

Administration cuts spark fierce responses

It was the 21st — and last — budget item presented to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, but it drew the fiercest responses.

The item? Administration. The long, and complicated, task of examining 1982-83 school-year budget cuts began Friday and Saturday with a two-day, 10-hour workshop.

The instructional session included 21 "decision packages" that may be reduced or eliminated this fall.

Attendance was meager, but the information and discussion was abundant.

Presentations ranged from reducing

the length of classroom days to eliminating the intramural-extramural program at middle schools.

The board now plans to rank cuts of the 21 items. A decision on one item — elimination of the Extended School Year (ESY) program at four elementary schools — faces the board at its next regular meeting Monday, Feb. 22.

Decisions on other reductions will follow in the next few months, as the board copes with a projected \$2.2 million deficit.

PROPOSED ADMINISTRATIVE cuts drew a strong response from Trustee Flossie Tonda, who believed reductions should be made in high-level administration.

"My feeling is that last year we

raised the class size and decreased aid," Ms. Tonda said. "We put more work on the aids, we put more work on the teachers and we put more work on the principals and assistant principals."

"Everyone's got to bite the bullet. I think this is what the community feels. You can't keep chopping below the line (lower-level administration) and not chop above the line."

Superintendent John Hoben said he makes no apologies and believes there is no overload in the schools' administrative structure.

He also quoted figures from 1980-81 statistics compiled by the Wayne County Intermediate School District, saying Plymouth-Canton spends \$29.67 per pupil on general administration.

The average administrative figure for 36 Wayne County school districts is \$58.96 per pupil, according to those statistics. Plymouth-Canton ranks 29th of 36 in this category.

Hoben is tired of hearing all the comments about high administrative costs in the Plymouth-Canton district, he said.

MS. TONDA WAS worried about budget cuts directly affecting students.

"Every time we cut, we cut where it hits the kids directly, and the cuts over the line (in high-level administration) do not hit the kids directly," Ms. Tonda said.

Treasurer Glenn Schroeder and trustee Tom Yack felt a need for this particular level of administration to properly

organize and plan the district.

"Those functions still have to be carried out," Schroeder said. "I don't think you can chop the head off the snake and still make the department run."

Vice President Elaine Kirchgatter said people don't understand the work and time involved with administration in this district. Cuts could be made through attrition, she believes.

Shirley Spaniel, executive director of elementary education, said a cut in administration would mean a reduction in district functions.

"If you, as a board, want to cut above the line, then you have to decide what function you have to do without," Ms. Spaniel said.

Ms. Tonda did not agree.

"The duties have to stay, but we have to double up on the functions of these people (administrators)," Ms. Tonda said.

SCHOOL OFFICIALS estimate \$41.4 million in revenues and \$43.644 million in expenditures for the 1982-83 operating budget — a deficit of \$2.244 million.

These figures are in a "state of flux," however, because of uncertainties in projected enrollment and state aid, Hoben said. Deficits range anywhere from \$1.2 to \$5 million.

The district also faces negotiations with all seven organized labor groups. Contracts expire this fall. An increase of 1 percent in salaries represents an additional \$300,000, Hoben said.

EUGENE DALEY, newly appointed member of the Canton Planning Commission, recently resigned from the Zoning Board of Appeals because of his new appointment.

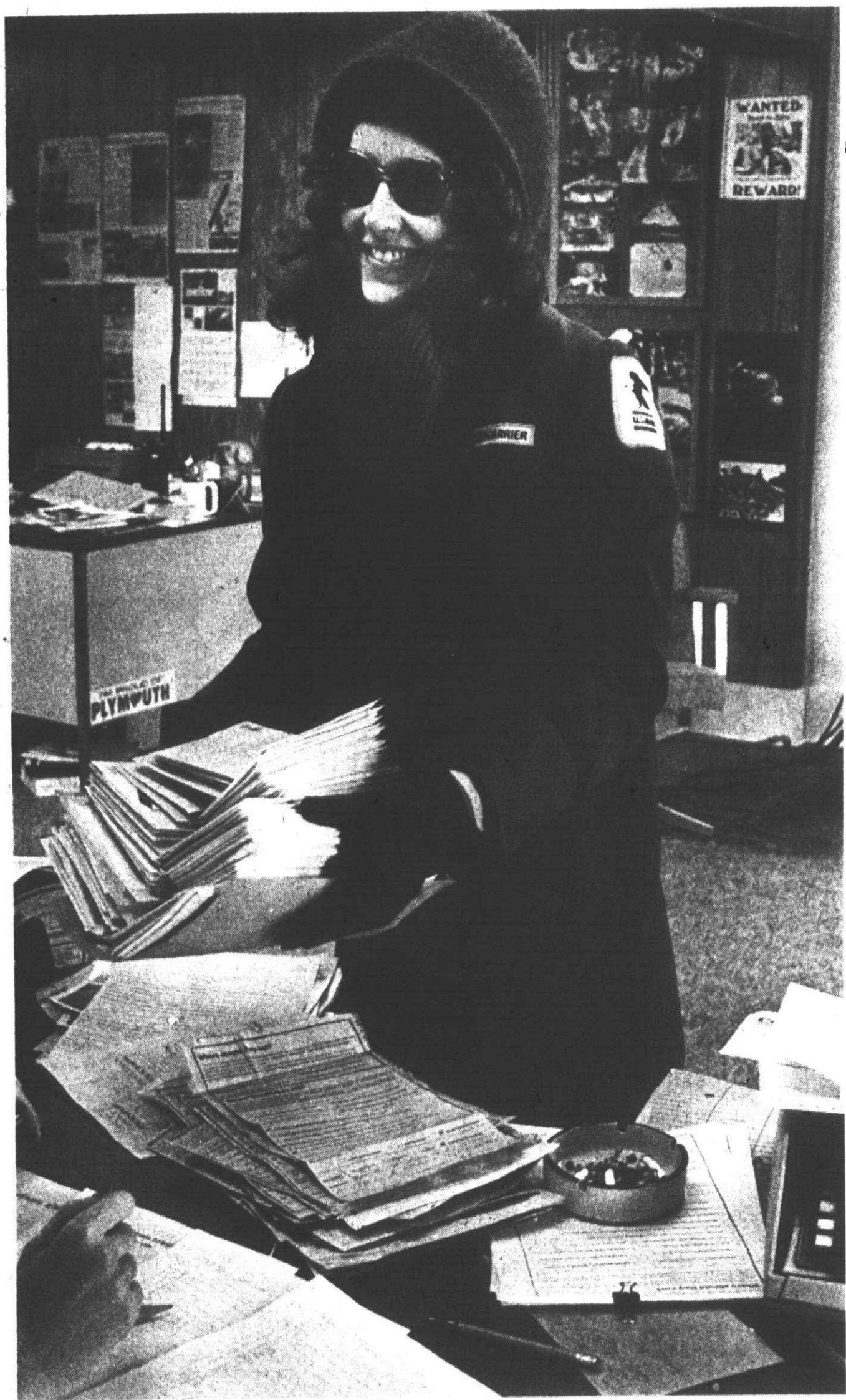

Former Canton activist

Ernest Koch dead at 39

Services for Ernest Koch of Dexter, a former Canton community leader, were scheduled for 10 a.m. today at Old St. Patrick Church in Dexter.

Mr. Koch, 39, died Wednesday in Detroit after choking on food during a business dinner at Carl's Chop House restaurant.

An annuities manager for Hartford Insurance Co., about three years ago, he moved with his wife Judy, and daughters Amy, now 14, and Katie, 12, to Dexter, north of Ann Arbor.

During the 1970s, Mr. Koch served as an officer of the Windsor Park Subdivision Association in Canton and helped

establish the Divine Savior Catholic Church in Westland.

"It's been quite a shock," said Canton Supervisor James Poole. "We were really close friends. Our families went canoeing together up the Rifle River, north of Standish."

WHILE LIVING in Canton, the Kochs and several other Catholic families held worship services in Fiegel Elementary School.

"They humorously used to call it St. Fiegel," said Mrs. Koch's sister, Mary Lewandowski, of Ann Arbor.

The family helped raise money to

build Divine Savior Catholic Church on Joy Road in Westland. "They had a 10-acre parcel of land which they purchased a few years ago (in Dexter)," said Mrs. Lewandowski. "They had a contemporary home. He did a lot of the work himself."

"He was active with his family," she continued. "He was a good father."

The Kochs had joined the Old St. Patrick Church, said Mrs. Lewandowski. Mr. Koch became an usher and joined the men's club.

The family requests memorial contributions be sent to the church of one's choice.

Police report rise in crime

Car thefts, break-ins and assaults increased in 1981.

Robberies were at about the same level as the previous year, and fraudulent activities decreased.

A recently compiled police department report breaks down criminal activities in Canton for 1981.

Overall, complaints increased 10 percent over the previous year. The department logged 20,218 complaints, which generated 10,291 written reports — an increase of 24.5 percent.

UNIFORMED OFFICERS made 183 arrests for felony charges. Some additional arrests were made by detectives.

Police Chief Jerry Cox attributes the increased crime figures to "better reporting and better accountability."

"The other side of that whole issue is there is increased economic need and available time," said Cox. "Many of them are young-people crimes."

More people out of work these days, and "A percentage of them allow themselves to get into that (crime) situation," he said.

Police investigated 17 percent more accidents, but drunk driving arrests declined.

THE YEAR-END report indicates forcible entries of Canton homes and

businesses increased 11 percent. A total of 554 cases were reported in '81, compared to 501 for the previous year.

There were 14 robberies in '81, up one from the earlier year.

Larceny — including shoplifting and thefts of items from businesses and cars — increased 27 percent. There were 1,375 cases reported in '81, compared to 1,084 for the year before.

Declines were reported in the fraudulent activities category, which includes practices such as switching price tags and trying to obtain refunds on stolen items.

There were 51 reported cases in this category a 35-percent drop from the 79 cases recorded in 1980.

DRUNK-DRIVING arrests were down 26 percent. Cox said writing reports saps available time for other activities. The decline in possession of stolen car cases can be linked to lower traffic enforcement.

"It's down because traffic involvement is down," said Cox. "It's normally discovered as a result of a traffic stop while the car is moving around on the road. The opportunity to discover those crimes is down."

Cox hopes to overcome the manpower and time gap by hiring more part-time and reserve officers and by concentrating heavily on neighborhood watch and crime prevention programs.

Ministers oppose role-playing game

A minister plans to meet with Plymouth-Canton school officials this week to ask that a fantasy role-playing game be taken out of the schools.

