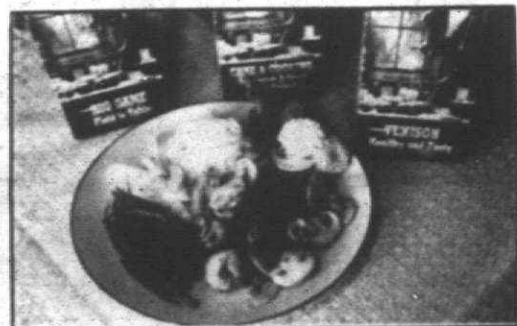

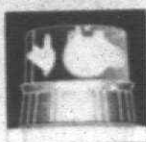

Son's 911 call saves mom's life

Seven-year-old Michael Potter asked his father if he did right by calling 911 when his mother fainted

in her Canton home Oct. 26.

"How can I stress more importantly that you saved your mom's life," Jim Potter said he told his son. Michael has been recommended by

the Canton Police Department for a civilian commendation for the efforts that saved his mother, who had a seizure and fell to the floor in her house on Antietam Drive at about 12:40 p.m.

Mary Potter, 34, was coming out of a bedroom when she collapsed. "He heard her fall," Jim Potter said.

The Bentley Elementary School student called 911 and told a dispatcher that his mom had fallen and was bleeding from her mouth, ac-

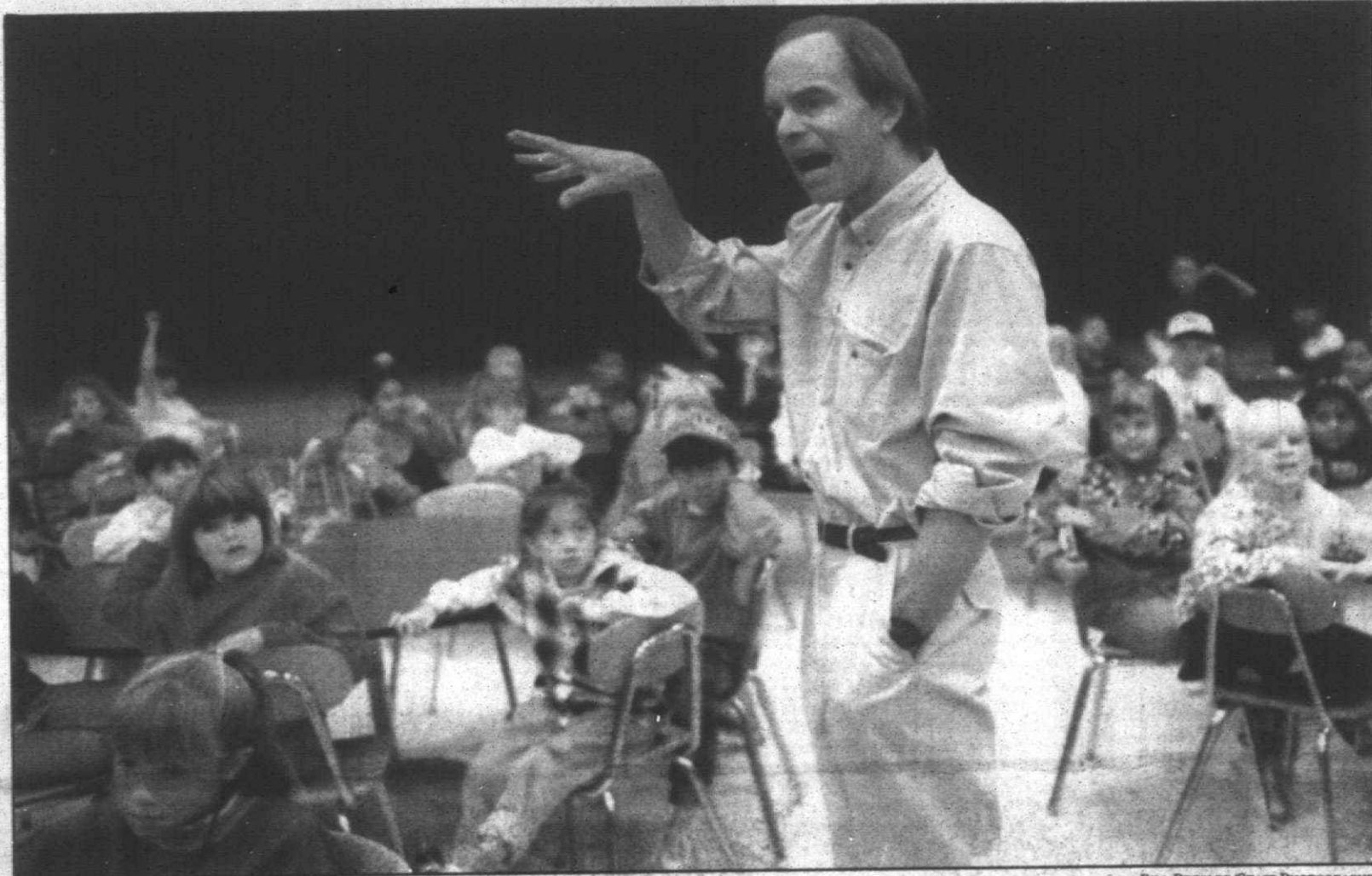
ording to fire and police reports.

"I've been trying to piece things together," Jim Potter said. "He was holding up her fingers and asking her how many fingers she had. She was staring off into space when he called 911."

Mary Potter was taken to Annapolis Hospital where she remained as of Friday. "She's coming along," Jim Potter said.

Canton has tool to block strip malls

A new zoning tool is available to prevent traditional strip malls in Canton's residential areas.

"We are hoping this quiets some of the fears on our C-1 (neighborhood shopping) district," said Jeff Goulet, Canton planner. "Hopefully what this will do is stop strip development in our residential areas."

Rewriting the C-1 district from neighborhood shopping to village shopping district will limit uses in the commercial areas while requiring architectural standards and designs to make the developments compatible with nearby residential areas.

Under the village shopping district, the buildings can't be linear like traditional strip malls. They must be oriented around a courtyard, square or village green. Building materials used must be compatible with the residential areas.

Also significant is that roof lines must be pitched, not flat, and that

covered walkways, canopies or awnings will be used in main pedestrian areas. Primary building entrances must be recessed or protruded from the facade.

The new regulations won't allow one business to use more than 5,000 square feet unless special land use approval is obtained. Each village shopping project must contain a minimum of two primary buildings.

Parking in the village shopping districts will be in the side or rear yards, not the front unless it's a corner where it may be permitted in the front yard of the street. Sidewalks or bikepaths must be included. An amenity such as a bell, clock tower, sculpture, fountain or public art must be included, but not for commercial advertising.

"These items will be the standard," Goulet said. "We see it as a valuable tool for commercial development. The primary focus is that it is compatible

Canton homeowners will be turned into humus and made available free in 1995.

Task force extends reach to kids, violence

The more than one-year-old Canton gang task force is enlarging its focus from strictly gang-related issues to violence and children.

"Our efforts and energies have worked well to put a tulle in gang efforts," said Tammie Colling, Canton Police Department community relations officer. "But we have to do more than gang-related issues. We are looking at the whole situation."

Canton police have witnessed an increase in violent behavior among children. "It's not to the degree you see in the city. We are

not seeing guns and other weapons. We are seeing the physical contact in and out of the schools," Colling said, adding that the use of intimidation is also increasing.

The task force formed when problems with gangs and gang-related problems surfaced at Canton Commons Apartments in 1993. Police mobilized efforts to address problems there, as well as throughout the Canton, Plymouth and Plymouth Township communities. Police also worked with Canton Commons management to make improvements in the complex with lighting and other security features.

The task force stressed not only police efforts but help from the

school district, as well as social service agencies, such as Growth Works, Salvation Army and Family Service Detroit and Wayne County.

"It's a community issue. It affects each and everyone of us in all aspects of our lives," Colling said.

The task force plans to conduct a survey of high school and middle school students about youth violence and intimidation. "We're going to see what are the concerns of our youthful population," Colling said.

Using intimidation against classmates, for example, is a sign of what's happening with today's youths. "Intimidation comes from

the fact that you have to show strength on the outside because you don't have it on the inside," Colling said, adding that the use of intimidation is also increasing.

"You have to take a look at resolving things peacefully, but then the kids go home where often force still rules," Plecha said. "The family is still the cornerstone."

Plecha said attention also must be given to other factors that affect children's less-than-passive reactions. She included violent movies, video games, television and songs. "You add all of that. It's pretty much propaganda. But in real life we tell them to talk it out," Plecha said.

Parents must be aware of the

messages they send to kids. "A lot of it comes from not thinking about it. We spend a lot of trying to get rid of behavior we don't want rather than what we do want."

Plecha said it's time to include youths in the community. "We need to socialize kids to be a part of the whole community. The more opportunities we can give them to experience things, they'll hook into things."

The task force will look at programs that might be available for youths at the new Summit on the Park community center. "It's very important we have kids in the planning of things to do them," she said.

with the residential area and adds rather than detracts.

Township Supervisor Tom Yack questioned whether such regulations are defensible in court. Goulet told him that the regulations are performance standards, not necessarily architectural controls. "In the state of Michigan, architectural controls have not been upheld," Goulet said.

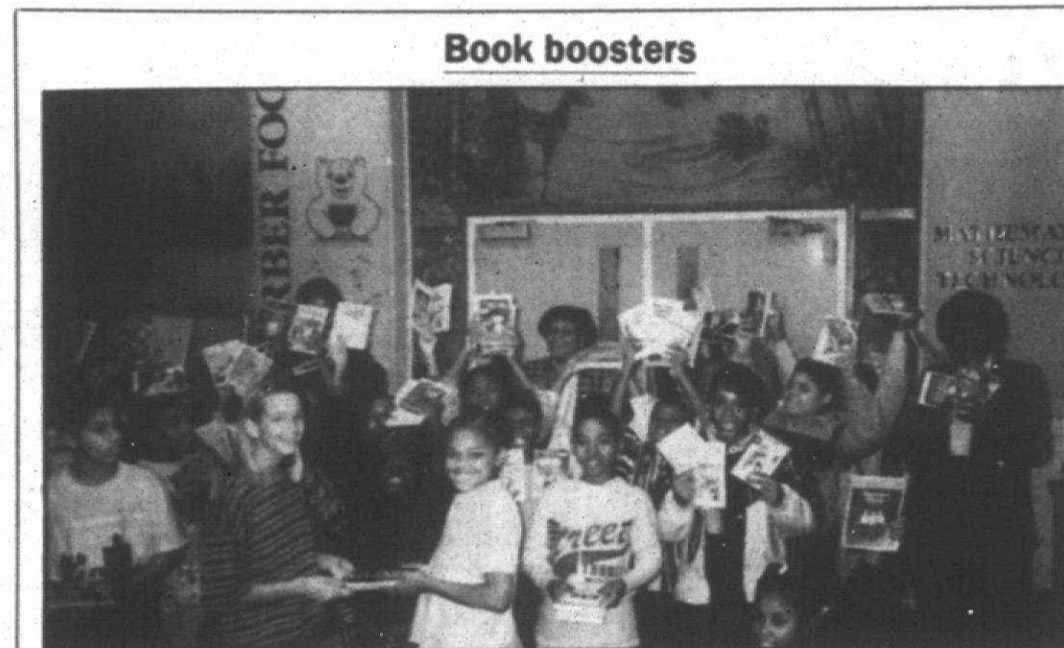
The new regulations will not affect developers who want to renovate their existing developments, though efforts will be made to encourage them to meet the new standards, Goulet said.

