Warren Road cut from 2017 county projects

Other road improvements still planned for this year

Canton officials are surprised after a list of Wayne County road projects for this construction season failed to include a deteriorating stretch of Warren Road, between Canton Center and Beck.

Officials say the anticipated repairs have been delayed until next year, though county officials confirmed several other Canton roads are on the fix-it list.

"I'm surprised that it looks like it's going to be delayed," Canton Township Supervisor Pat Williams said.

"The longer they take, the more effort and cost it's going to take to fix it."

Local officials had antici-

pated the project would be completed this construction season until the county this month revealed its newest road-repair list.

Kaye Byrd, Wayne County spokeswoman, said the Warren Road project was delayed until next construction season "to provide more time to design the storm water drainage system."

They have organized barbecues for the homeless, are founders of numerous school service groups, they volunteer in local hospitals, do research at local universities and have started their own businesses. They sit on mayoral councils, play guitar in hospice centers and volunteer at animal shelters. That is what they do in their spare time. What they all have in common is that they are the shining stars of our local public and private high schools.

They are the 2017 Hometown Life Top 6 students.

Twenty-six schools responded to our call to honor their top six, representing a total of 146 students in the Hometown Life coverage area — and the list is impressive.

COMBINED RELAY WALKS TO KICK CANCER

When Lisa Cummins was diagnosed with cancer 18 years ago, she had no idea she'd eventually be helping other people get through the same disease.

But there she was Sunday, hands clasped and arms raised with her friend — and patient — Diane Ordiway in the always-emotional Survivor's Lap at the Relay for Life event at Canton's Heritage Park Sunday.

Ordiway herself was diagnosed in December 2013 and is being treated — by Cummins — at the St. Joe's Cancer

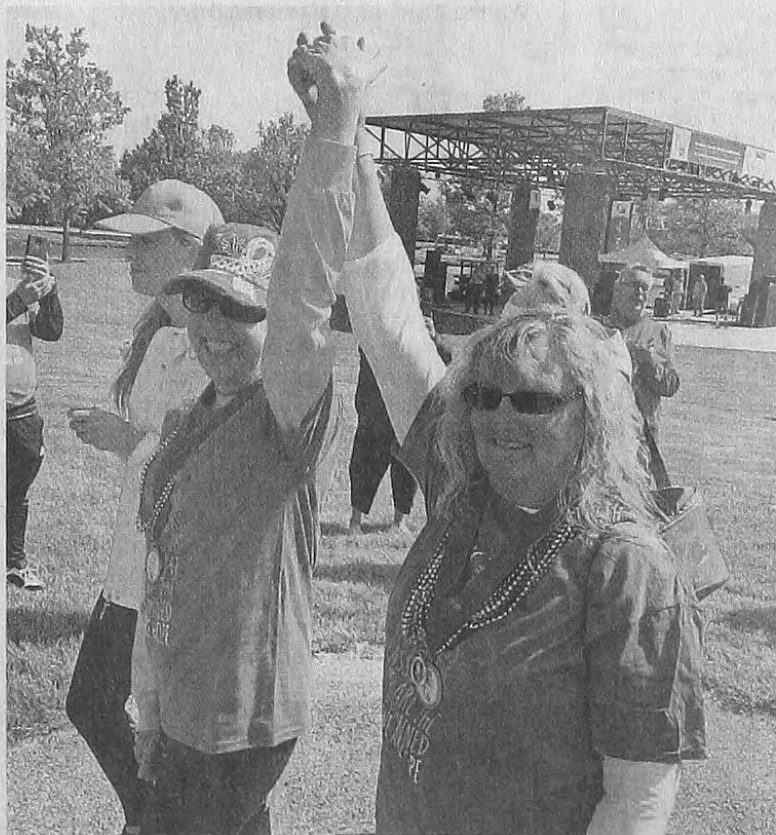
Center in Canton.

"We've become really good friends," Cummins said. "It's amazing. I can't believe I've made it 18 years. I can't believe I get to help people with cancer now."

Cummins and Ordiway were among hundreds of walkers Sunday, with some 55 teams committing to the 24-hour event. That number included 10 "virtual" teams — teams that did the fundraising but couldn't make the logistics of actually walking the event work.

