## The Canton Connection

**POISON PREVENTION** week activities take place at the Oakwood Hospital Canton Center facility now through March 27, on the corner of Canton Center and Warren roads. The staff will present displays in the lobby, free literature, a film, and speakers to anyone interested in learning about poison prevention. Ipecac syrup, used to induce vomiting in some cases of poisoning, will be given free to citizens if they bring in old medication for discarding in a drug drop-off box. For more information on the week's activities, call 459-7030.

**CANTON OFFICIALS** have requested a public hearing on toxic waste, in conjunction with proposed licensing of the existing Woodland Meadows North landfill in the southeast corner of the township. Although the existing site currently is in operation, new state legislation forces all landfill sites to be licensed.

The hearing, sponsored by the state Department of Natural Resources, takes place at 7 p.m. Wednesday at Township Hall, on Canton Center south of Cherry Hill. The public is invited to attend.

**THE CANTON REPUBLICAN Club** will hold an organizational meeting and elect new officers at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Canton Fire Hall, on the corner of Cherry Hill and Canton Center.

**FRIENDS OF THE Canton Public Library** will hold its monthly meeting at 7 p.m. Monday, March 29 at the Canton library, on the third floor of Township Hall. Organizing the April used book sale will be the main topic of discussion. Books still can be donated for the sale.

**HARVARD SQUARE** shopping center, on the corner of Ford and Sheldon roads, will sponsor a "Wild and Crazy Day in March" this Saturday from 1-3 p.m. Feedbag, a professional clown, will make up faces during this time at no cost. Children or adults may receive a happy — or sad or funny — face on a first-come, first-served basis.

**SKATIN' STATION** will hold a skate-a-thon from 11:30 p.m. Saturday to 4 p.m. Sunday to help benefit the annual metropolitan Detroit Easter Seals drive. Admission is \$3 per person plus \$1 for skate rental. Pledge cards for Easter Seals donations are available at the rink, on Rhonda Drive, off Joy (between Lilly and Haggerty) in Canton. Games, clowns and celebrities will be featured at this all-night event.

**A TRIP** to the Shrine Circus is offered to elementary school students on tracks A and B of the extended school year program. Track A students may attend this field trip on Wednesday, March 24, while Track B students are scheduled to go Wednesday, March 31. The trip, sponsored by the Canton Parks and Recreation Department, is \$2.50 per person. ## Canton wins suit against 2 group homes

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Victor Baum has ruled that mentally ill residents must be removed from two small group homes in Canton Township.

That ruling, which came Thursday following a non-jury trial, is a victory for Canton officials who filed a lawsuit against the state Department of Social Services last April.

The lawsuit challenged the placement of small group homes — particularly facilities for mentally ill — in Canton subdivisions.

Currently, there are nine adult foster-care homes operating in the township, including facilities for mentally ill patients on Raintree Court and on Forest Trails.

"We are quite happy about it (the ruling), even though the state is going to appeal," said C. Gerald Hemming, attorney for the township.

"People have to be informed on this," added treasurer Maria Falkiewicz. "We went into (the lawsuit) knowing it would be a battle."

**BAUM'S OPINION** addresses the issue of small, foster-care homes for six persons or less in areas which are zoned for single-family residences.

State law allows the establishment of foster-care homes without permission of the municipality. The law allows facilities for aged, developmentally disabled (retarded), physically handicapped and emotionally disabled, Baum said.

"It was unlawful to use such homes for persons who are mentally ill," Baum ruled.

The judge said his ruling orders the mentally ill persons out of those two homes. However, he has granted a 20-day "stay," or delay, in implementing the order.

The delay will give the DSS an opportunity to file an appeal with the state court of appeals.

"My decision will be appealed — without question," said Baum. William Basinger, an attorney for the DSS, was unable to be reached for comment.

**THE STATE** foster-care law is intended to remove persons from warehouse-sized state hospitals and to place them in the community. It also aims to give patients more individualized attention and to ease the transition back into the community.

A key point of the lawsuit has been the definition of mentally ill, and whether the group home residents meet the guideline. Baum said he based his decision on the language in the law.

The state earlier had contended the Forest Trails and Raintree Court residents had been hospitalized in the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital, but were no longer being diagnosed as mentally ill. Instead, they are emotionally disturbed, the state argued.

## Historical society to co-sponsor carnival

The Canton Township Historical Society will co-sponsor a carnival at Towne Plaza shopping center next month.

The society will oversee local arrangements for the five-day carnival, in exchange for a share of the profits, said Bert Berg, president of the organization.

The shopping center, at Ford and Sheldon roads, had arranged to hire the W.G. Wade Shows Inc. of Mason, Mich., for the week of April 20-25. Rides, games and other amusements are planned.

However, the Township Board hesitated to permit the event unless a local, non-profit group offered sponsorship.

"Most communities won't allow carnivals unless they're sponsored by an organization to bolster their own treasury," said trustee Robert Padgett at a recent board meeting.

**THE HISTORICAL** society agreed to be the sponsor last week. "It's approved, providing the township doesn't find any more problems," said Berg. He declined to specify the percentage the society will receive.

"It's a goodly amount," said Berg. "There is a potential (earning) of \$2,000-\$3,000."

Earnings from the carnival sponsorship will be used to buy display cabinets for the old Canton Center schoolhouse, which is being converted into a historical museum, Berg said.

## Old 1-room school will open as museum

The Canton Center schoolhouse — the last active one-room school in Wayne County — soon will begin a new life as Canton's historical museum.

The Canton Township Historical Society is raising money to refurbish the building, which was built in 1884. A fall opening is planned.

"In 1984, it will be the 100th anniversary for the school building," said Bert

Berg, president of the historical society. The year 1984 will mark the 150th anniversary of Canton Township.

**THE OLD** schoolhouse was made from bricks produced on the Cobb farm 1½ miles west on Proctor Road, according to local records. It was used until the early 1960s.

## A new idea for lonely seniors

Here is a new twist to senior citizens activities: pen pals.

O.H. Williams, a retired Plymouth pharmacist who is president of a Canton senior citizens group, created this idea, which could become international in scope.

"These old souls," he explained, "need companionship in the autumn of their lives and it could come through correspondence.

"And that's what I hope to bring

about. At the moment, I am on the trail of some small English towns because the folks there speak English, and correspondence would not be in a more difficult language."

Williams freely admits that his idea came from the manner in which the city of Plymouth, Mich., became so attached to Plymouth, England, that they not only correspond, but have visited back and forth across the sea.

"You know," he went on, "there should be more to life for these elderly folks than visiting the clubhouse sever-

# Twice-elected county commissioner Joyner announces for state House

R. William Joyner has announced he will seek the office of state representative.

Joyner, D-Plymouth, has been elected twice to the Wayne County Board of Commissioners in a district which includes Canton, Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

The formal announcement will be made next Sunday in a campaign kickoff party from 4-7 p.m. in the Mayflower Meeting House.

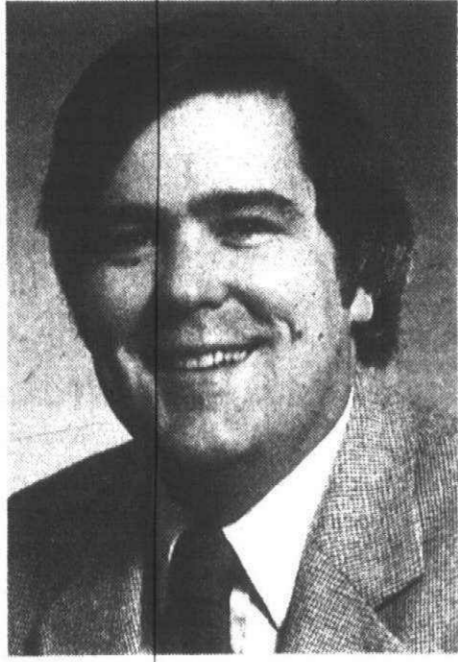
Joyner becomes the first candidate to announce for the Michigan House in this area. The boundary lines for the district have not yet been drawn and so it remains unknown whether Canton, Northville or Livonia will be included.

The Michigan Supreme Court is expected to make a decision on redistricting appeals near the end of this month.

**IN MAKING THE announcement,** Joyner expressed regret at having to leave the county board of commissioners.

"I have worked for the past four years to bring reform to county government, to be accessible to residents of my district, and to make the people in western Wayne County proud of their commissioner and his fight for increased service to our area."

Joyner stressed that he has kept ear-

lier campaign promises by serving full-time as commissioner and by not traveling out of state at taxpayer expense.

Another promise kept, he added, is accessibility, which he has maintained by attending city and township government meetings, and Lion, Kiwanis, Jaycee and Optimist club meetings.

"I have fought the county-entrenched 'good 'ol boy' system just as I said I

would do when first elected. I led the fight for county reorganization and was one of only two commissioners to endorse and work for the recent charter proposal."

Beside county reform, Joyner said he also is proud of the nearly two-year investigation into the Wayne County Office on Aging, a probe he had pushed for.

"As a direct result, the bulk of funding for senior citizen programs in Wayne County was taken away from the county and given directly to a non-profit citizen committee which worked directly with the local units of government. For once you did not have Detroit telling out-county how to spend money for senior citizens."

**JOYNER ADDED** that it was unfortunate that his county commission district was left intact except for the community he lives in.

Ninety percent of the district is without an incumbent, he added. "I have been thrown in with my friend Mary Dumas (R-Livonia) who has worked with me the past four years on county reform. It would not do our community any good for the two of us to run against each other." Commenting on holding state office, Joyner said:

"The enormous task of revitalizing and rebuilding Michigan's economy is such an important and challenging one that I am prepared to give my full-time effort towards providing a fresh approach and new leadership while helping to build a better Michigan."

"I will base my campaign on a new, independent politics which will work on solving the state's persistent economic problems which have resulted from the shift of investments to the Sun Belt and in the decline in the importance of industrial production in the national economy."

Joyner has worked as administrative assistant to Livonia Mayor Ed McNamara, and as executive assistant to the president of Gale Research in private business.

Joyner, 32, lives at 45951 Amesbury, Plymouth Township. He has been a member of the Plymouth and Canton Jaycees, Plymouth Optimist Club, and the Canton and Plymouth chambers of commerce.

"I am not running against any party and am not running against any person. I am running for the office of state representative to build a bipartisan effort toward solving the problems facing Michigan."

# Germans in Russia search continuing

Patricia Hanschu is an amateur sleuth.

But the case she is trying to solve lies buried in Russia's shrouded past, and it's unlikely she'll ever be completely successful.