Examples of C-1 districts are Cavalier Corners on the northeast

corner of Cherry Hills and Sheldon, southwest corner of Cherry Hill and Lilley; northeast corner of Palmer and Haggerty; north corner of Cherry Hill and Canton Center; and the corners of Warren and Canton Center and Warren and Lilley.

Some of these sites are planned unit developments in which agreements were made between developers and the township in the 1970s. "Most PUDs grandfathered development in on regulations in place at that time," Goulet said.

The new regulations follow recommendations in the Ford Road Task Force report that was re-

According to police and fire information, Michael gave the 911 dispatcher his address and stayed on the line while emergency rescue was alerted. He was able to answer all necessary questions over the portable phone he was using while keeping a check on his mother.

Michael told the dispatcher that he could tell his mom was still breathing by watching her chest rise and fall and that she has a history of fainting spells. With the portable phone, Michael told the dispatcher when he heard the emergency sirens and when help arrived.

Michael learned about 911 not only from his parents but from a public safety booklet for children. "We stress the importance of it (911) and that it's not a toy," Jim Potter said.

The booklet also has blanks for children to fill in emergency numbers. "He filled them in by himself," Jim Potter said. Michael also informed emergency personnel how his dad and grandmother could be reached.

Parents are encouraged to teach their children emergency information, such as when and how to dial 911.

"Kids get nervous. We want them to be able to say who they are and what help is needed," said firefighter Mike Caruso.

The 911 system automatically tells dispatchers where a call is coming from. If a child hangs up, dispatchers are able to call back. But it is preferred that callers stay on the line to keep communications open and to provide dispatchers with necessary information.

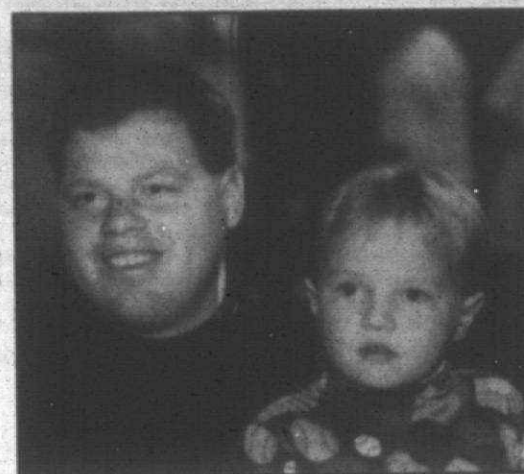

Kids call shots on play structure

Canton kids don't mince words. They want a play structure with a bridge, maze, twisted slide, ropes, a cave, tunnels, monkey bars, tires, a sandbox, and bouncing star.

"Your kids want a mirror maze," said architect John Dean of Robert S. Leathers and Associates to parents gathered for the Canton Community-Built Playscape kickoff rally Thursday.

Dean and architect Dave Inanello met with students at most of Canton's elementary schools all day Thursday to get an idea of what kind of wooden volunteer-built play structure kids want in Heritage Park. Ideas also came from children involved in Canton's organized playground programs.

"For one thing, it (playscape) offers kids a choice," Dean told parents and children at a crowded Center Stage, 39940 Ford Rd., Thursday, when the preliminary design of Canton's new playscape was unveiled. Copies of the design will be available in about two weeks.

"Each playground is different," Dean said. "All kids are different. But how we lay them out is different."

Based on what kids told Dean

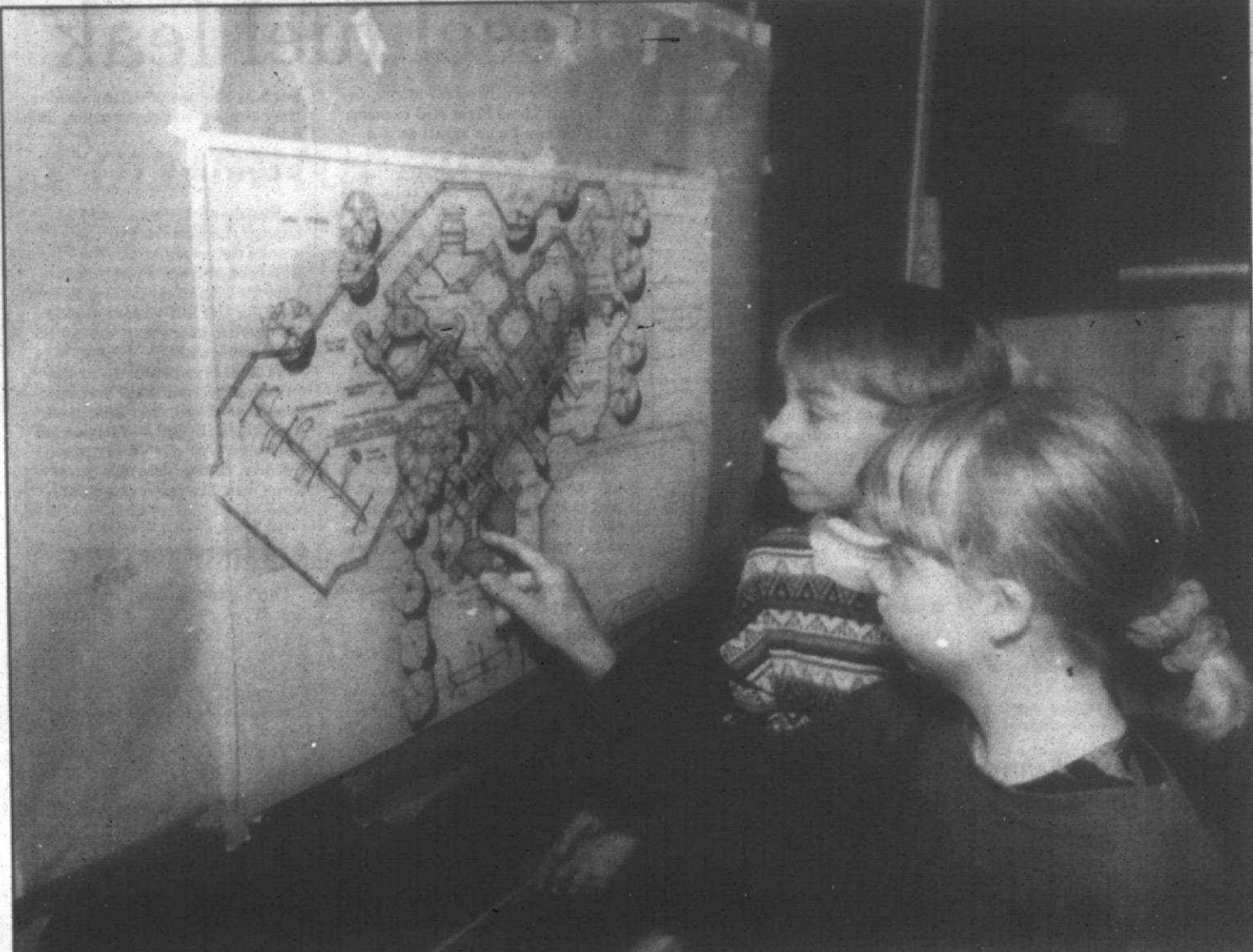

and Inanello all day, Canton's playscape will feature a castle maze with a spiral staircase to a tower, as well as a bouncing bridge, twisted slide, fort, swings, tires and even a tot lot.

"It's a place for little ones with a fence around it," Dean said, adding it will feature a sandbox and playhouse.

The 3-D maze will have a center room with mirrors, as well as a cave and tunnels. The playscape will feature a pirate ship with a crow's nest. Kids will be able to talk via a pipe to their friends all over the playground.

The playscape that will be near the picnic shelter in Heritage Park also will boast a bouncing star, spider web climber, fire pole, tube slide and

a fort to accommodate children in wheelchairs - a concern many children expressed.

"Young ones are concerned about all kids having access to the playground," he added. Much will be used as the ground surface for the playscape, which allows wheelchairs to move over it. The playscape will be mounted on totem poles set into deep holes, Dean said.

When the playscape is built over five days by hundreds of volunteers, residents will see

something pretty close to an old-fashioned barn-raising. Building the playscape will similar to framing two, mid-sized subdivision homes in five days, Dean said.

In addition to needing volunteers to help build the multi-level wooden structure, playscape organizers need donated materials and equipment.

"All the tools are lent the project for five days," Dean said. Organizers already have been fundraising to reach the \$100,000 goal. At Thursday's

playscape rally, organizers received a \$7,000 check from the Canton Soccer Club. The effort already has received \$30,000 from Canton Township, as well as \$2,000 from Pulte Homes of Michigan, plus another \$500 from the recent Canton Country Fling.

"This is a great start. We have had great support from the township," said organizer Christine Donaldson. "I hope you will all get involved with your children and make it a reality."

Music for the playscape kick-

off rally was provided by Sound Machine, with a cheer from the Canton High School cheerleaders. T-shirts bearing the playscape's new name and logo - Heritage Hideout - also were on sale.

Organizers are still seeking additional volunteers for a number of committees, including construction, childcare, fundraising, materials, tools, food, public relations, children's and administrative.

Field trip plan draws concern

Plymouth-Canton School Superintendent Charles Little says students will be safer and the district less vulnerable with parent-driven field trips becoming a thing of the past.

But some remain unconvinced that his back-up plan is a good one, or that it's being well-communicated.

Little said school buses and drivers can be used for field trips between 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. at a cost of 88 cents per mile and \$11 per hour for labor.

Parents may still go on field trips, but as chaperones, not drivers.

Sharon Belobradich told the school board she's come to appreciate how valuable field trips are, having taught first grade in the district for 29 years.

"Education doesn't always take place within four walls," she said. "A student of mine was walking through Miller Woods and said, 'I've never been in a forest before.' It was a

thrill for that child," said Belobradich, who teaches at Hoben.

"If this is going to be the new policy, then do something about the bus policy. Eighty-eight cents a mile and \$11 per hour adds considerable cost. Return by 1:30 p.m. is an impossibility. It's difficult to get through the zoo in three, let alone two hours.

"It doesn't seem fair because there are schools where finance is not a problem. I urge you to reconsider your policy on bus usage."

Sue Poniatowski told the school board she's "not satisfied with the way the new policy is being communicated." Poniatowski helped set up a Miller Elementary School field trip to Lansing recently.

"We were told bus drivers weren't available Thursday, Oct. 20 and to switch the trip to the next day. We made arrangements for the change, only to be told drivers weren't available. We were rescheduled for March.

"It was obvious there was no

communication between the transportation office and our principal," she said. "I was there for several of the phone calls that day."

Poniatowski said she doesn't want to incur liability, "but I think the policy should be clear. I hope money is made available for field trips," she added. "It shouldn't be the full responsibility of PTO's."

