Terror hits at home for family

Canton native among those presumed dead in WTC attack

Meredith Whalen is among the World Trade Center's missing. Back at home in Canton, her mother, Patricia isn't expecting to hear from her.

"I'm really convinced we've lost her," Whalen said.

Meredith Whalen, 23, was working on the 93rd floor of the north tower, the first to be hit by a hijacked plane.

"I saw that on the news, and I was about 90 percent sure, she was there," Whalen said. "I held out hope for a little while, thinking she may have gone into work late that day. But her roommate told me she left for work at 7:30 a.m. That's my Meredith."

Whalen's fears were confirmed when she heard from a friend of Meredith's who received an e-mail that was dated and timed Sept. 11, 8:20 a.m. Meredith had e-mailed her friend from her desk at work.

"I knew she was indeed in the office then," Whalen said.

Whalen is trying now to get through each moment as they come.

"I go up and down, but I've got a lot of support. I'm OK now, but sometimes



I'm afraid I'm just going to snap," she said.

Staying connected with Meredith's friends and other survivors via e-mail is helping a bit, as are

her family and close circle of friends.

Meredith Whalen, a 1996 Plymouth Salem High School graduate and honors student, graduated with honors from the University of Michigan in April, 2000. In June, she went to New York to work for Fred Alger Management Inc. as a research analyst.

Meredith Whalen's father, Henry Whalen, served on the Canton Township Board of Trustees from 1988 until his death in 1989.

"I was so very proud of Meredith. Both my girls are so good," Whalen said, adding Meredith's younger sister, Kristen is surrounded by supportive friends at the University of North Carolina.

There were 55 people working on the

93rd floor Tuesday morning.

"There are 38 still unaccounted for. Everybody that was working that day is missing. They're all gone," Whalen said. "I wonder if anyone in the building ever saw the plane coming. Can you imagine? I'm sure my Meredith never knew what hit her."

Whalen said alongside shock and disbelief came anger.

"I was angry immediately. I knew that was no accident, and then when the second plane hit, I was beside myself. How could they?"

Whalen and her daughter were scheduled to fly to Barcelona yesterday, where they were to board a cruise ship for a 12-day tour of Europe.

Community answers call for support and healing

Canton area businesses, religious and civic organizations continued an outpouring of spiritual and financial support late last week in the wake of Tuesday's terrorist attacks on New York and Washington, D.C.

Prayer vigils, fund-raising drives and special activities at local schools were among the efforts undertaken by residents and business owners.

And one event already scheduled for today — a youth prayer rally in Heritage Park — will change its focus to help teens cope with the national tragedy, organizers said.

"A substantial part of the event will be given over to pray for the nation," said Scott Petersen, Canton resident and student ministries pastor at Canton Community Church.

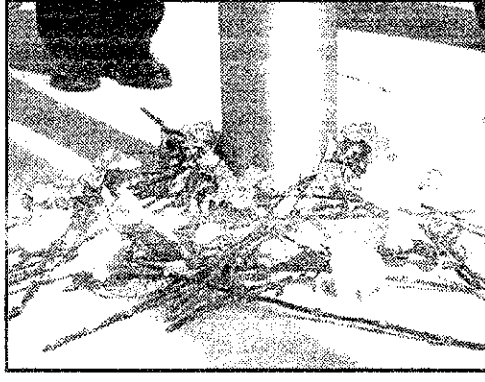
"Many students feel helpless," said Petersen. "They feel the same emotions as adults."

This is the second year for the CRAVE event, which drew about 150 participants from four area churches in 2000. Petersen said six churches and one private school have confirmed their participation in today's rally and he expected attendance to double.

It is scheduled for 6-8:30 p.m. and is open to the public.

Participating in addition to Canton Community Church are Plymouth First United Methodist Church, St. Michael Lutheran, Canton Friendship Church, Trinity Presbyterian, Tri-City Christian Center and the Plymouth Christian Academy.

Last year's theme of prayer for the coming school year will also be emphasized today but



Petersen said the entertainment portion of the event has been "downsized" in keeping with last week's events. Local student bands are still expected to perform, he said.

Local donations

Meanwhile, the generosity of Canton residents is once again on display.

"Many people have called asking how or where to send their individual donations and proceeds from various fundraisers," said Joan Noricks, president of the Canton Community Foundation. "Our executive board made the decision to create a pass-through fund to send money from our community groups directly to the September 11th Fund in New York."

The September 11th Fund will be administered by the New York Community Trust and United Way of New York City to respond to the pressing needs of the victims and their families in New York, Washington and all those affected by this tragedy. It will provide immediate support to established emergency assistance agencies such as the American Red Cross, as well as other nonprofit health and human services agencies, Noricks said.

"I was aware that there were some school groups raising cash to help the victims of the tragedy, and I thought it would be so easy for them to just be able to drop off their buckets of cash here, and we could translate it into a check," Noricks said. "The other beauty of it is being able to track how much money we're sending as a community. There's something very

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On a mission

Pastor's travels bring religion to Belarus

The Rev. Bryan Smith had the chance last spring to spread Christianity in a country that was atheist for 90 years.

Smith, pastor at Geneva Presbyterian Church in Canton, traveled to Minsk, Belarus, where he helped teach ministerial students how to preach Christian sermons.

Today, the religious mix in Belarus — which has about 10.2 million people and is about the size of Kansas — consists of 48 percent Eastern Orthodox, 22 percent Catholic, 1 percent Protestant, 1

percent Jewish, .2 percent Muslim. Some 28 percent of the citizens still consider themselves atheists.

The potpourri of religions came about after Belarus gained religious freedom and attained its independence from the USSR in 1991.

When Smith got there he found out the country's newfound religious freedom didn't go without restrictions. Churches have to be licensed by the government under the Orthodox hierarchy or Baptist Union. The Canton minister was accepted to teach under Baptist

Slowing economy gives some builders pause

Economists are watching the market a little closer. Families are socking away a little extra to their savings. And businesses are expanding cautiously, slowing commercial development in Canton.

"The recession is not pending, it's already here," said Chico Rodriguez, marketing representative for Sam's Club.

A new Sam's Club and Wal-Mart store were to be built this year on Ford east of I-275 at the former Auto Nation site. The softening economy has delayed the construction, and the new

stores will open in May 2002, Rodriguez said.

Rodriguez belongs to eight local chambers of commerce and said he hears from everyone signs of a slow economy.

"Everybody, even big companies have started hiring freezes and are laying off," he said. "We're so affected by the auto industry, when they cough we hiccup. And when they freeze or lay off, we feel it."

Still, he said, the Sam's Club in Westland has continued to exceed projections, and reports \$1.25 million in sales monthly.

Still other businesses are not shying

"This was going to be the first trip Meredith was going to pay for all herself," she said. Whalen is also coping by keeping in touch with Meredith's friends from all over the country and the world. "They're just heartbroken,"

she said of her daughter's friends. "We're all being tested, but we make it through somehow," Whalen said. "But I believe we're all here to support each other and to love each other. That's what it's all for."

from Canton, and are moving ahead with building in the community. "The buying power and disposable income in communities west of I-275 has businesses pretty confident in building in Canton," said Canton attorney Bryan Amann, who represents developers planning to build the Grand Sakwa shopping center near Ford and Morton Taylor roads. While the Grand Sakwa project appeared to slow down since it was initially presented to the Canton Township Planning Commission more than six months ago, the pause is not related to economic issues, Amann said.

"Basically, the potential tenants were sitting back and waiting to see what we were doing," Amann said. There were at the time of the presentation in February two developers planning major centers within a few miles of each other. Amann said the tenants waited to see who would break ground first. Grand Sakwa last week submitted to the township a revised traffic study, and Amann said by the end of September the developer will submit a final agreement and plans to the planning department. In the meantime, Grand Sakwa has had the opportunity

to seek tenants. Lowe's has remained one of the center's anchor stores. "They're going to be the types of stores Canton has wanted," he said. They will include a home decor and an electronics store. "We're also still in negotiation with a major book store." Plans will be presented to the public in November, Amann said. Biltmore vice president, David Stollman, reported the housing industry continues to flourish in Canton, as well. New home sales in Cherry Hill Village have not waned over the last few months, and Stollman said he's still certain

they'll remain steady. However, houses priced over \$400,000 have become a harder sell than they were last year, he said. "Our houses over \$400,000 and \$500,000 have slowed down to a crawl, but overall sales remain strong," Stollman said. "As the economy has been slowing down, the available land for sale has still been in short supply. Land prices are still going up, so that's a good sign," said Stollman, adding lower interest rates have contributed to the housing industry's stability.

Academy reports bomb threat

An unknown male caller told threatened the teacher, using profanity and racial slurs, and indicating the building should be evacuated or he would blow up the school and mosque. **Assault and battery** A Canton man found himself in the wrong place at the wrong time last week.

He was spending the night with a woman he had befriended over the last few months. At 5:30 a.m., the woman's former boyfriend entered her Canton Court apartment and found the two friends sleeping. The former boyfriend struck the victim in the head and upper body, and kicked him in the ribs. The victim was able to fight off the angry boyfriend by choking him. The victim intends to press charges.

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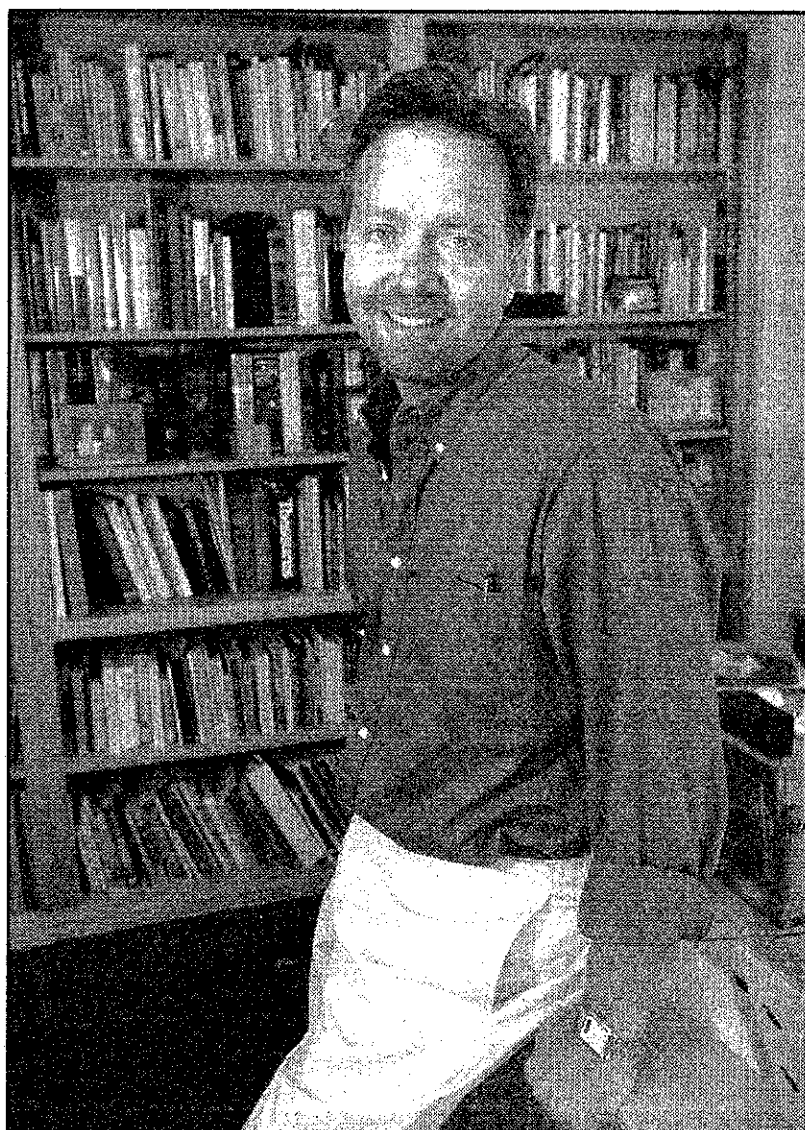

Union. "There wasn't as much religious freedom as I thought there would be," Smith said. And, to top it off, there were rumors about becoming Baptist Union. Some of the rumors referred to Baptist Union being a cult religion and others spoke of the Baptist Union religion trying to break up families. The advice Smith gave to his students was to set a good example with their Christian family lifestyle to prove the rumors false.