"Solving the genealogical mystery of one's past is seldom easy, but for those of us who trace our ancestry to 18th Century Russia, the task is doubly difficult," said Hanschue, a teacher who lives in Plymouth Township.

**LIKE THOUSANDS** of other first- and second-generation Americans, she's trying to learn all she can about the German families and villages that Russia wiped from the face of its rural lands.

Even if Hanschu traveled to Russia, the Soviet Union would not permit her to visit the German villages that once dotted Russia.

"It's part of their history that Russia refuses to acknowledge. In the eyes of the Soviet Union, my grandparents never existed."

Yet she knows that at least a half million families of German origin inhabited Russia, having pioneered hundreds of villages two centuries ago at the invitation of Catherine the Great.

Eventually, they were driven from their villages, their homes burned or confiscated. Many starved, were murdered or imprisoned. Some escaped, however, and made their way to Amer-

ica, where they carved out new lives for themselves.

**TODAY, GERMANS** from Russia inhabit all 50 states. Many hundreds live in Michigan, some in the Plymouth area.

Like Hanschu, many of them are members of America's fastest-growing historical society — American Historical Society of Germans from Russia (AHSGR) — which seeks to unravel the mystery of these people.

"I can't accomplish much alone," she said, "but together with others of similar heritage, we can piece together many of the puzzles."

"That's why we're continually on the lookout for others of similar backgrounds."

Persons wishing to learn more about AHSGR may call the chapter president, Henry Felker of Plymouth, at 459-6675.

The AHSGR, headquartered in Lincoln, Neb., now has the world's largest collection of data about Germans from Russia. Its chief purpose is to assist families in genealogical research.

Families from Plymouth and Canton who believe their German ancestors lived in Russia may attend the next meeting of the chapter at 7:45 p.m. Thursday at Lawrence Institute of Technology at 10 Mile and the Lodge Freeway in Southfield.

Highlighting the meeting will be a program on German Russian folklore.

# Girl dies in swim accident at YMCA

A 6-year-old Plymouth girl died last week following a swimming accident at the Wayne-Westland YMCA March 4.

Kathy Dorf, of Barrington Road, died last Monday after being listed in critical condition for several days at Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor.

Funeral services were held Thursday in Divine Savior Catholic Church, where she attended with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Dorf.

Kathy was discovered floating in the pool about 10 minutes after a free period had started during swimming lessons. A YMCA lifeguard administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation at the scene.

"It's being left an accidental drowning; there's nothing to indicate anything other than that," says Det. Robert Barthold of the Westland police.

Hwa Stacy, YMCA executive director, earlier said she was conducting her

own investigation of the accident and that a free period didn't mean the children were left unattended.

Stacy was unavailable for comment last week.

Kathy was a student at Isbister Elementary School. She was participating

in a YMCA day-camp program for students on break from the Plymouth-Canton extended school year.

Westland police said there were 15 other children in the pool at the time of the accident.

## Here's how to make candy

The sweet aroma of milk chocolate wafts through the room.

Brightly-colored baskets are stacked on a table. Peanuts and raisins are nearby, and there are plenty of bunny molds.

The occasion is a candy-making demonstration, just in time for Easter.

Jenny Towsley, owner of Create-A-Cake in Canton, put on a one-hour free demonstration at the Canton public library last week. It attracted 42 aspiring candy-makers.

"It has gotten very popular in the past three years," said Towsley, a Canton resident. "Candy in the stores is expensive."

SOME PERSONS like to make their own candy so they can control the quality of the ingredients. Others make a little money by selling their homemade efforts, said Towsley.

The demonstration shows how to melt chocolate in an electric frypan, taking care to see that steam doesn't get into the chocolate.

The melted chocolate is poured into molds and placed in the freezer for a few minutes until firm.

Towsley gives free demonstrations in her store, and likes to get out before Brownie, school and community groups.

The Create-A-Cake store, at 44286 Warren, Canton, sells baking and candy-making supplies. Ingredients are also available to make items for diabetic or allergy-prone customers. There also is a bakery.

The store is open from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and until 8 p.m. Thursday. Saturday hours are from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

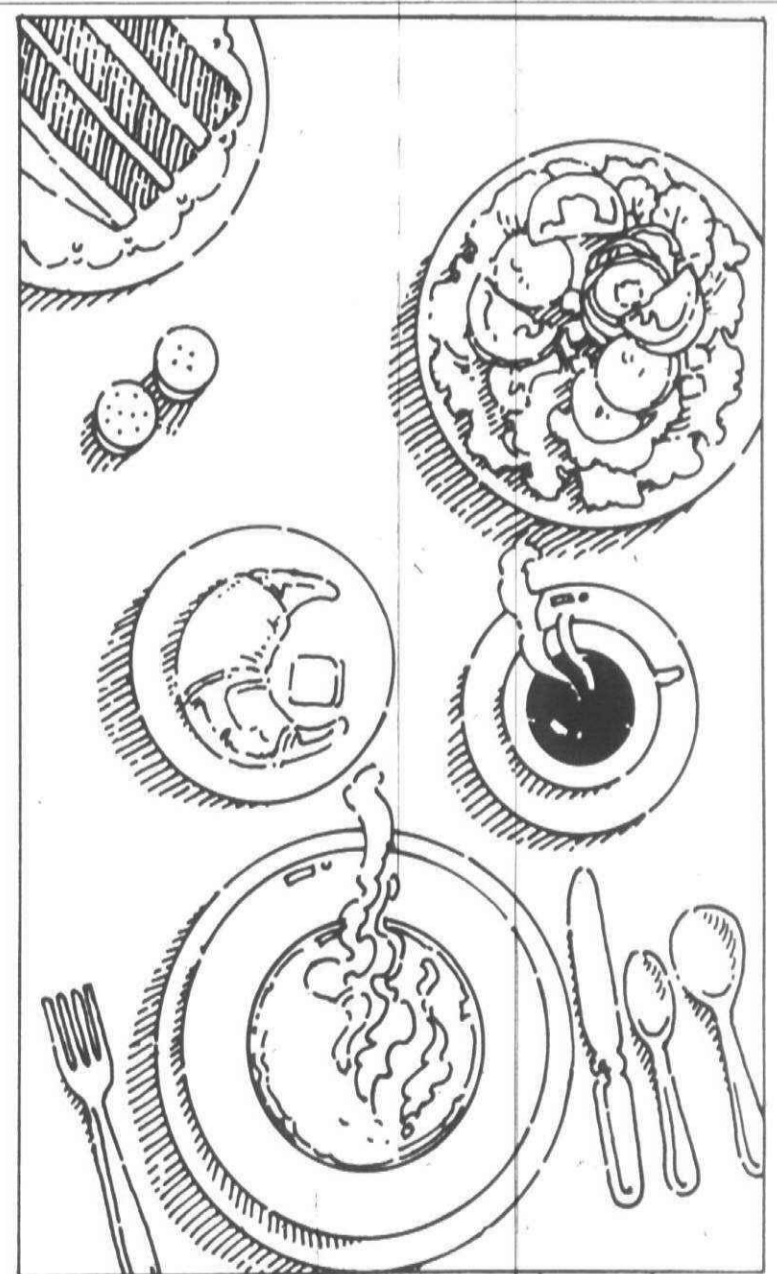

# Court says no to mentally ill

Mental illness is defined in the Michigan statute as "substantial disorder of thought or mood which significantly impairs judgment, behavior, capacity to recognize reality, or the ability to cope with the ordinary demands of life."

Under the "mentally ill" guidelines, a person may be involuntarily committed to a mental health facility if they are dangerous to themselves or others, or if they cannot care for their own basic needs.

"It's people of this kind who are finding their way into these licensed (foster care) establishments," said Baum. "If they are mentally ill, or have recently been mentally ill, they are probably more dangerous than if they are merely emotionally disturbed."

DR. EMANUEL Tanay, a well-known psychiatrist, contends that a group home "has no real function in the care of the mentally ill," and may harm patients.

Tanay testified for Canton Township in the lawsuit. He is in private psychiatric practice in Detroit and is president of the American Psychiatric Society and is a professor at Wayne State University.

The group home is too small to give good medical attention, and too large to help the patient integrate back into the community, said Tanay.

"A GROUP home in the community is perceived as a foreign body — it isn't accepted by the community," he said. "Geographically, they are in the community, but they're isolated," he added.

Tanay visited the Raintree and For-

est Trails homes last Sunday, in conjunction with the lawsuit. He found the homes "very, very nice," but wasn't allowed to speak with the residents.

According to Tanay, group home residents often have "less freedom" in the group home than they would in a large hospital, because they are constantly accompanied by staff persons.

"There is a much greater danger of being railroaded out (of the hospital)," said Tanay. "They need more as mentally ill persons than nice surroundings."

On another lawsuit issue, Baum ruled against Canton's claim that the township has an "excessive concentration" of group homes. Canton is comparable to other nearby communities with its number of group homes, Baum said.

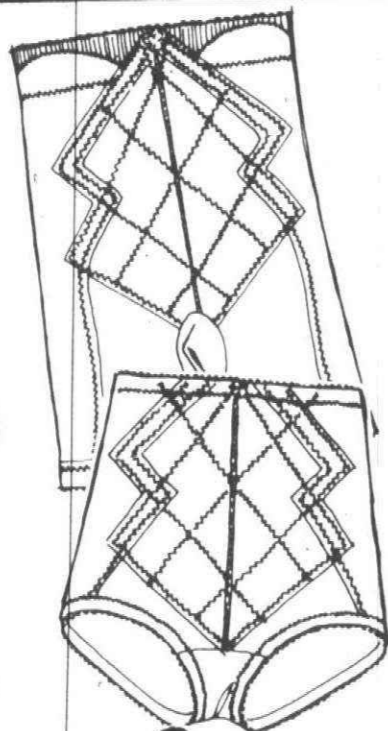

# There's an easy way out of role-game controversy

School Superintendent Mike Hoben is now looking into the charges against the role-playing game, Dungeons and Dragons (D&D), following a curriculum review committee's decision that the game should be allowed.

D&D currently is part of a West Middle School elective course called "Games, Games, Games." The Rev. Gregory Gentry of Canton Calvary Assembly of God is seeking to have the game removed, saying it has "negative spiritual effects" on the students.

Gentry has appealed the committee's decision to Hoben, who will make a ruling in the near future.

Hoben could duck the whole issue by offering the students an alternative.

Since the course is built around games, Hoben would simply need to find a game better liked than D&D, a game which students love and which avoids the controversy of religious content.

Hoben would need to offer a game which parents could understand, without reading several handbooks and guides. A game with universal appeal, a game which is challenging to the mind and body.