That's a combination of teams American Cancer

Society staffer Megan Shaper thinks came from combining the Canton event, for the first time, with the Plymouth event.

"It's given us a momentum and a feel we haven't had in awhile," Schaper said. "It's brought together two communities who do a lot of things together. It's two communities coming together to make life-saving change."

The event got a lot of help from local sponsors, as well, collecting some \$28,000 in sponsorship donations. One of the biggest came from Adient, a spinoff of Johnson Controls.

Kurt Wise of Adient said sponsoring the Relay for Life was one way the company could give back to the community.

"We walk for all the families who've been touched by cancer," Wise said. "We're walking in honor of those we've lost, and for all those still fighting this disease."

The event featured a variety of booths raising money for the Relay, the Survivors Lap, several activities, including an IKEA build-out challenge and a luncheon for the Survivors.

While the hundreds walked, Cummins reflected on the dramatic changes cancer has

brought to her life. "It's changed my whole life in a great way,

because I can help people like (Ordiway)," Cummins said. "Cancer

has done a lot of bad things, but it's also done some great things for

me, too. It's given me a purpose in life."

Williams said road repairs, when delayed, only become more costly.

"As everyone is very much aware, the roads in the community continue to deteriorate," he said. "The longer we wait for repairs to be completed, the more deterioration is going to occur."

Wayne County Executive Warren Evans earlier this month said the county continues to seek ways "to get more out of

our state and federal dollars to improve our roads and bridges."

The biggest project announced for Canton this year involves a reconstruction project on Canton Center, between Michigan Avenue and Geddes, which is expected to occur in August through November.

Canton Municipal Services Director Tim Faas has called it "unquestionably the worst section of road in the township, condition-wise."

Among other Canton projects scheduled for

this year:

» The section of Canton Center between Ford and Warren is to receive what the county calls "preventative" concrete patching from August to October.

» A gravel stretch of Ridge Road, between Warren and Hanford, is slated for a paving project starting in October and spilling over to next year.

» Though not a road project, the county confirmed plans for an asphalt pedestrian path in Cherry Hill Village to connect sidewalks al-

ready in place along the south side of Cherry Hill Road.

The project involves a 10-foot-wide path and bridge near the site of an emerging arts complex on the site of a former Henry Ford factory. The work is expected August to October.

» The intersection of Joy and Morton Taylor is expected to be resurfaced in mid-June, a project that is expected to last just one day.

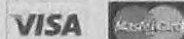

Plymouth, Canton ceremonies honor Memorial Day

Plymouth and Canton will join communities all across the nation Monday in honoring the sacrifices of this country's service men and women. In Plymouth, several civic groups are working together on the annual parade, which starts from Wing street and moves to Veterans Memorial Park – in front of the Plymouth Arts and Recreation Center –

at 9 a.m. The theme of this year's ceremony is "Women in the Military," and the featured speaker will be U.S. Marine Corps Lt. Col. Krista McKinley, a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy. The parade is being organized by the Plymouth Lions Club, Passage-Gayde American Legion Post #391, May-

flower Lt. Gamble Veterans of Foreign Wars Post #6695 and the Canton-Plymouth Vietnam Veterans of American Chapter #528. **Canton ceremony** The Canton Fire Department Honor Guard hosts the Memorial Day service in Canton at 10 a.m. The event will take place at the Veteran's

Memorial Center located in Heritage Park (directly behind the Canton Administration Building), 1150 S. Canton Center Road, in Canton. Representatives from the United States Marine Corps will also be present for a ceremonial wreath posting and a rededication of the 1st Battalion 24th Marine Division Memorial. A roll call will also take

place for the "Fallen 22," Marines who were deployed for duty in 2006-07 to Iraq, and made the ultimate sacrifice. The public is invited and encouraged to attend this memorial service honoring the Marines and all service members, organizers said, "who put our great nation before their own lives — a debt we cannot repay."

Prostitution arrest

A 24-year-old woman was arrested for prostitution after she went to a Canton hotel expecting a date and found a police officer, police said.

The incident unfolded at about 9:15 p.m. Thursday after an undercover police officer began texting with a Woodhaven woman who advertised herself online as a "Hawaiian bombshell," a police report said.

