## Minister's son held on murder rap

A minister's son was arrested Friday and charged with murdering the caretaker of his father's church.

Scot Edward Wiese, 20, of Westland, was arraigned in 18th District Court in Washtenaw County for the Dec. 8 shooting death of David Lee Cischke, the caretaker at the Plymouth Seventh Day Adventist Church. Wiese's father, Robert, is the pastor of the church.

Judge Kenneth Bronson ordered Wiese held without bond in Washtenaw County Jail. His preliminary examination was held today.

Washtenaw County Sheriff detectives arrested Wiese early Friday morning after his release from the Detroit House of Correction (DeHoCo). He had been serving a 90-day sentence in DeHoCo for attempting to possess a gun silencer.

"We think he's the man we are looking for," said Sheriff's Detective William Gillis. "So we were waiting for him when he got out."

Before he began serving his sentence in DeHoCo, Wiese was employed by the Canton Recycling Disposal Company on Ford Road.

His arrest was the result of a two-

## Tailors make a point at auto plant

Opal Workman makes cars. But she doesn't use a wrench, a screwdriver or a welding torch. Her tools are almost as ancient as civilization itself—needle and thread.

Mrs. Workman, sews and assembles the upholstery in Buick Le Sabres at the Livonia Fisher Body plant.

She is one of the plant's 2,200 sewing machine operators. She uses a double-needle machine and works eight hours a day five days a week, and has been doing so for 22 years.

An experienced sewing machine operator, Mrs. Workman also sews as

a hobby. She says she enjoys sewing whether it is for pay or for fun.

"I like my job very much because I like to sew," she said with traces of a Southern accent. "And I like the friends I have made while working here."

**WORKERS IN THE Fisher Body plant**, according to Harry Strand, superintendent of industrial engineering, make all the soft trim on General Motors cars.

"Soft trim is what you would call material trims," he explained. "We make things like the door inner panels, front and back cushions on seats, covers, and vinyl top covers."

Items like the instrument panel and door moldings are known as hard trim.

The superintendent explained the 4,500 hourly and salaried employees who work at the plant turn out interior trims for 8,000 cars per day.

"We have 725 different trim combinations in various styles and colors," said Strand, who received his engineering training at General Motors Institute. "And we produce some of all 725 trims per day."

**MANY OF THE 2,600 women** who work at the plant, like Mrs. Workman, are experienced sewing machine operators. Experience is the main factor

when hiring a worker at the plant, whether the company is looking for cutters, assemblers or sewers.

"By far our largest number of employees are sewing machine operators," he said. "We get some from the garment industry and others have been hired as graduates of industrial sewing schools."

The plant, with more than a million square feet of work space, has not always been used for new car interiors.

In the early 1950s the plant turned out transmissions. In 1953 it burned down in the largest fire in General Motors history.

## Canton clerical to vote on union

Twenty clerical workers at Canton Township Hall will decide Thursday afternoon if they want to be represented by the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME).

A union election will be conducted 2-2:30 p.m. and could incorporate the secretarial staff into an AFSCME unit already containing 16 township employees—eight from the department of public works and eight from the building department.

"We've always been a family," said one clerical employee. "Now, brother, we're not a family. You're afraid to talk to the girl working next to you for fear of losing your job."

"It seems like every day you're transferred so you don't learn too much about the job. You're doing something one day; the next day you're told you're not doing that job anymore."

"Every other administration I worked under was open. Now every-

thing's locked up, everything's kept quiet."

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein claims administrative officials are taking a "neutral position" on the organizing effort.

"The township isn't going to interfere with their organization drive," Stein said. "You don't interfere with that kind of thing."

**ASKED IF township officials** were prepared to offer clerical workers a raise as an incentive to vote against the union, Stein said that claim is a rumor that has been quashed.

"It is standard practice around here to give pay increases around the first of the year. That was done. So there's no carrot being dangled in front of them as an enticement to vote against the union."

Stein said he called in the entire supervisory staff and asked if promises of remuneration were made to employees. Department heads, Stein said, assured him there had not and will not be any attempt to interfere with the union vote.

"We posted a message to that effect on the board for God and everyone to see. The decision is entirely up to the employees. I'll work with them whatever route they choose."

One clerical worker cited the lack of a civil service commission to hear employee grievances as her reason for supporting the union.

Clerk John Flodin called township hall "quite a friendly place to work" and said any employee having a problem could request a hearing before him, Stein or the full township board.

"They could come to Harold (Stein) or myself or whoever they felt comfortable with and we'll try to resolve it."

But Flodin conceded the lack of a civil service commission is "probably part of the problem."

Canton clerical workers turned down union representation in the 1975 AFSCME vote that unionized employees in the DPW and building department.

## Cars going crunch at record clip

Thwack. Crack. Splat. Car meets road—or rather holes where road used to be.

Anybody who has driven around Plymouth-Canton is no stranger to the pothole. In fact, driving on some streets is like navigating an obstacle course: You try not to swerve into the oncoming lane of traffic while you wrench the steering wheel back and forth to avoid the potholes.

And if it seems that you're playing dodge 'em more and more these days, you are 100 per cent correct.

"This winter has been especially bad for the roads," commented Kenneth Vogras, Plymouth's DPW director, "and it will probably get a lot worse."

While numerous roads in the city have pock marks, Vogras said the two worst were Church Street and Main. "Those are old, old roads," he said. "They've been down for a long time, and they're just showing their age."

**PLYMOUTH AND CANTON townships' roads** haven't escaped the ravages of age and winter, either. "We've got some pretty bad areas out here," acknowledged Canton's DPW superintendent Jake Dingley.

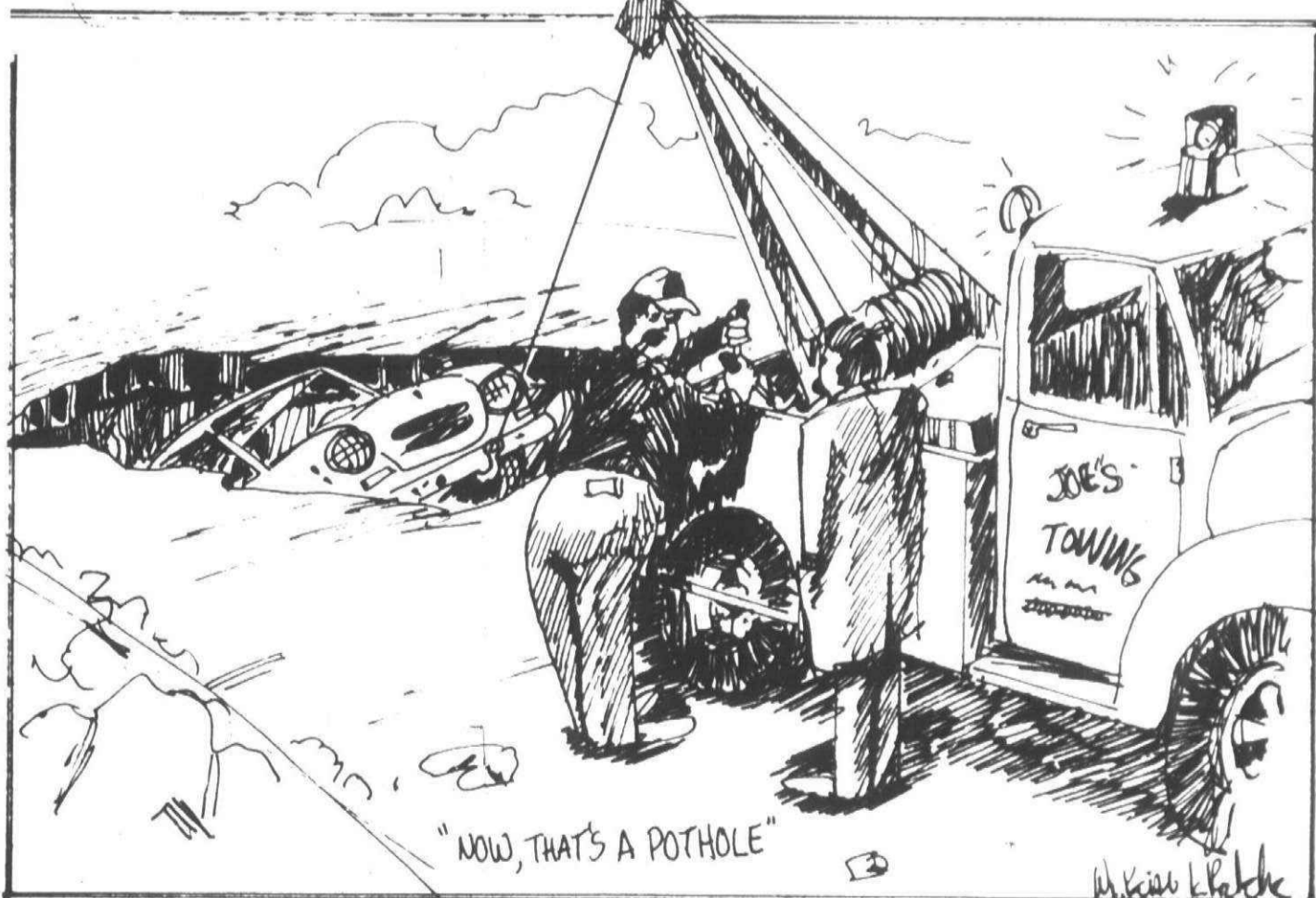
Among those he called attention to were Cherry Hill, Haggerty and Canton Center roads. "The weather has been bad and the heavy volume of traffic on the major roads hasn't helped."

The holes happen when water seeps into cracks in the asphalt. Then, as the water freezes, it expands, ripping apart the road surface.

The more moisture or water that is absorbed, the worse damage is done to the road.

Once a given road has reached the point where large chunks of asphalt have been loosened, there are two alternatives. The road can be re-paved or the holes can be filled in with cold patches.

Because re-paving is a major

expense, Vogras said, the city opts for "temporary patching."

Since Jan. 1, Plymouth has spent \$1,200 in wages (228 man-hours) for road patching. It also has used about \$1,000 worth of cold patches.

And, according to Vogras, "those patches are very temporary. They'll only last until the next big snow if that long."

But, temporary as they are, the cold patches do furnish a small break from the annoying clunks and bangs that signal a direct hit.

In both Plymouth and Canton townships, however, the patch-work is not handled by the DPWs. Instead, the municipalities depend on the Wayne County Road Commission for care and maintenance of the highways and byways.

And depending on who you talk to, the county is either doing a reasonable job, or it isn't.

"They don't do much for us in terms of repairing the roads or in terms of removing snow," said Helen Richard-

## Joyner named to county post

With backing from the Jaycees and the United Auto Workers, William Joyner, 28, of Plymouth Township has been appointed to Royce Smith's former seat on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

Joyner, who lives in the 2d Congressional District, will represent Plymouth, Canton, Sumpter and Plymouth townships, plus portions of Northville, Westland, Belleville and Van Buren Township.

The 27th District he now represents is the largest district in terms of area in Wayne County.

County Commissioner Tom Presnell (D-Westland) nominated Joyner for the county seat.

In Thursday's vote by 25 county commissioners, Joyner received a necessary 13 votes; Robert Myers of Canton came in second with eight; and Fred Montgomery of Wayne got four votes for the appointment.

Joyner was endorsed by UAW Region 1E, Myers by UAW Region 1A and Montgomery by the metropolitan Detroit AFL-CIO.

Another county commission seat—in the 7th District—was filled Thursday by the appointment of Martha G. Scott (D-Highland Park). Both seats were vacated when county commissioners Smith and Chester Wozniak resigned to head the "Super Sewer" authority in the Wayne County Department of Public Works.

**THE TWO county appointees** will hold office through Jan. 1, unless they're reelected in the Nov. 7 general election.

There was no scarcity of applicants for the \$16,000-a-year post. The Plymouth-Canton community alone had five applicants including Joyner.

Canton Township Trustee Robert Myers, one of the applicants, is not taking his loss lying down. As Myers sees it, the appointment boiled down to a battle between candidates endorsed by UAW Region 1A and UAW Region 1E. And Myers claims Region 1E gave him and his region office (1A) "the old stab in the back routine."

He bitterly and redundantly refers to Joyner as "an imported carpet-

bagger," referring to the fact that Joyner moved into the 27th District last fall from Livonia.

Jim Poole, former Canton trustee, was a bit more gracious. He wished "this kid Joyner all the luck in the world" and said he would continue to wish him well "if he represents the people of western Wayne County well."