"I felt humbled to be able to be a part of the pastors' training. Going out in adverse circumstances," Smith said, "I felt very connected with the students even though I couldn't speak their language."

Smith had a translator for the two, week-long classes made up of 17-27-year-old students who spoke Belarusian. The class was a segment of a two-year program in a Bible college.

Another moving part of the trip for Smith was that Belarus, which borders Lithuania, Latvia, Russia, Poland and the Ukraine, was a country that was devastated by the Nazis in World War II. There were eight different concentration camps and 25 percent of the population in Belarus was killed.

Smith said he was reminded of this daily when he walked by the memorial outside his motel of a statue representing 180 Jewish adults and children that were lined up and shot.

"You could feel the suffering and sadness in the air," Smith

said of the locals.

Not only was there a sadness by the past, the locals seemed to be frightened by the current government.

Aleksandr Lukashenko, who has been president since 1994, has seized elections and gained great power, Smith said.

"I asked the leader of the Bible college a question about Lukashenko and he unplugged the phone and closed windows prior to answering," noted Smith.

Meanwhile, back in Canton — some 7,100 miles away — the congregation was staying abreast of

their pastor's mission via daily e-mails. The church congregation at Geneva paid for the trip to Belarus and the expenses of the students.

The opportunity to go to Minsk, which is the capital of Belarus, was presented when John McWilliams, a Naples, Fla., staff member of International Leadership Academy, which is affiliated with the Campus Crusade for Christ, approached Smith. Smith said the mission was a great life experience and he also celebrated his 40th birthday in Belarus.

Thanks to a member of the congregation who's a Northwest Airlines employee, Smith was greeted with a basket of welcome home cards and letters from the congregation on his 14-hour return flight.

Smith said he's looking forward to his next mission abroad; he may go to Madras, India or return to Minsk, Belarus.

Area man tells of narrow escape during terror attack

During Tuesday morning's mayhem, Bob Evenden opened a door to safety — only to get a view of hell.

The 1971 Franklin High graduate joined his CIBC World investment colleagues, who patiently descended an emergency staircase after feeling the impact and then seeing flames across the street at the World Trade Center.

Evenden, 48, first thought an earthquake hit when he was jarred from his desk on the 34th floor of the World Financial Center. He went to the window and saw papers floating through the air but looked down to find burning debris scattered on the ground.

An orderly evacuation ensued. When Evenden exited, the financial advisor adjusted his eyes to the bright sun.

Then an acrid smell burned his nose. His eyes shot upward where the first WTC tower was completely engulfed, which Evenden described as a lit, huge steel match stick.

His ears were suddenly filled with horrific screams as bodies fell from atop the massive structure. Those human cries of anguish were then drowned out by a roar overhead.

A commercial airline raged above before slamming into the second WTC tower.

"First you think, 'My God, it could have been us,'" Evenden said. "You didn't have time to soak it in. It was so bizarre."

After Evenden and others saw the second tower catch fire, the realization the buildings could topple over interrupted the surreal moment. They ran.

Evenden didn't arrive to his Ridgewood, N.J. home until six hours later. A load of phone messages piled up from people concerned about his safety.

In Livonia, his father Clayton and stepmother Betty didn't know Robert's condition until Wednesday when his uncle phoned.

"I was so flabbergasted; We sat up until midnight every night," said Clayton, who is a retired Livonia Public Schools

teacher. "I had not pictured him being so close to it."

In a heartfelt e-mail sent to family and friends, the father of two sons documented his journey home.

On that long walk, the former University of Michigan drum major purposely avoided large pockets of people, fearing they would be easy targets for terrorists. For the same reason, he adroitly walked in the middle of the street, staying clear of potential car bombs.

He and others eventually were able to take a luxury cruise boat over to New Jersey from the Chelsea piers.

Traumatic time

Evenden was conditioned to traumatic events, having lived in California during earthquakes and riots.

"You just keep your wits about you," he said. "You try to stay focused."

In the chaos, he joined three others trying to find their way.

One included a fellow broker who had been living in the Embassy Suites Hotel across from the trade center, whose two towers collapsed before their eyes. All her possessions presumably were gone.

Evenden offered the woman — who he knew for all of 20 minutes — to stay with him and his wife, Nancy.

"He's a good Christian," said Betty, Bob's stepmother. "We knew he would help if he could."

On Thursday, Nancy and the woman were busy putting her affairs in order. Bob remained home as his brokerage firm waited to relocate employees.

Evenden had spent the past 72 hours on the phone recounting the shock and horror to numerous family and friends. His 30-year high school reunion is also coming up.

Images, especially the sight of people jumping to their deaths, will haunt him forever, he said.

He awoke at 3 a.m. Wednesday, unable to sleep, replaying the terror in his mind.

"I had a terrible headache yesterday just from the adrenalin," Bob said Thursday. "You're functioning on adrenalin the entire day."

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Area auto supplier may be on move to Salem

Officials from Johnson Controls, an automotive parts manufacturer and Plymouth Township's second-largest taxpayer, are scheduled to make a presentation Monday about a proposed

move to Salem Township that has drawn some controversy.

Planners for the company will appear before the Salem Township Board of Trustees at its regularly scheduled meeting.

The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. at township hall, at 9600 Six Mile.

According to Salem Supervisor

Fred Roperti, company officials will present a "pre-concept plan," which will describe the \$170-million facility they envision building on 360 acres the company purchased on Napier Road, between Joy and North Territorial.

However, Roperti said the board will not vote on rezoning the property at the meeting, as has been reported by other media sources. Salem currently has the property zoned mostly agricultural/residential, with a small portion of it recreation/conservation. Johnson Controls

needs the property to be zoned research/research associated before the new facility can be built.

"Johnson Controls has not yet filed the rezoning request, so there is no action to be taken at the meeting. To my knowledge, they are strictly presenting a pre-conceptual plan. This is not even a preliminary site plan. There are a lot of things that have to be accomplished before that point. They won't be able to get into the real nitty-gritty of the project," Roperti said. Johnson Controls officials say

they must move to a larger facility because they have outgrown their current facilities in Plymouth. They had been looking at several properties in Michigan and other states, before concentrating on the Salem property.

The plan to build in Salem has drawn criticism from Plymouth Township officials, as well as residents from both Salem and Plymouth. The property is directly across from \$500,000 homes in Plymouth's Country Club Village, and residents there don't want a facility that will house more than 2,000 employ-

ees in their backyards.

Some Salem residents fear such a facility will destroy the rural flavor of the community.

Roperti said he has heard complaints from residents in both communities. Even though he doesn't know how many will show up for Monday's meeting, he said he won't be shocked to see quite a few there voicing concerns.

"There's no way to know how many people might show up, but I wouldn't be surprised if people came out and said they were opposed to this project," he said.

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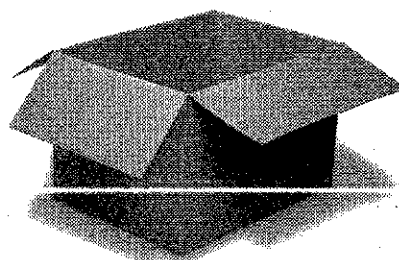

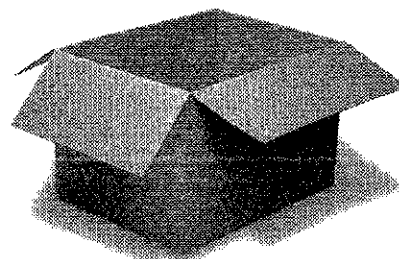

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Metro Airport open again under strict new security

Detroit Metropolitan Airport is one of 17 airports across the United States where armed federal marshals will be posted at passenger check points operated by airlines.

Limited service at the airport was resumed Thursday following the nationwide Federal Aviation Administration ban on air traffic following terrorist attacks on New York's World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

Metro Airport was allowed to reopen after meeting new security regulations ordered by the FAA.

These new rules include:
■ No curbside check-in for baggage

■ Only ticketed passengers will be allowed beyond the security screening checkpoints

■ Additional random screening of passengers

■ No knives, including small pocket knives, will be allowed to be carried beyond the passenger screening checkpoints

■ All parked vehicles must be at least 300 feet from the terminal.

Airport spokeswoman Barbara Hogan said Friday that Northwest Airlines, which handles about 70 percent of the flights out of Metro, and other airlines have resumed service on a limited schedule. She said that fliers should expect long lines and need to be patient and understanding and allow themselves plenty of time.

Those planning to fly are being asked to contact their airline to check on flight schedules.

The airport hopes to resume a normal schedule as early as Monday.

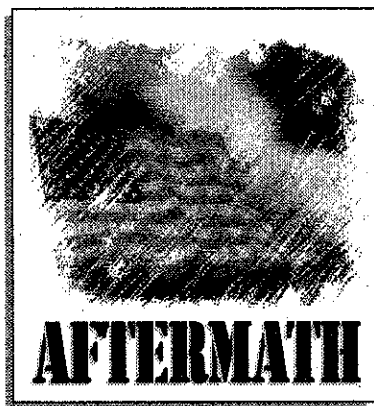
Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara traveled by train Wednesday to return to Detroit after attending an airport conference in Montreal with Airport Director Lester Robinson.

"Our hearts and thoughts are with the families of the victims of these terrible tragedies," McNamara said.

At a press conference Thurs-

day, McNamara commended county workers and local businesses for an "outstanding job" during the crisis. He said two airport area hotels had offered free accommodations to people stranded at the airport by the ban.