The schools need to offer a game which doesn't require supervision, doesn't fill young minds with undesirable thoughts and can be played in a classroom. The schools need to offer Pac Man.

WHAT STUDENT wouldn't want Pac Man machines at school? And what threat does a video game pose?

They're self-supervising, semi-quiet (if the volumes are turned down a bit) and harmless.

Pac Man is the star of the space-battle, race-running, danger-averting, submarine-piloting, alien-invading video game world.

If you pulled middle school students, Pac Man would be second only to carrying an eight-inch comb in the back pocket of tight designer jeans. The students would gladly trade D&D for Pac Man.

As an avid Pac Man player myself, I can attest to the great challenge of the game, which pits man against monster (something the D&D players would love).

Nowhere else can I find such adventure, suspense, split-second decision-making and sudden fate for 25 cents. There's something to be said for the surge of adrenalin which races through the body as you guide the yellow Pac Man around a maze of dots and energizers.

The game is demanding. Every time the player grasps the red guidance knob, he is forced to display articulate coordination of the mind and hand. One slip of the mind, one slip of the hand, and you risk immediate loss of the dot-eating Pac Man.

The hairpin turns, behind-the-board tunnel and carnival music thrusts the player into a battle of wits with the faceless enemies. It's an intense sport of its own.

The students would love to play Pac Man at school. Just look at how many play after school.

On my daily trips to Cloverdale Dairy Store, I patiently wait my turn for a moral victory on the Pac Man game as middle school students display their video wizardry.

Every student in America can tell you about Pac Man. They're the masters of the game. Stop and watch one of these teenage experts compile scores of 80,000, 90,000 or even 125,000. My superfluous scores of 15,000 or 16,000 seem like foothills compared to the mountains of the experts.

BESIDES GETTING rid of D&D, there's a distinct advantage for the schools to provide Pac Man machines. The Pac Man games would bring in revenues for an ailing district.

Each day, students would pump quarter after quarter into the games. Within hours, the school would clear the overhead for the classroom and the rest would be pure profit.

If the average length of one quarter on the game is five minutes, a high estimate for us adult players, some 10 quarters would be pumped into the machine in one class period. Multiply that by the seven class periods a day and you get 70 quarters, or \$17.50.

If five machines were put in the classroom, that would mean \$87.50 a day, or \$437.50 a week. Not to mention the money an after-school Pac Man club could bring in.

Think of the profits five Pac Man games in every school would bring. You're now talking five figures.

It seems obvious the schools are losing money by not cashing in on the Pac Man craze. And what better time to bring Pac Man in? Eliminate D&D, add Pac Man, and make everyone happy while you fill the school coffers.

# Memories on rainy day

Many a pleasant memory can be revived when a fellow starts re-arranging his files on a rainy afternoon.

This happened the other day when the dark clouds and a bit of fog combined to keep the Stroller indoors. Not to be bored, he thought this would be a good time to do a bit of shuffling of his cabinets in the den.

You might suspect what happened.

The first thing he came across was a picture taken back in 1931 at the old Ford Airport where the Dearborn Inn now stands.

He had been invited to join Ralph Greenleaf, then the world pocket billiard champion, to play an exhibition match in one of the Ford Tri-Motor planes in a scheme to prove the stability of the machine.

Greenleaf had invited him because none of the other players in Detroit for the world championship would accept.

And what a thrill it was. The RKO movie team was on hand with cameras in the plane and the table was miniature sized. But it was a lot of fun for more than four as we flew over downtown Detroit. And the plan was successful as the plane was declared suitable to carry freight.

It was a moment to be remembered. Next came a picture with Jack Dempsey in his restaurant in New York. The Stroller was there on a baseball trip and he never failed to visit Jack when in the big city.

We got to talking about the tough break he had gotten in his second bout with Gene Tunney when Referee Jack Barry gave Gene the long count. But much to The Stroller's surprise, Dempsey called it the best break he ever got.

"That night I thought they stole the title from me," he said. "But if I had won and regained the championship, I would have had to continue fighting and some fellow would have come along and knocked me out. Then I would have been just another old knocked out heavyweight."

"As it is, folks still think I won and I am a hero in most of their eyes. I have my name in lights in New York, far from being forgotten."

It was another memorable moment.

Suddenly, in lifting up a large envelope, a photo fell out and The Stroller blinked as one of the most memorable moments of his sports writing career came to mind.

It was a picture on the banks of the St. Clair River in Algonac on the morning record of 124.85 miles an hour with his famed Miss America X. What made the picture memorable is the fact that The Stroller was with him and Orlin Johnson that morning in 1933. He was given the ride of his life, made especially scary since The Stroller was deathly afraid of water and couldn't swim.

But the picture from the files that gave him the biggest thrill was one taken back home when The Stroller was a mere youth. He was standing with his father in front of the family lunch counter. He was in knee pants and wore a cap — he didn't own a hat until he was a young man.

It was the last picture taken of The Stroller's father and at the time The Stroller was only nine years old.

Turns out there was nothing boring about an afternoon of rain and fog. The Stroller's files provided rich memories and a very enjoyable afternoon.

These extensive activities have introduced many new and complex problems affecting municipal functions, operations and economy. And they expand daily.

It must therefore be recognized that the fire department activities, as well as those of the police department, are highly specialized and the services performed are diversified and vastly different in every aspect. The personnel in each department must receive continuous specialized schooling and training in their respective fields if they are to be efficient and perform in a professional manner. It must be remembered that it is also the duty of the police department to protect the people from domestic enemies.

With coordination and cooperation of both departments in a common cause, the police officers can contribute greatly at a fire.

THEY CAN preserve order, direct traffic so fire apparatus can get to the fire, at large fires they can keep the public back by putting up barriers, and assist in rescue like CPR or controlling bleeding on injured parties.

Fundamentally, a fire department

must be in constant readiness to answer an alarm for a fire or medical emergency. In order to accomplish this, the trucks must be ready at all times and manned by adequate personnel for immediate and effective action. This prime prerequisite cannot be accomplished when firemen are out performing the duties of a policeman at the time of an alarm; they may be on patrol, miles from the location of a fire.

Delays in the arrival of adequate manpower and equipment to the site of the fire have resulted, as the national statistics show, in many disastrous fires and serious loss of life.

### School claims are misleading

To the editor:

The Plymouth-Canton Community School Newsletter was recently mailed to my household. I think the general public should be aware of the apparent intent of this newsletter to misinform taxpayers on several issues.

In the article on summer tax collection, the newsletter states that school taxes represent about 60 percent of the total property taxes. This is false; Plymouth-Canton Community Schools receive 71.43 percent of our property tax bills — the educational system as a whole receives 77.07 percent of our property tax bill. Note: 77.07 percent — that is more than three-quarters of our hard-earned dollars going to the school system.

If half of the school tax were to be collected in the summer as the newsletter proposes, this would amount to two-fifths of our total property tax bill, not the less than one-third figure stated by the newsletter.

In addition, in responding to the question, "Don't higher taxes mean a lot more money for the taxing authority?" the newsletter states that the schools do not receive the full benefit of increases in local taxes.

This also is false: The state support does decrease as the local property taxes increase. The school system loses no money — it is just allocated from different sources, i.e., more from taxpayers, less from the state. If our taxes

were to decrease, the state would increase its support accordingly. The school system is in a no-lose position on this matter.

Decreasing state support is not the real problem of the Plymouth-Canton Community School system. The real problem is the mismanagement of its budget and the ever-increasing salaries and fringes of the administration and teachers.

# McNamara: 'I'll straighten out mess

Vowing to "straighten out the mess known as Wayne County government," Livonia Mayor Edward H. McNamara on Wednesday formally announced his candidacy for Wayne County executive on the Democratic ticket.

Last fall, voters approved Michigan's first county charter, which calls for streamlining county administration under an executive. The executive, who will be elected in November, will assume office next January. The Aug. 3 primary will narrow the field to one Democrat and one Republican.

By passing the charter, McNamara said, "the people showed that they want an end to the political opportunism, massive deficits, uncontrolled waste and widespread inefficiency that have made Wayne County government a sick joke."

McNamara is the first major candidate to announce formally. State Sen. John Hertel, D-Harper Woods, and Robert FitzPatrick, executive director of the Wayne County Economic Development Corp., are actively seeking support to become the Democratic candidate. Other possible Democratic contenders are Sheriff William Lucas and former Appeals Court Judge T. John Lesinski.

McNAMARA SAID his 11 years of experience as Livonia mayor demonstrate he has the leadership qualities

needed by a county executive.

"Besides cleaning up the governmental mess, jobs and an improved economic environment will be my top priority for Wayne County," he said.

"During the 11 years I have been mayor of Livonia, more than 800 companies were encouraged to locate in our community, adding more than 12,000 jobs in the area.

"Livonia's tax base was increased by more than \$10 million, and the city's net worth was more than doubled.

"This growth resulted from bold, aggressive and imaginative leadership and was achieved with the cooperation of hundreds of business, labor, financial and political groups."

UNDER McNAMARA'S administration, Livonia assumed supervision of senior citizen nutrition programs in 34 western Wayne County and downriver suburbs. Since 1970, the city has paved the way for the construction of 900 housing units for senior citizens, including 100 that were financed totally by the city, he said.

His other priorities for reforming county government, he said, include overhauling the property tax assessment system, bettering road maintenance and improving senior citizen programs.

"Recent efforts of higher-salaried county personnel to insulate themselves in their jobs provide further proof of the urgent need for reform," McNamara said.

"Management-level members of the Wayne County Road Commission have hastily formed an organization to lock themselves in their jobs. As county executive, I do not intend to be hamstrung by devious and self-seeking devices which are not in the best interests

of the Wayne County taxpayers."

Prior to his full-time public service career, McNamara was an executive with Michigan Bell Telephone Co. He is a Navy veteran of World War II.

McNAMARA HAS served in numerous county, regional and statewide posts while mayor of Livonia.

These include: member, Governor's Special Commission on Land Use (1971); chairman, Western Wayne County Mayors and Supervisor Association (1972); chairman, Tri-County Mayors Association (1972); member Board of Water Commissioners (appointed and removed by Mayor Coleman Young in mid-1970s); president, Michigan Municipal League (1974-75); president, Michigan Conference of Mayors (1975-76); member, board of Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (1977-81), board chairman 1978-80); member, Judicial Merit Selection Committee (appointed by Sen. Donald Riegler in 1978); chairman, board of Out-County Area Agency on Aging (1980-present); co-chairman, Labor Relations Advisory Committee, National League of Cities (1978).