The Rev. Gregory Gentry of Canton Calvary Assembly of God recently met with several ministers to discuss his objections to Dungeons and Dragons (D&D) and share his plan to meet with school officials.

D&D is one part of a West Middle School elective course called "Games, Games, Games." Gentry claims the game also is being played officially and unofficially in other schools in the district.

D&D is an unending role-playing game in which players "become" imaginary characters and are led on adventures, which include battles, by a referee (dungeon master). The framework for the characters and make-believe voyages are set up in several D&D handbooks.

lieve voyages are set up in several D&D handbooks.

Gentry claims the game has a negative spiritual influence on the student players due to the game's emphasis on magic, crimes, sorcery, witchcraft and the occult.

GENTRY HELD his meeting and called ministers to inform them of the dangers of the game. He encouraged the ministers to educate their congregations about what the game involves.

Quoting from an article in Christianity Today, which described the game using portions from the handbooks, Gentry said:

"The Players Handbook reminds players that 'Swords and sorcery best describe what this game is all about.' Although the game is make-believe, the handbook also says 'It is so interesting, so challenging, so mind-unleashing that it comes near reality.'"

Frightful!

Auditions risky, but students show desire

The fear is over.

Auditions for this spring's school musical, "Mame," were completed two weeks ago.

Gloria Logan, drama instructor at Plymouth Salem, and Betty Weideman, vocal music teacher at Plymouth Canton, watched 112 students act, sing and dance for a chance to participate in the play. The teachers filled 47 parts, 18 of which were speaking roles.

And it wasn't easy for the students.

"They're terrified, especially an adolescent," said Ms. Logan. "They have a sense of risk (coupled) with a great sense of desire."

RONNIE MELNIK, 11, of Hulsing Elementary School, and Robin Comer, a Canton High School student, won the leading roles. Melnik, who beat out 12

other young boys, will play the role of young Patrick Dennis. Ms. Comer will be Mame.

All participants needed to have three skills — read lines, sing and dance, Ms. Logan said.

And, at times, Ms. Logan and Ms. Weideman

found it hard to make decisions.

The hardest thing to do was matching people with roles. Often they found themselves wishing for "that voice — in that body — with those feet," Ms. Logan said. "(You) had to be a triple threat. This show — you had to have all three."

THIS YEAR'S cast includes 75 percent new faces, showing how hard it was to succeed.

Both teachers spent more than 40 hours going over notes and critiques after auditions and prior to matching people to roles.

"I have to bottom-line it in terms of quality," Ms. Logan said. "Three thousand people will see it. We have to keep over production level high."

In the 12 years Ms. Logan has directed these productions, 43 of her students earned scholarships in drama or theater. Of these 43, 37 still earn a living in theater.

The Logans brought together the musicians, actors and actresses for the first reading of the play, during auditions in late January. This helped all students get to know each other and appreciate and understand their respective roles in the play, they said.

IN THE PAST, the groups met one week before the production. In fact, musicians did not know the story line of the play until that moment.

For the first time, musicians also experienced the audition process. Past productions did not include musical auditions.

The pit orchestra includes 27 people who survived the audition procedure.

"They're excellent," Logan said of his orchestra. "They are the finest players from Plymouth's top groups."

"This is a very 'showy' musical. We have everything from banjos to oboes."

This year's production also includes a lot of "team spirit" — thanks to the Logans.

Gentry also quoted from the D&D Deities and Demigods book.

"Serving a deity is a significant part of D&D, and all player characters should have a patron god. Alignment assumes its full importance when tied to the worship of a deity."

Worship of the D&D gods is idolatry, Gentry said. "There is only one God and he is Jesus Christ, our Lord," he said.

"THE GAME requires a tremendous amount of reading, training and deep involvement. It's not something you sit down and play for an hour.

"To bring it into the school and let it be an elective is letting it go too far. It's being played officially or unofficially at both high schools and in the junior highs. And other schools have clubs hosting it.

"It's really influencing young minds towards that which is demonic. It is negative spiritual influence," he said.

Dr. John Telford, director of secondary education, said he wasn't certain if the game is being played in schools other than West.

"D&D is a game that does require lots of thought. It challenges the logical mind," Telford said.

THE "GAMES, Games, Games" elective is set up to let students learn and play a variety of games, said Robert Smith, West principal.

"Some of the students in the class were interested in playing D&D. They had been meeting after school to play it," Smith said.

"We haven't spent any money on the games. We're not providing instruction, just a place to play.

"We've met with Pastor Gentry and some of his people and about eight of our staff members. He expressed his concerns, but nothing has been substantiated about the effects of the game."

The D&D handbooks are published by TSR Hobbies. The company claims the game is a beneficial tool in having players expand their imaginations.

"The game develops increased interest in learning, reading, history, mythology and mathematics," said Brian Pritzer, TSR's director of public relations.

"The players aren't competing with each other. They work together, which makes it a great sociological tool. It's merely a game — all the fantasy in the game is imaginary.

"The characters can cast spells, but they are imaginary spells. The rule book writer created the spells in a tongue-in-cheek manner."

Both game systems are based on advancement. After several weeks of play, the basic book will become obsolete to the D&D player, according to the basic handbook.

Gentry has compiled both pro and con information on the game. He invites anyone seeking more information about D&D to stop by the church office, 7933 N. Sheldon, during office hours.

PREPARING FOR and playing the game entail a lot of time, Pitzer said. However, it is up to the individual to do his homework or fulfill his other responsibilities before playing a game.

Although the game is imaginary, Gentry says the deep involvement of the players and the nature of the game make it dangerous.

Dr. John E. Holmes, who edited the D&D Basic Set rule book, describes the game in an article he wrote for Psychology Today, November 1980. Holmes is a staff physician at Los Angeles County Hospital and teaches neurology at the University of Southern California.

D&D was created in 1974 by Gary Gygax. Now

there are two D&D game systems. The basic D&D game includes the basic and expert sets. The second system is Advanced D&D, which includes five hard-bound books.

Avid D&D fans can supplement their materials with miniature D&D figures and a monthly D&D magazine, Dragon.

Gas leak fuels blaze at mobile home park

An early-morning gas leak sparked a fire that destroyed a mobile home at West Point Manor mobile home park off Michigan and I-275.

The Canton fire department and Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. are investigating the cause of a gas line break, which occurred shortly after 2 a.m. Feb. 10, said Fire Chief Mel Paulun.

"A mobile home was totally destroyed," said Paulun. "The gas line kept feeding the fire. It kept starting again."

THE GAS LINE is at the east side of the destroyed mobile home. The owner told officials he heard a small explosion outside before the mobile home caught fire.

The residents escaped unhurt, said Paulun. A neighbor flagged down Canton police officers, who went to the mobile home park and alerted other residents.

"We had flames 15 to 25 feet high," said Paulun. There were no injuries.

The fire department was on the scene for eight hours.

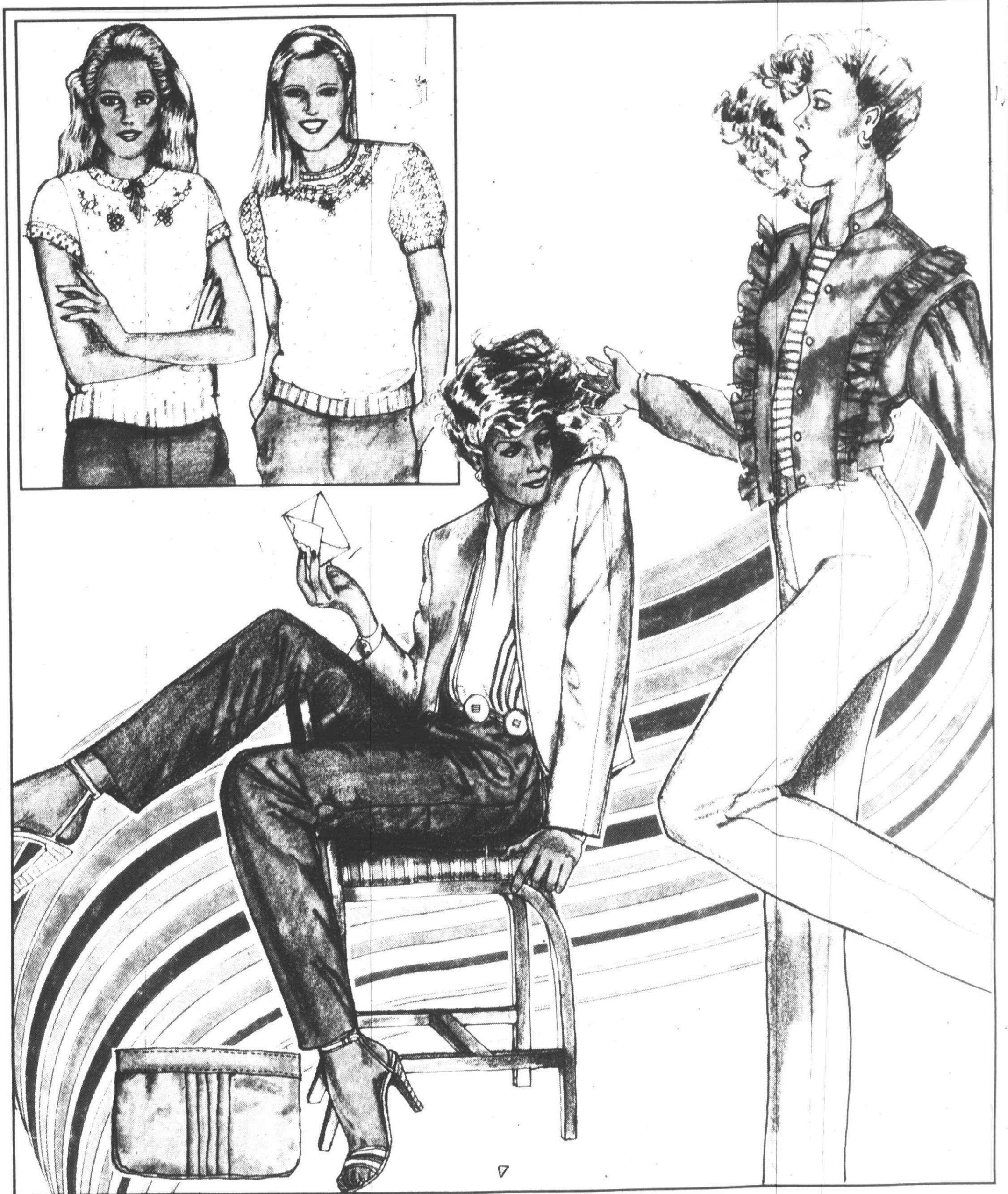

County road commission merry-go-round continues

To the garden variety taxpayer, a court "motion" seems like a procedural maneuver which only nit-picking attorneys bicker about.