Robinson said security workers at the airport have been working 12-hour shifts since the attack. Airport security and federal agents, using bomb sniffing dogs, made complete search of the airport prior to reopening.

Emergency measures

Wayne County officials set up an emergency management team, putting security on heightened alert Tuesday, after the World Trade Center was destroyed and Pentagon damaged from terrorist attacks.

Sheriff Robert Ficano said the attack "changes the American landscape forever."

Wayne County closed Tuesday the Wayne County Building in Detroit, county offices and courts inside the City-County Building and Frank Murphy Hall of Justice. The Ambassador Bridge and Windsor tunnel were closed, but re-opened Wednesday. Traffic was delayed three to four hours coming from Windsor to Detroit, so on Thursday, sheriffs deputies assisted U.S. Customs agents with vehicle checks and inspections, Ficano said.

The Wayne County Jail was closed to visitors. Prisoners who were of Arabic descent were monitored closely to ensure that there was no "misplaced reaction" against them or other prisoners, Ficano said.

Parked cars were towed Tuesday from in front of the public buildings in Detroit. Public buildings were re-opened Wednesday.

Ficano met with the U.S. Marshals, FBI and ATF periodically Tuesday, and planned to continue meetings throughout the week.

"It's outrageous what's happened and you certainly feel sympathy for the victims," Ficano said. "We're going to remain on heightened awareness."

Wayne County also has offered help to New York City with rescue efforts. Deputy County Executive Mary Zuckerman said the medical examiner's office will send staff to help in New York City to help that office.

Ficano put together a group of about 50 sheriffs to provide technical assistance to the cities of New York and Washington D.C. if needed. Officials in New York issued a message to put that assistance on hold Thursday.

"I think they want to spread out the assistance over the next few weeks," Ficano said.

Wayne County Sheriffs also began issuing violations Wednesday under the Michigan Consumer Protection Act to service stations they believed were price gouging with prices over \$2.30 a gallon. Ficano said customers with complaints should call 1-800-743-7433.

Coping with grief

Residents still groping for reasons

Sam Newingham was too young to take part in World War II, and by the time they needed people for Vietnam, he was too old.

Newingham, 94, is past his war-fighting prime, but he was there at Independence Village Friday, doing what he could to show his support for his country.

Newingham joined dozens of other Independence Village residents, saying a prayer, hearing a poem and singing, "God Bless America," as part of the National Day of Mourning observance called for by President Bush.

The gathering at Independence Village was one of several around town Friday, as churches, schools and other organizations sought ways to help those victimized by Tuesday's terrorist attacks in New York and Washington, D.C.

"This was very important," Newingham said of Friday's observance. "From some of the things I remember from years back, you realize how lucky we are. You never know what's going to happen."

Susan Gilbert is a nurse whose mother, Dolores, is a resident at Independence Village. Susan worked the last three days, and was on her way Friday to visit when she found out about the observance. She took the time to sit with her mother and reflect.

"I've been working, so I haven't had a chance to do my own grieving," Susan Gilbert said. "I cried a little and sang God Bless America. It felt good."

Visitors to St. John Neumann Catholic Church in Canton were glad to have a place where they could join the rest of the nation in prayer. It's an important step, according to pastoral associate Gene Kijek.

"At those times when it's hard to remember, God is with us," Kijek said. "Life is too short to forget the ones we love. This tragedy reminds us of that."

Some observers came out of a need for closeness, others to show support in whatever way they could.

"I felt I needed to be close to my family and friends," said Debbie Winkler of Canton, wiping away tears, "and try and understand what went on."

"I came to show support for my community and parish members, and for me," said Al Davis of Canton. "We need to reach out to each other and remind ourselves we're all different and we love each other."

"I've been praying at home with my friends and family, but I needed something more," said Jan Pickard of Canton, her shirt bedecked with an American flag on the pocket and on the back. "I got the sense that people in the community were feeling the Americanism and patriotism to support personal issues, pray for the country and the president, and anyone that might have to go and serve us."

Similar reactions were evident at Trinity Presbyterian Church in Plymouth Township, which also held a noon service for about three dozen people.

Those in attendance took turns saying prayers. Some concentrated on the victims of the tragic attacks, while others prayed for a church member stuck in San Francisco without important medicine.

"Any time there is a tragedy like this, it is important to look at our inefficiencies as a society and pray to God for help. It is also important we pray for President Bush and all the rescue workers, so they have the strength to carry out their important roles. Our thoughts and prayers must be with them," said Tom Thompson, a Livonia resident who is the director of children's ministries at the church.

Trinity member Ellie Schupra, who lives in Canton, said it is important for parents and teachers to try explain the events of the terrorist attacks, and help them understand that tragedies do occur in life.

"This is a very difficult time for children, because they have many questions about how something like this can happen. Sometimes adults back off because we don't have all the answers to their questions. I think we should accept it is OK that sometimes we can't answer all those questions. But we must be willing to discuss this with them, because family and prayer can be a huge refuge for them at times like this," she said.

Mom worries until she gets telephone message

Good news has been hard to come by this week, but amidst the national tragedy, a Canton woman feels grateful her family was spared.

Betty Marudas' daughter, Linda Schweitzer, was working at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md., Tuesday morning. Marudas' son-in-law, Robert, works at the Pentagon.

Like so many Canton residents, Marudas was already concerned about the country's safe-

ty when she left her home to do some shopping just after 9 a.m. Tuesday. She didn't know yet the tragedy was about to hit closer to home.

"I had heard about the World Trade Center before I left, and then when I was at Meijer, I heard about the Pentagon. That just wiped me out completely. I was so worried," Marudas said. "I still can't even remember what I bought that morning."

Luckily for Marudas, good news travels almost as fast as bad news.

"I wasn't home 10 minutes when my phone rang. My daugh-

ter told me she had been evacuated from the university, and Robert did not go to work that morning. For some reason, he just didn't go to work."

Marudas' son-in-law had decided instead to travel to New Jersey to visit his mother. However, he heard the news of the attacks and turned around to come back home, and managed to stay out of harm's way.

"I can't believe it," Marudas said. "I'm still in a state of shock, just like everybody. But I'm just so glad they're safe."

Fighting back

Canton battles, but can't catch up to Harrison

Farmington Hills Harrison's lightning-strike offense met Plymouth Canton's thunderous, pound-it-out ground attack Friday night in a Western Lakes Activities Association football game that lived up to its lofty pre-game hype.

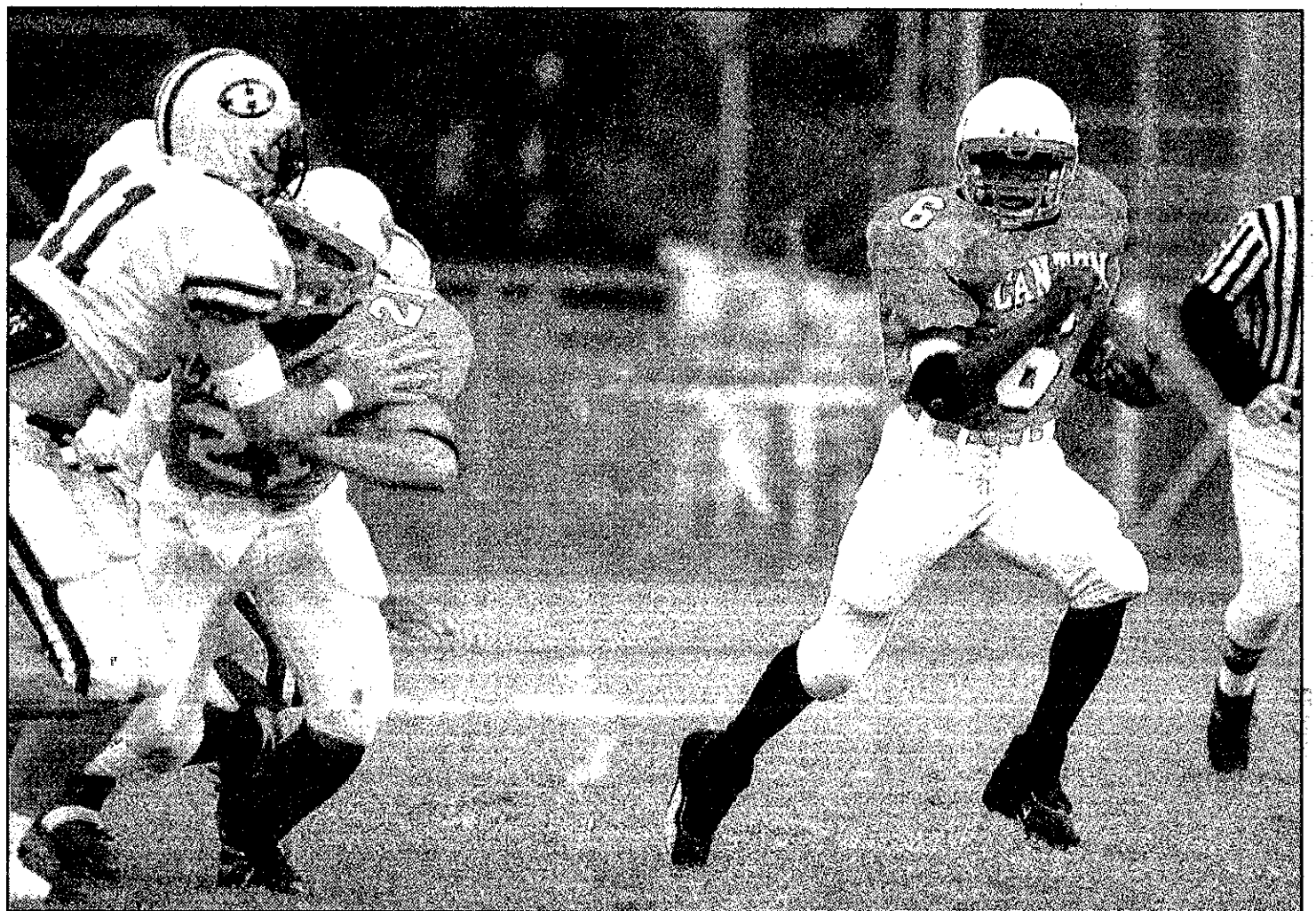
"It wasn't a play we called in the huddle," Herrington revealed. "But if Drew sees no one is lining up on Agim, he has the option to throw the ball to him. He made a nice pass and Agim did the rest."

"There were some lights out on that side of the field, so I don't think they saw Agim over there," Stanton said. "He gave me a signal, he got open, and I got him the ball."

The win improved Harrison to 4-0 (3-0 in the Western Lakes Activities Association) while Canton dropped to 3-1 (2-1 in the WAAA).

Chief coach Tim Baechler said his team displayed a split personality Friday night.

"In the first half, I asked myself, 'Where did my football team go?'" Baechler said. "We made so many dumb mistakes. But in the second half, I've never been more proud of a football

team. I was so proud of the way they hung in there and didn't give in to Harrison. They just have too much speed."

