## Downtown Canton?

### Planners contemplate land use idea

Years ago, communities developed around a central hub.

Businesses located there along with the town doctor and attorney. Government buildings and, perhaps, a park became focal points for the area.

Looking toward older communities like Plymouth and Ann Arbor, Canton planners now are contemplating a step backward in time.

You could call their idea a downtown area, a business nucleus or simply a focal point for the community.

"The problem with Canton is that everything's oriented toward the motor vehicle," said Trustee Carol Bodenmiller, who also sits on the planning commission.

"Most of the shopping is jump into

your car, run into the store and jump back into your car. There's nothing to make pedestrians want to stroll around in a nice pleasant area.

"The idea is to make people say, 'I want to go to Canton to shop.'"

ASSISTANT PLANNER Dave Nicholson said planning commissioners first brought up the downtown idea five or six months ago. Now that the zoning ordinance and revised master plan has been approved, the commission has more time to study those types of projects.

At this point, no firm proposals have been made.

Nicholson said the township needs an undeveloped area or a commercial section with only some stores to implement the idea.

High on the list of potential areas are Canton Center between Ford and Warren, the southwest corner of Ford and Sheldon and the span of Ford Road between Lilley and Haggerty.

Nicholson said planners could approach the idea in a variety of ways.

They could waive zoning stipulations which require a parking area for every store and establish a large parking lot for the "downtown" vicinity. Walkways and service drives could connect commercial areas. A small park could be planned for the vicinity along with such government buildings as a post office or library.

"If you look at cities with downtown areas, you'll find that there are little or no sideyards and walls are often contiguous," said Nicholson.

"I'm not saying we'd want to do those things. But we could use some

ideas and throw other ones out."

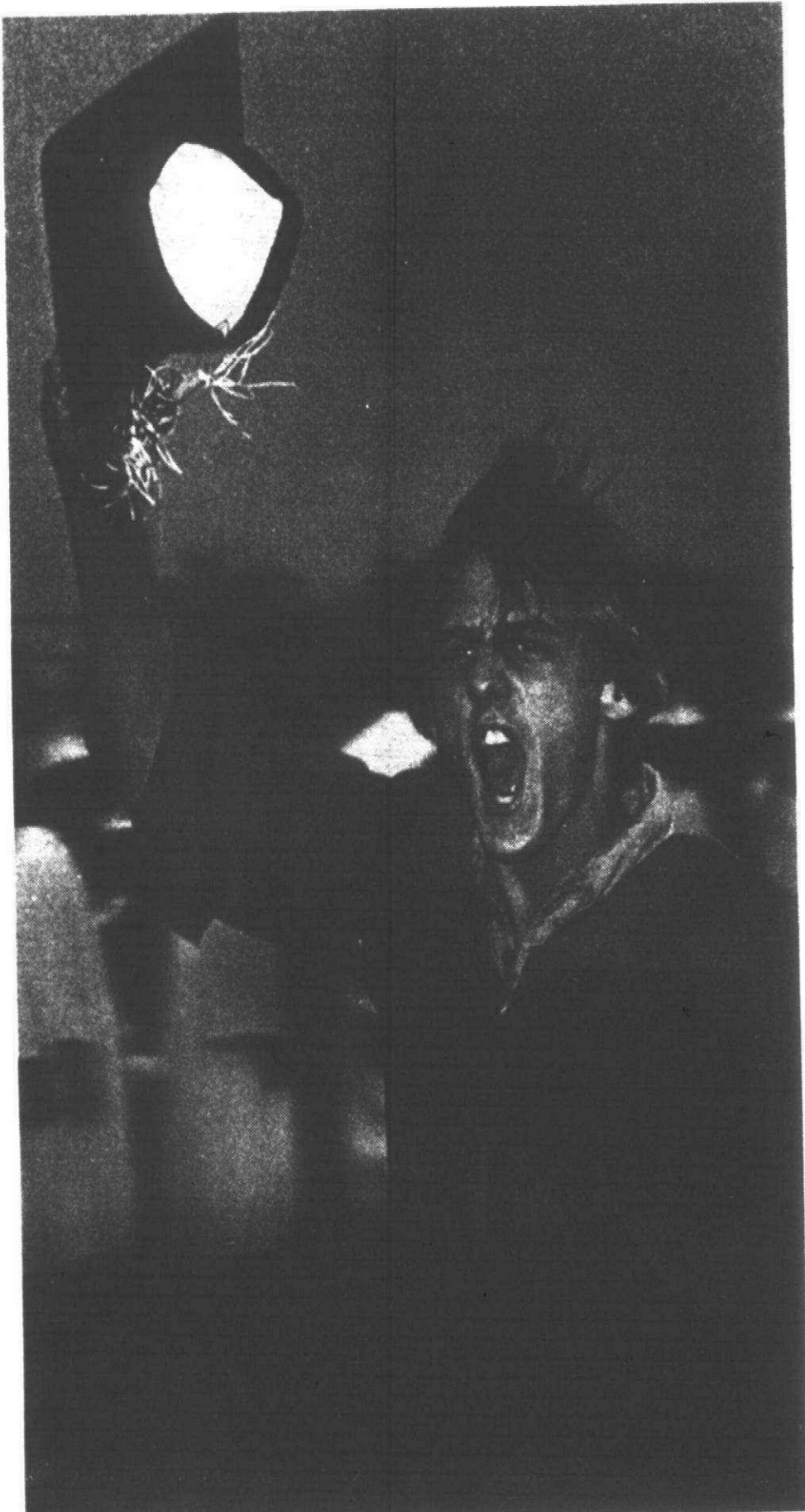
THE PROPOSAL is simply an idea — but one which warrants studying in Supervisor Noel Culbert's estimation.

He says that Canton could establish a Downtown Development Authority to spur growth in the central district. Specific methods for developing the district have not been discussed.

"This idea has been in the back of our minds for awhile," said Culbert.

"Like many ideas, you may not pursue it in the end. But at least you can see we're looking at it and not sitting on our duffs."

Nicholson said a downtown area would "complement" Canton's master land use plan. If the idea is implemented, planners would formulate a supplement to the plan.

## Merit seat opens as committee draws flak

Supervisor Noel Culbert is seeking applicants for a vacant seat on Canton's three-person merit commission, while some board members push for abolition of the group.

The commission oversees the hiring, firing and discipline of township employees.

Culbert hopes citizens with a back-

ground in personnel matters apply for the vacant post. They are urged to contact the supervisor's office at 397-1000.

Culbert recently opposed the efforts of some board members to place a merit commission proposal on an upcoming ballot.

The board members favor abolishing the merit commission and giving the group's responsibilities to personnel director Dan Durack. They maintain that the commission injects too much red tape into personnel matters.

Durack has been directed to study the idea.

The commission is comprised of a township board appointee, an employees' appointee and a third person appointed by merit board members themselves.

Up for grabs is the seat formerly held by Larry Bowerman. He recently resigned to seek a township trustee position.

## Get ready for falling marshmallows

The sky won't fall next Saturday.

But marshmallows — 3,000 of them, to be exact — will pour from the heavens to kick off Canton Township's first Youth Day.

Other events, including a Frisbee-throwing contests and dog show, will follow.

The festivities will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday in Griffin Park. The facility is north of Cherry Hill between Canton Center and Sheldon.

Gene Smith, supervisor of the town-

ship's organized playground program, said the event is slated for kids of all ages — from preschoolers through teens. Even Mom and Pop are invited to attend.

Participants must register at Griffin Park's Sheldon Road entrance. Recreation department employees will start taking registrations at 9 a.m.

At 10 a.m., a helicopter will fly over the park grounds and dump its cargo of 3,000 marshmallows.

Finders will be eaters, of course. But

Smith advises participants to hold on to the goodies until they're counted and divided into piles of various colors.

Those with the most marshmallows and certain colored goodies will receive a prize for their efforts. Kids 4-18 will be divided into age groups for purposes of the event.

Hula-hoop and Frisbee-throwing contests are next on the schedule. Prizes will go to contestants with the most points for Hula-hoop tricks and Frisbee tosses.

Even the family dog will get into the act.

The pooch which catches a Frisbee the best will advance to a July 26 district competition in Detroit's Rouge Park.

An amateur show will feature certificates and ribbons for the biggest dog, the smallest, the one with the most spots and the pooch with other winning characteristics.

Smith said the event will probably end about noon.

## Trustee hopefuls square off

### Loren Bennett

Loren Bennett has lived in Canton Township his entire life. He can see his boyhood home from the front window of his current address on Denton Road.

Now, at 29, Bennett has jumped into the race for one of four available trustee positions as a Republican. He will compete with 14 other candidates for the job.

"Being a lifetime resident, I've seen a tremendous amount of change in Canton," said Bennett. "Some has been for the better. Some has been for the worse."

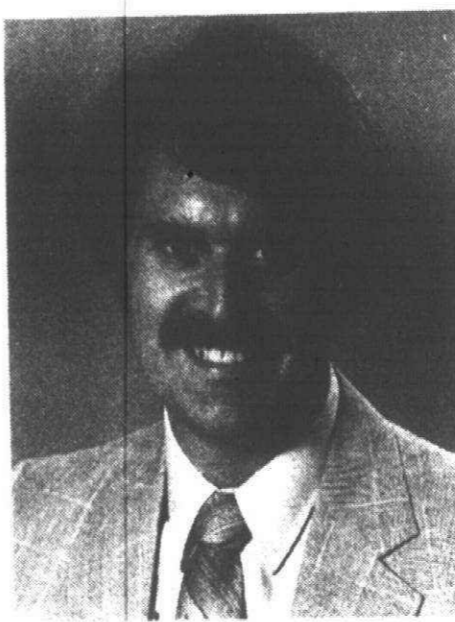
"I just got to feel that my expertise is needed up there."

BENNETT, a frequent audience member at Township Board meetings during the last six months, voices concern on a number of issues, including farmland preservation, an excessive amount of government regulations and the need for an open government.

As a part-time farmer of 10 acres, Bennett said he knows of farming needs.

He adamantly supports the township's efforts to save agricultural land and serves as chairman of the farmland preservation committee.

"I'm not pretending to be appointed by the farming community to represent them," Bennett said. "I just want to make sure that the laws implemented are something farmers can live with."

"A great deal of the people who are really farming are less concerned about development rights than having their taxes rolled back," he said.

Bennett maintains that farmers should be exempted from some requirements and restrictions in order to better pursue agricultural activities. He cited a tree-cutting permit requirement as an example.

"I believe that in all aspects of life,

### Carol Bodenmiller

Carol Bodenmiller considers her present trustee position a full-time job.

She decided to seek re-election as a Democrat to continue work on projects which were started during her two-year term.

"I do not have another full-time job," says Mrs. Bodenmiller as a possible plus for her campaign. She is competing with 14 other candidates for four trustee positions.

"To be as involved as I have been, you have to be available from 9 to 5. I've always tried to be a liaison between residents and the township board."

Mrs. Bodenmiller serves as the board's representative on the planning commission, Canton's delegate to the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) and a member of the farmland preservation committee.

She also serves on the builders' task force, the mobile home task force, a computer study committee and a farmers' market committee.

"I'M INVOLVED in so many programs, I want to see them continued," she said.

Farmland preservation is among the programs which Mrs. Bodenmiller views as most important.

As a planning commissioner and township trustee, Mrs. Bodenmiller participated in a decision last winter which zoned thousands of acres west of

Canton Center for agricultural use.

But Mrs. Bodenmiller says the township should take additional steps to help the farmer "withstand the pressures associated with the encroachment of city upon the farmland."

She sits on a farmland preservation committee, which is ironing out details of a proposal for a weekly farmers' market. She says the township should help farmers drain their lands and sell

After the reception is held, the school board will hold its regularly scheduled meeting, starting at 7:30 p.m.

Persons to be honored include: Marguerite "Peggy" Anderson, Ellen Gross, Robert Hewer, Nora Horn, Juanita Kahrl, Phyllis McKenzie, Marjorie

Monteith, Russell Pritchard, Jennie Siebert, Les Tinson and Virginia Tinson.

MS. ANDERSON has totalled 23 years of teaching in Plymouth since arriving in the district in September of 1957.

She taught second grade for the first two years and then taught third grade for the next 21 years. All of the 23 years were spent at Starkweather Elementary School.

Before coming to Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, she taught for nine years in Massachusetts.

Ms. Gross has taught in Plymouth-Canton for 14 years, all of them as a kindergarten teacher at Farrand Elementary. Before coming here she taught 2½ years in South Redford and Detroit Public Schools.

Hewer, a plant engineer at Starkweather, has been with the district for 11½ years. During that time he has worked at Isbister Elementary for about two years, at Allen Elementary for six years and at Starkweather for about four years.

Mrs. Horn, who has been a secretary with the district for 23 years, started in 1957 as a secretary at Allen. She served

for many years as secretary at Fiegel and spent two years in the same position at Eriksson. Her last two years were spent as a secretary for the employee relations department in central administration.

Mrs. Horn has helped open three new elementary schools — Allen, Fiegel and Eriksson — during her career.

