## Road projects coming to Canton, Plymouth

Wayne County has revealed a list of construction-season road projects and Canton and Plymouth are on it.

Projects involve fixing car-rattling stretches of roads and improving a pedestrian pathway in Canton. Plymouth is getting a new traffic light at Sheldon and Goldsmith to aid motorists as global automotive glass supplier Fuyao Automotive North America, Inc., brings a \$66.3 million project to the site.

"We continue to look for ways to get more out of our state and federal dollars to improve our roads and bridges," Wayne County Executive Warren Evans said in a statement, adding this year's

projects "should have an impact across the county."

A road reconstruction project for Canton Center, between Michigan Avenue and Geddes, is expected to occur from August to November — a project local officials say has been long-awaited.

"It is unquestionably the worst section of road in the township, condition-wise," Municipal Services Director Tim Faas said.

Supervisor Pat Williams said money from the state gas tax is "not even scratching the surface" of Canton's needed road repairs, but "we're appreciative of the fact that we've made the list."

## SIKH STAND-UP COMEDIAN EARNS SEINFELD COMPARISON

After landing a stand-up comedy gig at New York City's former Laugh Factory in 2008, Iqbal Singh Bhan's friends called him the Sikh world's Jerry Seinfeld.

They nicknamed him Sardar Seinfeld after he used his Sikh attire, especially his turban, to make audiences laugh, dispel misconceptions and break down cultural barriers.

He joked that his turban was an amplifier that improved his hearing. Or he wore it to disguise that, as a Sikh man who should never cut his hair as a religious tradition, he was bald.

"I took advantage of my turban," Bhan said, sitting with wife Veena in their Canton home.

Bhan was born in India and brought his sense of humor with him when he came to America in 1960. He couldn't get used to driving on the right side of the road because, in his homeland, motorists drove on the left.

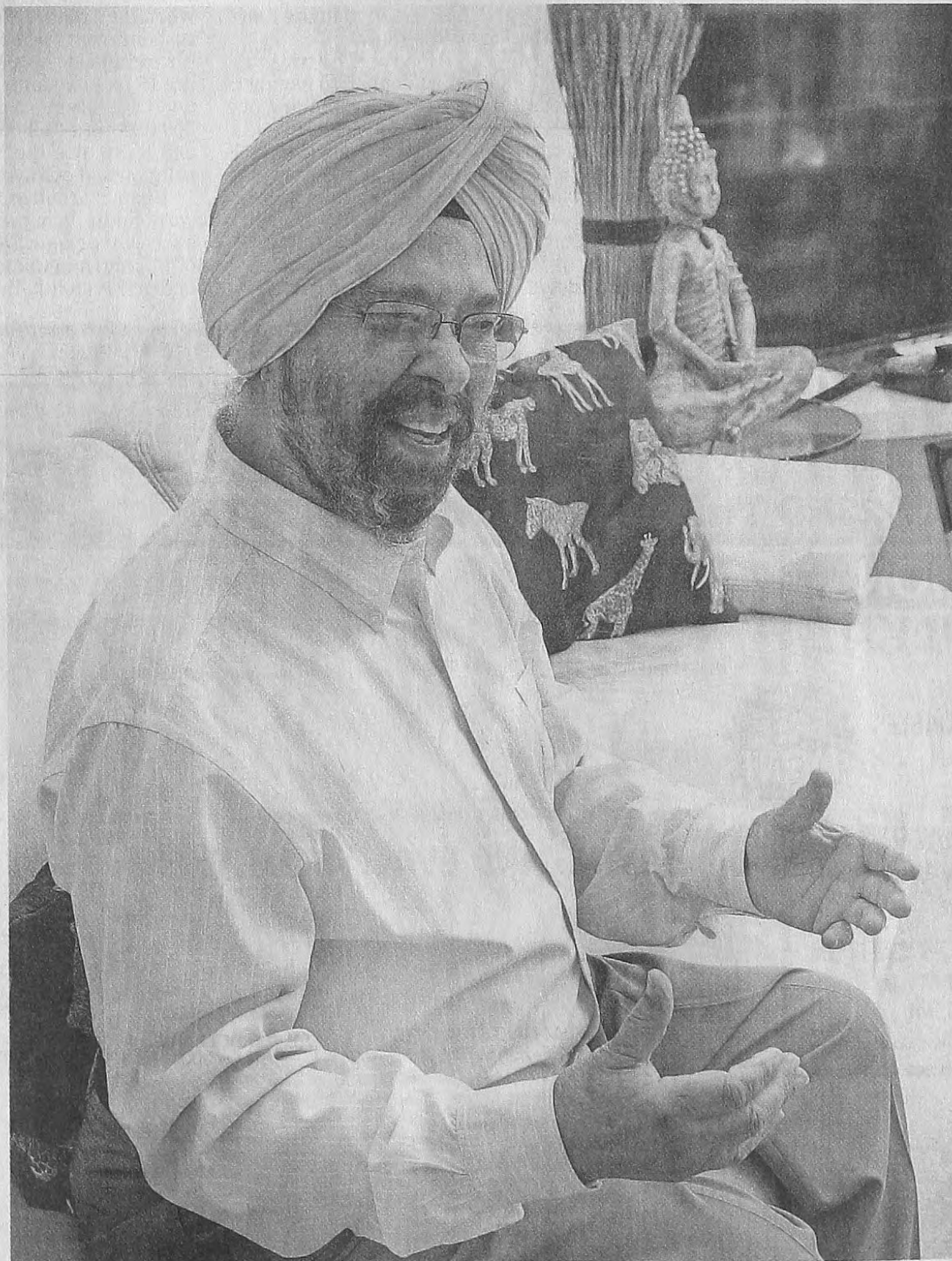
"So I started driving in the middle of the road," he said, smiling.

