Court site, size debated

Bids from construction companies for remodeling Canton Township's fire hall into a district courtroom are due next week. But, at the 11th hour, Trustee Lynne Goldsmith has other ideas for the courtroom site.

Goldsmith thinks the township would be making a mistake by converting the fire hall-meeting room into a courtroom because she feels the remodeled fire hall would make for a cramped courtroom.

"Canton right now is responsible for 30 per cent of the caseload in the 35th District," said Goldsmith. "The way the township's building, I can only expect it to increase."

"The courtroom, as proposed in the fire hall, will have 59 seats and I've been told that 75 to 100 is desirable. Is that what we want for our permanent courtroom?"

Better, according to Goldsmith, would be utilizing the basement of the township's soon-to-open administration building as a spacious court facility. The fire hall then could be used as a meeting room for Canton clubs, committees and associations.

SUPERVISOR Harold Stein, Clerk John Flodin and Finance Director Mike Gorman all oppose Goldsmith's last-minute suggestion. Nonetheless, the matter will come up for discussion at tomorrow night's township board meeting in the very chambers that are the subject of debate.

Goldsmith hopes to persuade two other trustees and at least one of the three administrators that the wisest long-range plan would be to locate the court in the basement of the new administration building at the northwest corner of Canton Center and Proctor.

STEIN SAID it would be unwise to commit one whole floor—the basement—to a courtroom before the township knows if it may need that floor for additional office space when the township expands its municipal services or personnel.

"Another thing is the money we're spending at the fire station is being underwritten, in part, by a federal block grant," Stein said. "We have to make the remodeling comply with barrier-free construction standards so it wouldn't all be township funds like it would at the administration building. The elderly and handicapped are two areas that fit block grant provisions."

GORMAN estimates the cost of the fire hall remodeling will be about \$35,000. The township will apply for

\$15,000 in block grant funds to defray that cost, said the finance director.

To make more room for parking, the township is in the process of condemning 1.75 acres to the north and east of the fire hall. Trustee Goldsmith said the land for parking space will probably cost the township \$16,000 plus parking lot surfacing.

"So, there is a potential for being inadequate from the start with no room for expansion," Goldsmith said.

Judge Dunbar Davis of the 35th District Court said he'll sit in either facility "providing they are halfway suitable. But it's not up to me to decide."

The only shortcomings he can foresee in the fire hall is the lack of storage space for court records, a detention room for prisoners and a private rest room for court clerks.

"But I'd prefer to back off from the darn thing and let them fight it out among themselves," Davis said. "I just don't want to become involved in any political dispute in Canton Township."

In defense of the fire hall alternative, the judge said it can be a problem holding court in a building shared by municipal employees—as is the case in Plymouth.

School cost cut with farms—Yack

The president of the Plymouth-Canton School Board is challenging the prediction of a land use report that says the average Canton taxpayer will save nearly \$1,500 in taxes over the next 30 years if the township's farmland is preserved.

Tom Yack believes residents will save much more than that if they vote to preserve farmland through the public purchase of development rights.

He bases his theory on future school costs not accounted for by the \$35,000 study on a proposal to preserve Canton's dwindling agricultural land.

The report did not consider the increased operating budget needed by the school system to educate children who might move into homes on the farmland were it developed. Yack called the study's estimated cost of new-school construction excessively low.

THE STUDY, conducted by Wade, Trim & Associates and the Seidman & Seidman accounting firm, compares the estimated \$15.2 million cost of buying farmers' development rights to the cost of allowing the 4,750 acres to develop.

The report concludes that Canton taxpayers will have to spend more during the next eight years if they decide to preserve the agricultural land through the public purchase of development rights.

But over the long run, taxpayers will save, the report says. If the farmland is allowed to develop, residents will have to pay more taxes for increased police protection, fire protection and other municipal services, the report says.

The development rights issue will

probably appear on the November ballot.

"**BUT I FEEL** it would be safe to say that the net savings to the taxpayer will be magnified (over what the report shows) if development rights are purchased," Yack said.

"There are some gaping holes in the assumptions," he said of the report. "The costs to the schools are just not realistic."

The study only considers the municipal property taxes paid by Canton residents, Yack said.

It does not consider any increase in the school operating millage that could result from an increased school population as the farmland is developed.

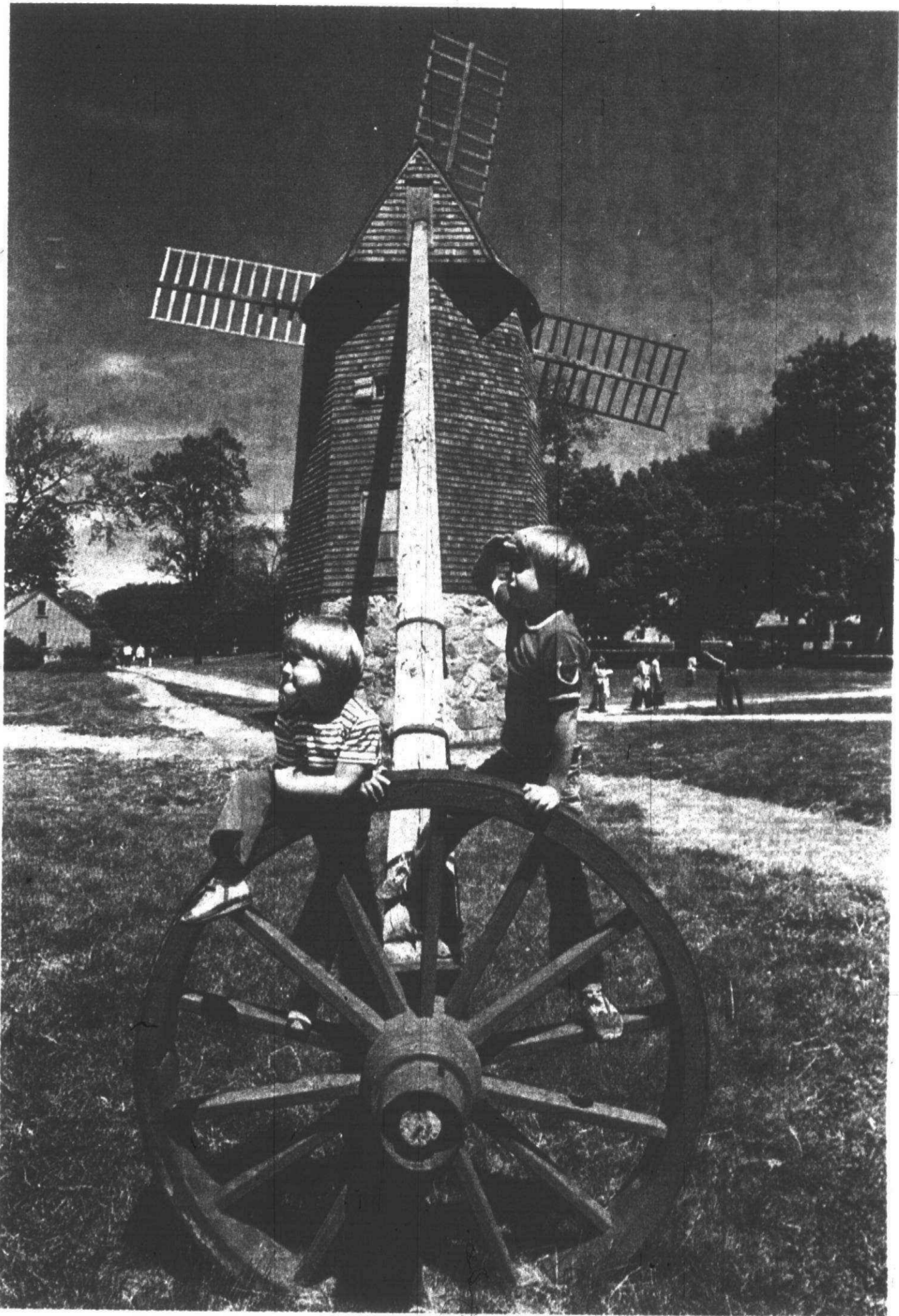
As the school population grows over the next 30 years, the report assumes the school board will spend \$2.1 million for additional elementary schools, \$4.4 million for additional middle schools and \$7.9 million for additional high schools.

Yack says those estimates are low, especially when inflation is taken into consideration.

According to School Supt. John M. Hoben, the last elementary school constructed by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools cost \$2.4 million.

YACK SAID he may request a meeting between the Plymouth-Canton School Board and the Canton Township board to discuss the "faulty" assumptions.

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein has already invited officials of the township's three school districts—Plymouth-Canton, Wayne-Westland and Van Buren—to submit their thoughts on the development rights study.

Itty-bitty antiques gain fans

Until 2½ years ago, Mary Jane Weidenbach and Judith Shellhaas never touched a piece of wood except to dust the furniture.

Now, the two Canton mothers are building hundreds of pieces of furniture each year and selling them in stores in two states.

Their creations include replicas of antique sofas, chairs, desks and tables displayed in antique magazines and Greenfield Village. Caned rockers and carved cabinets accent their collection.

But none of the furniture is even big enough for Shellhaas' 7-month-old baby to sleep on.

"You find yourself looking at everything in miniature after awhile," said Weidenbach, holding one of her early creations—a dollhouse-sized highboy with 13 tiny drawers that slide in and out.

"It's much like algebra. You find yourself scaling everything down to size."

WHEN THE TWO women first started building miniatures, they thought of the craft as a hobby to satisfy their obsession with arts and crafts.

They met at a miniatures class taught by Shellhaas at Pease Paint in Plymouth. Weidenbach had never tried to build a miniature before, while Shellhaas describes herself as a "novice teaching other novices" the craft.

Weidenbach minored in elementary school art at a small college in Pennsylvania, and Shellhaas majored in art at Schoolcraft College.

Both soon realized they had found their niche in life and recognized each other's talents.

"Both of us had considered archi-

ecture as a career when we were younger," Weidenbach explains. "But because women's liberation came a little too late for us, we were discouraged every step of the way."

"I knew right away that miniatures were my niche in life. They're perfect for anyone who's a jack of all trades."

WHAT STARTED OUT as a hobby has now mushroomed into a full-time job.

The two women now sell their creations in shops in Plymouth's Old Village and the historical resort town of Williamsburg, Va. Gift shops in Dearborn, Berkeley and Caseville also offer furniture signed with the Weidenbach and Shellhaas names.

Both work 45 to 50 hours a week in their homes just to supply the five retail outlets. The two women work on their own miniatures separately, but they market their creations as a team.

"It's as if we work a different shift than our husbands," Shellhaas says. "As soon as they come home, we go to work."

But work for the two women is an occupation they love.

First they draw patterns for the furniture pieces on thin sheets of wood. When the wood is cut, they painstakingly glue each piece together and attach the tiny hinges and hardware. Next come the finishing touches that stain and wax bring.

"The most challenging part of miniatures is finding the right materials to work with," says Weidenbach. "You have to ask, 'Will this work on this scale? If it won't, you have to find a substitute—something that will look realistic but still be workable.'"

SHELLHAAS is quick to add her theory on why people collect miniatures.

"It's a dream thing," she maintains. "People can create a small world of ideals inside a dollhouse. They can live emotionally inside that small world where everything is perfect."

"Maybe that's part of our enjoyment."

Dog catchers' tale: no room with boom

Canton Township may be going to the dogs or the dogs may be going to Canton Township.