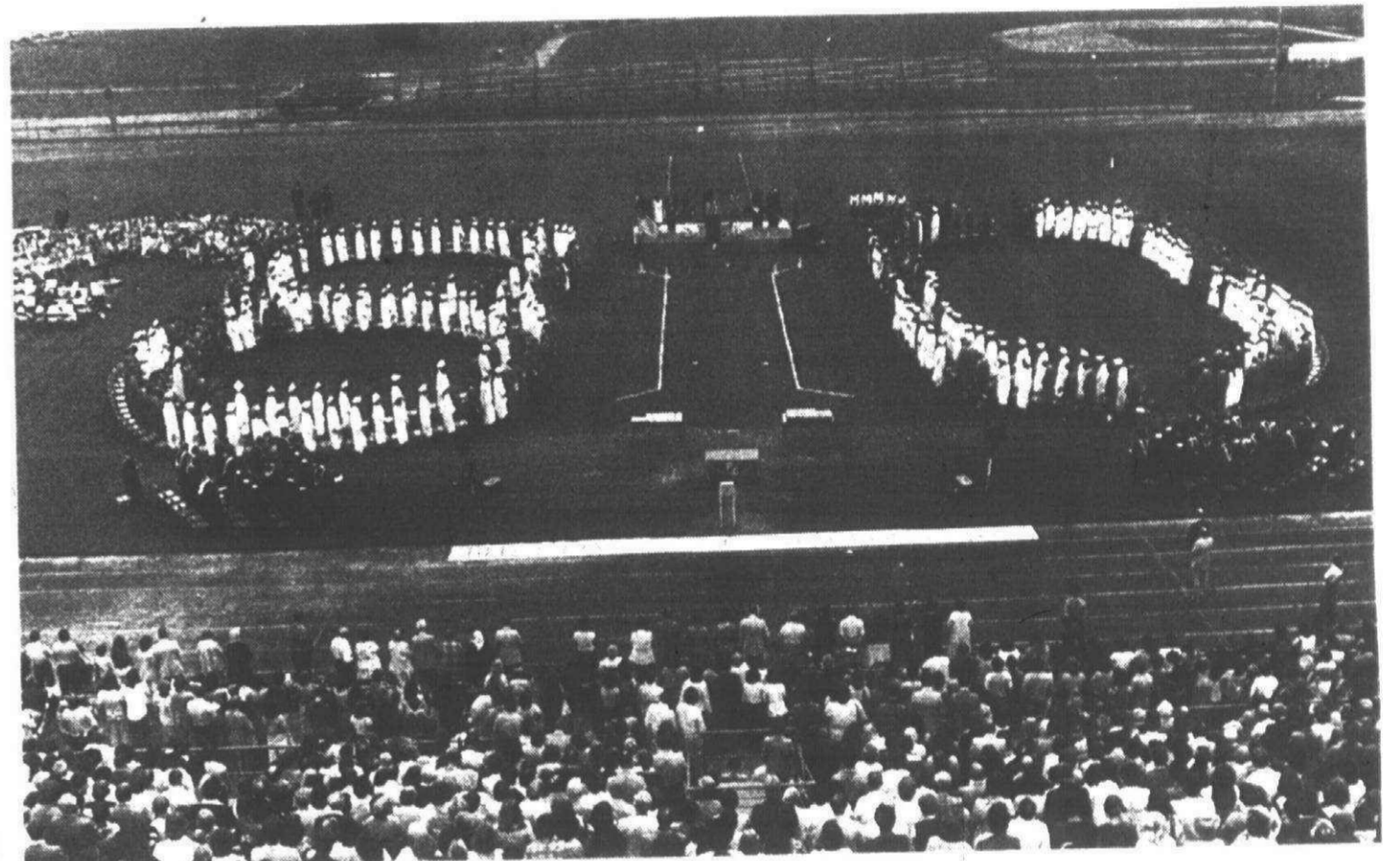

Mary Beth Szilagyi, Salem senior class president, gives her remarks to the Class of '80 while the wind

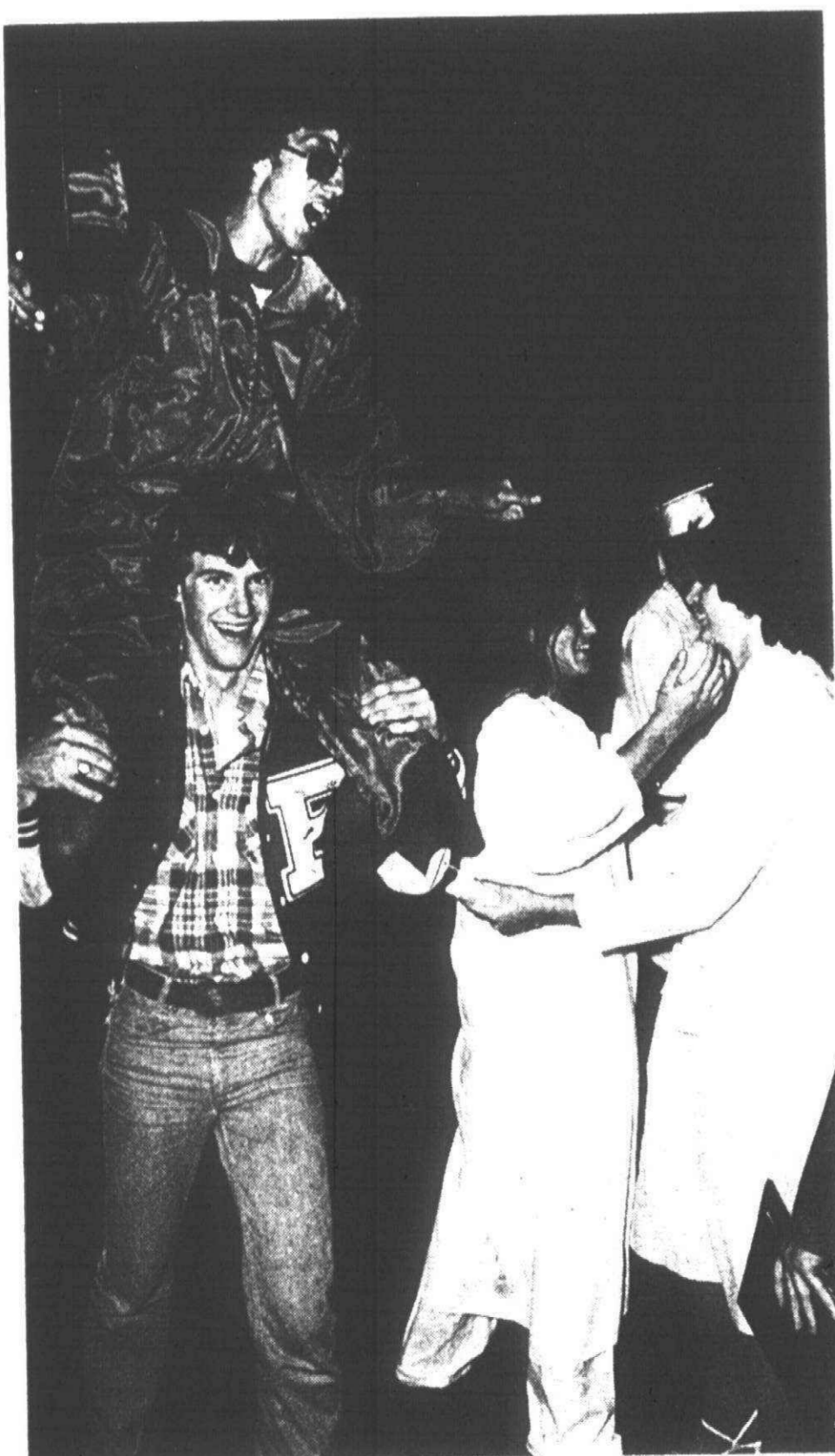

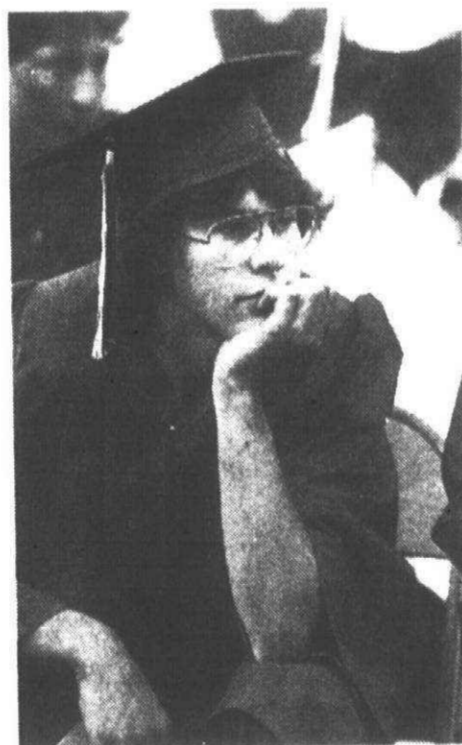

# Bodenmiller labels trustee post 'full-time' job

Mrs. Bodenmiller sees no immediate need for funding of a development rights program, however. Because of

the absence of water and sewer facilities, the land cannot be developed in the near future anyway, she says.

Mrs. Bodenmiller said the committee is researching other ways to compensate farmers, such as reimbursement

for high taxes paid in the past.

She says Canton should be proud of its farmland preservation program.

She recently attended a farmland preservation seminar in Lansing with other township officials.

"One of the things that impressed me the most was that several times Canton was referred to as the leader. People were saying, 'We need Canton's help.' Although we don't have the amount of farmland that some of these counties

do, we're so far ahead of them."

MRS. BODENMILLER sees a pressing need to stimulate industrial development during the next four years. She says the time for paying lip service to the need for an industrial tax base is past.

"Novi is developing now. We're going to lose out if we don't get going in the next six months," she said.

The township's industrial and commercial committee needs funding for the development of pamphlets and other materials, she said.

"We should be wining and dining industry to come in."

Mrs. Bodenmiller has been actively involved in solving a string of complaints from Canton's mobile home residents. She says the township should be-

come more involved in the establishment of safe federal standards for the construction of mobile homes and other related matters.

She favors the purchase of a proposed computer system for township hall, which would cut down on employee overtime costs and increase efficiency. The cost of the system has not been determined.

Mrs. Bodenmiller, 41, has lived in Canton's Stonegate subdivision since 1975. Prior to her election as a trustee in 1978, Mrs. Bodenmiller served as vice president of the Stonegate Civic Association and a board member of the Stonegate Homeowners' Association.

She is an active member of the Canton Goodfellows.

A former teacher, Mrs. Bodenmiller holds a bachelor's degree from Hiram College in Ohio.

# Bennett supports less government

the less government, the better. I believed that before it was vogue," he said.

Bennett believes that a negative business atmosphere has been created by the Township Board. He says com-

mercial and industrial development is needed in order to fatten Canton's tax base.

But Bennett maintains that the attitude of some current and past officials has discouraged that kind of development. He says officials have failed to treat many developers with "respect and dignity."

"At times sitting in the audience, I've been embarrassed. If I were a developer, I would have walked out and gone to another community."

HE FAVORS investigating the idea of a township manager form of government. Under that system, an administrator appointed by the township board would oversee the day-to-day operations of the township.

The new system has been suggested by a citizen's group.

"I think it would provide continuity and remove day-to-day politics from government."

As for spending priorities, Bennett places recreational needs fourth—behind, police, fire and the DPW.

He "wholeheartedly encourages" citizens to call him and discuss their concerns.

"You've got to get out and be open and accessible to the whole community," he maintains. "If you don't, you don't deserve to be (on the Township Board.) I will be held to that."

Bennett promises to make the trustee position a 40-hour-a-week job. As a realtor and owner of a delivery service, Bennett said his work schedule is flexible.

Besides sitting on the farmland preservation committee, Bennett served as Canton's citizen representative to the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG). He is vice president of the Canton Jaycees.

"If I'm not elected, I'll remain as active as I can and as the Township Board allows me to be," Bennett said. "I'll be willing to serve on committees."

'Mad as hell'

# Atheists take unholy stand toward session

The last time we saw a collective group of atheists, they were stacking up Gideon's Bibles in the Sheraton Southfield hotel lobby at their annual convention.

This, you may remember, is the same convention where atheists fought with members of the restaurant union because they allegedly wouldn't serve roast beef while a speaker was roasting the Catholic church.

The convention aftermath is the cover story in the May edition of the "American Atheist." The magazine offers an interesting look at the way the organization views its own activities.

When you talk to an ex-alcoholic you're probably going hear about the demon drink. When you talk to an organized atheist, you're going to hear about God, but He's spoken of in lower-case type.

On page 3 of the May edition of the atheist house organ, you'll see a letter from a loyal reader, Dan Bloom, who asks the atheist editors to go one step further.

"Let's begin to stop using the words Jesus Christ in print or in speech. Let's stop recognizing (linguistically) an empty claim.

"Instead, let's speak of the jesuchrist (one word, meaning, in our terms: 'the false prophet' or 'the alleged and supposed Christian messiah.') If this term were used consistently in 'American Atheist' magazine every time mention was made of the jesuchrist, then eventually a new word would be coined which would better suit the purposes of Atheist approach."

Mr. Bloom must have an exaggerated idea of the magazine's ability to persuade public opinion. It doesn't even convince a committed pagan like myself.

But then I'm the kind of guy who isn't sure if there's a God but believes that Mary was his mother.

THE LETTER was in what I called the May edition of the "American Atheist" because that's the month the magazine came out. But things are not so simple. These Atheists don't like to call months by their Christian name, I soon found out.

Dr. Madalyn O'Hair, atheist figurehead and most famous spokesman, explains in the issue that:

"From henceforth the god appellations of the months will be abandoned and American Atheists will adopt the names used by the French Revolution . . . American Atheists will decide later on what year to utilize. We have had enough of B.C. and A.D. We will no longer date anything which begins with the alleged birth of Jesus Christ. This mythological god means nothing to us."

Dig the "henceforth." They're mixing King James Bible syntax with their bile. The message from Madalyn is that May is now "Floreal" and the year is 188, because it's been that many years since the French Revolution. Toot sweet.

These are the kind of people who try to ban Easter egg hunts and get gravely offended if their sneeze is answered by an innocuous "Geshundheit."

On to the cover story about the American Atheists 10th Annual National Convention. The "news" story is preceded by a statement that "We editorialize our news" and that "unlike any other magazine or newspaper in the United States, we admit it." Fair enough.

READING the 10-page article on the convention, one is informed that Bob Brooks of Madison Heights had the atheists rolling in the aisles Good Friday night with a string of anti-religious jokes.

"But as he punned away," the magazine article states, "the guests waited to be served and waited and waited. No salads appeared. No coffee was poured and a rigid little group of wait-persons (waiters and waitresses) went in and out of the service entrance, or stood at the kitchen entrance, tight-lipped."

The story tells how the staff allegedly refused to serve food while Brooks was speaking, which hotel management says is normal policy and the atheists contend is bunk.

Just as the last joke was being told, the salad was served, the article states.

"I don't know about any of you," the magazine quotes Mrs. O'Hair as saying, "but I am choking on this food. There is no reason that any atheists should be hungry enough to eat their pride. As far as I am concerned, the Roman Catholics in the kitchen can take their food and shove it up their collective -----."

Tensions between the conventioners and restaurant workers probably were not eased by that statement.

Mrs. Murray says she has filed a formal complaint with the Michigan Department of Civil Rights over discrimination on the basis of their lack of religion. Bill Holmes, assistant director of enforcement in the Detroit civil rights office says there has been correspondence with the atheists but no formal complaint.

Ruth Rasmussen, director of the Michigan Department

of Civil Rights, said she's sure a complaint will be filed and investigated.

"IT'LL be a public accomodation complaint," Ms. Rasmussen said, "on the hotel staff's refusal to serve on the basis of the group's lack of religion."

The atheists received an unprecedented amount of publicity during the convention about the alleged banquet boycott. They're getting ink here over their civil rights complaint. The group is also contemplating filing a civil suit asking \$350,000 in damages.

We asked Mrs. O'Hair if the whole hubbub isn't a publicity stunt promoted by the American Atheists.

"We're tired of the insults," she said. "If that had been a (Catholic) cardinal speaking and the food was held up for five minutes by atheist waiters, can you tell me what the hotel management would have done? All that (talk of a publicity stunt) is pure, unadulterated horse -----"

"They tried to deliver an insult to us. And because we wouldn't take it sitting down, and the staff refused to apologize, we're supposed to slink away and lick our wounds."

Other oppressed minorities engage in violent behavior to prove a point, she said.

"We are civilized enough that we go to the courts."

If the atheists go to court, I'll bet Mrs. O'Hair doesn't swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, so help her lower-case god.

I had planned to sleep-in every morning this summer. It was to be my last lazy summer, since my eldest starts first grade in the fall. School all day means Mommy gets up early.