But the argument over a motion in the case of Killen vs. the Wayne County Road Commission (WCRC) in circuit court last week has some far-reaching implications. People who want to reform county governments, either in Wayne or anywhere else, should take notice.

The WCRC and a "union" of 74 administrators, as defendants, moved for a summary judgment from Judge David C. Vokes. Their attorneys said the public officeholders "who were attacking their labor contract lacked "standing" to sue — that is, they had no legal right to complain.

ATTORNEY MILTON Mack Jr., representing the officials, called the WCRC's labor contract with its administrators "self-serving," "unprecedented" and "a flagrant attempt to circumvent the new Wayne County charter."

And Mack argued that if his four clients lack standing to sue, "who can? The road commission itself? Unlikely. The association (union)? Hardly."

WCRC Attorney Joseph Sullivan scarcely concealed his sarcasm as he went over the list of persons attacking the contract as a sweetheart deal to stave off reorganization by a county executive.

County Commissioner George Killen? "That Mr. Killen is a member of the board of commissioners has nothing to do with it," said Sullivan. "He does not speak for the board of commissioners. There is no allegation this contract will impact on him more than any other commissioner."

Sen. John Hertel? "Sen. Hertel does not speak, or purport to be speaking, for the Michigan Senate," said Sullivan.

George Ward of Detroit and Justine Barns of Westland, chair and vice-chair, respectively, of the Wayne County Charter Commission?

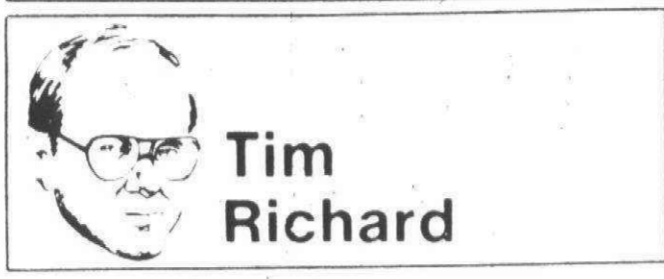
Ditto, said Sullivan, scoffing at their affidavits as "not facts but just conclusions in law."

Besides, argued the road commission attorney, the case should be before the Michigan Employment Relations Commission (MERC), not circuit court.

MACK SAID that if his four clients lacked standing, then no one could halt implementation of the sweetheart contract, and county reform could be frustrated under the guise of contract law.

Killen, he said, had standing because as a county board member he voted on budgets for the charter commission and had a stake in seeing a charter implemented.

Hertel, Mack went on, helped push the enabling act through the Senate but now finds that the WCRC and management "union" now "seeks to evade a

policy of the state for which I, as a senator, voted." (Mack didn't add that Hertel is running for county executive and, if elected, would have his powers trimmed by the contract.)

Ward and Barns did more than just vote for the charter, Mack said. "They wrote it and put it on the ballot."

And as for the contention that the contract could be challenged only before MERC, Mack replied, "MERC has jurisdiction over unfair labor practices. This is not an unfair labor practice case."

JUDGE VOKES didn't decide whether to dismiss the case last week. He said he wants to study all the briefs and affidavits.

To the four officials who want to see the contract dissolved, his decision is crucial. If Vokes rules they have standing to sue, they have an excellent chance of winning the battle over the contract itself. If Vokes rules they lack standing, it's all over — not only in the effort to reform Wayne County but in other counties studying Wayne.

What makes the contract so bad, in the view of Mack and his clients, is that it would frustrate a county executive's powers to reorganize the road commission through his power of appointment and removal. The real power, they argue, will have been given away in the contract with the 74 top-level administrators. Mack gave these examples:

- No layoffs are possible unless there is a lack of funds or lack of work. And who determines those conditions? The administrators themselves, said Mack, arguing it's "as self-serving a proposition as could be imagined."
- No performance evaluations are possible.
- The contract runs for six years, which means the new county executive elected in November won't be able to touch the administrators during his first two terms in office.

THE ATTORNEY for the road commission management union had his reply. Erwin Ellmann painted a sympathetic picture of a group "half of whose members are minority or female," a group composed of many college graduates, engineers, lawyers and other professionals.



This group, Ellmann said, saw its civil service protection eroded by the charter voters adopted last Nov. 3 and saw a union as the only way to protect itself.

The union lawyer called Killen, Hertel, Ward and Barns mere "bystanders who have no right to second-guess the decision of the parties themselves," meaning the WCRC and the management "union."

And he said the law of the land places a contract above the provisions of a charter or ordinance.

Which is why Mack's clients were so upset in the first place. Mack accused the WCRC and "union" of a "public be damned" attitude and of "trying to subvert the charter" by insulating the managers with a sweetheart union contract.

But before Mack can actually argue that point, he has to prove to Judge Vokes his clients have "standing" to sue.

And that's why what appears to be a mere procedural motion over "standing" is as important as the rest of the case itself.

They make me nervous.

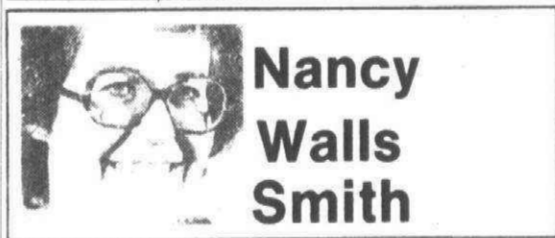
I confess that I'm the type who, if I happen to spy a few snow flurries before I go to bed, can lose an entire night's sleep worrying about whether my car

With snow in huge piles and still falling it was only natural that the conversation turned to big storms of the past and the odd experiences that befell those who were brave enough to battle the drifts.

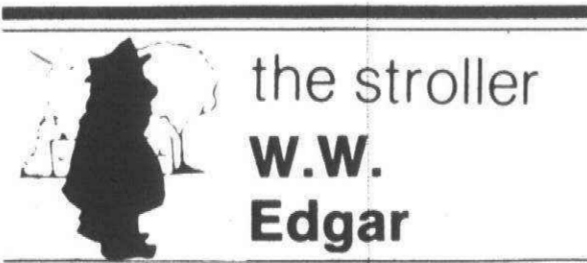
One after the other around the table recalled some of the most peculiar happenings. The Stroller listened with interest for he had gone through some of the most fearful moments of his life while battling the elements.

For instance there was the Sunday morning when, en route to Sunday school, he sank waist deep in a heavy drift and couldn't move.

For some moments he stood there with fear in his heart. At the time he was attempting to set a record for perfect attendance, and no excuses — even being stuck in a snowdrift — would be accepted.

Fortunately, an older fellow came along. He sized up the situation and pulled the young Stroller out of the drift and helped him to the Sunday school, which was about a half mile away.

That kind gentleman saved the day. He did more than that. By attending Sunday school that snowy Sunday, The Stroller was able to keep his string going and eventually go on to set a record of 20 years of perfect attendance.

So far as he knows that record still stands back home.

Years later The Stroller had another rare moment that has lived with him through the years.

There always was a race to determine which group of young fellows could build the best and swiftest sled. This particular year our group, working in almost complete secrecy, finally came to the hill with a new model. This one was built low to escape wind resistance and was steered by a wheel, much after the fashion of the automobiles.

It seated 10 persons and was so low that each rider had to hold up the legs of the person right behind. When it came time for the initial run, The Stroller had to hold up the legs of a girl — Montana Shellheimer — and in a few moments we were off on the trial run. We didn't get very far. About halfway down

the hill something went wrong. The bobsled skidded, then turned over, and we were sprawled all over the hill.

One by one we got up. That is all but Montana. She lay there and had to be lifted. She couldn't walk. When she was taken to a doctor it was found that she had suffered a broken leg. The Stroller was accused of holding her leg too tight. It has been years since The Stroller has heard from her. And he often wonders if she, too, recalls that ride (part-way) down the Pine Street hill.

On another occasion, on one of the popular sleigh rides of the time, we travelled eight miles out in a large hay wagon drawn by four horses. On the way home in the drifts one of the horses reared up and collapsed.

It was past midnight. There was little chance of getting help. So, the old horse was taken from the four-way harness, and we decided to have him walk along in the back of the wagon. Then came the laugh. The Stroller was the only "single" on the trip, so he was selected to ride the animal back home.

Imagine that! Starting out in early evening on a sleigh ride and coming home astride a horse in the wee hours of the morning.

Yes, the snows have brought about some unusual experiences.

Marketing autos poorly

PARENTS CAN thank Marianne Garris for the workshop, "Self-Care to Save Costs," which will be offered free on Saturday. The workshop will be from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Feb. 20 at St. John Neumann Church, Warren between Sheldon and Canton Center, roads, Canton Township.

It all started when Marianne read an article in a magazine about taking a more active role in health consumerism. She read the books recommended in the article. In talking to other parents, she discovered they shared her interest. While they "shopped" intelligently for groceries and appliances, they were lacking in background knowledge to judiciously select health care for their young families.

The article also listed sources for more information and organizations that offered workshops. None of those listed in the metropolitan Detroit area panned out. Finally, Marianne talked to Suzanne Antisdal, director of the Metropolitan Detroit Health Education Council.

"We have been working on this for a year," said Marianne. "Suzanne had to take it to her board for approval. I finally found a location, St. John Neumann, where I am a member. I compiled a list of local contacts, persons I believed would be interested."

SESSIONS SCHEDULED for the workshop will be: "How to get the health care my family needs" — how to choose a doctor, how to talk to a doctor and get needed information, the best places to go for our health needs, free community health services.

Marianne says she wants to be "treated with respect by doctors when I talk to them."

The "Family Stress" session will deal with what it is, why it's there, what to do about it; stress in special situations, what are the options? Do we always need a professional?

"Drug Consumerism" will explain what drugs should be in our medicine cabinets, how to save money and buy only the drugs my family needs, cautions about drug interactions.

"Prevention" session will encompass how parents can safely diagnose, treat and medicate at home; how to recognize when professional help is needed; how to use nutrition, exercise and lifestyle to keep family well.

There will be a film presentation on child auto safety and basic home care books will be displayed and discussed. Participants are encouraged to bring a brown bag lunch for a casual rap session. For information or to register, call 541-8386.