Thomas Goodman, director of the Westland Human Kindness Center of the Michigan Humane Society, told Canton Township administrators that western Wayne County is experiencing a bow-wow boom in addition to a building boom.

The three-year-old Westland facility already is crowded, according to Goodman, so the organization soon may be left with two choices: refuse to contract with municipalities such as Canton or substantially increase the fees charged to municipalities to pay for facility expansion.

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein said he would like to study the feasibility of building a township animal pound for housing stray animals. But few others on the board seemed receptive to even studying that possibility.

"Unless the Humane Society contract with Canton is cancelled or the

fee gets outrageous I say we should stay with the Humane Society," Clerk John Flodin said.

"They're the professionals, they have the personnel," Flodin said. "You're talking a tremendous cost with full-time township personnel if we set up a local dog pound."

Presently, Canton has a one-year contract with the Humane Society. The township pays \$5,250, or 15 cents per resident, for the contract alone. In addition, it pays \$1 per day for every stray animal impounded.

In April, 206 stray animals from Canton were impounded, while 79 were picked up in January.

Animal Control Officer John Swalley said his business has increased lately, to the point where the township board, at its Tuesday meeting, will consider buying a new dogcatcher wagon for him.

"I pick up 20 to 30 dogs some weeks," Swalley said. "On other weeks I might take in 10 or 12 dogs."

Poet Will Carleton's house deserves better

The famous poor house at Hillsdale, Mich., is fading away. Like the old folk who once lived within its gray, cobblestone walls, it has been better days.

The structure which helped make Michigan poet Will Carleton's name a household word in the 1870s is beginning to crumble.

WHEN I VISITED the poor house recently, the walls of the place were still intact, but the roof and porch were about to collapse. The historic building will not last long unless prompt steps are taken to restore it.

Carleton, who put the Hillsdale Poor House on the map, first came to national attention in 1871. In that year, the Toledo Daily Blade published his poem, "Betsy and I are Out." It was based on a divorce case he covered when he edited the Hillsdale Standard. Newspapers throughout the nation picked it up and the poem was later published in Harper's Weekly.

Carleton plummeted to fame later the same year when his best known poem, "Over the Hill to the Poor House," appeared in Harper's. He was paid \$30 for the poem, a simple ballad, the theme of which is the cruelty of children to their parents. The opening lines—"Over the hill to the poor house I'm tredgin' my wear,"—became part of the national language.

The poem tells of the plight of a woman of 70 whose husband is dead, and whose six married children refuse to find a place for her in one of their homes. The saddest blow, she recalls, is when her youngest son "went to the poor-master an' put me on the town."

According to one critic, the feelings of pathos evoked by the poem "set in vibration a sympathetic chord in the hearts of a great multitude. Superintendents of poor houses reported to Carleton that their inmates were decreasing in numbers because children were withdrawing their parents from these institutions, shamed into filial duty by this ballad."

MANY YEARS AFTER he wrote the poem, Carleton said he got the idea for it from the visits he made to the county poor house in Hillsdale where he listened to the troubles of the inmates.

Carleton, himself, was never in any danger of going to the poor house. His income as editor of the Detroit Weekly Tribune, from a magazine he founded, from the books of poetry he published, and from public readings of his works was more than ample. He was often called "a money-making poet" (the prevailing attitude apparently was that poets worth their salt should decently starve in attics).

As his biographer says, Carleton was in tune with his age. His simple annals of plain people in rural domes-

tic life, coupled with his homely diction, lucid style and gift for popularizing struck a responsive chord in most of those who read his poems. During his lecture travels, Carleton met and dined with many writers whose fame has eclipsed his in the field of literature.

He rubbed elbows with Mark Twain and Walt Whitman, and was on close terms with John Greenleaf Whittier. Carleton moved from Michigan to Boston, then to Brooklyn, where he died in 1912.

One of the best ways to reach the poor house Carleton immortalized is to drive through the rolling Irish Hills, southwest of Detroit. On your way, stop at Hudson, the small town at the junction of Routes 34 and 127, where Carleton was born.

Two miles east of Hudson you will find an historical marker in front of the farm where he was born in 1845. His father, John Carleton, came from an old New England family. His mother, Celestia Smith, who sang ballads to her children while rocking them to sleep, was born in New York State. They were married in Plymouth in 1832.

YOU'LL FIND HILLSDALE a bit further west of Hudson, on Route 34.

This attractive city is the home of Hillsdale County Fair, and of historic Hillsdale College, the first in Michigan to grant degrees to women. Carleton attended Hillsdale College where the most complete collection of his works is housed.

If you like stately old residences of

the past, visit the community library in Hillsdale. Since 1908, it has been in the Charles Mitchell house, a wonderful example of the buildings inhabited by people of means in the 19th Century.

Then drive out Wolcott Street until you come to the Bob Evans sausage plant. It is on a many-acred farm enclosed within a white picket fence. On this property, enclosed within the fence, you'll find what is left of the poor house that caused many a tear to be shed in the 1870s.

A "no trespassing" sign warns you away at the entrance, but the poor house is close enough to Wolcott Street for you to get a good view. A stone marker, erected by the Will Carleton Memorial Association, stands in front of the small, well-proportioned, but decaying stone building. It was young, more than 100 years ago, when Will Carleton first saw it, but its days are now numbered.

As you look, you might be reminded of one of the stanzas in the poem:

"Once I was young and handsome—I was, upon my soul,—Once my cheeks were roses, my eyes as black as coal; And I can't remember, in them days,

of hearin' people say, For any kind of reason, that I was in their way."

A soybean license plate?

Eddie collects a bumper crop

Eddie Pashukewich is a collector. Things some people term "junk" and toss aside for the garbage Eddie considers treasures.

Take the Plymouth Canton High School senior's most interesting (although not largest) collection—license plates. He has almost 400 of them and he only got started about a

year and a half ago.

"I found my first plate—a 1926 Michigan—in Brighton," he said. He paid 50 cents for it and proceeded to trade it to his uncle, an experienced license plate collector with "a whole garage full of plates."

THE COLLECTION grew from there.

He found a 1945 and a 1967 Michigan

in a dump in Salem Township. He found a 1932 Michigan in Monroe, buried under two feet of dirt, with a metal detector.

"I find most of my plates in junkyards, garage sales and from other collectors," Pashukewich says. "My uncle gets me plates from other countries from a friend of his in Europe." His plates currently date from 1911.

He says the most difficult plate to

obtain was one from Alaska. He also claims it's his favorite plate right now. "It was a hassle to get because of the trouble in the mailing. It's my favorite because I like the design of the bear and the mountains on it."

Eddie's plates are his pride and joy. He keeps them wrapped individually and stacked carefully away in boxes and mounted on boards. "They rust out easily," he explains, "so I have to wash them and rub them with naval jelly. And they fade, so I have to keep them put away."

THE OLDEST PLATES Eddie has carefully repainted with the original colors, although that decreases their value somewhat, he says. "You can receive a better price from an old or rare plate in good condition. The reason I had to repaint some of mine is because they were all rust."

Needless to say, most of Eddie's plates are from Michigan. And he knows a lot about the history of Michigan plates too.

"The actual plate as we have now was first issued in 1910," he says. "Plates from the years 1910 through 1914 were porcelain with the state seal in black on white, except 1912, where the seal is black and the base is orange."

He says porcelain plates are the most difficult to track down because of their fragile quality. "They cracked easily and weren't used much after that," he says.

He also has an Illinois plate made from soybeans and an Ohio made of aluminum.

"Plates made in 1915 through 1919 were stamped metal with an aluminum state seal riveted to each plate," Pashukewich says. The license tabs used today were first issued in 1943 and not again until 1960. The stickers used today made their first appearance in 1972.

License plate colors in Michigan have ranged from the plain black and white to light purple and black to the 1976s, when the state issued its first tri-color plate. "Beginning in 1960, Michigan used to honor a college or

university with their colors as the plate colors," he notes.

Eddie's other license plate collection, this one in miniature, won him first prize at a show of the Michigan License Plate Collectors Association. It's a complete collection of the little VFW tags that were sent to car owners to attach to their keys. When the keys were lost, they could be found and dropped into a mailbox and returned to the owner.

Eddie has one from each of the 50 states and several from Canada. "They were sent until 1975, when they were outlawed because of the right to privacy law," he says.

IN ADDITION TO colors, license

plate collectors have a great interest in the numbers on the plates.

Eddie is embarking on his search for his "birth set," plates from all 50 states from the year 1961, when he was born.

"I've got only Michigan and Vermont so far. My uncle just completed his birth set," he says.

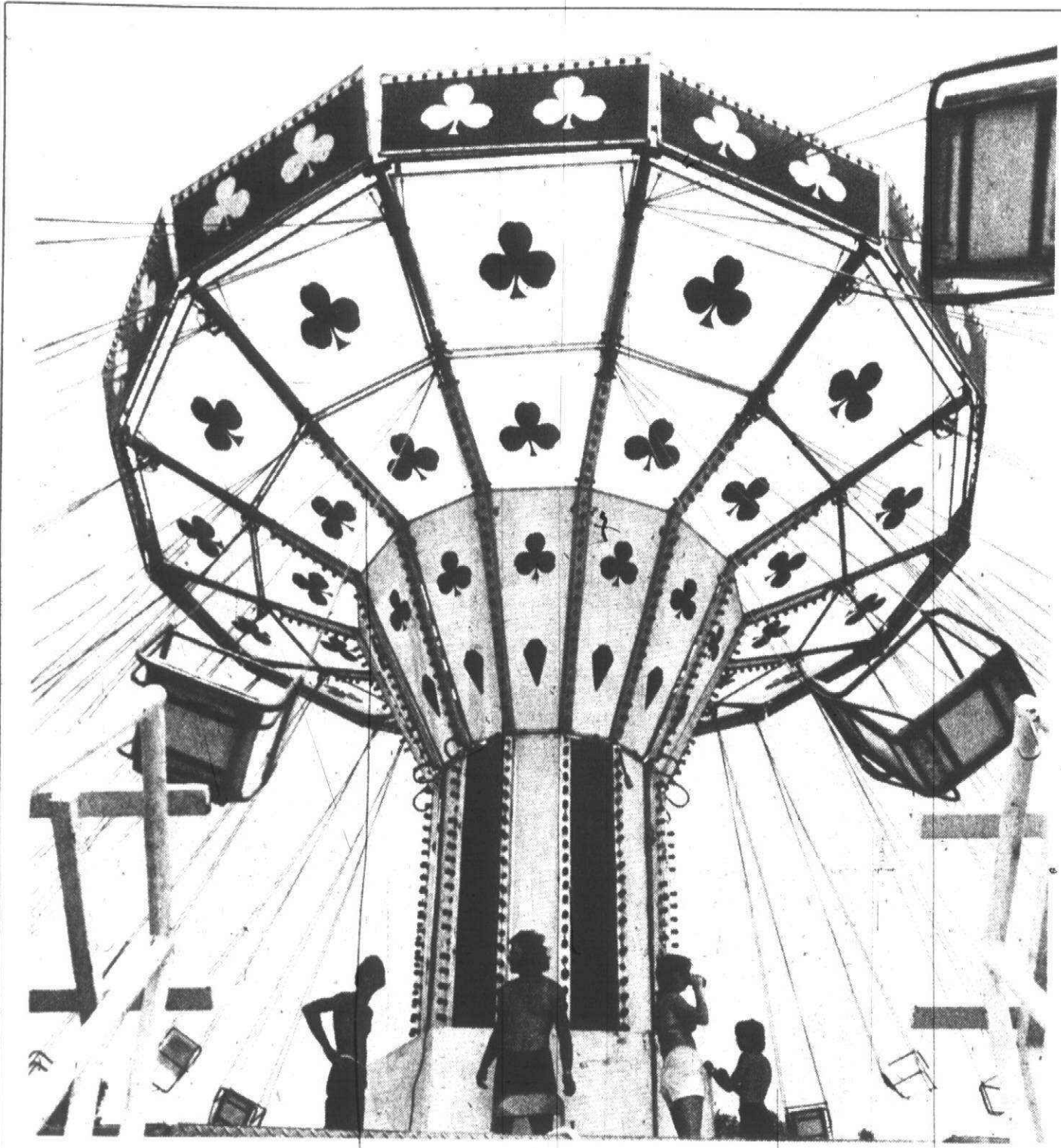
License plates aren't the only things Eddie collects. He has 400 45 r.p.m. records from the 50s, a knife collection and an Army patch collection. "I collect beer cans, but only to trade for license plates," he says.