Bhan, who uses the stage name Bali Bhan, even turned a hospital stay into humor when he went in for knee replacement surgery.

"I told them I was there for the food," he said.

His wife smiled: "He made jokes until he went in for surgery."

TejKiran "Sunny" Singh, who knows Bhan from the Canton-based Sikh Gurdwara Singh Sabha of Michigan, a place of worship, said Bhan's efforts to use humor to reach out to the larger community can only help to improve understanding among cultures.

## Teen house party draws 400, causes big ruckus

A house party spun out of control and drew a crowd estimated by police at 400 after a 16-year-old Plymouth Township girl was home alone while her family was in California.

One female party-goer was found unconscious, but breathing, and was taken to St. Mary Mercy Hospital in Livonia for treatment, a police report said.

Police Chief Tom Tiderington said word of the party likely spread on social media and left the host teen unable to control it. Party-goers fled in all directions when police arrived shortly after 12:30 a.m. Saturday at the Plymouth Country Club Village subdivision, near Ann Arbor Road and Napier.

"She wasn't supposed to have a party," Tiderington said, adding later, "A party can start out with five, 10, 20 people, but once it gets on Twitter or wherever, the house fills up quickly. Next thing you know, she can't do anything."

Police received several phone calls from neighbors reporting a large party and hundreds of vehicles. Police arrived to find a huge party in progress, a police report said.

Police knocked on the door and saw party-goers peeking through the blinds. Police turned their patrol car lights on the house and, according to the report, an estimated 300 teens fled "in all directions" through the door and windows.

Police found another 100 teens in the basement.

Police heard screaming inside the house when they initially arrived. They found someone described as a white female unconscious in the master bedroom and took her to the hospital.

» The section of Canton Center between Ford and Warren is slated to receive what the county calls "preventative" concrete patching from August to October.

» A gravel stretch of Ridge Road, between Warren and Hanford, is expected to be paved starting in October and spilling over to the 2018 construction season.

» Though not a road project, the county has announced plans for an asphalt pedestrian path in Cherry Hill Village to connect sidewalks already in place along the south side of Cherry Hill Road. Faas said the project involves a 10-foot-wide path and bridge near the site of an emerging arts complex on the site of a former Henry Ford factory. The work is expected August to October.

» The intersection of Joy and Morton Taylor is expected to be resurfaced in mid-June, a project that is expected to last just one day.

In Plymouth, a traffic light is listed for the Sheldon-Goldsmith intersection to accommodate an

impending spike in traffic from the Fuyao plant, which is expected to create 533 jobs.

John Buzuvis, Plymouth community development director, said the county got a grant from the Michigan Department of Transportation for the project.

"It will cover the cost of a traffic control device there to help regulate traffic on Sheldon Road once the plant is up and running, so traffic will flow and people can get in and out," Buzuvis said.

He said the area formerly had a traffic light, but it was taken down years ago for an underpass project. It wasn't put back up because the Fuyao site was vacant.

The traffic light project is expected to begin in October and be finished in December. It is needed because Fuyao expects to employ hundreds of workers when it begins production, possibly later this year, in a 528,000-square-foot warehouse.

Buzuvis has called it Plymouth's largest industrial site, with about 32 acres.

Officers found dozens of empty liquor bottles and beer cans inside the house. The report said the smell of marijuana was so strong that police at times had to pause their investigation and go outside for fresh air.

The teen hosted the party while other family members were in California, the report said. Tiderington said a family friend came to the house to take charge.

The police report indicated the house was "destroyed" and had widespread damage, including a backyard grill and a fence.

Tiderington said police would be following up with the parents and deciding whether to issue any citations.

"It's showing that we want to be part of everybody. We want to be part of this country. We are not foreigners anymore," Singh said. "We are all one."

Bhan, one of five siblings, came to the U.S. after he became upset that he was rejected for an engineering school in India. He said he became the first Sikh to graduate from Marquette University in Wisconsin, where he earned a degree in mechanical engineering.

He helped pay his way through school by modeling to sell products in advertisements in magazines such as Playboy and National Geographic, who sent representatives from Chicago to work with him.

At a time when far fewer Sikhs had come to

America, Bhan found that most people "were curious" about his appearance. He earned hundreds of dollars for the photo shoots.

He later earned his master's degree in engineering from Penn State, where he said he met the likes of longtime football coach Joe Paterno. His education gave him the skills for a long career working for companies in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan, where he retired from Faurecia Interior Systems, although he still works as a part-time consultant.

No matter where he worked, he always had a knack for making his co-workers laugh with humor he often directs at himself. He stands 5 feet, 7 inches.

"I'm very short for a Sikh man. I didn't drink milk," he said.

Bhan began working as a part-time stand-up comedian after he re-

tired in 2008. He has appeared in clubs in Los Angeles, Washington, D.C., and Dallas, where his daughter, son-in-law and two grandchildren live.

Closer to home, he has appeared at the former Joey's Comedy Club in Livonia and at local parties, churches and schools.