Marianne hopes the workshop will result in wiser consumerism of professional health services.

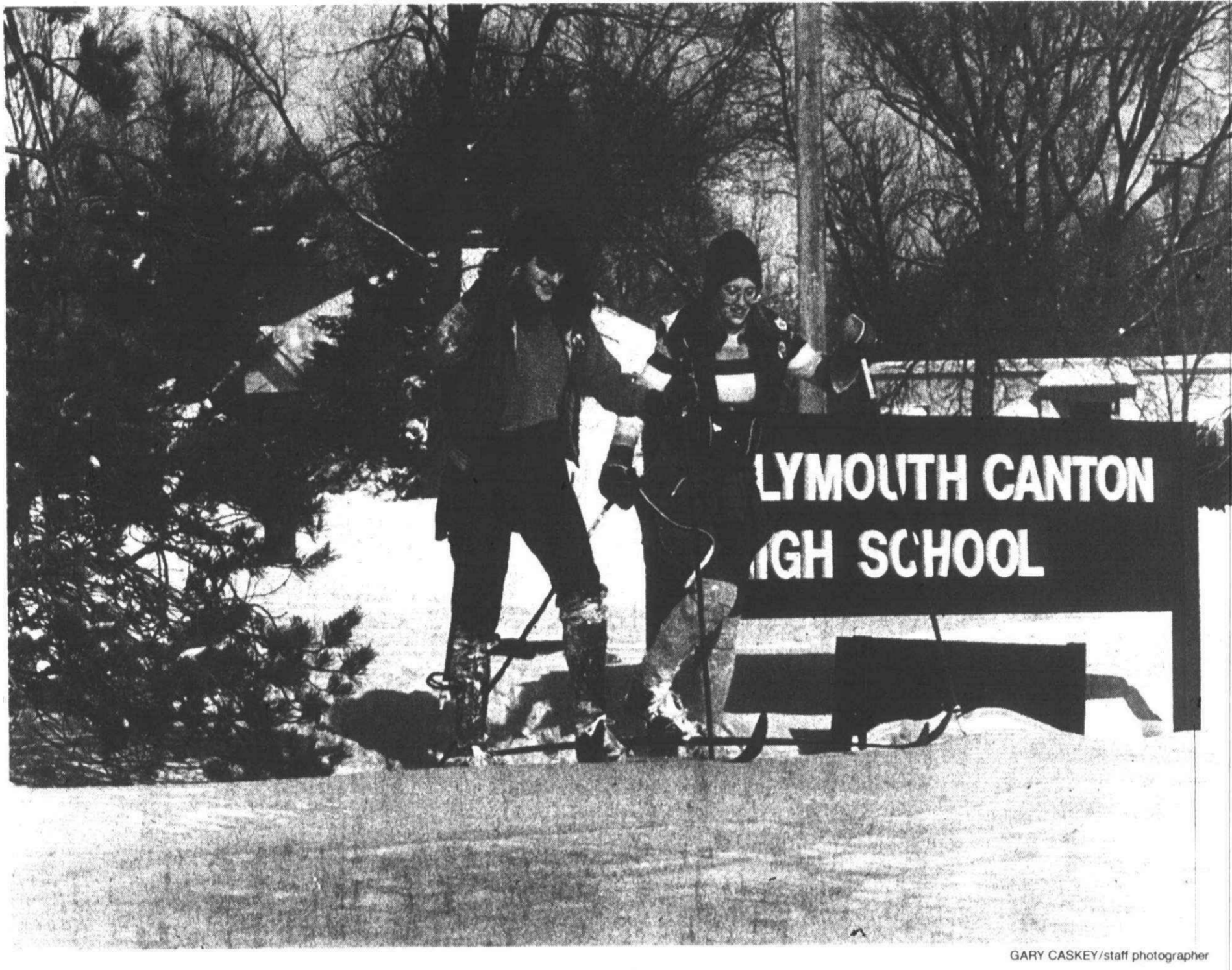

Media women get distorted on film and TV

The Hollywood version of women in the media professions is doing the real ones more harm than good, in the opinion of Jessica Savitch of NBC television.

And to prove her point when she keynoted a women's career conference in the Westin Hotel last week, she took Jane Fonda's roll in the film "China Syndrome" as an example.

"As a television reporter, she was always assigned to do fashion and fluff," the newscaster told a gathering of about 3,000 women.

"And when she got her chance to report a big news story about a nuclear accident, she got all choked up and was so emotional she was inarticulate.

"Sure, it was an emotional time, but it was her job to report the news and she couldn't get the words out."

MS. SAVITCH talked about how women have made strides in the broadcast industry but also made it plain she thinks there are tough roads ahead. When she began her educational career at Ithaca College in 1964, she noted, women television reporters were nonexistent.

Today, she went on, most of the old tricks about women of the television reporters have virtually been wiped out,

but "unfortunately they've been replaced by new ones."

She said it used to be that women weren't hired as correspondents and anchors because station managers said they didn't have authoritative voices — like men.

"They also believed that women shouldn't do the 11 p.m. news because women at home at 11 o'clock were at their worst time of the day, tired from

the kids and with their hair in curlers," she went on.

"They thought women at home couldn't cope with a woman dressed nicely at 11 p.m. telling them the news."

The "they" who thought up the theories she identified as "television executives — who were men, of course."

"There was no shred of evidence about it," she added.

THOSE MYTHS were dispelled by women's success stories, Ms. Savitch told her audience.

Then her voice turned somewhat sour as she explained the new variety.

"One of the new myths shows that women can succeed in the media business if they are immoral or asexual," she said. "That's what they did with Fay Dunaway in 'Network'."

Another new myth claims that women can't grow old as television anchors, she stated, "but they won't know that for sure until the current crop of reporters and anchors passes 40."

She called television shows and commercials "the worst offenders."

"They show women at home as mindless, spineless idiots. And if they work and aren't Superwomen, then they're anything less than inadequate," Ms. Savitch contended.

"Jessica Novack" (a now-defunct television show about a broadcast jour-

nalist) was always getting so involved with her sources that she couldn't do a news story."

Ms. Savitch said in her half-hour lecture that the most important quality a

person should have in the broadcast industry is stamina.

"You can have talent and good looks, but if you don't have stamina, you don't have it," she concluded.

Get the saving habit, broker tells women

"Most people are so busy earning a living, they don't know how to manage the money they make," believes investment broker Jeanne Anderson.

Ms. Anderson was one of the 100 speakers last Friday at a career orientation for women in the Detroit's Westin Hotel. Her half-hour seminar featured financial advice.

The former school teacher explained that money means independence, and smart investing yields more money in the pocketbook.

"Women should learn to take care of themselves financially, and the reason most of them fail is because they procrastinate and fail to set goals," she said.

Expanding that if women don't set concrete career plans and goals for themselves, they'll never get ahead, she offered this advice:

"Write your goals down. Ask yourself, where do I want to be a year from now, five years from now and in my 60s? And most important, get in the habit of saving money for yourself."

Ms. Anderson advised women to inquire about money market certificate savings, which yield higher interest payments than passbook accounts, to learn about tax laws and to open an Individual Retirement Account.

"I don't care if you beg, borrow or steal the money for the IRA," she concluded. "But open one."

Decorators' showcase funds at scholarship

One of Ann Arbor's stately old mansions, the Hermitage, has been converted to a decorator's showcase to raise money for the Guy Palazzola Memorial Scholarship Fund. The home was opened to the public on Valentine's Day with an "Arts and Flowers" theme featuring many paintings and floral displays.

It will remain open for one month from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday and noon to 4 p.m. Sunday. Admission is \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for senior citizens, students and children. Interior design firms have worked for several months on a total redesign of

the interior of the Hermitage, 1808 Hermitage Road, off Ferdon. Now a private residence, the 65-year-old building has been used at various times as a University of Michigan fraternity house.

All proceeds go to the School of Art scholarship fund which is named in honor of Guy Palazzola, longtime U-M art professor and associate art dean, who died in 1978.

PALAZZOLA was widely known for his painting demonstrations, which were broadcast on television stations across the country and distributed

through Michigan Media at U-M.

The Three Cities Art Club sponsored a Palazzola appearance several years ago at Plymouth Salem High School auditorium. The artist demonstrated painting mountain scenery in acrylics.

The decorators' showcase was organized by Marguerite Oliver, one of Palazzola's former art students; Louise Palazzola, his widow; and June Handy, an Ann Arbor resident.

A wide array of antiques and artwork will be in the showcase, including artwork by Palazzola. Both the artworks and the antiques will be for sale.

Interior design will focus on first-floor living and dining areas, kitchen, sunroom and study; seven second-story bedrooms as well as sitting rooms, hallways and bathroom; and a separate three-bedroom apartment on the building's third story. Each design firm concentrated on a different area of the building.

Other highlights are a functioning outdoor hot tub, exterior landscaping, an unusual Danish rosewood dining-room table, and a complete redesign of the kitchen.

Beverages, snacks and lunch will be served daily in a cafe in the garden

room. There will be live music at various times and cooking demonstrations.

THE HERMITAGE has been the residence of U-M Prof. Jesse Gordon and his wife, Anitra, and their family. It is presently for sale. Previously, it was owned by Phi Sigma Delta fraternity for more than 20 years. Before that time, the history of the building is sketchy.

The house was built around 1917 by Ann Arbor Judge Marvin Ives, according to the Ann Arbor Historical District Commission. Judge Ives also owned and later subdivided much of the area now known as Ives Woods.

It is believed that the house was empty for a number of years after the Ives left. During the 1920s and 1930s it was owned by the U-M's Hermitage Society, a fraternal organization. The building originally was listed in the city records as being on Ferdon Street. The address was changed to Hermitage after that street was built.

The study committee of the proposed Washtenaw-Hill Historical District which has identified some 40 historical landmarks in that section of the city has included the Hermitage on that list. The home was opened for an Ann Arbor historic house tour.

The Hoover Mansion on Washtenaw Avenue had a similar decorator's showcase in 1978. It netted proceeds of \$75,000, which were used to construct five intensive-care units at C.S. Mott Children's Hospital at U-M.

Food and our way of life: Can we learn to enjoy eating more healthfully?

This is the fifth in a series of 15 articles exploring "Food and People." In this article, Johanna Dwyer, a nutritionist at the Tufts University Medical School, discusses how we can eat more healthfully and enjoy it. Americans have long prided themselves on their high standard of living. Many of us assume that our

affluence has brought us better food and better health than almost anywhere in the world.