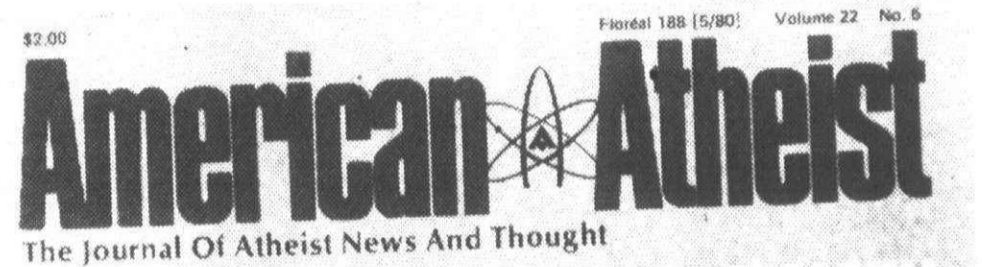

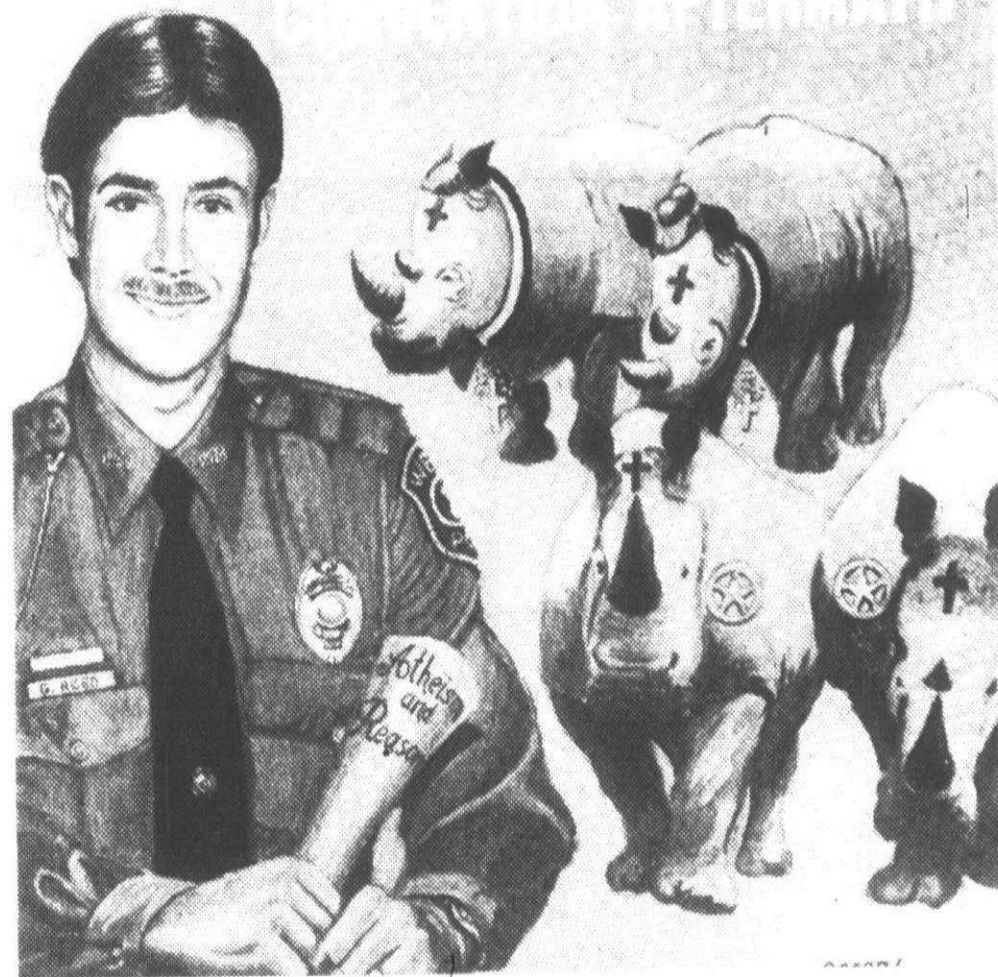
Either we're doing something wrong, or this dog is just dumb. I opt for the second.

## June's a rarity

James Russell Lowell's "The Vision of Sir Launfal" is a very long poem remembered only for the brief line:

"And what is so rare as a day in June. . . ."

Once I could recite several stanzas of Lowell's work and I can still blunder through a few lines of it, but I'm sure most people aren't even aware of author or poem, only that memorable line.

Human nature seems to command that we practice a kind of selective remembering and forgetting about dates and other matters.

As far as rare days in June, for me the rarest came on the ninth of the month three years ago.

In the midst of the happy celebration of my parent's 48th wedding anniversary, the telephone rang at my brother's home where we were toasting the happy pair.

Weeks before we expected the word, Jack and I were told we had a grandson. With one ring of the telephone we were grandparents of little boy, Arik, and my parents were great grandparents.

BEFORE that day, June was momentous for Mom and Dad's anniversary and the fact that daughter Elaine had a June 1 birthday. But it will be difficult ever to top June 9, 1977.

Another memorable June day was the 17th of the month in the year 1972. But we didn't know that when it happened.

If that doesn't ring a bell for you, it's the anniversary of the day that the Democratic National Party headquarters at the Watergate Complex in Washington was burglarized.

The date meant nothing at first, just a crazy, bungled burglary by a group of Cubans and strange ex-intelligence types.

In the months that followed, Watergate became the media story of the decade surpassing even the Vietnam War.

A president resigned from office for the first time in the nation's history and many of his cohorts wound up in the slammer.

It's debatable whether Watergate is an event we want to remember. Perhaps it's better erased from mind like

those controversial 18 minutes on one White House tape.

FOR MY PART, I prefer to remember it as a somber lesson of history and as a hiatus for journalism.

Newspapers took no back seat to the electronic media on Watergate. It was print reporters that broke the story and doggedly pieced it together to its nebulous end.

Once broken, Watergate was everyman's story and CBS broke all precedent before Nixon's second election by airing a 14-minute segment and then a second, long feature on the case.

Just like Watergate, there must be dozens of significant dates in history that came in June and that we annually ignore.

Like the June day in 1812 when the United States of America declared war for the second time on mighty Great Britain. Our young nation, with Andrew Jackson at the helm, finally beat old England, but not before a rough go of it and the burning of the White House.

Just and Old Hickory would never forget that battle date, Napoleon Bonaparte could hardly forget June 18, the day the little Corsican met his Waterloo in 1815.

Closer to our times, a date only veterans tend to remember is June 6, D-Day, when allied forces landed on the Normandy beaches in France and began the long, hard march to retake Europe from the Nazis and end World War II.

Like I said, there are dozens of them. So many rare days in June forgotten just like the ones in July, August and so on and so on.

## Celebrate Dairy Days

Warm breezes and sunshine call for outdoor meals. Barbecue grills from the simplest to the most elaborate are kept busy because meals in the open have become the summer lifestyle for many Americans.

All of the food is not grilled, of course, but when part of the food can be cooked out-of-doors, it eliminates kitchen chores. In the menu given here, prepare the barbecue sauce in the kitchen, then lather it on the split chickens cooking on the grill. Broiler-fryer chickens are young and lean so they need butter in the sauce to brown attractively and to bring out the taste. Tomatoes, puree and other seasonings with just a bit of brown sugar add a saucy note to this economical, popular entrée.

Potatoes may be baked on the grill as the chicken cooks or both may be done in the oven. Cheddar cheese topping with bits of appetizing bacon and green onions will taste best if it melts easily on the potato.

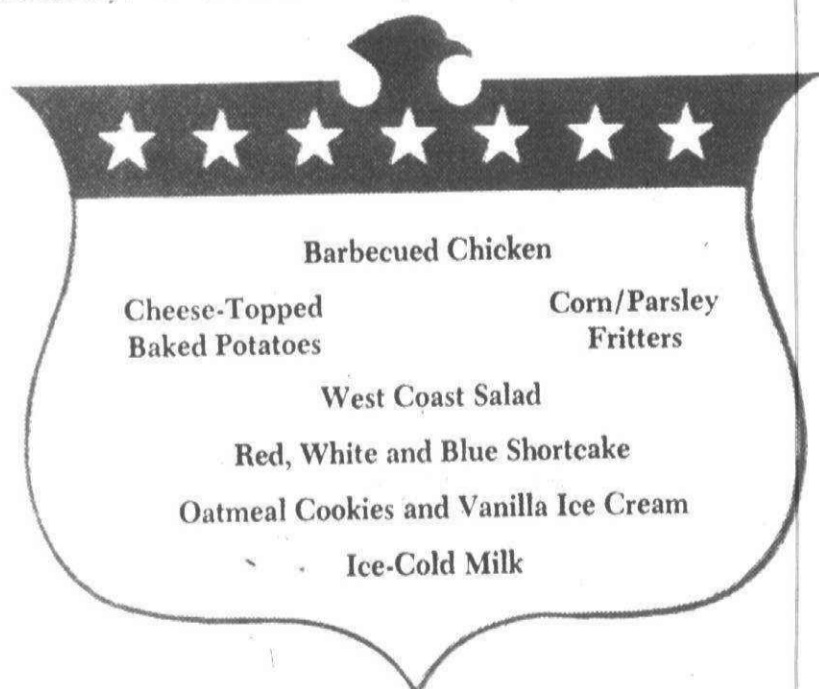
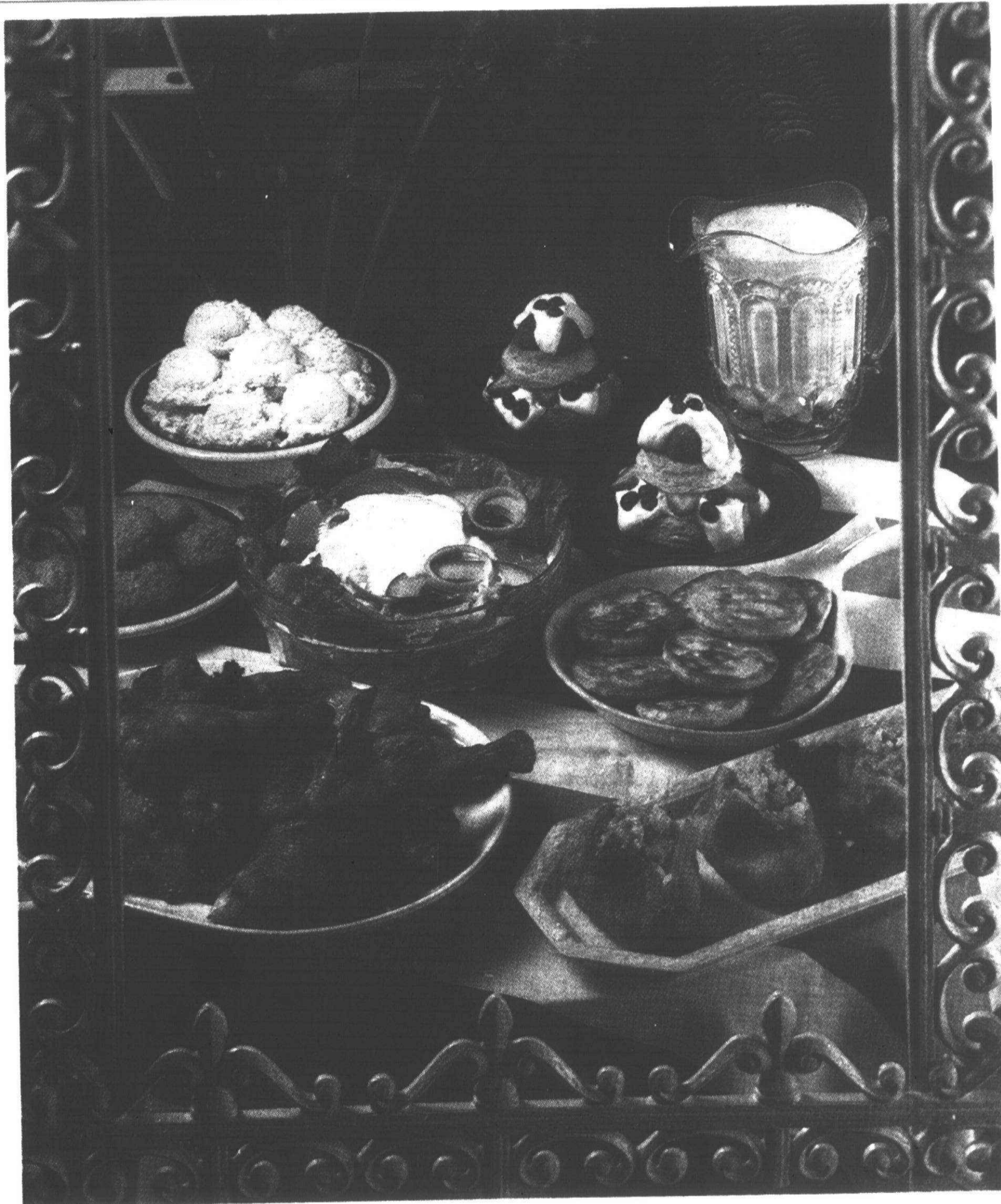
Add a bit of Americana to the menu with typical Corn and Parsley Fritters. Fresh corn, cut from the cob, is delectable in the batter, which is fried by spoonfuls in shallow butter and fat.

Salad inspiration comes from many lands but the size and variety of American salads have made them an institution! In this one, there's an abundance of greens planned, with one cup per person. They're accented with sliced orange, sweet red onion and avocado. Everything is chilled to sparkling crispness.

Cottage cheese and dairy sour cream form the base for the dressing, which is thick and fluffy. Two ounces of Blue cheese in this base seem like more, appealing to one's sense of economy. Horseradish and hot sauce furnish piquancy.

You can go all-American with a Red, White and Blue Shortcake, using strawberries, blueberries and whipped cream! These are layered on individual biscuit-type shortcakes, made in two sizes so they're high and handsome.

Are old-fashioned Oatmeal Cookies and ice cream necessary? Yes, children may want a light dessert.



### BARBECUED CHICKEN

6 to 8 servings

- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter
- 1 1/2 cups chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1 can (16 oz.) tomatoes, finely chopped with liquid
- 1 cup canned tomato puree
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tablespoon dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 broiler-fryer chickens (2 1/2 to 3 pounds each), cut up

Melt butter in a heavy 3-quart saucepan; sauté onion and garlic until tender, about 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, puree, brown sugar, vinegar, Worcestershire, mustard and salt. Simmer, uncovered, until thick, about 15 minutes. Cook chicken over hot charcoal 45 to 60 minutes, or until chicken can be pierced easily with a fork. Turn chicken every 10 minutes; baste generously with sauce during last half of cooking time. (Chicken may be baked in a preheated 350°F. oven for 50 to 60 minutes, turning and basting every 15 minutes.)  
NOTE: Remaining sauce will keep well, covered, in refrigerator up to two weeks.