His real love is music from the 50s. "It all began with 'Happy Days—I got interested in that kind of music and began collecting records. I have Elvis, a Fabian record with his signature some lady threw out, and a song sung backwards."

And what does Eddie plan to do with all his collections?

"I want to be a musician, (the plays drums and saxophone) and open a museum when I get famous. The plates are just a hobby."

"At least it keeps him off the streets," sighs his father.

Off the Walls

Subdivision streets often are a-maze-ing

Now that I've lived in Canton for more than a year, I can finally confess that moving into a subdivision was a somewhat traumatic experience. You see, I grew up in a city where the streets were all straight lines and the blocks were perfect rectangles. You could walk out your front door, walk down the street, take a short hike, make four right turns and end up in front of your very own house again. I hardly ever got lost.

Subdivisions are a different world entirely. Most of them are mapped out like a pretzel gone berserk. Our own little homestead is located in the back of this particular sub, which means you can take about five different routes and still get here—or you can get lost five different times.

You can either take the long way around and circle the whole development, or, if you're really brave and the visibility is good, you can cut through the middle and make 25 left, right and semi-circle turns.

We lived here about six months before I finally worked up the courage to venture into the middle of the sub and try to find my way out. I took my map and my compass and stationed my husband by the phone in case I had to call home for help.

Well, I made it, and lived to tell about it. But just because I've finally figured out how to drive this mind-boggling route doesn't mean I'm bright enough to explain how to do it to anyone else.

IT GETS RATHER awkward if I happen to invite a friend over to return my visit. When they

ask for directions, all I can say is, "I don't know. You turn a lot."

They never seem quite satisfied with that answer, so I go into my moronic monologue about, "Well, first you go down two blocks, and then you turn left on this street that I don't know the name of, but you only go down about five houses and turn right onto this street that starts with a C or a K. I can't remember which, and then you go down one or two blocks and make a right and then a quick left, and then you keep going until you reach a dead end. Or is that where you turn left? I forget."

At about this point, I break out into a nervous sweat and they look at me as if to say "Forget it. It's not worth the trouble."

If I'm talking on the phone when directions are required, I just quickly hand the phone to my husband and say, "Tell Beelzebub how to get here." He rattles off his irritatingly accurate directions without even bothering to ask who Beelzebub is. I suspect that he has just decided not to make friends with anyone on the phone until they've passed the test of whether or not they will be able to find our house. If not, we can always be pen pals.

Are these famous stones monuments or shrines?

STONEHENGE—One of the great unsolved mysteries of the world is this huge double circle of stones that stands near what is now Wiltshire, England.

Scientists who study such things tell us that it was begun in 2200 BC, and rebuilt around 600 year later (1600 BC).

The first builders left behind the huge Heel Stone, weighing 35 tons, which was brought from 24 miles away. Years later, giant blue stones were brought from the Prescelly Mountains, 135 miles away.

How did these early people move these gigantic stones? And for what purpose?

Some people believe they were placed there for worship, to form a place for Druid rituals. However, a recent computer study revealed corre-

lations between their placement and the position of the sun, stars and moon in 1500 years BC.

Were they really part of an enormous observatory and calendar? If so, how did the primitive people know enough about the movements of the heavenly bodies to place them so precisely?

BLARNEY STONE—Difficult to reach, this stone—located in the County of Cork, Ireland—is said to bestow great powers of persuasion upon those who kiss it.

ROSETTA STONE—In 1799, this stone was discovered near Rosetta, Egypt. It is a slab of black basalt on which there is an inscription in hieroglyphics, demotic characters and Greek, believed to be carved there in 196 BC. It now may be seen in the British Museum in London.

Mantle Merchants win marathon game in Montreal

There wasn't a lot of hitting in Montreal, Quebec, Canada over the holiday weekend, as the Plymouth Merchants (Plymouth Canton High School) won one of three 1-0 baseball decisions.

The Merchants, coached by Dave Racer and Fred Crissey, the Chiefs' head coach, participated in a four-team, double elimination Canadian tourney against All-Star teams from New Britton, Conn., Windsor and Quebec.

The 16 and 17-year olds, many of whom will play varsity baseball for Canton next season, lost their first

game to New Britton, won the second contest over Windsor and lost the third game to the eventual champions from Quebec—all by the same one-run margin.

The more suspenseful contest was a 14-inning donnybrook which saw Plymouth edge Windsor in an exciting pitcher's duel.

Brian James, the ace of Canton's varsity staff most of last school season, pitched all 14 innings for the Merchants.

He allowed five hits, struck out 16 batters, walked two and hit one man

enroute to the marathon victory. Windsor never came close to scoring off the Merchant hurler. James threw only 167 pitches in the contest.

The Merchants scored their only run off a Windsor reliever after the Canadian starter kept the Plymouth squad in check for the first 12 innings.

The Merchants' Dave Meador doubled in the 14th and scored on three consecutive walks. Dave Weise's base on balls with the bases filled drove home the only run of the game.

In the opening contest, the Merchants were sent to the loser's bracket

when they wasted a brilliant two-hit performance from Scott Dawson. New Britton scored the games only run in the first inning.

Dawson allowed one of his two hits in the initial stanza. That runner successfully stole second base but catcher Rusty Mandle's throw went wild into centerfield. Plymouth Salem batman Matt Etienne, playing centerfield for the Merchants, allowed a wild throw to get through his legs as the runner raced around the bases for the lone tally.

Dawson struck out eight batters but

to no avail, as the Merchants wasted their eight-hit attack.

In the third contest against Quebec, Etienne started and struck out the first 12 of 13 batters he faced.

But a touch of fifth-inning wildness, plus the inability of the Merchants to register a hit off the Quebec hurler, led to the Plymouth defeat.

Etienne finished the game with a four-hitter, striking out 16 batters. But he walked three batters in the fifth which helped force home the game's only run.

The Plymouth loss marked the first

time the Merchants or Chiefs have ever been defeated by a no-hitter.

The three Plymouth hurlers, Etienne, James and Dawson all received Most Valuable Player medals for their performances.

The Merchants, accompanied by parents and coaches, also enjoyed the sights of Montreal, visiting Mt. Royal, the Olympic Village and serving as guests of the Montreal Expos at a major league baseball game against the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Merchants were in Canada for a five-day span from June 28 through July 2.

Plymouth umpire enters 50th season

Gray, 82, feels at home on field

The recent celebration of Independence Day was a special date for Earl Gray. It marked the start of the 50th season of baseball umpiring for the Plymouth resident.

Yet, with all those years under his belt, the 82-year-old Gray will tell you he's never missed a call.

"As far as I'm concerned, I've never missed a call. But no one's that perfect," Gray said with a smile.

In his fifty years of umpiring, he must have called a lot of close plays. Although Gray almost went blind in his right eye from scarlet fever at age three, he never wore glasses until he was 65.

AND HIS PHILOSOPHY on umpiring hasn't changed in his half-century of experience.

"I always figured when I walked out on the field, I was a disinterested party. It didn't matter to me what town or city I was in. There's only one person you have to please and that's yourself. You're always on your own."

The retired Wayne County construction worker was a Plymouth High School student in the 1910s.

He began his umpiring career as a side job on weeknights and weekends. His first contest, between C.S. Smith and Plymouth Class A (they didn't have high school teams in those days) was played at the old Burrough's Field in Plymouth in 1929.

From there, he worked in the Inter-County Baseball League, the Michigan-Ontario League, and now is a member of the Suburban Umpires Association.

IN 1947, GRAY organized the Suburban Umpires Association, serving as the secretary-treasurer for more than 60 umpires. At one time, Gray handled a bank roll of as much as \$28,000 a year, as his umpires worked high

school and semi-pro baseball, men's fast-pitch softball, and boys little league games in western Wayne County and northern Oakland County.

Gray gave up his secretary-treasurer position in 1973 but continued to officiate games. In fact, just this last spring, Gray umpired in Lincoln Park, Saline, Ann Arbor, Farmington, Livonia, and Ypsilanti, just to name a few.

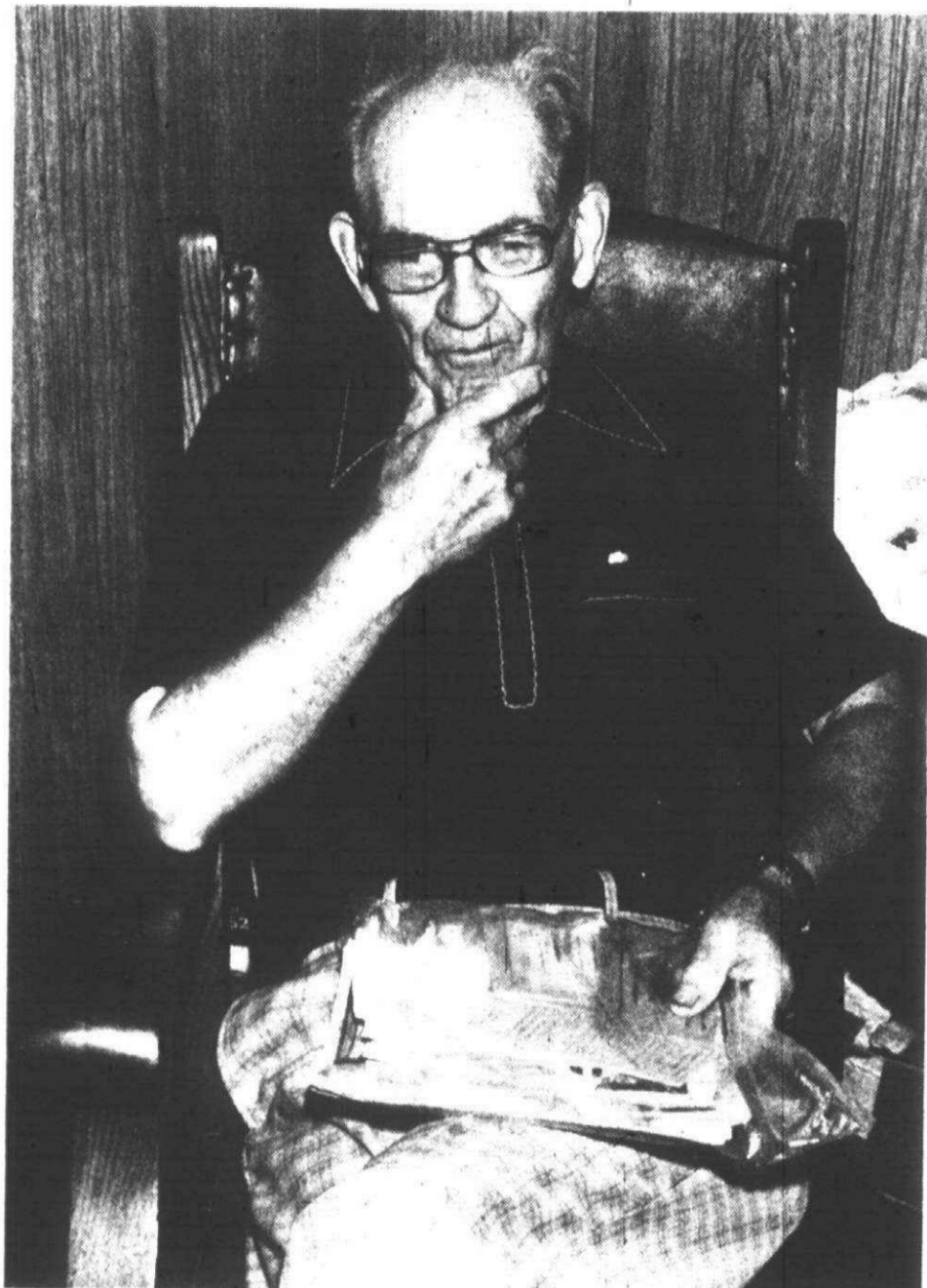
Last spring was the first year Gray

missed umpiring in the Plymouth-Canton area. A different umpire association was hired for Salem and Canton contests.