It therefore comes as a shock to realize that some other countries may be enjoying better health than we are.

For example, despite recent advances in curative medicine, American death rates from coronary heart disease are still five times those of Japan, triple those of France, twice those of Italy, and a good deal higher than rates in Denmark, Sweden, Germany and Belgium.

We are also fatter than many of our peers in other industrialized countries, and our overall life expectancy is lower than in several other nations.

The explanation for these differences in health does not lie solely in our genes. Rather, the environment of abundance in which we live fosters habits that do violence to our health. Our American way of life, with all its advantages, also provides us with maximum temptations and low-cost opportunities to eat, drink and smoke too much, while we lead increasingly sedentary lives.

Our life style encourage us not only to eat too much, but also to eat the wrong kinds of foods for our health. For example, we spend nearly one-fourth of our food dollars on meals and snacks away from home, especially at fast-food restaurants, which frequently feature foods high in calories. And nearly one-half of the money we spend for meals at home goes for convenience and processed foods, which are often high in fat, sugar and salt.

IMPROVING OUR HEALTH

Fortunately, we are in a position to improve our health without radically changing our lifestyles. New findings from a major study of heart disease prevention conducted at Stanford University show that modest changes in how we eat, drink, smoke

and exercise, which are very much in line with most of the ways we like to live, can reduce and are reducing coronary artery disease.

Those who have succumbed to unhealthy eating habits are not necessarily unwilling to change their diets. Rather, they find it difficult to choose wisely from our abundant food supply. Our supermarkets, for instance, contain many thousands of items. Little wonder consumers are confused. Furthermore, when they do decide to change their diets, they often listen to the wrong advice.

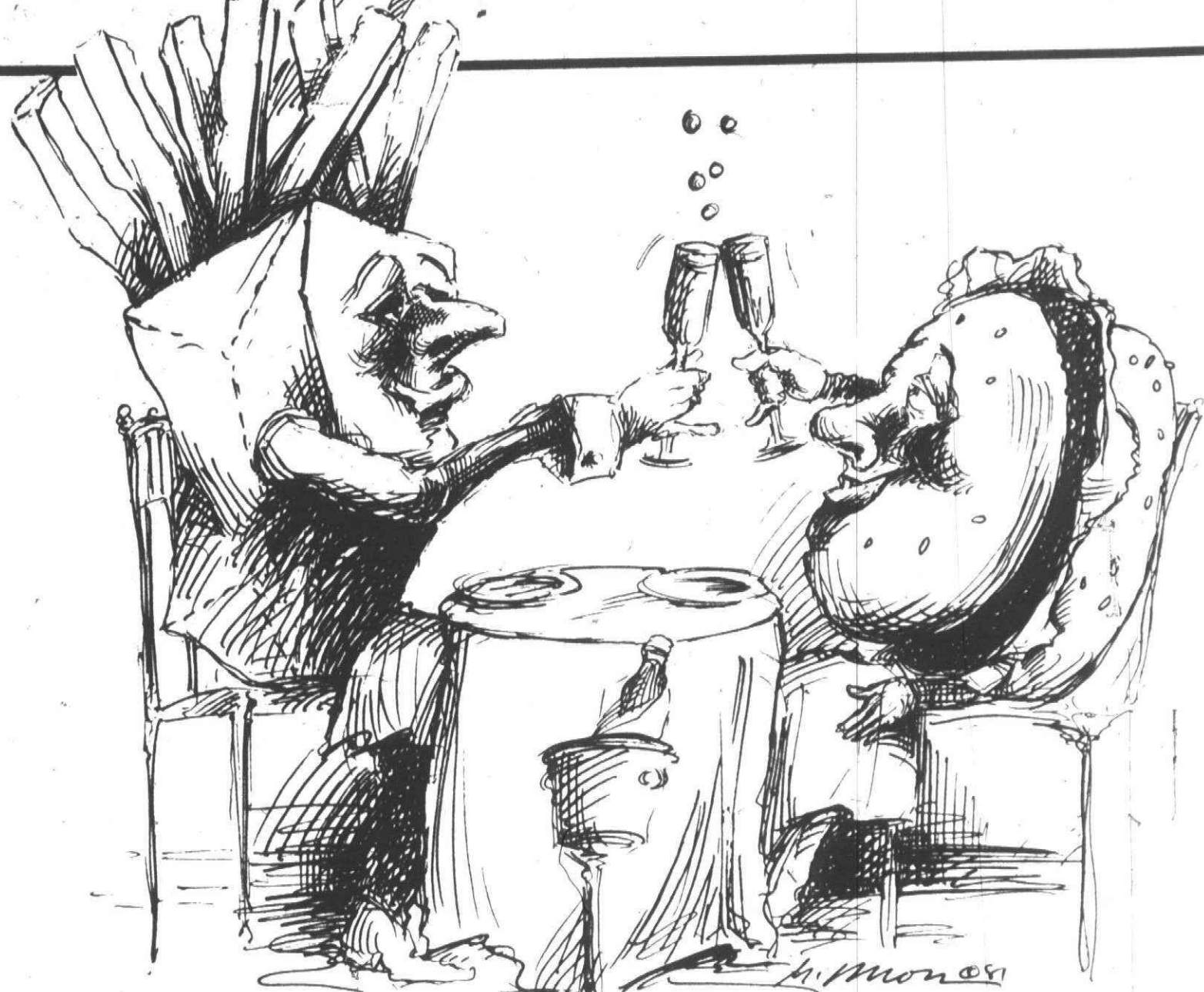
Too often it is fad diets, promoted by extremists in the nutrition profession as well as by self-styled experts, that capture media attention precisely because they are so outlandish and demand such unnecessary sacrifices. Fad diets play on the misconception that healthy diets, like strong medicines, must be unpleasant to be successful. Most also cater to our desires for quick fixes to long-term problems.

In actuality, some fad diets are dangerous because they lack essential vitamins, minerals and other nutrients; most don't work; and all are inconvenient — good reasons for avoiding them. Moreover, fad diets fail to change our long-term eating habits for the better.

In contrast, the real experts recommend rather simple and far less sensational steps for improving our health. They call for gradual changes rather than a headlong rush into a new way of eating, and they emphasize enjoyment rather than a lifetime of pleasure prohibition.

The four principles of enjoyment, variety, balance and moderation are all that are really necessary for eating the healthy way.

Oysters make fine stuffing for meats



Don't let oysters scare you! Even if you don't like them raw, their texture becomes quite different upon cooking.

Oysters can be used to stuff steak, as in the classic Carpetbagger recipe, and they can be especially delicious in a bread stuffing for a holiday turkey or capon. This stuffing uses whole wheat bread for fuller flavor and is scented with thyme. The herbs may be varied to suit your taste.

OYSTER BREAD STUFFING

- 1 pint shucked oysters
- 1 1/2 Tbsp. lemon juice
- Several dashes hot red pepper sauce
- 1/4 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 3/4 tsp. dried thyme leaves
- Salt and ground black pepper to taste (about 1/4 tsp. each)

5 Tbsp. butter or margarine
2 ribs celery with leaves, chopped
1 medium yellow onion, chopped
6 cups whole wheat bread cubes (7-8 slices day-old bread, cut into 1/2-inch cubes)

1. Place oysters in medium bowl. Combine lemon juice with hot pepper sauce and remaining seasonings. Stir gently into oysters. Let marinate while preparing rest of recipe.
2. In large skillet, heat half the butter until hot. Sauté celery and onion under medium heat until crisp-tender, about 5 to 7 minutes. Transfer to large bowl. Melt remaining butter; sauté bread cubes until gold on all sides, about 8 minutes. Stir bread cubes and oysters in celery-onion mixture, tossing gently to thoroughly combine.

3. Place in buttered 1-quart glass casserole. Bake in 350-degree oven 20-25 minutes, or until top is browned. If using a metal baking pan, increase oven temperature 25 degrees and bake 5 minutes less. Makes about 1 quart. Or stuff a 5-pound capon or a 6-pound fish with the mixture. Double recipe for a 10-pound turkey.

TIPS: Fresh or frozen oysters are preferred for this recipe, because their liquor (juice) is used.

Stuffing will be more moist when cooked in a bird or fish. Prepared in a casserole, it is crispier; casserole may be covered the last half of baking for a more moist stuffing.

VARIATIONS: Delicious with grilled chicken or turkey. Herbs may be varied; thyme and sage or marjoram are good combinations.

Learning how to eat better

A VARIETY OF FOODS

Eating a variety of foods assures an adequate supply of all the necessary nutrients. Each of the major food groups is a particularly good source of certain nutrients and should be included in the diet. Bread, cereals and grains, for instance, are good sources of starch, most of the B vitamins and iron. Fruits, especially citrus fruits, provide Vitamin C.

Dark green vegetables supply vitamins A, C, B-2, folic acid, iron and magnesium, while starchy vegetables and beans also provide protein and vitamins B-1 and B-6. Milk products and cheese are essential sources of calcium and of several vitamins, including vitamin D. Meat, poultry, fish and eggs provide protein, phosphorus, iron and B vitamins. Unless prescribed by a doctor, vitamin and mineral supplements are unnecessary.

Thanks to American abundance, food technology and marketing, it is possible to obtain a broad variety of foods throughout the country.

BALANCE

Balance is important to assure adequate amounts of starch and fiber in the diet. Whole grain breads and cereals, vegetables and fruits are high in one or both of these constituents, and many are also low in calories.

The proper balance of nutrients is also important for maintaining desirable weight. Cutting back on calories from the energy rich foods — fats and oils, sugars and sweets, and alcohol — is the easiest way to control weight.

Of course, eating smaller portions of other high-calorie foods and increasing physical activity also help maintain weight. Because most of us expend little physical energy at work, it is important to increase everyday physical activities such as walking and climbing stairs, as well as to include vigorous activities we enjoy — tennis, biking, running, swimming — in our regular routines.

MODERATION

Moderation insures against overconsumption of any particular food component. For most Americans, particularly those who smoke or have high blood pressure, cutting back on fat, saturated fat and cholesterol intakes is sensible. This can be done in part by choosing lean meats and by substituting lowfat or nonfat dairy products for those rich in fats. Since foods high in fat also tend to be high in calories, cutting back on these foods also helps to control weight.

Moderation of our use of sodium is also important; salt has been linked with high blood pressure, and most of us consume far more than necessary. We should learn to enjoy the unsalted flavors of food and to eat sparingly of highly salted snack foods as well as pickled foods, cured meats and condiments.