The two exchanged texts and agreed to meet in a hotel room near Lotz Road and Michigan Avenue. She knocked on the door, walked in and gave the officer a hug before the conversation turned to money. According to the report, she offered her services for \$175 for a half-hour and \$250 for an hour.

At that point authorities arrested the woman and had her car impounded. She was issued a citation for prostitution.

Peeping Tom?

Two stepsisters, ages 10 and 12, have reported seeing a peeping Tom outside of their house on several recent occasions, mostly recently Sunday, a report said.

Police haven't discounted the girls' accounts, but their stepmother said they both might have an overactive imagination, the report said.

The girls had told their mother they had

seen a man hiding in bushes behind their house. They said he wore black clothing.

The 12-year-old girl also said she had seen the man with binoculars looking at her through a window. The girls estimated they have seen the man 7-10 times since late March.

Police searched the area where the man had supposedly been and found no evidence such as footprints, even though the ground was soggy. Even so, police said they haven't ruled out a peeping Tom.

Weapons charge

A 21-year-old man carrying a pellet gun that looked like a real handgun was taken into custody during a traffic stop that occurred at about 12:45 a.m. Monday, a police report said.

Police stopped the driver near Cherry Hill and Canton Center amid reports he might be a suspect in a nearby larceny. Turns out he wasn't.

However, a police officer noticed what appeared to be a handgun on the front seat. It was a pellet gun but had the paint scratched off the tip, in violation of a Canton ordinance.

Police took the man into custody and he was issued a citation for having a facsimile of a handgun.

Unwelcome visitor

A 47-year-old Canton woman notified police after her ex-boyfriend showed up at her house

to see their daughter, even though he had been advised against it, a report said.

The woman told police the suspect often can be seen in the parking lot of the apartment complex where she lives, near Haggerty and Palmer. She said he also has repeatedly called her.

During the latest incident, the suspect told the woman he wanted to see the daughter and give money to her before he went out of town. The woman told him the girl was already asleep, but he went to the residence anyway, the report said.

The suspect asked to use the bathroom and pushed his way into the apartment, but he left when she told him that she was calling the police.

The woman told police she wanted to document the incident.

Truck hits bicyclist

A Plymouth man riding his bicycle along the 1400 block of Sheldon Road was hit by a Ford pickup truck that was backing up, a report said.

The man escaped with only minor injuries.

The incident happened shortly after 10 a.m. May 14 while the man was riding his bike along a sidewalk near a Speedway gas station, the report said.

The truck driver had started to back up at the same time and didn't see

the bicyclist, striking him and knocking him off his bike, the report said.

Jump-start goes bad

An 18-year-old Redford man whose car had stopped running got more than a jump-start when police stopped to help him.

He got arrested for having marijuana and paraphernalia.

Police went to the area of Beck and Powell on the morning of May 17 amid reports that a man was trying to wave down other motorists, a report said. He told police his car had stopped running.

Police helped him charge his battery and sent him on his way, but

then noticed his car had broken down again not far from the same spot. This time, they reportedly noticed the scent of marijuana and ended up taking the man into custody and issuing a citation for having marijuana and paraphernalia.

The man's car, which still wouldn't start, was towed.

Debit card fraud

A Plymouth Township man told police he received a Green Dot debit card in the mail even though he had never applied for it, a report said.

The man reported the incident after learning that someone apparently used his name and Social

Security number to get the card, the report said.

The man didn't activate the card and told police he also has contacted the Better Business Bureau to report the fraudulent activity.

Credit card fraud

A Plymouth Township man went to the police station to report recent unauthorized charges made on his credit card.

The man told police seven different fraudulent transactions had been made on his account. He said he didn't know who might have stolen his personal information.

The man wanted to document the incidents.

Alert officer halts auto dealer wheel thefts, suspects flee

An alert police officer patrolling near two Plymouth Township auto dealerships halted a crime in progress as suspects were stealing wheels off vehicles, Police Chief Tom Tiderington said.

"This is the crime of the ages right now," he said. "It's happening everywhere."

An officer had turned off his patrol car headlights and was approaching Hines Park Lincoln, on Ann Arbor Road west of I-275, when he noticed a Mercedes-Benz SUV

and a Dodge Caravan with occupants.