Harrison secured its biggest lead of the night, 42-14, 24 seconds into the second half when Stanton galloped 63 yards on a broken play. From that point on, the Chiefs outscored the state's top-ranked team, 21-3, but it was too little, too late.

"Their defense was swarming," Stanton said. "If I was going to set up a defense to play against us, I would play the same one Canton did."

The Hawks pro-set offense racked up 437 total yards. Stanton threw for 156 yards and one touchdown. He also ran six times for 99 yards and a score.

Harrison junior running back Mar-

cus Woods and Shabaj proved to be just as elusive as Stanton was to Canton's defense, combining for 315 yards in total offense and four TDs. Among Woods' game-high 155 yard rushing was a scintillating 71-yard scoring dash late in the first half.

"There were a few times in the first half when we had our defensive guys right where we wanted them, but we'd miss a tackle and then — boom! — they're off to the races," Baechler said.

Canton's brightest offensive star Friday night was senior tight end Chris Smilo, who hauled in six Brendan Murphy aerials for 114 yards and two touchdowns. On at least three occasions, Smilo simply outjumped the smaller Hawk defensive backs for the

ball. Murphy completed nine-of-20 passes for 175 yards. Overall, the Chiefs finished with 335 total yards.

"I was very happy with our offensive line play, too," Baechler said. "They were in my doghouse coming into the game, but I thought they did a great job against a very good defense."

The Chiefs' opening drive was typical of the kind of offense they had displayed in their opening three games: 10 plays, 80 yards, five minutes, seven points. It climaxed when Murphy hit Smilo with a 7-yard slant pass in front of a slipping Hawk cornerback.

Canton got the ball back a minute later when Stanton's second pass of the

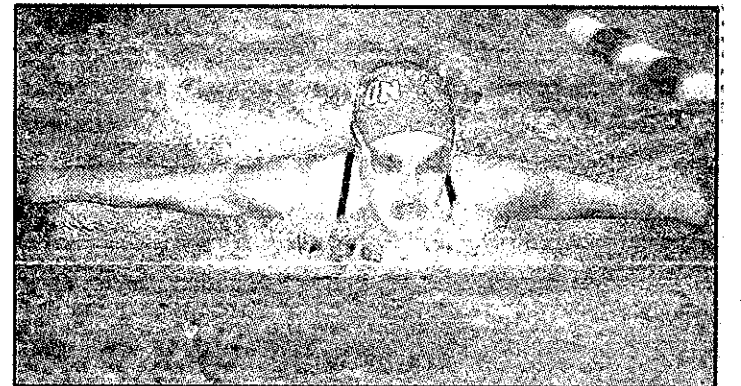

Her mother Susan and two grandmothers will accompany Tracey on her trip to Italy, while her father Larry and brother Larry will cheer from home.

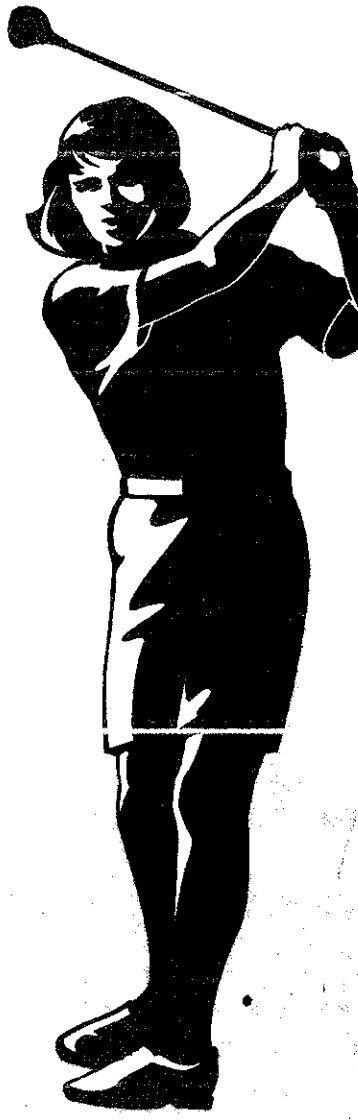

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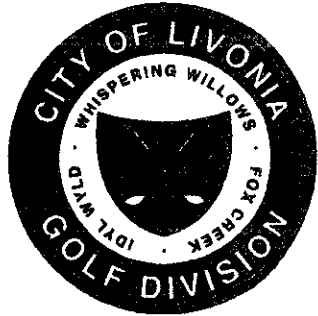

Schoolcraft earns 1st All-Sports Trophy

Set your goals, put in the time and effort, and you can accomplish just about anything — however improbable.

Indeed, witnessing Schoolcraft College become a powerhouse in athletics, at least a decade ago, was about as likely as a pro wrestler becoming a major political figure (ooops).

But things can change.

SC went from the doormat in the Michigan Community College Athletic Association to the top level. That was so noted in the 34th annual MCCA Year End Report for the 2000-2001 school year.

On page four of the report, at the top of the all-time list of all-sports trophy winners for the MCCA, is a school that had not appeared in the 43 previous years: Schoolcraft College.

While a school like Lansing CC or Grand Rapids CC (each a winner of 12 previous trophies) might shrug such an accomplishment off, SC will not. This is

something special for members of Ocelot sports teams.

"This is the first time in school history," said SC athletic director Ed Kavanaugh. "We're pretty proud of it."

Was it something the coaches on staff was shooting for? "It wasn't a goal per se," answered Kavanaugh. "But we knew it was there and attainable."

A total of 10 sports were competed in the fall, winter and spring sessions — some only on a statewide basis, others both statewide and in Eastern and Western conferences.

Last school year, SC finished first in the state in women's cross country and men's soccer in the fall (women's soccer is not a sport sponsored by the MCCA); and first in the state and Eastern Conference in men's basketball, and first in the conference in women's basketball last winter.

In the six MCCA sports SC competed

in, they scored a total of 427 points, or an average of 71.17. Next best was St. Clair County CC with 371 points for six sports (61.83 average), followed by Grand Rapids CC with 384 points for seven sports (54.86).

The reason for SC's success is easy to analyze: better talent, sure, but also top-level coaching. In the six sports the Ocelots competed in, four were singled out for top coaching honors. Van Dimitriou in men's soccer (an honor he shared with Mike Nunn of Kellogg CC), Nancy Gavorr in women's cross country and Carlos Briggs in men's basketball were named MCCA coaches of the year; Briggs and, in women's basketball, Karen Lafata were named all-Eastern Conference coaches of the year.

"Funding, and we said an outstanding coaching staff," said Kavanaugh, when asked why the turnaround. "We now have full scholarships for every athlete. My boss, John Tomey, has been instrumental."

Kavanaugh was quick to point out how well academically SC athletes are doing.

The volleyball and women's cross country teams were both given academic All-American status. Indeed, the grade-point average of SC athletes is higher than that of the average student.

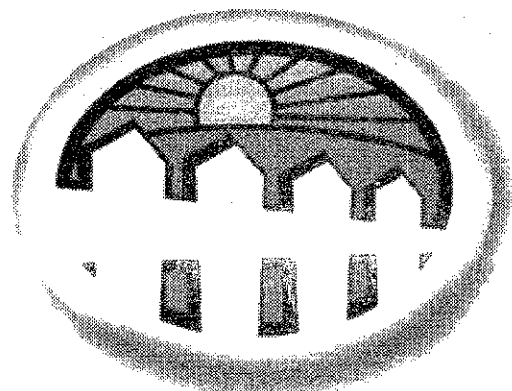

night bounced off the shoulder pads of wide receiver Terrill Mayberry and into the hands of Chief defensive back Bill Gazsi at the Canton 38.

Keyed by a 22-yard completion to Brandon Wilcox and a 23-yard hook-up with Smilo, Canton moved the ball down to the Harrison 5-yard line. However, on a fourth-and-three play from the 7, Shabaj intercepted Murphy's pass in the end zone.

Paced by the interior line play of Derek Johnson and Will Stinson, Canton stymied the Hawks' explosive offense once again — at least until Stanton connected with Shabaj on the 83-yard fake-punt pass that tied the game at 7-7.

Harrison grabbed the lead for good, 14-7, when Shabaj got the

ball on a reverse, juked out three Canton defenders before cutting back against the grain to complete a breath-taking 53-yard touchdown run.

College expands music program, sets its sight on the future

Donald Morelock looks like a kid with a new toy as he tries out one of the new 7-foot Steinway grand pianos in the music department at Schoolcraft College. Morelock never stops smiling all the while his hands race across the keyboard in an energetic performance of Brahms *Rhapsody in B minor*.

As chairman of the music department, Morelock has a lot to smile about these days. In the last several months, the college doubled the space where students take lessons, practice and learn theory and history as well as the latest in music technology.

"I'm excited about the changes," said Morelock, as he led a tour of the department. Morelock's seen steady growth in the department since he first began teaching piano at the college in 1967. "We have new studios, new practice rooms. We have more than 200 students taking private music lessons in voice, classical guitar, piano, band and orchestra instruments. We're expanding our piano teachers certification program. Everything is growing because we have more space.

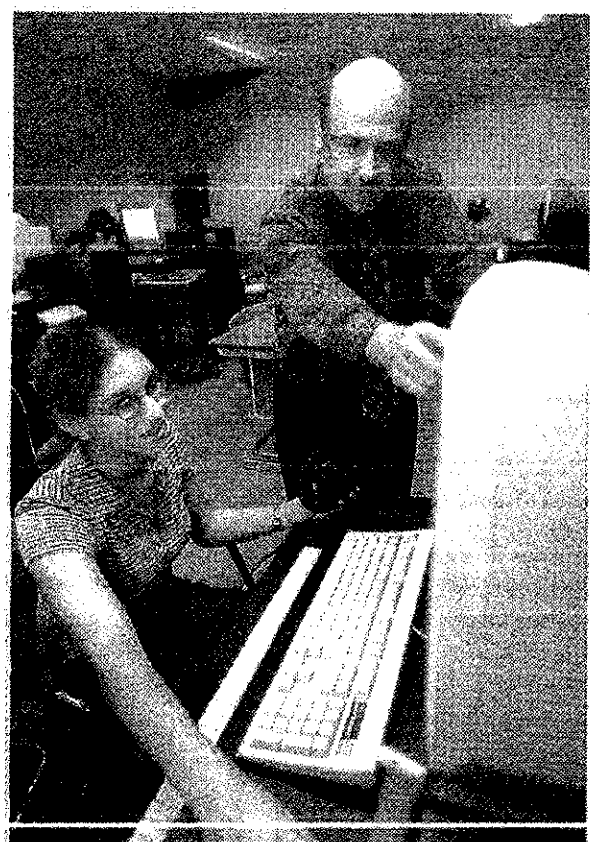
"We want a quality program. There's a lot more performing opportunities - an internal honors program recital in addition to a public series of recitals in spring. And we have audio visual to tape lessons and master classes so students can take them home to study."