McNamara also teaches government at Madonna College and is part-owner of Wil-O-Mac Corp., which owns and operates a miniature golf course and driving ranges.

## Wants to be governor

# Blanchard's run is now official

More than 200 people crowded into the Pleasant Ridge Community House Monday to hear home town Rep. Jim Blanchard formally announce his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor.

The 39-year-old four-term congressman was at home in the 18th District. Audience chatter produced such comments as, "Local boy makes good." "It'll be nice to know the governor" and "He still looks as handsome as he did years ago when he knocked at my door during his congressional campaign."

PLAGUED BY a cold and his voice hoarse, Blanchard told the group he has the knowledge to "turn Michigan around financially."

He rebashed the disturbing 16 percent state unemployment statistic. He mentioned the 20,000 businesses that went bankrupt last year. He didn't promise miracles. He said tax hikes appear imminent.

"This year it will be worse. One out of 10 people is on welfare, and the number is growing. We must face facts. America's recession has become Michigan's depression. No one is going to save us but us," Blanchard said.

WHEN ASKED about Gov. William Milliken's plan to raise income taxes from 4.6 to 5.3 percent, while simultaneously cutting the budget, Blanchard said:

"Milliken's plan might work, but I believe we're in a more serious state than the governor is letting on to.

"Since 1975, Michigan has had a serious cash flow deficit. One-tenth of a percent of income tax (Milliken's figure for cash flow improvement) is not sufficient to eliminate the deficit," he added.

Blanchard said the auto industry will never bounce back to past levels, and displaced auto workers should be retrained to work in other manufacturing jobs.

BLANCHARD PROMISED to make Michigan attractive to manufacturers and farmers alike.

"In Michigan, we have the resources to recover. But we need the leadership to make them work," he added.

Noting that 15 other candidates are vying for the state's top office, he explained why he should win.

"I am the only candidate in either party who has been seriously tested by a tough economic problem — the Chrysler situation — and I passed the test," he said of getting the government-backed loans.

In addition he is the only candidate who has worked in both Lansing (in the attorney general's and secretary of state's offices) and in Washington.

IF ELECTED, Blanchard said he will call together leaders of small and large businesses, labor, agriculture, education and local governments to hammer out a strategy for Michigan's future.

He said he would institute a massive job training and retraining program, develop a strategic investment program to create jobs and diversify the state's economy, and review all state laws and regulations, including tax laws, to straighten out Michigan's finances.

He said he is committed to saving the state's higher education institutions from budget cuts.

"Our colleges and universities are the building blocks for our future, and we must protect them," he added.

Before closing his 20-minute speech, Blanchard said the only way out of Michigan's depression is through teamwork.

"No region or group can expect to get 100 percent or even 80 percent of what it wants from our state government or our governor. Good leadership must be something more than the sum total of the demands placed upon the leader," he said.

# State tax issues: welfare, potholes, public transit

Joe Forbes, the Democratic floor leader in the Michigan House of Representatives, aimed a stubby thumb at the electronic tally board. His usual impish grin faded as he said:

"I've got to see 24 on the board before we'll deliver."

The 24 he wanted to see are half plus one of the 46 Republicans in the House. Forbes, a six-term lawmaker and master tactician, insists Gov. Milliken's party put up majority support for a state income tax increase before Democrats put up any of their 64 votes.

"I looked at (William) Bryant (House GOP leader) and asked him, 'How many votes have you got?' He went — Forbes made a goose egg with his fingers.

"Well, I know he's got a solid six who support the governor... Bobby Crim and Bill Ryan and I — we want to do the responsible thing," said Forbes, an Oak Park veteran whose district includes part of Southfield.

THAT SUMMED up the situation in the State Capitol last week:

In the House, Republicans want to see more cuts than the \$451 million Milliken proposes to reduce a projected \$566 million deficit. While the caucus position has yet to jell, Bryant insists welfare must be cut 12 percent to the levels of such neighboring states as Ohio — a move he says would save \$40 million — before Republicans will consider a tax hike.

In the Senate, Republicans and at least one Democrat reacted against

Milliken's proposal to use 0.3 of the 0.7 percent state income tax hike for "transportation," broadly defined.

"The transportation money is in trouble," Forbes agreed. "It may be amended out. If the Oakland County Road Commission wants it out, someone will introduce an amendment."

MILLIKEN'S proposals, besides cutting expenses, are aimed at bringing in new revenue by hiking the personal income tax to 5.3 percent from 4.6 percent.

Of the hike, he would use 0.1 percent to ease the treasury's cash flow problem, 0.1 percent for general state government, 0.2 percent for school aid and 0.3 percent for transportation.

"A core of Republicans on the Appropriations Committee want to separate the transportation money from the rest," said Sen. R. Robert Geake, R-Nortville, whose district includes Livonia, Plymouth and Redford.

"They are not related. The rest is a budget deficit and a cash-flow problem," said Geake.

TRANSPORTATION — freeways, highways, county roads, city streets, public buses and rail transit — are funded by state gasoline and weight taxes. That fund has declined 10 percent in the last couple of years as lighter, smaller autos have come on the roads. But as Geake said, there is no deficit in that special fund.

Milliken made a radical departure from a practice of many decades in suggesting transportation be beefed up by general fund revenues such as the income tax.

Oakland road commissioners and Geake objected that this is a violation of the user-benefit concept.

But that didn't bother House GOP Leader Bryant. The Grosse Pointe Farms lawmaker said road interests like having their own special fund so they can deal with one state department for money, and not have to satisfy the legislature.

IN AN APPROPRIATIONS Committee meeting, Sen. James DeSana, D-Wyandotte, raised a third objection to funding transportation with an increased income tax: "Transportation" does not mean highways. It does not deal with chuckholes in the roads.

The complaint is that Milliken has yet to specify how much of his proposed 0.3 percent of the income tax would go for roads and how much for public transit.

In an interview, Sen. Donald Bishop, R-Rochester, was even blunter about some Oakland County objections to public transportation funding: "They don't get along with SEMTA (Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority). The mayor (Detroit Mayor Coleman Young) runs that show — subway, people mover and all that. What Oakland needs is more buses."

Bishop had no objection, however, to a SEMTA commuter rail line which runs from Pontiac to the Detroit Renaissance Center in the morning and back at night. "People use that," he said.

SEMTA is in trouble on operating budgets this year. A January cutback hit the downtown staff, and a March cutback reduced bus and commuter

rail service 20 percent. SEMTA officials see cuts totalling two-thirds unless new money is pumped into the system this year.

The Oakland County Road Commission says all the money should go for roads and objects to "sharing with transit on an undetermined basis."

IF THE SENATE scene was focused on the transportation element, the House picture was more diffused.

"We had a closed caucus and let it all out," said Republican Rep. Sylvia Skrel of Livonia. "We just vented our frustrations. All our frustrations."

The mood of Skrel, Bryant and others was to concentrate on the spending portion of the budget.

But one of the frustrations, said Skrel, is that "there are only five Republicans on the Appropriations Committee and 13 Democrats."

Another is the anger of the voters.

"My phone rings all hours of the day and night," said Rep. Doug Cruce, R-Troy, a freshman who took over a previously Democratic district. "People think we're spending too much."

Sen. Geake counted 25 phone calls against an income tax increase and three in favor — two from known school employees. "Many are saying they're against it because 'we just got a big property tax increase,'" said Geake.

Rep. John Bennett, D-Redford, found a major tax revolt coming because of a 31-percent increase in his township's property assessments.

# Chambers asked to assist suppliers

Suburban chambers of commerce are being asked to help a Wayne County effort to aid the automotive supplier industry. And the Livonia Chamber says it's ready to cooperate.

"We're all geared up, ready to start," said executive director Ray Lech after the Livonia chamber heard a speech by Robert FitzPatrick of the Wayne County Economic Development Corp.

"We're still in the preliminary stages, but we're planning a joint city-chamber committee," Lech said.

FITZPATRICK is asking chambers to interview 1,336 firms in the county — including 153 in Livonia — with a goal of creating 5,000 to 10,000 new jobs in the next 10 years.

"The North American automobile industry has introduced a program of 'just in time' production," FitzPatrick said.

"We used to teach that because the auto industry involved mass production, it also had to have massive inventories of parts."

But the highly-competitive Japanese automakers have shown it's wasteful of capital and plant space to build up massive inventories and costly to ship them long distances, FitzPatrick said.

To implement "just in time" produc-

tion here, he said, auto manufacturers need to know what local firms can build such components as seat frames, foam pads and supports, suspension coil springs, and constant velocity joints and half-shafts for front-wheel drive cars. Many Indiana, Ohio and Ontario firms supply those parts.

THE COUNTY EDC, a quasi-public-private corporation, wants to arrange meetings between small businesses and give them governmental help in job training and arranging for credit.

"Our people will do all the paperwork," he said.

FitzPatrick said local chambers are being solicited for the survey work because small business owners might be wary of giving information to a quasi-public agency with the name of Wayne County in the title.

"We're not certain the Auto Community Adjustment Program has all the answers to all the problems," he said, "but it's a step in the right direction."

FitzPatrick did not mention his possible candidacy for Wayne County executive in the August Democratic primary. In an interview after his speech, he said he is committed to making the run but the crucial test will be whether he can raise a campaign war chest.

# S'craft hikes budget as enrollment climbs

Schoolcraft College students enrolled in 2,000 more credit hours during the past summer and fall than administrators had anticipated, adding \$51,222 in tuition funds to the college contingency fund.

Schoolcraft collected \$83,711 more in tuition money than it expected for the fall and summer terms of 1981, Kenneth Lindner, vice-president of business affairs, told the board of trustees. The board previously budgeted \$3.7 million in that revenue category for 1981-82.

"Usually by the end of the fall term, we lose about 6 percent of the credit hours through attrition. This year we didn't have any attrition. Instead we had an increase of students," Lindner

said.

The general operating budget, adopted last June, was reduced from \$14.2 million to \$14.1 million. When the board made the \$120,753 adjustment, it took into account two state aid cuts of about \$257,000 ordered by Gov. Milliken, the added tuition revenue, a \$37,000 reduction in property tax revenues from residents who appealed to the state and had their assessments lowered, and a \$4,700 increase in state appropriations for the college retraining program. The net was \$51,222 in added revenue.

The \$51,222 was placed in the college contingency fund because it was not previously earmarked for specific programs.

## Party delegate deadlines told

Petitions for precinct delegate can be picked up at the county clerk's office or at the local Republican or Democratic parties' headquarters when they are available.

Clerk Esther Hulsing of Plymouth Township and Clerk Gordon Lirburg of the city of Plymouth both caution prospective precinct delegates not to circulate nominating petitions prematurely.