Two men spotted the officer and ran toward a wooded area to escape as the incident unfolded about 3:15 a.m. May 16, a police report said.

As the officer approached the Mercedes, occupied by at least one man, the driver swerved around the patrol car and over the curb before fleeing the scene at a high rate of speed, the report said.

The officer went to the Dodge Caravan, which police learned was stolen out of Southfield, but found no one in it. However, police found

four Cadillac XT5 silver wheels and tires inside the vehicle.

Police then went to the nearby Suburban Cadillac dealership and found a Cadillac XT5 on landscaping blocks with all four wheels missing. Officers found another Cadillac XT5 being held up by a jack, with two tires leaning against it.

According to a police report, at least three vehicles were either missing wheels or had been tampered with before authorities arrived.

Police brought a canine to the scene but the suspects who ran off couldn't be located.

CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN
ORDINANCE NO. 17 - 04

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 6 - ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS, LIQUOR LICENSING POLICY SEC. 6-33 (c) and SEC. 6-33 (d) TO EXPAND THE NUMBER OF ALLOWABLE LIQUOR LICENSES BY ONE, IN THE B-1, B-3 AND ARC ZONING DISTRICTS.

TO ACHIEVE THE REFERENCED ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS AS NOTED ABOVE THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE ARTICLES AND SECTIONS HAVE BEEN AMENDED:

Sec. 6-33. - Licensing policy.

(c) Within the B-1, B-3, and ARC zoning districts within the city, as indicated on the City of Plymouth Zoning Map, the city shall have a cap or a total of not more than eleven State of Michigan Liquor Licenses of any type of on-premises retail licenses that would allow for the service of any alcohol (beer, wine, spirits) by the glass or for consumption on premises of any establishment. This would include but not limited to State of Michigan Class C, Club, B Hotel, A Hotel, Tavern, Brewpub, Micro-Brewer, Resort, DDA, and Economic Development, winery and/or other type of state license allowing the regular serving of alcohol at a licensed establishment.

(d) The City Commission shall not recommend to the State of Michigan Liquor Control Commission the approval of any on-premises retail liquor license in excess of eleven within the B-1, B-3, and ARC districts as outlined here.

Elliott is about to turn 4, and was diagnosed on the autism spectrum at age 2. He currently attends therapy five days a week, which is very costly even with insurance.

Between all the doctor appointments and hospital stays, both parents have had to take weeks off work at a time, which has been financially devastating. They had to move in with relatives to help offset the costs of treatment combined with the lack of ability work full time. This fundraiser will help pay off some of the thousands of dollars in hospital bills as well as to provide a safety net for the family as they are one emergency away from disaster.

Missy Hinkson wasn't there to get her head shaved, but that doesn't mean she didn't get in on the action. Hinkson was there to support her good friend, Vince Austin, part

Hinkson paid \$20 to take the first chunk out of Austin's hair.

"He's a great friend," Hinkson said. "He's been doing this a long time. I just had to be the first one to cut his hair."

Austin and his son, Shaun, have both participated in the St. Baldrick's event for all seven years of its existence. That commitment earned them the coveted Knights of the Bald Table designation.

A cousin of Vince's got the duo started years ago with his own participation in a similar event in Romeo.

"It raises money for a good cause," Vince Austin said. "It's awesome to help children and those less fortunate than us."

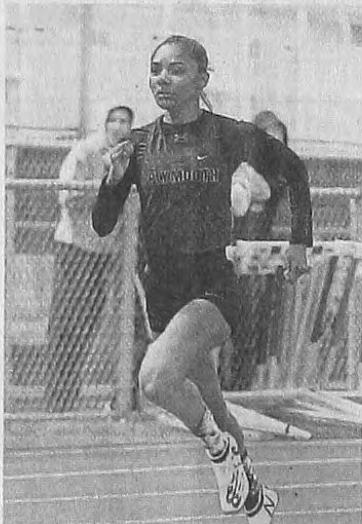
The weather changed drastically from Thursday to Friday, going from warm and breezy to chilly and damp.

Salem boys' depth and determination pay off in encore regional championship

From start to finish Friday, Salem's varsity boys track and field team had major momentum and a swagger — the kind that comes with knowing the territory.