Said Little: "We have limited funds. I guess the day is here when there are constraints placed on the school budget. There's not an unlimited amount of money for things as valuable as field trips. Don't think there is funding available, because there isn't."

Safety remains the key issue, said Little. "We can't risk having an accident with a carload of youngsters, not to mention the liability of the chain of command that would authorize trips. It could freeze us for years. The prudent step to take is to use our transportation window," and the district's buses and drivers.

Defense cuts bleeding local firm

A Plymouth tank parts maker is joining other military suppliers in an effort to lobby Congress to restore defense cutbacks.

Loc Performance Products, Inc., on Industrial Drive just east of Massey Field, has written letters to Congress, urging support for legislation to restore cuts made this summer to the M-1 tank program.

"The vast majority of our business is in defense work, we make tank and truck parts and the majority of those are for the spare market," said Jim Johnston, company sales manager.

During the summer, more than \$300 million was cut from the M1 upgrade program, which cut annual production from 120 upgrades to 70.

which has employed as many as 160 employees, had its workforce drop to 120 from resulting layoffs and employees leaving because they couldn't get as many hours as before.

"We have employees with families, they have house payments, car payments, kids going to school," said Victor Vojcek, president of the firm.

The letters to Congress draw the attention of John Schall, Republican candidate for U.S. Congress in Michigan's 13 District, which includes greater Plymouth.

Schall toured the company's main facility on Wednesday, talking with workers and company officials.

He supports restoring funding to the tank upgrade program. "When those on the far left cut defense spending, they're really harming the

American economy. The situation here at Loc demonstrates that defense cuts hurt real people right here in our own community," he said.

Schall is running against Democrat Lynn Rivers, for the U.S. House seat now held by Rep. Bill Ford, D-Ypsilanti. Rivers supports some defense cuts.

Loc Performance Products' primary defense products are tank components including road arm assemblies, suspension housings, track adjusters and wheel hubs.

The Defense Appropriations Committee in September recommended, through an appropriations conference bill, that \$108 million be appropriated in an M-1 upgrade program for 24 additional tanks. Final action on the bill has yet to be taken by the full Congress.

Firemen defuse diesel fuel leak

Listed below are some of the Canton fire and rescue incidents reported during the past week, as well as fire safety tips and programs available free to the community. Year-to-date (Jan. 1-Oct. 27) runs for the Canton Fire Department: 2,891.

FIRE CALLS

FUEL SPILL
Firefighters spent most of the evening and early morning hours working on a diesel fuel leak at a motel at Michigan Avenue and Lotz Road, Oct. 20.

Firefighters were called to the scene at 9 p.m. when about 20-25 gallons of diesel fuel spilled. A semi-truck that was hauling tractor trucks piggyback pulled into the driveway of the motel when a fuel tank on one of the tractor trucks was ruptured, according to fire department personnel.

The diesel fuel spilled onto the driveway and into a storm sewer. One of the fire department officers who is a member of the regional hazardous materials team was on duty at the time. There was no need to call in the larger HAZMAT team, fire personnel said.

The spill did not cause a fire. But people in the area, such as at a nearby strip mall were evacuated. No buildings were shut down.

Schools to seek an 18 mill renewal

A suggested date for the proposed issue to be decided by voters was not discussed, only that the need will eventually arise.

Trustee Mark Horvath said, "This vote is required as a result of Proposal A. We have no control over it. The result of not passing this renewal would be \$14 million lost."

"We are not looking for additional money," added Horvath. "We're looking to keep what we already have."

Trustee Sue Feiten suggested getting word to the PTO Council

Alternatives offered to Rivers, Schall

If the Democratic and Republican candidates for Congress in the 13th District don't get you all excited, consider the two alternatives.

Although Republican John Schall and Democrat Lynn Rivers have gotten all the headlines, Libertarian Craig Seymour and Workers League candidate Helen Halyard would like you to consider them as well.

The 13th District includes Canton and Plymouth townships, Plymouth, Westland, Garden City and the southwest quadrant of Livonia.
Seymour, 26, of Westland, works in retail sales for a food distributor. In his spare time, he publishes a newsletter called "Capital and Liberty."
Seymour is running for Congress on the premise that "government has only one legitimate function, and that is to protect individual rights," according to his campaign literature.

His top priorities, he said, are to protect the right to keep and bear arms and to lobby for U.S. withdrawal from international organizations like the United Nations and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Seymour would also like to balance the federal budget, in part by selling most of the property the federal government owns.

Halyard, 43, of Detroit, is a socialist. It doesn't matter that she doesn't live in the 13th District, she said, because "we have a program that represents the working class, and the working class lives

Halyard believes in public ownership of banks, large corporations, the health care industry and more. She would also have the government confiscate all income more than \$150,000 a year.

In her campaign literature, Halyard claims that the increase in interest rates in 1994 was done for nefarious reasons.

Youth at risk

Forum tackles juvenile delinquency

The chief lament at a League of Women Voters forum on "youth at-risk" last Wednesday was that most of the officials who were invited didn't show up and the ones who did left early.

"The key people who could help and make a difference, they leave," said Lewis Colson, who chairs the Metro Detroit Commission to Prevent Crime, Drugs and Violence. "They didn't see enough people here. That's why they left. When they see a full auditorium they'll stick around."

Attendance at the event, held in the Livonia Library auditorium, was about 20.

Colson and Robert Bee, the director of child welfare licensing for the state Department of Social Services, were the only officials to stay for the whole four-hour meeting.

Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano, state Rep. Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth, and county commissioner Edward Boike, D-Taylor, all spoke and left early.

The topic was juvenile delinquency and what to do with them. Colson said that his commis-

sion, which is not affiliated with government, is comprised of volunteers who are tired of waiting for government to address the problem of juvenile delinquency.

"We could not wait for our city officials to name a blue ribbon committee to study the problem."

Colson hopes, however, that the government will give his group some money to use for programs to prevent juvenile delinquency. "We're going to design the model for the nation," he said, "design a prevention strategy. We want to be known as the prevention capital of the United States."

Boike said he recently toured the county youth home and wasn't impressed.

"For what they have there, they're not doing a bad job," he said. "But if something major was to happen, you'd almost have to make a 911 call to get someone to respond."

The youth home, which houses 210 juvenile offenders, was recently renovated, but Boike said the work was "an absolute waste of money."

County prevention programs are also ineffective, he claimed.

Vorva said that government should give more money to community-based organizations who work with kids. "You have to take the money to where the problem is and work with the money right there," he said.

The key is to teach people morality, Vorva said. "All of us know that poor people aren't bad people," he said, noting that he grew up poor in Alabama, the illegitimate son of a 16-year-old mother.

"My mother still taught me right from wrong," the former police officer said. "We need to start teaching people some accountability and responsibility. By and large, we have told people they no longer have to be accountable for their actions."

Vorva concluded his remarks by noting that he can be very candid because he lost his primary and cannot be re-elected. "I'm in a real good position to say whatever I want," he said.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. C-94-10 EMERGENCY WATER USE REDUCTION ORDINANCE

THIS ORDINANCE AMENDS CHAPTER 73, WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH, BY ADDING SECTION 73.240 ET SEQ WHICH SHALL BE KNOWN AS THE EMERGENCY WATER USE REDUCTION ORDINANCE. AN ORDINANCE TO DECLARE A WATER USE REDUCTION EMERGENCY; PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION OF METERS TO MONITOR WATER FLOW AND WATER REDUCTION; PROVIDING THAT POLICE OFFICERS AND CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS ARE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUE ORDINANCE VIOLATION NOTICES AND CITATIONS UNDER THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR CONDITIONS WARRANTING INITIATION OF WATER USE REDUCTION; PROVIDING FOR A DECLARATION OF A WATER USE REDUCTION EMERGENCY; PROVIDING FOR A PROHIBITION OF WATER USE DURING A WATER USE REDUCTION EMERGENCY; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 73.240. This Section provides that every person, firm, or corporation shall be subject to the Ordinance. The Public Works Manager may enter premises and install meters for measuring water use. Section 73.243. This Section provides for the prohibition of water use during a Water Use Reduction Emergency and exceptions.

Section 73.244. This Section provides for penalties for violation of this Ordinance.

Section 2. This Section provides that every day the violation continues is a separate violation.

Section 3: Severing Clause. This Section provides that adoption of this Ordinance does not affect proceedings, prosecutions for violation of law, penalties and matured rights and duties in effect before the effective date of this Ordinance.

Section 4: Severability. This Section provides that any unenforceable section can be severed from the rest of the Ordinance.

Section 5: Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances. This Section provides that all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 6: Effective Date. This Section provides that this Ordinance shall become effective upon publication.

MTRC, based in Westland, provides on-going technical assistance and services to Youth Assistance Programs in 22 Wayne County communities for at-risk children.

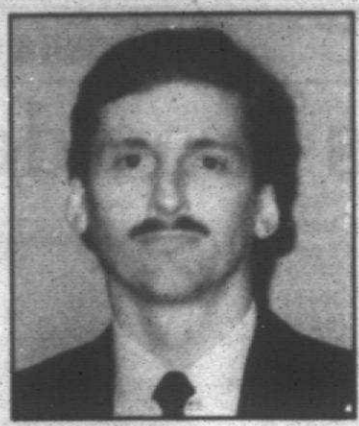
MTRC also operates the Alternative Intervention Method Pro-