Poole agreed with Myers that the UAW endorsements had a great deal to do with the appointment but thought any criticism should be leveled at "the people who don't organize into a power base."

"If people like John Q. Citizen got off their butt and organized, they could do something instead of sitting home, reading the paper and complaining," he said.

Poole, a Republican, said he was interviewed for possible endorsement by UAW Region 1E.

**JOYNER CALLED Myers' remarks** "unfortunate."

I have always been a person who spoke and voted my conscience," he said.

The new commissioner of the 27th District said he would "pick up the fights Royce Smith started"—specifically lobbying for more out-county

## No plans set for coal crisis

Although the coal miners' strike could cause a critical power shortage in Michigan very soon, the Plymouth-Canton community may be caught by surprise.

Despite warnings from state and energy company officials that power blackouts could start by the middle of next month or sooner, a random check of governments and businesses in the area indicated that only a few of them had given the matter serious thought.

"We haven't discussed what we would do to save energy as a government," said Plymouth Township Clerk Helen Richardson. "It's a very grave concern, and we should be thinking about it. But we are not."

# Weather, confusion deter local auto sales

Bad weather and confusion. That is what is stopping Plymouth people from buying cars, according to area dealers.

The combination, and not the lack of money or the people's unwillingness to purchase cars at this time, has caused the slump auto sales in the area.

With one exception each dealer in the admitted that sales have been down since November and the snow didn't aid matters, either.

THE EXCEPTION was Don Massey, the Cadillac dealer, who confided that business was a bit better than last

year at this time and for an unusual reason.

"We now have our new big showroom, and a higher inventory. If we had been in the old location where we were last year, I suppose our business would have been down, too."

"The weather was a big factor," Jack Selle, the Buick dealer, said, "but confusion also is to blame. The people are confused about the government rulings. They don't know what kind of a car to purchase because they don't know what edict the Carter administration will hand down next."

"On top of that, the public is confused over what type of car to buy. They don't want the small car, after

driving a big one for years.

"And they don't want to buy a big car for fear they will be ruled against. So, they really don't know what to do. The bad weather was much to blame for the business slump, but this confusion is as much to blame as anything else."

Selle, who is ever the optimist, predicted that things will get better when the sun shines every day, giving people the urge to buy again. All told it should be a good year.

"There is no doubt that the heavy snows and ice had a lot to do with the business slump," Tony Marino at Colonial Plymouth, commented. "But with the sun shining the last couple days,

business is picking up. It sure was quiet for a while, but I think we'll have a good year."

Leo Calhoun, the Ford Dealer, provided an interesting point to lend credence to the charge against bad weather and confusion.

"I just returned from a meeting of the country's Ford dealers and outside of the snow belt, business is keeping up with the predictions made last fall."

"True, the bad weather hurt us in the Plymouth area. But January this year was better than January of a year ago. And there is plenty of activity now that the sun is shining."

ONE OF THE things puzzling Cal-

houn is the slow movement of the large model Fords.

A year ago the large Ford was out hottest model. This year, at least up to now, it isn't moving as well."

Then, with a chuckle, he added, "People have to drive the small cars to get the desire for the big ones. But, all in all, things look bright for the rest of the model year."

Lou LaRich, the Chevrolet dealer, not only blamed the weather in Michigan for the dip in sales, but the almost unbelievable conditions around the rest of the country.

"When you read and see what hap-

pened during the storms in Boston and the east coast and then switch to the west where the rains have caused flooding and even the uprooting of cemetery graves, you can't blame people for being confused and a little timid about what to do.

"At the start of our model year, one of the industry leaders predicted that the first three months of 1978 would be bad. And he didn't miss."

Like the other dealers, LaRiche is sure the confusion of the government and the bad weather caused the slump and that business will rise with the coming of more sunshine and warmer weather.

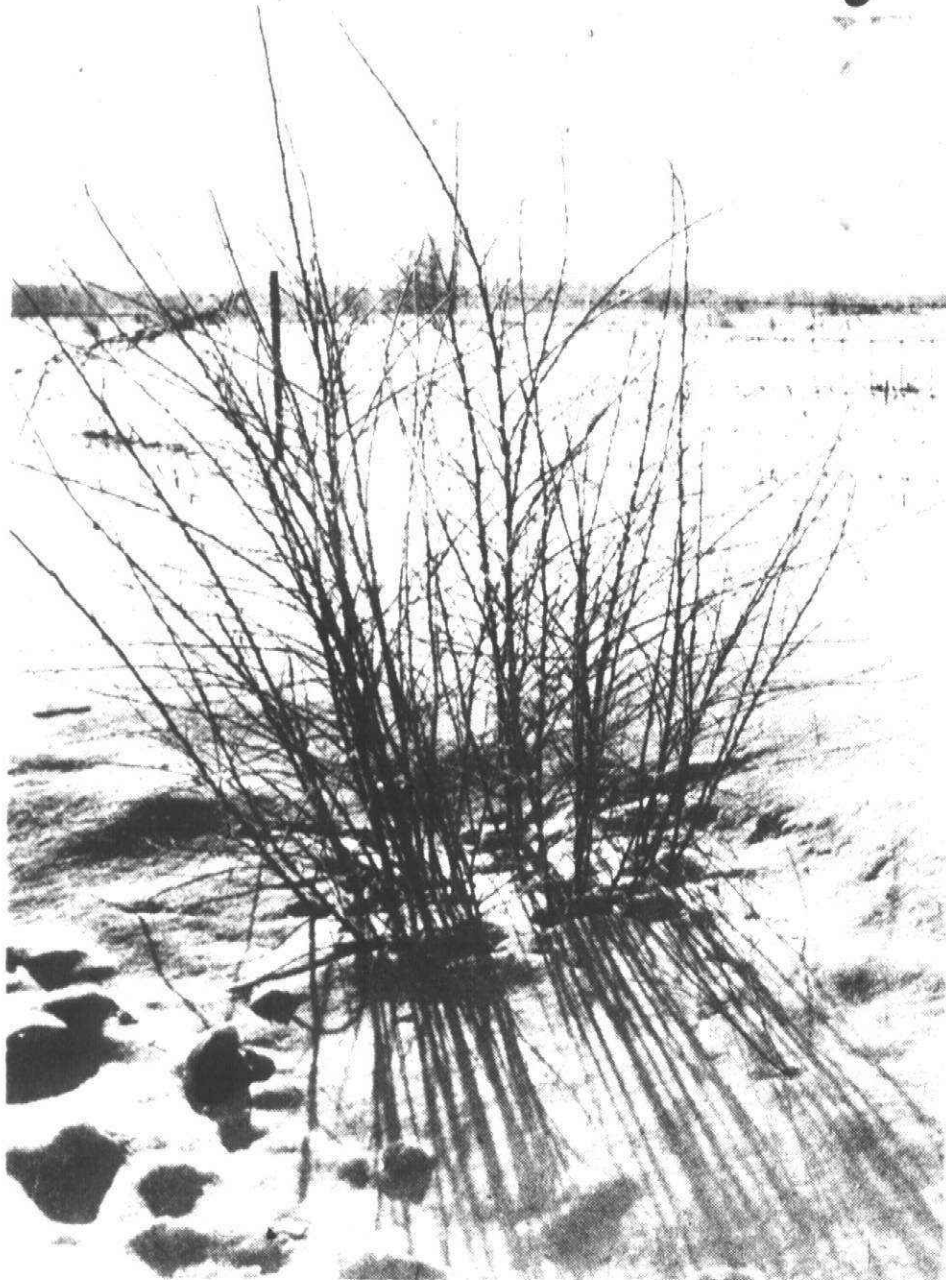

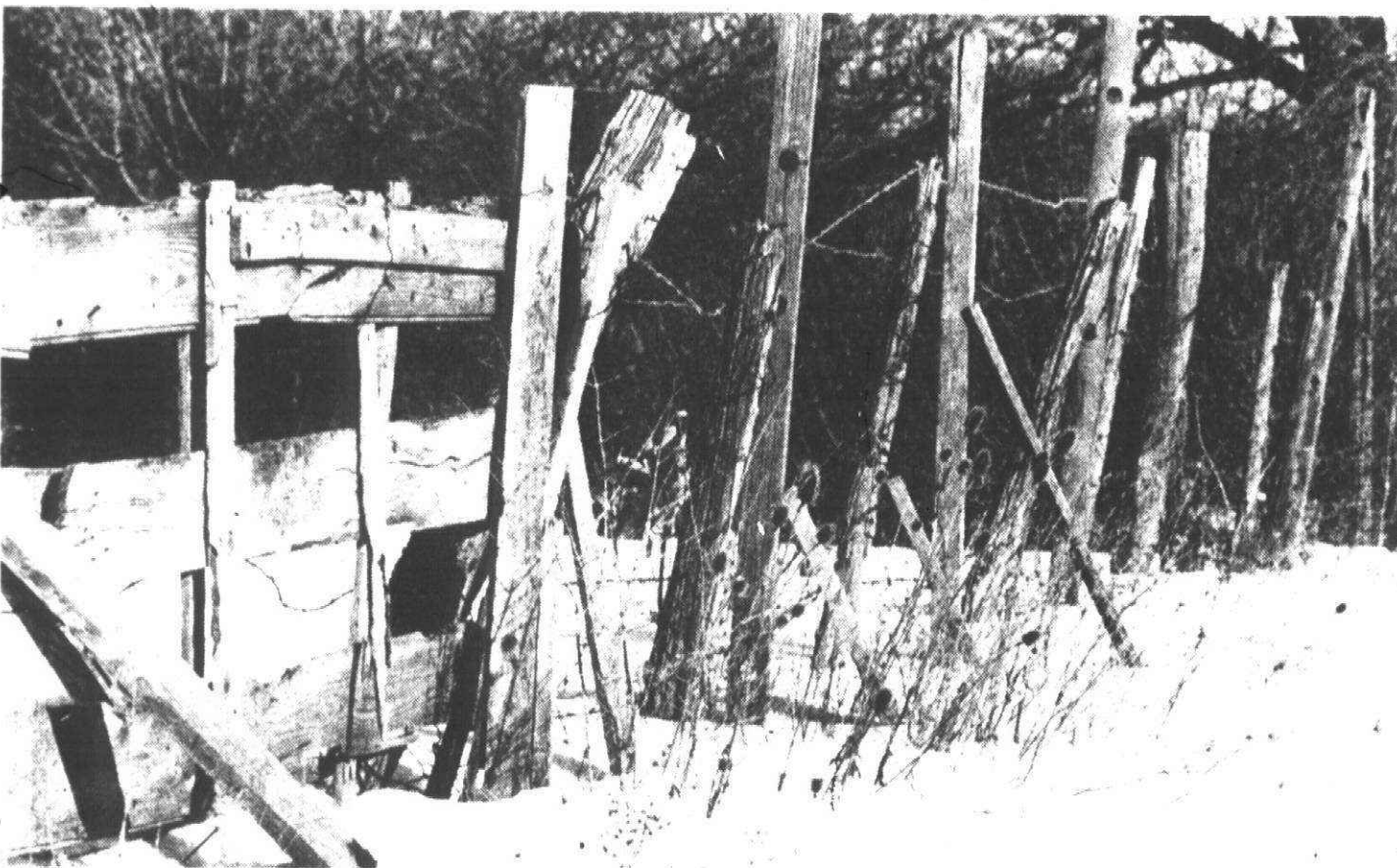

# Alternative high school has support but no site

There may not be an alternative high school for some time, even though the idea has the support of a majority of the members of the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

And it's not philosophical differences or money that is the primary roadblock to establishing an alternative high school.

The major hang-up is location. The board doesn't agree with the site recommended by the alternative education committee, but doesn't know where else to locate the program.

The citizens' committee had recommended an area in Central Middle School. But locating the alternative high school there met strong opposition from the school's staff and parents.

**THE AFTERMATH** of Monday night's board workshop on alternative education is that trustees likely will appoint another committee to search for a suitable location.

The rejection of the Central Middle site, and probable new search, means the alternative high school will not be started by this fall as had been hoped.

The school board wants an alternative high school to help students who cannot cope with the environment at the Centennial Educational Park or who need individual attention.

The program suggested by the citizens' committee calls for a staff of five instructors and a student body of between 100 and 125.

Trustee Joe Gray opposed the program. Trustee Elaine expressed reservations and indicated she was apt to vote against the plan unless modified. The other five trustees indicated strong support for the plan at the workshop session.

But when it came to a location, Carol Davis, Flossie Tonda, Gray and Mrs. Kirchgatter all expressed their intent to vote against the Central Middle site.