Public Act 2 of 1982 delays the date by which precinct lines may be drawn to 120 days prior to the state primary election on Aug. 3. The deadline this year, therefore, would be April 5.

Congressional and state legislative districts have not yet been drawn, and firm precinct boundaries cannot be established until that is done.

Clerks Hulsing and Lirburg, however, do not anticipate precinct boundary changes at this time.

Deadlines have been announced for delegates (precinct delegates) to the county convention for both the Democratic and Republican parties.

The precinct delegates will be elected at the state primary to be held Aug. 3.

The filing deadline for candidates is 4 p.m. May 25 in the office of the county clerk, 207 City-County Building in Detroit.

Candidates for precinct delegate must be qualified registered electors living in the precinct they wish to represent.

To be nominated, a candidate must obtain signatures of at least 15 registered electors from that precinct to have his name placed on the ballot.

To qualify as a registered elector, a person must be a U.S. citizen, 18 years or older, and a resident of the state and community for at least 30 days.

friends," Mrs. Nunn said as she waited on her customers at the Thrift Store.

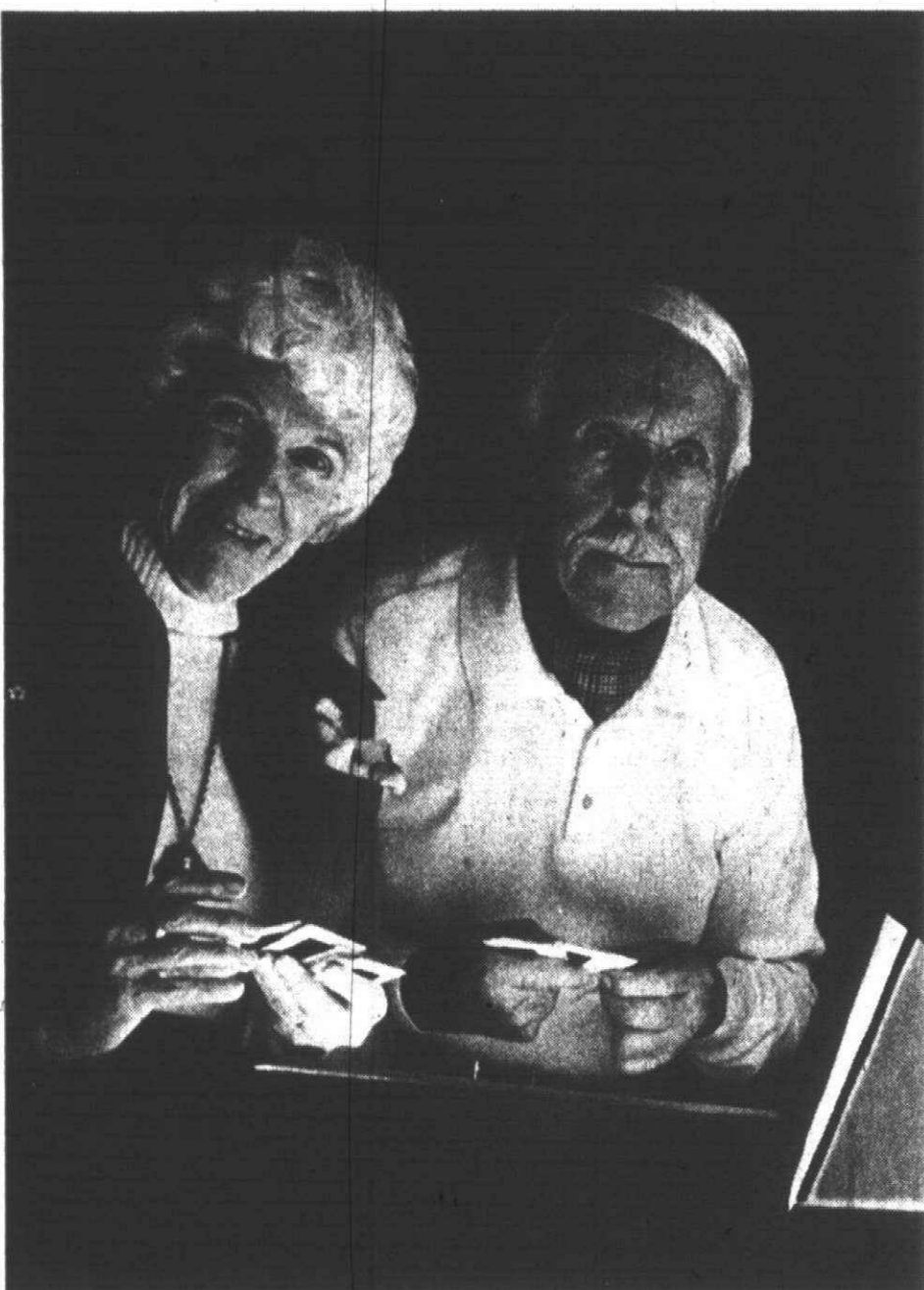

## State reps ask Reagan to meet

The 21-member Michigan congressional delegation has signed a letter asking President Ronald Reagan for a special meeting to discuss the state's worsening economic plight.

The letter, drafted and circulated by Rep. Dennis Hertel, D-Detroit, refers to the president's recent

statement to Gov. William G. Milliken acknowledging the state's "depression." In part, it says:

"As you are aware, the national unemployment rate stands at 8.5 percent for January, while Michigan's unemployment rate stands at 16 percent, the highest in the nation. More than 700,000 people are

out of work. The state budget has already been cut over 20 percent."

**TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE**

There is a legal phrase: "Time is of the essence", which means: "Time is no fooling around with dates in a contract. If your youngster accidentally gets a tooth knocked out and you'd like to give the dentist half a chance to successfully replant it - "time is also of the essence".

Take the typical case where a child gets his front tooth knocked out at a hockey game. He skates over and hands it to his parents and finishes the game. Later on - probably the next day - they'll go see a dentist. Too late, my friends. No chance for saving that tooth.

The proper reaction would be to take Johnnie - skates and all - immediately to the dentist. This is an emergency. A tooth replaced within 30 minutes has a 90% chance of being saved, but in two hours the success rate drops considerably.

To improve the chances of a successful replantation of a knocked-out tooth, rinse it in tap water (don't scrub it), replace it in its socket and the patient hold it in place with his tongue on the way to the dentist.

# The politics of food: Can it be used as a weapon?

**S**OCRATES ALLEGEDLY said that "no man is qualified to become a statesman who is ignorant of the problems of wheat."

American policy makers nowadays do well to heed this ancient advice, for grain has become intertwined in politics in the last decade as never before.

How much grain the United States sells abroad, and at what price, affects the balance of payments, the health of the dollar, domestic food prices and the environment, as well as our relations with both adversaries and friends.

In one sense, the United States is in an enviable position as the world's unchallenged "grain superpower," supplying about half the wheat, corn, soybeans and rice to the world marketplace.

But such pre-eminence has left the United States vulnerable to market forces beyond its control, and it has raised some difficult policy questions.

For example, is it justifiable, or practical, for the U.S. government to use food as a diplomatic weapon — as President Carter attempted to do when he denied American grain to the Soviet Union in retaliation for the invasion of Afghanistan?

If not, what ends should American grain supplies serve — the requirements of foreign policy, the interest of farmers and consumers at home, the needs of hungry people abroad, or all of these to some degree?

## SUPPLY AND DEMAND

These are new political dilemmas that result mainly from the persistently precarious balance between supply and demand in the world grain market since the early 1970s.

Until then, the politics of grain had been fairly straightforward. After World War II, American farms grew far more food than war-torn countries in Europe and Asia could afford to purchase. The main concern of the president and Congress was to prop up commodity prices and secure the still-influential "farm vote."

U.S. taxpayers underwrote the effort to keep the mountainous food surpluses moving abroad. The government paid subsidies to multinational grain companies so they could sell U.S. wheat in depressed world markets.

And the government financed the shipment of hundreds of millions of tons of food aid abroad through Public Law 480, passed by Congress in 1954 and later nicknamed Food for Peace.

The food aid eased famines in India, Bangladesh and Africa's plains region, but it also was intended to win friends and influence people, and on occasion to gain specific concessions such as military bases in the Portuguese Azores.

IN THE EARLY 1970s, however, the United States found itself in a seller's market for grain. Prosperity in industrialized Europe, Asia and the Soviet Union had created demands for more varied, richer diets. Japanese were eating more wheat; Germans and Russians wanted grain-fed pork, broilers and beef; the demand for wheat, corn and soybeans soared.



## food and people

New industries grew up around corn, making it nearly as vital to the economy as oil. Corn was refined into efficient animal feeds, into oils for margarine and mayonnaise, into sweeteners for soft drinks and ice cream, even into gasohol.

These developments tied American farmers more closely to world grain markets than ever before. In 1950 the crops from only one acre out of five were exported; in 1980 it was one out of three. Corn exports rose from 17.8 million tons in 1970 to 75 million tons in 1980.

The benefits to the United States are evident. The nation no longer has to rely on government giveaway programs to market its annual harvest. Agricultural exports, amounting to more than \$40 billion a year, offset some of the cost of oil imports.

As this money is passed back to railroads, barge lines, banks, and the farm implement and fertilizer industries, the whole economy benefits along with the farmer.

## FOOD AS A WEAPON

Increasingly, these exports have been seen in Washington as a valuable tool of diplomacy and foreign policy.

By 1990, American could be supplying about 15 percent of the rest of the world's food. Advocates of the "food weapon" note that the oil cartel has been able to work its will when its petroleum accounts for a similar percentage of total world energy output.

There are, however, strong arguments against the food weapon. First, it might be impractical. The grain trade now is operated by private companies (such as Cargill, Continental, Louis Dreyfus and Bunge). For the food weapon to work with maximum efficiency, the government would have to take over the grain trade, as the governments of the Middle East oil states did in the case of petroleum.

More important, except in a few instances such as the recent embargo against the Soviets, many Americans view the use of U.S. crops for purpose other than feeding hungry people with considerable distaste, if not moral outrage.

## HIDDEN COST

Quite apart from the food weapon issue, there are other legitimate reasons for asking whether the current grain trade system serves the nation's best interests in the 1980s.

Along with political and economic benefits, the grain export boom has some hidden political and economic costs, as well as posing long-term dangers to the environment.

The more grain that is exported, the less that is left behind. When supplies become tight at home, the domestic livestock industry has to compete with foreign markets for corn and soybeans. And as the laws of supply and demand work, grain prices rise, and eventually food prices follow.