More than half of the sodium we eat is "hidden" either as part of a naturally occurring food or more

often as a seasoning or preservative that has been added. Reading labels on packaged foods can help us to avoid excessive sodium.

Moderation of alcohol is also wise. Alcoholic beverages are usually high in calories and low in other nutrients. For those who really enjoy alcohol, one or two drinks a day don't appear to cause any major harm in adults, but for most people it is easier to maintain weight and avoid a habit that may lead to excess by making it a more occasional habit.

Finally, it makes sense to moderate sugar use. Many foods that are high in calories are also high in sugar and fat while they are low in protein, vitamins and minerals. We can avoid excessive sugar by using the sugar bowl sparingly and choosing fruits and vegetables processed with little or no sugar. We can also eat less of such high-sugar foods as candy, soft drinks, ice cream, cakes and cookies.

Notice that it is not necessary to deprive ourselves totally of the foods we enjoy. Good food and the American way of life need not be incompatible with good health. All that is necessary is modification of our eating and exercise habits in line with that of the oldest of American virtues, common sense.

If we can take these steps and keep in touch with our physicians for any additional medical measures that may be called for, there is a good chance for dramatic improvements in our health in the next decade.

Eskimos find profit under musk ox locks

The musk ox, a shaggy ice relic, is helping to relieve the desperate poverty of Alaskan arctic villages.

An expanding industry of raising musk oxen and knitting their wool now provides a substantial part of the livelihood for 24 villages in the tundra-coastal region and the Aleutian Islands.

The guiding force behind the industry is John J. Teal Jr., who has been credited with domesticating the first hoofed mammal in 5,000 years. The musk ox, known to the Eskimos as Oomingmak (the bearded one), has proved to be an intelligent and easily-managed farm animal.

With its humped shoulders and dark hair nearly reaching the ground, the musk ox (Ovibus moschatus) looks like small, white-stockinged bison in need of a haircut.

ITS SILKY underwool, "qiviut" to the Eskimos, is the thermal underwear that insulates the animal from the minus 60-degree arctic temperatures. It is one of the finest animal fibers in the world. Remarkably light, warm, and strong, seven pounds of the wool — the amount shed by some bull oxen each year — can be made into 100 scarves.

Qiviut is harvested in the spring when it works its way out past the shaggy guard hairs in long blanket-like strips. Teal says that during shedding, a musk ox "appears to be carrying a sheep around on its back."

When the United States gave two musk oxen, named Matilda and Milton, to the Chinese people in 1972 in exchange for the famous pandas, the Chinese thought the oxen had a rare skin disease and refused to exhibit them until the shedding season ended.

What they were shedding may be the most expensive fiber in the world. "One cone of yarn, about 1½ pounds, produces a cash value in knitted items of \$4,300," Teal said. And the musk ox farm in Unalakleet, Alaska, with 175 animals is producing 600-700 pounds of qiviut each year.

"Our biggest problem now is producing enough wool to meet market demand," he said. "Christmas orders nearly cleaned out our entire stock this year."

Qiviut is knitted into caps, scarves, tunics, and traditional Eskimo Shawls known as "nachaq" ranging in price from \$50 to \$400.

EACH ITEM bears the name of the individual knitter and the unique design of the village based on its archeological artifacts. The knitting patterns

have been translated into symbols so those natives who do not read are able to create the designs.

The Musk Ox Producers Cooperative, run by the herdsman and knitters, manages the farm, market the products, and trains other Eskimos, Aleuts, and Indians in musk ox husbandry and knitting.

Its parent organization, the Institute of Northern Agricultural Research, was set up in 1954 "to use the natural resources of improvised regions to provide cash income as employment to native peoples."

Teal said the cooperative is ready to embark on a

major expansion. This year he expects to announce the location of two new musk ox farms in selected villages and in the next few years he hopes to provide herbs of domesticated musk oxen to other villages that have requested them.

A former Harvard fullback, Teal has made a life's work of musk oxen. He studied them in the wild from 1947 to 1954, then captured some of the animals in northern Canada and took them to his 600-acre farm in Vermont for domestication. In 1964 he set up a breeding station in College, Alaska, and by 1975 had enough animals to establish the successful farm in Unalakleet.

Domestication has led to the production of up to one-third more wool per animal, earlier maturity for breeding, and the ability to bear offspring every year.

Teal also provided musk ox herds for breeding stations for the Inuit at Old Fort Chimo, Quebec, in 1967, and for the Laplanders in Bardu, Norway, in 1969. He now plans to establish a musk ox station on land in southwest Greenland that was Eric the Red's farm in the 10th century.

Hunted to extinction in Alaska in the mid-1800s, wild musk oxen were reintroduced to the Bering Sea island of Nunivak — where they thrive — by the U.S. Department of the Interior in the 1930s. Prehistorically, they ranged across North America and Eurasia, but their natural habitat is now limited to northern Canada and Greenland.

TEAL INSISTS that taming these wild, ferocious-looking beasts was easy. "They quickly develop trust in man and become docile, playful, affectionate, and fiendishly clever," he said.

"They respond to their own names when called, and they love to unlatch gates, play pushball, and ride on sleds. One can develop special friendships with individual musk oxen just as with dogs."

Vietnam vets may get extra benefits

Thousands of Michigan Vietnam era veterans may be eligible for a one-time, two-year extension of their G.I. Bill limiting date.

Gordon Clowney, director of VA's Regional Office in Detroit, said that the Veterans' Health Care, Training and Small Business Loan Act of 1981 signed training programs to educationally disadvantaged or unskilled Vietnam era veterans who allowed their 10-year delimiting date to expire before using all their entitlement for G.I. Bill training. The extension period began Jan. 1, 1982 and ends Dec. 31, 1983.

Eligible veterans may use their remaining entitlement to receive benefits for high school training, if they do not have a high school diploma or equivalent, or vocational, apprenticeship or

other on-the-job training, if the VA determines that training is needed because the veteran is unskilled.

Payment for high school training will be limited to the cost of tuition and fees charged. Payment for vocational, apprenticeship or other on-the-job training will be at the regular G.I. Bill rates.

Enrollment in college degree courses, correspondence and flight training is not allowed. Veterans with employment assistance following completion of their training to help them find suitable employment.

Clowney urges all potentially eligible veterans to contact the Detroit Regional Offices for further information. Veterans residing in the Detroit metro area should call 964-5110.

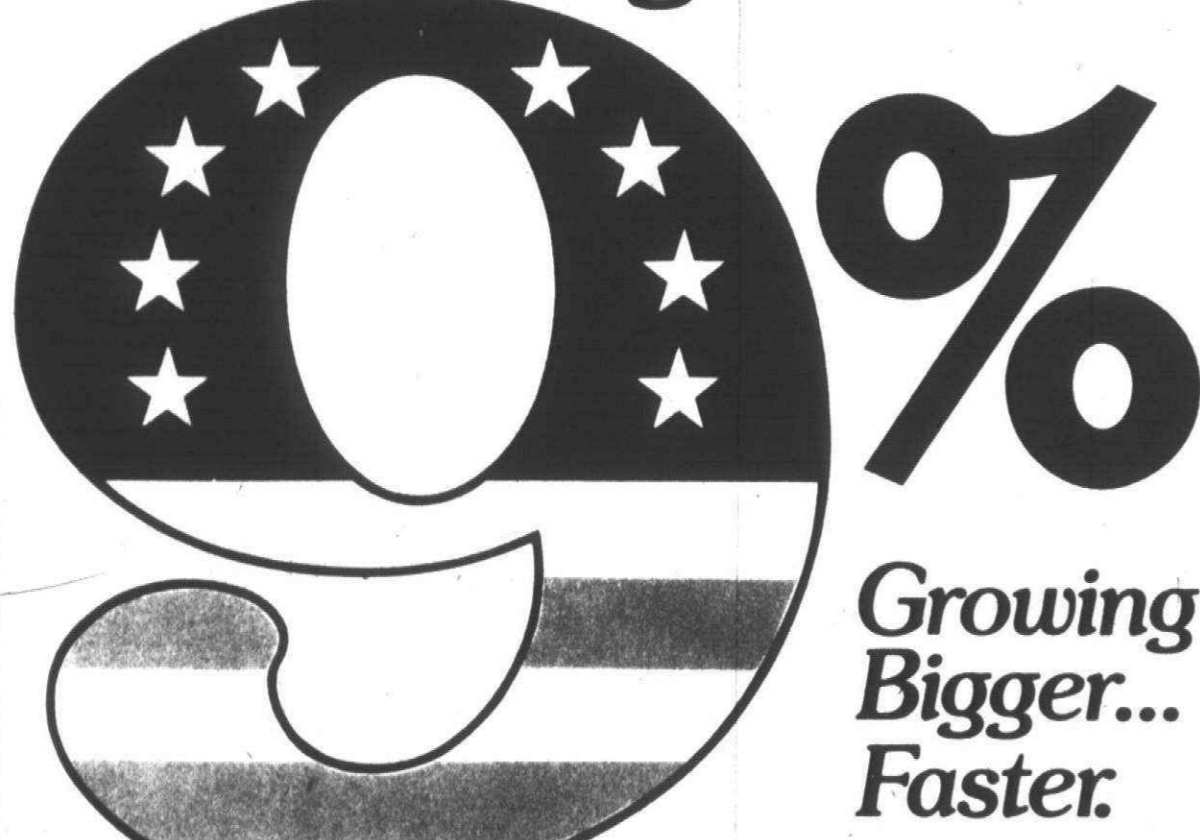

Salem keeps Suburban 8 cage slate clean

Plymouth Salem gave a lesson in "survival of the fittest" Friday in its Suburban Eight League basketball battle with Dearborn Edsel Ford.

The Rocks captured their eighth straight league game using strength as the main ingredient to wear down the host Thunderbirds 56-46.

The game featured an onslaught of body checks. Forty-three fouls were called. Many more went undetected.

Edsel gave the Rocks' backcourt fits most of the night with a relentless full-court press, causing numerous turnovers.

On the other side, the Charles Atlas-

like and enormous Salem team countered with a potent inside attack.

Edsel made a last-ditch rally in the final quarter, closing the gap to five points on one occasion. Salem, however, was able to hold the upper hand in the final minutes, despite an off-night from the free throw line. The Rocks converted only eight of 17 in the fourth quarter.

"Our kids really hung in there and played tough," said Salem coach Fred Thomann. "We handled their press pretty well for the most part."

"We made some turnovers when they had the press on, but there was a tremendous amount of contact. We didn't protect the ball as well as we should have."