At that point, the chance to begin an alternative high school this fall evaporated because the citizens committee—after eight months study—had been unable to find another location which the district could afford. Other places, they reported, would be too expensive to renovate.

**DURING THE REGULAR** board meeting held prior to the workshop, a petition of opposition was presented to the board by Fred Crissey on behalf of the Central Middle staff.

Crissey stressed that the staff strongly supported the concept of an alternative high school but were

equally strongly opposed to the selection of Central Middle as the site.

"We believe that total separation of the alternative high school students from the middle school students is impossible. And it is unreasonable to expect that all activities of the high school students will be closely monitored," Crissey said.

"It is difficult enough for our students to make the adjustment to middle school without placing them in close contact with older students having difficulty adjusting to high school. The students who cannot adjust to high school will be undesirable role models for our sixth graders."

"The philosophy of the school district and this board is that the middle school student is at an age where his particular needs require a separate program and separate building. But the site recommendation seems to be based purely on economic considerations and not on the board's philosophy of middle schools."

**BARBARA CARPENTER**, president of the Central Middle PTSO, presented the board with petitions signed by about 680 parents expressing opposition to using Central Middle for the alternative school.

"Most parents also support the idea of an alternative high school, but we just cannot support the proposed location."

At the beginning of the workshop session, Tom Yack, board president,

expressed appreciation to the 14-member citizens committee for the many hours invested over eight months in the alternative education report.

Speaking for the committee were Dale Yagiela, Tom Santer, and Dr. Michael Homes, assist. supt. for instruction.

Yagiela said the proposal was for students to attend the alternative school for basic core learning, with some students returning to the CEP for special classes. Most would spend two-thirds of their school day at the alternative school site, he added.

"Parental involvement is a critical concern, so critical that the committee feels it should be a key criterion in deciding whether to accept students into the program," Yagiela continued. "Without parental participation, the chances of students obtaining success are dubious."

Homes responded that a "surrogate" or substitute parent could meet the criteria in those cases where parents refuse to help their students. "But what will happen, when involvement is resisted, is that parental involvement will be quite small to begin with and will increase as the relationship with staff is developed."

Gray also objected to the goal-setting portion of the program. "Many of the kids at the CEP now having difficulty cannot handle the freedom, cannot make choices, and they need posi-

# Principals seeking pace on non-economic issues

The newly-formed Plymouth Congress of Administrators (PCA), which represents 37 principals and administrators, still doesn't have a contract with the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

The PCA was given official recognition as a bargaining unit in July and is trying to hammer out its first master agreement.

Although the two parties haven't formally sat down at the bargaining table for a month, they are "still talking," according to Norman Kee, chief negotiator for the board of education.

Kee said negotiators for each side weren't that far apart but had "a dozen or so small points of difference to iron out."

However, he acknowledged that the PCA had recently filed with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission, (MERC) charging the board with

violating a tentative agreement and failing to bargain in good faith.

"But that kind of suit is fairly common in bargaining," said Kee. "It's kind of a catch-all thing."

The negotiating team for the PCA has requested fact-finding, but Kee said he hopes to have a contract settled before the fact-finding process is completed.

Among the issues separating the parties, Kee said, include the method of evaluation to be used for the principals, a maternity leave clause, a binding arbitration clause and the number of secretaries allotted to the principals.

He played down the importance of money in contract talks.

Although bargaining started last April, Kee said he is not worried about a strike. "I just don't think it will happen, mainly because a strike is not a viable weapon for 37 people. But animosities are built up."

# Nursing home evictions stopped as state probes

The Hendry Convalescent Center in Plymouth is under investigation by the state Department of Public Health for alleged violations in the transfer of nursing home patients.

The licensing and certification bureau of the health department is studying complaints filed against Hendry by Citizens for Better Care, a nursing home watchdog group based in Detroit.

"We've been involved in investigating the complaints and we're inclined to believe there are violations," said Fred Traill, chief of the state licensing and certification bureau. "We're not about to sit still."

The convalescent center announced early last month that it was evicting 40 elderly patients on Medicaid because it could no longer afford to keep them.

The nursing home receives \$24.55 per patient per day through Medicaid, compared to a cost of \$32, according to executive director John C. Hendry. So far, six patients have moved to other nursing homes and two have died.

**THE COMPLAINTS** stem from a patients' rights provision under federal Medicaid certification requirements.

The patients' bill of rights says nursing home residents can only be transferred due to a change in medical status, for nonpayment of services or for the welfare of the patient or surrounding patients.

Traill said that if the investigation documents the charges, the state's first move would be to notify the convalescent center of the findings and recommend taking away Hendry's certification.

The local nursing home can either stop evicting patients at that time or appeal the finding before a state hearing officer, Traill said. The next level of appeal would be a battle between the state and the convalescent home in circuit court.

Hendry vows to fight the state even if the dispute ends up in court.

"I don't want to cross that bridge until I come to it because that would involve seeking legal counsel," Hendry said. "But who in the hell are they (state officials) to tell me what to do when I'm giving good care and they refuse to listen to my problems?"

"I don't think there is a court in the world that would tell me I can't offer the kind of care people are getting in my home."

The Hendry convalescent center has temporarily stopped sending eviction notices to the relatives of Medicaid patients, according to Marvin Diamond, former public relations director of the state nursing home association who serves as an informal consultant to Hendry.

"I ADVISED HENDRY to stay in the Medicaid program, stop expediting this thing and start providing care," Diamond said.

"If he continues to transfer patients, he might have to get out of the Medicaid program totally and I don't know if that's in the best interest of the home, the staff or the community."

"I think we just have to call a halt to this thing—take a 90-day break and see what we can do for people who are very old and very sick. The amount of time it takes to devote to this issue causes unrest in the staff, patients and family."

If the state decides to strip Hendry of its certification, the nursing home also would lose benefits for 32 patients—out of its 110-patient total—who receive Medicaid.

# Deaf pageant held

A pageant open to all hearing-impaired women, 18-28, will be held in the Detroit area this spring.

Called the Miss Deaf Michigan Pageant, the event welcomes participants who have a hearing loss of 65 decibels or more (ASA) or 75 decibels or more (ISO). Contestants must be graduates of a high school or school for the deaf. They may qualify for the state pageant before graduation.

The winner of the Michigan pageant will compete in the Miss Deaf America Pageant at the National Associ-

ation of the Deaf Convention in Rochester, N.Y., this summer.

representation on county boards governing water, sewers and transportation.

"I think western Wayne County needs a strong alternative to counteract the political force of the City of Detroit," Joyner said.

But Joyner said he'd have to study a bill proposed by State Rep. Tom Brown (D-Westland) to establish a separate county in western Wayne County called "Suburbia" before commenting on its merits or faults.

"My first reaction is that we can do all the things he would like done without forming a separate county."

Later, Joyner said the people of western Wayne County must acknowledge that "the county has a tremendous obligation to the City of Detroit. I've always maintained that the way the city goes, so goes the rest of Wayne County."

Joyner served as administrative assistant to Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara in 1973-74. He lost a bid for state representative in 1974 against Republican Robert Geake. Joyner now works as public relations representative for N.W. Ayer of New York and other clients. His mother, Geraldine, served on the Livonia school board and is now on the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

# Township terms may jump to 4 years

Depending on your point of view, voters in Canton and Plymouth townships could be thrilled or appalled by their supervisors, clerks and treasurers for an extra two years beginning in 1980.

A bill still tied up in the Michigan Senate committee on municipalities and elections proposes changing the term of township administrators and constables from two to four years and eliminating the staggered terms of township trustees.

The four trustees who sit on the Canton and Plymouth township boards are now elected to four-year terms, but two of the four are up for reelection every two years.

Senate Bill 579, sponsored by State Sen. Gary Byker (R-Hudsonville),

would have all four trustees elected to simultaneous four-year terms beginning with the 1980 election.

THE REACTION of local officials to the bill is mixed. Canton Clerk John Flodin favors

extending the term of township supervisors, clerks and treasurers to four years, because, she says, it would eliminate some of the campaigning "that often takes people away from the business of the day."

But he questions the portion of the bill that would eliminate the staggered terms of trustees and put all seven members of township boards up for reelection on the same day.

"Conceivably, the entire township board could be removed in one election," Flodin noted. "One effect of the staggered term was that you always had two experienced people on the board who were familiar with the issues. I think that is a definite advantage to the staggered term."

Although township elections would be held only once every four years under the bill, Flodin said the elimination of two-year local elections would not save the township much money. Townships would still have to schedule elections every two years for state and county races.

month investigation, Gillis said, and ends a "very complex case."

CISCHE'S FROZEN and bullet-riddled body was found by police tracking dogs in a snow bank behind the Adventist Church, 4295 Napier Road, Dec. 15, five days after he was reported missing.

Cischke, 26, was an employee of Garden City Auto Parts and a part-time caretaker at the church. He lived next door to the church.

Police said he had been shot a number of times with a small calibre weapon sometime the evening of Dec

8. Police theorized Cischke had been shot inside the house but ran outside to escape his assailant.

Detectives, who have refused to comment on possible motives for the shooting since the investigation began, remained silent after Wiese's arrest.

"I don't want to discuss the details of this," Gillis said, "because it might hurt the case we have against him." He would only say that drugs were not involved in the incident.

At the time of Cischke's death, Audrey Cischke, his mother, of Redford Township, said she had no idea who would want to hurt her son.

Yockey worded his statement a little more cautiously but said essentially the same thing. "We haven't done a thing. We are waiting to find out what the governor and the utilities are going to ask us to do."

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein said the township had instituted no plans to cut energy use but would go along with "whatever was mandated."

LESTER TINSON, maintenance supervisor for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, said discussions had taken place about what the school dis-

trict could do to cut down energy consumption.

"We have no formal plan, but we are going to have more meetings about it later in the week. But I know we are going to cut down on lights and heat whenever possible." He added, however, that in extremely cold weather, classroom heat could not be reduced by very much.

Bob Farkas, a spokesman for the Burroughs Corp., said a number of "preliminary discussions" had taken place at the executive level, but that no policy had been formed.

tive direction and structure. You are asking them to make a lot of decisions they may not be capable of making. To my mind, an alternative school should be very structured and should be the last chance."

Yagiela answered that the proposal did represent a very structured program, a structure which contains a day-to-day accountability required of the students. "But it is not our intent to set up a program to serve only the problem youth. We want to serve a cross-section of the CEP student body. The alternative school should not be a dumping ground or a place of last resort."

Yagiela added that a separate location was needed so the students could have a sense of identity and to allow the students and staff to work closely together. "An intimate environment is needed to develop the learning experiences these students will require. And then there are just certain students who just cannot fit into a setting as large as the CEP with a student body of 4,400."

The board planned to continue its discussion Tuesday night at a workshop session held to consider when to hold a bond issue election and what to ask for.

A vote on the alternative education program could be taken at the next regular meeting on Feb. 27.







# The Stroller

# On Washington

This is Washington's birthday, and all across the country they'll be re-telling the time-honored story that the Father of Our Country and the first president of the United States never told a lie.

Over the years, since his childhood, The Stroller has heard all of these stories only to find out in later life that the cherry tree story was a figment of the imagination of old Parson Weems, the self-styled "world's greatest liar." Any many a time he has heard the cynics decry the Potomac River feat by saying a dollar went much further in those days.

**THE WASHINGTON** story The Stroller likes best comes to mind each year on the birthday anniversary.

It concerns the bronze statue of the Father of our Country that now stands on the lawn of the Old Mariner Church on Jefferson Avenue, just east of the City County Building. And it is there only because the City of Detroit refused a place for it on Washington Boulevard.

Several decades ago the members of the Masonic fraternity in Michigan decided it would be a fine tribute to have a nice, big bronze statue of the first president placed on the boulevard that was named for him. In those days, Washington Boulevard was one of the nicest avenues in the Midwest—just the place for a great tribute to George.

Immediately, a drive was on to raise the necessary funds and it wasn't long until the fund was over-subscribed and the order placed for the statue.

Up to then, everything was fine. At last there would be a suitable monument placed where it would be a focal point on the boulevard.

Those behind the move scarcely could wait for the day when the bronze tribute would arrive. Big things were planned. There were visions of a mammoth parade with members of the fraternity putting on their best dress to play host to visitors expected from all parts of the country.

**THE DAYS**, though they seemed long, went by. At last the monument arrived. There was joy abounding. But it was short lived.

In the midst of the plans somebody pointed out that the city fathers had not been asked for permission to place the prized bronze on the boulevard.