Unexpected depletion of grain stocks also poses a "no win" political predicament. For example, in 1973, Nixon temporarily halted soybean exports to safeguard supplies at home, and in 1974 and 1975 President Ford took similar action in the grain markets.

In each instance, farmers reacted angrily, while consumers criticized the president for not acting

fast enough to prevent food-price inflation. The soybean embargo stimulated competition, for example in Brazil, and it also alienated the Japanese, close allies who depend on U.S. beans.

ANOTHER HIDDEN cost in grain marketing is the federal subsidies paid to maintain the railroads and waterways that bring grain to the ports.

An additional concern is the impact of the grain trade on the environment. Western wheat and corn depend on irrigation systems, which are causing the underground water tables supplying these systems to fall, in some cases critically. The loss of topsoil due to overuse of the land is also of increasing concern.

## Stuff those potatoes

Russet potatoes are a wise choice for nutritious, easy on-the-budget meals. Now in plentiful supply, this all-purpose potato can be prepared in many delicious ways.

Russet potatoes become a tempting entree when stuffed with a savory salmon filling. After baking, the fluffy potato pulp is combined with butter, milk, egg, flaked canned salmon, Parmesan cheese and seasonings. # In the hot seat: Can grain prices be stabilized?

All these "cost" factors have raised the question whether the United States is really getting a fair price for its grain in the foreign market.

But as the system now works, prices for U.S. grain are established not by the U.S. government on the basis of calculations of the long-term cost, but by a world marketplace that responds to short-term factors. Temporary weather conditions or passing economic and political developments beyond U.S. control send commodity prices up and down.

This leaves the United States vulnerable and puts the president in a political hot seat.

If foreign pressures on the American grain supply continue in the 1980s as most experts expect it is likely that presidents will be seeking new methods of stabilizing the grain trade and protecting U.S. interest. That almost certainly will mean more government involvement in the grain markets.

Unfortunately, international efforts to create a system to stabilize the costs of foodstuffs have not been very successful. The United States may therefore have to take action on its own.

One possibility is more bilateral agreements, such as those already existing with the Soviet Union, Mexico, Poland and East Germany, that leave grain deals in private hands but set limits on what countries can buy.

Whatever presidents do in the 1980s, it is certain that they will end up agreeing with Socrates.

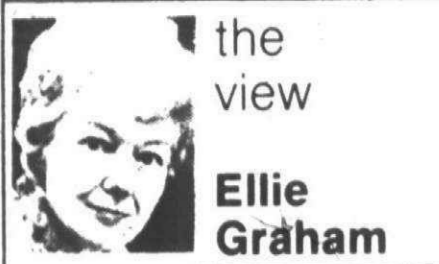

# Patricia Hill Burnett BPW speaker

Patricia Hill Burnett, artist, sculptor, political activist, feminist and lecturer, was guest speaker at the Plymouth Business and Professional Women's Club guest night.

BPW members and guests admitted to being distracted by her glamour and beauty as she talked about her personal life and the condition of women in other countries. Earlier in her career — Burnett is 61 — she was Miss Michigan and was runner-up at the Atlantic City pageant. She played the feminine leads in the radio shows "The Lone Ranger" and "The Green Hornet" for three years.

More than 80 members and guests gathered in the main dining room of Hillside Inn for the annual guest night dinner. For years, the BPW called it "bosses night." But times have changed. The speaker is among the women who brought about the changes.

BURNETT convened the first chapter of the National Organization for Women in Michigan in 1965. She was president of the chapter for two years.

Her 25th wedding anniversary present from her husband was a trip around the world. She went alone, as she requested. During her travels, she observed the conditions of women in other countries and absorbed ideas for her career as an artist and sculptor. She said her husband, a doctor, understood. They have two sons and two daughters. Her husband died two years ago.

She emphasized the need for teamwork among women, the need for a mutual support system of the type "men have had for years."

A PROFESSIONAL portrait painter and sculptor, her portraits and commissions encompass leaders in the

worlds of government, industry, entertainment and the arts.

Her clients have included Indira Gandhi, Benson Ford, Mrs. Edsel Ford, Joyce Carol Oates, Hiram Walker, Walker Cisar, Jean Stapleton, Martha Griffiths, Betty Ford, Gloria Steinem, Rosa Parks, Marlo Thomas and William Milliken.

She was the first woman to occupy a studio in the Scarab Club, formerly an all-male artist club in Detroit. She served on the board of directors for two years and has had a studio at the club since 1962.

Her works are in galleries in London, Paris, Rome, New York and across the United States. She has won first place awards for her works in Boston, San Diego, Albuquerque, Paris and Venice. She teaches and demonstrates portrait painting to professional and amateur

artists and has had 19 one-woman shows.

She is a member of the Michigan Academy for the Arts, Michigan Craftsman Council, Detroit Society of Women Painters and Sculptors, Sculptors Guild, and the Coalition of Women's Art Organizations.

BURNETT HAS has chaired the World Feminist Commission since 1974. She visited the USSR in 1973 as a Russian government guest in recognition of her work in the women's movement.

She visited China in 1979 on the invitation of the Chinese government to study the status of women. She was a Michigan delegate to the International Women's Year Convention in Houston in 1979, and in 1975 was delegate to the United Nations Conference of the

Woman's International League for Peace and Freedom.

She has been a member of the Republican State Central Committee since 1975. Republican Party activities include serving as vice president of District 1, member of the State Issues Committee and precinct delegate. She was co-convenor and chair in 1975-78 of the Michigan Republican Women's Caucus and was secretary of the Republican State Ways and Means Committee from 1976 to 1979.

Her NOW involvement has been on a local, national and international level.

In 1977 she was named one of the world's 10 distinguished women by Northwood Institute. She was selected Distinguished Woman of Michigan by the BPW in 1976 and has been included in all the prestigious "Who's Whos."

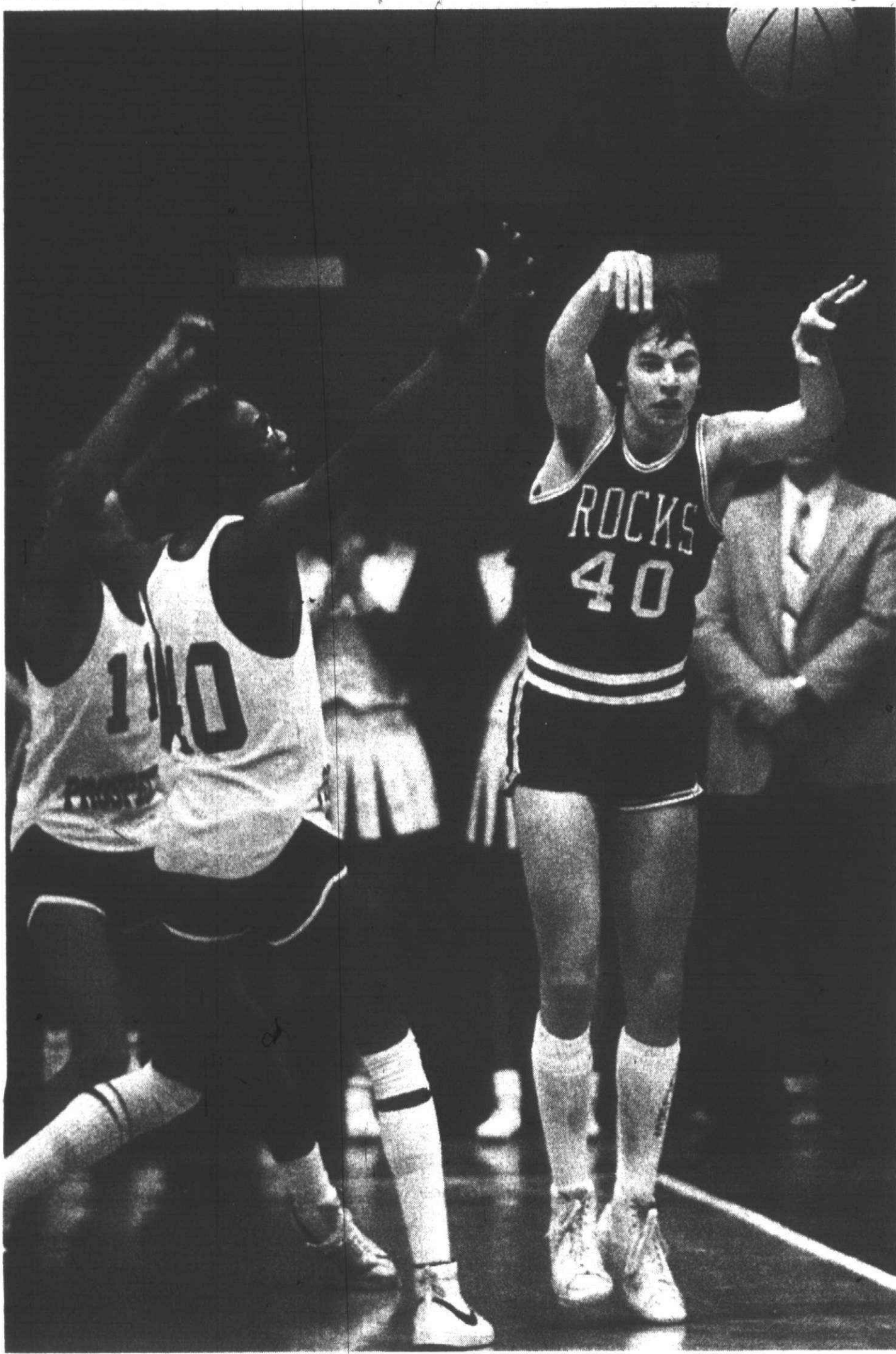

# Gallant Salem cage effort falls short in tournament

Plymouth Salem's Rocks proved that Antoine Joubert was human, but it wasn't enough to get them into the regional finals.

Detroit Southwestern, led by the 6-foot-5 Joubert, scrapped and clawed its way to a 63-54 Class A playoff victory over the Rocks before an overflow crowd of 3,800 Thursday at Ypsilanti High School.

Rated by one scouting service as the best junior player in the country, Joubert found himself constantly frustrated and harassed by Salem defenders. He was still able to lead all scorers with 33 points but made just eight of 27 shots from the field. The key, however, was his free-throw shooting. Joubert connected on 17 of 19 from the line, including four clutch shots with less than a minute left to clinch the victory.

Salem went into the game as the underdog against the city champions despite a 20-3 record.

But the Rocks were not awed by the presence of Joubert, Southwestern or the large crowd.