The Rocks earned back-to-back Division 1 regional championships with an impressive 124-point tally on a chilly day and evening at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park. Their closest competitor, Livonia Churchill, registered 87.66 points while Canton came in third with 77 points.

"Our boys just ran and performed really well today," Salem second-year head coach Dale Maskill said. "It started early and they just kept carrying that momentum over and they were just firing each other up. They kept carrying it through every event.

Dyer, a junior, won the event with a time of 38.94 seconds, edging Vaunado (39.56). Both will go after each other again at the June 3 state meet in East Kentwood; the top two finishers in each event Friday automatically qualified.

Maskill said Dyer showed a winning brand of determination that helped rack up points for the Rocks.

"He (Dyer) had a really good leg of the 200 of the 4-by-2 and he was warming up for the 300 (hurdles) and he talked to me and told me he felt really good, and he was going to try to win it," Maskill said. "Down the back stretch over the third to last flight he took the lead and just never looked back. He had a great run."

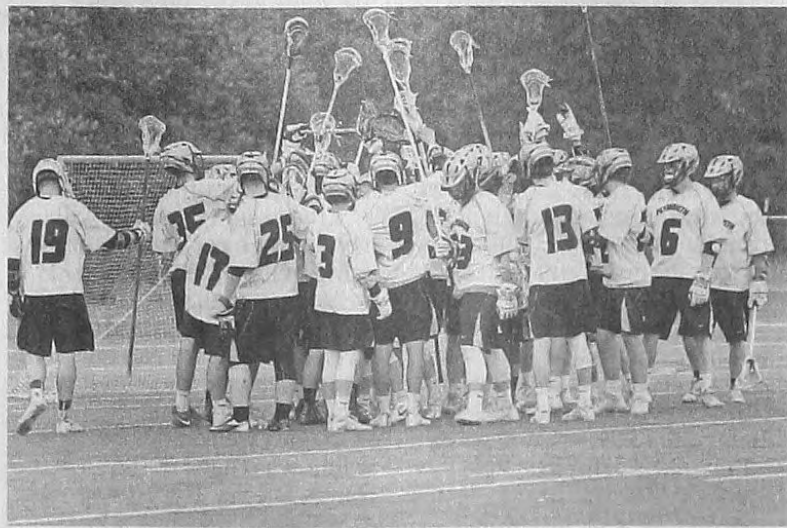
"Our seniors really stepped

"It shows the dedication we have at practice," said Davis, about how Salem's relay teams have chemistry that pays off in big moments. "The bottom line is it makes us better as a team if we can push each other."

Dyer noted that familiarity with each other helps. "You got to know if your guy is coming in fast, if he's coming in slow, and when to go."

Phillips, who also won the long jump, talked about being part of a group of athletes that has a special connection.

"It means a lot, running with a great team and people I have a bond with," Phillips said. "Because I actually play football with them and it's a really good bond, we just work hard every day."

There were other Salem successes on a cold and windy day — a much different setting than the balmy weather at the previous week's Kensington Conference meet (also at P-CEP).

Alex Howie won the shot put, Cameron Grace was second in the high jump and among additional state qualifiers were distance runners Andrew Beyer and Christo Jeffers (mile run) and Luke Haran and Ryan Exell in the two-miler.

According to Maskill, a key to Salem's regional title was scoring points on a consistent basis in distance events.

"Our distance runners had a nice day today," Maskill said. "They've had a little rough go of it lately because we had to see Novi so many times. And it's hard to look good behind Novi because they have a lot of quality."

"But our distance runners were able to show that they are a good distance crew, and we're really excited to see what those guys are going to be able to do in the next couple years because we have young distance runners."

Weather a factor

Churchill interim coach Jordan McLellan said the weather conditions were something all teams had to deal with, but he wasn't about to complain with his team's overall effort.

Leading the Chargers with a new school mark of 11.01 seconds in the 100 dash was Jamal Allen.

"In the 100 dash it (cold, brisk weather) helped us a ton, we broke the school record, we had a nice tailwind," McLellan said. "But in some of the other events, we saw it affect our 4-by-2. We thought we were going to get through on time today and definitely we were a little off."