More disheartening was the word from the city fathers that there was no room for the monument, because another statue was being placed at the Michigan Avenue end of the boulevard. That one would be a tribute to General Pulaski, the famous Polish leader who had gained a mark for himself in military circles.

Imagine that. No room for a statue of George Washington on the boulevard that carried his name. It was of little solace that the fathers let it be known that Wayne Street, named to honor "Mad Anthony" Wayne, was to become an addition to Washington Boulevard and "Mad Anthony's" name would be left to the historians.

What to do now? Where would the statue be placed? Those were the questions confronting the state's Masons.

**EVERY DARK** cloud has a silver lining. It was in the darkest hour that one of the Masonic fraternity asked:

"Wasn't Washington an Episcopalian?"

It didn't take long to learn that he was, and the original questioner called attention to the fact that Old Mariners Church, then moved from the foot of Woodward Avenue to a site on East Jefferson, really was an Episcopalian Church.

And so it came about that the lawn of the old church became the home of the Washington statue.

"As we have more money to work with," Fischer said, "we will be looking for suggestions for projects to take on in the community."

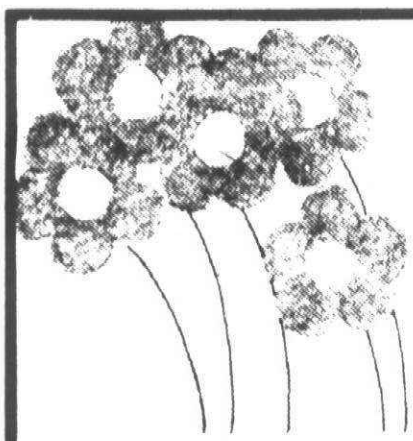

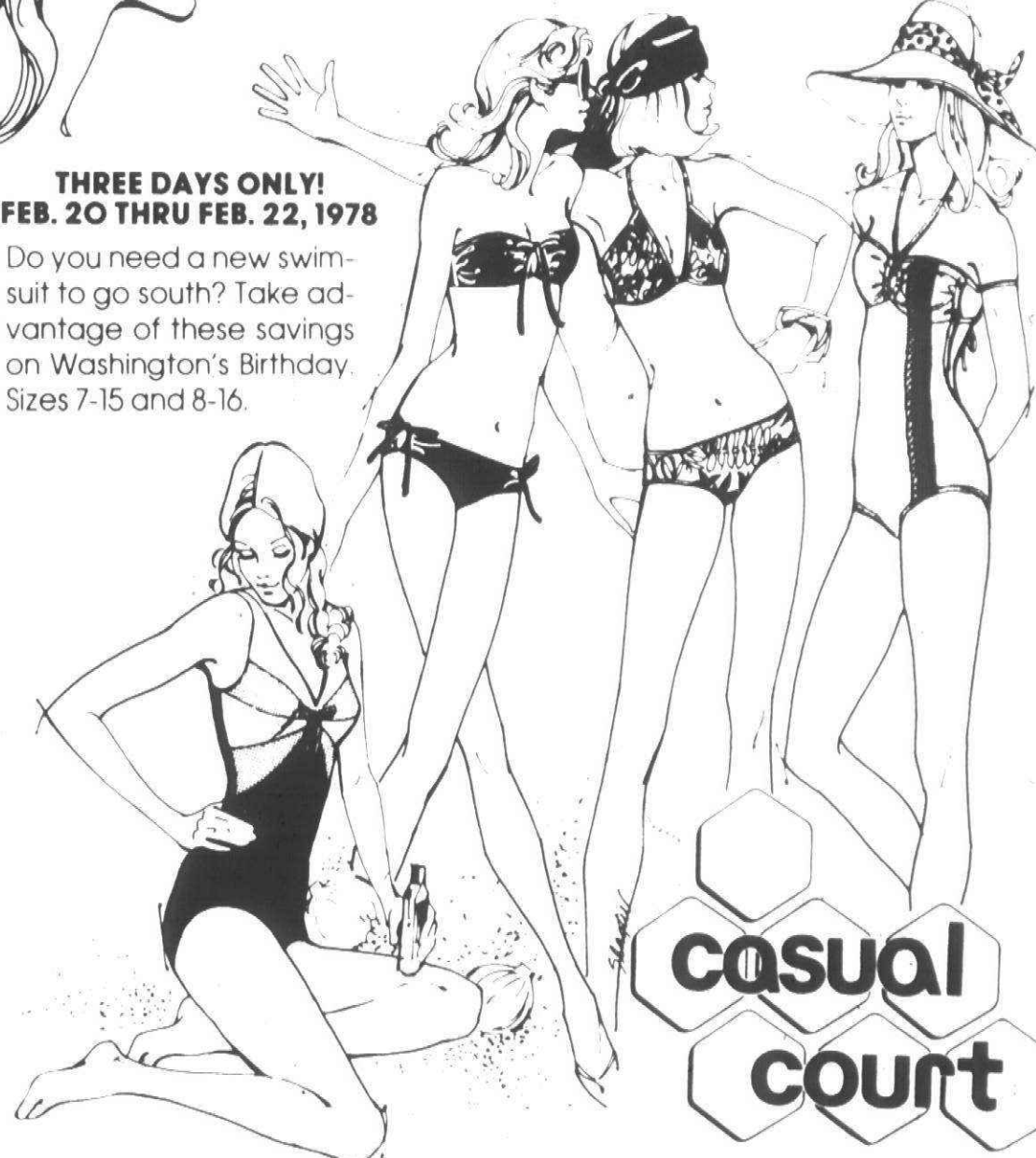



# Mott ends Chiefs' title hopes

Plymouth Canton didn't just lose a basketball game Friday night. It also lost the chance for its first-ever outright league championship. And the Chiefs chances for a tie are slim to none.  
Canton lost a crucial Western Six League contest to Waterford Mott, 58-56, at its own gym, giving the Corsairs a tie for the conference crown.  
Going into the contest, Mott, which

won a make-up game earlier in week to Farmington Harrison, held a 6-2 record and a half-game lead over the Chiefs, with a 5-2 conference record. Mott's victory over Canton raised its advantage to one and a half games.  
The only way the Chiefs could salvage a tie for the title would be for Mott to lose its last league game to Harrison on Wednesday night while the Chiefs defeat Walled Lake Western twice this week.

A tough combination indeed for the Chiefs, 9-8 overall.  
The last time these two clubs met, the outcome meant control of the league race at the midway point of the season. In that game, the Chiefs won handily, 73-60, on the strength of Butch King's 41 points.  
Friday's game also meant control of the league race at the most important time of the season. But this outcome was nothing like the one in Waterford.

Not only did the Chiefs lose by the narrow two-point margin, but it wasn't the same King, who mastered the Corsairs just one month ago.  
King was hit by the flu bug on Thursday night, and although he started the contest and led the Chiefs in scoring with 16 points, it was evident the junior guard sensation wasn't up to par.  
He converted on only two of 11 from (Continued on page 2B)

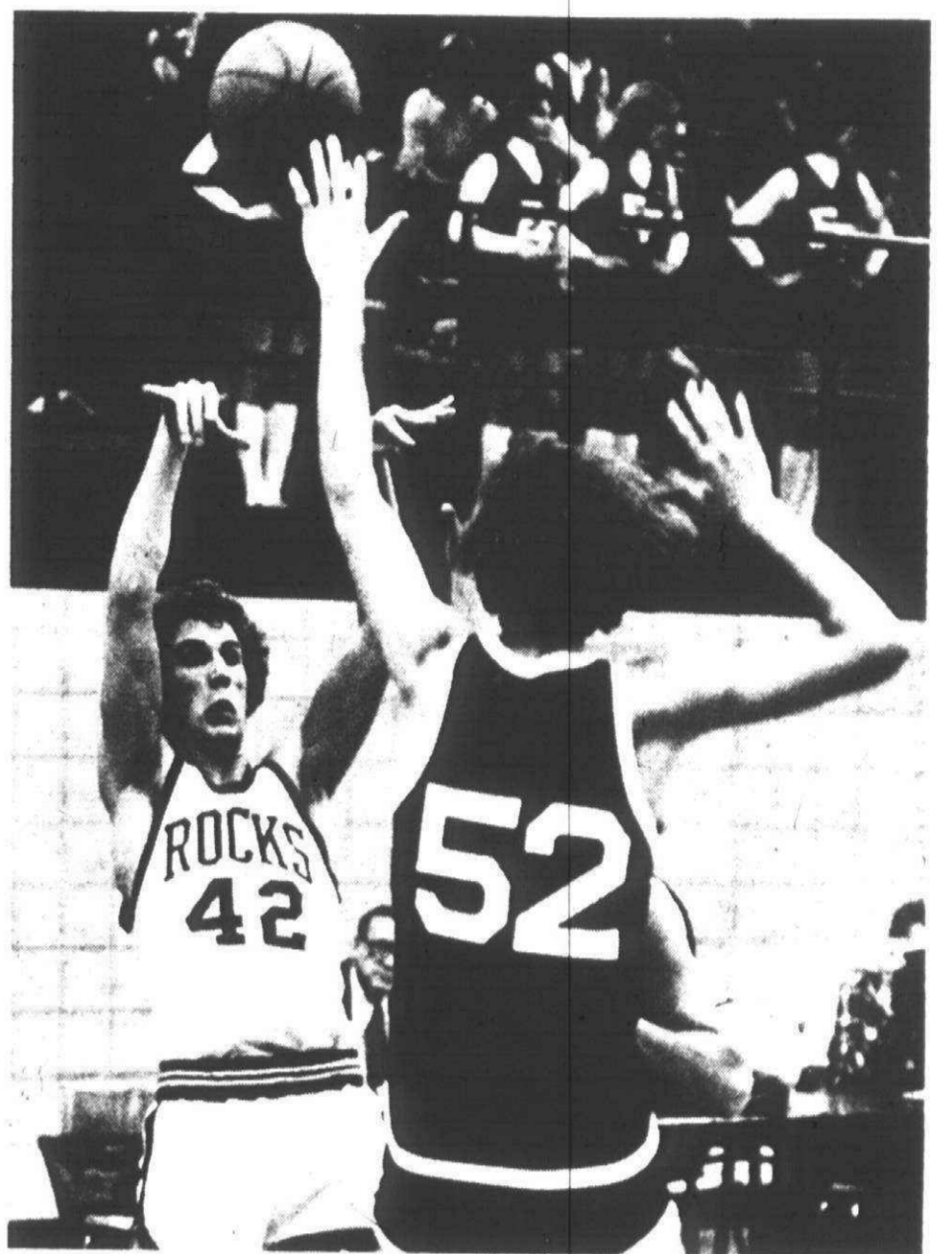
# Rocks stage 2d half surge

Like a race horse that shows little early foot and then comes storming to victory in the last few furlongs, Plymouth Salem crushed Dearborn Edsel Ford under an avalanche of 50 second half points Friday night, 73-41.  
The win hoisted Salem's overall basketball record for the winter to an impressive 16-2, but the Rocks still trail Livonia Bentley by a game in the Suburban Eight title chase with time running out.  
Bentley, 11-1 in the loop compared to Salem's 10-2 mark, can wrap up an

undisputed championship by winning at Redford Union Tuesday.  
However, if the Bulldogs fail at RU, defending champion Salem could tie for the '78 crown by beating Belleville Friday night in the Rocks' final home game of the season.

EDSEL FORD, despite giving away considerable height, used its zone defense effectively to limit Salem to only three baskets in the first quarter Friday and led after that stanza, 10-7.  
With Tom Ellinghausen, Rich Hewlett, John Broderick and Mike Christie hitting the cords, the Rocks started getting better penetration in the second period. They pulled even at 13-13 and then the lead changed hands six times before the halftime buzzer showed the score knotted at 23-23.  
Three minutes into the second half the Thunderbirds still were making a battle of it, 29-29. Then a turnaround bucket by Hewlett after a pass from Ellinghausen gave Salem a 31-29 edge and the rout was on.

CRISP, SHARP passing off their fast break time and again gave the Rocks the prime element their motion offense needs for success, the ability to hit the open man cutting for the hoop.