Monthly master classes for all the students encourage them not only to advance their performing skills but to listen to each other play. Also once a month they're encouraged to learn from professional musicians by attending a free recital series.

More than two dozen pianos are available for students as young as 6 to begin learning the basics of music. Morelock recommends children begin piano lessons at age 6 or 7.

Over the last six years, Morelock's Russian trips with students taught him "the importance of exposing children to music at an early age." The summer American-Russian Piano Institute and Shostakovich Competition are but two of the opportunities available to music students at Schoolcraft College. The Institute is one of Morelock's favorites because it offers students the chance to study piano at the St. Petersburg Conservatory.

Sanjay Mody, who grew up in Birmingham, won first place in the Shostakovich Competition in Russia this year. Even though the 15-year-old Mody now lives in Paris, he still studies with Morelock

who's preparing him for a performance with the Livonia Symphony Orchestra in April.

"We also have a summer program here at the college for the last 12 years with the first two weeks focusing on solos and duets, the second two weeks on concertos with professional musicians," said Morelock.

"I have a philosophy about teaching community college with emphasis on community and college. There's certain things we can introduce to the community like the recital series which begins in late October and is open to students as well as the community. It's a good time to study piano. It's been proved that piano studies increase learning skills. It's also enjoyable."

Morelock is always looking for new ways to introduce children to music. New this year is an early childhood class for ages birth to 6. Morelock came up with the idea for the sessions after attending a national pedagogy conference where one of the speakers recommended more creative approaches for teaching music.

"We want children to discover music in a natural way," said Morelock.

That's exactly what Rosalia Emanuele tries to do as instructor for children and parents attending the classes.

"We're introducing music through the environment," said Emanuele. "We're doing a lot of singing and dancing, getting the children involved in hearing music and imitating sounds, singing back what they hear. Too many times when they start at 6 or 7, they cannot tell the difference between hearing wrong or right."

Once students advance to taking private music lessons at the college, they then have the opportunity to study with professional musicians such as Eugene Bossart, the college's artist-in-residence who accompanies and coaches voice students, and coloratura soprano Elizabeth Parcells, vocal artist-in-residence. A wind ensemble, jazz band and vocal jazz group round out the offerings.

Especially exciting is the expansion of music technology at the college. Barton Polot recently joined the faculty to teach students about composing with computers. He takes over where Bradley Bloom left off. Bloom, who recently retired after 30 years of teaching at the college, instituted the musical arts and technology studio where students

explore sound and learn to organize it into compositions.

Using the computer, Polot shows students how to play each of the instruments of the orchestra and then build layers.

"In order to be creative you need to know the fundamentals of music," said Polot. "There's higher expectations from musicianship. The computer speeds it up. It means taking musical instruments that are digitally capable and converting them."

Polot will teach a course in the basics of composing on computer as well as one for graphic artists to design sound to accompany their work.

A relatively young field, music technology began to evolve in the early 1970s. Polot was an undergraduate student at the University of Michigan at the time.

"In 1970 I didn't know what a computer was," said Polot. "At U of M it occupied an entire building. I fell in love with it even though I had to submit cards to a machine and wait 45-minutes to get an answer."

By 1978, Polot became interested in using technology as a creative tool while teaching music in Ann Arbor Schools. He's also taught at the University of Toledo and University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

"Mozart didn't know what a symphony would sound like until he passed out the parts at rehearsal," said Polot.

"With the advent of music technology, composers have complete control. They're not only the composer but conductor, performer, audio engineer. If I'm writing a string quartet the musicians are imposing their interpretation on my music. Picasso or Pollack got to see a finished product without anyone interfering with their work. With music technology, we have the opportunity to hear a finished product as we composed it."

Using a PC, keyboard and Cakewalk Pro Audio program, a handful of students in the MIDI Lab lay down a rhythm track. It's evident musical technology, also referred to as MIDI or Musical Instrument Digital Interface, has advanced greatly since standards or conventions were first set up in 1983. One thing that hasn't changed, though, is the ability to understand the basics of creating music. Polot also teaches music theory and history. He plans to coor-

Artist urges viewers to look for hidden meaning

Nancy Hurd expresses herself not in words but colored pencil. Delicate compositions tell a story of life and death.

Hurd says she isn't trying to be depressing. She's just suggesting maybe there's a few things we should think about.

Death is one of the subjects she addresses in at least three of the art works on display in a one-woman show in the Fine Arts Gallery at the Livonia Civic Center Library.

Sponsored by the Livonia Arts Commission, Hurd's exhibition includes acrylic painting and fiber in addition to the colored pencil drawings for which she's won several awards.

"I do love to draw. It bridges what I'm

thinking," said Hurd.

Emotional content is what sets Hurd's art apart. There are the usual portraits of grandchildren, a series on magnificent birds and pets, but it's the images of the elderly vegetating in a nursery home that reach out and grab

the viewer. Entering the gallery, the first work prods the onlooker to make sense of a little boy with fishing pole and an angel above his head. The work speaks of Hurd's brother John Davis who died in March of lung cancer but it could touch anyone who's lost a loved one.

Another work, *Fleeting*, focuses on her dying grandfather. Hurd incorporates a butterfly and portrait of her four children into the collage of memories.

Like a puzzle, Hurd pieces together teeth and bones to symbolize death and eternity in yet another colored pencil drawing where vicious dogs seem to be lunging toward the viewer.

"Everybody likes the cats and condor. Some are mystified by the symbolic

ones. Others enjoy trying to figure out what's going on. This is another one of those weird ones," said Hurd pointing to *Omen* in which a group of sheep seem unaware of the monkey lurking behind them. "Ideas just come out of my head. Is he part of the group or do they even know he's there, and is he a threat?"

Not all of Hurd's work is so heavy. A great grandmother sits peeling apples with a few neighbors. Hurd comes from a family of German farmers who settled in the Midwest. The theme appears again in a wagon scene. Family plays a big role in Hurd's life. One granddaughter sleeps peacefully. Hurd has four granddaughters and they're all pictured here in the exhibit.

A self-portrait with a baby

reflects on Hurd's past and what's yet to come. Hurd is always exploring subject matter as well as media. *We're All Ears* was drawn on red paper. Hurd ended up liking the experiment so much the finished work ended up on her living room wall.

"It's been fun to live with," said Hurd, who began drawing with colored pencil 10 years ago. "It was a challenge to start with red paper and work it out." You have to manipulate the colors differently. I'm learning more about color than I used to."

Hurd's also learning to deal with life's challenges. Ten years ago Parkinson's forced her to retire from a graphic artist position with Wayne RESA. Since then she's had a lot of time to think about the tremors wrest-

ing away the control of her hands. The prescriptions Sinemet and Mirapex help ease the tremors and she's drawing again but doesn't know for how long.

"It makes my art more precious," said Hurd, who's a member of the Farmington Artists Club and Artifacts Art Club. Hurd, through the Farmington Artists Club, helps teach the Senior Painters at the Costick Activities Center in Farmington Hills.

"I get up and work as if it's a job, but I love it. I feel fortunate that I have time to do my art."

inate all of the programs to provide students with a comprehensive music education. But first he needs to get the word out about music technology and the 14-station MIDI Lab at Schoolcraft College. Many students don't realize the program exists on the Livonia campus even though he conducts a conference on music technology every January in the Washtenaw Intermediate School District.

"It's going to be more popular," said Polot. "I'm going to contact high school teachers in the area. It's a well kept secret. There's no other opportunity to get formal training."

"The next generation will be

interesting, young people getting involved with music technology," said Polot. "Anybody who has a PC already has a synthesizer. It's simple to attach a keyboard. We've been hearing it for 20 years in film scores that sound orchestral. The technology has become so affordable. For \$5-6,000 you can set up a studio in your home that would have cost a couple of hundred thousand dollars 20 years ago. I don't know of any synthesizer virtuosos yet or any synthesizer teachers for that matter. After the piano was invented it took a hundred years to produce the first virtuoso."

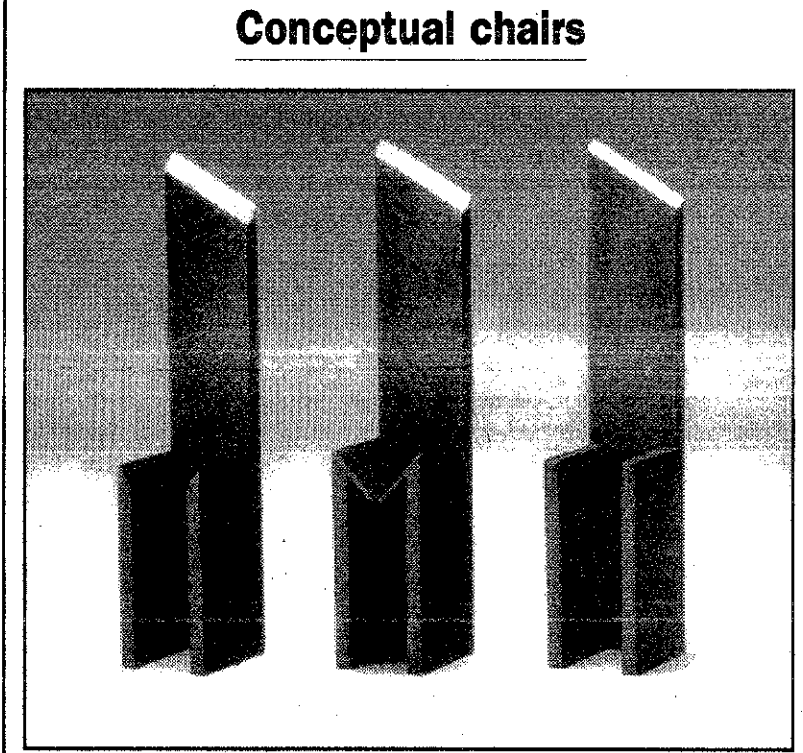

New Alex McKnight mystery takes in many Michigan sites

The Hunting Wind

(Thomas Dunne Books, \$23.95).

Maybe it's all those fast balls that hit him upside the head when he was catching for the Toledo Mud Hens. Maybe it's all that Canadian beer he drinks. Or maybe he was just born that way.

Whatever the cause, in this new mystery by Steve Hamilton, you may get the feeling that ex-cop Alex McKnight, now retired and living in the U.P., is operating just a few sandwiches short of a full picnic.

It's not that he's crazy — it's simply that he seems vulnerable, bumbling and naive. (He's also a bit blurry here, in comparison to some secondary characters, but more about that later.) Imagine Forrest Gump morphing into a detective of sorts, and you've pretty much got the picture.

Still, he's not unlikable. Somehow, on these pages, we keep caring what happens to this guy who calls the town of Paradise home.