Gray once was a baseball player himself but he suffered arm trouble when he was young.

AFTER A BRIEF stint managing a baseball team the 1920s, Gray became involved as an umpire, knowing it would be just a hobby.

The winners of the Plymouth event receive a trophy and qualify for state competition later in the month.

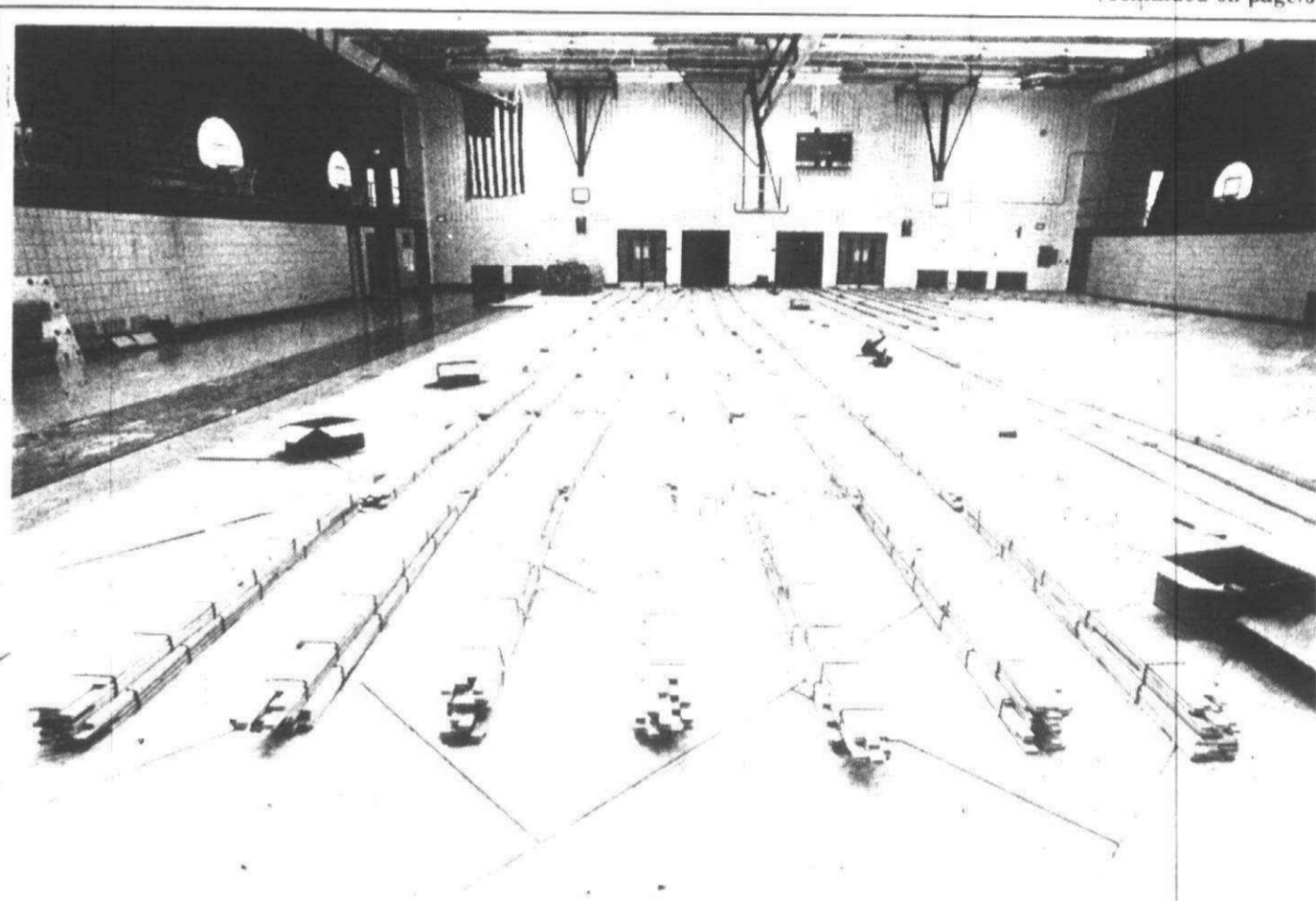

No more bubbles! Wood replaces Tartan surface

The Plymouth Salem High School gymnasium floor won't bubble anymore.

The controversial Tartan surface—installed in 1971—has been known to rise and form bumps and bubbles. It has been torn up and will be replaced by a hard wood court before the beginning of the fall school year.

After nearly eight years of battling with builders about the poor condition of the surface, an out-of-court settlement was finally reached last month.

The wooden floor will cost about \$30,000 and the Plymouth-Canton

School District will pay around \$4,000 of the bill, according to Supt. John Hoben.

"It's costing us the price of what a lawsuit would have been," Hoben said.

The old rubber-like floor had been repaired three or four times. But the bubbles—including big bumps in the middle of the court—continued to appear.

"The structure was never sound, I guess," Hoben said. "Originally, I don't think it was laid properly. It's hard to say because 50 feet away in the wrestling room there were no problems."

Hoben considered the negotiated settlement "very minimal" for the school district to pay.

"This is something that has been pending for eight or nine years and now it's a dead issue," Hoben said. "So rather than fool with some risk of losing (a lawsuit), we're getting an excellent maple hard wood floor. It's as good as any around."

"It's not Tartan so we'll have to take better care of it and refinish it over the years."

Construction of the new surface has begun and is expected to be finished by Aug. 1—in time for girls basketball practice and the physical education classes.

Canton takes 2d in Koufax tourney

Don Massey Cadillac, with convincing victories in all four of its games, won the second annual Don Massey Fourth of July Baseball Tournament last week in easy fashion.

Pierce competes in marathons

Bicycle racing requires skill

There are bicycle riders and then there are bicycle racers.

There isn't too much difference between the two, one might suppose.

However, there are great differences ranging from the tangible, such as equipment, to the more subliminal, such as the frame of mind of the racer compared to the rider.

Jeff Pierce, 19, from Livonia, is a racer who has been at it six years. He started off by entering a marathon not too long after he had purchased his first 10-speed bike.

From there, Pierce went into racing. His idea of a good time is to bicycle up to 20 miles per day. As a result of all that training, Pierce will enter and complete races of 100 miles in four hours.

Pierce races nearly every weekend from March to September. On any given weekend, he's likely to be racing anywhere in the midwest.

IT IS EXPENSIVE to become a serious racing bicyclist. A good bicycle will range in price from \$500-\$700, said Pierce. The reason? Fine engineering and machining and the types of metal used in construction.

Racing bikes weigh approximately 20 pounds, about half the weight of the average touring 10-speed. The racing

cycle weighs less so that less energy will be needed to peddle it over long distances.

The tires on the racer are even thinner than those on a regular 10-speed bicycle and the racing tire is actually glued to the rim. When a new tire is needed, the entire wheel must be replaced.

Special alloys—combinations of metals—are used to build a racer to provide strength but still keep the cycle as light as possible.

Other special equipment used by the racer is a light, usually open-aired helmet, a pair of gloves to protect against callouses and scrapes, and special shoes.

"The shoes have a slot in the bottom that fits over the pedal. Then you strap in the foot so that it is locked in," said Pierce.

The purpose of locking the feet to the pedals is to get even pressure on the peddle stroke for the best utilization of energy over long distances.

WHY DOES he do it? Pierce said he is not a physical fitness nut who substitutes cycling for long distance running or jogging to keep in peak condition. He races as a manner of exercise, but primarily because he enjoys it.

"It is not monotonous," said Pierce. "There are always things to look at,

things to see. And, you have to keep alert, too, for people and cars."

There are several things which must be considered when planning strategy for a race, and the constant thinking sets the racer apart from the rider, said Pierce.

"The first part of the race, you're just sitting in and analyzing the competition. The first thing you have to consider is what kind of rider you are.

"If you're a sprinter, you save your energy and hope the outcome comes down to a field sprint the last 200 meters or so. If you're strong, you go out by yourself and a few other people and grind away.

"If you're strong climbing hills, you may break away there," Pierce continued, adding that the hope is that

weak or average hill climbers will tire themselves out trying to keep up.

The other side of the coin is that those who break away from the pack during a race risk tiring themselves out.

"Most people are combinations of riders," Pierce concluded. Drafting, racing directly behind another rider to take advantage of him breaking the wind, is as common in bicycle racing as auto racing.

The type of course also influences strategy. "There is a difference if you're riding a one-mile flat loop as opposed to a 10-mile course with hills and sharp turns," said Pierce.

"There's also the wind and who else is in the race. You know you only have so much energy so if you go out and

use it all up (early), you're not going to do well."

ENERGY is as important to the bicycle racer as it is to the long distance runner. Like marathoners, Pierce said he loads up on carbohydrates prior to a long race. Carbohydrates break down to form glycogen, a stored energy source.

Sources of carbohydrates are pastas, spaghetti, bread and pancakes.

Because carbohydrates take time to break down and transform to an energy source, Pierce says they do no good unless a race lasts at least two hours.

Pierce said he prefers non-processed foods such as fruits and vegetables while training.

He said he avoids beef in large amounts because beef contains fat which the body can't break down as easily as it does other good protein sources like fish and poultry.

WATER BOTTLES are attached to the bicycle for quick drinks along the way and there is generally a feed area along the course where fruit can be tossed to riders as an energy boost.

All that is done on the run because Pierce said he never stops once a race gets underway.

Pierce acknowledges he has a lot of time to think during a long race. "I fantasize about the race, think about problems at home, what to do after the race—just fantasize," he said.

Then, of course, there is always the

strategy of the race at hand to consider.

PIERCE SUGGESTED that beginners learn their limitations and progress at a reasonable pace if they decide to take up bicycle racing.

"You should set up a good training schedule and a reasonable schedule," said Pierce. "You can't go out and ride 400 miles in a week. You must be honest with yourself. Ask yourself, 'What kind of time do I have and what can my body do?'"