# Gridder Bob Dasher picks the Crimson Tide

Plymouth Salem All-State gridder Bob Dasher signed a national letter of intent to play football for the University of Alabama Thursday afternoon.  
The announcement concluded two months of speculation on which scholarship the heralded lineman would accept.  
Dasher, a 6-3, 230-pound center, was the catalyst of the Rocks' powerful offensive and defensive interior lines. The team compiled a perfect 9-0 regular season and earned a spot in the state playoffs last fall.  
The "blue chipper" was ranked as the ninth most-sought-after player in the state of Michigan. He visited six different universities during the recruiting period before deciding to play for the Crimson Tide.  
"It was a very, very hard decision—

very hard between Alabama and Penn State," Dasher told the Observer. "I visited Alabama last Tuesday and really enjoyed the people. It's a small campus and they have excellent facilities." Dasher also mentioned the southern climate as a factor in his decision.  
Dasher visited Michigan State University, Penn State University, the University of Washington, Ohio State University, the University of Washington and finally Alabama before making the selection.  
He said he wanted to go to a program which had a winning tradition in recent years, citing Ohio State, Penn State and Alabama as his top three choices. The 18-year old senior cut his choices down to only two schools last weekend, four days before making the final announcement.  
Dasher has played under Salem

coach Tom Moshimer's wishbone offense for the past four years. This is the same system which Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant uses.  
He felt he has a jump on other recruits by staying in the same offensive system but is realistically setting his goals to be a regular starter in his sophomore season. He said, however, he felt he had a chance to snap punts on the special teams during his freshman year.  
"Coach Bryant is a fair man who will give everyone a chance to play," Dasher said. "He is a good guy who relates everything on the field to life. He teaches you how to be a man and cares about you after graduation."  
"You're always one of 'his boys'. He is a fine gentleman."

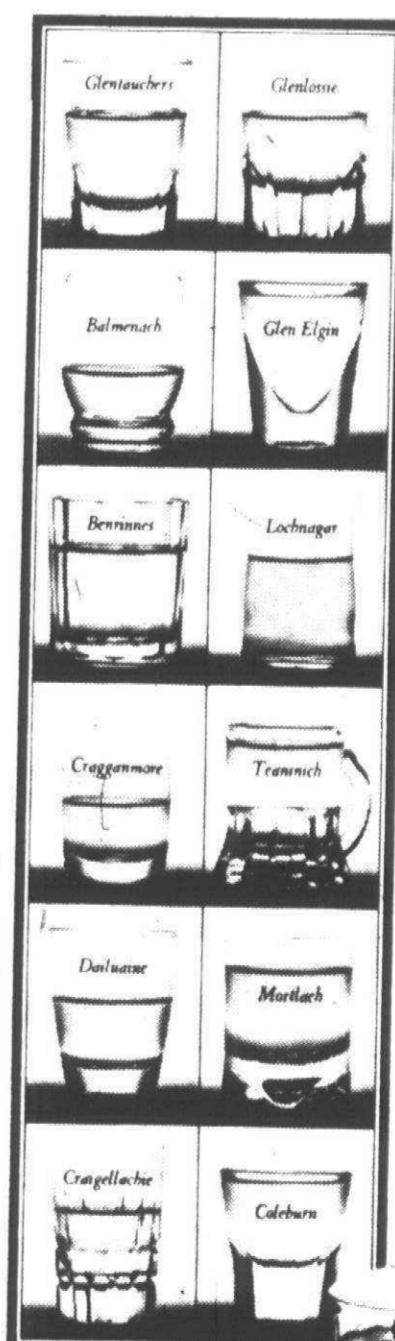

I took Dasher to lunch (under the golden arches) to find out more details about his decision. In 45 minutes, I found out how emotionally thoughtful and modest he is.

I didn't know what to expect at first. After all, here is this monstrous football player who walks into the lunch room and orders three quarter-pound hamburgers with cheese, two large orders of fries and a large drink. I barely had enough money to order for myself.

I just hope my boss doesn't get upset with the big bill on my expense account this week. I mean, I wasn't about to argue about Dasher's order when he has six inches and sixty pounds over me.

We started talking about the different colleges he visited and I expected him to discuss how good he was, like most highly-acclaimed high school recruits often do.

But this wasn't the case at all. Dasher probably had a right to brag. After all, he was a blue-chip player who was ranked as the ninth-most-wanted football player in the state. He was All-Suburban Eight League, All-Observerland, All-Suburban, All-Metro and All-State in every poll.

But it was hard for me to get him to talk about himself.

All he wanted to discuss was all the wonderful colleges he visited and how great all the people were to him—and how lucky he was to be in this position.

He kept talking about this past fall, when the Rocks finished the regular season undefeated and went to the state playoffs. He admitted, in all sincerity, that he didn't think he would have made All-State if his team hadn't

finished 9-0. (Although the word about Dasher's ability was known in the coaching ranks long before the season started.)

He also talked about how lucky he was to play for Salem coach Tom Moshimer and now Bear Bryant at Alabama. He said his next goal is to play for a national championship team as a member of the Crimson Tide.

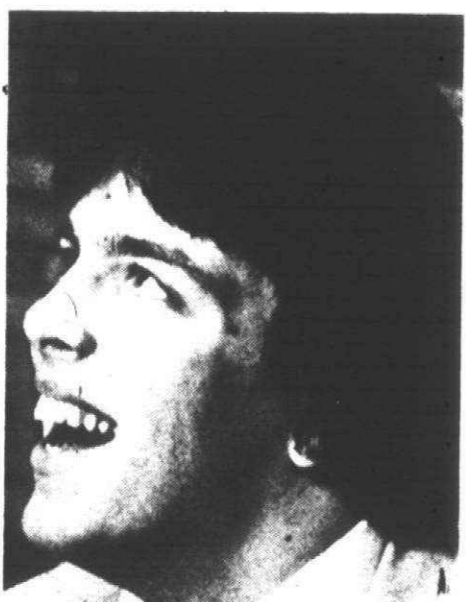
He also wanted me to mention all the other college-bound guys on the 9-0 team and talk to them as well.

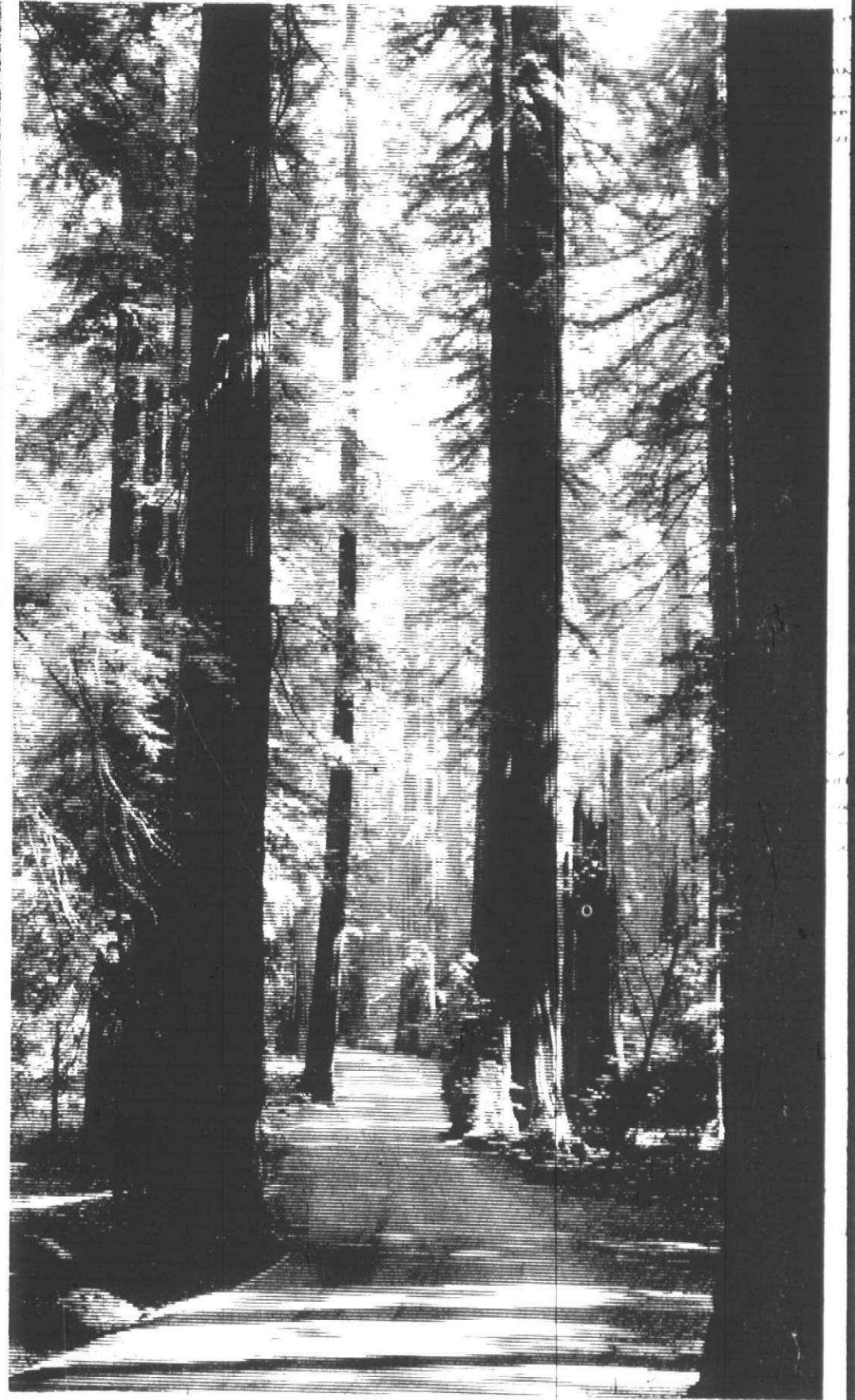

## No quotas yet on fuel oil

There is no shortage of No. 1 fuel oil, at least in this area, but J.D. McLaren, the veteran dealer is keeping his fingers crossed.

Sitting in his office that has been a landmark on Main Street for years, McLaren discussed the energy crisis at length, claiming that, in his opinion, the coal strike has been allowed to go on too long, but that, up to now, his firm has not been placed on any type of quota for oil.

As he spoke, a long freight was passing his window at the Chessie tracks, and there wasn't a car of coal among the long train.

"I honestly think the government should have stepped in long ago and ended the coal strike, and things could have been different.

"AND DON'T FORGET, the strike has come at a time when the temperature has not been above 32 degrees for more than a month. This put pressure on all types of fuel, but up to now we have been alright with oil."

If there isn't an end to the coal strike shortly, he wouldn't be surprised if the demand for oil would result in his company being placed on a quota.

Regardless of what happens, though,

McLaren is not going back into the coal business.

"No we got out of that some years ago and even got rid of the equipment. If anyone is interested in entering the business he can visit Stan's in Ypsilanti and purchase all we sent over there."

IN THE OLD DAYS when coal was the main heating fuel the McLaren yard was a bee hive of activity. With the trend toward oil and the passing of the old coal cook stoves activity quieted down. There is no movement except the oil trucks delivering fuel to the homes in the area.

"I don't have any idea of how long we will be allowed to keep doing at our present scale, but if the coal strike continues there is no telling what might happen."

As he sits in his office these days he admits that he misses the activities of the political world where he served several terms as supervisor of Plymouth Township.

"Sure I miss it, but I have some fond memories of the days I spent in the supervisor's chair."

They are only memories that he will cherish with no thought of going back while waiting the outcome of the energy crises.

## Even Olivier can't salvage 'Betsy'

The strength of "The Betsy" (R) is its excellent cast. The weakness is its story.

The wealthy, powerful and oversexed people of Harold Robbins' novel are best left between book covers where readers may imagine what they please. On the screen, the characters are too ridiculous.

Of course, for Detroiters there is the added interest of recognizing a few local names and places used in the movie, but that's skimpy fare to sustain one through a lengthy picture.

Laurence Olivier, by virtue of his fascinating performance, is almost single-handedly responsible for keeping this clunker clinking.

Olivier, who might be doing Lear, instead is doing Loren Hardeman Sr., an 86-year-old auto tycoon and family patriarch. And is he doing him? Hardeman is not Cedric Hardwick (remember him?) with the hots, but a lecherous, scheming SOB who can be treacherous one minute and sympathetic the next.

FLASHBACKS ENCOMPASS about 40 years of his life from his power pinnacle as founder and president of Bethlehem Motor Co. to his restless retirement years. Now that he's on the entrance ramp leading to that big highway in the sky, he decides he'd like some immortality.

He wants to be remembered, like Henry Ford and Hitler, for producing a "people's car," like the Model T and the Volkswagon. He calls his car "The Betsy," after his granddaughter. Hardeman has a penchant for naming cars after members of his family. He's probably hoping that the cars will set good examples for their namesakes.

The Betsy is to be a compact, fuel-efficient, nonpolluting, economical automobile. These characteristics, by the way, bear no resemblance to the human Betsy, who is front heavy, loaded with extras and expensive to maintain.