For that, of course, Michigan native Hamilton deserves full credit. As our story begins, we find Alex at his usual Paradise hangout. The Glasgow Inn, a place of little pretension, with a big fireplace, Scottish overtones, and plenty of that Canadian beer he likes so well.

The season is spring—one of those edge-of-winter April nights, "cold enough to hurt." Suddenly, through the door swaggers the guy Alex calls "the left-hander." Alex hasn't seen Randy Wilkins in 30 years — in the days when they both played for Toledo — but he's still got "that look in his eye."

Whatever the cause, in this new mystery by Steve Hamilton, you may get the feeling that ex-cop Alex McKnight, now retired and living in the U.P., is operating just a few sandwiches short of a full picnic.

"Some days, you'd call it a twinkle; other days, you'd call it insanity," remembers Alex.

It appears that the divorced Randy has traveled all the way from California because he's learned through an Internet Web site that his old pal Alex is a private investigator, specializing in missing persons. (This is not exactly true, but Alex can't seem to convince Randy.) The person Randy wants to find is a woman named Maria, the love of his life, last seen in Detroit. No, he hasn't laid eyes on her or heard from her in all that time, but little matters like that do not deter Randy Wilkins.

Off to Detroit

Alex protests weakly, but he's no match for Randy's stubborn charm, and soon, the two are off, headed for the Motown area. There, they encounter problems aplenty, including a bloody and momentous event on a lovely, tree-lined street in Farmington Hills. They visit Dearborn, get misty-eyed at the sight of Tiger Stadium (and a mite critical as they cruise past Comerica Park), drop in at the Lindell AC, take a hilarious turn at a Westland "Senior Community," nose around a bit at the Detroit Public Library and do some snooping at the City-County Building.

Though they don't find Maria, they do turn up various members of her family, some of whom work exceedingly hard to discourage their search.

Although Alex is willing to give up the chase, Randy isn't, and his tenacity lands him not only in a heap of trouble, but in

a Grand Rapids hospital, clinging to life.

In this twisty story, it also leaves Alex feeling compelled to act as the avenger for his buddy. And even though the information he uncovers reveals that perhaps Randy is not so trustworthy himself, Alex sticks to the trail, traveling from Grand Rapids to Muskegon to Whitehall to Manistee National Forest to other points along the Lake Michigan shore and, finally, back to Paradise in the U.P.

About half the action of this story occurs while the southpaw is lying, comatose, in an ICU, and we definitely miss this lively, offbeat character when he's not around.

Out of action

Why Hamilton chose to eliminate him from so much of the tale is anyone's guess, but the adventure definitely sags in his absence, and loses a good bit of its fun (unlike Hamilton's previous, always-edgy novels, "Winter of the Wolf Moon" and "A Cold Day in Paradise").

In addition, Alex's "partner," Leon Prudell, even though he's a minor character in this uneven novel, often provides more punch than does Alex.

You'll learn something about sleuthing on these pages, though, especially if you're hankering to look up a lost love of your own. For instance, should you plan to obtain a copy of your old love's birth certificate, better have Plan B at the ready. In the State of Michigan, this is no easy task.

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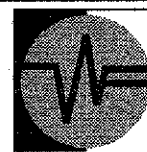
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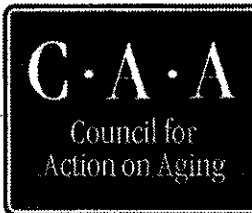

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Fall fashion is framed by sadness

Last week was supposed to be fashion's week to shine in New York, with eight days of runway shows scheduled.

Even the staid *New York Times* ran a breezy front page photo on Tuesday of the style makers and fashion followers that flood the city during the annual Fall Fashion Week.

But Wednesday's front page told a very different tale.

And suddenly, fashion didn't really matter. With the city in a state of shock, fashion week was virtually shut down, with tentative plans to reschedule in October.

And even events closer to home were affected. The 12th Annual Birmingham Fall Spectacular, which was scheduled for Wednesday in Shain Park, was canceled.

"The tents were already up and they had to take them down," said Linda Ashley, the event's public relations coordinator. "We didn't think that people wanted to be festive. There's no heart in it here."

Karen Daskas, owner of Tender in Birmingham, said that her sister, Cheryl, had an extensive line-up for the show, but had to retrieve the clothing from the Townsend Hotel when told the event was canceled. Tender's fall focus is on tall boots, fur wraps, lots of belts, and textured and colored tights.

The Daskases said that many customers came into the store to hug and linger when they heard about the terrorist attack on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

"I think they just wanted to be with people they knew," said Karen. And a company Tender does business with in Japan offered its condolences via fax. "They speak barely ten words of English, but they wrote that they hoped that people we know are safe," said Karen.

But for at least one of the Birmingham retailers that had planned to showcase a fall line, the cancellation of the Fall Spectacular was seen as a way of "giving in" to terrorists.

"This event is for a good cause. The money goes to children with cancer," said Cathy Lauri, manager of Fitigues, located on the corner of Old Woodward and Maple, referring to the Beaumont Pediatric Cancer Survivors Scholarship Fund. Fitigues fall line features its trademark traditional comfortable clothing, and a new line of holiday colors is being introduced on October 10.

So far, the Birmingham Fall Spectacular hasn't been rescheduled. The Birmingham Bloomfield Chamber, which organizes the event that draws nearly a thousand guests, is expected to make a decision by Monday.

But nearly 75 participants did attend the "Best of Bridge" sportswear show at Saks Fifth Avenue in the Somerset Collection on Thursday. The showing of the Fall 2001 sportswear collection was a benefit for the Child Abuse and Neglect Council of Oakland County.

Cheryl Hall, the store's public relations/special events specialist said the events of last week, including the closing of Somerset Collection in the wake of Tuesday's tragedy, did not pose a deterrent.

"We called the charity to see what the feeling was," said Hall. And when the sentiment was "let's go forward, let's move on," Hall said her group was in it 100 percent.

The show featured works by Michael Kors, Gucci, Dana Buchman and Eileen Fisher, among others.

Karen Daskas said that she had just returned from New York earlier in the month, and was planning a buying trip there again next week. The hesitation in her voice spoke to the fact that no one knows when New York will be ready to accept visitors again.

For a week that started with images of Vutton purses, and ended with such unimaginable destruction, perspective had certainly changed for the citizens of New York. And for the rest of the country.

Threads of hope

Act of buying Old Glory brings people together

Behind the Main Street storefront of American Flag and Banner, a business that has been selling and making flags in metropolitan Detroit since 1917, strangers become friends.

Clutching flagpoles and star-spangled boxes containing nylon and cotton versions of Old Glory, they patiently wait in the Clawson store's check-out line — a queue that has spilled out the front doors, circled the building and reached into the back parking lot more than once during the last two days.

As they wait in line, they cannot help but converse with one another; it has only been two days since terrorists crashed planes into the World Trade Center in New York and Pentagon in the nation's capital.

They share thoughts on the tragedy. Tell stories about today's search for an American flag.

Exchange plans for the one they are about to purchase.

One man cradles an enormous flag that was passed down to him by family. He carefully opens the ensign to show the woman standing next in line.

"It's beautiful," the woman says.

The line of waiting customers bond for the same reason a steady flow of people continue to rush into the store. It's the same reason retailers across metropolitan Detroit are selling out of American flags as fast as they can get them in stock. Hundreds of miles away from the crash sites, local residents are grasping for a way to pitch in, show support and stand up for their country.

"You feel helpless. You want to do something positive," says Jim Stewart, a Troy resident who's carrying a 3-by-5-foot American flag and two flagpoles. "After the shock, I thought what can I do. I can't go to New York. I can't push the rubble around. This is something I can do."

Stewart says flying the flag fosters solidarity. "You want to unite the country and that starts with uniting the neighborhood."

In line, Tracey Eckenrod clutches her 16-month-old daughter Briana, and waits to pay for a flag windsock and five small American flags to place in her front yard. Most of Eckenrod's Royal Oak neighbors have put up flags, she says. "I think it hit me yesterday, it was time to show a little pride and say we're American."

Bobbi Beckett of Bloomfield Hills carries two poles, having purchased two flags earlier in the day, one set for herself and another for a neighbor, she tells others in line. "I told my neighbor 'you need a flag' and she said thank you."

"It's the American thing to do," she adds, her eyes suddenly watering. "Now, I'll start crying. ... It's just the simplest thing we can do. They can't use our blood. This is something that we can do."

By the close of business, the shelves on the sales floor at American Flag and Banner are almost empty. "We are completely out of flags," says co-owner Bill Miles.

"But I have a truck coming out from Newark tonight. He'll be here at about five tomorrow morning."

Miles says he can't predict how long the supply will last — he's gone through two months worth of inventory in two days. He will extend hours of operation and open for business on Saturday as long as he has flags to sell.

"Never have we seen that many people standing in the showroom like that," says Miles, referring not only to the sheer number of customers he's seen but also to their behavior.

"I couldn't believe it, really. Because of the wait, friendships were being made in line," he says, a lump in his throat. "They would come up and pay and then turn to the person behind them and say 'good to meet you.' People were joining with strangers."

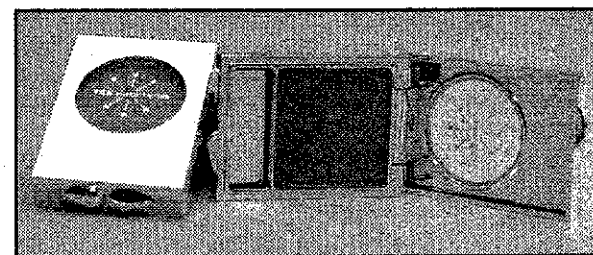
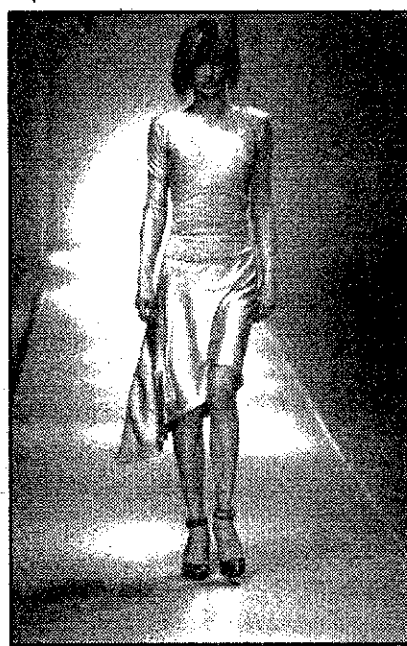

Mid-Michigan cities offer quiet respite, tranquility

I've always heard about the pride that the folks of Marshall have for their historic homes, but it was never more evident than when I took a wrong fork in the road and had to stop at a drive-in eatery to ask for directions to the hotel.

"Oh, that's on the other side of town where all the junk is. You know, the Burger King and video stores," said the man behind the counter.

Well, he's right. The west side of Michigan Avenue, Marshall's main drag, is strip mall heaven. But the east side of the strip is a quaint little downtown with shops that sell knick-knacks and antiques.