Expect to be sore much of the time during the first several weeks of conscientious training. The bike's little seat isn't very comfortable at first when you sit on it for extended periods of time.

In time, thigh muscles will probably expand and calf muscles will flatten, Pierce said. Also, anticipate a sore back, neck and arms during the early training period.

It is suggested that those who lead sedentary lifestyles and older people who are thinking of taking up riding get a physical check-up before starting an ambitious training program.

The best way to get started, Pierce suggested, is to attend a marathon or a race and talk to some of the people involved with the activity.

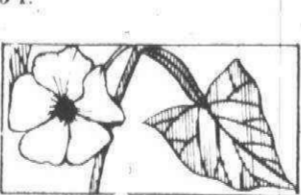
Pierce said the difference between marathon riding and racing is that marathoners try to ride as far as they can in a specified time period, often 24 hours, while racers attempt to cover a specific distance in as fast a time as possible.

AMONG THE MANY tributes paid to Eddie Lubanski several weeks ago when he was inducted into the Polish-American Hall of Fame was the fact that he won most his early honors while using a two-finger ball.

He was using that type of ball when he teamed with the veteran "Sarge" Easter to win the national doubles more than forty years ago. He still reverts to the old style ball when he is in a slump.

SPEAKING OF UNUSUAL things, Detroit has boasted of two bowlers

Gray said the game has changed a lot in terms of coaching where he sees more professionalism from men who teach the high school players. And he never resents a coach who questions a call.

"These coaches are hired to teach the kids," Gray said. "It never bothered me if coaches came out and questioned a close decision. As long as they handled themselves as professionals and forgot about the play after it was done—and play the game from then on. I've only thrown out one high school coach—somebody from Dearborn years ago."

ANOTHER CHANGE in the game was the attire of an umpire. In the 1920s and 1930s, umpires wore regular

suits and ties for every game. Later on, the clothing switched to a striped shirt, much like that of a football or basketball referee. Only recently, Gray said, the umpire's clothing switched to the light blue shirt and dark slacks that umpires now wear.

And the pay was quite different, too. "We used to take home \$6 for two games—18 innings—in the Michigan-Ontario League. Now we get \$17 for a high school game and \$9 or \$10 for a softball game." Both those leagues play seven innings a game.

GRAY ALSO said the fans were more kind in the early days.

"We didn't have too many problems," Gray said. "We respected the umpires more in those days than now, in terms of touching. The umpires had more protection from the fans."

Gray admitted, however, he was involved in an incident in the Inter-County League in 1942 when a fan at a Belleville-Garden City game didn't like a call, jumped out of the stands, and knocked him down—resulting in a police escort after the game.

GRAY HASN'T umpired for about two months now because of some health problems, but he should be ready to call those balls and strikes again by the end of this month.

He enjoys the time he has for himself and Edna, his wife of 53 years, after retiring as secretary of the organization.

But he'll never retire from his work on the diamond. Like Gray said, "I don't umpire for need. I umpire for the love of the game."

Building trades' hiring rules bring uproar

Women eyeing careers in the building trades took a giant step forward in May when the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs (OFCCP) put into effect tough new minority hiring rules for all federally funded construction jobs over \$10,000.

But these same women were stopped in mid-stride June 28 when the U.S. Supreme Court, in the Bakke decision, banned the use of quotas in minority-assistance programs.

Confusion now reigns in many affirmative action programs, including OFCCP's.

Whether these future female plumbers and roofers will resume their pace again under the new federal guidelines is at this point uncertain. OFCCP must decide, in the wake of the Bakke case, if its mandated "6.9 per cent of women in the construction work force by 1981" is a quota or a goal.

WHAT IS CERTAIN, however, is that the American Subcontractors

Association (ASA) and its Michigan branch, ASA of Michigan (ASAM), both are up in arms over the new federal regulations, whatever OFCCP's final decision may be.

ASA views the new rules as just the latest example of "bureaucratic red tape being jammed down the throat of the small businessman."

Small subcontractors who say they are already "hampered by 170-plus pages of federal rules and regulations" must now provide on-the-job training to unskilled women and minorities in the building trades, ASA says.

Doing so, according to ASA, will clash with traditional rules of seniority and union contracts, will anger unemployed skilled tradesmen across the country and will place an unfair economic burden on the small businessman.

"WE HAVE NO QUARREL with affirmative action for minorities or for women," said Ernest J. White, execu-

tive director of ASAM.

"But we do object to having to hire people with no marketable skills and then train them. Schools today are graduating illiterates. They (graduates) expect someone to take care of them. The government comes along and tells subs (subcontractors) to take the women and the kids in off the streets and make something out of them."

According to White, training costs fall on the group of businessmen least able to absorb them.

"Many of our subs are so small they send out only one or two men to a job site," White said.

"If the government was really sincere about efforts to get women into construction work, it would do what it did during World War II. We had instant 'Rosie the Riveters' because the government paid for the training."

According to White, the bottom line for any subcontractor in hiring is not race or sex but whether the person is

"qualified to do the job."

And, he said, most women are not qualified to work in the building trades because the schools are "just not doing the job" of teaching manual skills.

He cited his own experience of trying to get his daughter enrolled in a high school shop class. The school refused. He said he "screamed" to the administration and only then did the school back down.

AT A RECENT ASA press conference held in Southfield to honor Michigan Subcontractors Week and also to criticize OFCCP's "arbitrary" approach to getting women and minorities into the skilled trades, reporters were told that "emphasis must first be placed on creating an acceptance of the role of women in construction."

Charles B. Lavin Jr., ASA national executive director, told reporters that women who want to work in the building industry now get a boost from fed-

eral law, but they get very little encouragement or help from family or schools.

To this, White added that the nation's educational system had yet to "crank itself up" for the changing role of women and until it did, small subcontractors would be made the "scapegoats."

White conceded that putting women in apprenticeship programs would satisfy the government targets of 3.1 per cent of women in the building trades work force by 1979, 5.0 per cent by 1980 and 6.9 per cent by 1981.

But, he said, many apprenticeship programs are now frozen because of unemployment in the construction industry.

THE NEW REGULATIONS were first proposed by the U.S. Labor Department in August 1977. They were immediately opposed by contractors, unions and the National Association of Women in Construction on the grounds

that there were "not enough qualified, interested females in most fields."

The regulations finally adopted in May applied to all federally funded contracts over \$10,000. According to figures cited by White, close to \$3 billion flowed into Michigan in 1977 from federally financed projects.

According to ASA, subcontractors perform more than 75 per cent of job site work, thereby earning a major share of this \$3 billion.

White predicted that because of OFCCP's regulations more and more of this money would go into the hands of the larger subcontractors.

Smaller subs will avoid the "impractical, unrealistic restrictions and costly procedures" simply by not bidding on federally funded jobs, White predicted.

"Big business will just get bigger, there will be less competition, and prices will be forced up," he said.

Antique shops enjoying new interest boom

Fifty years ago when Grandma's Mason jars bubbled and boiled on the open stove, steaming up her kitchen, little did she guess that one day someone would pay a hefty price for one of her old jars.

And Grandpa, filling his brand new fountain pen, could not foresee the day when someone would travel many miles just to buy it.

The Grandmas and Grandpas of yesteryear went about their daily work using ordinary tools in a house crammed with ordinary furniture and utensils.

But today a wave of nostalgia for things of the past has turned Grandpa's everyday paraphernalia into prized antiques and collectibles.

New collectors intent on owning pieces of America's past are joining old connoisseurs and adding new life and zest to antique collecting.

Unable to afford many of the items made before the turn of the century, new antique enthusiasts have turned to the rugged oak furniture and collectibles of the 1920s.

Collectibles are everyday articles made too recently to be antiques, but are too old to be ignored.

The new collectors' aim is to capture as economically as possible in modern homes a little bit of Americana—a piece of its history and a memory of quieter, happier times gone by.

"PEOPLE SEE A PLASTIC world today," said Norma Weiser, owner of the Collectors' Barn in Northville. "They want something that has lasted something that isn't from the assembly line. This is their way of rebelling."

Everything is fair game for the new collector to collect in today's "anything goes" market. The possibilities are endless, restricted only by one's imagination and pocketbook. It could be clocks or postcards. Or anything else you can think of.

As collectors wax hot and then cool of the fads that come and go, be they carnival glass or commodes, antique dealers find themselves wearied and weathered.

Eleanor Lowell, owner of the Barr Door in Canton, explains why: "Antiques cover everything ever made. No one shop can carry everything."

This means that by the time a shop finds and stocks the latest fancy, collectors' interests are possibly elsewhere.

Unfazed and undaunted, antique dealers have learned to cope with their highs and lows. They tend to specialize. Or they stock just a wee bit of everything they can.

They refer collectors to sister shops. They welcome competition, for items are hardly ever duplicated in nearby shops. They also spend hours scouting auctions, farm and house sales, hoping to find a special object at a good price.

IT'S A HIGHLY UNSTABLE, erratic business that demands strict attention to detail. However, most of the owners of antique shops in the western Wayne County area would agree with Cathie Bosker, co-partner of Plymouth's Bennett House, where she said: "I love it."

Bennett House, nestled on the ground floor of a redone 19th Century Victorian duplex, is the newest in a long line of well-known Plymouth shops which have lured antique lovers to Michigan for years.

Southeastern Michigan antique shops have long been known throughout the Midwest for their competitive prices and well-stocked rooms.

"We are cheaper here because we have more here," said Mary Marie Riegal, owner of Riegal's Antique Shop in Livonia. "We have more accessories, more flea markets, more competition."

Riegal's Antiques is an 18-year-old Livonia landmark which finds itself, in

its owner's words, "fighting a whole new ball game" these days.

LONG RECOGNIZED FOR its collection of crushed and colored glass, Riegal's now finds these treasures piling up as younger collectors burst onto the market. To explain why, Ms. Riegal divides today's collectors into two groups, the older and the younger.

The older collectors had hard economic times growing up, Ms. Riegal said. So when they turned to antique collecting, they went for the pretty things, the things they were denied in earlier days. Things like glass and china.

They shied away from oak because this was the style they grew up with, and they didn't want to collect the familiar.

Today's younger buyers, according to Ms. Riegal, grew up with the pretty things and are used to them. Now, as collectors, they want the rugged, practical furniture that was popular in the '20s, before they were born. They prefer oaks, tins, irons and primitives.

"You can't expect them to like Victorian," Ms. Riegal said. "And, of course, there are the prices. The younger people get discouraged by prices they can't afford, so they have turned to the affordables."

HIGH PRICES long have besieged the antique business, a business which many claim caters mostly to well-heeled investors.

But Ms. Lowell, who moved the Barr Door from Northville to Canton two years ago, said she "gets a kick out of selling to people who have to watch pennies. They are very careful what they buy, and they want to know all about an object before buying it."