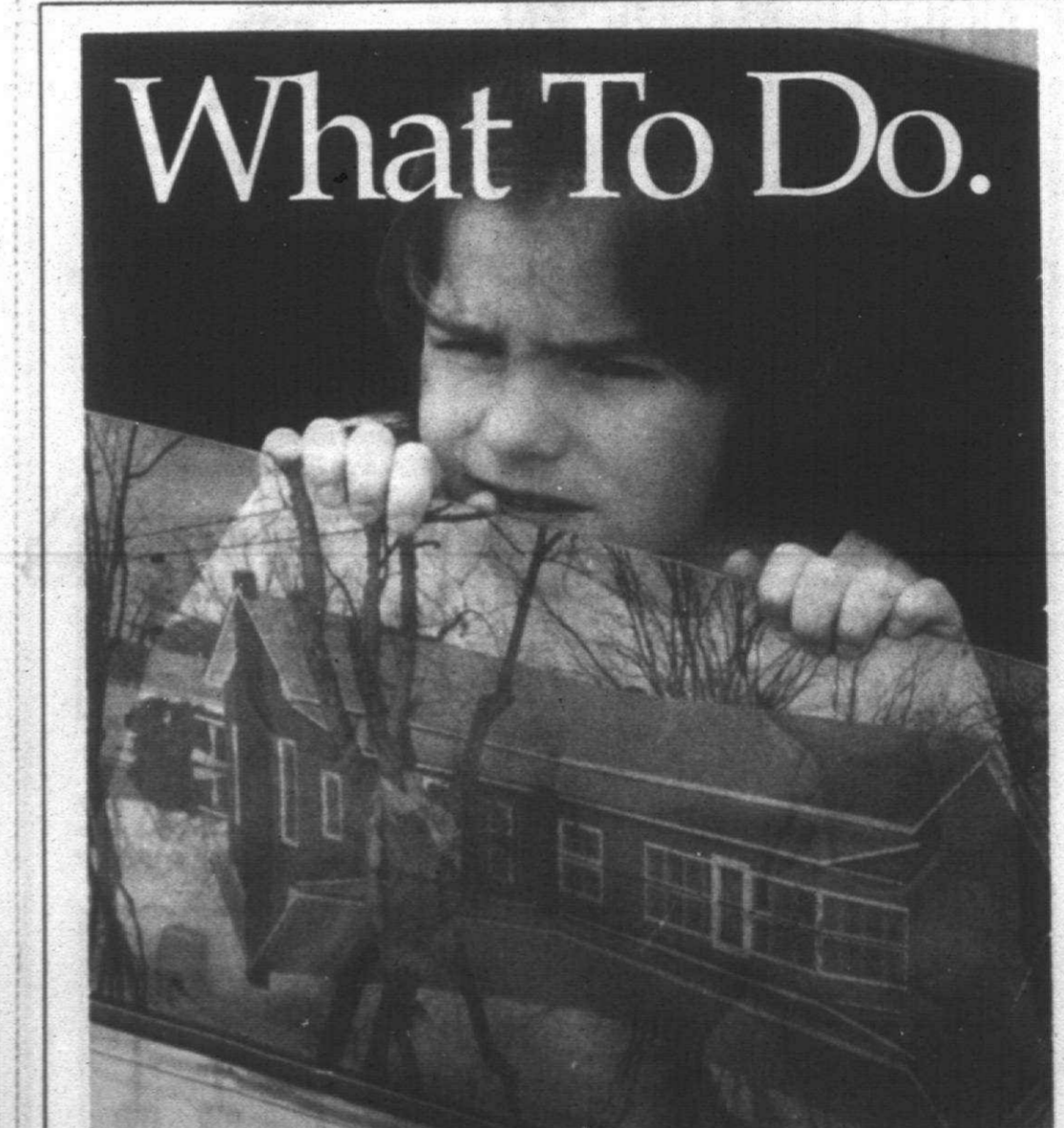

Test score studies provide interesting comparisons

Q: My son recently took the Scholastic Aptitude Test and is now sweating the results. He is a B+ student. He felt he "lightened up" during the SAT testing. We are worried. It seems every newspaper article I read on the SAT scores shows how low our students are scoring nationally. Are students today scoring that much lower on the SAT than in the past?

math section. How bad are we today in comparison? In 1983, 11 percent of our students scored above 650 on the math section. That is an increase of 4.32 percent when compared with the original 1941 group. And today we are testing over 30 percent minorities of which over 30 percent have family incomes in the \$20,000-\$30,000 range. A different population than the 98 percent, affluent, private school, upper class student population that set the original standard in 1941.

You refer to how the news stories you read point out how bad SAT scores are. I personally don't believe and never have believed the press is the enemy of education. It is the enemy of the truth. I believe it is "deadlines" and simply time to study the issue.

For instance, George Will, the nationally syndicated writer whom I thoroughly enjoy reading, wrote a column entitled, Meaningless Money Factor. He pointed out that states with more money don't even score as well as "poorer" states on the SAT. To make his case, George pointed out that the top five SAT scoring states, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah and Minnesota were relatively very low spenders on education while New Jersey spent more money and yet was down in the pack on SAT scores. What George didn't point out is that only 5 percent of the student population took the SAT in Iowa, only 6 percent in North and South Dakota, 4 percent in

Utah and 10 percent in Minnesota... probably the student cream of the crop. No, did he mention that in the wealthier state New Jersey, which he used as a comparison, 76 percent of the seniors took the SAT. The more students taking the test (76 percent in New Jersey as compared to 5 percent in Iowa) the more "average" or below average the New Jersey students are tested. A first year high school student in math can figure that out. New Jersey, which tests 76 percent of its students on the SAT will not look good when compared to a state (Iowa, etc.) which tested only 4 percent to 6 percent on the SAT... most likely it's brightest students.

And to compound Will's lack of factual data in his column is that most students in the states he cited which spent the least money on education (Utah, etc.) don't even take the SAT. In the states he cited as winners, over

90 percent of the students take the ACT, the American College Admission Test. Reporting in general numbers without breaking down the data can be newsworthy but not necessarily factual. How can he compare one state, New Jersey in which 76 percent take the SAT with "poorer states," Utah where only 6 percent take the SAT. Apples and oranges!

One of the most interesting studies from the National Center for Educational Statistics study ranked the top finishers on the International Assessment of Educational Progress (IAEP-2), a test that compares nations, states and groups within nations.

Top finishers: Asian students (U.S.) 287, Taiwan 285, Korea 283, advantaged urban white students (U.S.) 283, white students (U.S.) 277, Hungary 277.

Bottom scorers: Jordan 246, Mississippi 246, Hispanic students (U.S.) 245, disadvantaged urban white students (U.S.) 239, black students (U.S.) 236. From the data above it is clear that specific groups of American students score at the top, that includes Asian students (U.S.)... advantaged urban students (U.S.), and white students (U.S.). And it should be noted that 70 percent of our K-12 population is made up of white and Asian students.

Recognizing it is not politically correct to break data down in this enlight-

ened era, the fact is that Mississippi, Hispanic, disadvantaged urban white and black students scored at the bottom in the international study, Education in States and Nations. And those scores impact on this nation's overall score. Of course, this data is a reflection of a multitude of inner city societal problems we must address.

But these facts are overlooked when those with a need want to take another shot at public education. No more fair than for me not to state that educated, wealthy blacks out score many Asians... which negates any thought of blacks not being capable.

You ask if our students are scoring lower today than in the past. Review the data and make your own decision. As far as your concern about your son "lightening up" during the SAT... this is very normal. When I took my doctoral degree final, I didn't sleep the night before.

Salespersons going in for a big sale experience this, coaches before game, band directors... principals before major meetings, lawyers before cases, editors before deadlines. It's very normal.

Smokeless is no alternative

Recent headlines across the nation read like this: "Smokers Addicted to Nicotine Advised to Switch to Snuff." The author of the article in the "American Journal of Medical Sciences" argues that while cigarette smoking is linked to a host of hazards from heart disease to lung cancer, smokeless tobacco is associated only

with an increased risk of oral cancers.

Suggesting this switch is like telling someone to use a rifle instead of an Uzi.

As an oral and maxillofacial surgeon, I am all too familiar with the ravages of smokeless tobacco. Its devastation is not restricted to the spot in the mouth where smokeless users place the pouch. According to the American Cancer Society, "the use of chewing tobacco or snuff increases the risk of cancer of the mouth, larynx, throat and esophagus

and is a highly addictive habit."

Some other disheartening information regarding smokeless: while cigarette smoking has declined for the seventh year in a row, consumption of snuff has risen for the fourth consecutive year. And, who's using it? More than 22 million persons, age 12 and older have used some form of smokeless. Usage among high school students is as high as 35 percent — 19 percent use some form daily.

Even more shocking, a recent govern-

ment survey found that smokeless users pick up the habit at the average age of 9 1/2 years old... and more than 25 percent of users start dipping snuff by age 5.

So, do we want to suggest that smokeless is a "better alternative?"

The answer is a resounding no! No, we don't want an increase in the more than 29,000 cases of oral cancer that doctors diagnose each year. No, we don't want to increase the number of persons who die as a result of oral cancer from 8,000 each year to an even larger number.

And for those who are among the millions of current smokeless users, I advise you to perform a self-examination at least once a month and see a dentist or oral and maxillofacial surgeon for a yearly exam. McNamara, commission mow down parks budget

Wayne County commissioners approved a \$500,000 cut in parks funding Thursday while enacting a general-fund budget of \$537.8 million for 1995.

The parks cut was part of the budget that Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara delivered to the commission. In fact, McNamara had asked for a \$600,000 cut, but the commission restored \$100,000 of that.

The new parks budget for 1995 is \$1.8 million, and director Hurley Coleman said programs and services will be cut if the money isn't restored.

"We just have to lop off some things we're doing," he said. "Some park areas could be closed down."

Commissioners are hoping to modify the budget in the next month to replace the money that was cut.

Lester Robinson, the budget director for McNamara, said the commission could have easily continued parks funding at 1994 levels, but chose to spend new revenue from fee increases elsewhere.

The budget was approved on a 9-6 vote. Among those voting against the budget were commissioners Michelle Plawecki, D-

Dearborn Heights, who also represents Redford Township and Livonia east of Middlebelt, and Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, who also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

Among those voting for the budget were Vice Chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, who also represents Garden City, and commissioner Bryan Amann, D-Wayne, who also represents Canton Township.

Beard was the commissioner who suggested transferring \$100,000 from the Probate Court to parks, restoring part of McNamara's cut. "The parks system is very important for the quality of life of Wayne County," she said. "We're committed to restoring most, if not all, of that money for the parks."

Amann blamed the budget woes on rising costs and stagnant revenues associated with the property tax cut approved by voters last March.

"This is the first budget where Wayne County has to learn how to live under Proposal A," he said. McCotter and Plawecki said they opposed the budget because of the parks cut. The two freshman commissioners were also disappointed that the commission's personal budget increased by about \$125,000.

The increase was due to in-

creased costs in health insurance and related areas.

"I can't vote for a budget that has an increase for the commission and a decrease for county parks," McCotter said.

Plawecki and McCotter also agree that the commission's personal budget should be cut. They said that a plan already exists to examine the commission budget early next year and make staff reductions. "There will be some people who are let go," Plawecki said.

Amann suggested that the commission's fiscal advisor office should be "seriously economized."

The commission's spending on itself was about \$3 million in 1986 and rose to \$6 million in 1992.

Plawecki and McCotter said that McNamara has an unofficial office budget of \$20 million, and it should be cut, too.

The new budget is expected to be the subject of discussion and modification during the next two commission meetings, tentatively scheduled for 10 a.m. Thursdays, Nov. 3 and 17, in the commission headquarters downtown.

The new budget also includes several fee increases and a new medical examiner fee for moving dead bodies.

Local Red Cross short of type O blood

The Red Cross in southeastern Michigan is appealing for donors with type O blood as shortages threaten the ability of area hospitals to meet patient needs.

As of Thursday, Oct. 20, the general inventory for type O blood at Red Cross headquarters in southeastern Michigan was 92 units, or 10 percent of adequate levels. "We supply blood to 54 hospitals in a five-county

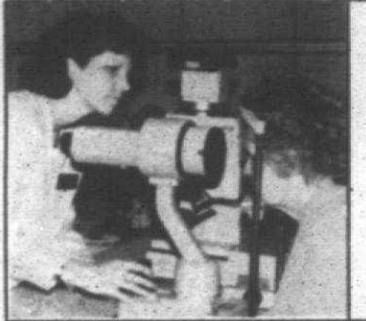
region and those 92 type O units do not leave much room for an emergency."

"There are almost two million people (45 percent of the population) in our area who have type O blood, however, only about 5 percent of eligible individuals donate blood on an annual basis," says Red Cross spokesman Dan Waxman in a press release. "We supply blood to 54 hospitals in a five-county

region and those 92 type O units do not leave much room for an emergency."