"Our kids proved if they needed to that they can play with anybody," said Thomann. "He (Joubert) had to make his shots under a lot of pressure. I don't think our kids backed off him. There was only one time, early in the third period, when he really got his thing going."

"He's a great player. You saw what we tried to do. We tried to take him out of his rhythm."

SALEM, which trailed at halftime, 30-25, fell behind by as many as 14 points in the third quarter as Joubert and Eddie Benavides started clicking.

Benavides tallied 10 of his 15 points during that eight-minute stretch. Joubert also added 10.

But Salem stayed close, cutting the lead to nine, 50-41, going into the final period on Dave Houle's basket and free throw.

The Rocks gradually began to chip away at Southwestern's lead and had a shot at winning it in the final minute. Reserve John Kelliher played a key role down the stretch as he held Joubert pretty much in check.

Mike McBride's two free throws with 1:21 to go cut the Prospectors' advantage to 58-54. Southwestern then took a misguided baseline jumper and Salem grabbed the rebound.

## Rock fans, Joubert display surly traits

True confessions. I underestimated Plymouth Salem's basketball team.

It wasn't long ago when I told Rich Saah and Tom Zaibek, diehard Rock fans, that Salem was going to get blown out when they met up with Detroit Southwestern in Thursday's regional opener at Ypsilanti.

My worst fears seemed confirmed when the Rocks got down by as

many as 14 points in the third quarter.

But to coach Fred Thomann's and his team's credit, they refused to fold and almost turned the corner for a victory. (Southwestern won 63-54).

I agreed with Thomann's post-game assessment: "The tempo was ours. We had to play a 50-point game, and it was a 60-point game."

# State champ paces All-Area wrestling squad

It's great when a high school wrestling team wins a state championship. But if a wrestler can't push his team to a state title, the next best thing is to capture an individual state title.

That's what John Beaudoin did. Beaudoin helped Plymouth Salem to a fourth-place finish in the Class A state wrestling finals two weeks ago by fighting his way to the top of the 132-pound weight class.

Beaudoin leads the 1982 Observer All-Area Wrestling team, selected by the area's wrestling coaches. Also included on the list are three repeaters from last year's All-Area team.

Here's this year's edition of the O&E team, starting with the lightest weight:

Tom Gibson, Westland John Glenn,

98-pounds — Gibson, a junior, excelled on the mats this season with 35 wins in 41 matches and a sixth at the state meet. Gibson is equally adept in the classroom, compiling a 3.66 grade point average.

Gibson won the John Glenn Invitational and the Northwest Suburban League (NSL) meet and was second at the Salem Invitational. He was second at the very tough Temperance-Bedford state district and third at the regional at Ann Arbor Huron.

Todd Bartlett, Plymouth Canton, 105 — Bartlett is also a junior and one of several O&E wrestlers who was sidelined by mishaps that prevented him from competing at the state tournament. Bartlett was the Western Six League (WSL) champ and compiled a 23-7 match record.

A regional qualifier as a sophomore, Bartlett suffered a separated shoulder

at this year's WSL meet, forcing him out of the state tourney. Though cut short, his season was still successful: He reached the finals of every tournament he competed in and won the John Glenn and Rochester Adams Invitationals.

Mike Parsons, John Glenn, 112 — A senior tri-captain, Parsons is serving his second term on the O&E team. His 30-6 match record included a NSL championship, a first at the Salem Invitational, a second at the John Glenn tournament and a first in the districts.

Parsons suffered what Glenn coach Bob Lusk termed "just a bad day" at the regionals. Parsons beat Ann Arbor Huron's Jamie McNaughton twice during the season (once on a pin), including a victory at the districts. But it was McNaughton who ended up as state champ.

Parsons is more than just a wrestler. He is also an Eagle scout.

Harry Newton, Redford Thurston, 119 — Newton, a senior, rolled up 102 mat wins in three seasons for the Eagles. Included on this year's list of accomplishments was a 38-8 record and a sixth at the state meet, after winning the districts and placing fourth at the regional.

A team co-captain, Newton reigned as the NSL champion, was first at the Thurston and South Lyon invitationals and second at the Catholic Central, Schoolcraft, Wayne and Canton invites.

Rob McDonald, Plymouth Salem, 126 — McDonald was a team captain for the Rocks. The senior posted a 29-9 record, which included firsts at the Monroe Invitational and at the Suburban Eight League meet.

McDonald wrestled much of the season at 132. He finished third at the John Glenn, North Farmington and Wayne invitationals and second at the state district meet at Temperance-Bedford.

John Beaudoin, Plymouth Salem, 132 — Beaudoin's list of accomplishments are lengthy, and he's only a junior.

He wrestled up a weight class much of the season but posted a 13-0 mark at 132. He became Salem's first ever state champion when he won the 132-pound state title. His 46 victories (only three losses) established a new team record for mat wins by a junior.

His other achievements: firsts at invitationals in Temperance-Bedford, Canton, Salem and North Farmington; first in the Sub 8, first in the districts and first in the regionals; second at John Glenn, second at Monroe and third at Wayne.

Bruce Bachman, Plymouth Salem, 138 — Bachman, a senior, was another wrestler who dropped down before the state tourney. A team captain, he set a school record for mat wins in a season (48-2 record).

Called "our most knowledgeable wrestler" by Salem coach Ron Krueger, Bachman went all the way to the state finals before losing a decision to Gerhard Bell of Lansing Everett. Bachman won the district and regional tourneys and finished at the top of the Temperance-Bedford, John Glenn, Wayne, Salem, North Farmington and Monroe invitationals and was Sub 8 champion.

Steve Hamblin, Plymouth Canton, 145 — A senior, Hamblin won 44 of 52 matches en route to a fourth-place finish at the state meet, the first Chief wrestler to advance that far. Hamblin racked up a 100-33 career record, including a string of 23 straight wins over the past two years.

A WSL champion, Hamblin set school records for career wins, consecutive wins, team points, most pins, most near falls and most reversals. He repeats as a member of the O&E team.

Jeff Alcalá, Catholic Central, 155 — Alcalá wound up in fifth place in the state meet after winning both the districts and regionals.

Wrestling in the 167 and 155 classes, Alcalá finished second in the Catholic Central tournament and the Louisville (Ky.) tournament, but missed several others due to a shoulder injury. He finished the season with a 34-6 record.



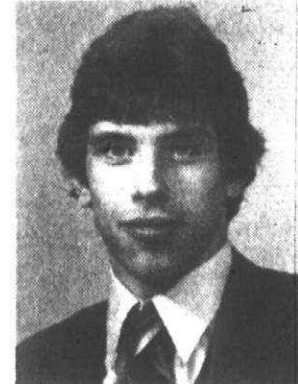

(tie) John Woochuk, Plymouth Salem, 167 — A junior, Woochuk's performance at the state meet was hampered by a knee he hurt in his final match of the regionals. He placed second in the districts and fourth in the regionals.

The junior's 33-12 record included firsts at the Canton Invitational and the Sub 8 meet, seconds at the North Farmington and Monroe invitationals and thirds at the John Glenn and Temperance-Bedford invites.

(tie) Ted Badami, John Glenn, 167 — Badami deserved better than what he got.

The senior won 17 of 18 matches before a dislocated elbow sidelined him the day before his team was to wrestle Temperance-Bedford Jan. 16.

The injury ended a promising season for Badami. "He was definitely a state-quality wrestler," Glenn coach Bob

Lusk said. Badami is also an avid weightlifter.

John Graczyk, Bishop Borgess, 185 — Graczyk made it to the state meet after finishing first at the Trenton district and second at the regionals.

A senior, he finished with a 38-7 record that included wins in the Catholic League meet and the Schoolcraft tourney, a second at the Robichaud tourney and a third at the Catholic Central invite.

Described by Borgess coach Joe Bothel as a "very hard worker", Graczyk "learned in two years what others learn in four."

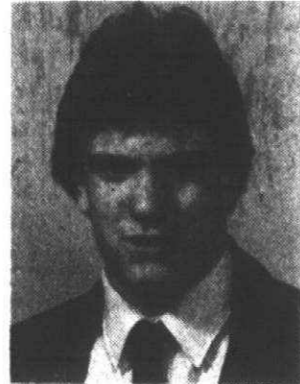

The senior captured top honors in the Thurston, Clarenceville and South Lyon invitational, and placed third at Schoolcraft. He won the Metro West League title for 198-pounders and finished first at the Class B Robichaud district.

A team co-captain, Respecki set a school record for quickest pin — eight seconds.

(tie) Harry Walkley, Plymouth Salem, 198 — A junior, Walkley came within one match of qualifying for the state finals.

Walkley finished with a 24-17 record, including a second at the North Farmington invitational, thirds at Monroe and the Sub 8 meet and fourths at the Temperance-Bedford, John Glenn and Salem invites. He also finished fourth in the districts.

Marty Piper, Plymouth Salem, heavyweight — Piper's story is truly tragic.

The stellar senior heavyweight was a legitimate contender for the state title before being sidelined — not by injury or an opponent, but by a Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) ruling.

An auto accident prevented Piper from competing in the district finals. The MHSAA ruled that since it wasn't an injury that kept Piper out, he was ineligible to continue. But the MHSAA also notified Salem far too late for a protest to be filed.

So Piper's prep career, which included a 35-1 record this season and four school records, ended on a technicality.

Piper's school marks include: most pins in a season (30); most consecutive pins (10); and best win percentage in a career (82). He finished first at Temperance-Bedford, John Glenn, Wayne, Canton, North Farmington and Monroe invitational and at the Sub 8 meet.

Piper was also a member of last year's O&E team.