And historic homes abound. Some are still single family residences, but several have been turned into museums.

Island flavor

The Honolulu House is probably the most famous. Built in 1860 by a state senator who was enamored by the Hawaiian Islands, the lavishly decorated house features tropical murals,

beautiful fireplaces and a very odd pagoda-shaped observation deck.

There's also a Governor's Mansion, despite the fact that Marshall lost out on being the state's capitol by one vote. Today, it serves as museum and headquarters of a Daughters of the American Revolution chapter.

Except for Schuler's and a more-up-to-date little hole-in-the-wall Italian restaurant, downtown Marshall doesn't offer much in the way of dining. There's decent pizza at Mancino's and Su Casa is a popular destination. Breakfast at the Coffee Pot, where the main decor is velvet Elvis, is a given for guys in Carharts. Most of these early morning patrons order "the usual," and I found the cinnamon toast to be particularly good.

Be sure and see the Brooks Memorial Fountain at night. Last year, the historic 1930 white pillared fountain underwent an \$80,000 restoration paid by the City of Marshall. Jets of water project through the Greek Doric design and are lit up in numerous colors at night.

If you enjoy traipsing in and out of little shops, then Marshall is your place. But an afternoon of that and I was ready to strike out a little further so I hit the big city—which, in this case, was Battle Creek.

It's Grrreat

Whenever I've driven to Chicago, I've always been strangely drawn to the road sign that advertises the Battle Creek attraction "Kellogg's Cereal City USA." It reminds me of childhood road trips out west when we'd see signs inviting us to view "dinosaur parks" and "death cars of the stars."

What could possibly fill a whole museum devoted to cereal?

Well, forgive me for being a Doubting Thomas because this place is a lot of fun for kids and adults. There's a huge playtime area that kids can run, jump and fall in without getting hurt. The entrance is a huge milk carton, and soft-sculpture Fruit Loops abound.

Kids will also enjoy all the

train artifacts as Cereal City also serves as a historical museum showing Battle Creek at the turn of the 19th century.

A self-guided tour takes you through a makeshift control room and production line for making Corn Flakes, and at the end, you get a free sample. Four theaters show productions ranging from a historical account of the brothers Kellogg and C.W. Post to old commercials starring everyone from Rin Tin Tin to the Partridge Family.

You can purchase a box of Corn Flakes with your picture on it, and, of course, there's a gift shop with every conceivable product with Tony the Tiger, Toucan Sam and Snap, Crackle, Pop on it.

Roam free

Besides Cereal City, the place

you don't want to miss is Binder Park Zoo, just on the outskirts of downtown Battle Creek.

Having the Detroit Zoo just minutes away, I wasn't really expecting much from a zoo in the middle of Michigan. But I was quite taken aback. At this zoo, the zebras and giraffes roam free in a savannah large enough to allow them to work up a gallop.

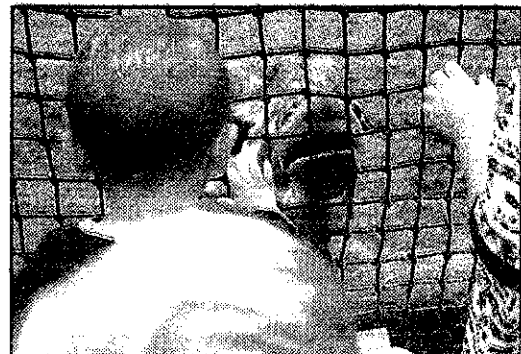
Along the trail in Wild Africa (it's accessible only by the zebra tram), there are stops where you can feed the giraffes—which is sure to elicit squeals from youngsters. The one-mile trail through Wild Africa is accessible for strollers, and there are stops along the way to get the best views of ostriches, antelope and gazelles.

During the winter months, the animals can come and go or simply stay in a barn the size of a football field that is beyond visitors' sight as you look across the hills.

The zoo also features a snow leopard, red pandas, camels and prairie dogs. Throughout most of the zoo, patrons walk above the animals on boardwalks, giving the feel that it's the animals that roam free and the visitors are confined to the smaller spaces.

The zoo also features a children's zoo and a railroad ride that take you through some heavily wooded areas.

The Binder Park Zoo offers a reciprocal agreement with the Detroit Zoo, so you get in free if you're a member. And besides being a wonderful habitat for animals, the zoo is a pleasant place to white away a fall afternoon.

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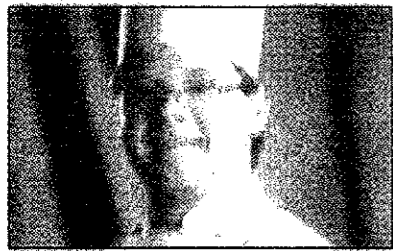

Here are quick cooking tips to sauces, potatoes

Part of training to become a professional chef or cook is learning the "tricks of the trade."

In every kitchen I have ever worked, there has always been some different way of doing something. To become successful as a chef, it is important to learn as many of these tricks as possible. Solving the mysteries of a kitchen has always fascinated me. Often these methods cut the preparation time or improve the taste or presentation.

Tenderizing

One neat trick that quickly comes to mind is the use of cling wrap to tenderize meat. We use it to pound meats and fish thinly. You may want to try this if grilling rib eye, New York strip or top round steaks. It's also great for pounding veal for scaloppini. Place a sheet under and over meat and pound evenly with a flat surface, such as the smooth side of a meat mallet or a flat bottom pot or pan.

Marvelous mashed potatoes

Making perfect mashed potatoes is an art that many people never seem to master. The secret is to cut the potatoes evenly into 2-inch cubes, place in cold water to bring to a boil and then simmer. Cool through and strain well.

While still warm, add cream or half-and-half, warm butter, salt and pepper. Mash well, but not too long or it will make the potatoes starchy. The key is uniform cuts for the potatoes and simmer rather than boil.

Super sauces

Producing good sauces and gravies also eludes many cooks, but once you solve the mystery of making a good roux, you can produce great gravy every time!

When making a sauce, before thickening always taste and reduce (or boil down) if not flavorful enough. To thicken, add a roux, which is a cooked paste made of flour and butter. Mix the flour and water together to make a paste and then cook at a simmer, stirring continuously. The longer you cook the roux, the more flavorful it will become and deeper in color.

When your roux is ready, slowly whip it into your sauce. The key points are to add the roux slowly to the sauce so as not to over-thicken. Then, continue cooking at a low heat for about 1/2 hour, so that no starch flavor is left. Strain before serving.

Using oil sprays

In the old days, using a pastry brush was customary to oil meats and spread butter on sliced croutons. We are now moving to spraying oils out of clean spray bottles to make an even coating and also so not to create bacterial growth on pastry brushes that may sit at room temperature for hours.

Stick-free cooking

Here is a remedy for the age-old problem of food sticking to your pans or even on your barbecue grill. I have seen so many beautiful pieces of fish mangled and ripped apart by so many people. I have to admit that I myself may have done this, but only once. There is an easy fix, provided you aren't using a non-stick pan: pre-heat and pre-oil — this is the ticket.

Do you want to brown a chicken breast in a skillet? Turn heat on medium-high for a few minutes, place oil in the pan and wait until oil crackles when you drop a few droplets of water. Then place the chicken in, being careful not to over-fill the pan. This is the other key to the success of a great meal.

Do not put too much in the pan. Overloading will cool your pan and make your food stick. As for the grill, whether charcoal or gas, heat until the grates are hot.

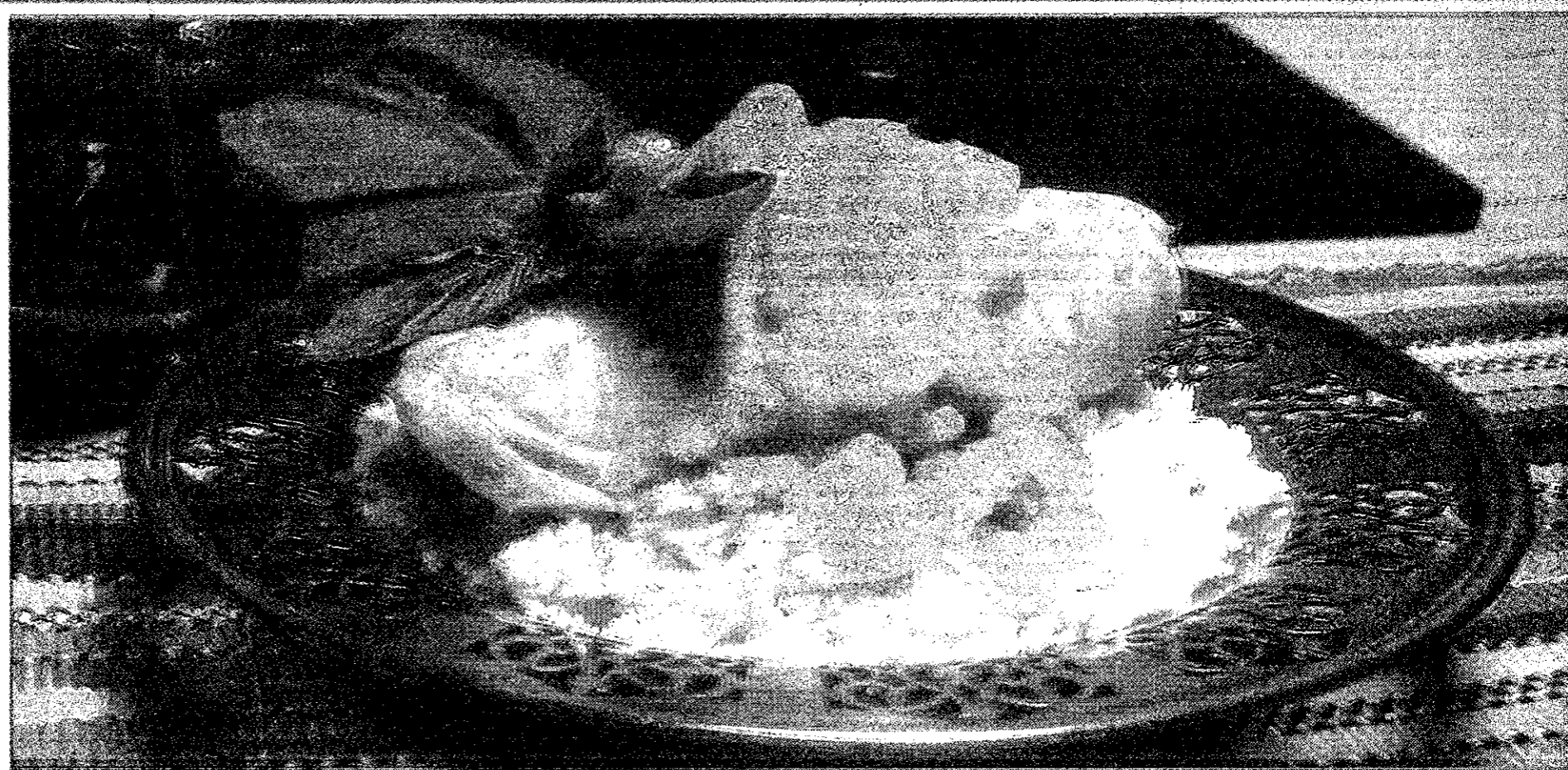

Rosh Hashana

begins Jewish holidays

Norene Gilletz, author of kosher cookbooks *Second Helpings Please* and *Mealean! Yummy*, admitted recently that Jewish cooking can be a challenge to cook healthy, while restricting certain ingredients.