"He entertains in the (airplane) flight also," Veena said, recalling the time Bhan had an impromptu comedy routine for passengers who were delayed departing from their plane.

Bhan's neighbor, Dianne Neihengen, was among a group that saw one of his "delightful" shows. Neihengen, who is Catholic, said some neighborhood Christians and the Bhans have taken turns visiting each other's churches.

"We have wonderful talks together about our different faiths. I love

learning about other religions," she said, adding later, "I consider it a gift to have them as neighbors."

Bhan also organized an outing for four couples to an Indian restaurant.

"It's very important to him to build a sense of community," Neihengen said.

In the late 1970s, Bhan's young daughter penned a letter to late-night talk show icon Johnny Carson, though Bhan never sent it. In it, she wrote of her father's humor and made a pitch for Carson to invite him on his show.

Bhan said he tries to lead people into having a better understanding of Sikhs. He speaks to strangers everywhere he goes. It's another way he tries to break down cultural barriers.

"If I am friendly to you," he said, "chances are you will be friendly

Mata Tripta Ji Gurdwara Sahib, commonly known as Hidden Falls, places he said are welcoming to the larger community.

"We feed people in our temple. We help others. We pray for everybody," he said.

Bhan's successes have brought him attention in his home country, where he once received recognition from former India President Giani Zail Singh.

Bhan has performed stand-up comedy less since he had knee replacement surgery. In the end, though, Bhan's goal in life is simply to make people feel good. He uses his humor to do it.

"A smile is easy and it doesn't cost anything," he said. "That's what I provide."

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# Volunteers gather to battle hunger

Linda Siegrist is so grateful the second annual Greater Plymouth Service Project took place Saturday at the Plymouth Arts & Recreation Complex in downtown Plymouth.

"Oh, absolutely," the Plymouth Township resident said of the anti-hunger effort. Her husband Dave Siegrist, who Jan. 1 lost his battle with cancer at age 63, had the vision for last spring's inaugural GPSP.

"He had that vision of trying to unite the community," she said. Dave would tell her, "I've never started a project I haven't successfully finished."

She said: "He just put his whole heart and soul into it."

Added Nick Schultz of Plymouth Township, this year's chairman, "He had this vision of connecting all the service clubs together." That quickly branched out to include churches and school groups, Schultz said.

Dave Siegrist was a longtime Colonial Kiwanian who had headed the Community Foundation of Plymouth, affiliated with Ann Arbor's foundation. Of his illness, Schultz said, "He never complained, never made it his focus."

A hardworking committee carried on for the event to benefit the Kids Coalition Against Hunger. Like last year, many volunteers gathered at PARC to package meals.

Committee members are proud nearly \$40,000 of this year's \$70,000 goal had been collected by mid-March. That will provide 250,000 adult meals, Schultz said.

The goal was to recruit 1,550 volunteers, Wallace said. He's pleased NorthRidge Church donated \$15,000. The church was also planning on bringing 300 volunteers.

Linda Siegrist said of community volunteers: "They were so grateful to have this opportunity to come together as a unified group. I feel the community has become a family."

