex was able to acquire about 200 pair to launch the program. "The state of the ski industry tells the overwhelming demand," the manager said.

Maddex can be convincing when he talks about the merits of cross country skiing.

"There are three or four major reasons why it's a good sport," he said. "It's an esthetic thing in that it's a good way to get in with nature." Maddex began.

"It's also something you can do by yourself. If you go out to Mt. Brighton (downhill skiing), you try not to get run over. As far as cost, it (cross country) is very reasonable compared to other sports."

"Kids, older people and the non-athletic

type can learn how to cross country ski in an afternoon and it's something the whole family can do.

"You don't need a big weekend," Maddex continued. "You can be driving along in your car, come across a field, pull off the road and ski for awhile."

Maybury's trails will be jointly maintained by Round River and the park services, Maddex said. "The state will be helping with trail clearing," the manager said, "but we'll inspect them (trails) and if they get too compact, we'll drag and groom them."

As during previous winters, cross country skiers with their own equipment are welcome at Maybury, which has developed

into a popular setting for the sport.

"The thing that has really surprised us is that we've had so much cross country skiing," Remer said.

Rental rates are \$2 per hour for the first two hours and \$1 per hour for each additional hour. There are special children's and family rates and a handful of group programs and tours.

Rentals are available noon-6 p.m. weekdays and 8 a.m.-6 p.m. weekends. Week-end times will prevail on weekdays the week between Christmas and New Year. The rental hotline number is 971-5373.

Maybury is located at 2045 Beck, Northville and is easily accessible to area skiers.

In cage tourney

Leading scorers for the Rockets were Daran Armstrong with 21 points and Doug Martin with 13 points.

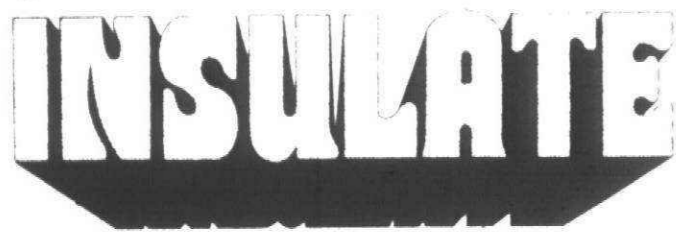





German 'Santa' prefers front door to chimney

As a young girl growing up in Berlin, I used to be very upset the day before Christmas just when Santa Claus was due. I always wanted my father to see him, but he never seemed to have any luck. Five minutes after he went out to look for him, Santa Claus would come and then be gone before my father returned. The fathers of young girls today are much luckier. A booming economy has allowed for many Santa Clauses. Now all the children can wait anxiously with their fathers and mothers on that long afternoon of Dec. 24 for that thump of heavy boots on the stairs and a loud knock, knock on the door that all German children know means St. Nikolaus has come.

Like the American Santa Claus, he rides from the skies on a big sleigh pulled by reindeer. On his back he carries a big sack filled with sweets, toys and other things for which children have been acting good all year. But in Germany St. Nicholas has problems. Because houses are so expensive, most people live in apartment buildings, few of which have fireplaces.

SINCE IN THAT country he is expected to make a personal appearance, he has to arrive by way of the front door. Everything is ready for his arrival, the tree is trimmed and the house is filled with good smells. The week before has been a busy one for children because they must learn a Christmas poem. Santa will

ask them to recite it, so they must be prepared. They must also concentrate on good table manners and their behavior greatly improves. After all, Santa will want information on that too, and it may have an effect on the expected presents. In the old days an apartment was heated by a tile oven, which stood in the corner of every room. In the middle of the oven was a special metal compartment in which food could be kept hot for meals. At Christmas time this compartment was mostly used for baking apples and the room was filled with the beautiful smell this made. On Christmas evening it blended with the smell of duck or goose and cakes coming from the kitchen. While in earlier days, the father had to

leave all this to go out and put on his Santa suit today there is a Santa Claus connection, between an organization and parents. They can call or write to the local university where there is a group which hires students to act as Santa Clauses. THIS ORGANIZATION maps out the city, neighborhood by neighborhood, so one St. Nikolaus does not have to do too much sleighing around. Each student gets a few acting lessons, a costume and numerous addresses. When he arrives at an apartment, he finds a sack of presents waiting at the door. Inside is a list telling him the person for which each present is intended. Although he carries a rod for naughty

children, he rarely uses it, as most bad behavior can be forgiven with promises from the children to be better next year. Soroptimists honor Laura Callow

Laura Carter Callow is the winner this year of the Women Helping Women award of the Soroptimist International of Livonia. Runners-up for the honor were Laura Toy, a program director at the Western Wayne County YWCA, and Gloria Root, who retired recently as co-chairwoman of the Livonia Clothing Depot.

Livonia organizations were invited to nominate for the award women deserving recognition for their community contributions, with emphasis on the advancement of women.

The committee making the selection included Martha Griffiths, honorary chairwoman; Rosina Raymond, committee chairwoman and trustee of Schoolcraft College and Rita Radzialowski, St. Mary Hospital administrator.