"... But there are a lot of kids from different schools maybe not turning the times they were

expecting. But it's track, everybody gets the condition and you just got to fight for those spots."

The wind helped Churchill long jumper Martell Dooley set a new mark in that event with a 21-10.5 and "we had another long jumper get through into states (Evan Cummins), he jumped the qualifier," McLellan added.

Churchill also prevailed in the 3,200-meter relay with a time of 8:10.50. In that tandem were Frank LaFave, Josh Musen, Josh Momeyer and Dash Dobar.

Canton head coach Jess Shough said the weather slowed some of his runners down "but we scored in virtually every place we felt we could."

"The last race, the 4-by-4 relay, it came down second

week in a row where we came up against Churchill and beat them," Shough said. "So we're regional champs in that one. Jemal Vaunado was outstanding again, he placed in the state in three events. Both hurdles and the 4-by-4 relay. We were very close in a lot of races."

Vaunado anchored the champion relay team, which also included Dirk Thornhill, Caleb Moraw and freshman Srikar Komanduri.

Senior Andrew Koenigs-knecht and junior Chuck Skrey went 1-2 in the pole vault with respective marks of 13-0 and 12-0.

"I was proud of the whole team," Shough said. "When you score 77 points that's good against this type of competition. We battled all season. This was a great accomplishment for them."

Other regional champions were Plymouth's Connor Bush (high jump, 6-3) and Churchill's Dobar (800 run, 2:00.03).

Also going to the state meet, thanks to finishing second in their respective events, were Livonia Franklin senior sprinter Brandon Smiley (22.22 seconds), Westland John Glenn sophomore Jared Tarrance (50.38 in the 400 dash), Churchill's LaFave in the 800 run (2:01.12) and Franklin senior Bobby Madley (51-10 in the shot put).

Plymouth junior Ethan Byrnes was a double qualifier, going both in the mile and two-mile runs with respective times of 4:25.74 and 9:31.86.

at all. But for sprinters you want it to be hot, so I feel kind of bad for them."

Murphy also was an automatic qualifier in the two-mile run with her second-place time of 11:24.05. The first- and second-place finishers in each event automatically earned spots at the state meet, set for June 3 in East Kentwood. A number of athletes also made the cut by meeting additional qualifying standards as determined by the MHSAA.

Going the distance

Another distance runner who was outstanding was Swider. She earned regional championships in the 800 and 1,600-meter runs with times of 2:20.78 and 5:13.29. In the latter race, she outdistanced Livonia Franklin sophomore (and automatic state qualifier) Erin Seibert (5:18.03).

Another double winner for the Chargers was Bradley. She finished second in both hurdles events. In the 100 hurdles, she finished in 15.04, trailing event champion Haven Essien of Salem (15.00).

Bradley's 46.36 in the 300 hurdles only trailed the 45.18 turned in by Wyandotte Roosevelt's Kyana Evans.

"She (Swider) actually scored a lot for us in the 800 and 1,600 meters, winning both of those for us," Churchill first-year head coach Bruce Rivera said. "Our other senior point collector was Taktia Bradley. All season long just very, very tough in the hurdles and the 200 (dash) and she anchors that 4-by-4 for us as well."

"But our distance crew, collectively, Gabby Swider's kind of at the head of that with the (800) and the (mile). Christina Murphy and Kathleen George, the George girls, Caro-

line (George) as well. They're going to be tough to replace next year, big time."

Rivera said his team will have a "nice representation" going to East Kentwood.

"A very nice surprise, I couldn't be more proud of the girls, how they all ran and competed," Rivera said. "And we came away with one, for sure. Plymouth was on our heels and Salem was there until the last couple events. Hats off to them as well."

Still a good day

Veteran Plymouth head coach Ricky Styes, who also will accompany a nice group up to the state meet, pointed to Churchill's strength in distance events as a key reason his team came up just short in the team standings.

"That's where they (Churchill) got us today, they scored a lot of points in the distance and we tried to make it up in the sprints," Styes said. "They've got a good hurdler, Taktia Bradley, good kids in the vault."

"(Senior) Annie Bonds, our best distance runner, ran 14

seconds faster than she has all year (third in the 3,200 run, 11:30.80). She ran phenomenally, but it's they got a lot of depth."