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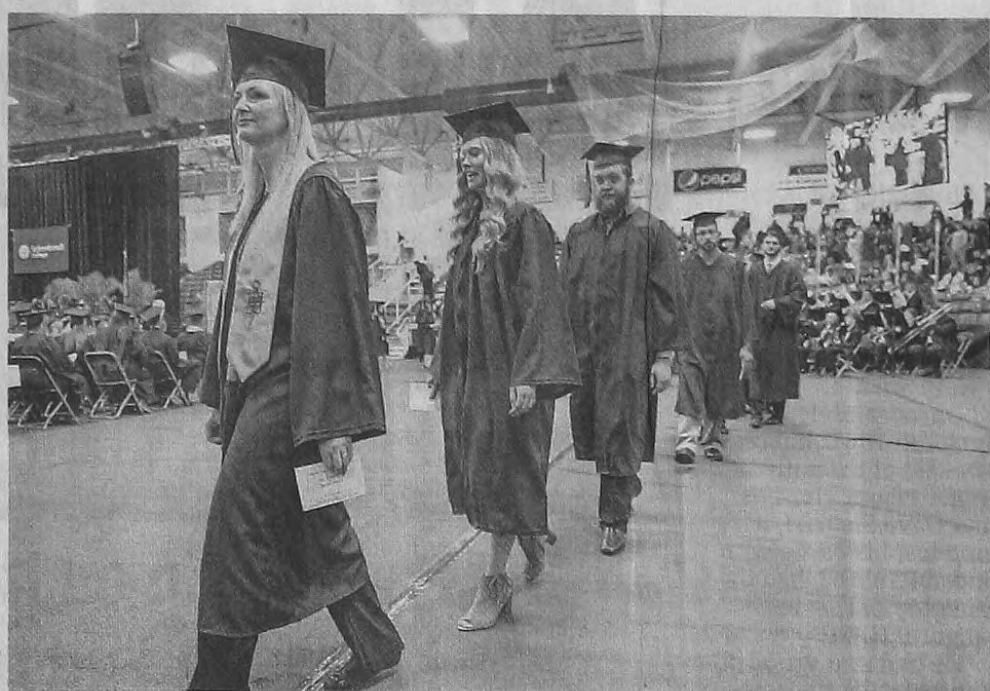
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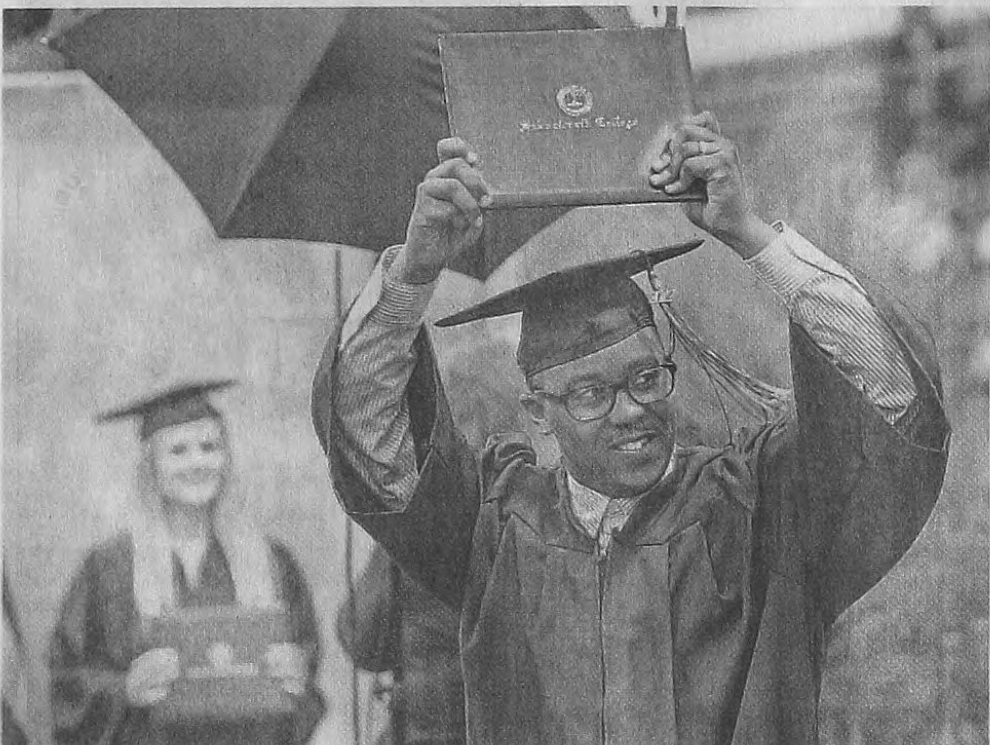