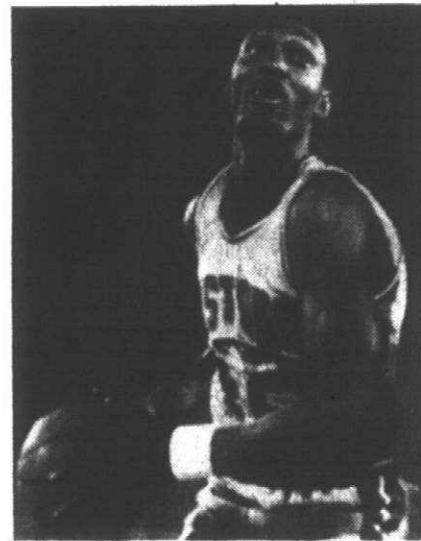

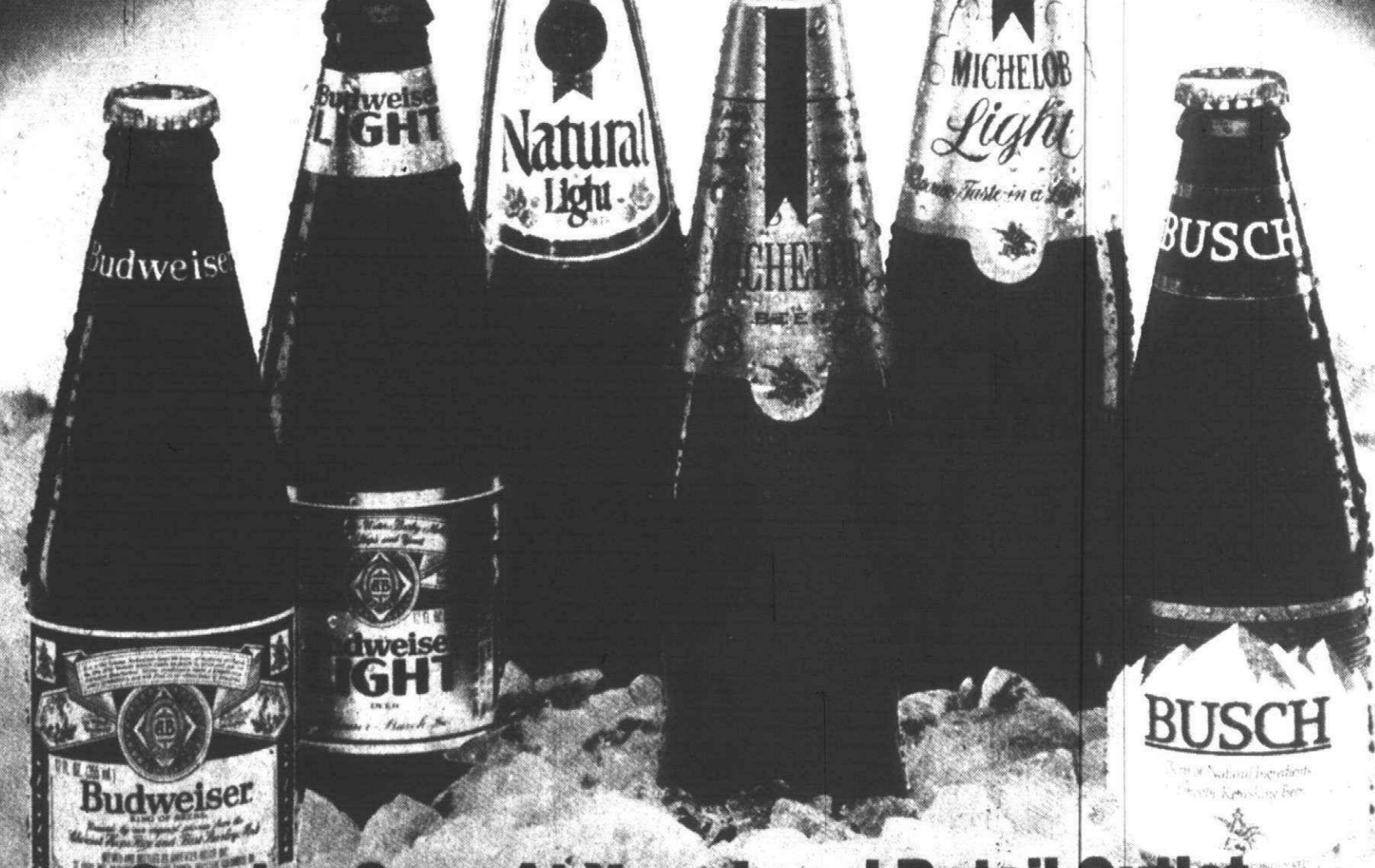

Despite the loss, in some respects it was the Rocks' finest hour. They blocked shots, stopped just about every Southwestern fast-break attempt and played fine defense.

Antoine Joubert, Southwestern's 6-foot-5 sensation, was a marked man. Salem worked him over pretty

good. Six different players took turns hawking the All-Stater. His shooting, however, was abnormal (eight of 27 from the floor). He looked frustrated at times even though he finished with 33 points.

In some respects, it appeared the officials Thursday night protected him. He shot 19 free throws.

But as Southwestern continues to win, his celebrity status continues to grow day by day.

But the real problem was a contrast in styles. Southwestern likes a finesse game while Salem plays physical. The whistle seemed inconsistent at times. But the game was emotional, a tough one to call.

IT WAS a new experience for Joubert, an exceptional talent who can shoot, pass and handle the ball with the greatest of ease.

But if it was the team's finest hour, it was one of the fans' worst. The Salem fans goaded Joubert prior to the game with taunts of "Antoine who?" He glared back at the

stands during warmups and in the first quarter.

The Salem fans' conduct was inexcusable. Bush league all the way. The few who ruined it for the rest threw garbage on the court (pennies, pencils and paper) when things didn't go their way. Southwestern coach Perry Watson,

sitting on the bench, was hit in the back by flying objects a couple of times.

The Southwestern fans acted in a more civilized manner with the exception of a group of four or five in the front row at midcourt who tried to intimidate the officials.

## Searching for fire leads to adventure for early 'stooges'

Naoh, Amoukar and Gaw. Are they the Three Stooges? No, although at times they may act like them.

These three early homo sapiens are the heroes of "Quest for Fire" (R), a science fantasy set 80,000 years ago at the end of the Ice Age.

The director, Jean-Jacques Annaud (he directed "Black and White in Color," which won the Academy Award in 1978 as Best Foreign Language Film), and the producers went to great lengths to give it an authentic appearance.

They filmed in Scotland, Canada and Africa, they hired novelist and linguist Anthony Burgess to create appropriate languages, and they recruited behavioral theorist Desmond Morris (author of "The Naked Ape") to devise compatible body languages and gestures.

WE CAN'T ASSESS the validity of their contributions. Who knows how these people spoke or acted? Within, the context of the movie, however, the language and gestures seem reasonable and consistent.

Furthermore, as used by the exceptionally fine cast of unknown actors, it enhances the development of the plot. There is no need to understand the words to know what is happening. The story is simple and the action plentiful.

The three men belong to the Ulam tribe. The Ulams are cave dwellers. They use fire and know how to maintain it, but they cannot create fire.

When they are attacked by a band of marauding Neanderthals, they are driven from their caves to a marshy area. Worse yet, they lose their vessel of fire. The three ablest warriors are then sent on a mission to find fire and bring it back to the tribe.

Their journey takes them beyond their tribal grounds to one adventure after another as the movie condenses a long span of human history into the period of their journey — a few weeks or months. It's not clear how long they were gone.

THEY ENCOUNTER saber-toothed tigers (much better groomed than the Ulams), a cannibalistic tribe, woolly mammoths, and a more advanced tribe, the Ivakas, who know how to create fire, build shelters and make pottery.

One of the Ivakas, Ika, was a captive of the cannibals. She was freed when the savages fought with the three Ulams. She tagged along with the warriors, and Naoh, their leader, claimed her for himself.

When he awoke next morning and found she had left, he discovered a new emotion — love. He followed her and remained with her and her tribe until his two companions joined him. Then all four left together to return to the Ulam tribe.

Meanwhile, he had received some basic sexual education, learned to create fire by friction, learned to laugh (caveman humor is of the rock-falling-on-someone's-head variety), and he had become monogamous.

This is a very entertaining movie, but those with delicate sensibilities should be warned. There is a lot of head bashing, random sex and general coarseness. Personally, I found the music to be the most offensive aspect of the movie because it is so overwhelming. Did these cavemen always fight to an orchestral accompaniment?

STILL, "QUEST for Fire" accomplishes what, I think, Annaud intended. It shows how difficult and precarious life was for these early humans. It shows that even with people so different from us as these, we share common experiences and emotions — love, friendship, loyalty, compassion and, above all, a willingness to learn.

The movie's success owes a great deal to its cast: Everett McGill, Ron Perlman and Nameer El-Dadi as the three Ulam warriors and Rae Dawn Chong as Ika. Their gestures, expressions and actions convey everything we need to know.

McGill as Naoh is a joy to watch. His wonder at seeing the Ivakas create fire is one of the beautiful sights of the movie. His spark of intelligence, like the one campfire we see burning on the vast dark plain, heralds hope for mankind's survival, at least for 80,000 years.

# Frequent washings are best protection for car

It pays to clean the exterior of your car — both in pride of ownership and in resale or longer life. And with warmer weather coming on longer, you can wash the outside of your car without suffering frostbite.

Exterior paint requires some care to retain gloss and depth of color. The best care is to keep the finish clean by frequent washings, say engineers at Fisher Body Division of General Motors.

The car should be washed in cold or lukewarm water. Don't use hot water or wash in direct rays of the sun.

And don't use a strong soap or chemical detergent. There are mild cleaning agents on the market, but be sure they aren't allowed to dry on the finish.

SOME MATERIALS may attack the finish of your car. These include such things as tree sap, bird droppings, chemicals from industrial stacks, road oil, tar or ice-melting agents. They can cause permanent damage to the finish, if they aren't removed soon. If prompt washing doesn't remove them, additional cleaners may be needed. But read the "how to use" directions first.

Polish and wax are still top notch ways to preserve your car's finish. Polishing is recommended to remove a film of accumulated residue and eliminate any weathered appearance. But don't expect long-range miracles.

Waxes fill the microscopic cracks in the surface and will give temporary gloss. Every time the car is washed, however, some of that wax is removed.

IN ADDITION, don't expect wax or lusterizing sealants to protect car finishes from long exposures to ultraviolet rays. Both are so thin that such protection is not possible, engineers say.

Chrome and stainless steel parts should be cleaned regularly to keep their luster. If water doesn't do the trick, use a chrome polish.

Never use bleach, steam or a caustic soap to clean aluminum. A coating of wax, rubbed to a high polish, is recommended for all bright metal parts.

Do not use any abrasive cleaner on plastic parts. This is especially true for bright plastic parts. However, plastic will benefit from a protective coating of wax.

Cleaners for white sidewall tires are available, but don't get a white sidewall cleaner on wheel aluminum trim. A stiff bristle brush will help clean sidewalls.

POWERED OR mild foaming-type cleansers may be used to clean vinyl tops. A soft bristle brush may be needed. Rise the top thoroughly, and then rinse any of the soapy material that reaches the body finish. Don't use any volatile-type cleansers or household cleaning agents.

Rust is not as great a danger if you keep the finish protected and fill in scratches as they occur.

Rust is most likely to occur in the hidden, interior panels, so that's where rust prevention treatments are found. On the lower portion of the body sides, a plastic spray may be applied over the primer paint coat. This tough material resists chipping from stones thrown up from the roadway.