The Wildcats qualified in the 400- and 800-meter relays, however. In the 4-by-100, Erin Bradley, Paige Sanders, Delia Brennan and Reghan Draper finished second (50.29) while the combo of Sanders, Faith Washington, Reghan Draper and Rylen Draper won the 800 relay (1:42.37).

In the latter race, Salem's Ayanda Brydie, Madeline Kernahan, Lauren Ogarek and Haven Essien also qualified with a second-place finish of 1:46.72.

Rylen Draper, a senior, earned the No. 1 spot in the 400 dash with a time of 56.23; she placed second in the 200 dash behind event champion Anavia Battle of Wayne Memorial. Battle won with a 24.30 time while Draper finished in 24.88.

Double winner

Battle was a double regional champ, also winning in the 100 dash — with her 11.91 time outpacing Canton sophomore Jada Sabir's 12.32.

Field events also yielded several state qualifiers for Plymouth.

Leading the way was freshman high jumper Kennedy Chastang, who jumped 5-feet even.

"She (Chastang) did a great job, she's been improving all year," Styes said. "Long jumper Paige Sanders jumped 16-11, hit the qualifying mark. It was her first big jump in a big meet and she stepped up."

"Our two pole vaulters, Natalie Janke and Emily Caragay, have been really solid vaulters for us. Both hit the qualifying mark of 10-3 in jumps and both had really good days."

Also qualifying for states was Canton's 1,600-meter relay team of Ryan Sparks, Sabir, Carmen Bruchnak and Donae Adams. That quartet came in second with a time of 4:07.67.

Other regional champions included Salem junior Essien in the 100 hurdles (15.00) and Churchill sophomore Visscher in the pole vault (11-0).

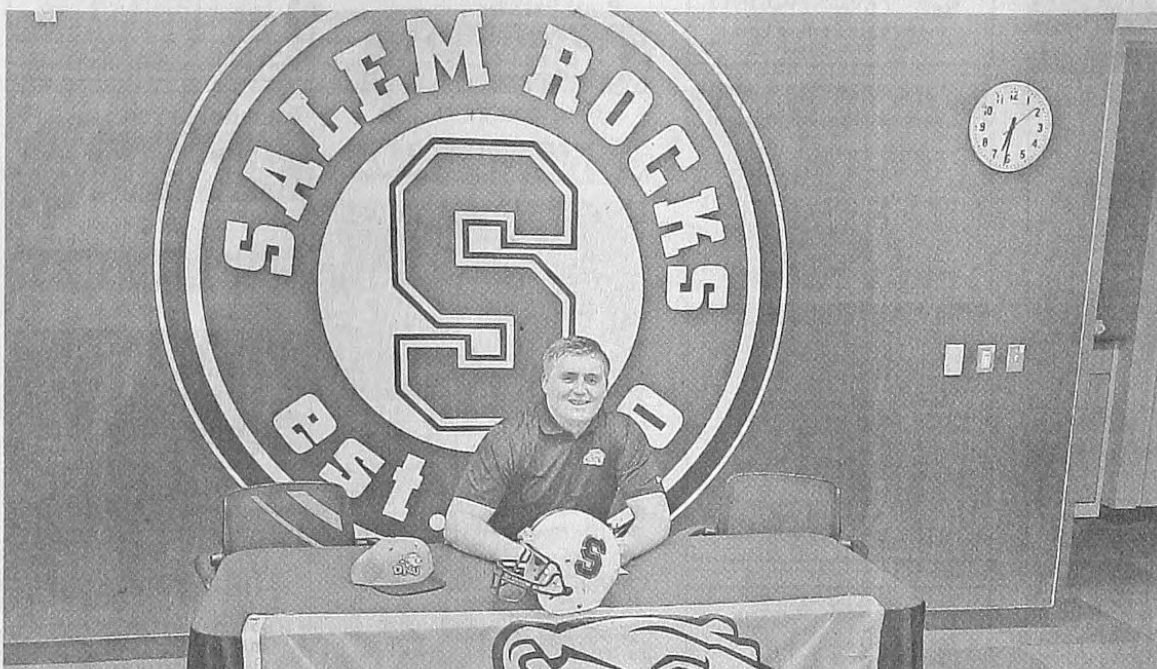