### CHEESE-TOPPED BAKED POTATOES

Yield: approx. 1 1/4 cups of topping

- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter
- 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese
- 4 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 2 tablespoons sliced green onion
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 6 medium-sized Idaho potatoes, baked

Combine butter, cheese, bacon, onion and Worcestershire. Beat until fluffy. Split top of each potato and squeeze to open. Top generously with cheese-butter spread.

NOTE: Remaining spread will keep well, covered, in refrigerator up to two weeks.

### CORN/PARSLEY FRITTERS

Yield: 15 to 16

- 1 1/3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper
- 2/3 cup milk
- 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1 tablespoon butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 cups fresh corn
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 2 teaspoons grated onion
- 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 3 tablespoons oil

Combine flour, baking powder, salt and pepper in a large mixing bowl; set aside. Combine milk, egg yolks, 1 tablespoon butter and Worcestershire. Add liquid ingredients to dry ingredients; mix just until smooth. Stir in corn, parsley and onion. Gently fold in egg whites. Heat a small amount of equal proportions of butter and oil in a large heavy skillet over medium to high heat. Drop batter by tablespoonfuls into hot mixture. Sauté 2 to 3 minutes per side or until golden. Serve warm with butter.

### WEST COAST SALAD

- Blue Cheese Dressing:**  
(Yield: approx. 2 1/2 cups)
- 1 cup cottage cheese
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 ounces Blue cheese, crumbled
- 1 to 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon seasoned salt
- Few drops hot pepper sauce
- Freshly grated pepper

For dressing, beat cottage cheese on high speed of mixer until almost smooth, about 5 minutes. Stir in remaining ingredients until well combined. Refrigerate, covered, 1 to 2 hours to allow flavors to blend. Meanwhile, for salad combine all ingredients. Sprinkle with salt to taste. To serve, spoon salad into individual bowls; pass dressing.

NOTE: Remaining dressing will keep well, covered, in refrigerator up to two weeks.

### RED, WHITE AND BLUE SHORTCAKE

Preheat oven to 450 F. Combine flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk; mix until a soft dough is formed. Turn out on lightly floured surface and knead gently several times. Roll to 1-inch thickness. Cut out six 3-inch circles and six 2 1/2-inch circles with a floured cutter. (If necessary, reroll dough to make specified number of circles.) Arrange large circles on buttered cookie sheet. Brush with a small amount of melted butter. Top each with a smaller circle; press gently. Bake until golden and firm to the touch, 15 to 18 minutes. Cool on wire rack. Meanwhile, reserve 18 perfect strawberries; slice remaining berries and sprinkle with 2 teaspoons sugar. Wash and drain blueberries. Combine whipping cream and confectioners' sugar. Whip until soft peaks form. To serve, separate shortcakes. Spread a small amount of whipped cream on bottom circle; spread some of sliced berries on each; sprinkle with blueberries. Place smaller circle on top. Spread with whipped cream. Arrange 3 whole strawberries on each; sprinkle with blueberries. Serve immediately.

### OATMEAL COOKIES

Yield: approx. 6 dozen

- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter
- 1 1/2 cups firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 1/2 cups uncooked oats

Preheat oven to 350°F. Cream butter; add sugars and beat until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, milk and vanilla. Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Stir into creamed mixture. Stir in oats. Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls onto buttered cookie sheets. Bake 12 to 15 minutes or until golden. Cool slightly; remove to wire racks and cool completely. Store in tightly covered containers.

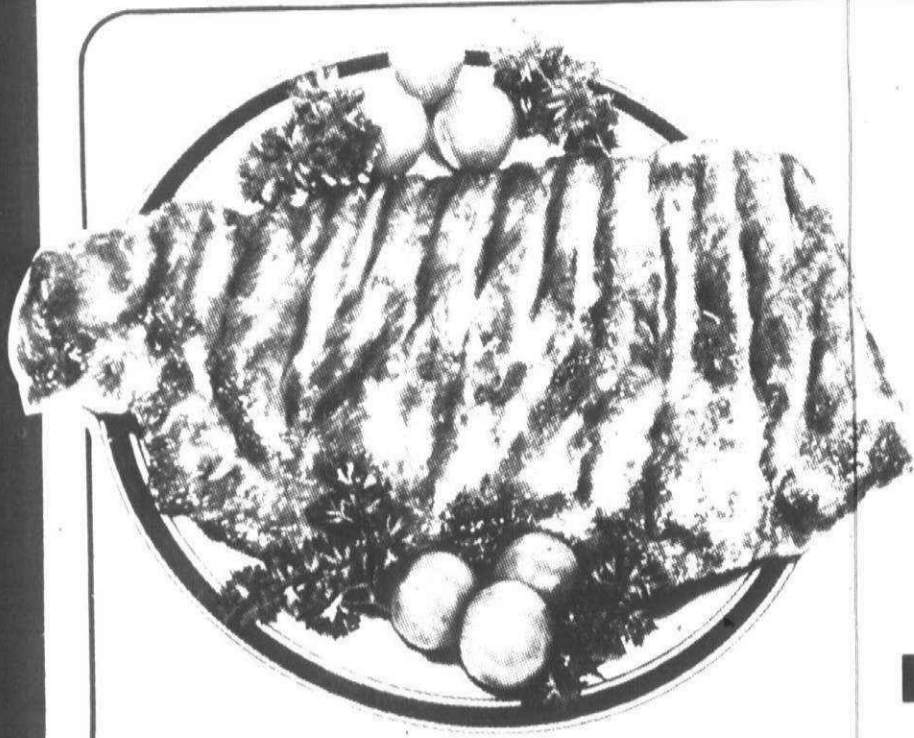

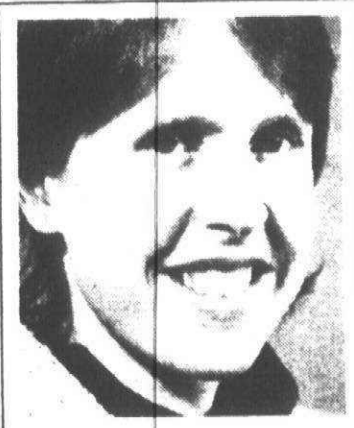

## A Question of Taste

# Juicy mangoes are a challenge to decorous diners

In a characteristically practical moment, James Beard suggested that mangoes be eaten in the bathtub or at least in private. Mangoes, when eaten out of hand, present a challenge to the decorous eater.

A relative of poison ivy, this fruit has oils in its peel which may cause a rash when it comes in contact with the skin of sensitive individuals. Consequently, the mango should be peeled before being eaten, a procedure which leaves one holding a soft fruit dripping juice which will stain clothing — hence the bathtub solution.

Actually, a compromise solution might be to cube the fruit and eat it with a spoon, either alone or in combination with other fruits.

In any case, it is well worth the trouble involved to enjoy this sweet, mellow fruit. It is in peak supply during the months of June and July, so there is little time left to enjoy this year's harvest.

**THE DELICIOUS** taste of the mango has been described as a cross between that of a peach and a pineapple. The texture of the ripe fruit (it should yield lightly to gentle pressure) is like that of a juicy peach and the color of the flesh is bright yellow.

If you opt for a bowl rather than the bathtub approach, you might wish to

combine the mango with other compatible summer fruits and use this as the occasion of a lovely summer brunch.

The delicate, sweet tastes of the summer fruits would be a perfect foil for a spicy egg dish. An omelet topped with a Mexican hot sauce would make the refreshing effect of these fruits doubly welcome.

You will probably want to make the hot sauce a day ahead to allow it several hours to simmer, intensifying the spices and to free yourself for the last-minute work involved in dicing fruits and cooking omelets.

Allow two to three eggs per omelet, cooking one omelet at a time rather than attempting a five- or six-egg omelet.

Cook the omelet in a heavy-bottomed pan, about eight inches across, with gently sloping sides. Preheat the pan over medium heat. When hot, melt about a tablespoon full of butter, tilting the pan to coat the bottom and sides. Beat the eggs briskly and pour into the prepared pan.

For the first few seconds, stir the mixture quickly with a fork, scraping the bottom of the pan. Continue cooking without stirring but occasionally lift the edge of the omelet with a spatula and allow the uncooked egg to slide under the cooked portion. Cook until the underside is slightly golden and the

top still moist. Slide onto a warm plate.

**IF YOU ARE** making omelets for more than two persons at a time, it would be ideal if a friend could bring a suitable pan and be cooking omelets along with you, unless you plan to eat in shifts.

Omelets don't hold well. If either of you is less than adept at omelet making, simply change the menu to read "scrambled eggs with Mexican hot sauce" and no harm will be done.

If, in fact, you have a particularly congenial group, this could be a real participatory meal. Another guest could be asked to assemble the fruit salad. Just be sure to supply a substantial, no-nonsense apron. Another guest could put the finishing touches on the omelets as they slide out of their pans. Someone else could pour hot coffee and make boiling hot pots of fresh tea.

**IDEALLY**, all of this should flow like a beautifully choreographed Agnes de Mille ballet. In practice, it will more closely resemble a scene from a Woody Allen movie.

Even this chaos, however, is more convivial and practical than a harried host or hostess attempting to perform all of these last-minute functions single-handedly.

Since so much associated with a

brunch is, of necessity, last minute, as much advance preparation as possible should be made.

With this in mind, the rolls I am recommending to accompany this meal can be mixed and shaped the evening before and allowed to rise overnight in the refrigerator. These cream rolls have an unusually light, velvety texture and would be delicious served with the eggs or later with sweet butter and homemade jams as guests lean back and savor cups of hot coffee and tea, resting from their labors.

### WESTERN OMELETS

6 two- or three-egg omelets  
3 tbsp. corn oil  
2 medium onions, sliced  
2 stalks celery, thinly sliced  
1 medium green pepper, diced  
6 large wheat tortillas  
Mexican Hot Sauce (recipe follows)

Heat the corn oil in a large skillet. Sauté the onions and celery about five minutes. Add the green pepper and continue cooking until crisp-tender. Divide the vegetables evenly among the six omelets. Fold the omelets closed over the vegetables. Lay a tortilla over each omelet, tucking the edges of each tortilla to enclose it loosely. Spoon the warm hot sauce over the tortillas. Top

each with two tablespoons yogurt or sour cream. Serve immediately. Makes six servings.

### MEXICAN HOT SAUCE

1 cup chopped onion  
2 crushed cloves garlic  
3 cups chopped tomatoes  
1 cup water  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. cumin  
¼ tsp. ground coriander  
2 tsp. dry red wine  
¼-½ tsp. cayenne  
¼ tsp. black pepper  
½ tsp. chili powder  
2 tsp. tomato paste  
2 tsp. olive oil

Sauté onions and garlic in olive oil with ½ tsp. salt until onion is clear. Add spices. Transfer to saucepan and add tomatoes, water, tomato paste and wine. Add remaining salt. Cover and simmer ½ hour, or longer. Several hours is best.

Hot spices tend to get hotter as they cook. It is recommended that you add the cayenne a little at a time, so the degree of hotness is to your tolerance.

This sauce can be left in chunky form or you can puree all or part of it.

### MANGO COMPOTE

2 large, chilled mangoes (supposedly,

unchilled mangoes have a taste akin to turpentine. Having read that, I was afraid to try them any way but chilled so I can't verify the accuracy of the allegation.)

4 oranges peeled and sliced crosswise  
1 pint fresh strawberries, sliced  
1 cup chilled orange juice

Peel and dice the mangoes. Stir together gently with the oranges and strawberries. Pour the orange juice over the fruit. Serve immediately. Makes six servings.

### CREAM ROLLS

¾ tsp. yeast  
3 tbsp. warm water  
½ tsp. salt  
1 large egg, slightly beaten  
1 cup heavy cream  
2 cups unbleached flour

Dissolve yeast in water, add salt. Stir together egg and cream; combine with yeast mixture. Add one cup flour. Beat 100 strokes. Add one more cup flour and mix.

On a board, knead lightly for 30 seconds. Add the minimum amount of flour to prevent sticking. Shape into balls 2 inches in diameter. Place in buttered, round cake pans. Let rise until doubled, 1½ to 2 hours. Brush with cream or milk. Bake 15 to 20 minutes in a preheated 400-degree oven.

# Tall, frosty fruit drinks take simmer out of summer

One of the best and all-time favorite thirst quenchers is fresh lemonade. Slightly tart and served in a frosty pitcher, lemonade is cooling, refreshing and light.

Part of growing up in the south was participating in that old tradition of summertime family reunions, of long outdoor tables groaning with goodies from all the best cooks in the family. And at the end of the table, a large wooden barrel of lemonade.

My father was the family lemonade maker. Reunions were always on Sundays, so around 4 p.m. the day before, my dad would scrub down the barrel, put a 20-pound block of ice in the bot-

tom and begin rolling and squeezing the lemons. He would add lemon juice, water, sugar and some lemon peel, then taste and add some more of one or the other, or all of the ingredients. He would taste again and continue adding ingredients until there was just the right amount of lemonade in the barrel and just the right flavor.

When he was satisfied, he would always say the same thing, "Okay, put the top on it. That will be just right by dinnertime tomorrow." Dinnertime meant the noon meal. The lemonade would sit overnight with a cloth cover, then the wooden top weighted down. He was always right, it would be perfect

the next day.

He never wrote down his recipe or counted lemons or pounds of sugar or gallons of water. He just added whatever it seemed to need until it "tasted right." The method worked for him.

However, for those of us who wish to be a little more precise, below is a recipe for lemonade, with a couple of variations.

### LEMONADE

For each serving:  
1 cup of water  
1½ tsp. lemon juice  
3 to 4 tbsp. sugar

It is not necessary to boil the sugar and water but the flavor of the lemonade is improved if you do. Boil the sugar and water for two minutes. Chill the syrup and add the lemon juice. Stir and serve over ice cubes.

### RASPBERRY COOLER

7 cups fresh lemonade, or  
2 6-oz. cans lemon concentrate plus  
6 cans water (6 ozs. each) 1 10-ounce  
package frozen raspberries, thawed

Combine and mix well in the blender. Pour over ice cubes in tall glasses.

### PINEAPPLE LEMONADE

2 cups sugar

2 cups water  
1½ cups lemon juice  
2 cups grated fresh pineapple  
3 cups water  
Ice cubes  
Fresh mint

Combine sugar and 2 cups water and boil 7 minutes. Cool. Mix with lemon juice and fresh pineapple and chill well. Add 3 cups water. Serve over ice cubes with mint garnish.

### PURPLE PEOPLE EATER

1 cup sugar  
2 cups water  
2 cups grape juice

2 cups orange juice  
½ cup lemon juice  
ice cubes

Cook sugar and water together 7 minutes. Cool. Combine with fruit juices. Chill well. Serve over ice cubes in tall glasses.