EDSEL COACH John Kreger, whose team slipped to 8-4 overall and 4-4 in Suburban Eight play, said his team ran out of gas after playing another physical game three days earlier against Dearborn Fordson.

That game was suspended late in the final quarter because of lighting problems. Fordson was leading at the time, and the game will be replayed from the point of stoppage later in the season.

"It took a lot out of us to have another physical game against this bigger Salem squad," said the weary coach. "At the end, we didn't have enough poise and energy to convert turnovers into points."

Mike McBride turned in another sparkling performance from the field by

pumping in 21 points to lead all scorers. Dave Houle, who returned to the lineup Tuesday after being sidelined with a lower back injury for two weeks, followed with 11. Dave Miller and John Cohen added nine and seven, respectively.

Dave Smith scored in 14 points to pace Edsel. Rob Rodriguez had 10.

EDSEL ENJOYED an early 7-4 advantage midway through the first quarter but failed to hold onto that lead. Salem exploded with 12 unanswered points to take a 16-7 advantage into the second period as the lid remained shut on the Thunderbird defense for the rest of the period.

"I think our run of 12 points was the

difference in the game," Thomann said. "After that, it was a matter of 'gutting it out' at the end."

Edsel pulled to within five, 22-17, on two consecutive baskets by Mark Jeter, but the Rocks were able to spread the margin again, 30-20, at intermission.

McBride scored eight points in the third quarter as Salem maintained its 10-point lead, 41-31, heading into the final quarter.

The Rocks were able to shut down the middle and gain control of the boards during the final eight minutes of play.

Edsel, however, gave Salem a 45-40, thanks to a persistent press.

BUT A STIFF Salem defense proved

to be the deciding factor at the end as the Rocks upped their lead to 51-40 with 1:10 remaining on Houle's short bank shot.

Salem, now 12-3 overall, appears to be closing in on another Suburban Eight League championship. The Rocks have won outright or shared seven of the last nine titles. Dearborn is the second place team with a 7-2 mark, 1½ games off the pace.

"I was really happy with this win because it locks Edsel out of the league race," Thomann said. "It was a good game for us."

"We didn't play as well as I'd like to have seen us play, but we were able to play well enough to get the 'W' and that's what counts the most."

Junior baseball holds sign-up

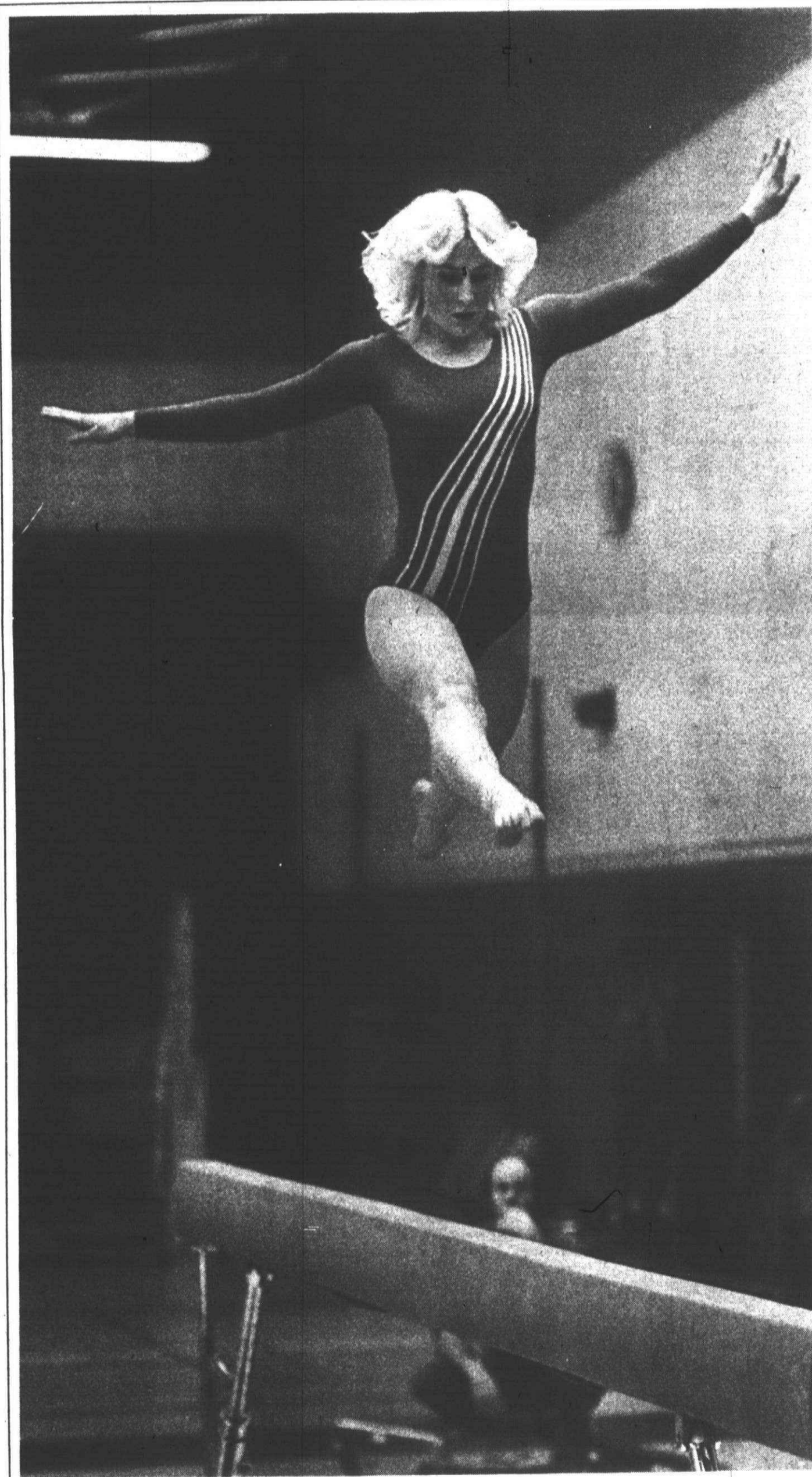

The Great Lakes and Mid-American conferences came away the big winners Wednesday as a handful of All-Observer athletes signed collegiate football letters-of-intent.

The elite Big 10 Conference stayed away this year for the most part, opening the door for the MAC and NCAA Division II schools.

SAGINAW VALLEY head coach Jim Larkin and assistant Steve Reese recruited heavily in western Wayne County and came up with all-area performers Phil Jean, a tackle-linebacker from Garden City West, Plymouth Salem linebacker-fullback Darrel Bartkowiak and Salem tight end Marty Piper.

The host Warriors took advantage by hitting 19 of 36 free throws, compared with Canton's 13 of 20.

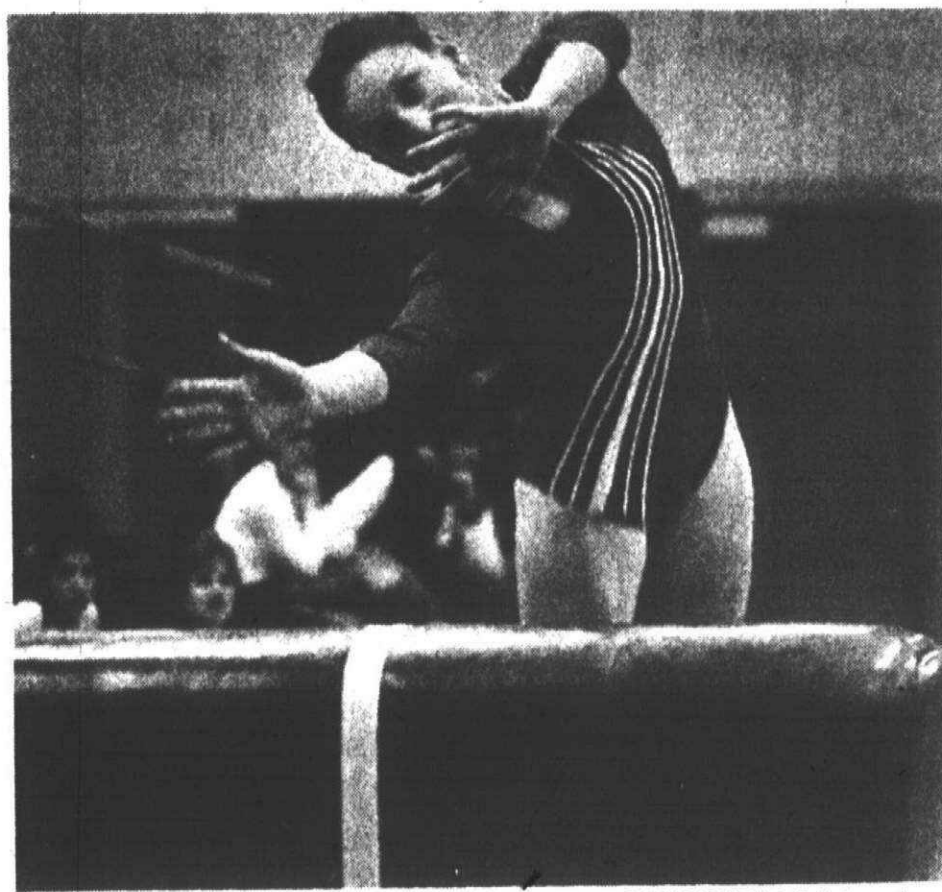

'Night Crossing' keeps audience on edge of seats

One of the popular movies last year was "Victory." It was about Allied prisoners of war in Germany who formed a soccer team and used it as a means of escape.

A new adventure movie from Disney studios, "Night Crossing" (PG), parallels "Victory" in many ways. The story and characters are different, but the plot is almost the same. I point out the similarity not as a criticism but simply to call attention to the successful pattern adopted by these kinds of movies that belong to the "escape" category.

There are clear-cut good guys and bad guys, there is the problem of working out an escape, and there is the suspense. Will they be discovered? Will they make it?

"Night Crossing" takes place in East Germany. The bad guys are the authorities — the military and the government. The good guys are the people who want to get out of the country.

THE FOCUS narrows to one family, the Strelzyks, and their close friends. John Hurt plays the father. Hurt is a splendid actor (he was the "elephant man") who gives this movie its foundation. He takes his role in this Disney adventure just as seriously as something in a weightier film.

Jane Alexander as his wife also adds her dramatic strength, and Doug McKeon (the young boy in "On Golden Pond") keeps up with both of them. The cast is rounded out by Beau Bridges as Strelzyk's friend and helper and Glynnis O'Connor as Bridges' wife.