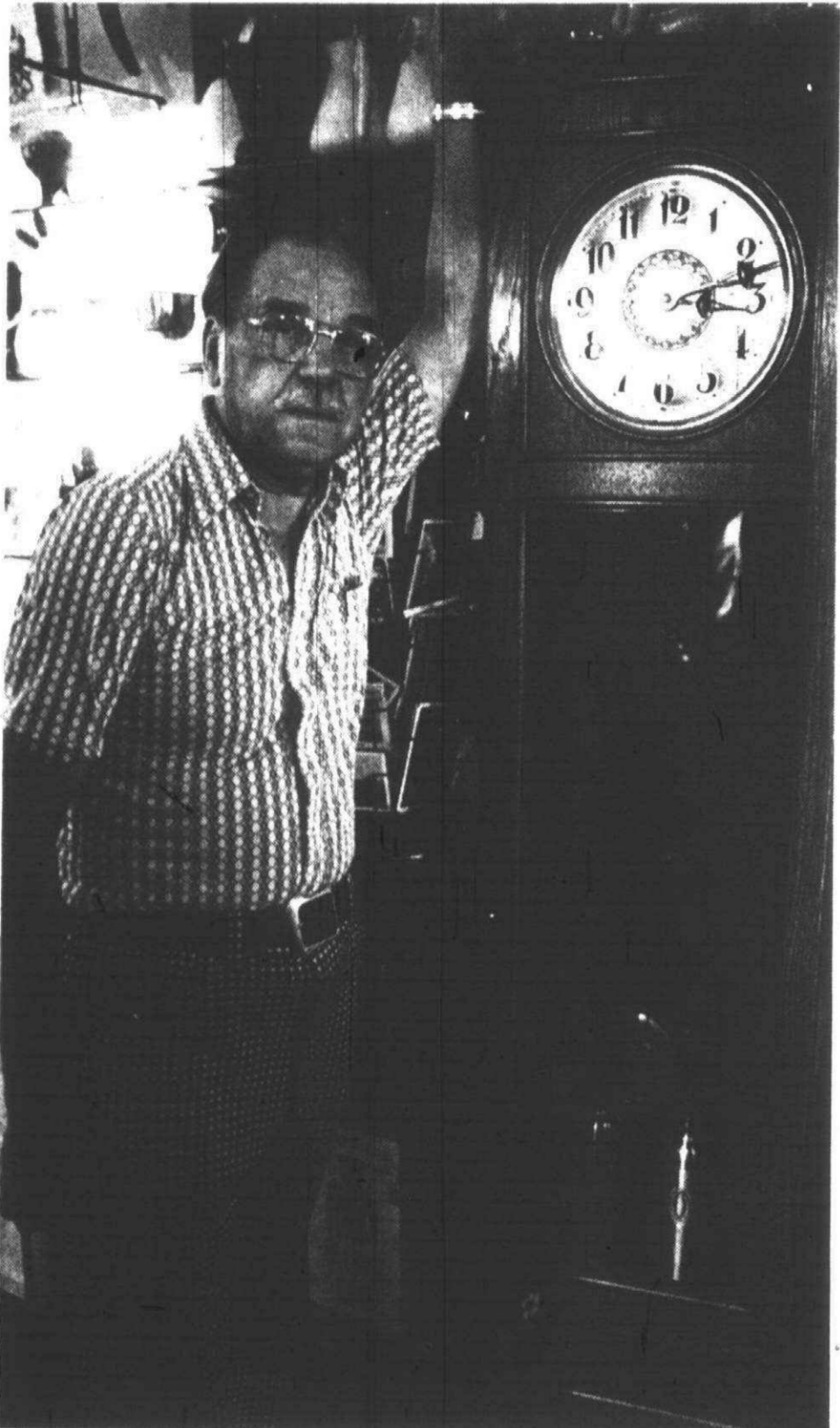
Ms. Lowell added that she had encountered buyers who were "horrified" at prices.

"I tell them that antiques haven't gone up proportionately with other things on the market. Some even carry the same price tag year after year. But some people still feel they'll get stung at an antique shop. This is nonsense," she said.

"It's not like the auctions, where you get caught up in the excitement and overbid. Here, you have longer to think about it and to examine a piece. A reputable shop will always take something back if it is not as represented."

Market Watch

Now that the first half of 1978 is history, let's take a look at some of the things that occurred to the stock market during this period.

While the Dow Jones industrial average closed June 30 only 12 points below the year-end close, it has had some rather volatile movements in the interim.

The average stood at 831 at the beginning of the year. By the first week in March, it had dropped 10 per cent to a level of 745. Then, without any specific reason, a tremendous rally developed that carried the average upward 15 per cent to a level of 860. This was reached in the second week of June.

Since then the market has drifted lower to its close on June 30 of 819.

THE FIRST HALF of the year witnessed more negatives than positives as far as the news background is concerned.

Congress failed to act on energy legislation, interest rates continued to rise and inflation showed little sign of abating.

While the average showed little change over the six months period, examination of individual stocks shows otherwise.

Following is a record of the performance of representative stocks in some of our major industries. The first price in the parenthesis represents the year-end, and the second price shows the approximate close on June 30.

In the auto group, American Motors (4-5 1/2) and Ford (46-47) showed improvement, while Chrysler (13-11) and General Motors (63-60) declined.

John Deere (25-32), International Harvester (30-35) and Allis Chalmers (25-35) were strong in the farm equipment area, while Caterpillar Tractor (55-54) and Massey Ferguson (15-11) were slightly weak.

MINOR CHANGES OCCURED in Bethlehem (21-22), Republic (22-23) and Armco Steel (28-29), while U. S.

Steel, the largest, declined from 31 to 26.

In the electronic group IBM (274-261) was weak. Burroughs (73-73) and General Electric (50-50) were the same. Honeywell (46-56), Texas Instruments (74-79) and Westinghouse (18-21) showed gains.

The aluminum, Alcoa (47-42) and Reynolds (32-28) were down. Large food chains such as A&P (9-7) and Kroger (28-32) were mixed, while two local companies, Allied Supermarkets (23-23) and Borman's (3-5) held their own.

The retail store group was even lower. J. C. Penney (36-36) held steady, but Kmart (27-25) and Sears (28-23) slipped slightly.

TWO MAJOR INDUSTRIES that performed disappointingly in the first half were the oils and the chemicals. Their records are as follows:

Exxon (48-44), Gulf (27-23), Marathon (49-44), and Texaco (28-24). Allied Chemical (44-36), Dow (27-25), DuPont (120-112), Monsanto (57-51), and Union Carbide (41-38).

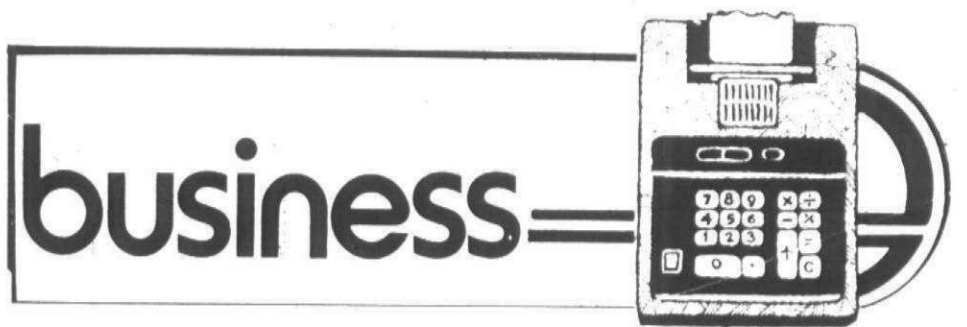
The aerospace and pharmaceutical industries were very strong.

Boeing (28-53), General Dynamics (46-77), Lockheed (15-22) and McDonnell Douglas (27-34) all did well, and Pfizer (27-33), SmithKline (50-81) and Squibb (24-35) showed nice gains.

To the embarrassment of most serious stock analysts, however, the group that performed the best was the one that was probably most overlooked—the casino stocks.

While they dropped sharply from their earlier highs, they still showed impressive gains at the conclusion of the first half. The record follows: Bally (17-36), Caesars (7-24), Del Webb (13-22) and Resorts International "A" (22-71).

MONEY GO ROUND

Credit is a six-letter word which means a lot of things to a lot of people.

To some, the use of credit is a normal way of life. Without it their standard of living would be reduced substantially.

To others, credit is a means of acquiring a much-needed item such as a car or a house.

Still others only use credit in a financial emergency. Whatever the situation or the need, remember that credit is not a right; you must earn it.

Even though not everyone is entitled to credit, many people feel discriminated against when they are turned down. This is particularly true for women.

MANY WOMEN ask if they can buy their own home or purchase a car on their own. Of course you can. I tell them, provided you qualify. If a woman can meet the credit qualifications, she is entitled to the same considerations as any other person.

A woman applying for credit, whether she is single, divorced or married, will find the going easier if she knows in advance what the lender will ask. Basically, the application will require information on residence, employment, fixed expenses, other indebtedness, and past credit experiences.

The primary concern of all lenders is the ability to pay. They will look at how much money comes in every month, the source of that money, and basically how it is spent.

They will also look at other indebtedness closely, because lenders will not create another debt if the applicant is already over-extended, even when the income level is substantial.

LENDERS WILL ALSO consider the person's stability. How long has she been employed and how long has she lived at her current address.

Lenders will also check her financial habits. Does she maintain a checking account and/or savings? And they will check her credit with the local credit bureau.

Reader blasts rec hall purchase

The Canton Township Board just approved the purchase of the OLD recreation building, on Michigan Avenue, for \$105,000 and presented another financial shock to the Canton taxpayer.

Supervisor Harold Stein's sales pitch for the FREE \$2,715,300 federal grant to build a three-story administration building was that it would "house ALL current activities as well as future needs—court, library, meeting rooms, activity centers" and (he said) "The advantage of a new building would be that it will allow the township to consolidate the different spread-out operations into ONE building."

First floor—clerk, treasurer, supervisor

Second floor—building, water, recreation department

Third floor—Large activities room for senior citizens, and temporary

library
Basement—courtroom, records, storage
Plymouth Township trustees are about to place two major purchases on the August primary ballot to get voter permission for:

1) Proposed purchase of 34 acres to enlarge their golf course to 18 holes.

2) Voter permission to buy a building on one acre for \$117,500.

Why didn't our board give Canton voters the same opportunity by putting these major purchases on our August ballot for voter approval? The Canton board recently approved \$1 million for purchase of a golf course without asking permission of taxpayers.

The Canton board has had many secret meetings regarding purchase of a recreation building, and at least one trustee who attended one said that he was not aware of others and wished them discontinued.

Two trustees feel the building is "out-dated and obsolete;" "and we paid too much for it." Township clerk said "roof repairs are needed." The cement block walls definitely need interior walls with insulation for cost-efficiency and less waste for heating and cooling. Purchase, according to Stein, was "contingent upon getting federal assistance—due to costliness."

We haven't received it yet.

In January 1977, newspapers reported Stein said "they will not renew lease on recreation building when it expires in TWO years;" "the placement of the recreation department in the new building will eliminate the need for the rented recreation building once the five-year lease is up." Deputy Treasurer Mike Gorman said the "five-year lease will run out within a month or two of date on which new building can be used." Eleven months later, Stein says we have a 10-

year lease and "we might just better own the property."

Do we have a five-year or 10-year lease? And why did the board add purchase of this building as a last-minute addition agenda item?

I can't understand why this building was assessed in 1977 at \$21,190; and NOW is appraised at \$152,000. I do know that a \$30,000 federal grant was used in 1976 to renovate this ancient building for a desperately needed building for senior citizens' activities. The before and after pictures were very striking, and there were no hidden costs for Canton taxpayers.

The board also is planning on converting the present township meeting hall to a courtroom at a cost of \$30,000, instead of putting it in the basement of new administration building as originally presented.

7 candidates line up for seat on county commission

As a service to Plymouth-Canton residents, the following voter's guide information has been prepared for candidates seeking election to the 27th District of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The biographical information and responses to issue questions which follows has been compiled by the League of Women Voters of Northville, Plymouth, Canton and Novi.