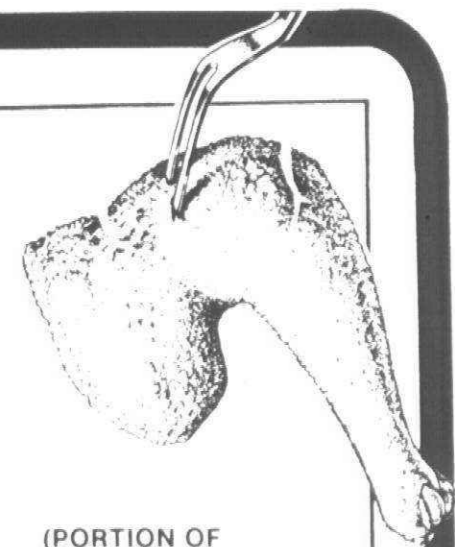

It was a big day in Carmel.

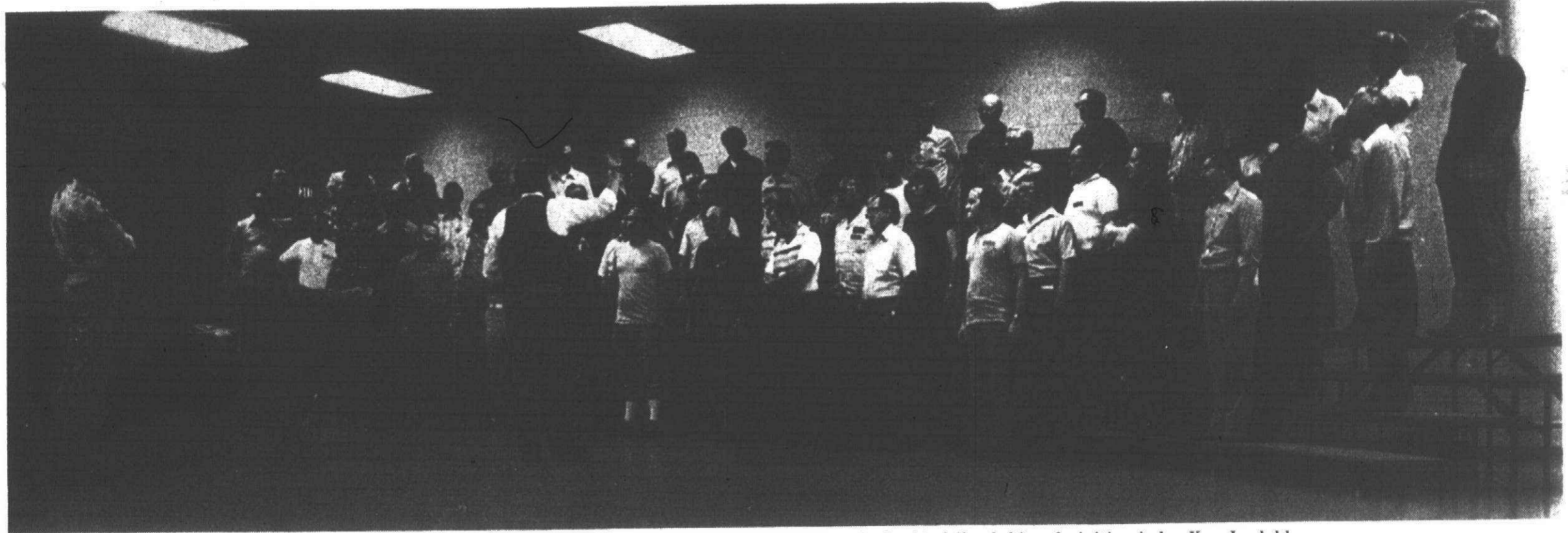

# It's all for 6 minutes of song

They'll travel 60-strong to Salt Lake City to sing for four to six minutes.

They've been preparing for that moment of song for months, and before this week is out they'll have had several more rehearsals and practice performances.

They'll compete against 15 equally dedicated groups of songsters, and they don't even expect to win.

But not to worry. The 60 men of the Wayne Wonderland Chorus of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America wouldn't miss any of the heady experience.

The chorus has for the second time in two years won the right to represent the Pioneer District of the SPEBSQSA, covering Michigan and part of Ontario, at the organization's international convention July 8-12.

That week of harmony will involve 8,000 participants and competition among 50 barbershop quartets as well as the 16 choruses.

"We were 12th among 16 last year and we thought that was fine," said Hubbs Grimm of Plymouth, current president of the Wayne Wonderland men. "We have no illusions about winning," said Al Fricker of Livonia, who has been with the chorus since 1961.

"This group will do well and represent the district very well," was the judgment of Ken Jordahl, a long-time

judge of barber-shop singing who was flown in by the local group for an evening of special coaching. "But they won't win."

"It's a long way to the top," is the way it was put by Steve Sutherland, the young director who is showing his dedication by heading for convention and competition just two days after his wedding.

**THE WAYNE WONDERLAND** singers are part of a tradition that goes back to 1938 and a hotel in Tulsa. A couple of businessmen got talking and fretting because they saw the time-honored art of close harmony falling into disuse.

"They wanted to preserve it," Fricker recounted, "so they began enlisting traveling salesmen to join them in singing get-togethers."

They organized their society dedicated to barbershop singing in 1938. "That was the time of the New Deal and lots of agencies with long names that used initials. They decided this one would be the longest name." SPEBSQSA filled the bill.

The organization has won for barbershop quartet singing the respect it sought. "Now it is regarded as an American folk art and taught in colleges," commented Fricker.

Quartets were the backbone of the SPEBSQSA from the beginning, but

choruses began to show up too.

"We sing the same music with the same parts — lead, tenor, baritone and bass," explained Fricker. "It's the kind of music that is very difficult to sing if it's done right."

"Choruses began to form because a lot of the guys would rather be in a big group than a small one. Some singers are more introverts than others."

**SINGERS** in the local chorus include both introverts and extroverts. The group also spans many ages and interests and occupations, keeping as its single thread the enjoyment of singing and fellowship.

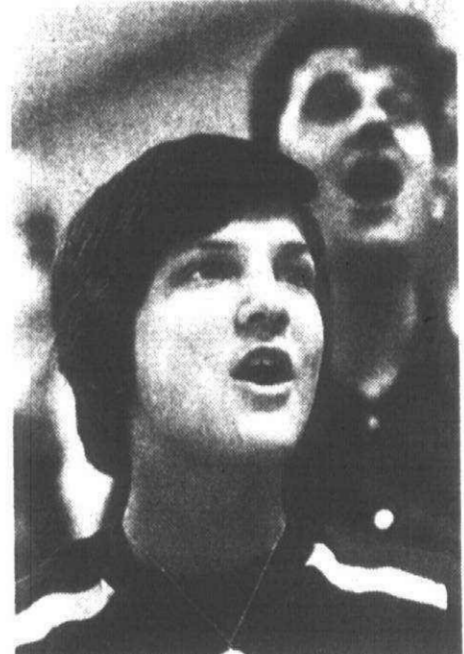
Architects, businessmen, engineers, teachers and men following many other paths gather once a week, alternating rehearsals between Plymouth-Salem High School and Newburg United Methodist Church in Livonia.

As concert time or convention time approaches, like this week, the rehearsals lengthen and double up, and the men stand on their risers throughout the singing time.

"You sing better standing up," Fricker said.

This 19-year-member counts the friendships and group camaraderie highest in his own participation.

"It's the grandest bunch of men I ever knew," he said. "Most of us work eight or 10 hours a day and them come

here. It's not always easy to sing with excellence and vigor. They often are tired but they're there."

**THE YOUNGEST** of the 60 men in the Wayne Wonderland aggregation is Jimmy McLane of Plymouth, who is just finishing the eighth grade. Like his father, also a member, he's a tenor, and he gets his biggest kicks out of the competition events.

Besides singing with the chorus, he sings in school groups and plays soccer and "that's about all I have time for."

At the other end of the age range there's Frank Maton of Belleville, whose 67 years formed the basis of a "This Is Your Life" sequence the chorus performed at one of its concerts this year. He spent some time on the vaudeville stage a few years ago and that got the most musical attention.

"Everybody on the stage had a ball during that presentation, but I had the most fun," he chuckled.

Director Sutherland is an elementary school teacher in Northville and came to the chorus when he was in high school as a member of a young barbershop quartet. He stayed to become the director.

The wedding date was set, he explained, because it was the only time he and his fiancée, Plymouth teacher Laurie Schoutz, both were free. Then came the divisional victory for Wayne Wonderland chorus and the plans to compete at Salt Lake City.

"I don't believe I'm doing this," he

said. "But the honeymoon will come after the competition."

**PRESIDENT GRIMM** and his family are leaving at the end of this week for a camping vacation that will have the convention as its high spot. Many of the other men are making similar plans, while some will fly out just for the competition.

"We probably will do some other singing at a few events around the convention," he said, "but our time for competitive singing is four to six minutes. We're competing June 12."

The two carefully-rehearsed selections, chosen to display style and versatility, are "Who'll Dry Your Tears?" and "My Lady Loves to Dance."

Back home, the chorus will start thinking ahead to 1981, when the international convention will be held in Detroit's Cobo Hall.

"And we will have the winning quartet from this year for our March show next year," Grimm said.

This chorus, like the rest of the SPEBSQSA, makes regular contributions to help support the Institute of Logopedics, a research and rehabilitation center working with children and young adults who have severe communications handicaps. It is at Wichita, Kan.

"The organization tries to give \$10 a year per man; we do more than that," said Grimm. "Part of the profit from our shows, and whatever we get from appearances before private groups goes to that fund."

## Faith Community has intern

Faith Community Church recently welcomed Ron Baard as summer intern pastor. He will serve in team ministry with the Rev. Darryl Bell, pastor of the congregation.

Baard and his wife, Mary, moved here from Princeton, N.J., where he was a student at Princeton Theological Seminary. **PERSONS** interested in learning more about this new group can call Baard, 459-4175. He also will organize and lead an adult education series for church members and interested persons from the community. The study, based on the book of Romans, will deal with understanding some of the basics of Christian faith as it relates to contemporary living.

Much of the intern pastor's work will involve direct outreach to the Plymouth-Canton community. He will call on neighbors of the Faith Community Church to inform them about the church and its programs.

Faith Community, which is about two years old, meets at 10:30 a.m. Sundays in Pioneer Middle School, 46081 Ann Arbor Road. It is constructing a new building on Warren Road west of Canton Center. Record spring rains have slowed the project but parishioners plan to be in the building by Christmas.

# Mormon missionary home after 2 years in Brazil



Joe Mero spent his two-year service as a missionary in Brazil.

Elder Joseph Mero, 21, returned recently to his parents' home in Canton Township after spending almost two years in Brazil.

The elders of the Mormon Church are a constant and ever-changing part of the community. The faces and the statures change, but the team is easily recognized as two young men from the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-day Saints serving a part of their missionary stint in this area.

Persons of other faiths are prone to wonder at their shining enthusiasm and devotion in "giving up" two years of their young lives to their church.

The majority of those who come to Wayne County are from Utah. Joseph Mero went from Wayne County to South America.

He spent the first 2½ months of his mission at Mission Training Center in Provo, Utah, where he learned Portuguese as a second language. After some difficulty in obtaining a visa, which he had to renew every three months, he left Provo for Sao Paulo.

During his mission, Joseph and his

parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Griffis, paid for all his expenses. He spent all his time proselyting for his church in Brazil.

EACH DAY began early for the elder. He rose at 6 a.m. After cleaning up, eating breakfast and a study period, he would leave his residence by 9:30 a.m. His work day lasted until he returned at 11 or 11:30 p.m.

Missionaries for the Mormon Church live and proselyte with companions. Most of his companions were non-English speaking so he spoke Portuguese most of the time.

Mero says he was received very well in Brazil and "Brazilian people are very lovable." He appreciated the strong family ties of the people and felt his work among them was rewarding and successful. Among the highlights of his mission was the dedication of the Sao Paulo temple in October 1978.

Growth of the Mormon Church in Brazil has been slow. The first Mormon to visit the area came at the invitation of the wife of a new German immigrant in 1926. Missionaries preached

the Gospel in German and distributed the Book of Mormon in that language. All Mormon missionaries were withdrawn during World War II but since then, church membership has grown to 112,000 persons.

MERO PLANS to work until the end of the year then enter Brigham Young University in January where he will major in accounting.

His older brother, Blaine Mero, 23, is a student at Brigham Young, majoring in theater arts. He served a mission for his church in Toulouse, France, from February 1976 to February 1978.

A younger brother, Richard Mero, 19, is planning to leave on a mission this fall. Their sister Michelle Mero, 17, is a student at Plymouth Canton High School.

Their parents are active in the Plymouth Ward of the Michigan Westland Stake. Mary Griffis teaches the Gospel Essentials class to investigators during Sunday school and also teaches a class of 14 and 15-year-old girls. Father, Dave Griffis, serves as Ward Mission Leader for the Plymouth Ward.

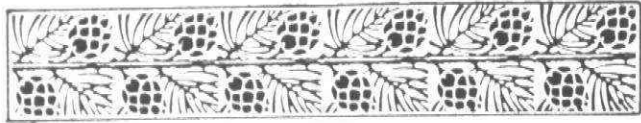

And I like Central Park, SoHo, the East River, Yankee Stadium, the theaters, Times Square, movies, the Village, tourist sites, bars, museums, restaurants, Rockefeller Center and Broadway — how about you?

They're all a part of New York City, and there's more. Much, much more.

New York, New York, especially in the summer, rocks around the clock. You don't like rock? Well, it swings, jitterbugs, waltzes and punks around the clock, too.

I like a Gershwin tune, how about you?

## THE BIG APPLE, from A to Z

**Art** — The Picasso show is the big news this summer. The three floors of the Museum of Modern Art have been taken over for the exhibit, which runs into September. The show is overwhelming . . . and over-crowded. But there's no way around that, so make the best of it. Some 8,000 people a day will tour the retrospective — some who know Picasso inside out and others who will never know a Picasso from a Paganini. But be polite and patient. Expect to spend three hours from the time you get in line until you've seen it all. Tickets available for \$5.25 from the dozens of Ticketron outlets in the city. You specify date and starting time, then you're on your own. Audio tours for about \$3 are a good idea.

Elsewhere, the Guggenheim has brought out its best Impressionist paintings, the Metropolitan has relocated all of its American art in its magnificent new American Wing, and the International Center for Photography has jumped on the bandwagon with an exhibit featuring pictures of Picasso.

**Books** — For the best deals, shop at the Strand Bookstore on Broadway and 12th in the Village. It boasts of miles and miles of books, and that seems and underestimate from the inside — and don't overlook the basement. Featuring a large selection of sale books neatly categorized and easy to thumb through, as well as one of the most gregarious bookstore guards you'll ever come across.

**Clothes** — Forget Saks and Gucci and shop at the source. Walk down Broadway south of Bleeker, toward Wall Street, and you'll come across some old-fashioned retail and wholesale shops. The wholesalers won't sell to you, but their stores are fun to look into. And there's plenty of retail to go around, with the clothes ranging from antique to unique. This year's fad: plastic shoes.