In a real sense, these people are prisoners. Their freedom of movement, let alone freedom of speech, is severely restricted. They are contained in East Germany by an 836-mile barbed-wire fence with automatically firing machine guns.

"Night Crossing" actually is based on the true experiences of two families, eight people, who sought to escape in a hot-air balloon.

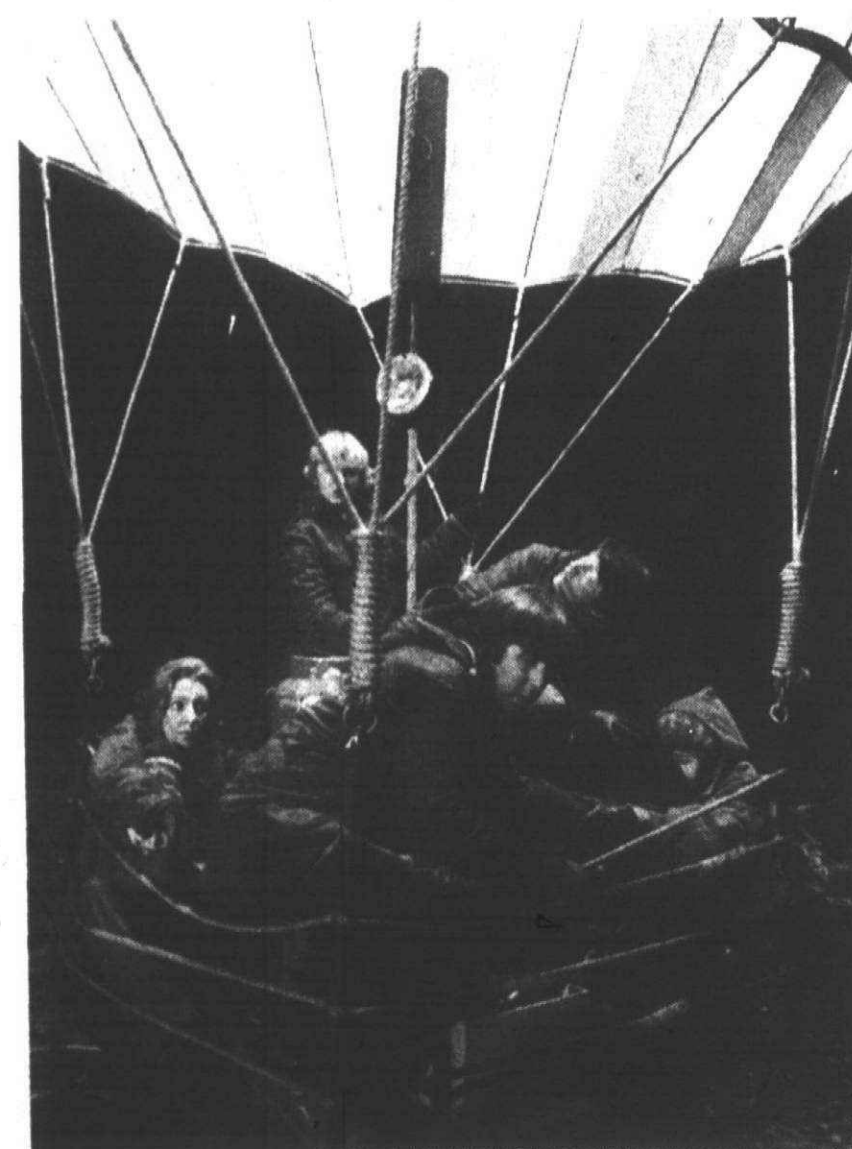
The Disney film does a fine job of conveying the gray grimness of their lives — hard work, consumer shortages and a controlled existence like animals in a laboratory.

SOME SCENES of Jane Alexander shopping for food are especially effective in getting across the atmosphere and tensions. She buys one egg at a time. When she reaches for the only orange on display, another shopper who is quicker snatches it away from her grasp.

A moment later, the other shopper, her eyes downcast, says, "I'm so ashamed," and hands Alexander the orange. This incident says more about the depressing climate of life in East Germany (and, we might infer, in other Eastern European countries as well) than many scholarly treatises.

It certainly helps establish why people would risk everything, including their lives, to get out. It took a lot of courage, a lot of determination and a lot of ingenuity to attempt the dangerous escape method chosen by the Strelzyks.

This is the kind of movie that makes audiences cheer. Like "Victory," it fires one up with enthusiasm for those who dare.

Hearing their special concerns

The Rev. Mackay Taylor used to have a "fairly set format" when talking with engaged couples. That's changed in the last few years. Today, each premarital session is as different as the pair getting married.

"Also, how they deal with conflict and emotions is important in any relationship — and this is certainly the most intimate."



Each time the Rev. Mackay Taylor talks with another engaged couple, the format is a little bit different.

ALTHOUGH HE'S turned down two marriage requests, the minister tries not to judge relationships.

"I try to be attuned to what the particular couple is saying and would like to deal with," he said.

"The marriage is not what I do. Marriage is what the two of them decide to go with an excerpt from the 'Book of Common Worship' written in the 1600s but 'still a delight,'" said the Presbyterian minister.

"It has dignity and simplicity and promises as well as vows that are identical for both people," he said. Along with the "mechanics of the marriage ceremony," Taylor talks with engaged couples about their backgrounds and how they deal with problems.

Depending on the couple getting married, the wedding is either a brief experience for the minister or a sharing one.

"Sometimes they just use my services and that's it," said Taylor, who was organizing pastor of the Troy congregation of 300.

"When I know the people and have contact with them, it's really kind of a delight. I like to be at the reception and go the whole shot."

But he never gets choked up at a ceremony — and doesn't expect to until one of his three children marries.

"Weddings aren't choke-up times. They are good times."

"It was a standing joke that I'd be beating me to the altar," said Dennis O'Connor, who didn't know when he was asked to be his brother's best man that Kevin would soon stand up for him.

"As it turned out, he didn't beat me by much."

Two weddings in one family just four months apart could be difficult. Somehow, the engaged couples have avoided bumping into each other's plans.

"We thought about Kevin and Dana's wedding when planning ours," explained O'Connor, whose engagement just happened to coincide with his brother's.

"They should have their day, and we should have ours."

So far, the best man hasn't played a big role in the upcoming wedding. He expects things to start rolling in March with tuxedo fittings.

The bachelor party — traditionally arranged by the best man — will be put on by the bridegroom's Sigma Chi fraternity brothers at General Motors Institute.



Except for paying part of the reception and buying liquor for the event, he's staying out of things. "I played my role several years ago," explained the Ohio native with a broad smile.

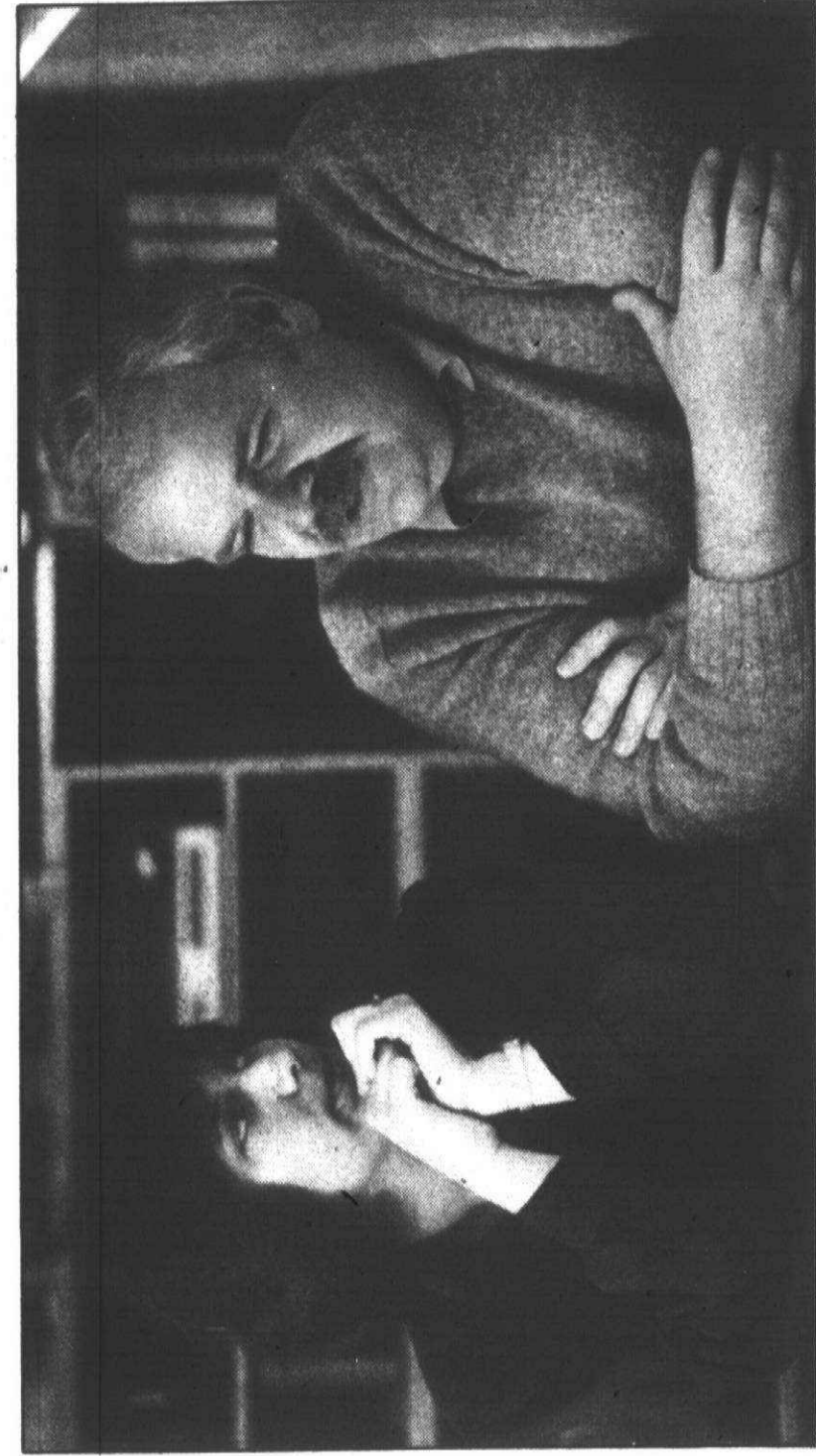