"You learn to be more creative," Gilletz said. For example, her pesto uses less oil, substituting tomato juice for some of the liquid. A tip for roasted chicken: season underneath the skin. After roasting time, remove the skin before eating.

Another tip: use Idaho potatoes for latkes because they have the perfect starch content. New potatoes are great for potato salad.

"Use my recipes as a springboard and experiment a little bit," she suggests.

Holidays begin

With Rosh Hashana, or the Jewish New Year coming up on Tuesday, about 100 members of the Sisterhood of Adat Shalom Synagogue in Farmington Hills recently got into the holiday spirit at the 2nd annual Hiddur Mitzvah.

Setting the tone for the day was Lynn Scheele Nevins, wife of Rabbi Daniel Nevins, with an explanation of the 10-day period between Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, or Day of Atonement.

"We're called upon for extra introspection," she said about the traditional period of repentance. "To turn away from sin and toward righteousness."

In Hebrew, Rosh Hashana means, literally, "head of the year" or "first of the year." Rosh Hashana is commonly known as the Jewish New Year. This name is somewhat deceptive, because Rosh Hashana is considered one of the holiest days of the year. For most Americans, mention New Year's Day and they think of parties and football.

But there is one important similarity between the Jewish New Year and the American one: Many Americans use the New Year as a time to make resolutions. Likewise, the Jewish New Year is a time to begin introspection, looking back at the mistakes of the past year and planning changes for the new year.

The name "Rosh Hashana" is not used in the Bible to discuss this holiday. The Bible refers to the holiday as Yom Ha-Zikkaron (the day of remembrance) or Yom Teruah (the day of the sounding of the shofar).

Sounding the shofar

The shofar is a ram's horn which is blown somewhat like a trumpet. One of the most important observances of this holiday is hearing the sounding of the shofar in the synagogue.

No work is permitted on Rosh Hashana. Much of the day is spent in synagogue, where the regular daily liturgy is somewhat expanded. In fact, there is a special prayerbook called the machzor used for Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur because of the extensive liturgical changes for these holidays.

Another popular observance during this holiday is eating apples dipped in honey, a symbol of the wish for a sweet new year.

Jews celebrate Yom Kippur, on Thursday, Sept. 27 this year, which is probably the most important holiday of the Jewish year. Many Jews who do not observe any other Jewish custom will refrain from work, fast and/or attend synagogue services on this day. Yom Kippur occurs on the 10th day of Tishri.

The name "Yom Kippur" means "Day of Atonement." It is a day set aside to "afflict the soul," to atone for the sins of the past year.

Yom Kippur is a complete Sabbath; no work can be performed on that day. It is well-known that Jews are supposed to refrain from eating and drinking, even water, on Yom Kippur. It is a complete, 25-hour fast beginning before sunset on the evening before Yom Kippur and ending after night-fall on the day of Yom Kippur.

The Talmud also specifies additional restrictions that are less well-known: washing and bathing, anointing one's body, wearing leather shoes and engaging in sexual relations are all prohibited on Yom Kippur.

Children under the age of nine and women in childbirth (from the time labor begins until three days after birth) are not permitted to fast, even if they want to. Older children and women from the third to the seventh day after childbirth are permitted to fast, but are permitted to break the fast if they feel the need to do so.

Most of the holiday is spent in the synagogue, in prayer. In Orthodox synagogues, services begin early in the morning (8 or 9 a.m.) and continue until about 3 p.m. People then usually go home for

CHALLAH

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 envelopes dry yeast
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 3/4 cups warm water
- 4 eggs, room temperature
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter or margarine, melted and cooled
- 6 to 7 cups unbleached all-purpose flour or bread flour
- 1 egg, beaten with 2 tablespoons milk or cream (glaze)
- Poppy seeds or sesame seeds

Combine sugar, yeast and salt in large bowl. Whisk in water, eggs and butter. Add 3 cups flour and whisk until smooth, about 3 minutes. Using a wooden spoon, mix in enough remaining flour, 1/2 cup at a time, to form soft dough. Knead on floured surface until dough is satiny, about 10 minutes, kneading more if flour is sticky.

Grease large bowl. Add dough, turning to coat entire surface. Cover bowl with towel. Let it rise in a warm, draft-free area until doubled, about 1 1/4 hours.

Grease large baking sheet. Gently knead dough on lightly floured surface until deflated. For large loaf: Cut off 1/3 of the dough.* Cover both pieces with a towel and let them rest for 10 minutes to relax the gluten. Divide the larger piece of dough into 3 pieces. Roll each into a 14-inch rope. Braid together, working from the middle to the ends. Pinch the ends together. Place on prepared pan, tucking the ends under. Cut the remaining dough into 3 pieces. Roll each into a 9-inch rope. Braid together. Set smaller braid atop larger. Cover with waxed paper or towel. Let rise in a warm, draft-free area until doubled, about 40 minutes.

German tradition grows, extends to Wisconsin

Many of us know the history of Oktoberfest, which began in Munich, Germany with The Royal Wedding celebration of Prince Ludwig on October 12, 1810.

But few of us know how Oktoberfest came to be an annual celebration here in America.

The first Oktoberfest in the U.S. was held October 13-15, 1961, in Lacrosse, Wisconsin. It originally stemmed from the G. Heileman Brewing Companies discussions of an annual festival to promote their own beer. Two malt house workers of German descent suggested an Oktoberfest celebration.

The idea was quickly accepted due to the fact that October is the time for color. Just as in our fine state of Michi-

gan, the leaves change from summer green to brilliant fall crimsons and golds in early October (or sooner). A celebration in October would be the perfect way of marking the end of the harvest season in preparation for winter.

Everyone at Heileman agreed that an Oktoberfest celebration was the perfect venue to promote the brewery. It soon became apparent by the growing size of the festival there would be much more to do than their brewery could handle alone. The idea was presented to the Lacrosse Chamber of Commerce and was quickly adopted as a complete civic enterprise to promote the town of Lacrosse itself.

Some of the primary objectives in making Oktoberfest a community-wide celebration were to promote local pride in Lacrosse, involve large numbers of people in the area, and to break even financially, while remaining a non-profit organization. The almost unbelievable growth of the Lacrosse festival

since that first year has been astounding.

Lacrosse eventually adopted this celebration as a holiday for the community.

In 1962 the name Oktoberfest, USA was listed and registered as a trademark by the City of Lacrosse. For over 40 years this celebration of beer, bratwurst, music and parades has made Lacrosse, Wisconsin's Oktoberfest the finest in the nation.

Here in the U.S., we now celebrate Oktoberfest for the entire first week of October, but back in Germany, the Oktoberfest celebration carries on for a full two weeks — the last week of September and the first week of October. That's a lot of celebrating.

It never ceases to amaze me the historic and economic impact breweries have made here in our fine country.

So the next time you're out for a relaxing evening, stop by your local brew pub as a way of supporting your community. It just may put our town

back on the map.

Here's a terrific German appetizer, also called Kohlroutaden, that goes great with a fresh, malty Oktoberfest lager. You will not be disappointed.

As always, never trust a skinny Brewmaster.

The PT Cruiser would then be Chrysler's volume leader for the entire product line and would increase their market share considerably. Only one engine is currently offered, a four-cylinder, 2.4 liter one that features a dual overhead camshaft (DOHC) and four-valves-per-cylinder. The smooth and quiet running engine produces 150-horsepower at 5600 rpm and 162 ft-lb of torque at 4000 rpm. Either a five-speed manual or four-speed automatic transmission, both with overdrive, are available. While offering adequate performance in an urban setting, the engine is definitely on the slow side when asked to lug up over two tons (about 3200 pounds for the PT Cruiser plus up to 900 pounds of payload) in hilly terrain, especially when fitted with the automatic transmission. The 5-speed stick trans makes the PT Cruiser a bit more fun to drive, plus you get a neat cue-ball shifter knob to play with. The DaimlerChrysler engineers did an outstanding job in putting lots of carrying capacity in a small package. While only about 169 inches long, about six inches less than the Dodge Neon on which the PT Cruiser is loosely based, it can carry 64 cubic feet of cargo with the rear seats removed. This is only about two cubic feet less than a much larger Jeep Cherokee SUV and the PT Cruiser also comes with

a 1000 pound towing capacity. As innovative as the styling is, the versatile interior design is the key to the PT Cruiser. The seats can be arranged into no less than 25 different configurations for seating one to five people. The rear seats are both foldable and removable. If you order the optional folding front seat you can carry 8-foot lengths of lumber. The floor is completely flat when the rear seats are removed, just like an old panel truck. The split 35/65 rear seat can be removed in two parts and both are fitted with small rollers for easy movement. There is also a multi-position removable shelf panel. The large rear slant back door means easy loading and unloading and has a cool look to it too. The PT Cruiser is not only fun to look at it is also fun to drive. Steering is precise, the ride is very good, and handling on twisty roads is great, while the braking provides quick, controlled stops. Indeed, it feels like a much larger vehicle. And as in a small truck or SUV you sit high up for very good visibility. The PT Cruiser has a rugged, built-to-last feel and high quality materials appear to be used throughout the retro-look interior. The PT Cruiser is priced right starting with a MSRP figure of \$16,000 and with the "Limited Edition" Option a PT cruiser can reach past the \$21,000 mark. The base price includes items like air

conditioning; tilt steering wheel; AM/FM/cassette; dual outside power mirrors and power steering, windows and brakes. The Anti-lock brakes with traction control at \$595 are definitely a worthwhile investment. The PT Cruiser is not without faults, albeit small ones. For instance, the three deeply recessed and rather smallish instrument pods are somewhat difficult to read in the daylight. The switches for the power front windows are conveniently located on the center of the dashboard, but those for rear windows are located on the back of the center console, where they are difficult to reach from the front seats. And while the PT Cruiser is easy to park, the turning diameter seems excessive for such a short vehicle. Minor gripes for sure. All in all, this is the Retro vehicle that will be taking the new car market by storm for the next three years, if production can keep up with the demand. The bottom line is that the PT Cruiser is a serious hauler whose utility will last years after its unique looks have grown old. It represents a very affordable alternative for those considering a small SUV and want the convenience, but not the looks, of a small minivan. And on top of all that it will still be the "Coolest Car in America" for years to come, so you better order yours today!