Type O blood can be given to people of all ABO blood types. In emergencies when the recipient's blood type is not known, or their specific type is not available, type O blood can be given.

For that reason, it is used in greater proportion to other blood types.

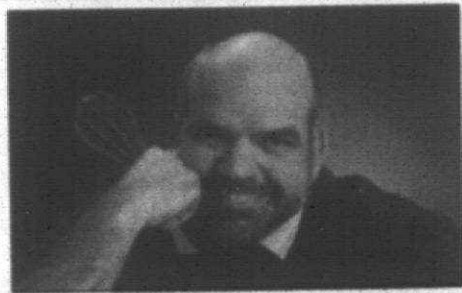

Don't 'stew' over what to cook tonight

When daylight savings time ends, and the clocks fall back an hour, my internal clock begins craving for stew. Rich, thick and hearty, stew is a one pot meal that sticks to the ribs.

On a blustery day a good pot of stew will steam the windows of the kitchen and the soul. Served with some bread or a quick johnnycake to soak up all the juices, stew can be as exotic as a beouf bourgignone, as French as a pot au feu, as British as Shepherd's Pie, or as American as meat and potatoes. And you don't need the skills of a rocket scientist to pull it off.

Cooking method

To "stew" is to cook less tender cuts of beef such as the chuck, shoulder, round or brisket using a moist heat method. These methods help cook the meat in varying amounts of liquid in a closed pot or casserole for relatively long periods of time, therefore rendering a tender meat by-product.

Any type of meat is perfectly acceptable to make a good stew. Beef, lamb and venison offer the perfect tougher cuts that can slowly tenderize in their own cooking liquid, but pork, chicken and small game are also acceptable alternatives.

The liquid medium that surrounds the meat can be as plain as water or as delicate as wine. Personally, I favor a mixture of V-8 vegetable juice cocktail and a few hearty gulps of cheap dry red wine (i.e. Gallo Hearty Burgundy is a Janes Gang favorite). This mix assures a tasty sauce or gravy.

Proper pot

Before you begin a stew, choose an appropriate cooking vessel. A crock pot works wonders for those who work all day. A heavy saucepan on the stove top may tempt to be stirred every now and then, but a Dutch oven or deep casserole nestled gently in the oven is just what this doctor of cuisine prefers to utilize.

A pressure cooker is nice, but for the most part, stew is one of those dishes that begs to be made on a frosty day to help warm the house and diners inside.

Since stews beg to be cooked slowly, it's not one of those meals the beef industry wants you to start at 5:15 p.m. and have ready for a 5:45 p.m. meal. Bigger chunks of meat means longer cooking times. If the clock matters, choose a more tender cut of beef, and cut the meat into small cubes or thinner slices against the grain.

The procedure for preparing a great stew is one of those no brainers that even a beginner can accomplish with minimal fuss. The most difficult task in making stew is to cut the meat into uniform cubes or strips.

Simply cover the cubed meats in a little flour and shaking off the excess, brown the meat in a pan just barely covered with sizzling fat. After the meat is browned over medium high heat, remove the meat and splash a good cup of the cooking liquid over the bottom of the fry pan to loosen any bits of meat and flavors that might have adhered. It's even OK to stir and prod the pieces with a wooden spoon. Look at it this way: by loosening all that stuff off the bottom of the fry pan, it's a cinch to wash!

Experience has taught me to cook the browned meat for an hour or two before adding in the vegetables but either method can be used.

Next, wash, trim, pare and dice the vegetables and toss them in with the meat. Pour on your liquid and sprinkle with salt and pepper. You can get fancy with herbs and spices and add everything from juniper berries to Hungarian sweet paprika, but you'll want to rely on the flavor of the vegetables for a real stew.

Speaking of the vegetables, most stews contain all of your basic vegetables. Carrots, celery, onions and potatoes are the average stewing vegetables but again, you can get as exotic as you wish with the addition of turnips, parsnips, rutabagas, fancy potatoes, peppers, leeks and squash.

Shortcuts

In the produce sections of some grocery stores you'll find a package of vegetables that contains just enough redskin potatoes, onions, celery, carrots and parsley to help stew up a one pound package of chuck complete with a basic recipe.

In the frozen food section, convenience seekers will find a bag filled with frozen vegetables and potatoes that can be "dumped in" with nary the need to scrub a potato or pare a carrot.

Experienced cooks know the benefits of a "bouquet garni" or a blend of fresh parsley, garlic, bay leaf and a few peppercorns tied together in cheesecloth that helps accentuate the flavor and turn a basic stew into a gourmet meal.

HUNTERS ARE WILD ABOUT VENISON

Some people enjoy the thrill of the hunt, others prefer the spoils. Hunters talk about their favorite ways to prepare venison.

Let's make one thing perfectly clear: I'm a lover, not a hunter.

I have, on numerous occasions, hunted, yet when it came time to sight in the six-point buck that was no less than 20 yards away - a clear shot - I raised my rifle, but my heart wouldn't let me pull the trigger.

As a matter of fact, when I saw my first buck, it was all I could do to just stand there, my heart beating what seemed like 200 times a minute. I lowered my rifle and grabbed the binoculars but couldn't hold them steady. I'd prefer to cook venison than to kill it.

But it's evident that I'm in the minority when it comes to hunting. With bow and arrow season well under way, and firearm season beginning Nov. 17, Michigan's 250,000 hunters will pump more than \$40 million into our state economy before the season ends.

Matt Richards of Troy will be one of those hunters. If early results are any indication of his luck (Richards bagged a six pointer just

before dawn Oct. 9 with a bow) the season looks to be prosperous.

Richards has been hunting since he was 8, and has a deep freeze purchased solely for venison hidden in the corner of his Troy rec room.

Richards and two friends bought 40 acres just north of Owosso. They have been lucky enough to have bagged at least two deer every year for the past five years.

An auto worker who turned down a weekend of overtime to begin hunting, Richards agrees with Chef Milos Cihelka (see related story) about the importance of proper field dressing to ensure good tasting venison.

"I know of guys who bagged a deer and properly field dressed it only to strap it onto the front hood of their car, and by the time they returned home, the meat was almost rancid from the heat transfer," Richards said.

He attended Chef Milos' class on butchering last year at the Kitchen Glamor store in Rochester, and now prefers to butcher his own deer.

"About 5 years ago I sent my

deer to a local processor and it was evident they didn't know what they were doing. I ended up with two roasts and 125 pounds of venison burger.

"After observing the ease of technique offered by Chef Milos, butchering my own deer not only saved money, but the results were far superior to the processing plant."

In addition to luscious tenderloins, Richards' favorite style of venison preparation is a dish called "onion roasted venison" that cooks all day in a crock pot.

Don Marshall of Canton enjoys the thrill of the hunt for other reasons.

"I never even held a rifle until three years ago when I suffered a major heart attack and underwent triple bypass surgery," Marshall said.

Having always been a fan of red meat, Marshall was told by his doctor to lay off beef.

When a fellow retiree introduced him to the joys of eating venison, which is low in fat and cholesterol, he decided to join a few friends at a hunting camp near Gaylord.

On the first day out, Marshall bagged a 10 pointer and has been a lover of venison ever since then. Having worked at a butcher shop many years ago, Marshall enjoys butchering his own deer.

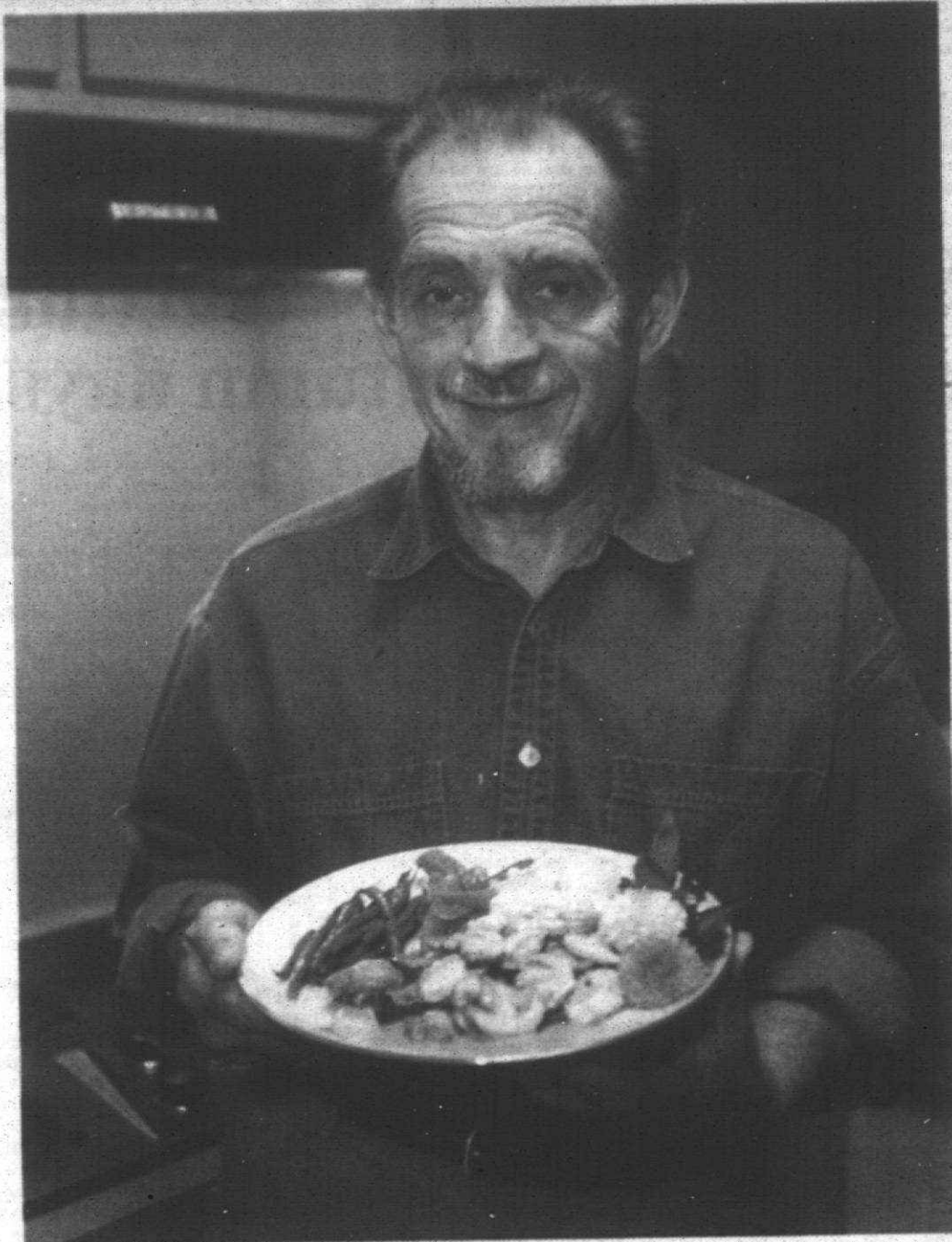
"I enjoy making low-fat stews and roasts and frequently entertain and grill venison tenderloins and serve them with roasted vegetables and Yukon Gold potatoes," he said. "It's a hearty dinner any lover of red meat can really sink their teeth into."