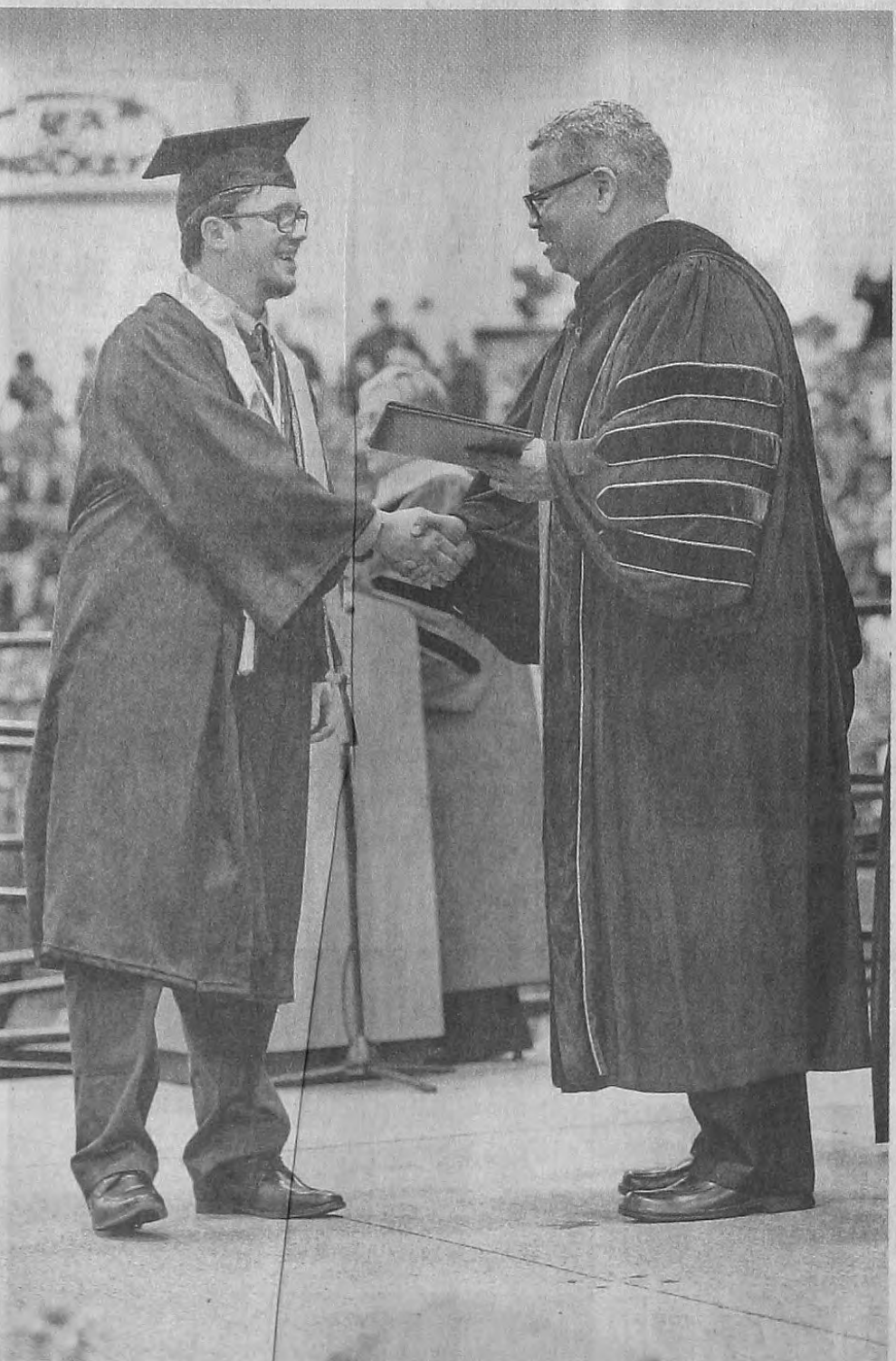

**Cops nab teens bailing from stolen car**

Two teens riding in a stolen car bailed while it was still moving and tried to flee the scene, but were caught by Canton police, a report said.

Police spotted the 2009 Chrysler Sebring near Canton Center and Warren after the 16-year-old driver's father had notified police of his son's alleged involvement in stealing a car from a Detroit auto dealership.

Police trailed the car and tried to initiate a traffic stop as the incident unfolded about 10:15 a.m. May 11. However, the driver ignored police and drove as fast as 70 mph in a residential neighborhood, the report said.

The teens bailed from the car while it was still moving, causing it to hit a street sign before coming to a stop. Police caught the teens near Canton Center Road.

The 16-year-old driver's father told police his son had been on an electronic tether for an unrelated incident, but had cut it off. The 17-year-old passenger told police he didn't know the car was stolen.

Police turned the driver over to juvenile authorities. The other teen, who told police he only ran because he was scared, was released.

**Fighting while driving**

A 53-year-old woman being arrested for domestic violence told police she wanted one of their guns to kill herself, a police report said.

She became upset after she was accused of punching her boyfriend in the face while he was

driving is facing domestic violence charges.

The two had been to a bar in Wayne and were on their way home when an argument escalated on Michigan Avenue, near Lilley, prompting the man to pull onto a smaller road and put the woman out of the car, a report said.

The incident unfolded about 6:45 p.m. May 9. The man struck a curb and damaged a tire as the dispute was happening.

Police went to the woman's house and arrested her for domestic violence.

**Retail fraud**

A 46-year-old Kentucky woman was facing charges after police arrested her for stealing merchandise from the Walmart store on Michigan Avenue in Canton.

A store employee notified authorities after watching the woman conceal cosmetics and a T-shirt in her purse about 3:25 p.m. Sunday, a police report said. The worker confronted the woman and detained her until police arrived.

The report said the woman's daughter became upset that her mother was being arrested on Mother's Day. The items she allegedly stole amounted to \$38.35 and were returned to the store.

**Unemployment fraud**

A 53-year-old Canton man notified police after someone filed for unemployment by fraudulently using his personal information.

He reported the incident May 10 after receiving a letter in the mail notifying him that the attempt had been made. He told police he didn't know anyone who would have done it.

The victim already had started an appeals process with the state. He also had contacted his credit card companies to safeguard his accounts.

**Cops nab speeder**

A Livonia driver who ran a red light at 70 mph without braking was arrested for driving while drunk, a police report said.

The incident started about 3:10 a.m. May 2, when a police officer spotted a car traveling at an even higher speed, 93 mph, on southbound I-275 near Plymouth Road. The car exited at Ann Arbor Road and made an illegal left turn while the traffic light was red, the report said.

He then ran a red light at 70 mph before he pulled over and, according to the report, told police "you got me, not going to lie."

The man told police he had been to a party in Ann Arbor. He admitted he had driven at speeds as high as 120 mph, the report said.

**Erratic driver**

Police arrested a Northville man who stopped at a flashing yellow traffic light and then began speeding at 55 mph in a 45 mph zone, a report said.

The incident unfolded shortly after midnight May 4, when a police officer saw a black BMW stopped on Beck Road near M-14, the report said. The driver then accelerated and began speeding, prompting police to pull him over.

The man was taken into custody for being under the influence of alcohol.

# Museum dedicates Civil War tombstone

The Plymouth Historical Museum is hosting a tombstone dedication ceremony for Civil War veteran Luther Lyon in Riverside Cemetery at 11 a.m. Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 20.

The museum worked together with the city of Plymouth and the Veterans Administration over the past few months to obtain and install the replacement veteran's marker for Lyon.

"During research for the 2016 Plymouth Ghosts Cemetery Walk, we discovered that his original veteran's marker was broken in half," said Liz Kerstens, the museum's executive director. "So we partnered with the city of Plymouth and contacted proper governmental agencies to acquire a replacement."

"We are reaching out to Lyon's descendants with invitations to attend but so far we are still awaiting replies," she added.

Members of the Sons of Union Veterans are expected to be in attendance and other veterans organizations have been invited.

"We are delighted to be able to help, even in this small way, to honor this Plymouth resident for his service," Kerstens said.

This is the second time that the museum has been instrumental in working with the VA to get a marker for a Civil War veteran. The first was Albert Nelson Stevens in 2011, whose burial location had no marker.