To produce this Ralph Nader dream car, he must develop it secretly and then get it approved by the board of directors over the objections of the company president, his son Loren Hardeman III (Robert Duvall).

Loren III hates Loren I because when Loren III was still in short pants, he saw his mommy (Katherine Ross) in bed with his grandfather, Loren III, the night his daddy, Loren Jr. (Paul Rudd), shot himself.

NUMBER ONE was only trying to comfort his daughter-in-law because her husband was, well, peculiar. He preferred a male friends to his wife and his car. No family's perfect, and little Loren III grew up hating Loren I.

Thus, to accomplish his goals, Hardeman Sr. had to bring in an outsider, Angelo Perino (Tommy Lee Jones, a race car driver and auto engineer).

Jones is an economical actor. One expression and a few changes of clothes suffice to carry him through the entire film. Equally subtle in interpretation is Lesley-Anne Down, who plays Lady Bobby Ayres, an interior decorator with her libido stuck in overdrive.

The performances of Jones and Down are exceptions to the otherwise capable and even excellent work of the large cast, including Robert Duvall, Jane Alexander, Edward Herrman and Paul Rudd—but I wouldn't buy a Betsy from any of them.

Three Detroit Symphony Orchestra members will perform at 8 p.m. tonight on the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus.

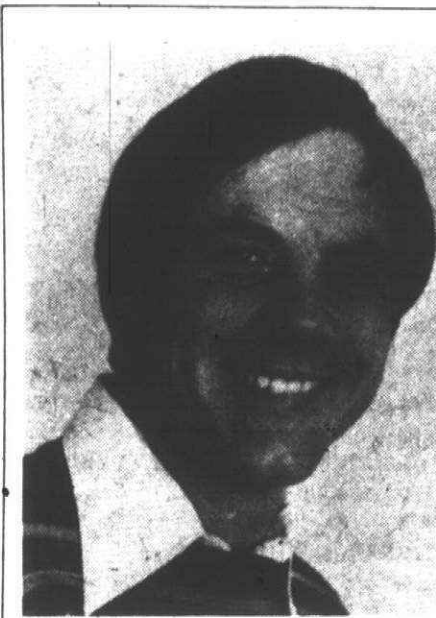

# Auto Club backs state police patrol

Making the state police responsible for patrolling all Michigan freeways and stepping up their patrols on state trunklines would help reduce traffic accidents and deaths, Automobile Club of Michigan general manager James Moffat stated.

Auto Club has completed a study entitled, "Portrait of Enforcement." He said such action would free other police agencies for traffic enforcement on local roads, which account for 67 per cent of all accidents but only 48 per cent of the statewide travel.

Despite manpower shortages and other problems, sheriff and local police departments could reduce accidents dramatically by employing selective law enforcement programs (SLEP). Under SLEP, enforcement personnel are assigned to specific locations at times when most traffic law violations occur.

RECOMMENDATIONS in "Portrait of Enforcement" were based on results of a comparative analysis by Wayne State University's civil engineering department of statewide accident rates and the effectiveness of

enforcement in Michigan, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Auto Club cited the diminishing role of state police on freeways as a major reason for Michigan's poor accident and enforcement comparison with Ohio, where there is a highway patrol responsible only for traffic enforcement.

Between 1969 and 1976, Michigan freeways grew 20 per cent, but freeway patrol car hours increased only eight per cent.

The study declared: "The role of the state police on freeways in Michigan is becoming as important to the motorist for personal security as it is for traffic law enforcement."

Because of this, Auto Club proposed that the state police operate on all 1,662 miles of limited access roads in Michigan 24 hours daily.

This would require 850 additional officers and 90 vehicles at a cost of nearly \$20 million annually, excluding administrative expenses.

Auto Club said it would not oppose financing increased state police freeway patrolling with funds from the state gasoline tax.

"THE ACCIDENT experience in Michigan is depressing when compared with the combined statewide experience in Ohio and Pennsylvania," the study stated.

Accident tables comparing all Michigan roads with those in Ohio and Pennsylvania had a total of 24 categories. Michigan was inferior to comparison states in 15 categories, the same in three and better in only six categories.

General conclusions:  
 •Michigan's local roads rated below comparison states in seven of eight categories.

•Michigan's freeways rated below comparison states in six of eight categories.

•Michigan's trunklines rated below comparison states in two of eight categories.

SHERIFF departments and city police face the biggest task in reducing traffic accidents, which in 1976 claimed 1,955 lives, injured 162,894 persons and resulted in an \$821 million economic loss.

The study emphasized that selective enforcement programs in problem areas constitute the most practical

and affordable approach to the problem and concluded:

"Sheriff deputies are needed to patrol and increase the level of enforcement on local roads in unincorporated areas, a move that would be welcomed by local residents and would have the biggest impact on reducing statewide traffic accidents and deaths."

It added, "... most city police departments in the state could reduce traffic accidents greatly by concentrating enforcement efforts on problem areas."

"Selective law enforcement does not always require increasing manpower," the study stated. "Many law enforcement agencies across Michigan could operate selective law enforcement programs by more efficient use of existing personnel."

The study cited Flint's three-year selective program as an example of how selective enforcement not only reduces the number of traffic accidents but also their severity.

Fatal accidents were down 38 per cent, and injury accidents dropped 18 per cent during the three-year Flint program compared with the three-year period before it began.

# Random selection should be continued

Editor:

The concept of an educational park was conceived in the early 1960s and the final parcel of land was purchased for the 306-acre park in August of 1972.

Basic principles for Centennial Education Park were established, such as: 1. Each high school would provide a comprehensive curriculum. 2. Some facilities and classes would be shared to meet special needs of students without duplicating costly facilities and classes in each building. 3. Pupil membership in each building would be representative of the broad social, economic and cultural levels within the

community. 4. Administrative units for about 2,100 pupils would be planned. 5. Each school would have its own athletic program and participate in separate leagues.

**REFLECTING UPON** this CEP philosophy, random selection should continue to be the method by which students are assigned to a high school.

This belief is based upon the following rationale:

1. In each building, we have an excellent opportunity to establish and maintain, representation of the most equal socio-economic-educational

blend of our entire school district population. This truly provides an equal educational opportunity for each student in our PCCS. If we are to promote the spirit of a Plymouth-Canton Community School District, a total mix of these communities also is desired.

2. A unique feature readily available at CEP is shared facilities and classes. This concept helps to more economically provide greater breadth and individualization of instruction i.e., commercial, machine shop, computer labs, plastics, medical assistant, radio, driver education range, auto body, gifted classes and day care center, to mention a few.

3. The 1976-77 school board opted for random selection after careful and lengthy study and input (beginning in the early '70s). We should therefore allow this decision to mature before considering change. Each new school board should not lightly change school policy.

4. Friendships are not necessarily based upon living in close proximity to one another but rather upon the development of similar interests and shared activities: debate team, athletic team, church, chemistry lab, advanced calculus, bus rides, school clubs, vocational class, Junior Athletic Association teams, etc. In this mobile society, most high school friendships are not often carried into adult life.

5. More stability in student assign-

ment is provided because the assignment is not contingent upon boundary adjustments during this period of population growth; balanced enrollment in middle schools; expansion of ESY; or new construction.

6. More support for "the high schools" will perhaps be fostered because one cannot assume you child will attend "a" certain high school.

7. Families need not divide their school loyalties and spirit because siblings have the choice of enrollment in the same school as their older brother or sister or of being placed once again into the random selection process.

8. In time, it is probable that 50 per cent of a neighborhood will attend the same high school."

In conclusion, if our main energies are devoted to providing quality education and an equal educational opportunity for each student in the PCCS, random selection seems to far surpass other methods of determining high school enrollment.



DISCUSSION OF the middle school school concept and a home for the alternative high school at last week's school board meeting raised some questions.

Trustee Richard Arlen recalled that for a good many years, kindergarten through 12th grade was housed in what is now Central Middle School. This was before there was such a thing as a middle school concept. There were about 1,200 students K through 12 at Central plus those in the one and two-room country schools. That was the whole school population and it included a group from Livonia which was then a township.

How had those students weathered the proximity of older students? Could they recall any bad experiences?

People like U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell and Russell Kirk, author, syndicated columnist and arch conservative were two of the underprivileged who were not available for questioning. Golf pro Tyler Caplin was not contacted in California nor was Kenny Fischer, director of the Post-Education Convening Authority of the Institute for Educational Leadership in Washington.

They seemed to have overcome the ill effects of spending their middle school years next door to the older students.

Those interviewed have stayed in their hometown area.

BETTY PINT, manager of the Ann Arbor Road-Harvey Street branch of National Bank of Detroit said, "I can't think of any bad experiences."

She said the ones they wanted to "pattern themselves after" were the outstanding students, athletes and those who were active in plays and other school activities.

"I don't think it would make all that difference, that there would be any bad effects," was her assessment of the present problem.

ATTORNEY JOHN F. Vos III said he appreciated any plan which saves school money for the school district.

"It was a good experience for me," he stated.

He chuckled as he described the disciplinary problems of his school days. "Kids would drop marbles off a desk to annoy the teachers. Pulling the fire alarm was another bad thing. And smoking was another."

"Some of the boys who had part-time jobs could afford cars and sometimes these caused problems."

JOHN WILTSE, owner of Wiltse's Community Pharmacy on Main Street started to kindergarten and graduated from high school at Central.

"It was a learning experience. I went to school with blacks, Greeks, Mexicans, half-breeds and Indians—all good, decent people. "If the school is well run, I don't think there'd be any problems—and I believe Central Middle School is well run. If we have a decent administration and the teachers are there to teach, they won't have any problems. The kids will be there to learn."

"We should have a high school in the city. We miss the kids."

"THIS IS A WHOLE different period," said Brian Kidston, assistant principal at Central Middle School.

He explained that there are now between 150 and 200 walkers to Central and 18 school buses transport the majority of the students. He is concerned about the alternative high school students creating a traffic hazard with their cars. "It also depends on the depth of their (alternative high school staff) commitment."

WIN SCHRADER, owner of Schrader Funeral Home, attended seventh grade classes at Central. Seventh and eighth graders were in the annex and high school students in the main building.

The first junior high school, now East Middle School, was opened in time for Win's class to transfer there for eighth grade.

## Women can make it in skilled trades

During World War II women flocked into factories to fill the gaps left by the men departing for war.

Kenneth Schultz of Plymouth thinks women should remember this when they are casting about for employment.

"Women are very capable of doing factory work," he declared.

Schultz, who coordinates instruction for the apprenticeship program at Schoolcraft College, made these remarks at a day-long conference on the all-important subject of jobs sponsored by the YWCA of Western Wayne County.

Other speakers were representatives of agencies and business with information to impart on the job market and how to be a successful shopper.

Among the speakers were Caroline Blank and Ingrid Kroeger of the Michigan Bureau of Rehabilitation, Maureen Sarkees of the Wayne County Office of Manpower, and Jenna Frank of the Chrysler Learning Service Center.

WHILE HOLDING OUT the tempting bait of salaries as high as \$25,000 a year for those in skilled trades work, Schultz leveled with the more than 65 women in the audience about the realities of industrial apprenticeship programs.

"You're a slave to your company when you sign an agreement," he stated. "You are required to attend classes after work even if you work 12 hours a day. You have to do your

homework and pass the course.

"If you fail a class twice, you are off the program. The companies who hire you for the program couldn't care less. If you can't hack it, they say they have a list of 2,000 people eager to take your place."

The program calls for 8,000 hours of work and classes, which often takes up to four years to complete, less if the participants work overtime. There are three semesters a year, and the courses require attendance one or two times a week.

Schoolcraft has about 500 students in its 22 industrial training programs. A small number are women.

"All of the women in the program have worked for one of the three auto companies for a number of years," said Schultz. "They were chosen after scoring as high as a male who wanted to join the same program."

He warned that if a woman wants to become a skilled worker, she had better know math.

"I know you're going to say you're not good at math," he said. "But we can teach you. We have taught men who are not good at it, and we have a low failure rate, only about five per cent. We don't teach traditional math. We do practical problem-solving relating to the job situation."

Some of the courses offered at Schoolcraft include welding, plumbing, tool design, production design, machinist work, tool and die making, pipefitting and millwrighting. So far he has heard few complaints about unfairness toward women on the job.

"Most say the men treat them great, and are very helpful," Schultz said.

If a woman wonders whether she has the ability to work in a mechanical field, Schultz suggested she ask to take the General Aptitude Test Battery at the Michigan Employment Service Commission.