Seven candidates have filed for election in the 27th District which includes all of Plymouth and Canton. The former incumbent, Royce Smith (D-Belleville), now is serving in a full-time position in the Wayne County Department of Public Works. The commission's seat presently is being held by William Joyner (R-Plymouth) who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by Smith's resignation.

The candidates who have responded to the League's questionnaire are: Walter Hink, Democrat from Belleville; Frederick M. Montgomery, Democrat from Wayne; Joyner, Plymouth Democrat; Frank A. Yonish, Republican from Wayne; Berna Chenaault, Democrat from Carleton; and Robert Myers, Democrat from Canton.

The League of Women Voters is a non-partisan organization the purpose of which is to encourage citizen participation in government by informing voters on candidates and ballot issues. The League does not endorse or support individual candidates, but may take positions on ballot propositions.

Following is a summary of biographical information on candidates for the 27th District of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

FREDERICK MONTGOMERY, 34, Democrat, of Wayne. Attended Wayne County Community College, Henry Ford Community College, currently enrolled in Wayne State University. Employed by Wayne County General Hospital for nine years; has been elected representative of 1,400 co-workers for past eight years, gaining

valuable insight into county's financial and administrative problems. Active Democrat. Executive board member (Wayne) 15th District Party; elected two-term precinct delegate; homeowner; Jaycee.

WALTER T. HINK, 32, Democrat of Belleville. Practicing attorney (firm—Blake & Hink), Doctorate of Laws—University of Detroit, bachelor of science in business finance, Wayne State University. Member Michigan State Bar Association, Florida State Bar Association, Suburban Bar Association, 15th District Democratic Party, United Canton Democratic Club, Van Buren-Belleville Democratic Club, Lions Club, Air Force Association.

R. WILLIAM JOYNER, 28, Democrat of Plymouth. Bachelor of Science in secondary education, Central Michigan University (1972); member Optimist Club of Plymouth; past lieutenant governor, Michigan District Optimist International; member Plymouth Jaycees, current vice-president of the Michigan Jaycees; I bring a background of dedication to the volunteer sector and recognize the important role it plays in government.

FRANK A. YONISH, Republican of Wayne. Attending the University of Michigan-Dearborn. Youth leader of the Western Wayne County Republican Club; also a member of the Michigan Young Republicans, and a sustaining member of the Republican National Committee.

BERNA V. CHENAULT, 48, Democrat of Carleton. Attended University of Detroit. Memberships: Community Advisory Committee, Oakwood Hospital, Dearborn; Southwest Wayne County Mental Health Association Board; Citizens Health Care, Sumpter, Van Buren, Belleville; Citizens Advisory Committee, Lincoln Consolidated Schools; nine years Real Estate experience; Realtor associate, Ann Arbor Board; Sumpter Township Planning

Commission, Board of Review.

ROBERT L. MYERS, 33, Democrat of Canton. Education—University of Detroit, 1965-66; Board member, Consumer Alliance of Michigan, 1973-present; president, Michigan Mobile Homeowners Association, 1970-present; member, Construction Code Commission, 1974; trustee, Canton Township, 1974-present; appointed Federal Mobile Home Commission, 1976-present; Michigan Mobile Home Commission 1977, reappointed 1978-81; UAW member 1967-present.

EACH CANDIDATE was asked three questions by the League and given a limit of 50 words per question for the response. The questions and answers follow:

Question: Would you favor putting the question of having a county executive on the ballot? Explain.

Myers: Yes, but not until 1980 when redistricting is complete to allow for western Wayne County to have larger voice in selection of drafting of qualifications of candidates.

Yonish: I favor placing the question of a county executive on the ballot. The commissioners, at present, are faced with the almost unachievable task of regulating the operation of county government. It is, therefore, necessary that Wayne County establish a county executive to see that the commissioners' policies are carried out.

Chenaault: In favor of having county executive on ballot, provided veto powers are explained before the vote not changed after, with clear-cut guidelines as to her (his) powers. Remove temptation of representatives favoring their constituents and neglecting other municipalities within their district. Out-county tends to lose on most issues.

Montgomery: Obviously need exists

for bearer of responsibility. Recent board chairman used post only for political appointment to higher paying positions. Lack of overseer has led to neglect and part-time attendance by commissioners. Plan apparently working in Oakland County. Only fear, one more high-paying, non-functioning office taxpayers must support.

Hink: Yes—Wayne County is at this time faced with bankruptcy due to the deficit spending by the board of commissioners. One of the solutions to this financial crisis is total re-ordering of the county budget at the direction of a county executive with enough power to eliminate mismanagement and waste.

Joyner: Yes. I am firmly convinced that the people of Wayne County must have the opportunity to vote on this needed reform. Wayne County government lacks the leadership necessary to be a truly dynamic force. I want to see the people given the chance to make a needed commitment for change.

QUESTION: Are services such as police protection equitable to townships and cities? If not, how would you correct this?

Hink: No—The townships in western Wayne County must rely primarily on the Sheriff Department for its police protection (road patrol). The county commissioners only allocate eight per cent of the total county budget to the sheriff. I would cut the waste presently in the budget allocating a larger percentage to the sheriff.

Joyner: No. County has obligation to provide services and protection for residents on a 24-hour basis. As long as townships exist without police then we must provide police protection. Should the legislature override the governor's veto of SB 1517, Wayne County will be

financially better off to provide the protection.

Myers: No. We have watched as sheriff patrols, road maintenance, helicopter patrols, and other county services have been cut back. At present, 64 per cent of the Wayne County budget comes from out-county areas while only 34 per cent is returned in services.

Montgomery: To this point, question has been out of my sphere of county government experience. Although, Wayne Police have always proven courteous, responsive and professional in my contacts with them. HB 1517, if signed, would greatly increase protection to all townships in 27th District.

Yonish: Police protection is equitable to certain townships and cities. The sheriff's department furnishes police protection in many unincorporated areas, and to the city of Romulus by contract. Although with the recent population growth in such townships as Canton, sheriff's patrols should be increased in proportion to the population.

Chenaault: County law enforcers should be more flexible, fluid and cooperative in shifting services in order to adjust the areas of inequities. They should not sit still, for example, in one area writing tickets. Crime in out-county areas tend to be seasonal and shifting, should also adjust to accommodate those seasons.

QUESTION: What suggestions do you have for improving the structure of Wayne County government?

Chenaault: The computer is an excellent device and can be used to reach areas of greatest need. There should be a shifting of monies and more rapid response to problems. Money should not be earmarked for one year. Sur-

plus should be placed back into general funds to be used somewhere else.

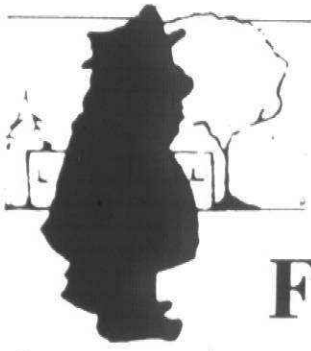
Yonish: I suggest establishing a county executive as one way to improve the structure of county government, as was put forth in question No. 1. Also, I suggest the county provide services to its taxpayers, but with a cost effectiveness approach toward spending and an hold-the-line approach toward taxing.

Montgomery: Commissioners accept position and pay as being full-time; should be held accountable for attendance, and participation. More controls placed on county agencies, commissions, revision of districts, possible reduction of number. Insist on equity for tax dollars for 27th District. Seek out, maximize state, federal monies available.

Myers: A. Move circuit courts closer to western Wayne County. B. Provide for greater utilization of rail and bus service in western Wayne County. C. See that the rates are fair for Super Sewer for all communities, not just the drain commission. D. See that the sheriff's patrol and road maintenance is continued and increased.

Hink: Bankruptcy is the most pressing problem facing Wayne County today. Sixty per cent of the budget is spent on health and welfare (\$210 million). Ninety million dollars is mismanaged and wasted on Wayne County General Hospital. In order to eliminate this situation we must re-order the budget, spending money on essential services.

Joyner: First, provision for a county executive or county manager. Second, full-time commissioners that can provide full-time legislative leadership and resident service (ombudsman). Third, perhaps fewer commissioners. We need to make people more aware of the county government. We need leadership.



The Stroller

Firemen light up parade

The last place in the world you would think that a fellow could suffer the pangs of homesickness would be on a curb along Main Street watching the Fourth of July parade.

But that is exactly what happened to The Stroller and it left him with memories of some of the most unusual and colorful parades he ever has seen.

While a group was marching past Plymouth City Hall and had trouble keeping a straight line, The Stroller got to smiling. For it was a last-minute truck to keep the marchers in line in the firemen's parade that helped them win first prize back home years ago. His old home town had the distinction of having the largest and best volunteer fire company in the entire area.

In those days there were no such thing as paid firemen in small communities. Those who fought the blazes that occurred from time to time were volunteers.

They worked for the glory of it. Their only reward was to attend the annual Four County Firemen's Convention and then carry off the top prize in the parade.

This one particular year, the parade was held in the southernmost part of the area. That meant the firemen had to leave early and be dressed in their parade attire, which consisted of a red flannel shirt and a white tie with a black numeral '9' on it.

As we arrived early in the parade town, there were red shirts everywhere—especially in the beer parlors, commonly known as saloons.

To make sure we would be in the running for the main prize—which went to the fire company with the most men in line passing the judges' stand—we sent scouts out to count noses.

The reports came back that our own Southwark Hose Co. No. 9 had the most men in uniform. There was joy in the ranks as our company had taken the prize for several years and we wanted to

do it again to keep up the tradition.

Things were going fine. Everyone seemed to be having a great time. Folks lined the streets in great numbers. Then came the shocking word that a great number of our men had imbibed too freely of the amber fluid and it was doubtful they could do any marching.

Just before the parade started—and our company was far back in the line—we rounded up all the tipsy fellows and had them stationed about two blocks from the judges' stand. The next chore was to get them lined up and walking when we reached the officials' stand. Only those in line at the stand were officially counted.

For a time we were nonplused. Then one of the officers came up with a splendid idea. We'd stand the fellows up and have them place their arms over each others' shoulder. That ought to keep them up.

It required a lot of effort. But the plan worked. When the judges' figures were presented, our company won the top prize by a margin of only a few men.

There was plenty of joy in the ranks when our captain was called up before the crowd and presented with the trophy.

That victory left a lasting mark. Every year since then, the marchers from our old company back home have still used the arms-around-the-shoulders technique at the Four County Firemen's convention, held annually on July 4th.

It was the memory of that "trick" that caused the Stroller to suffer a pang of homesickness on the streets of Plymouth last Tuesday.

He was wishing he was back home—just to see the volunteers from the Southwark Hose Co. No. 9 walking in the parade with their arms around each others' shoulders.

The memory of the original "trick" will never die.

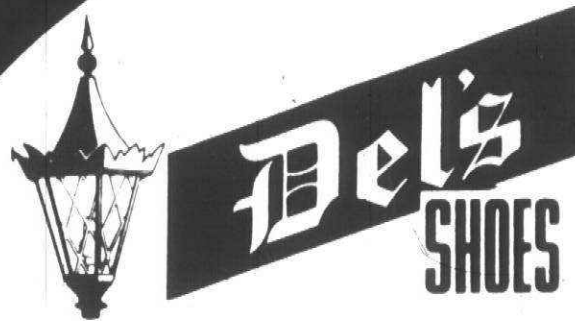

Would tax roll back hike income tax?