Marshall's wife Carol, who started hunting last year, supervises the wrapping of the meat and enjoys bringing homemade venison sausage to co-workers at a local medical office.

Her co-workers first thought venison was gamey and tough, but Marshall's recipes quickly changed their minds and their appetites.

"Now they ask me when I'm bringing it in," said Carol. Carol and Don belong to a loosely organized gourmet group and

Chef Milos shares secrets in video series

The Wildlife Management Institute reports America's 20 million hunters kill about 4.5 million deer annually.

Hunters add \$14 billion to the economy, making those millions of pounds of venison very valuable meat. Valuable, that is, if properly field dressed and prepared or so says Chef Milos Cihelka (Michigan's first certified Master Chef), who, with noted Michigan outdoorsman Jerry Chiappetta, has produced a three-part video series on the subject.

Co-sponsored by weapons manufacturer Browning and Jeep, this series of videos, its accompanying instructions and recipes, are a must for anyone contemplating "the thrill of the hunt."

Interviewed at his cozy, contemporary Bloomfield Hills home, Chef Milos, semi-retired from the fabled Golden Mushroom restaurant in Southfield, was between free-lance duties.

He's an independent contracting chef at Schoolcraft College in Livonia, and Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills, guest instructor at Kitchen Glamor stores and an official judge for the American Culinary Federation culinary contests. Chef Milos has been experiencing the joys of food, cooking and wild game for more

have prepared a venison ragout for the group that garnered rave reviews.

If it sounds too good that both hunters have prospered in the field, it would be unfair not to add that they both spend an ample amount of time preparing for the hunt.

The fields must be scouted, and blinds and tree stands must be erected. Both hunters have an average of \$1,000 in hunting equipment invested in the sport and spend 3-4 weeks in the fields.

The Marshall family "essily

spends \$500" in a normal weekend with motel and a stop or two at their favorite northern Michigan restaurants.

"But in retrospect, our red meat food costs are virtually zero from mid-October through May," said Richards. "The season is just beginning and it looks like it's going to be a great one."

Whether or not you choose to butcher your own, hunt your own or spend your time letting your fingers do the hunting, great venison dishes are as easy to prepare as red meat.

BLUE COLLAR BEEF STEW
1 1/2 pounds chuck or bottom round, cubed
1 tablespoon kosher salt
1/2 teaspoon fresh ground black pepper
1/4 cup peanut oil
1 white turnip, pared and cut into cubes
2 medium carrots, pared and cut into cubes
2 medium potatoes, cut into cubes
2 onions, cut into cubes
2 ribs celery, cut into cubes
1/2 cup dry red wine
3 cups water

Trim the meat of fat and gristle. Cut into 1 inch cubes. Pat the meat dry and place it in a medium bowl and toss with salt and pepper. Sprinkle with flour and toss until meat is evenly coated.

Heat the oil in a heavy pot over medium high heat. Brown the meat in batches, adding just enough meat to the pot as will fit without touching. Cook, turning the meat, until evenly and well browned on all sides, about 7 minutes. Remove the meat to drain on paper towels and repeat with remaining pieces of meat.

Adjust the heat and do the same to brown the vegetables without burning. Add the wine and water, scraping up any bits from the bottom and bring to a boil. Return the meat to the pot and low to a simmer and simmer uncovered for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add the potatoes, partly cover the pot and continue simmering until potatoes are tender, about 1 hour. Check the seasoning and adjust if necessary. Serve hot. Serves 6.

than 50 years. But as much as he enjoys cooking, he is an avid hunter. Avid might be a bit of an understatement because the modest, warm and charming chef has bagged moose, elk, caribou, antelope, bear and numerous deer with both gun and bow in North America, and a large variety of other game in Africa and around the world.

"The biggest mistake that hunters make with their deer meat and other wild game is that they don't field dress it properly," he said.
Part one of the video series, dubbed "Big Game: Field to the Table" details the centimeter exact way the hunter must first do in the field to ensure good eating wild game. Chef Milos claims "proper field dressing greatly enhances the quality of the game meat, whether you decide to butcher your game yourself or deliver it to a processor who can do the work for you."

When told the only time I've ever dressed anything in the field was when I accompanied a close friend on the hunt during a rainstorm and changed clothes in the blind, Chef Milos snickered and suggested I watch the video.
At the risk of alienating any in-

dependent meat market that processes deer, Chef Milos also claims "the second mistake hunters make is that they take their venison to a processor who doesn't age the meat and prepare proper cuts."
He said many processors can't take the time to properly age the carcass, and when the cutting begins, the hunter usually ends up with more venison burger than anything else. The video also very aptly illustrates techniques for general butchering and exact instructions on boning out the legs, saddle, ribs, flanks, neck, shoulders and tenderloins.

Presently, the videos are available locally at the Kitchen Glamor stores in Redford, West Bloomfield, Novi and Rochester, and at local Wild Wings Art Galleries. The videos are \$29.95 each and can also be ordered toll free by calling 1-800-819-3799.
When asked where he prefers to hunt, Chef Milos indicated that as far as stalking the elusive whitetail deer, you can't beat Michigan.
His personal hunting ground is about 50 miles south of Alpena near Curran.

The chef also enjoys hunting for mule deer in Utah and New Mexico, elk in Arizona and New Mexico, antelope in Wyoming and whitetail deer in Texas.
If you hunt or know someone who does, these videos would certainly be a welcome addition to someone's video library.

3 1/2 pounds venison neck or shanks, cut into 2-inch cubes

Combine all ingredients except the meat in a deep glass or ceramic dish and mix well. Add the meat and mix well. Cover tightly and refrigerate overnight for 1 day.

COOKING METHOD
1 pound lean slab type bacon, cut into 1 inch cubes
1/2 cup clarified butter
1 cup rich brown stock or broth
Salt to taste
1 cup (or more) ginger snaps, crushed (for thickening)

Drain the wine off the meat and reserve. Pick meat free of onions and pat dry with a paper towel. Save the onion.
Preheat 2 large skillets. Add 1/2 the butter to each and divide the bacon between them. Cook the bacon over medium heat until brown. Remove bacon from the pan and transfer to a heavy non-aluminum sauce pan.

Return the skillets to medium high heat and add the meat in batches and brown well on all sides.

Transfer meat to the pan with the bacon and set aside. Add drained onions to the skillets and brown lightly. Add wine from the marinade along with the stock and a pinch of salt. Bring this mixture to a boil and pour over the meat. Add meat mixture to the skillets and bring to a good simmer. Cover and lower the simmer and simmer slowly until meat is tender. (depending on the type of meat used, simmering could take anywhere from 1-3 hours).

When the meat is done, transfer just the meat to another pot, leaving the onions and spices behind in the juice. Add crushed ginger snaps to the juice mixture and cook for 5 minutes. Pour mixture into a strainer and press hard to remove the juices doing so over the meat. Serve with noodles, spaetzle, boiled potatoes or crusty bread. Serves 6.

Super pens make writing tasks fun

They say that the nib of a fine fountain pen wears down into just the right shape for the owner. It won't write as well for anyone else. When the angle of the point is just so, the handwriting glides gracefully across the page, effortlessly.

Our grandmothers probably cherished their favorite pens. They corresponded often, always taking a few minutes to jot a thank-you note or send a birthday greeting.

Unfortunately, most of us pick up the closest plastic Bic and discard it when it quits writing. Or, we use a word processor, appreciating its speed and the ease with which we can correct mistakes. The handy ballpoints and the computer are fine for everyday reminders, grocery lists and work-related writing. However, for those times when you desire to pen a thoughtful letter, there's a certain pleasure in reaching for your own personal writing instrument.

If you wish to bare your soul with grace and beauty, there are new pens that are worthy of heirloom status. Crafted from indestructible ebonite, the Recife fountain, rollerball and ballpoint pens are designed in Paris and made entirely by hand. Recife is the only manufacturer in the world to do so. In traditional ebonite — the material of choice from 1890 to 1930, Recife donates 5 percent of its sales from these environmentally friendly pens to rain forest conservation groups.

Retailers say: update or lose shoppers



Local retail leaders addressed the Detroit chapter of the International Fashion Group at the Troy Marriott recently, offering their visions of Retail in the Year 2000.

What a difference five years makes. In a lifestyles survey from 1989, most people said that gives a free Saturday afternoon they would shop.

Here in beautiful 1994, the same percentage of respondents answered: take a nap, listen to music, watch a movie — and in that order. No one even mentioned the "s" word.

Hudson's president Dennis Toffolo led a recent retail workshop in Troy with the tale, explaining to members of the International Fashion Group's Detroit chapter that retailers face a "do or die situation" in the next decade.

"We must change the way we do business to survive," Toffolo said. "Hudson's is already implementing new services to meet the changing needs of modern consumers."

Toffolo joined a speaker's panel that included Mark Rosenfeld, Jacobson's president; Barbara Ashley, senior vice president of Retail Services for the Taubman Company; Dennis Donlin, Media Director at Ross Roy Communications; and Francesca Kuglen, president of JONTEE hair accessories. The panelists discussed their views on merchandising through the next decade.

"The modern customer is starved for time," Toffolo said. "They want convenience and they are becoming technology smart." He suggested that the future of department stores may be as "fulfillment centers" where shoppers pick up items already purchased by telephone, computer, catalog or television.

Toffolo enumerated the conveniences Hudson's has introduced for shoppers: wider aisles, Hosiery Express (grab the hose you need, slide your credit card through a scanner, and go), vertical transportation located in the center of a store at all newly renovated locations, large print on price tags, payment on accounts at all terminals, 13 Hour Sales to offer more time to make purchases at bargain prices, a wider range of price points, a computerized bridal registry with a 1-800 number, and kiosk terminals that can display whole collections of merchandise from up to five different vendors (now an experiment

in the Tabletop Shop at the Oakland Mall Store.)

At Jacobson's, Rosenfeld explained that through a new merchandise plan Jacobson's hopes to make customers feel unique as individuals and not a mass market target.

"As other retailers consolidate their businesses, Jacobson's will focus on its individuality, be the first to offer new things," he said. "We're making Jacobson's itself the brand."

Rosenfeld said the company expanded its direct mailings to third card users, installed computers to enhance delivery at the point of sale, and plans to use satellite to link the branch stores with central offices in Jackson to improve inter-company communications.

A full-course Jacobson's catalog with 800-numbers for ordering is also under discussion.

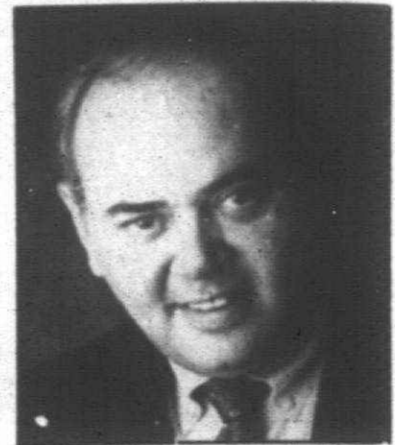

Firm puts pizzazz in new stores

Retail architect Michael Crosson scoffed at the notion that shopping centers will someday be replaced by computer terminals and television programs.

What will happen, Crosson predicted, (offering evidence that it's happening already) is that retail establishments will transform into entities that besides selling products, also educate and entertain.