**Drink** — "We were here before you were born" is the motto of McSorley's Old Ale House on East 7th in the Village, and you'd have to be 127 years old to call them liars. Perhaps the only bar in America that owns its own brewery, McSorley's offers its special in bottles. But stick to the dark tap and try it with a ham and onion sandwich. And on the walls: Newspaper clips, campaign posters, buttons and slogans — many from the 19th century and all Democrats. What kind of place is this? Women weren't allowed in until the early 1970s.

**Eats** — Sardi's, sure. The Russian Tea Room, OK. But for a break from the same old posh, head for Mulberry Street in SoHo. Walk south toward Little Italy and Chinatown and let your nose lead you where it will. But pizza and chop suey are out; muscles and eels are in. Oh, there's a middle ground too, but give the specialties of the house a go. Great, huge meals are to be had for between \$5 and \$10. Take your own beverage into many of the Chinese places. Expect an Italian street fair almost any weekend out of the summer, and browse the open-air fish markets in Chinatown, even if you're not buying.

**Films** — On any given night you'll have a host of classics to choose from. Remember, you really haven't seen a film from the 1930s or '40s until you've seen it on a big screen and witnessed the audience reaction as our parents or grandparents used to. New York film audiences are among the most appreciative. Plan to pick up tickets in advance for evening shows.

**Going out?** — Let's hope. But first pick up New York magazine and/or the Village Voice. Both offer complete listings of what's going on, when, where, how much and what's the telephone

number. Don't leave home without them.

**Heights** — Where once the Empire State stood supreme, the World Trade Towers now dominate. An incredible view of New York Harbor, the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, New Jersey and the Poconos, uptown Manhattan and Staten Island, too. Pick a clear day and see forever, but don't pick a windy one or the roof will be closed off and you'll have to take in the panorama from inside. Expect large crowds and a long wait.

For a more relaxed, less-crowded bird's-eye view, try the top of the RCA Building. The view of the harbor area isn't as good, but Central Park is right beneath you and — after all — what better place to see the World Trade Towers from?

**Initials** — Get ready for them. SoHo is the area south of Houston (pronounced House-ton) Street, which is the southern border of Greenwich Village. NoHo is a new name for the stretch to the north — the southern part of the Village — but most of the locals still call it the Village. Tribeca, where many old warehouses are being turned into new lofts, is the triangle beneath Canal Street. The subways (the BMT, IRT and IND) are another story, see "Transportation" — just stay off the PATH system unless you want to go to Hoboken.

**Jokes** — Rodney Dangerfield's club will cost you a good \$20 for the cover charge and a couple of drinks alone, but you may think it's worth it because: "Kids today are getting into sex at such a young age that they're making birth control pills in the shape of Fred Flintstone." Or "When I was a kid my dad bought me a dart board that featured automatic return." Hard to get to, though, in the 80s off of First Avenue. In the same neighborhood and cheaper: "Catch a Rising Star" where the up-and-comers appear.

**Kosher** — There are more deli's in New York than you can shake a gefilte fish at. One of the best: The Star, where all the you-know-whats hang out. Go there and look for yourself in Earl Wilson's column the next morning. Or try the Cordial, where Garry Moore and

Dirwood Kirby used to go; now find the former Not-ready-for-prime-time Players there upon occasion.

**Law** — The drinking age is 21 and the bars stay open till 4 a.m. And while you might not think it's illegal to smoke a joint while you're sitting in the park — what with all those around you doing the same — remember that it is.

**Music** — You might catch a biggie in town, but their shows can be expensive and sold out in advance. Give the smaller clubs around the Village a chance or just keep plugging the juke boxes in New York bars. They're the world's best.

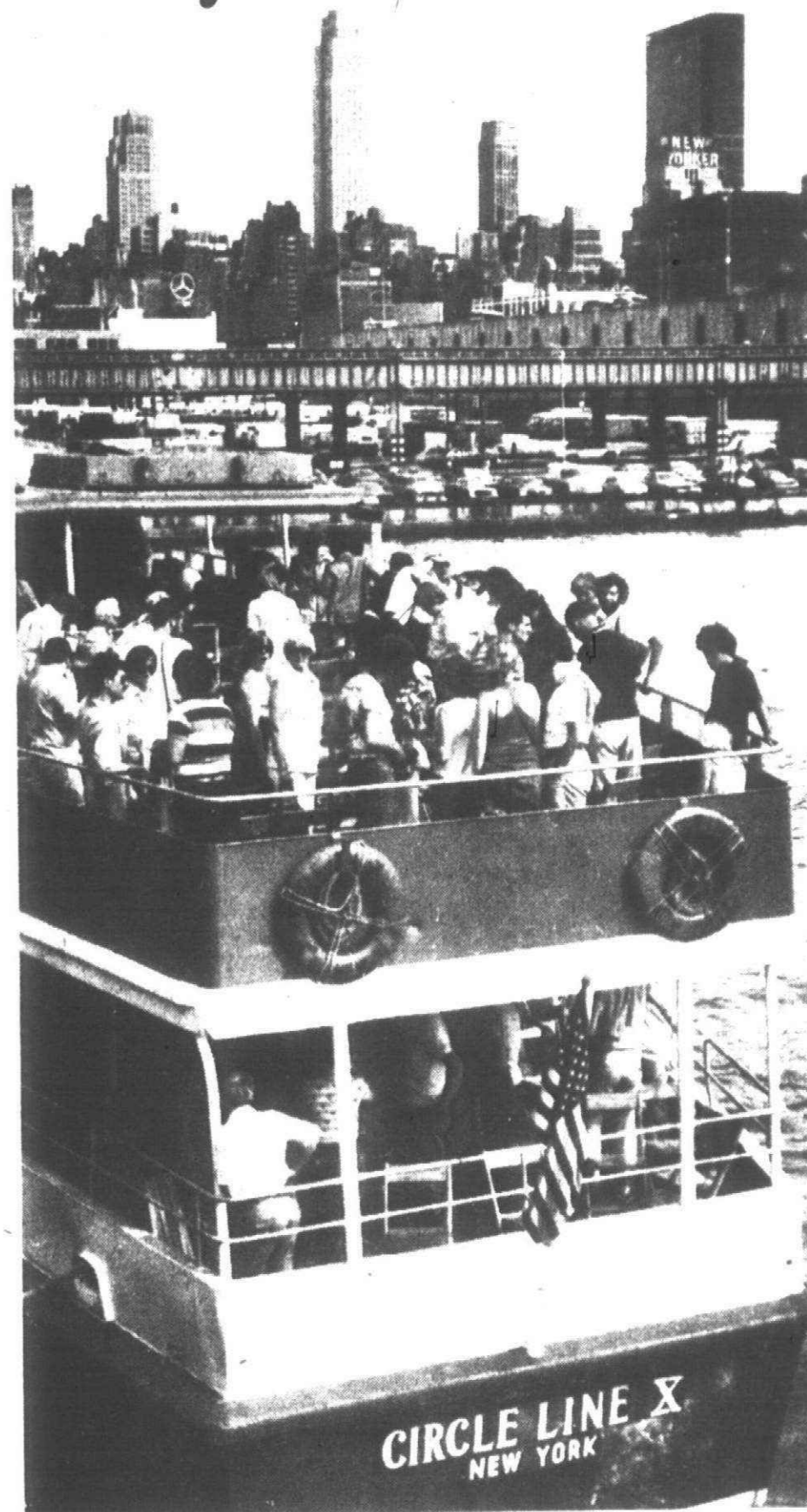
**Newspapers** — The Times is unparalleled, but you may find yourself picking up the Daily News and the Post — most New Yorkers do. The Post, especially, dishes up a brand of journalism unfamiliar to native Detroiters, and that's too bad. Not all of us go for heads that shout "Volcanic ash on its way" or "Ronnie wraps it up," but it is a nice alternative to the often-staid Times. Another nice touch: Pick up the morning Times and News the night before and the evening post every morning. Then look for later editions and compare. That's competition.

**Onions** — Not to be confused with "Eats." Try a frank from one of the street vendors. But don't ask for a dog, or a hot dog, or a can of pop. It's a frank and a soda. Then ask for the onions, but don't expect white diced onions. What do you get? Maybe you'll find out.

**Plays** — Write ahead for tickets to "Evita," this year's — or any year's — best musical. If you wait till you get there, seat selection will be severely limited and you'll still pay top dollar, meaning \$20 to \$25 per person. But don't limit yourself to the great white way.

Off Broadway (theaters generally within the core of Manhattan) frequently offers better plays, good casts and smaller theaters, all at a lower price: \$10 to \$15. Off-Off Broadway (theaters could be anywhere) shouldn't be overlooked, either, although productions often are of more interest to theater stu-

## Man's best friend meets Algonquin, and survives

People aren't the only ones who go on vacation. Boots loves his annual summer trip to the cottage, although he is always falling off the prow of the boat into the lake.

Boots is a very small middle-aged black terrier with a zest for life and delusions of grandeur. Last spring, he fell in love with a great dane. This spring he attacked a very large German shepherd. After the vet stitched Boots together again, he shook his head and agreed that the dog probably doesn't know how small he is.

In his home territory, Boots considers himself king. He cases other dogs out of the yard, protects us from rabbits, pheasants and robins, and barks whenever the front doorbell rings. I notice that he is more and more inclined to bark from a comfortable position two rooms away from the door, but I guess he feels that he is protecting us anyway.

When we visit Algonquin Park, he protects us from wild animals: three-inch long mice, tiny ground squirrels and other ferocious creatures.

He still believes that he can outrun a chipmunk. The chipmunks think it is hilarious. They run down tree trunks and cheep-cheep at him until he chases them, but he never catches up.

Boots' favorite vacation activity, other than protecting the household, is to stand guard over the canoe, the motor boat or the dock.

ALGONQUIN PARK is a large provincial park 200 miles north of Toronto, Ontario. We take Highway 400 north from Toronto to Huntsville, where the 60-mile highway runs through the park to the town of Whitby on the other side.

This was once lumbering ground for the great white square-cut pines. Now it is all second growth, although you can still hike or canoe the 150-mile north-south dimensions of the park without meeting anybody but an occasional bear or moose.

The deer don't bother to go that far off the road. They just munch away at the signs that lead to the campgrounds,

the portage store, the lumberjack's museum and other park attractions.

There are also two lakes that are edged by summer cottages, all of them built on government land leases that the government is now trying to reclaim.

The cottage we visit is on an island half a mile across the water from the mainland boat dock. We cross that water by canoe, by a 10-horsepower motor boat, or sometimes by Bill's taxi. Bill and family also run the post office, the garbage collection service and the handyman service.

These cottages are not your tile-floor electric light models, nor are they for rent to the public; we rent from a friend. Our cottage has a wood stove, an outhouse and kerosene lamps. The classy folks, usually those who have come all summer for 50 years, have propane lamps. One high brow even has a telephone.

When we cross Cache Lake by canoe, Boots sits like a figurehead on the prow and inevitably falls off. When we cross by motor boat, he lands in the lake while jumping from the boat to the dock.

On fishing expeditions, he gets excited as soon as we get some action on the line, which either scares off the fish or causes him to once again fall in the lake.

Of course, he does the dog paddle. They all do. But he doesn't really feel comfortable in the water and he is usually a little embarrassed by his own clumsiness.

Nonetheless, he keeps his graying chin up through hiking trails and midnight boat trips. He tries to remember not to talk to close to the edge when we serve drinks to company on the dock, the traditional lakeside social center for passing boats.

Now that we no longer have a cat, life is easier if a little frustrating for him up there.

He doesn't miss the cat, but he misses her litter box. Boots is the only dog I know that likes to bury his bones in the kitty litter.

### Melting pot lives

It's summertime in the big city. And it's a Thursday night, like any other Thursday night. It's close to midnight. The moon is out and stars are visible through the billion-watt glow of the big city. The temperature hovers at 70°.

Trees and shrubs are in bloom. And a girl glides by in a purple, see-through, plastic jumpsuit. Another coasts past in cutoffs and a T-shirt, carrying a copy of the morning New York Times.

A thousand young people are out — many on roller skates or bikes, while others flip a Frisbee, pass a volleyball or keep a soccer ball suspended in air for kick after kick after head butt. Still others listen to music or make their own, but most sit and talk, drink and smoke, watch and listen.

This is Washington Square in lower Manhattan, New York City, in the heart of the Village. Greenwich Village.

You've seen Jane here and a barefoot Robert, an unmarried Jill and countless others from countless other films. But the film crews aren't out tonight. Only the regulars are out. All 1,000 or so of them.

**ANYTHING GOES** in the Village and the action is nearly non-stop. The sites, the sounds, the smells. The park is packed with ragtag-looking young people. The dress code is as strictly enforced as labor laws in Taiwan.

Whites, blacks, Puerto Ricans, Chicanos, hippies, punks, tourists. Skaters, bikers, after-hours athletes, vendors, musicians, jugglers, con men, bums. Everyone is out and everyone is having a good time — except maybe the bums.

The roller skaters are acrobatic. They weave and duck, dance and twirl and sidestep passersby — as well as each other — all in long, fluid motions and to the disco beat of a dozen blaring radios.

Like most New Yorkers, they mesh like cogs on busy factory wheels, yet they function largely in isolated worlds. By themselves, together, they number in the dozens. Back and forth, in and out, against the noises of car horns, sirens, whistles and disco, non-stop.

The bikers mostly come and go, but the volleyballers and the soccer players have corners of their own in the square. The musicians and the jugglers draw the crowds, temporarily.

But after the swell has witnessed the best they have to offer — and offered the performers the least money they could in return — it's back to sitting and talking, drinking and smoking, watching and listening and passing by.

**YOU MIGHT** strike up a conversation with a stranger, but you wouldn't want to. Not in the square. Either you're with someone, don't want to be with anyone or you maintain a constant banter with those around you. But not a conversation.

Squaregoers — the regulars — are like people in their livingrooms. They're at home. And if you haven't planned for guests, you don't want to entertain strangers. Idle chatter from porch to porch is OK.

And all squaregoers have one thing in common: a need to score.

Scoring can mean showing off on skates or with a ball, out-blasting a competitor's radio with your own, making a drug deal or just seeming like you belong. Maybe that's the main thing.

Perhaps every Washington Square regular would like to say to every tourist or passerby: "This is New York, love it or leave it. Or hate it and stay here. I could care less."

This is New York, though — love it or leave it or hate it and stay. It really doesn't matter. And to some, scoring simply means sitting in the square and thinking about the city and the people in the park. Just like this.

**United Nations** — Skip the tour, check out the lobby. A Foucault Pendulum proves the earth rotates on its axis, and moon rocks remind of man's visit to the moon. Walk around the outside of the complex — the flags of all the nations are something to see.