Other members were Virginia Handzlik, consultant, and Jessie Sanderson, media specialist in the Livonia school district and Livonia Soroptimist president.

CO-CHAIRPERSON of the newly formed Michigan ERAmerica coalition which supports the Equal Rights Amendment, Mrs. Callow has been working for ERA for several years.

She speaks on it one or two times a week, traveling to various parts of the state. She has been on both radio and TV to talk about her favorite subject.

Mrs. Callow is a member of the Livonia League of Women Voters, serving as its president in 1968-69. The state league recently appointed her as alternate delegate to the coalition, Women Organized to Meet Existing Needs (WOMEN), the purpose of which is to initiate and effect legislation concerning women.

She is a member of the women's advisory

board of Schoolcraft College, and was responsible for the "Women in Politics" presentation at the college during International Women's Year.

In 1972, she helped form the Northwest Wayne County Chapter of the National Organization of Women (NOW), and served as legislative coordinator in 1973-74.

LAURA TOY, a 1975 graduate of the University of Michigan-Dearborn, works at the Western Wayne County YWCA to create classes for women. She provides child care for mothers who need to learn new skills and find new roles.

Miss Toy is president for 1977-78 of the Livonia Business and Professional Women's Club and chairwoman of the Livonia Youth Commission. She has coached girls' track and field at Frost Junior High School and coached a girls' baseball team.

Together with Sarah Power, U.M. regent, she has begun a state-wide women's caucus to counsel and assess women's needs around the state and help them learn how to change government policy. Greatly interested in politics, she founded and is chairwoman of the Livonia

Women's Democratic Caucus.

Ecology is another major interest, revealed by the fact that she helped establish the Livonia Ecology Commission and served as commissioner from 1972-75. She was founder and director of the Livonia Environmental Awareness Center from 1971-73.

In 1971, she was appointed by Gov. William Milliken to the Environmental Task Force for Rodent Control. She also has been chief coordinator for the March of Dimes in Livonia.

GLORIA ROOT, for 12 years, has been closely identified with the clothing depot maintained by the Livonia school district in Jefferson Elementary School.

As co-chairwoman, she has helped Livonia residents who, because of economic or other problems, are in need of clothing. She has been involved in Scouting, PTA, March of Dimes and the Goodfellows. She has "adopted" a senior citizen, whom she supplies with supportive services.

Mrs. Root also works with women probationers who are assigned by the Livonia District Court.

Soroptimists offer women 3 grants for education

Three cash grants, one for \$2,500 and two for \$1,000, be awarded to deserving women through the Soroptimist International during 1977.

The Soroptimist club of Livonia is now accepting applications for all three.

The \$2,500 award is being added this year by the McCall Pattern Co. and its women's interests director, television star Marlo Thomas, to the \$1,000 grants that have been part of the Soroptimist program for several years and in the past have been won by residents of Livonia and Plymouth.

Top consideration, said Jessie Sanderson, Livonia Soroptimist president, will go to mature women, those who either head a household or have a family dependent upon them.

The awards are meant primarily to help such women complete or continue education or train for entry or re-entry into the working world, Ms. Sanderson added.

The Soroptimist International of the Americas is the world's largest classified service organization for professional and executive businesswomen. It is composed of nearly 1,000 clubs and has a membership of more than 30,000.

IN THE ORGANIZATION'S Midwestern District, which includes this area, a training awards foundation established two awards of \$1,000 each several years ago.

The new grant from McCall's grew out of the "Memo from Marlo" letter that Ms. Thomas published in the company's pattern catalogue after she became director of women's interests.

She said letters from hundreds of readers of the memo led her to ask the company to establish the McCall Life-Pattern Fund, providing the \$2,500 grant.

Ms. Thomas and McCall's selected the Soroptimist International to administer the grant that would permit the winner to pursue an education by providing tuition, books, car maintenance and other needs.

Explaining the decision to establish the grant, Ms. Thomas said the letters she received indicated "there is a great need in our country among mature women—women whose chances for an education and professional growth seem to be over."

"These are the women," she said, "whose future is smashed shut under an external pressure of time payments and doctor bills and hand-me-downs and coping, just coping with what you've got and never having the extra cash to spring for what you might have."

Earnings limit is raised

People under 72 who get social security retirement or survivors checks can earn as much as \$3,000 in 1977 and still get their social security benefits.

That's the word from Charles Anderson, manager of the Livonia social security office, who pointed out the figure represents an increase from the 1976 limit of \$2,760.

"The increase keeps the amount in line with increases in general average wages," he added.

If a beneficiary earns more than \$3,000, the social security payments are reduced by \$1 for every \$2 of earnings above \$3,000, Anderson said. However, no matter how

much is earned in 1977, a recipient can get full payment for any month in which earnings are not more than \$250.

People 72 or over can get their full social security payments regardless of how much they earn. Different rules, including medical considerations, apply to people getting social security disability benefits.

Persons who earned over \$2,760 in 1976 and receive social security checks must send a report on 1976 earnings to the Social Security Administration by April 15. For details, phone 493-1111. In Canton, Northville and Plymouth areas, phone 459-9700.