"Think Las Vegas," Crosson suggested. "Look what's happening there. We're moving to new levels of leisure experiences where retail and entertainment is combined."

Crosson is executive vice president of Southfield-based Jon Greenberg & Associates, an international architect/design firm specializing in retail projects. Established in 1971, JGA has a staff of 60 professionals experienced in creating consumer oriented retail environments. Their client list includes the Warner Bros. Studio

Stores, Detroit Institute of Arts Museum stores, Winkleman's, Scott Shuptrine and Godiva Chocolates to name a few locally.

"There was a time when retailers thought all they had to do was offer their product through a lot of similar locations and they would be successful," he said. "They formed buying groups and standardized store designs so what we ended up with was mall after mall across the country all looking the same with almost the same merchandise."

"Today retailers recognize that they must stand apart from their competition. They come to us asking what they can do to differentiate themselves, to be special to the consumer."

Crosson argued that shopping is a leisure activity. If it is pleasant, rewarding, fun and educational, consumers will shop more often, buy more items, boost up the bottom line.

It's no coincidence that JGA has recently acquired theme park, municipal aquariums, and hotel complex clients with plans to add retail elements to their properties.

"Magic happens when sales go up," Crosson smiled widely. "And people shop where they feel good."

To make shoppers feel good, Crosson said retail designers need to create visual cues in a store that reassure, instill confidence, identify the product, and move a customer through the merchandise.

"The successful business is the one that listens to its customers and gives them exactly what they want," Crosson said. "Consumers all say they want value. And what they mean by value is price, quality and service. No matter how attractive or interesting a store is, it will fail in the long run if any of these components is missing."

Constance Crump, marketing communications manager for JGA, points to the award-winning Warner Bros. Studio Store designs as the direction for stores of the future.

"We're all so jaded. We need to be stimulated when we walk into a store," she said matter-of-factly. "The Warner Bros. Stores certainly stimulate. With video

walls, a Batmobile machine that descends from the ceiling every few minutes, life-size Fiberglas cartoon figures, custom fixtures and beautiful materials throughout, browsing this store is elevated to a multi-sensory experience."

Crump said she heard rumors that the Louvre Museum in Paris is considering leasing space to a Warner Bros. studio store!

"Many manufacturers are getting into retail," according to Crump. Harley Davidson is looking for a location for a merchandise showroom. At one time Marlboro was considering a store. The Crane Stationery Company is opening up a showroom-style retail store. All these stores will have their own themes signaling the end of the cookie cutter approach to retailing."

Crosson challenged retailers to think multi-generationally, to plan stores and developments that keep both grandparents and toddlers entertained. To stay on the cutting edge of retail design, Crosson said JGA is a company "two ticks to the left."

Tomasso lifts Chiefs to title

It was a fitting scene following Plymouth Canton's district-clinching 2-1 boys soccer victory over Livonia Stevenson in the Class A final at Redford Union's Kraft Field.

Senior goalkeeper George Tomasso found himself under an avalanche of celebrating teammates. He had a right to be mobbed after making several clutch saves while stopping a late Stevenson onslaught in the final minutes.

The win puts the Chiefs (16-1-3 overall) into Wednesday's regional semifinals at Walled Lake Western against Novi, the Northville district champion. The doubleheader starts at 5:30 p.m.

"The defense has come up big for me all year, just as I've come up big for them," said Tomasso, who led Canton to its first district crown since 1988. "It was one of my best efforts. Everything came naturally, but I also pulled a couple out of my rear end."

Five-time state champion and three-time runner-up Stevenson bows out at 13-2-2 overall. It's only the second time in school history that the Spartans have failed to get past the district.

"I thought we dominated the second half . . . in all aspects," Stevenson coach Walt Barrett said. "We had 15 shots to their one throw-in, but that one went in."

Senior Jeff Knysz scored the game-winner with 13:30 remaining in regulation play. The goal came after a throw-in by Lance Pellow and a cross by Chad Dale.

"I had my back turned on the throw-in, but all the sudden the ball was at my foot," Knysz said. "I just reacted to the ball and shot it."

Following the go-ahead goal, Stevenson pushed everyone up in a mad attempt to score the equalizer.

Defender James Bossieux, backing up Tomasso, made a clutch play by heading away a pin-point shot from Scott Sersen with 9:30 left. Tomasso then went high to save a hard drive off the dangerous left foot of Steve Williford.

"Stevenson came hard at us, especially in the second half," Canton coach Don Smith said. "They had more scoring opportunities, but we played tough in the box."

Canton struck first at 14:23 of the opening half when Graham Will scored on an assist from Jeff Fliss.

Jeff Urbats then tied it at 1-1 with a goal for Stevenson at 27:32.

Despite playing against the wind in the second half, Stevenson began to increase its pressure tactics.

To make matters worse, Canton had to go without top marking back Keith Gniwew, who was sent off the field because the head referee feared the senior defender had suffered a head injury.

"This game was hard on me because I had to do a lot of yelling," said Canton coach Don Smith, who won the season series against the Spartans, 2-0-1. "I kept telling my guys they couldn't let down."

"We overcame some adversity. Todd Stonestreet came in for Keith and did a nice job. Jason Bennett, a sophomore, also gave us a lift. Everyone came through nicely."

Barrett shook up his lineup in an attempt to gain an edge on the Chiefs. He pulled a switch prior to the game when he went with Mo Lanspeary in goal in favor of Jim Grewe.

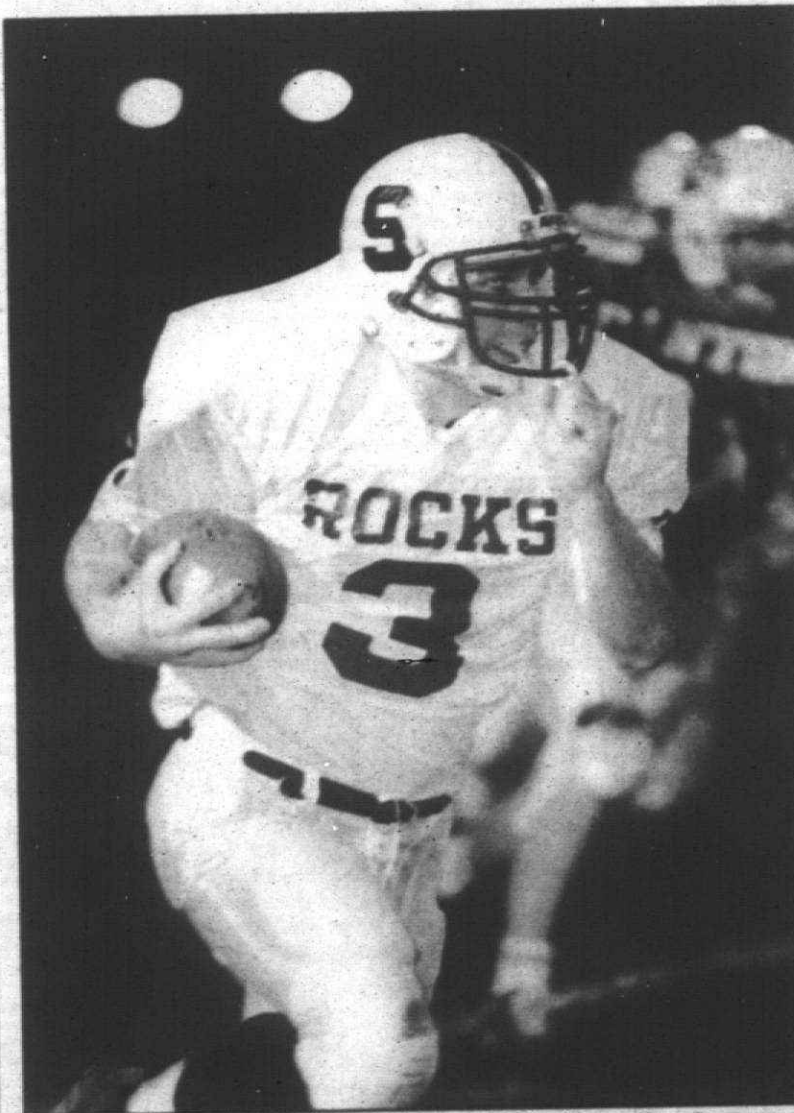
"Canton hadn't seen Mo all year and psychologically I thought it would get us going," Barrett said. "But I told Grewe he would play the second half (which he did)."

Salem rally nips Canton again

All season long, these two players have been central to what success each of their football teams experienced.

Plymouth Salem's Mike Brannan and Plymouth Canton's Len Gardner: Every game, they could be counted on to break a run, more often than not in a key situation.

When their teams won — and quite often when they didn't — their rushing totals sparked.

So it's no surprise to find these two filling the main characters' roles in this most important of games, Salem vs. Canton on Friday. Both had their heroic moments.

But both also had to absorb moments of dejection.

Brannan proved that not giving in to depression can, and will, be rewarded. His vindication came at Gardner's expense: With less than two minutes to play, Canton, trailing by a point, was driving, with a Gardner bolt advancing the ball to the Salem 42 — where he fumbled.

And Brannan, who twice in the second half bobbled balls deep in Salem's end of the field that led to Canton touchdowns, pounced on the loose ball. With 1 1/4 minutes left, Salem's 21-20 win was preserved.

"The first time he fumbled (on the punt), I grabbed him and said, 'Don't worry about it, it's one of those things,'" said Salem coach Tom Moshimer of Brannan's troubles. "I said in a situation like that, when the ball's sailing in the wind, just let it go. And then — it just popped out. 'Just one of those things.'"

Those "things" allowed Canton to overturn Salem's comeback and stage one of its own. The lone touchdown of the first half was scored by Gardner, a 3-yard run on the second play of the second quarter, capping a 13-play, 75-

yard drive that gave the Chiefs a 7-0 lead.

But despite outgaining Salem 197-98 in the first half, those were the only points they could manage.

Salem stormed back with two third-quarter TDs, both scored by Ashraf Youssef. The tying touchdown came on the Rocks' first possession; they went 69 yards on 11 plays, the biggest a 29-yard Brad Lear pass completion to Rushi Amin to Canton's 21. Youssef scored five plays later to knot it at 7-7 with 7:15 left in the third quarter.

A strong punt return by Brannan (partially neutralized by a clip against Salem) gave Salem its next possession at their 47. The Rocks scored in six plays, the biggest a 34-yard draw by Brannan, to take a 14-7 lead into the fourth quarter.

But that's when fate turned against Brannan. Canton was forced to punt early in the final quarter from its own 38; Jeff Fliss got it up into a strong wind, forcing Brannan to retreat. He got his hands on the ball, but fumbled it, and Andy Bahrou recovered for the Chiefs at Salem's 18.

Now it was Gardner's turn. On an 18-yard gain in the second quarter, Gardner had lost the ball at the Salem 8. This time, the Canton captain carried three-straight times, the last covering 9 yards and scoring the tying TD with 7:35 left to play.

Fate was still frowning on Brannan. On Salem's second play after the ensuing kickoff, the ball just popped out of his hands; Canton's Rob Johnson recovered at the Salem 25. On the first play, Chief fullback Paul Fromm — subbing for Sam Epley, who was injured while gaining 59 yards in the first half — burst through the middle and scored.