JOB FOR THOSE with physical and emotional problems were discussed by Caroline Blank and Ingrid Kroeger of the Michigan Bureau of Rehabilitation.

"An individual can come directly to a rehabilitation bureau office, or he can be sent here through a referral," said Ms. Blank, adding that there are no income restrictions.

First diagnostic testing takes place. Then there are tests by the client's own doctor as often a specialist. Psychological testing is also needed to determine what kind of work the client can handle.

The bureau then decides if the handicap interferes with the person's ability to find and hold a job.

The bureau has trained its clients for such jobs as beautician, auto mechanic, dog groomer and clerk-typist.

"We are putting people to work so they can pay taxes rather than be supported by them," noted Ms. Blank.

THE HOME BOUND PROGRAM aims to prepare the severely disabled to earn money at home.

"They have to put in 20 hours a week," explained Mrs. Kroeger. "We provide training and materials for various crafts such as lapidary, sewing and carpentry, and we help them market the items they make."

Lately an effort has been made to allow clients to do more than crafts. One client is making uniforms for a factory and is paid on a piecework basis.

"Our clients are excited about the chance to earn money," said Mrs. Kroeger. "But in some ways I think the psychological benefits outweigh the financial benefit. Finding a way of being creative or productive in our society is important."

Miss Blank and Mrs. Kroeger work at the bureau office at 34530 Wayne, phone 722-7431. There is also an office

in Livonia at 27437 Six Mile, phone 425-9600.

MAUREEN SARKEES is employed at the Wayne County Office of Manpower through the Comprehensive Employment Training Act "to help get as many folks as possible trained and working."

Her specialty is vocational education. Her targets are the poor and uneducated, who can get financial aid to go to private trade schools.

"Come to see me to see if you qualify for financial aid," she told her audience. "If you don't, perhaps I can offer an alternative."

Ms. Sarkees had some advice for job seekers. "I ask people what do you want to do," she said. "I don't want to make your decisions for you."

"Once you have an idea of what you want, the next step is to visit the public library and look up information on that career. I get lots of people who want to go into a job and know nothing about it. Head that off at the pass."

"Another valuable source of information is people in the field. Talk to them about pay, hours and other issues. Then visit schools in their area and talk to counselors to see what is really best for you."

She said that MESC is an excellent source of information on jobs, and that counselors are available there.

ANOTHER PROGRAM SUPPORTED by federal funds is managed by the Chrysler Learning Service Center, an institution owned

by the Chrysler Corp., which works through a contract with CETA.

Those who meet the income requirements of the program begin at the center with a training program called Job Search/Job Retention. It stresses self-awareness, self-growth, group discussions, attitudes on the job and how to handle problems on the job.

"After finishing this two-week class, the client's name goes in the job ready bank," explained Jenna Frank. "Then we try to find him a fulltime job he can stay with."

"We have had excellent luck in placement. In fact, last October we had no names left in the job-ready bank. We also have a good retention rate."

Women make up an estimated 40-50 per cent of the clients of the center, which serves Wayne County with the exception of Detroit, Livonia and Dearborn which have their own CETA offices.

A new federal program called Skilled Training Improvement Program (STIP) is soon to be available at the center. Through it money will be provided to train people in semi-skilled industrial positions such as diesel mechanic, industrial equipment repair, welding, machinist work, drafting, auto mechanics and auto body repair and transmission work.

The program rules requires that 55 per cent of those accepted for training be women.

The center has set no starting date for the program, but already has a waiting list.

## Tax clinic at Grange

The Plymouth Grange has scheduled a second tax aide clinic as a community service to senior citizens. A spokesman for the Grange said this added clinic will be extended if necessary.

Help in preparing state and federal income tax returns is provided by American Association of Retired Persons, Inc. tax teams. These persons received special training early this year when state and federal income tax representatives conducted a week-long seminar in the Plymouth Cultural

Center. The course was sponsored by the Northville Plymouth chapter of AARP.

Volunteers working on the tax teams do not charge for their advice and help.

The Grange clinics will be from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. Feb. 21 and 28 in the Grange Hall, 273 S. Union Street, Plymouth.

# Wise driving pays off

If you feel your car's fuel economy is not what you expected, take a minute to consider the type of driving you do. Chances are your trips are too short to permit the mechanical components of the car to reach optimum operating efficiency.

Automotive experts advise that an automobile must be driven 15-25 miles—depending on the car and the weather—to reach its mileage potential. Oil, differential grease, the engine, transmission, wheel bearings, tires and other working components get warmed up to full efficiency only after being driven that number of miles.

Yet, the average automobile trip is only nine miles. Personal business trips, such as shopping and visits to the doctor, average even less—5.6 miles. Trips to work reach 9.4 miles, and vacations by car average 160 miles one way.

Also, owners of new cars should not expect to obtain the EPA-posted figures because they are arrived at under laboratory conditions. The EPA is planning changes for the 1979 model cars.

Motorists should attempt to combine their trips to avoid several "cold" short runs. When starting a car with a cold engine, the driver should wait a few seconds before driving. Owner's manuals provide the suggested waiting time, ranging from 15 seconds to a minute. Extended idling periods should be avoided because they not only waste gasoline, but they're not good for the engine. Racing a cold engine should be avoided.

Drive at moderate speeds for the first few minutes to give the lubricants and components a chance to start warming up.

Other points of advice for starting and operating your car are contained in the car's manual. These manuals, which too often go unread, can save a car owner dollars and headaches.

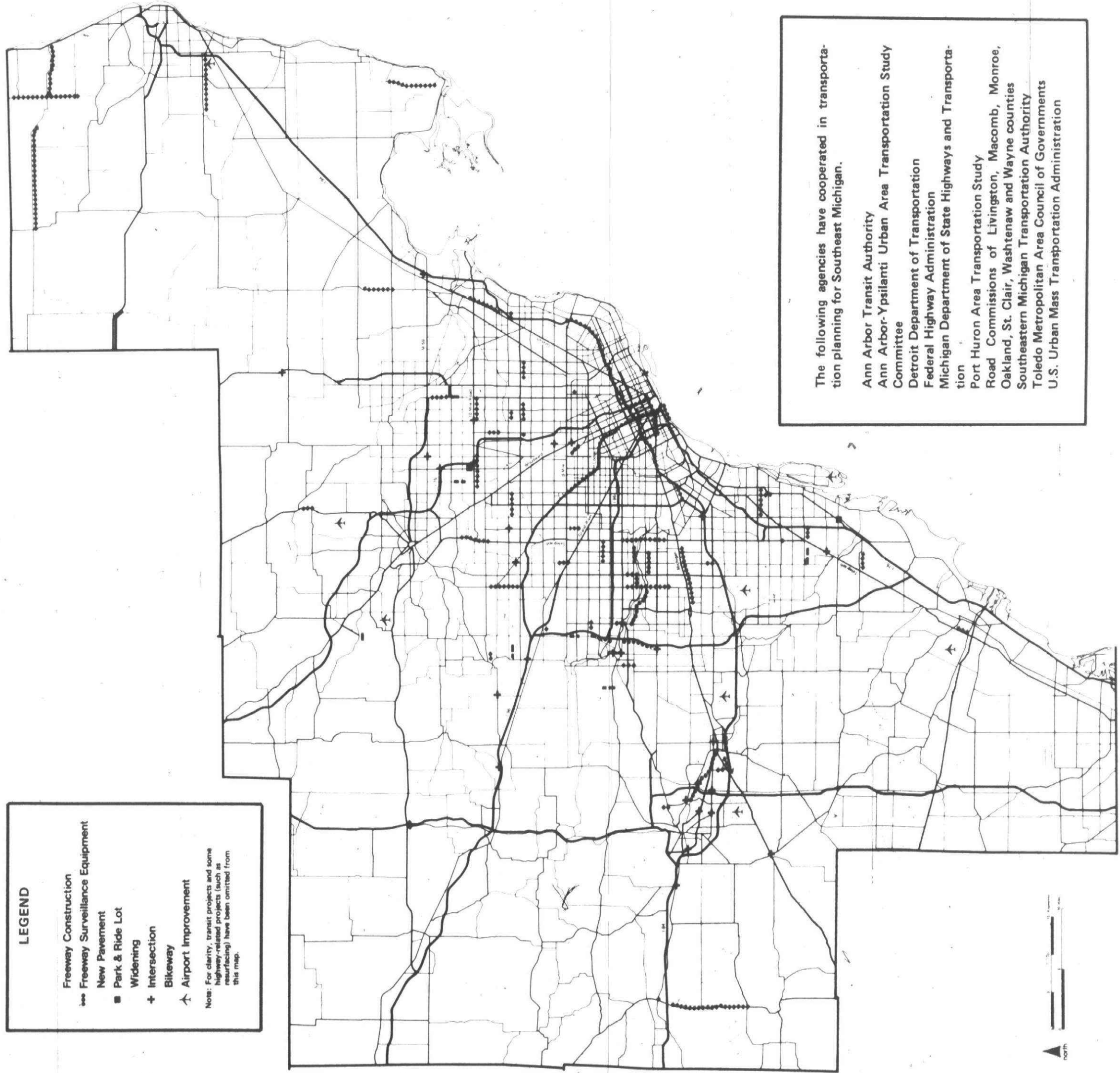



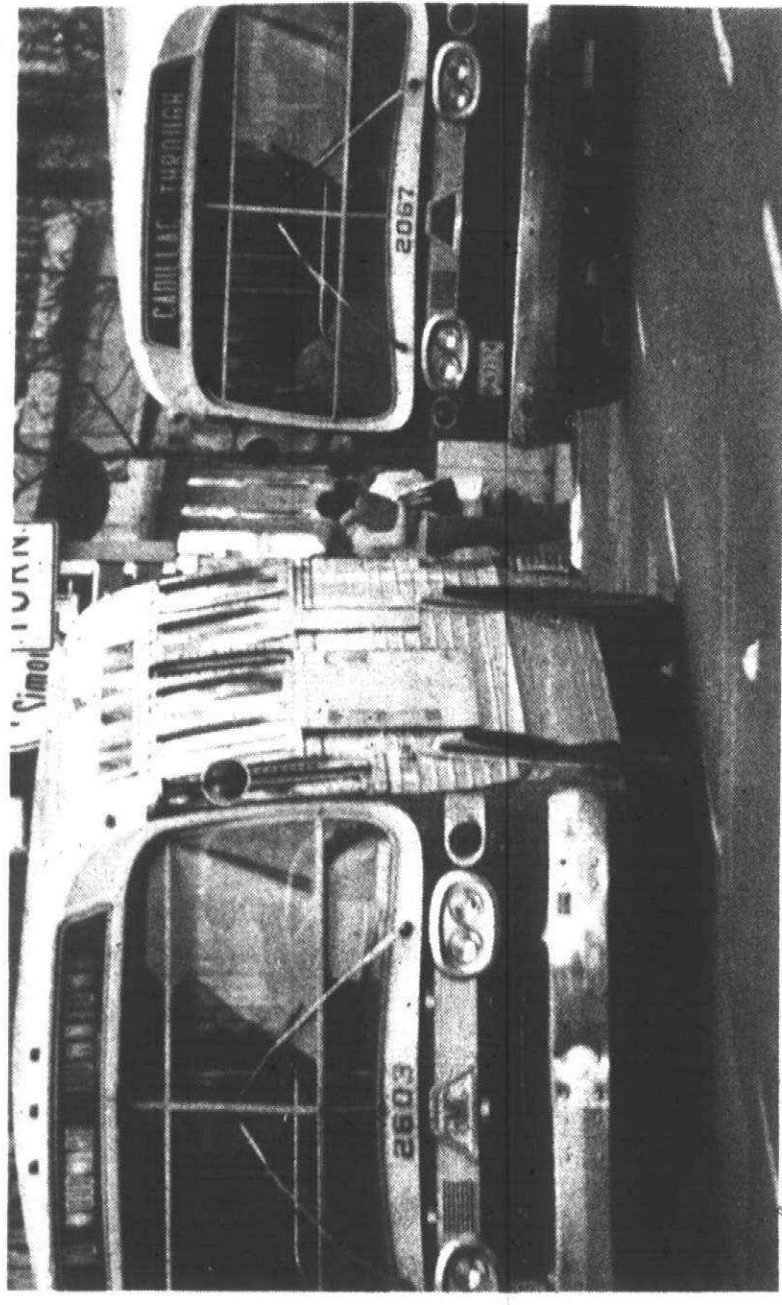

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) is a voluntary association of 131 units of government in Southeast Michigan. The Council prepares long-range regional plans for the 4.8 million people who live, work and play in Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne counties.