**Quiet** — For rest and relaxation, try the park. Bad jokes aside, Central Park is safe, a nice place to take a stroll, watch the joggers or see a softball game. And you won't believe how quiet it can get within the confines of its walls.

**Roads** — They're easy to remember, at least north of the Village. The avenues run north-south; 9th Avenue is on the west side, 1st Avenue on the east. The streets, running east-west, run into the 100s up north, around Harlem and the Bronx, and dwindle to 12th, 11th, 10th to the south, in the Village. South of 3rd you're on your own. One tip: Tourists will read the street signs and say "Avenue of the Americas"; locals call it 6th Avenue.

**Sun** — Here's a sidetrack: Trains leave Penn Station for Long Island all the time. One such train will take you each morning to the town of Bay Shore where you can catch a ferry to Fire Island. Total travel time is two hours, and you land on a 30-mile-long beach fronting on the cool Atlantic. Return in the late-afternoon. Train schedules available from the station. Ferry runs tie in with the train arrivals and departures.

**Transportation** — Meaning subways. Don't be afraid of them. There are three main lines that run between midtown and downtown, and you can't go too far wrong by taking any of them. Just remember: 7th Avenue line, west side; Broadway line, central; Lexington Avenue line, east side. They all run north-south, stopping every eight or nine blocks. Fare is 50 cents.

**Village, the** — A must see. Walking tours available (check New York magazine for times and starting points).

**Waterways** — Circumnavigate Manhattan Island. Four boats leave from the foot of 42nd Street on the Hudson River six or seven times a day. The sites include an up-close look at the Statue of Liberty, the Brooklyn Bridge, the industry-riddled northern portions of the East River, the supple north end of the island and the wide, wide Hudson. Well worth the four hours it takes, and when it gets hot in the city, there's no better way to cool off.

**X-rated** — Deep in the heart of old New York there is a thoroughfare that Ruby Keeler wouldn't recognize. No, 42nd Street isn't quite what it used to be. Massage parlors, strip shows, magazine shops, drug dealers and hookers dominate the scene. Not for the week at heart, but would a trip to New York really be complete without a stroll down 42nd Street?

**Yankees** — Those damn Yanks — John, Jackson, Randolph, Nettles, Murcer et al — play in the south Bronx, easy to get to via the Lexington Avenue subway's "Yankee Express" direct to the stadium. The park has been remodeled, as has Tiger Stadium, but Yankee Stadium looks about 10 times better. And the bleachers may be safer, too.

**Zzzzzzz** — Don't forget your rest. Try to get some sleep, even if you are paying \$40 for a bed.

## Travel trends

# Plenty of gas this year

- Gasoline will be readily available at fuel pumps in the United States this summer, barring some unpredictable disaster.
- The price rose 68 percent this last year, and is still going up, but that doesn't seem to stop us from using it.
- Travel patterns are changing because of the energy problem, the depressed economy and changing social patterns.
- Last year, for the first time, foreign visitors to the U.S. increased to the point where there were more travelers coming in than going out.

**THOSE ARE** just a few of the trends reported in a variety of surveys done by the travel industry, private, non-profit and government. All segments of the industry are eager to avoid the disastrous summer of 1979, when the real energy problem was magnified by the public perception of it.

Americans assumed that there wouldn't be enough gasoline to get them to their destination and back, so they often didn't go at all. Millions of dollars were lost to the travel industry, which is among the top three industries in 42 states, employs four million people directly and two million indirectly nationwide.

The U.S. Data Center reports a 24.8 percent jump in the travel price index this year, primarily because of increased fuel prices. The Travel Industry Association, (TIA), formerly the Discover America Travel Organization, surveyed 30 travel industry executives to measure the effect of energy and rising prices on travel. Their tentative conclusion was that Americans are still planning vacations but they are doing it more carefully.

"No other industry relies so much on energy as the travel industry," said J. William Hudson, vice president of industry and Government Affairs for TIA. "We can't convert to coal."

"This summer, travel by motor vehicle will constitute two-thirds of vacation travel. Every indicator, every survey, shows that there will be an adequate supply of gasoline, at prices that have already increased 68 percent this year."

TIA, with hotels, airlines, tourist attractions, convention bureaus and travel associations as members, has fought to keep travel from being the

scapegoat of national energy legislation. Less than 3 percent of our fuel is used for recreational travel, but legislators tend to think of travel as a luxury rather than a major industry in America.

Rachel Nilsson, public relations director for the American Automobile Association nationwide, believes that public response to the energy problem is based on availability, price and the conservation ethic.

"**AVAILABILITY IS** apparently more important than price," she said. "The price keeps going up, but there is no sign of a breaking point yet. People keep buying it. But they want to know that gasoline is available, whatever the price."

"Nobody in the industry understood the allotment system last year. There was a glut where there was no people, and a shortage where there were lots of people. City dwellers saw a shortage at home and assumed it applied everywhere. So they stayed home."

Nilsson said that the White House, which last year emphasized conservation of home heating, is this year focusing on travel. "They assume that people are not conserving, but we believe that Americans are already actively conserving energy."

Some of the patterns seen so far are shorter trips, closer to home, with fewer family members along. More people are using trains, buses and other public transportation, and more are combining various forms of transportation to achieve a travel goal. People are saving energy and money for the big trip once taken casually.

Inner city rail and bus business has increased. Amtrak is up 6-10 percent. Airlines business has decreased 5-8 percent causing layoffs in the industry and a flurry of special discount prices, but the gap in price between car travel and air travel is narrowing.

Ed Stone, director of public relations and marketing for Opryland in Nashville, recently spoke to a group of travel publicists and travel writers about specific steps that can be taken to ease the cost-and-energy strain on travel.

"Travelers are exploring tour packages, bus tours, no-frill options, special discounts and free local activities in an area," Stone said. "Gas cost 50 cents in 1978 and \$1.20 now, which means that 400 miles of car travel now costs \$12.60 more than it did in 1978."

Stone also talked about how the changing family is affecting travel patterns. "By the mid 1980s the typical nuclear family will be 2.25 persons. The nuclear family is now only 13 percent of U.S. households."

"Thirty percent of homes are childless and more than 20 percent are single. The travel industry is already beginning to reflect this movement away from family travel as we have known it."

**ONE OF THE** most interesting trends in the travel industry is the increase of foreign visitors to the United States, a situation created by the drop in the dollar value overseas. Americans once enjoyed this situation in reverse, because our dollar bought a lot of travel in other countries.

Nowadays, German marks and Japanese yen buy a lot of travel in the United States, making America a favorite travel destination for foreign visitors.

Unfortunately, we are not as well prepared to host foreign visitors as they have been to host us. Few sections of the travel industry have employees who speak languages other than English. Few employ interpreters.

The industry is scrambling to change that, so that we can take advantage of this economic boost to our economy.

Foreign travelers do not necessarily see the United States as we do. The Japanese, for example, are eager to visit Dodge City because of their exposure to American westerns on television.

The highest number of overseas visitors come, in descending order, from Canada, Mexico, the United Kingdom and Japan. Their numbers increased 19 percent last year.

As of Sept. 1, American Airlines will provide discounts up to 55 percent for travel throughout domestic U.S.

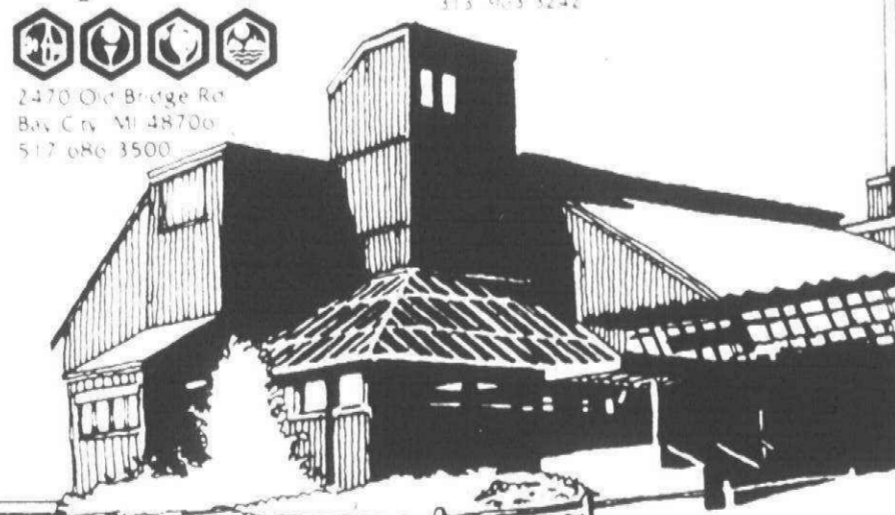

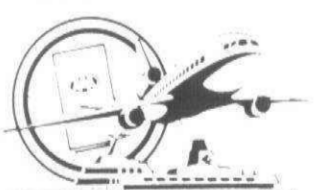

## 'Urban Cowboy' Travolta rides mechanical bull

Does history repeat itself? Maybe. Do successful movies repeat themselves? You bet. John Travolta's new film, "Urban Cowboy" (PG) is a replay of his box-office smash, "Saturday Night Fever."

The locale has shifted from New York to Houston; the music has changed from disco to country and western. People dress and talk differently, but the key elements — the leading character and the general drift of the story — are the same.

Travolta is Bud Davis, the western counterpart of Tony Manero from "Fever." Bud's a blue collar guy who is just looking for a good time or trying to give his life meaning; the interpretation depends on one's social outlook.

During the day, he works at a petrochemical plant. At night he puts on his cowboy clothes for beer drinking and two-stepping at Gilleys.

GILLEYS, which gets a million dollars worth of free publicity in this flick, is a huge plastic zoo of a place with a bar, dance floor, entertainers and all kinds of goings on.

One of the attractions is a mechanical bucking bull. Bud soon leaves the hoedown to others as he takes up the challenge of mastering this metal monster. Thus, instead of a dance contest, "Urban Cowboy" features a mechanical bucking-bull contest.

Will Bud win it or will he lose to Wes (Scott Glenn)? Wes is the bad guy. An ex-con out on parole, he beats up on women, including Bud's wife who unwisely succumbed to a yen for "a real cowboy."

This is simple stuff, very imitative and a bit tedious. Two hours of bull riding, beer drinking and Texas accents can get wearisome. However, "Urban Cowboy" does have some major assets to offset these liabilities.

To begin with, there is a terrific soundtrack. You don't have to be a C & W fan to get caught up in the foot-stomping rhythms and heart-throbbing vocals of the musical numbers, which include appearances by the Charlie Daniels Band, Mickey Gilley, Bonnie Raitt and Johnny Lee.

THERE ALSO is an exceedingly good cast. Debra Winger as Sissy, Bud's wife, creates an interesting character of some depth. Sometimes assertive, sometimes submissive; sometimes she looks homespun, sometimes seductive.

Scott Glenn makes you cringe as the mean cowboy-convict Wes, and Brooke Alderson and Barry Corbin cut fine roles as Bud's understanding aunt and uncle. Only Madolyn Smith fails to be credible as Pam, Bud's uptown girlfriend. However, the problem probably is with the script, which calls for a stereotype, a rich girl out slumming.

Finally, there is the principal asset of the film, Travolta himself. When the camera pans up his long legs to his handsome face and the girls in the audience scream, there's no doubt that this is the actor in the kind of picture his fans want to see.

The temptation to keep playing this character to legions is adoring, ticket-buying fans must be overwhelming. But if Travolta wants to establish himself as a serious actor, he's going to have to show that he can handle some other kind of role.

So, what next, Travolta? If you're offered a script about a working stiff who spends all his free time roller skating, square dancing or skate boarding, will you go into training or will you search for a part that stretches your acting skills as well as your limbs?

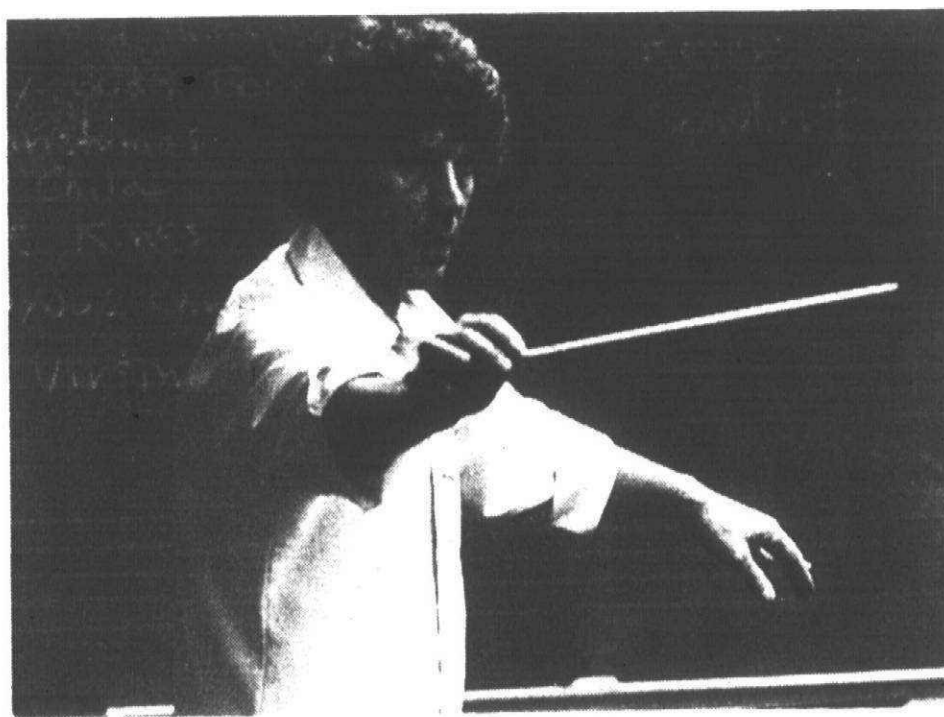

# Meadow Brook opens Friday

The Kenneth Jewell Chorale, almost a staple of the metropolitan area's musical diet, will open the 17th Meadow Brook Music Festival at 8:30 p.m. Thursday.

With them in Baldwin Pavilion on the Oakland University campus will be the Detroit Symphony Orchestra directed by festival artistic director Neville Marriner. This marks the chorale's 36th appearance with the orchestra.

Founded in 1962 by the now-retired Kenneth Jewell, the chorale is made up of 50 professional musicians who teach, direct church choirs, and are featured as soloists in opera companies and major choirs.

Eric Freudigman of West Bloomfield, a tenor, charter member and professional pianist, has been the director since 1976.

"It is a thoroughly professional group," he said, "and the greatest thing about them is the way they sight read. . . . We practice 2½ hours a week and they must be able to sight read extremely well because we go through a great volume of music in a short span of time."

The chorale, Freudigman said, has never had a problem attracting singers. About 18 have been with the group since its inception and the age range is from post college to mid-50s.

Freudigman is responsible for the review and research of all music performed and in recent years has uncovered many unusual compositions by great composers, past and present.