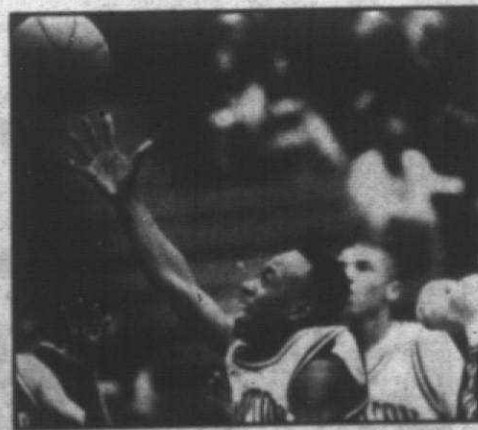

Docks announced his intention to attend Morehead State last week. He will make his commitment in writing during the early signing period, which begins next week.

Docks becomes the first-ever Plymouth Canton male basketball player to land a full-ride NCAA Division I scholarship. Hal Heard did earn a partial scholarship at Mississippi Valley State.

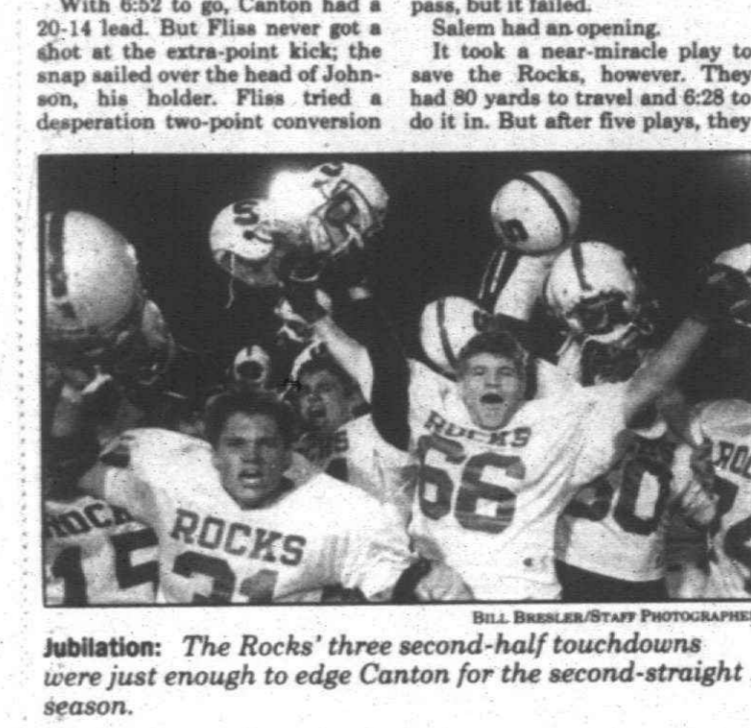

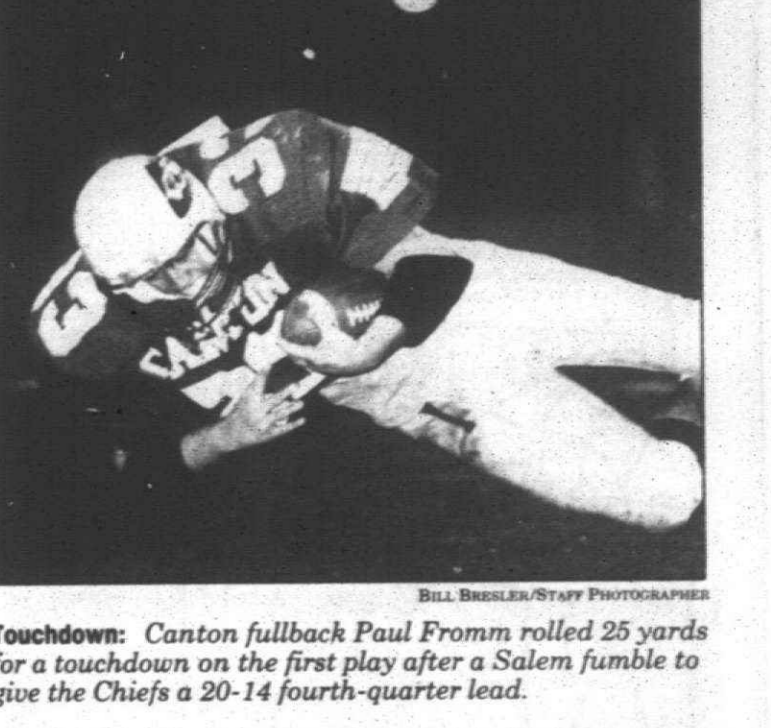

He pitches each day, beginning around 2 p.m. under the watchful eye of an SVSU coach and a video camera. Paluk said he videotapes his motion to see how he can improve.

He's trying to take a crash course in improving his velocity.

"When I'm breaking my hands, I'm breaking a little late, which causes me to throw with mostly my arm and not my whole body," Paluk said. "Coach Pratt has been really lenient."

Paluk will recognize the face of University of Michigan infielder Kelley Dransfield, who is the only other Michigan player selected to tryout for team USA.

Paluk pitched against Dransfield last summer in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League. Paluk played for Hines Park Lincoln/Mercury and Dransfield was with Elmer.

"So at least I'll know someone, Paluk said.

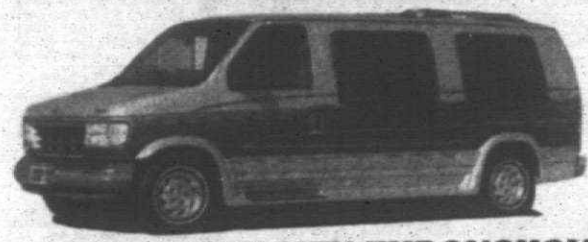

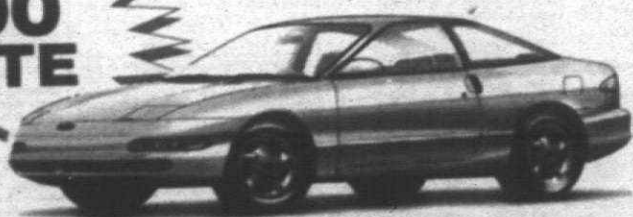

Farentino leads colonists to new home on *Earth 2*

For actress Debrah Farentino, the opportunity to play a strong female character on television was the hook for the leading role in *Earth 2*, premiering Sunday, Nov. 6, on NBC.

"This is clearly the most satisfied I've been in my job," she says. "I finally found a role — and it's not easy to find in television — of a mature woman."

Farentino plays Devon Adair, who organizes an expedition 200 years in the future to a distant Earth-like planet. She hopes to cure her son (Joey Zimmerman), and others whose health is threatened by the sterile environments of the space stations humanity now inhabits.

"When I first read this script, I went 'Wow, here is a woman who is a mother' — there's no more feminine power than that, motherhood," she says. "So I still can be completely in my femininity and yet still find the strength in that and be somewhat of a leader, a decision-maker and a doer."

"She's a very proactive person, and she doesn't depend and bounce her ideas or her decisions off a male counterpart, and that's just unusual. And it's a lot of fun. So I get to play

a mother, but I don't have to be the wife."

Until reading the script for *Earth 2*, Farentino says she never considered doing science fiction.

"This script was sitting on my desk for a couple of weeks and was not really a top-priority read for me, because science fiction had not been something I was hugely interested in," she says. "But the writers created a story so rich in character that it could have been a mystery to me; it could have been an adventure; it could have been a character piece."

"I read this and I said, 'I must do this role; I must get this part.' It was something that I just thought 'This is the woman I've been waiting to do' — grabbed me, from the page, she grabbed me."

Farentino says she feels fortunate to be playing Devon, adding that she is not as proud of some of her previous characters.

"I didn't quite like the babes in distress roles," she says. "This is no babe in distress."

To simulate an alien environment, *Earth 2* is filmed around Santa Fe, New Mexico. While playing a character who has

never before stepped foot on a planet is challenging, Farentino says the pristine beauty of the location certainly helps.

"I live at sea level in Los Angeles, and our first day on location was at 10,000 feet," she says, describing the filming of the scene in which the settlers crash land on the planet.

"Now, when I stepped out of that pod, I needed to take a breath. And it was so helpful, because I hadn't felt air like this in my life. When the air is that thin, the light reflects differently — blue sky like I've never seen blue sky before, and I've traveled a lot; green in the trees like I'd never seen before. So, it really helped in terms of Devon Adair's first experience."

The ensemble cast of *Earth 2* also includes Clancy Brown (*Highlander*), Antonio Sabato Jr. (*General Hospital*) and Jessica Steen (*Homefront*).

"After *Equal Justice*, I didn't think that I would have an ensemble cast that worked so well together," Farentino says. "I really thought that that was a once-in-a-lifetime thing, and then I come here and it's just as good. We're ever closer because we're all away from home."

After crash-landing on the planet, the colonists face an arduous trek to find a spot on the planet that can support a large civilization. Farentino, who describes *Earth 2* as "a wagon train in the future," says the trip will include plenty of strange new creatures and plot twists.

"There's quite a few interesting things that we run into, and they're amazing to work with," she says. "The creatures are so well thought out, and the actors in those costumes are some of the best performers I've ever worked with."

Farentino says much work goes into the aliens because they are an important aspect of the show.

"We are the aliens; we are coming into their land," she corrects.

Horse racing's finale Breeders' Cup on NBC

Thoroughbred racing's finest will vie for the championship in their class in the 11th Breeders' Cup, from Churchill Downs in Louisville, Ky., on Saturday, Nov. 5. NBC will air the event live.

With a total purse of \$10 million, the Breeders' Cup features seven championship races, each with a minimum prize of \$1 million. The crowning race of the day is the \$3 million Breeders' Cup Classic.

Sunday, Oct. 30, ABC airs a full afternoon of sports excitement, beginning with the figure skating extravaganza *Skate America* followed by the final round of the PGA TOUR Championship, live from the Olympic Club in San Francisco.

TV FOR KIDS

Secret Garden, Mix
worthy of a look

Saturday, Nov. 5, brings two noteworthy productions.

For younger children, ABC presents an animated version of *The Secret Garden*, the story of a lonely girl's discovery of a long-neglected garden and the spirit of love it symbolizes for an austere Victorian household. Derek Jacobi, Honor Blackman and Anndi McAfee are among those lending their voices to the show. At press time, copies of the program were not available for review.

Teens should take note of an *In the Mix* episode, "Teens Talk Risk & Reality," airing on PBS (check local listings). The show addresses the leading killers of young people - drunken driving and homicide - and shows the tragic results of each. To be certain of hooking viewers' attention, the special opens with an emergency-room scene as doctors and nurses try to save the life of a real-life gunshot victim.

Since even the survivors of such situations find their lives changed forever, *In the Mix* cameras visit high schools in the New York City area, where physically impaired members of the Bryn Mawr Rehab Center and a group called People Opening the World's Eyes to Reality (P.O.W.E.R.) speak frankly to students about making good choices.

As one member puts it, "You don't get old by being no fool."