The Council's planning process extends to problems which go beyond jurisdictional boundaries — problems such as housing, criminal justice, land use, recreation and open space, the environment, and transportation.

Transportation, particularly, is a vital issue in Southeast Michigan. Perhaps that is because, having witnessed firsthand the birth and maturity of the automobile industry, the people in Southeast Michigan need and expect mobility. We have grown up with the concept of mobility. And we receive our mobility through an excellent network of freeways and major surface streets and roads, through a growing public bus system, through commercial and private aviation, through Dial-A-Ride, through commuter trains, through the bicycle and through ride-sharing programs.

This report talks about the progress that has been made by various transportation agencies during 1977.

# Making Better Use of What We Have

Transportation System Management is a concept of short range transportation planning aimed at efficient use of existing transportation facilities. Transportation System Management projects do not usually involve major new construction. Rather, they increase the capacity of what is already in use largely through improved management of existing facilities.

Transportation System Management actions fall into several categories. Among those which improve traffic flow are:

- Improved use of traffic lights to facilitate flow of traffic;
- Traffic lanes which carry inbound traffic during morning rush hour, and outbound traffic during evening rush hour;
- Metering freeway ramps to monitor traffic flow; and
- Widening of intersections to reduce congestion.

Improvements in public transit service are also Transportation System Management actions. The more trips taken by public transit, the fewer cars on the road, the more efficiently the highway system functions.

Projects to encourage public transit use include:

- Park and ride lots;
- Bus shelters; and
- Advertising and promotion of the benefits of public transit, and of transit service available.

All of the actions listed above have been taken in Southeast Michigan. In addition, three major Transportation System Management activities were in progress in 1977.

The first, highly visible to people who live in, work in or visit downtown Detroit, falls in the category of redirecting auto traffic in congested areas. That action is the Woodward Avenue Mall.

While the mall will serve other purposes, the banning of auto traffic on Woodward will facilitate a switch to public transit in a highly congested area. Other major Transportation System Management activities — ride sharing, freeway monitoring and bikeways — are covered in this report.

## Share Rides, Reduce Congestion

Getting people to use fewer vehicles is a major activity under the program known as Transportation System Management. It is the trip to work which lends itself most readily to ridesharing, especially in a large industrial and employment center like Southeast Michigan.

On Sept. 1, SEMCOG co-sponsored a vanpooling seminar with the Federal Energy Administration.

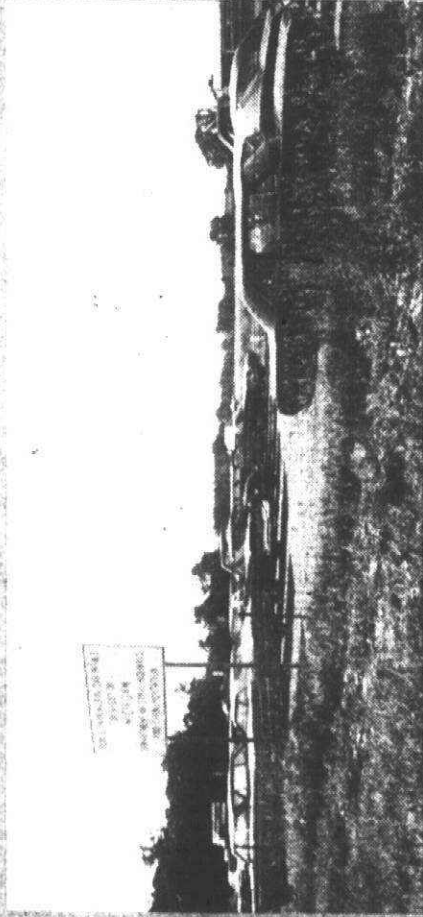
Vanpooling is a relatively new and well accepted means of ridesharing. It involves the lease or purchase of nine- to 15-passenger vans, usually by employers, for the use of their employees. All the passengers but the driver pay a fare adequate to meet all the costs of the van. The driver usually rides free and must maintain the van.

SEMCOG invited all the major employers in Southeast Michigan to the seminar. Among the companies sending representatives were such large employers as Ford Motor Co., General Motors Corp., the Automobile Club of Michigan and Michigan Bell Telephone Co. Hopefully, vanpooling, already underway at Chrysler Corp. and Detroit Edison Co., will meet wider acceptance in the region in the near future.

## Carpooling

Often many people from the same neighborhood work at the same location without being aware of it. Were these people to share rides to work, highway congestion during peak hours would be reduced. In addition, great amounts of energy could be saved and air pollution could be reduced. Finally, the commuters themselves could save money and eliminate the strain of daily driving.

Seeing the obvious benefits of ride sharing, SEMCOG undertook a ride-sharing program in 1977. Ridesharing, Carpools and Vanpools is a SEMCOG report that details those benefits. See the box on page 4 for details on obtaining a copy of this report.

# Bikes: Energy Efficient Transportation

The Transportation System Management program is meant to provide for all kinds of travel, and this includes one of the most energy-efficient of all — bicycling.

Because bicycles are gaining in popularity, SEMCOG has undertaken development of a Regional Bikeway Plan. This plan will become an element of the Regional Transportation Plan which now contains highway and transit elements.

The plan is the result of research and analysis of existing facilities, usage patterns, technical and legal considerations, and potential funding for projects.

A major corridor was open to bike traffic during the 1977 year along segments of Interstate 275 in western Wayne County. However, the Council's bikeway plan shows that the greatest need in Southeast Michigan is to provide for safe urban and suburban biking.

The Council of Governments' Regional Bikeway Plan calls for making urban and suburban bicycling safer.

# SCANDI To Monitor Freeway Conditions

An example of Transportation System Management is the use of a freeway traffic monitoring system known as SCANDI — short for Surveillance, Control and Driver Information System.

Such a system will be installed around the Detroit area over the next five years, according to a November announcement by the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation.

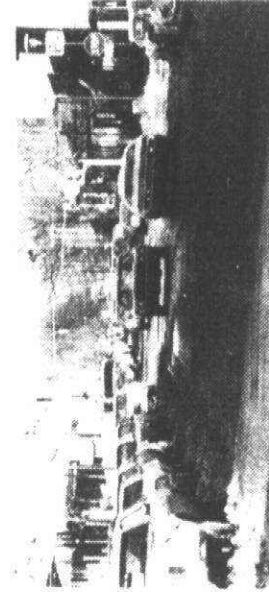
What is SCANDI? It is a computerized data and information system designed to improve safety, traffic flow, and response to stranded motorists. Currently there are 24 similar systems in operation around the United States.

An integral part of the system will be motorist-aid call boxes, providing direct communication between the motorist and a State Police dispatcher in Detroit. Also part of the SCANDI system will be traffic bulletins broadcasted on commercial radio stations, dispatch of fire and wrecker service, and eventual freeway ramp signals which will help motorists enter smoothly into freeway traffic.

The first phase of the project calls for installation of SCANDI equipment on 32.5 miles, or half, of Detroit freeways. All of the John C. Lodge (US-10) and portions of Interstate 75 and 375 freeways will be included in the first phase of construction.

After the first phase of SCANDI is completed and operational by the summer of 1979, a one-year testing and evaluation will take place before SCANDI is expanded to the second half of the freeway system.

# Cleaning Up Our Air



Transportation agencies in the region have the responsibility to make plans which are consistent with a state implementation plan for air quality standards.

Hence, the Council in 1977 undertook a detailed analysis of emissions of the gases carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxide and hydrocarbons from one of our biggest contributors to air pollution — the automobile.

The first step in this analysis required finding out how many automobiles now use each portion of Southeast Michigan's highway network, and how many will use our highways in 1990. This data came from an actual traffic monitoring conducted in 1975 and from projected traffic counts for the year 1990.

Once actual and projected traffic counts were known, computer techniques helped the Council determine the current level of air pollution, and what level could be expected for 1990.

One result of this study showed that if the Council's 1990 Transportation Plan for Southeast Michigan were implemented, with its improved public transit system, there would be less air pollution from transportation in 1990 than there is today.

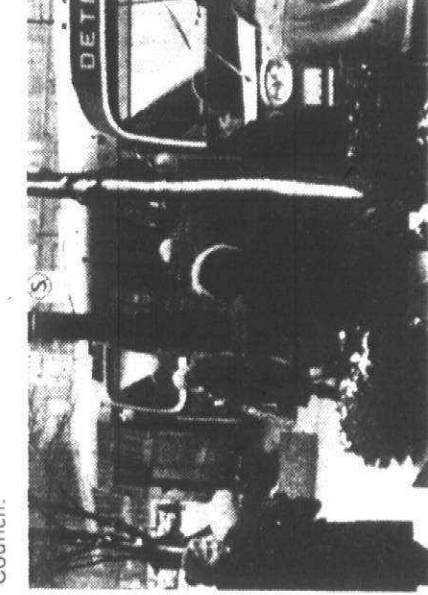
# \$600 Million Pledged for Transit

In late 1976, the region was filled with excitement over the federal government's pledge of \$600 million to develop a transit system proposed by the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMATA).

Through 1977, the Council of Governments assisted SEMATA in examining what kind of transit system would best suit this region. The results of this analysis will be a transit system which, pending federal approval, will be implemented with the federal funds as they incrementally are received.

The analysis of transit alternatives has dealt with transit systems containing expanded bus and commuter rail service, plus light rail transit service on Woodward. Light rail is an improved, modern version of the streetcar, completely separated from the automobile traffic stream.

A technical report, Design Guidelines for Intermediate Level Transit Service, was prepared by the Council to aid in the examination of priority bus service, called intermediate transit service. Copies of this report are available from the Council.

# Transit Crime Study Results In Security for City Bus Riders

A study of crime on public transit released by the Council of Governments in 1976 prompted the Detroit Department of Transportation (D-DOT) to implement a plain-clothes security force on buses, known as "Bluebirds," saw the benefits of this program when it realized a 25 percent drop in crimes on D-DOT buses.

From October 1976 through July 1977 the region received nearly \$1 million in federal grants totaling \$650,000, together with \$350,000 in local match money, have been allocated for the continued operation of the program.

That money pays for the operation of 12 plain-clothes police officers, mostly on a small number of bus lines which experience the bulk of the problems.

# Implementable Transportation Projects

Prior to 1975, the Council's focus was on long-range transportation planning culminating in the adoption of the 1990 Transportation Plan for Southeast Michigan.

After the adoption of that plan in June, 1975, the region's transportation focus shifted to give short-range transportation planning equal emphasis. With this in mind, the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) was created. (See Map, p.4).

The TIP is a five-year agenda of improvements for highways, transit, airports and bikeways. It is a priority listing of projects that can be implemented in the near future.

Items to be considered for TIP are submitted to the Council by the agencies which are close to transportation needs: county road commissions, the City of Detroit, the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti Urban Area Transportation Study, the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation, and the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority.

These agencies submit to the Council proposed projects that require federal assistance to complete. Because the amount of federal funds available is difficult to predict, the Council in 1977 began a "fiscal analysis" of transportation. This fiscal analysis examines what is available in dollars now, what transportation improvements we need, what they will cost, and whether the cost is justified.

While the fiscal analysis has just begun, it will in the future aid the region in formulating transportation programs that are financially realistic.

# Region's Airports Getting Busier

In an era when speed is becoming a consideration for moving people and goods, it is not surprising that the region's 64 airports are getting busier. In 1977 they provided 2.3 million annual takeoffs and landings to the 3000 aircraft based here, and to the countless aircraft that fly in and out of Southeast Michigan.

A detailed long range plan is necessary to direct growth of such traffic in an orderly manner.

In 1974, the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation completed the Michigan State Airport System Plan. This plan provided guidelines for development of aviation facilities throughout Michigan.

In the SEMCOG region, where the

bulk of the state's aviation activity occurs, this plan did not offer sufficient detail for continuing, comprehensive and cooperative airport master planning. Therefore, in 1977 SEMCOG developed a Design Study for a Regional Airport System Plan for Southeast Michigan, with the hope that the federal government would fund planning for the region's aviation needs. However, the Federal Aviation Administration, to date has not approved the Council's request for aviation funding.

Other aviation developments during 1977 included the opening of a new airport called Smith's Creek Airport in St. Clair County, and the addition of a new runway at Metropolitan Airport. Both were part of the Transportation Improvement Program.

Smaller airports like Grosse Ile Municipal carry a large load of the aviation traffic in the region. Grosse Ile is home base for 152 airplanes and last year recorded an excess of 39,000 takeoffs and landings.