THE CHORALE is partially funded by the Michigan Council for the Arts. Over the years, it has given concerts throughout the Midwest and received words such as "flawless" and "electrifying" from critics.

Freudigman said the only difference in the chorale over the years is that, "Now, we are doing more work with the Detroit Symphony."

The 1979 performances of "Die Aegyptische Helena" by Richard Strauss in New York and Washington as well as at Ford Auditorium are evidence of the growing partnership between the two groups. More recently, the chorale and symphony recorded the mystic Symphony No. 3 by Polish composer Karol Szymanowski.

The chorale has also done two Christmas recordings on the Musical Heritage Society label, "Bring a Torch, A Christmas Celebration" and "A Child is Born."

AT THE MEADOW BROOK Festival opening, their second in two years, the women's section of the chorale will sing to the Incidental Music of Mendelssohn's "Midsummer Night's Dream."

Also on the opening program will be Berlioz's Beatrice and Benedict Overture and Tchaikovsky's Hamlet, Fantasy Overture, Opus 67.

During the International Freedom Festival on Detroit's riverfront in early July, the chorale will sing with the Windsor Symphony Orchestra. On July 14, it will perform in the outdoor pavilion at Hart Plaza for the GOP convention.

The chorale will return to the Meadow Brook Festival stage on Saturday, Aug. 9, when Stanislaw Skrowaczewski will conduct the Detroit Symphony in Ravel's melodic Daphnis and Chloe Suites No. 1 and 2.

Chorale singers are paid. They do about 20 performances a year and over the 18-year history there have been almost 300 different members. Yet the quality remains on the same professional level.

It is, as Freudigman said, an excellent opportunity for professionals who can perform equally well as soloists and members of a choral group.

## Public misinformed, Hypnotist says.

"You don't see surgeons, psychiatrists, doctors or dentists doing public demonstrations to entertain. Hypnosis is a powerful people-helping method that should not be mis-represented or exploited."

Elaine says that in England where she was born and educated public displays of hypnosis are outlawed, and she believes the same should be in effect here.

At her now famous Hypnosis Center Elaine teaches self hypnosis courses and also has a busy private practice where in she helps people with all kinds of problems. Her people helping programs are gaining popularity as her reputation as a caring, concerned and most ethical hypnotist becomes more widely known.

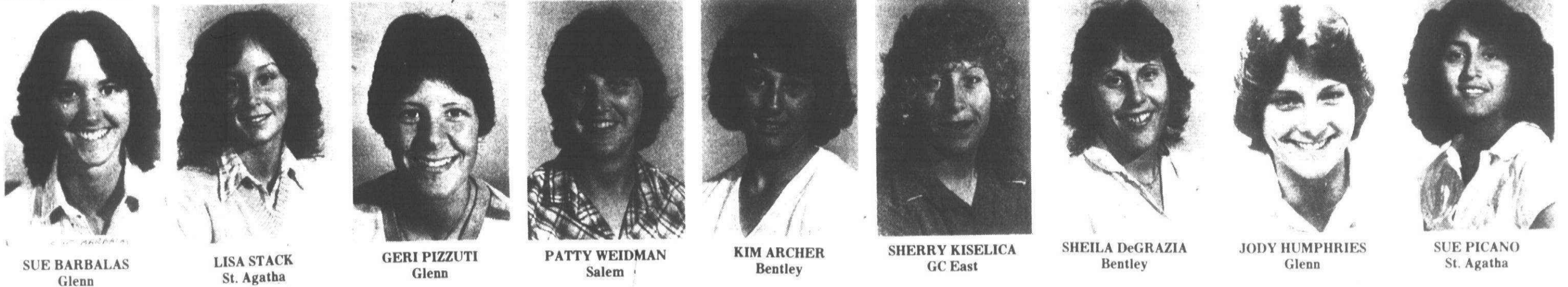

Coaches make selections

Big hitters dominate all-area softball squad

Observer-area softball teams gave a good accounting of themselves during the recently-completed season.

Plymouth Canton won the Western Six League championship.

Livonia Bentley and Plymouth Salem shared the Suburban Eight League title with Belleville. Garden City East and Westland John Glenn tied for first place in the Northwest Suburban League.

Bentley and Glenn each advanced to the regional round of the state Class A tournament.

Area coaches met recently to acknowledge the premier players in Observerland. Following is the result of the 1980 all-area meeting.

FIRST TEAM

**Sue Barbalas, Westland John Glenn, pitcher.** A senior, Barbalas compiled a 10-2 record this season for the Rockets. Both of her losses were by one run.

Barbalas also knew what to do with the bat, as she hit for an average of .403.

"Sue practiced all winter before school to make herself a pitcher," said Glenn coach Vic Koos. "Her will to win carried her through each game because she had a bad back."

**Lisa Stack, Redford St. Agatha, pitcher.** A three-year varsity performer, Stack often struck fear in batters with the velocity of her fastball.

The senior forged a 12-2 record this spring with an earned run average of 1.53. She pitched 97 innings and struck out 113 and walked 97.

Stack threw three no-hitters this season, five during her career.

"Lisa is a tremendous competitor. She works very hard and has overcome a physical handicap of being blind in one eye," said St. Agatha coach Don Myers.

**Geri Pizzuti, Westland John Glenn, catcher.** The junior quickly earned a reputation of being one of the finest defensive catchers in the area, especially with runners on base.

Pizzuti threw runners out 12 of 14 times they tried to steal bases during the course of the season. She also led Glenn in hits on offense.

"Geri loves competition," said Koos. "She wants all baserunners to run so that she can throw them out."

**Patty Weidman, Plymouth Salem, first base.** Weidman, a senior, led the Rocks in hitting this year with a .553 average. Her fielding percentage was .921.

Weidman, a natural athlete who has

accepted a basketball scholarship from Central Michigan University, earned her second softball letter this season.

"Patty is a very dedicated athlete—one of the best to come along in years," said Salem coach Livi Way.

**Kim Archer, Livonia Bentley, infielder.** Only a freshman, Archer batted .530 with 35 hits in 66 at-bats. Among her hits were seven home runs, three triples and six doubles.

Archer, also voted to the all-Suburban Eight League team, knocked in 40 runs during the season.

"Kim is big, strong and has outstanding speed," said Bentley coach Tom Lang. "Her range and arm are outstanding."

**Sherry Kiselica, Garden City East, infielder.** Another power-hitter, Kiselica clubbed four home runs, four triples and five doubles while compiling an overall batting average of .554.

The senior collected 20 RBIs. She stole 11 bases during the season.

Defensively, Kiselica made 35 put-outs and had 19 assists.

The first girl in the history of East High to win nine letters in three years, Kiselica was named the all-around sports person at East for 1980.

**Sheila DeGrazia, Livonia Bentley, infielder.** A three-year starter at third base, DeGrazia this season hit at a .423 clip.

The senior has won all-Suburban Eight League recognition in softball, basketball and volleyball during her high-school career.

"Sheila is quick and has a super arm," said Lang. "She gets balls defensively that others only dream about."

**Jody Humphries, Westland John Glenn, outfielder.** A repeater on the all-Observer team this season, Humphries knocked in 37 runs in 20 games. The senior smashed four home runs.

Defensively, Humphries threw out five runners during the course of the season from her outfield position.

"Jody is the best clutch hitter I have ever seen," said Koos. "She's smart and will go with the pitch. With her wit, she can relax the whole team."

**Sue Picano, Redford St. Agatha, outfielder.** The Aggies' Most Valuable Player this season, Picano compiled a batting average of .530. She clouted one home run, four triples and four doubles.

The junior had 25 RBIs and stole 25 bases. Her fielding percentage was .990.

Picano was named to the all-Catholic

and all-A West Division honorary squads.

"Sue has the ideal combination of speed and power," said Myers.

**Karin Phillips, Livonia Franklin, outfielder.** Phillips, a senior, hit .368 and led the team in home runs, triples and runs batted in.

She was a second team all-area choice last year and was voted to the all-Northwest Suburban squad this season and last.

Phillips started the season with a seven-game hitting streak, but an injury prevented her from maintaining that pace.

"Karin was a superb right fielder and with her strong arm threw many girls out at first base on would-be hits," said Franklin coach Chuck Hebestreit.

SECOND TEAM

**Kelli Nagy, Livonia Bentley, pitcher.** The senior was elected Most Valuable Player by her teammates.

Prior to the Class A state regional, Nagy had pitched 140 innings and compiled a record of 18-2. Her earned run average was 2.35.

She was selected for the All-Suburban Eight League team.

**Marianne Pink, Plymouth Canton, pitcher.** Pink hurled the Chiefs to the Western Six League championship and had an overall record of 11-2.

The junior was not only the ace of the pitching staff, but she also led the team with a .414 batting average.

Pink knocked in 28 runs.

**Nan Horwood, Plymouth Salem, catcher.** The senior hit at a .500 clip as the Rocks' leadoff batter.

Horwood, co-captain this season and a four-year varsity letter-winner, led the team with 20 stolen bases during the 1980 campaign.

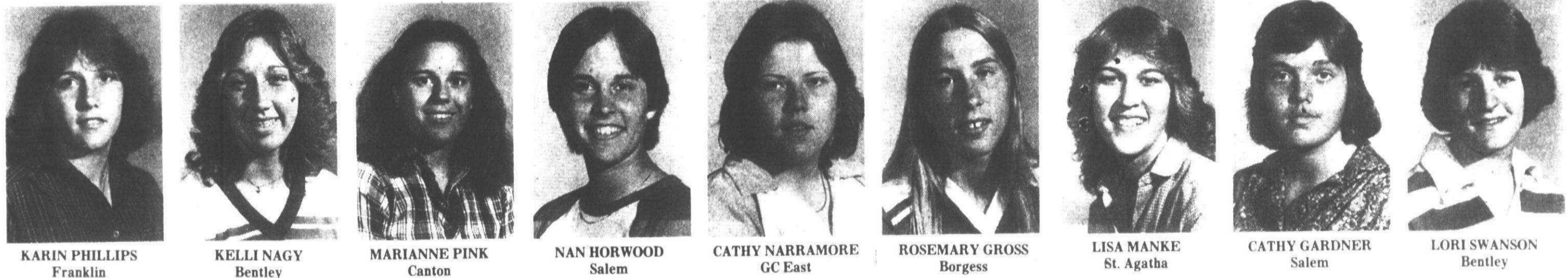
"She controlled our offense and defense all season," said Way.

Let me explain—I'm sorry

Journalism has been described as history in a hurry.

Journalists are not like the Hemingways, Steinbecks or Haileys. Reporters usually don't have time to write, rewrite, then polish a breaking news story.

Newspapers are not like literary publishing houses, either.

In spite of all the precautions that are taken to gather, write and edit news, mistakes are bound to pop up now and then through human or mechanical error.

While perfection is never attained, it should always be sought. Mistakes should not be justified, but rather acknowledged and corrected. Credibility is a reporter's most useful professional tool.

IN TWO RECENT editions, our attempts to publish the final girls' track listing did not succeed. Our June 12 paper headlined the listing as the final one of the season, but in fact, it wasn't.

We tried again in the June 19 paper. That time, only part of the cor-

rect listing made it. Technical problems with video display terminals—electronic typewriters—were at the root of the difficulties in both cases.

We will not try a third time with the girls' listing, nor will we publish the final boys' track listing.

The listings are no longer news. The All-Observer track teams were published nearly two weeks ago and school is now out.

A more important factor in our decision is that our news hole has tightened considerably and it is necessary to get very selective in what makes the prints and what doesn't. Good judgment becomes more and more important.

We are not attempting to justify our problems, but we do feel that regular readers deserve an explanation. We're very sorry for any inconvenience or hurt feelings that may result from our decision.

THAT IS NOT to imply that the accomplishments of area trackmen are not important. We have copies of both listings available in our Livonia office.

We will mail copies to any reader at no charge if the reader encloses a self-addressed stamped envelope. The address is Sports Department, Observer Newspapers, 36251 Schoolcraft Road, Livonia, 48150.

It would not be possible to publish the weekly statistics in any sport without the cooperation of coaches who volunteer to collect and organize the information.

They did the real work. Any errors that appeared during the year were usually our fault.

Many thanks for a job well done to Chuck Olson, who compiled the girls' swim times; Keith Wright, who took care of the boys' swim times; Fred Price, who charted both the boys' basketball statistics and the boys' track times; Paul Holmberg, who compiled the girls' track times; and Larry Ruzsas, who was in charge of the baseball stats.

# Wet diesel fuel sensor available

General Motors has developed an electronic sensor system that will alert owners of diesel-powered cars and light trucks if their fuel becomes contaminated by excessive amounts of water.

This water-in-fuel sensor system is now being installed on all new production GM diesel-powered cars and is being extended to light trucks. It also is being made available to current GM diesel-powered vehicle owners who will be receiving letters advising them of its availability.

This system resulted in an increase of \$50 in the manufacturer's suggested retail price of currently produced diesel-powered GM vehicles.

To enable all GM diesel owners to take advantage of this system, it is being offered in kit form by GM dealers for \$50. Installation by a GM dealer will be made at no charge for labor until Oct. 1.

"GENERAL MOTORS continues to believe the best protection owners could have would be the assurance that the water content in their diesel fuel is within the stringent limits set by a number of states," said James Vorhes, vice president in charge of GM Consumer Relations.

"While this new system does not solve the underlying problem of water contamination, it can provide an extra margin of safety for owners and will reduce the risk of engine damage from contaminated diesel fuel.

"General Motors-produced diesel-powered cars and light trucks are designed with a water separator system in the fuel tank that will hold substantial quantities of water," he said.

"In small quantities, this water gradually passes through the fuel system without harm to the engine components.

"However, some owners have purchased fuel contaminated with more water than the fuel sys-

tem can tolerate," he said. "In these instances, the engine will not run and if the water is not removed, eventual damage to parts of the injector pump may occur."

**THE SYSTEM**, available in kit form, includes:

- A warning light that will turn on if excessive amounts of water are present in the fuel tank. This will alert owners that fuel they bought contains large amounts of water.

- An even larger (more than three gallons) water separator system in the fuel tank. Capacity will depend on the vehicle model.

- Provisions for siphoning excess water from the fuel tank without removing the tank.

"We believe the contamination of the diesel fuel by excess water most probably occurs in the distribution process or at the retail level and is the result of improper fuel handling.

"At the very least, owners of diesel-powered vehicles are short-changed because they may have paid for diesel fuel that contains excessive water. Even more serious, it may necessitate costly cleaning of the complete system and can eventually cause pump malfunction."

IN ADDITION to the water-in-fuel sensor system, GM will replace without charge the injector pump governor weight retainer ring if it is damaged by contaminated fuel.

This additional protection is good for five years or 50,000 miles from the original service date of the vehicle.

Owners of diesel-powered passenger cars and light trucks that may have experienced diesel fuel pump damage from water, or governor weight retainer ring failure, may contact their dealer for possible reimbursement of repair charges.

The offer for reimbursement expires on Oct. 1.