Lyon was born in Plymouth in 1842 and eventually served in a local military regiment, the 1st Michigan Lancers. The Lancers were trained in the Napoleonic warfare method of charging and spearing the enemy from a horse. Fortunately, they were disbanded without ever seeing combat.

In January 1864, Lyon and his brother Alfred enlisted in Company F, 16th Michigan Infantry. While the two men missed Gettysburg and Antietam, they fought with Gen. Ulysses Grant's army all the way through Virginia to Petersburg and then marched to Washington for the Grand Review.

He returned to Nankin Township (now Westland), married Mary Phillips and lived on his farm there until he died in 1908.

The event is free and everyone is welcome to attend. Riverside Cemetery is located directly behind the 35th District Courthouse at 660 Plymouth Road. Veterans from local organizations are encouraged to attend.

The Plymouth Historical Museum is a privately funded membership organization dedicated to preserving, teaching and presenting history through the operation and support of the Plymouth Historical Museum.

**Preventing ID theft**

Today's world can be very tricky. There are so many new ways to transfer information and financial data that it is sometimes difficult to keep track of. Young adults and seniors are presented with unique difficulties.

In the past we had to deal with pickpockets, three-card monte dealers and the occasional slick salesman. These days a crook can put their foot not only in your door but in your bank account and swiftly empty it out. Young adults and seniors need to be protected from old fraud in new clothes.

I found some very helpful information from the Michigan State Police about preventing identity theft.

- Here are some tips:
  - » Never provide personal information over the phone, mail, internet or in person to someone you do not know.
  - » Review your credit report, if possible, at least once a year for unauthorized activity.
  - » Go over financial and credit card statements every month for unauthorized activity.
  - » Protect your purse or wallet, of course, at all times.
  - » Shred all financial document that contain personal information when you are done with them.
  - » Never send money to anyone you don't know including through money order or by purchasing pre-paid cards.
  - » If you do suspect you

may have been the victim of identity theft then contact the Michigan State Police or your local Police Department.

It turns out that there is indeed an exam called the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) that consists of a series of tests with the results used to compute a score for the Armed Forces Qualification Test (AFQT) and determines eligibility for enlistment. The Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines all use these tests and have done so since at least 1980. The maximum score for the ASVAB is 320 and equates to a AFQT percentage of 99. An ASVAB score of 200 equates to a AFQT percentage of 46. An AFQT percentile score indicates the percentage of examinees that scored at or below that particular score. So, a AFQT score of 46 indicates that Leo scored as well as 46 percent of those tested. While this is certainly an acceptable score it is decidedly average and certainly not as spectacular as Leo would like us to believe.

Next Leo claims, since he is so smart, that he doesn't think a "shrink" could teach him anything. I was under the impression that (almost) everyone knew that "shrinks" don't teach. Leo, there is an entirely different profession for that and they are called "Educators". Psychiatry is a branch of medicine that deals with mental or emotional disorders. 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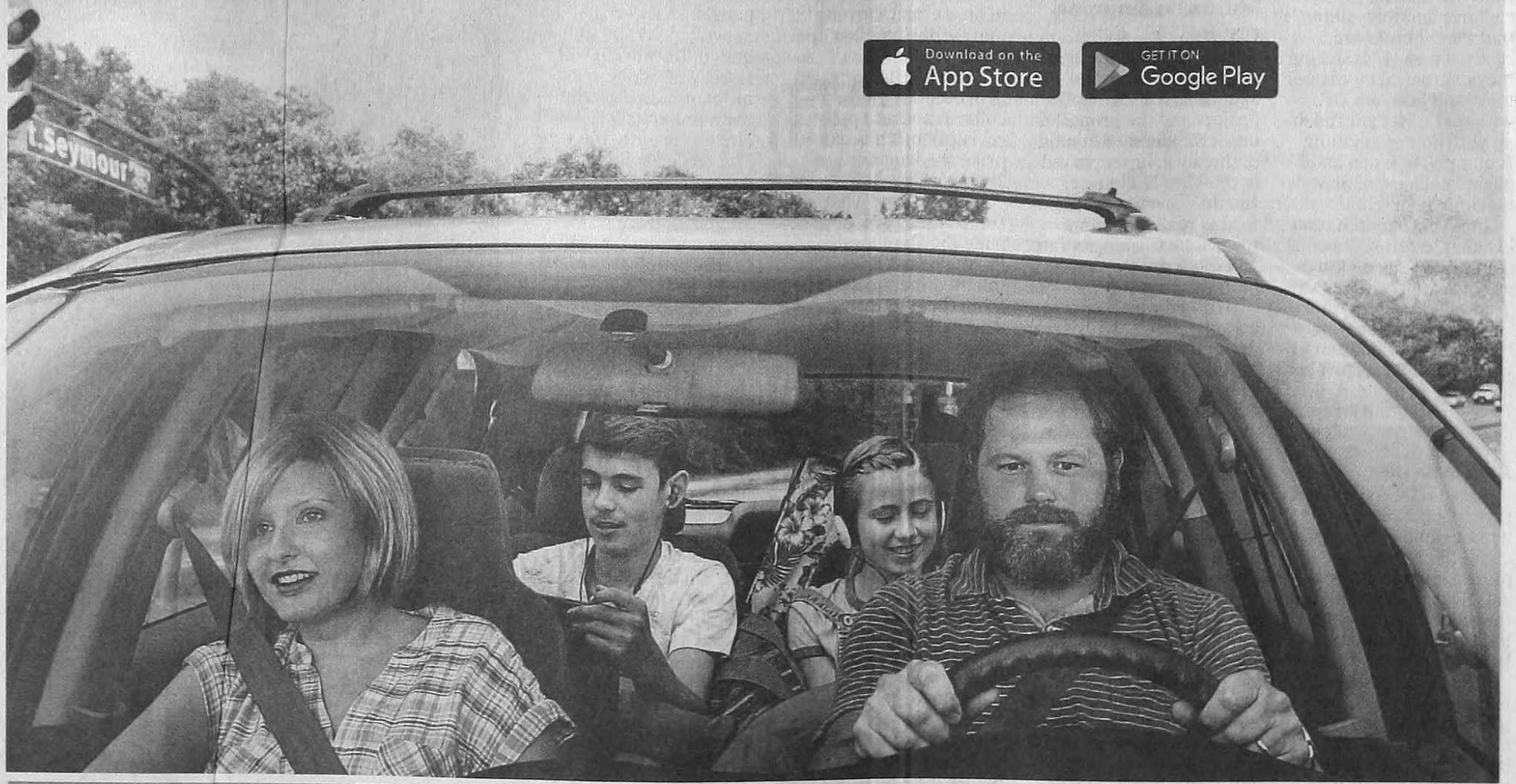
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# Isbister students participate in Girls on the Run program