If you're supporting the Tisch tax cut, you're actually supporting a tax increase. That's the opinion of Oakland County Executive Daniel T. Murphy—who is supporting the separate tax proposal championed by Taxpayers United for Tax Limitation—and an analysis of the county's office of management and budget.

"It is clear from the analysis that the Tisch Amendment is an insidious fraud," Murphy said. "Under the guise of lowering taxes, the proposal would actually raise taxes. Under the banner of Proposition 13, the people would be getting a 'Catch 22.'"

"The catch is simple—property taxes would go down, at least temporarily, but income taxes would go up," Murphy said. TISCH AND HIS supporters are saying the 50 per cent rollback in property taxes and a one per cent increase in the ceiling on the state income tax would mean immediate tax relief for property owners.

Murphy and Oakland County budget chief James Brennan, however, pointed out that Tisch's proposal also allows for a new one per cent local school district income tax and does not provide for any tax exemptions and would allow the state legislature to

initiate different types of property taxes to replace the revenues lost in the tax rollback.

For the special one per cent school district income tax to be assessed, however, it would have to be approved by the district's voters.

"There's no tax limitation protection in this (Tisch's) proposal whatsoever," Brennan said. While Shiawassee County Drain Commissioner Robert Tisch and no other official spokesmen were available for comment, volunteers were hostile when challenged with Murphy's analysis.

"Whatever it is they're telling you, it's false," said Westland businesswoman Laura Wofford.

"Give up on the politicians for awhile," she said. "They'll give you any kind of bull." ELABORATING ON HIS charges, Murphy said, "An individual with a

family income of \$22,000 and a house with a market value of \$50,000 would pay \$114 more in taxes (under the Tisch amendment) than under present laws.

"Those earning as little as \$10,000 a year could also find their taxes increased."

According to the department of budget and management's analysis, a family earning \$22,000 annually and owning a \$50,000 home would owe \$1,362.50 in property taxes. However, the property tax credit which is deducted from the state income tax reduces the net tax on property to \$1,007.

Under the Tisch Amendment,

according to the analysis, property taxes would be slashed to \$681. The amendment contains no property tax exemptions to further reduce that total, though.

In addition to the \$681, the one per cent increase in the state income tax and the special one per cent income tax which could be collected in local school districts would total \$440.

At the bottom line, according to Murphy and Brennan, is a \$114 tax increase—a total tax of \$1,121 under Tisch's proposal compared to the \$1,007 under the present tax system.

Taxes would also rise in the lower income brackets, Murphy and Brennan said.

Tax limit vs. tax cut

A spot on the November ballot has yet to be reserved for Robert Tisch's tax-cutting constitutional amendment, but what happens if it goes head-to-head against a tax limitation proposal that is already on the ballot? Since the two proposed amendments would appear as simple "yes" or "no" questions, there's the chance that both would be approved by the voters.

According to Bernard Apol, head of the Secretary of State's elections division, "The (state) Constitution provides that whenever two or more questions dealing with the same subject conflict, the question receiving the greatest number of popular votes shall prevail."

Tisch and his supporters have until this afternoon to file the 266,000 signatures necessary to place his proposal, which would slash property taxes by 50 per cent, on the November ballot.

'Cheap detective' cliché soup piping hot

Even a diehard Bogart fan will crumble before the spoofisms of "The Cheap Detective" (PG), an irreverent mishmash of the classic Warner Bros. films of the 40s.

It's an easy-to-satirize genre, and Neil Simon, director Robert Moore and producer Ray Stark, the team responsible for the 1976 hit "Murder by Death," have put together another winner.

The mocking tone is struck at the beginning, when a preamble with melodramatic music informs the audience of events going on in the world which have no bearing on the movie.

The movie itself is set in the fictional city of San Francisco. This time we do not have an assembly of famous detectives who convene to solve a murder. Instead, we have one caricatured detective and a collection of murders.

Peter Falk, in a gritty, stylish performance, is Lou Peckinpugh, private eye. (His office is in the Private Detective Center.) Specifically, Peckinpugh is a take-off on the Sam Spade character immortalized by Bogart. Generally, he's a take-off on that combination of qualities associated with the Bogie character and legend: The tough, masculine, self-reliant individualist.

"The Cheap Detective" is a pastiche of "The Maltese Falcon" and "Casablanca," with a little of "The Big Sleep" and "To Have and Have Not" thrown in for good measure.

Although Falk is the thread which holds together this crazy-quilt plot, there is hardly an actor or actress among the large cast who doesn't contribute comic and satisfying performance.

The exceptions are Sid Caesar and Ann-Margret, who play a doddering millionaire and his lusty, young wife. The fault however, is less with their acting than with the tasteless material with which they must work.

Madeline Kahn is a goofy delight in hat, gloves and prim white collar as the Mary Astor character from "Falcon." She uses so many aliases that she confuses herself.

Louise Fletcher and Fernando Lamas are thenoble duo (Ingrid Bergman and Paul Henreid) from "Casablanca." Dom De Luise scores as an overly perfumed Pepe Damascus (Peter Lorre) and John Houseman is an appropriately portly Jasper Blubber (Sydney Greenstreet).

Among the complications are the Gestapo officers of Cincinnati. Nicol Williamson as Colonel Schlissel with his aides Schnell and Kvikker. When the Colonel urges his driver to go faster, he shouts "Schnell, Schnell!" and his aide keeps popping up. Finally, the exasperated Colonel says, "I'll speak English. Kvikker!" and his other aide pops up.

The Colonel spars with puns and huns while Lou Peckinpugh tries to sort out the human filing system in his apartment. He has a different female stashed in each room and another one ringing the doorbell.

In one of the movie's major confrontations, when Lou sneeding the motley crew of conspirators about who will "take the fall," he turns his anger on Boy (Paul Williams in a parody of the Elisha Cook "Gunsel" role). Does Lou Slug him? No. He commands Boy to hit himself until he finally knocks himself out. Williams's self-assault is a comic masterpiece.

Sight gags and one-liners tumble over each other in the brisk action of "The Cheap Detective," and as might be expected, the quality varies from very funny to terrible.

This is the kind of movie that looks as if the cast were having a good time and, generally, that means a good time for the audience, too.

Dennis and Cheryl Toles brought their two children in from Canton Township. Jeff Stratton dropped by from Westland with Debbie Patton of Melvindale. Brooke Kinford, a graduate of Redford Union High School, turned up with another RU grad, Pat Sherman.

MORE THAN A MILLION people like them march through the Greenfield Village entrance each year to take a step backward in time.

Why do they come?

"We want to expose the children to the past," said Cheryl Toles. Besides, daughter Michelle likes horses, and was fascinated by the seeing the handsome creatures, long gone from city and suburbs, applying natural horsepower to wagons and buggies in the village.

"It makes you think back to the old days, and you realize how good we have it now. We don't have to work as hard as they did, or get up at 5 a.m. to milk the cows."

YET LIKE MANY others, he found undeniably attractive the fact that there wasn't much of a drug or crime problem back in the days when they rose at 5 a.m. to milk the cows and to make their own soap, candles, furniture and quilts.

"People were more friendly then," he decided. He likes Greenfield Village for its openness, its history and its charm, but he wouldn't want to live there and then.

Mr. and Mrs. Ben Giglio of Windsor didn't so much bring their children as their children brought them. Heavy lobbying by their youngsters, including David, who likes cars, impelled them over the Detroit River.

"We had heard so much about it," noted Mrs. Giglio. Nodding toward her offspring, she seemed glad she had agreed to come. "It's an education for the kids," she smiled, "and I like the old furniture and jewelry."

The Karl Pesicks of Country Club Hills, Ill. were making a return trip, this time to open the door to the past to their three children. "We like the history and old architecture," remarked Pesick.

LIKE MANY OF THE VISITORS, the Finley family of Birmingham had made the nostalgic scene because of a visiting relative. They were spotted with their cousin, Dan Schueler of Liverpool, N. Y., studying long out-of-date machinery.

"I like Menlo Park the best," said Dan, referring to the area of Greenfield Village devoted to Thomas Alva Edison, a man highly admired by Henry Ford.

Called the wizard of Menlo Park, Edison was the guiding light behind such inventions as the light bulb, the mimeograph machine and the phonograph. Ford brought Edison's six-building research complex to Greenfield Village from New Jersey.

Picking her favorite attraction, Colleen Finley ignored the steamboat, the steam locomotive, the horse-drawn carriages and the covered bridge.

"I liked the clock the best," she said pointing to the Sir John Bennett clock made in England that is the focus of attention every quarter hour when it chimes the time with the help of life-sized figures.

Maureen Finley is one of those who likes to watch the glassblowers, candlemakers, woodcarvers and blacksmiths work on their trades. In an era of mass production, the time, and patience they spend on an original piece of work impresses her.

THE BRAVEST PERSONS on the 260-acre site on a recent Monday may have been Robert and Janet Chiapelli, who had driven from Rochester with four small children. In strollers that could have been marked his and hers, they wheeled the kids, two apiece, over the cobblestones, brick, dirt and cement paths.

Mrs. Chiapelli likes old things and made a special effort to stand under the Bennett clock when it chimed.

To stroll back to the days of tablecloths, medicine shows, ice cream parlors, old cars and bicycles, homes made to last and machinery that made us what we are today, drive south on the Southfield expressway past Ford Rd. Then watch for signs directing you to the village.

Both Greenfield Village, with its outdoor attractions, and the Henry Ford Museum next door, with its indoor treasures, are open every day of the year except Jan. 1, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Hours in summer and on holidays are 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.

Separate admission is charged to the museum and village. Adults are \$3.50, children six through 12 are \$1.50, with children under six admitted free. Group rates are available.

Among the special events scheduled for summer or fall are the National Antique Fire Apparatus Muster July 22 and 23 and the meet of the Antique Auto Club of America, central division, Aug. 24. More than 250 antique cars are expected to participate in the Old Car Festival Sept. 9 and 10.

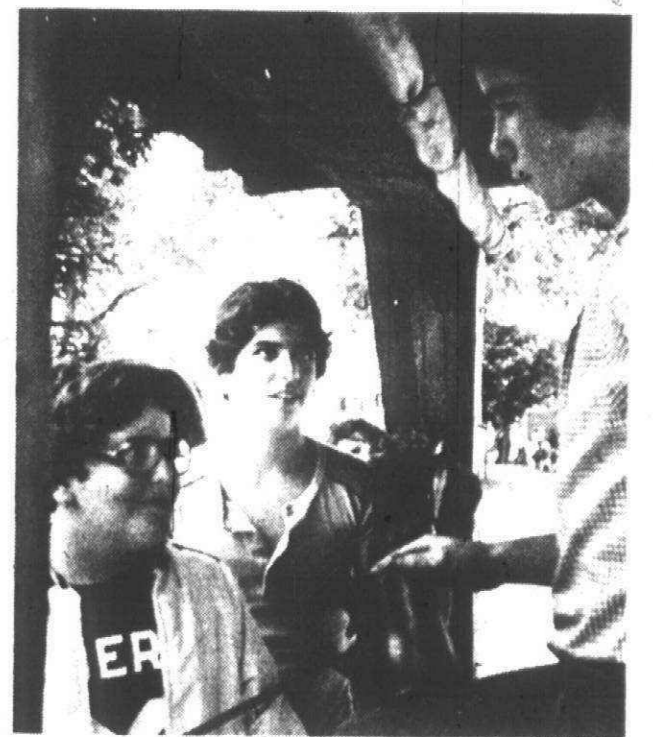