You can hear the kind of gleeful giggling and earnest whispering befitting a pre-teen sleepover, but don't let that fool you. Continue to listen to these 17 young girls, and you will also hear about being confident while being kind, standing up to bullies and "activating your star power."

Gathering after school each Tuesday and Thursday, these girls make up the Girls on the Run team at Isbister Elementary School in Plymouth. Gina Ebner knows the value of the Girls on the Run program, having coached a team at Isbister Elementary School for 10 seasons. "I actually do not have any daughters!" Ebner said. "I have two wonderful grown sons and I wish this type of program had been available to them when they were in elementary school. Because I only have sons, I so enjoy spending time with these girls. They are sweet and funny and have interesting and remarkably perceptive views on school, family and the world around them."

"We are proud of all the girls who participate in the Girls on the Run program," she added. "The goal of the program is to develop confidence and positive attitudes in the girls, while establishing a lifetime appreciation of

health and fitness."

We learned that everyone has a star and sometimes a cloud might come and cover your star, like when someone says something hurtful to you. When this happens, you are not happy and you probably feel sad, but you can do something about it because you can activate your star power. We learn about the things we can do to help activate our star power like being positive, making good choices and choosing friends who share our good attitude."

The Isbister Elementary Girls on the Run Team will join other teams from all parts of metro Detroit to participate in their 5K run Sunday, May 21, at Lake St. Clair Metropark in Harrison Township. 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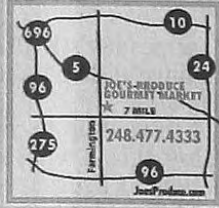

claimed third with 94.33.

Eckenroth, junior Ana Barrott and sophomore Olivia Harp accounted for 45 points of the Mustangs’ points in the two distance events. They also teamed with Emily Assemany to place second in the 3,200 relay with a time of 9:22.4, while Churchill took first in 9:19.85.

“We got really lucky with the weather,” Eckenroth said. “It was super-nice, so everybody had the chance to run great P.R.’s or faster times. And in the 4 by 800 — even though we got second — we got a P.R. for our relay and everyone in our relay got their own 800 P.R. So that was really exciting for everyone.”

Eckenroth posted a personal best 5:01.56 in the 1,600, holding off Churchill’s Gabrielle Swider (5:02.30), Harp (5:02.71) and Barrott (5:02.72).

“At the 200, I just knew I had to go,” Eckenroth said. “I had a lot of energy and I said, ‘I just have to do this.’ It’s my last conference meet, so I was really excited.”

Northville essentially clinched the meet when Eckenroth (11:01.19), Barrott (11:02.24) and Harp (11:02.36) went one-two-three in the 3,200. That enabled the Mustangs to put some distance between themselves and Plymouth.

Plymouth stayed right on Northville’s heels until the 3,200, when the Mustangs

used a 24-3 point scoring advantage.

“They’re very talented in the distance, they’ve always been,” Plymouth coach Ricky Styes said. “You look at their cross country performance over the past five years. We knew they were going to be hard to beat, just with the points they were going to score in the (1,600) and (3,200). But I was really proud of what my girls did today. We kept things interesting and close. We had a lot of girls P.R. today and we told them just put your best times out there and the score will work itself out.”

Draper, headed to Bowling Green, set a meet record in the 400, eclipsing the mark of 55.18 set last year by Northville’s Chloe Abbott (Purdue).

Meanwhile, Plymouth’s 400 relay team of Erin Bradley, Paige Sanders, Delia Brennan took first (49.80), while the Wildcats’ 800 relay foursome of Sanders, Faith Washington and the Draper sisters was also victorious (1:40.89).

“Ryen Draper is a really special runner,” Styes said. “She’ll graduate the fastest girl ever to come through the Plymouth-Canton schools. She ran a 54.97 in the 400, which might be the fastest time in the state right now. Everyone knows how good Chloe Abbott was and (Draper) broke the meet record. Our 4 by 200, I knew they were good and they ran a really special time today (1:40.89). I just saw a tweet and it’s one of the top 20 times in state history. We knew they were going to run well, but

that was a time that my eyes got as big as the stadium when I saw that. The Drapers (Reghan and Ryen) lead us and we’re deep in the sprints and they really shined today.”

Plymouth’s Natalie Janke tied for first in the pole vault (10-9 each) with Churchill’s Cate Visccher.

“This is our highest finish and we’re pretty happy,” Styes said. “We’ve never been second. We have some special, talented girls that helped us get first place in some events. And a lot of gritty performances of getting fifths, sixths and sevenths ... it does add up a lot. Total team effort.”

The Chargers’ 3,200 relay team of Christina Murphy, Caroline George, Megan Gendjar and Swider, who was battling a stress injury, won in 9:19.85. Swider, a state placer (seventh) last year, was held out for precautionary reasons in her specialty, the 800, in lieu of Friday’s MHSAA Division 1 regional meet at Canton.

“(Swider) ran a very fast (1,600) and a very fast 4 by 800 leg,” Churchill first-year coach Bruce Rivera said. “She P.R.’d in both of those today, but sometimes that can take the toll on the body. She P.R.’d by 11 seconds today in the (1,600). That’s crazy. We had a beautiful day for it, so decided to rest her up for the rest of the meet.”

Senior Takia Bradley accounted for 24 points individually for Churchill, with first in the 300 hurdles (46.56), second in the 100 hurdles

(15.31) and third in the 200 (25.30).

“Takia was stellar today,” Rivera said. “We had some worries with all the races she had to do. She was in the 200 semis and the 100 hurdles semis and she came on just as Bradley does. She’s been stellar for us all year, never falters.”

# Chiefs' Vaunado gets most out of relay success

## Canton senior excels at Kensington Conference meet with three firsts

Anybody watching the end of Friday's 1,600-meter relay were intrigued by the foot race between Canton's Jemal Vaunado and Livonia Churchill's Frank LaFave.

The two rivals were in lock-step down the stretch of the final event of the KLAA Kensington Conference boys track and field meet with the outcome still a tossup.

But then Vaunado, who earlier won both the 110-meter high hurdles and 300-meter hurdles, found a little extra gas in the tank and edged LaFave to give the Chiefs victory by the slimmest of margins (3:26.58 to 3:26.83).

"I tried to just take whatever running speed I had and put it into that last 100," Vaunado said. "This race I was running next to him a lot, pretty much the whole thing until the end."

"He put up a really good race, I'm a little bit surprised I won. But I'm happy with how I did and I'm sure they're happy with how they did."

Vaunado — who will run

track next year at Columbia University — might have been gassed; in fact, he briefly fell to the track immediately after crossing the finish line. But soon he was on his feet, being congratulated by relay teammates Caleb Moraw, Dirk Thornhill and Srikar Komunduri.

"I definitely couldn't have done it without my team," Vaunado said. "There was Caleb and Dirk and Srikar. I knew I really wanted to bring it home to my team because the team is what matters the most to me right now."

"I feel if I can do something for them then they deserve to have it (the win). I ran five races today, but that's not an excuse to not try my hardest."

Not surprised in the least by Vaunado's string of successes Friday was Canton head coach Jess Shough.

"He's been one of the most consistent, well-prepared athletes I've ever coached," Shough said. "He just concentrates on what he has to do and he does it."

Meanwhile, although Vaunado relishes every event victory,

there is something a little sweeter about a relay win.

"For hurdles it speaks more to everything I've done as a person, to try and get that good, since I was a freshman really,"

Vaunado added. "And when I win a relay, anchor or not, I couldn't have done that by myself."

"So it makes me happy to know that their hard work is

paying off with mine, and together we're able to do cool stuff. ... We're like family."

Canton pitcher Seth Marano proved to be the great escape artist in Monday's KLAA Kensington Conference baseball championship game against host Northville.

The junior left-hander was Harry Houdini-like, working his way out of jams over the first five innings as the Chiefs earned their first conference title since 2013 with a 2-1 win over the Mustangs.

Marano, who scattered nine hits and hit one batter over seven innings, helped give Canton its 16th straight victory.

Northville left nine runners stranded over the first four innings and came up scoreless before scratching

out a run in the bottom of the fifth on an Aram Shahriegan sacrifice fly.

But that was the only run Northville would get as Marano retired nine of the final 10 batters he faced, including a one-two-three seventh as the Chiefs improved to 26-5 overall.

"I threw for an inning of relief in the regular season and I didn't do so well actually," Marano said of a 4-1 loss to the Mustangs on April 17. "I didn't really think about it, I just think about getting the next guy out. I just pay attention to the batter. I really don't worry about those guys on base."

Meanwhile, Canton's win secured a spot in Wednesday's KLAA Association final against Brighton.

Canton strung together three of its five hits against Northville starter Jon Michalak in the fourth inning to score both of its runs as Justin Mattson started the rally with a two-out single. Ben Spencer followed with a hit-and-run RBI double and Lou Baechler followed with another RBI double to make it 2-0.

Marano took care of the rest, only giving up an unearned run in the fifth.

White has a pretty good idea about what it takes to succeed at the collegiate level, as he formerly coached Madonna University.

For the Chiefs, who are ranked as an honorable mention all-state team, the clutch hitting and strong pitching (by freshman Shae Scott), the win over the pesky Mustangs (19-7) gives them the opportunity to repeat as association champions.
